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CATCHING UP WITH:

RENEGADES RELIEF PITCHER

RENEGADES MAGAZINE: We are a little past the halfway mark of the season, it's kind of crazy to think about that. How do you feel like your season has gone to this point and kind of how things have been coming along for you?

Matt Keating: I think that the start of the season has gone pretty well. I think that together as a team, we're starting the bond more, and I could hope to expect that we'll play a little better in the second half this year.

RM: You mentioned the way the team's been bonding. It's been really the same core group since Opening Day. How big is that, for that kind of bonding and that chemistry in the clubhouse, of just being around these guys every day since, you know, spring training and most of last year, too?

MK: It's huge from a team aspect. You know, most minor league teams, the reason why they have two halves of the season is because the teams change so much. But with this core group of guys, I think since we're all getting a lot closer, it's going to be really important that we kind of lean on each other throughout the season, so that, you know, towards the end of the year, we're really clicking.

RM: We've seen you come out of the bullpen quite a bit so far this year. How do you feel like you have improved as a pitcher from April at the beginning of the season to where we are now?

MK: Well, we've been blessed with some really good pitching coaches here in the Yankees organization, and I've had some specific stuff that I've been working on this year I have two new pitches – a one seam fastball and a slider. I think I've been working quite a bit on both, mainly just getting them into the strike zone, which has helped me, you know, with getting weak contact early and staying ahead in counts. And I think continuing for me to work on that throughout the year will help me, you know, lower the walks increase, the strikeouts give our guys a better



chance at winning.

RM: How difficult is it to kind of get a feel for especially the one seam it's not a pitch that a ton of guys throw. How has that process been of learning that and kind of, kind of getting a feel on that this year?

MK: I think getting a feel for the pitch was pretty easy, because all it requires is using your same four-seam fastball grip, but you just shift the ball a little bit, so you rely on that seam-shifted wake. So it's been a little difficult when I first started throwing it to find a good start line where I want to start it to have it end up in the strike zone. Because most pitchers I know use their four-seam fastball as their line for all of their pitches, and they let the movement of the pitch determine where it ends up in the strike zone. The one-seam has been a little different because I've had to use a different focal point. So instead of using like the catcher's mask, I would use my the catcher's shoulder to have it kind of run back into the strike zone. So it took me a good month or two to figure that out, and I'm still working on it, but I think that that's come a long way since the beginning of the year.

RM: Why did you and the Yankees feel like, all right, this is going to be a pitch that that is going to work well for you?

MK: They were looking at some of the metrics on my four seam fastball, and one of those metrics that they look at is gyro degree, which I'm not going to pretend like I know a whole lot about, but that's that's why they get paid the big bucks. My gyro degree was in an ideal range for this one-seam pitch, for that seam-shifted wake to work. And [Yankees Pitching Director] Sam Briend came to me at the end of last year and said that he thought that could be a good addition for me. So this off season, that was my number one priority: to show up to camp with a new pitch. And you know, I think that he's been pretty happy with that so far. But again, you know, it's still got a long ways to go, but we're gonna

keep working on it, and hopefully he'll be pretty happy with it by the end of the year.

RM: In college you finished up at USC, but but started off at Southeastern Community College in Nebraska as a two-way player. And you had some some really good offensive numbers while you were there. Looking back was the transition from two-way to being just a pitcher something that was kind of difficult for you at first, or did you kind of always know, like, all right, my future in baseball is as a pitcher and on the mound, and you found that something easy to embrace?

MK: That's a really good question. I was actually a catcher in my whole life growing up through my junior year of high school, and then I transitioned to playing third base, and then [my coaches] let me throw a couple of innings on the mound. So I never really considered myself to be a pitcher. I got to Southeast Community College, and, you know, I was, I started at third base and hit, and then they would pull me straight from third base and put me on the mound. So I just kind of felt like I was getting up there and just throwing, you know, but I felt like that made it an easier transition, because I still felt like an athlete as a pitcher. I think a lot of people tend to, as they've pitched for longer, fall into more of the pitcher only term, where they just kind of go through the motions, and I think that it's kept it pretty fresh for me. I still feel like I'm learning a whole bunch as a pitcher, but it feels like a new term to me. I've always considered myself more of a position player, hitter, but this has been really fun, you know, getting to learn from some of the best minds around and every day, you know, I show up with wide eyes, you know. So it's been a pretty cool experience.

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REYZ OF HOPE

PERSEVERING THROUGH INJURIES, ERIC REYZELMAN HAS BURST ON THE SCENE IN 2024

The baseball journey of Eric Reyzelman has been far from easy. From Tommy John surgery as a teenager to missing nearly all of 2023 with injury, the road has never been easy for the right-handed pitcher. As he's battled injuries during many stages of his career, the right-handed pitcher has gained some valuable perspective.

"It feels good to be at a ballpark playing baseball," Reyzelman said. "When I first got here, I was just ecstatic to be in a uniform, sitting in the bullpen talking to the guys. Two years removed from real games is not easy, so being out here is something I've never going to take for granted."

This season, Reyzelman returned to the mound on May 28 to begin a rehab assignment with the FCL Yankees, pitching for the first time since August 4, 2023. After being drafted in the 5th round by the Yankees in 2022 out of LSU, the 23-year-old had appeared in just nine total games entering this season. Reyzelman spent all of 2023 on the Tarpons 60-day injured list.

After concluding his rehab assignment in early June, Reyzelman joined the Renegades on June 11th, his first opportunity at the High-A level. He was outstanding as soon as he arrived, striking out 17 batters in 9.2 scoreless innings with Hudson Valley, allowing just two total hits. He earned a call-up to Double-A Somerset on July 2nd.

It certainly wasn't the first time Reyzelman was forced to overcome adversity. Growing up in Northern California, Reyzelman attended De La Salle High School, a powerhouse athletic program that has won dozens of regional and state championships across many sports. While Reyzelman was at De La Salle, the baseball team won four North Coast Section titles.

However, the talented pitcher was only a part of one of those championships. He was cut until his senior year.

"That molded me into the player I am now," Reyzelman said. "It helped me overcome some of the other challenges I faced as well. Being on the brink of losing the game of baseball definitely changes your perspective on it. I attribute a lot of my success to the adversity I faced there."

Reyzelman made the most of his senior year at De La Salle, earning a 0.55 ERA and an 8-0 record. This got the attention of the University of San Francisco, where Reyzelman began his college career in 2020, where more challenges emerged. Reyzelman was forced to undergo Tommy John surgery that March. Looking back, the timing of the rehab was fortunate.

"I got really lucky when I had UCL reconstruction," Reyzelman said. "It was right when COVID hit, so I had that year of recovery and that year of rehab. And it kind of got me to a place where I was really able to work on my stuff and develop in ways I hadn't before. The rehab is a blessing in disguise for a lot of guys."

After a disappointing season in 2021 at USF, Reyzelman traveled to Massachusetts in the summer to pitch for the Harwich Mariners of the Cape Cod League, a decision that would transform his career. A strong performance there built his confidence and caught the eyes of other colleges.

"That was the big first real turning point in my career," Reyzelman said. "The opportunity to show that I could compete with those guys was awesome. I faced guys at a competition level that I'd never faced before. And my confidence was higher than it had ever been."

Reyzelman leveraged that performance in the Cape into an opportunity at LSU in 2022, one of the premier college baseball programs in the country. He took full advantage of it, striking out 66 batters in 42.1 IP against top-level SEC competition. He fully embraced the culture shock that was moving from Northern California to the Bayou.

"I had never had any idea baseball would get me to that point," Reyzelman said. "I remember watching them on TV, seeing [Alex] Bregman, seeing [Aaron] Nola, become big leaguers. For me, it was a fever dream. I enjoyed every second of it. The fans, the atmosphere, the city are awesome. The first thing you realize is that everyone you meet has such good intentions. They want to help you succeed and help you find ways to grow closer to the community."

After his tremendous success with the Tigers, Reyzelman was drafted in the 5th round by the Yankees, where he faced his next hurdle. After a four-game debut in 2022, Reyzelman was sidelined for much of 2023, only making five rehab appearances with the FCL Yankees.

In 2024, Reyzelman appears to have returned to the dominant form he showed at LSU. The right-hander began his return in 2024 with 5.2 scoreless frames in the FCL, before continuing his excellence with Hudson Valley. While Reyzelman is excited about his success, he continues to prepare himself for the ups and downs.

"Everything takes time," Reyzelman said. "Patience is the biggest lesson I've learned. You got to be where your feet are. For me, it took a while to get to that mindset. Once I did, it became easier, and I go day by day."

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FROM BHUTAN TO THE HUDSON VALLEY

RENEGADES ENGAGE IN FIRST-OF-ITS KIND INTERNATIONAL OUTREACH PROGRAM IN AUGUST

The Hudson Valley Renegades, the High-A affiliate of the New York Yankees, and the Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association are ecstatic to announce a first-of-its-kind event in Minor League Baseball, as the organizations have partnered to create Bhutan Night, a cultural program aimed at growing the game of baseball in the Kingdom of Bhutan.

The Renegades have been engaged in fundraising efforts to benefit the Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association and help grow the game in the Kingdom of Bhutan.

“When we first learned about baseball in Bhutan last summer, our first instinct was ‘How can the Renegades be a part of this?’” said Zach Betkowski, General Manager of the Renegades. “After our first conversation with Matt DeSantis from the Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association, it was clear that this had the potential to be truly special, and the event took off from there.”

“With over a decade of baseball being played in Bhutan, having this extraordinary opportunity for young Bhutanese to play ball in the very valleys where I first fell in love with the game is a heartfelt moment. We hope it inspires them to continue their journey in the sport,” expressed Matthew DeSantis, a native of Fairfield County, Connecticut who introduced baseball to Bhutan, and currently chairs the Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association. “We are grateful to the Renegades for their commitment to growing baseball and providing opportunities for kids near and far to learn about the professional acumen of the sport, both on and off the diamond.”

As highlighted in a viral article by Michael Clair at MLB.com last August, baseball has become the fastest-growing sport in Bhutan, with more than 6,000 children playing in a nation of around 700,000 citizens. The Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association has organized youth leagues throughout the country to grow the game at a grassroots level, though most kids have never seen a professional game in its entirety before, only able to watch highlight clips of MLB games to learn the sport.

“Global collaborations in baseball empower associations in developing countries, uniting communities through the game,” said Karma Dorji, the President of the Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association.

During the game on August 20, the Renegades will wear special Bhutan-themed jerseys which will be auctioned off to help raise funds for the BBSA. The jerseys feature the Druk, the “Thunder Dragon” which is a national symbol of Bhutan and is prominently featured on its national flag, and heavily incorporates the Bhutanese national colors yellow and orange.

“We wanted to make sure that the jersey tastefully paid homage to Bhutan’s national identity,” said Betkowski. “They look unlike anything that has been worn on a Minor League Baseball field before, and we are so

proud of how they came out.”

In addition to the jerseys, the Renegades will be auctioning off unique items and experiences throughout 2024 to help raise money for the trip and for Bhutan Baseball & Softball. Fans can also make a direct donation on the auction page, which can be accessed at www.hvrenegades.com/bhutan.

Over the past few months, the Renegades staff alongside the Bhutan Baseball & Softball Association staff have worked tirelessly to plan an immersive itinerary for the athletes to come to our area and experience a true taste of America.

The night is also slated to be a T-Shirt Tuesday presented by Heritage Financial Credit Union, with a special Bhutan Baseball T-Shirt to be given away to 1,000 fans.



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HUESTON, WE HAVE NO PROBLEM

Hueston Morrill grew up in the heart of Gator country outside of Gainesville, Florida. As a kid, he dreamt of playing sports at the University of Florida. The fervor around athletics in that area was inspiring for Morrill to witness.

“The backing they get as a community is incredible,” Morrill said. “Homecoming games are electric in the swamp, and you can feel it all the time.”

When it came time for college, however, playing baseball at Florida wasn’t in the cards. Instead, Morrill made the trip west to Stillwater to become an Oklahoma State Cowboy.

“I felt like I could go there and make an immediate impact,” Morrill said. “I know it was a little far away but at the same time I trusted myself to go out there and be the best I could be.”

He began his career in the Big 12 as a shortstop, playing in 147 games as an infielder across four years. Until his junior year, Morrill didn’t take the mound. He made just three appearances as a pitcher in 2021, before 14 outings in 2022. As he remains early in his pitching career, Morrill brings a unique skill set to the rubber.

“Being a two-way guy in high school and playing in the infield in college, it honestly just made me a better athlete,” Morrill said. “They always say pitchers are athletes too. I kind of like to take that mentality to my game and try to use some of those athletics abilities as a shortstop or position guy and try and take those to the mound.”

Morrill has displayed his all-around talents throughout the season. He frequently makes impressive catches shagging flyballs during batting practice, including a couple of home run robberies in the outfield. The right-hander was also featured as the number one play on Sportscenter’s “Top 10 Plays” earlier this season, making a diving stop on a groundball before an underhand flip to first.

With pitching continuing to become his athletic pursuit, Morrill is ensuring that he maintains the joy and excitement that sports brings him. Athletics in a recreational form help him reset.

“It’s the highlight for me every day,” Morrill said. “I just love going out and running around. Football, baseball, it doesn’t matter. I always want to be as athletic as I can be. I don’t have a plan on stopping that now. I like to just go out and have fun.”

If Morrill could have played another sport?

“We talked about this the other day in the bullpen. Honestly, men’s volleyball. I know that sounds a little weird, but going up jumping and spiking the ball seems pretty cool to me. I got to do it a little bit in college taking some classes, it was pretty fun for me.”

In the summer of 2022, Morrill signed with the Yankees as an undrafted free agent. As he began his professional career, he watched as two former Oklahoma St teammates were drafted by New York in the 2023 MLB Draft. Infielder Roc Riggio was taken in the fourth round, before pitcher Brian Hendry was selected in the 10th round.

In April of 2024, they were reunited as teammates with the Hudson Valley Renegades.

“It’s amazing to share that same career path,” Morrill said. “It honestly was a shock to me when I first got here. When Riggio and Hendry signed here, I just thought, man, that’s amazing. Now we got something to talk about. Just seeing those guys bring the same work ethic they had to this organization is incredible. Seeing our growth and maturity is pretty awesome.”

Since being called up to Hudson Valley in late April, Morrill has shown tremendous growth. His fastball consistently is registered in the mid-90s with strong command. The 24-year-old feels immensely grateful to have ended up in the Yankees organization.

“There’s a level of development that’s incomparable to anyone else,” Morrill said. “The coaching staff, they’re brilliant, they’re professionals in their craft. With all the instruments that you can use here, it’s been a big help for me. They allow you to be yourself and trust who you are.”

Gades pitch in for a good cause

Serving the Hudson Valley community is an essential part of the Hudson Valley Renegades mission, and the organization would not be here celebrating 30 years without your support. Each year, the award-winning Renegades Community Program presented by Westchester Medical Center Health Network (WMCHHealth), gives back multitudes to our entire community. In 2024, the Renegades are rolling out another season filled with giving back to the Hudson Valley.

Youth Field Betterment Program

The first is the Youth Field Betterment Program, presented by Heritage Financial Credit Union. Each year, front office and Heritage Financial Credit Union representatives come together to renovate a local Little League field. This year's recipient of a renovated field is Lee Town Recreation Park of the East Fishkill Babe Ruth League.

The field was chosen for its ability to provide access to baseball and a place to develop valuable life skills for children throughout the Hudson Valley. The focus of East Fishkill Babe Ruth is on more than just baseball as they seek coaches and volunteers who can set positive examples and act as role models throughout the season and beyond for the children playing.

East Fishkill has also opened its enrollment to children from neighboring communities with baseball programs that have seen their enrollment numbers decline to the point of limiting their ability to continue their programs so that all children have a place to play.

The Youth Field Betterment refurbishment of Lee Town Recreation Park will allow East Fishkill Babe Ruth to continue to provide an enjoyable experience to every child who wants to learn and play the game of baseball from the levels of T-Ball through 13U in both recreational teams and local travel teams.

HOPE Week

2024 also marks the return of HOPE Week presented by WMCHHealth, a Yankees community service initiative. Each Yankees minor league affiliate carries out its own HOPE Week, which stands for Helping Others Persevere and Excel. This is the 11th season in which all Yankees affiliates have hosted HOPE Week, continuing a valued tradition. The Renegades HOPE Week will be taking place June 25-30.

On every day of that week, Renegades players, coaches and front office staff will go out in the community and donate time to making the Hudson Valley a better place. In the past few years, the Renegades have executed events at the Castle Point VA hospital, the Fishkill Food Pantry, and the Maria Fareri Children's Hospital at MidHudson Regional Hospital.

The organization that the Renegades are honoring are also brought out to that night's game at Heritage Financial Park to both bring a rewarding experience to those doing good in our community, but also to raise awareness for the causes they are fighting for.

Disability, Dream and Do (D3) Camp

Hudson Valley will also be offering the Disability, Dream and Do (D3) Day Camp once again. Since 2017, the Renegades have held a clinic at the ballpark to benefit children with disabilities. The D3 sports camps were created by Dave Clark and Doug Cornfield. Clark was the only pitcher in professional sports history to pitch on crutches, while Cornfield is a former NCAA medal-winning runner at Georgia, whose child was born without arms. Through donations and sponsorships, these camps are free to campers.

D3 camps bring professional players together with children with special needs, who compete in drills and competitive sports. In 2016, Dave Stevens became involved with D3. Stevens was born without legs, playing minor league baseball and college football. With his help, D3 camps expanded across the United States, allowing kids with disabilities to learn to pursue their dreams. This year's edition of the D3 camp at Heritage Financial Park will take place on Saturday, August 3.

These community programs are just a small sampling of the myriad programs that the Renegades offer on top of monetary, in-kind, and time donations made by the club and its staff. For the Gades, creating magical experiences that become life-long memories for the entire community is not something that begins and ends at Heritage Financial Park.

NICK ORTIZ | *MANAGER*

Ortiz begins his first season as the manager of the Renegades in 2024, returning for a second stint with the Yankees organization after spending the past four seasons as the Quality Assurance Coach for the San Francisco Giants. Before serving on Gabe Kapler's staff in San Francisco, Ortiz served a dual role for four seasons in the Yankees system, serving as an Amateur Scout covering Puerto Rico and a Minor League coach. He was an assistant coach for Rookie-level Pulaski in 2016, and managed GCL Yankees West in 2017 and 2019 and Pulaski in 2018. His Pulaski roster featured six future Major Leaguers on it, including former Renegades Oswald Peraza, Everson Pereira, Ezequiel Duran and Luis Medina.

In addition to his Major and Minor League coaching experience, Ortiz has coached and managed in the prestigious Puerto Rican Winter League for the Gigantes de Carolina and the Cangrejeros de Santurce, a league in which he played in for 16 seasons (1991-93, 1996-2007 and 2012) and was a six-time All-Star.

He began his coaching career after a 15-year playing career in Minor League Baseball, playing all four infield positions in the Boston, Montreal, Cleveland, Los Angeles-NL, Kansas City, Chicago-NL, and Yankees organizations. Ortiz also played for the Puerto Rican National Team in 2010 at the Central American and Caribbean Games. He was drafted in the 34th round of the 1990 First-Year Player Draft by the Red Sox out of Cidra High School in Cidra, Puerto Rico.

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Code of Conduct



In order to provide a welcoming experience for all, the Hudson Valley Renegades have implemented a Fan Code of Conduct. Out of respect for fellow guests, players, coaches, and ballpark staff, all guests are prohibited from...

- *Trespassing on the playing field at any time*
- *Interfering with baseballs that are in play*
- *Throwing or tossing objects*
- *Using foul, obscene or derogatory language (see below) or gestures*
- *Misusing or overconsuming alcohol, Including underage consumption*
- *Behaving in a manner that is disruptive, unruly, or abusive*
- *Accessing areas of the ballpark without a proper ticket, pass, or credential*
- *Misusing tickets, passes, or credentials in any way*
- *Bringing prohibited items into the ballpark*

Derogatory language is defined as offensive language concerning a person's race, ethnicity, gender, religion, disability, age, sexual orientation, or national origin. Anyone using such language is subject to automatic ejection from the ballpark.

Violations of the Fan Code of Conduct will not be tolerated and may lead to ejection from the ballpark, a ban on attending future games, or other consequences. Guests who are found to have used derogatory language will be ejected from the ballpark.

Guests are encouraged to report violations of the Fan Code of Conduct to the nearest ballpark staff member. This can be done in person, at the nearest Guest Services location, or directly with Ballpark Security.



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
