## OWNERSHIP FRANK WARD - OWNER

Frank Ward has three loves: his family, real estate and baseball. All three have led him and MFP Baseball to Nashville.

With more than 40 years of involvement in real estate, Ward's wide range of business experience includes restructuring corporate organizations, developing high-rise office buildings in New York City, and serving as chief operating officer of a very large commercial real estate company. After serving in the U.S. Army in Korea shortly after graduating from high school, Ward earned an accounting degree from Capitol University in
Columbus, Ohio.
Ward was hired out of college by Kenneth Leventhal \& Company (now Ernst \& Young) in Columbus, Ohio, in 1971 as an auditor, and he eventually moved into corporate restructuring. Ward moved to Kenneth Leventhal \& Company's New York City office in 1973.

In 1982, Ward was hired as Managing Director and Chief Financial Officer of HRO International, a client of his at Kenneth Leventhal \& Company that was the most active high-rise office building developer in Manhattan. Ward remained at HRO International until 1995. That year, he accepted an offer to serve as Chief Operating Officer of Hiro Real Estate Co.

One of his first responsibilities at Hiro Real Estate was to draft a business plan to turn the company around. He did, and over the next 13 years, Ward steadily decreased debt and increased profits. Ward worked at Hiro Real Estate Co. as Chief Operating Officer from 1995 to 2008 before leaving with fellow Sounds owner Masahiro Honzawa to start MFP Real Estate.

Ward is a longtime baseball card collector. Acquiring the Nashville Sounds promises to be a logical progression of his career and love of the game. Between collecting cards and his more than 25 years of experience playing fantasy baseball, Ward's hobbies may be as valuable to MFP as his real estate experience.

Ward is married and has four children, two sons and two daughters, ranging from 30 to 46 in age. He and his wife, Renee, live in Nashville. Ward's sons Christopher and Timothy, and daughters Danielle and Katie all live in Nashville. Frank and Renee are the proud grandparents of three grandchildren.

Ward fell in love with Nashville during trips to visit his daughter at Vanderbilt. He is excited that Nashville is a growth market for real estate and has promise as a great baseball town.

## MASAHIRO HONZAWA - OWNER

MFP President Masahiro Honzawa ran the U.S. operations of his family's Hiro Real Estate Co. from 1995 to 2008. Honzawa was also active in the company's Japanese operations.

The Honzawa family has owned and operated a privately owned, 7 million-square-foot warehouse business in Japan and extensive real estate in New York City, Chicago and Los Angeles.

Honzawa graduated from Keio University in Tokyo in 1991 and continued his education in the U.S., where he earned an MBA from Columbia

University in 1998.
Before he took the helm of Hiro Real Estate's U.S. operations in 1995, he interned with Arthur Andersen LLP in New York, where he met his future MFP business partner Steve Posner, who was the partner on the Hiro Real Estate account for Arthur Andersen at the time.

DOUG SCOPEL - VP OF OPERATIONS
Doug Scopel, who initially joined the staff as an intern in February 2000, oversees all aspects of operations for the Sounds and First Horizon Park. The 2021 season marks his 23 rd in professional baseball.

Scopel played a pivotal role in helping the Sounds secure the coveted 2019 Triple-A Bob Freitas Award. The Freitas Awards have been presented by Baseball America annually since 1989 and recognize franchises for their community involvement, long-term business success and consistent operational excellence.

In August 2018, Scopel was honored by Ballpark Digest as Minor League Baseball's Executive of the Year. He was also honored by Minor League News as the 2006 Public Relations Director of the Year.

He was promoted to his current position in January 2015 after previously serving a variety of roles, most recently as the Sounds' Vice President of Baseball Operations \& Communications. Along with team ownership, Doug served as the Sounds' point person for the design, project management, and construction teams during the planning and development of state-of-the-art First Horizon Park, which opened in April 2015.

Prior to arriving in Nashville, he served as a media/community relations assistant for the Rancho Cucamonga (Cal.) Quakes.

A Pittsburgh native, Scopel earned a journalism degree from Marquette University in Milwaukee. He resides in Nashville with his wife, Michelle, daughter, Bella, and son, Milo.

Under Mayhood's guidance the Sounds sales and marketing department played a key role in securing the 2019 Triple-A Bob Freitas Award. Bryan joined the Sounds in August 2016 from Corpus Christi, Texas, where he served as the Director of Ticket Operations for Islanders Athletics at Texas A\&M University-Corpus Christi since December 2014.

CHAD SEELY - DIRECTOR OF COMMUNICATIONS
Chad Seely joined the Sounds in November 2015 and was promoted to Director of Media Relations in November of 2016. He was named to Director of Communications in April of 2021.

He's responsible for writing and distributing press releases, managing game day press box operations, co-managing the club's social media efforts, facilitating baseball information, and handling media requests and content of the team's publications and website.

During the season, Seely supports the media with their gameday needs.

Prior to joining the Sounds, Seely served as the Communications Manager for the Reno Aces where he managed all communications efforts, team travel, and baseball operations. Seely also spent two years with the Clinton LumberKings of the Midwest League as the Director of Broadcasting and Media Relations. Peter Brooks joined the Sounds in April of 2021 and assists in all aspects of media relations including game notes, media requests, game recaps and social media, among other responsibilities.

Prior to the Sounds, Brooks served as a Media Relations Assistant with the Chicago White Sox where he wrote game notes, postgame notes and was responsible for a stat pack and lineup.

Brooks' first job in professional baseball was working as a Media Relations Assistant for the Gwinnett Stripers in 2019. With the Stripers, he was the secondary media contact and assisted in all media aspects for the team.

Brooks has also worked for the Rochester Honkers of the Northwoods League, the Cedar Rapids Gazette and the Dispatch-Argus.

He graduated from Mount Mercy University in 2018 with a bachelor's degree in journalism and was also a member of the baseball team. Brooks is a native of Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

## RICK SWEET • MANAGER

Rick Sweet, 68, enters his eighth season in the Brewers organization. Sweet has served as Milwaukee's Triple-A manager for all previous seven seasons. He has posted a 439-402-1 (.521) record during that timeframe. In 30 years as a Minor League manager, Sweet has a 2,141-2,042 (.512) record. His 2,141 wins are the second-most among active Minor League managers, behind only Myrtle Beach's Buddy Bailey $(2,145)$. The 2,141 wins are good for 7 th-most all-time.

Since 2014, Sweet has served as the manager for Milwaukee's Triple-A club. He managed the Sounds to a 77-67 record in 2014, narrowly missing the playoffs by 2.5 games. He managed the Colorado Springs Sky Sox from 2015-18 and San Antonio Missions in 2019. Sweet was expected to manage the Missions in 2020 prior to the Minor League Baseball season being cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

Prior to joining the Brewers, Sweet spent the previous nine seasons in the Cincinnati Reds organization as manager of Triple-A Louisville (2005-11) and as the Reds' catching coordinator (2012-13).

During Sweet's stint in Louisville, he became the franchise's all-time winningest manager with a 539465 (.537) record. His Bats won three consecutive International League West Division championships from 2008-10.

Sweet previously managed in the minors with the Seattle Mariners (1987-88), Houston Astros (198995), New York Mets (1997), Montreal Expos (1998, 2000), San Diego Padres (2001-03), Detroit Tigers (2004) and Cincinnati (2005-11). He was the first base coach for the Astros in 1996 and Field Coordinator for the Expos from 1999-2000.

He was named Pacific Coast League Manager of the Year in 1994, International League Manager of the Year in 2008 and 2009 and Baseball America's Triple-A Manager of the Year in 2010.

Sweet has managed in the Triple-A All-Star Game three times. He was the skipper for the Pacific Coast League in 1993 and 2003, and for the International League in 2009. He and Dave Miley are the only two people to manage three different teams in the Triple-A All-Star Game.

A former catcher, Sweet had a nine-year playing career (1975-83), including time in the big leagues with San Diego (1978), New York-NL (1982) and Seattle (1982-83). He was drafted by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the 31st round of the 1974 amateur draft but did not sign, and by the San Diego Padres in the 3rd round of the 1975 amateur draft. He attended and played college baseball at Gonzaga University from 1973-75.

## JIM HENDERSON • PITCHING COACH



OPENING DAY AGE: 38

Jim Henderson begins his first season as pitching coach of the Nashville Sounds in 2021. It's his fourth season overall as a member of Milwaukee's coaching staff at the minor league level.

Henderson was set to serve as the pitching coach for the Triple-A San Antonio Missions in 2020 prior to the Minor League Baseball season being cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

In 2019 he spent the season with Single-A Wisconsin as pitching coach for the Timber Rattlers. In 2018 he was the bullpen coach for the Short-Season Helena Brewers and assistant to the professional scouting department.

Henderson pitched professionally for 14 seasons (2003-16), including four years in the majors with the Brewers (2012-14) and New York Mets (2016) in which he compiled a 10-11 record with a 3.61 ERA in 155 career games and led Milwaukee with 28 saves in 2013.

The Canadian spent parts of three seasons with Nashville (2011-12, 2014) and appeared in 58 games with the Sounds. He was named a 2012 Pacific Coast League All-Star.

Henderson represented Team Canada in the 2011 Pan American Games where he won a gold medal. He also represented his country in the 2013 World Baseball Classic in 2013 and 2017.

He was drafted by the Montreal Expos in the 26th round of the 2003 MLB June Amateur Draft out of Tennessee Wesleyan College in Athens, Tennessee.

## SOUND BYTES - IT'S A CYCLE

Outfielder Tike Redman became the first Nashville Sounds player in the club's history to hit for the cycle, accomplishing the feat in 2001.

On June 30 at Tucson in a 6-5 defeat, the Sounds' leadoff hitter grounded out to second to open the game, singled to shortstop in the fourth inning, homered to right in the sixth, doubled down the right-field line in the seventh, then completed the feat with a one-out triple during the Sounds' 9th.

Catcher J.R. House joined Redman in the Nashville cycling club when he accomplished the feat on May 21, 2004 at Sacramento to lead the Sounds to an 8-7 win.

The backstop ripped an RBI double in the first, singled in the third, belted his eighth home run of the year in the fifth (off Sacramento starter Joe Blanton), and completed the feat with a go-ahead, two-out RBI triple on a 3-2 pitch in the top of the seventh inning that gave Nashville a lead that would last the remainder of the game.

Outfielder Caleb Gindl became the third member of the Sounds' cycle club on July 10, 2011, when he accomplished the feat at Albuquerque during a 9-5 Nashville victory.

The right fielder ripped a triple in the second, homered in the third, doubled in the eighth and completed the feat with a single in the ninth.

## SOUND BYTES - STREAKING

In 1999, the Sounds posted the longest winning streak in minor league baseball by accumulating 15 straight victories from June 2 to June 20.

The streak included four consecutive series sweeps and saw Nashville outscore their opponents 110-61. The Sounds' streak ended on June 21 with an 8-7, 13-inning loss at Tucson. Nashville nearly kept the streak alive, coming from behind to knot the score with two runs in the top of the ninth and then taking a brief 7-6 lead in the top of the 12 th before ultimately falling short.

The 2018 Nashville Sounds' squad matched the 15-game winning streak when they ran off 15 straight from July 29 - August 14. Nashville swept a seven-game homestand against Fresno and Sacramento before sweeping a four-game series in Colorado Springs to run the streak to 13 games. Back home again, the Sounds won the first two games against Round Rock before falling, 3-1, on August 15. Nashville outscored their opponents, $89-48$, during the streak and hit .309 as a club.

## 2019 SEASON NOTES

The Nashville Sounds finished the 2019 season with a 66-72 record, good for third place in the Pacific Coast League's American Northern Division. They finished 8.0 games behind the first place Iowa Cubs. The Sounds spent 91 days in fourth place, 52 days in third place, one day in second place and one day in first place.

First Tennessee Park welcomed 578,291 fans during the 2019 season, the fifth straight year of over 500,000 . It's the fourth time in the five-year existence of the park with over 550,000 fans. The average attendance of 8,631 fans per game was the second-highest average in the Pacific Coast League and third-highest in all of Minor League Baseball behind only Triple-A Las Vegas $(9,299)$ and Triple-A Columbus $(8,684)$. First Tennessee Park hosted 23 sellouts, the most in a single season in ballpark history.

Nashville finished with a $36-32$ record on the road, the seventh-best mark in the Pacific Coast League. In five years away from First Tennessee Park, the Sounds are 176-175. Comparatively, the Sounds finished with a 30-40 record at home in 2019 .

A total of 74 players played for the Sounds in 2019, including 43 pitchers and 31 hitters. 10 of the 74 players went from Nashville to Texas for their Major League debut. The list includes pitchers Kyle Bird, Brett Martin, Taylor Hearn, Pete Fairbanks, Phillips Valdez, Locke St. John, Pedro Payano and Brock Burke. The two hitters to make their MLB Debut were Scott Heineman and Nick Solak. Players who were with the Sounds from start to finish were pitchers Tim Dillard and Wes Benjamin, catcher Jett Bandy and infielders Eli White and Matt Davidson.

The Sounds finished the 2019 season with a whopping 254 transactions. The most transactions in a single day occurred on July 11 when the team made 10 different roster moves. 32 of the 74 players who played for Nashville in 2019 also played in the big leagues in 2019.

Nashville played its best baseball down the stretch with a record of 19-9 in the month of August. The 19 wins were tied for the second-most in the Pacific Coast League (Memphis - 22). It's the fourth-highest win total in a single-month for Nashville in the PCL era.

Nashville's longest winning streak during the 2019 season was five games, done two separate times. The team's first five-game winning streak was from June 29-28 when they finished a series with a win over New Orleans and then went on to sweep Memphis in a four-game series. The second five-game winning streak was from August 12-17. The Sounds finished a four-game series with two wins in Sacramento before returning home and winning the first three games in a series against Omaha.

The Sounds played their best baseball in tight games. In contests decided by one-or-two runs, Nashville went 38-26. It was the second-best record in the Pacific Coast League in such games, behind only Round Rock which went 38-25.

Right-handed pitchers David Carpenter and Seth Maness were selected as Mid-season Pacific Coast League All-Stars. Both hurlers pitched in the 2019 Triple-A All-Star Game in El Paso, Texas and helped the PCL to a win over the IL. Prior to the All-Star break, Carpenter was 0-0 with a 2.16 ERA (25.0 IP/6 ER) with 14 saves in 14 attempts and Maness was $5-2$ with a 4.97 ERA ( 67.0 IP/37 ER) in 12 starts.

Right-handed pitcher David Carpenter was named to the All-PCL Team as the Reliever. The team is selected through voting by the league's managers and media representatives. In 39 games, Carpenter went 2-0 with a 1.63 ERA ( 38.2 IP/7 ER). He led the league with 21 saves in 22 attempts. Carpenter limited Pacific Coast League hitters to a .213 batting average while racking up 42 strikeouts. He was the first Sound to be recognized on the All-PCL Team since Renato Nunez in 2017, and he is the first pitcher to garner the honor since Jimmy Nelson in 2014.

Infielder/outfielder Patrick Wisdom and left-handed pitcher Joe Palumbo each won a weekly honor from the Pacific Coast League. Wisdom was named PCL Player of the Week for his play from August 5-11. Wisdom hit .435 (10-for-23) with 9 runs scored, 11 RBI, 7 home runs, 1 double, 3 walks and 32 total bases with a 1.391 slugging percentage and 1.891 OPS. Wisdom became the third player in franchise history to hit at least one home run in six consecutive games. Palumbo was named PCL Pitcher of the Week for his play from August 12-18. Palumbo made one start for Nashville during the span and tossed 6.0 no-hit innings against Omaha on August 15. The southpaw struck out seven and walked two in the win. Wisdom and Palumbo became the first pair of Nashville teammates to win back-to-back weekly honors since Caleb Gindl (8/20-26) and Hiram Burgos (8/27-9/3) accomplished the feat in 2012.

## 2019 SEASON NOTES

Right-hander pitcher Tim Dillard and outfielder Zack Granite were named Co-MVP's. The award is voted on by the coaching staff and players. Dillard went 9-9 with a 4.75 ERA (153.1 IP/81 ER) in 33 games (21 starts). Dillard led the Pacific Coast League in innings and was sixth in ERA. He finished just outside the top-10 in strikeouts with 103. Dillard led Nashville with 10 quality starts and the team went 11-10 in his starts. Granite played in 119 games and hit 290 (146-for-504) with 66 runs scored, 18 doubles, 8 triples, 3 home runs, 37 RBI, 31 walks and 25 stolen bases. He finished among PCL leaders in triples (T-4th), hits (6th) and stolen bases (7th).

Infielder/outfielder Patrick Wisdom was named the team's Fan Favorite choice in 2019 in an online vote. Wisdom played in 107 games and hit 240 ( 95 -for- 396 ) with 68 runs scored, 15 doubles, 31 home runs, 74 RBI and 53 walks. Wisdom's 31 home runs are the eighth-most in Nashville Sound single-season history. Wisdom's power-packed season was highlighted in early August when he hit at least one home run in six consecutive games from August 4-10. He's the third player in franchise history to homer in six straight games.

Left-handed pitcher Wes Benjamin was recognized with the team's Community Service award. Benjamin was a regular in the Nashville Sounds' community appearances. The southpaw took time out of his personal schedule to make multiple trips to Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt to visit with patients and their families. Benjamin was a consistent presence in pregame autograph Sundays and participated in youth baseball clinics at First Tennessee Park.

The Sounds had two pitchers lead the Pacific Coast League in a pitching category. Right-hander Tim Dillard led the circuit with 153.1 innings pitched and right-hander David Carpenter led the PCL in saves with 21.

Infielder Nick Solak had an 18-game hitting streak from July 30-August 18. It was the longest streak by a Sound and tied for the fifth-longest hitting streak in the Pacific Coast League. During the 18 -game stretch, Solak hit . 432 ( 32 -for- 74 ) with 16 runs scored, 4 doubles, 6 home runs, 19 RBI and 4 walks. Solak's 18-game hitting streak is tied for the sixth-longest by a Sounds player in the PCL era (1998-present).

Outfielder Zack Granite had a 15-game hitting streak from May 3-18. It was tied for the 16th-longest
streak in the Pacific Coast League in 2019. During the streak, Granite hit . 394 (26-for-66) with 10 runs scored, 3 doubles, 4 RBI and 4 walks. It's tied for the 13th-longest streak by a Sounds player in the PCL era.

Infielder Matt Davidson put together one of the best offensive seasons by a Sound in team history. In 124 games, Davidson hit .264 (124-for-469) with 74 runs scored, 24 doubles, 33 home runs, 101 RBI and 42 walks. Davidson's 33 home runs are the third-most in a single-season and his 101 RBI are the fourth-most. Most of Davidson's offensive output started in June. From June 1 to the end of the season, he hit . 307 (84-for-274). Davidson finished among Pacific Coast League leaders in home runs (T-6th) and RBI (T-6th).

Infielder Matt Davidson drove in a team-high 30 runs in the month of August. It's the second-most runs knocked in by a Nashville player in a single-month in the PCL era (Chad Hermansen, 33 - July of 1999). Davidson's red-hot August included a . 340 (34-for-100) average with 17 runs scored, 6 doubles and 9 home runs.

Infielders Matt Davidson (33) and Patrick Wisdom (31) became the first pair of Nashville teammates to hit at least 30 home runs in the same season. The powerful duo joined Seth Brown (37) and Mark Payton (30) of Las Vegas, Jared Walsh (36) and Jose Rojas (31) of Salt Lake, Sam Hilliard (35) and Roberto Ramos (30) of Albuquerque and Yadiel Hernandez (33) and Brandon Snyder (31) of Fresno as teammates in the Pacific Coast League to both hit at least 30 home runs.

Infielder Andy Ibanez had a career-year for the Sounds. The 26-year-old hit . 300 (140-for-467) with 91 runs scored, 30 doubles, 20 home runs, 65 RBI and 53 walks. He set new career-highs in batting average, runs scored, total bases (232) and home runs and matched a career-high in hits. The 91 runs scored by Ibanez is the ninth-most by a Nashville player in single-season team history. It was the 12th-highest total in the PCL. He scored 29 of his 91 runs in August, the second-highest amount by a Nashville player in a single month in the PCL era.

Infielder Andy Ibanez and catcher Adam Moore were the only two Nashville hitters in 2019 to drive in five runs in a single game. In a 13-10 win at Sacramento on August 13, Ibanez went 4-for-6 with 5 RBI and in a 10-6 win over Memphis on May 24, Moore went 2-for-3 with 5 RBI. Nashville hitters put together 16 different 4-RBI games, led by Ibanez and Matt Davidson who had three each.

## 2019 SEASON NOTES

Left-handed pitcher Joe Palumbo struck out 10 batters in a 4-3 win over Oklahoma City on July 1. Palumbo's performance was the only 10-strikeout game by a Nashville pitcher in 2019. It was the first time a Nashville pitcher struck out at least 10 batters in a game since left-hander Eric Jokisch had 11 punchouts on June 15, 2018 at El Paso.

Right-handed pitcher Tim Dillard threw a complete game in a $7-3$ win over Albuquerque on August 2. Dillard's complete game was the only one by a Sounds pitcher in 2019. Dillard allowed a one-out, three-run home run in the first inning but faced the minimum 26 batters after the long ball. He allowed a base hit in the fourth inning but got a double play and allowed a walk in the eighth but induced another double play. The nine-inning complete game by Dillard was the first of its kind since Jharel Cotton threw a one-hit, complete game shutout on August 9, 2016 at Round Rock.

Right-handed pitcher Tim Dillard entered the season as one of Nashville's all-time leaders in several pitching categories from his time with the Sounds from 2007-2014. He is now the franchise leader in wins (48), games (242), innings pitched (710.0), strikeouts (437), runs allowed (398), home runs allowed (62) and walks allowed (233). He is second all-time in losses (33) and third in starts (69).

Outfielder Zack Granite had a stellar month of May in which he hit .330 (38-for-115) with 18 runs scored, 3 doubles, 1 triple, 1 home run, 12 RBI, 7 walks and 10 stolen bases in 26 games. The 38 hits by Granite were tied for the fifth-most in the Pacific Coast League and his 10 stolen bases checked in at thirdmost. The two marks were among the best by a Sounds in a single month as well. Granite's 38 hits were tied for the 18th-most by a Sound in the PCL era and the 10 stolen bases were tied for the seventh-most.

Infielder Nick Solak was red-hot in August and produced the second-highest batting average by a Nashville player in a single month in the Pacific Coast League era (minimum 75 PA). He hit . 414 (29-for-70) with 15 runs scored, 4 doubles, 5 home runs, 18 RBI and 4 walks. Solak's .414 average in the month of August is second to only Vinny Rottino's . 420 average in August of 2006.

Outfielder Scott Heineman carried the load for Nashville in the month of July. He hit . 388 (31-for80) with 19 runs scored, 3 doubles, 1 triple, 4 home runs, 10 RBI and 10 walks in 21 games. Heineman's .388 clip is the ninth-highest average by a Nashville hitter in a single month in the PCL era. Heineman had a seven-game hitting streak from July 4-13 and an 11-game hitting streak from July 16-31.

Among David Carpenter's league-best 21 saves, seven of those came in the month of July when he went $1-0$ with a 0.82 ERA (11.0 IP/1 ER). The seven saves for Davidson in July is the seventh-most by a Sounds player in a single month in the PCL era.

The 2019 pitching staff for the Sounds set several records. As a collective unit, the staff allowed fran-chise-highs in the following statistics: runs allowed (814), earned runs allowed (732), home runs allowed (175) and hit batters (96). The one complete game thrown by the team in 2019 was also a franchise-low.

May 5, 2019 will go into the Pacific Coast League record book for the Sounds. In an 11-2 loss to Memphis at First Tennessee Park, Nashville pitchers matched a league record by hitting five batters. Right-hander Yoel Espinal hit four batters and Joe Kuzia hit one. It's the fifth time in league history a team has hit five opposing batters, and the first since Oklahoma City vs. New Orleans on May 4, 2015.

## HISTORY



## NASHVILLE BASEBALL HISTORY

The 2021 season marks the 43rd in Nashville Sounds team history, and the first as a member of the Triple-A East League. It also marks the second round as the Triple-A affiliate of the Milwaukee Brewers after the two organization spent 10 years together from 2005-14.

Despite the 43rd season as the Nashville Sounds, baseball's roots in Nashville go back to the 19th Century. In fact, baseball has been played in Middle Tennessee since at least 1860, when the Republican Banner newspaper published a July 25th report on the game's popularity the previous fall. During the Civil War, Union soldiers temporarily based here helped spread the game in the local community. Home field was a place known as the Sulphur Springs Bottom, a half-mile north of today's state capitol.


When the original Southern League was organized in 1885, Nashville was a charter city and games were played at Nashville's Athletic Park, as the Sulphur Springs Bottom location came to be known. The city fielded several entries in the league over the next ten years -- the Americans (188586), the Blues (1887), the Tigers (1893-94), and the Seraphs (1895) -- but was unable to claim a pennant.

When the Southern Association was formed in 1901, Athletic Park - which was later given the name Sulphur Dell by famed sportswriter Grantland Rice -- became the permanent home to the Nashville Volunteers (or Vols, for short), who played there for the next 61 years. Under the guidance of manager Newt Fisher, the Nashville club won the SA's first two pennants. The team, which was not known as the Vols until a "name the team" contest conducted prior to the 1908 season, continued to build a solid, loyal fan base.

Over the years, Nashville would stake claim to several more pennants, 18 SA batting championships, and the all-time SA home run mark (Bob Lennon blasted 64 longballs in 1954).

The hitters weren't the only players experiencing success, however. Vols hurlers notched 16 SA strikeout titles -- more than any other team -- and Nashville produced several 20 -game winners. But year after year, the league's ERA title eluded Nashville pitchers, mainly due to the extremely short 262 -foot porch in right field that resulted in countless home runs for left-handed sluggers and caused pitchers to refer to the ballpark as "Sulphur Hell."

Negro League baseball was also part of the Nashville sports landscape in the early 20th century. Nashville's Thomas T. Wilson formed the semi-pro Nashville Standard Giants in 1920 and the team quickly built regional reputation throughout the South. In 1931, Wilson's team gained entry into the Negro National League and was later renamed the Nashville Elite Giants.

Wilson Park, an 8,000-seat stadium, was constructed in early 1929 in the Trimble Bottom section of Nashville, near the old Meharry Medical College and Waldon College, right in the middle of Nashville's largest Negro community. His marketing strategy, however, appealed to fans of all race and the facility was used throughout the following decade by numerous community groups and promoters, both black and white.

Unfortunately, the Negro National League disbanded the following year but Wilson kept his team alive by joining the Southern Negro League in the 1932 season. The NNL was reincarnated in 1933 and the Elite Giants rejoined the league for two additional seasons in 1933-34. Due to a declining economy, Wilson moved the club to Columbus following the 1934 campaign, ending Nashville's involvement in the Negro League scene.

In addition to the professional teams based in Nashville, Sulphur Dell also played host to countless Major League clubs and several Hall of Famers over the years. It was common for teams to stop and play games in Nashville on their route from Florida spring training to their northern homes. In addition, barnstorming teams became popular visitors to the Dell.

## NASHVILLE BASEBALL HISTORY

Among the famous names to play on this site over the years include Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig, Hank Aaron (who made his professional debut at Sulphur Dell), Ted Williams, Minnie Minoso, Monte Irvin, Cool Papa Bell, Bob Feller, Rube Waddell, Warren Spahn, Satchel Paige, Roy Campanella, Jackie Robinson, Eddie Mathews, Josh Gibson, and Honus Wagner.

Following the 1961 season, the Southern Association disbanded and Sulphur Dell sat empty for a year. But, in 1963 the South Atlantic League came to town and Nashville had its first Double-A team.

Unfortunately, the Double-A Vols had a disappointing inaugural season and the franchise folded. In 1969, Sulphur Dell was razed and a parking lot was built on the site.

After a fifteen-year hiatus, professional baseball returned to Music City in 1978 as the Southern League expansion franchise team, the Nashville Sounds. Owner and general manager Larry Schmittou, who had been involved in the Nashville baseball scene for several years as the head coach of the Vanderbilt collegiate squad, was instrumental in the re-emergence of pro baseball in Nashville.

Schmittou employed the city's entertainment scene into the nickname and country \& western stars such as Larry Gatlin, Jerry Reed, Conway Twitty, and Richard Sterban (bass singer of the Oak Ridge Boys) became Sounds stockholders.

The club played their home games at a new facility, Herschel Greer Stadium, located south of downtown at the foot of St. Cloud Hill in Fort Negley Park. Fans responded to the return of baseball to the city by flocking to the ballpark. Nashville led the Southern League in attendance in each of their seven seasons as a member of the circuit.

As a Cincinnati Reds affiliate in the Double-A Southern League, the Sounds finished 9th during their inaugural campaign in 1978 but easily led the league in attendance, drawing 380,000 fans (more than double the second-place attendance). The club returned with a resurgence the following season, leading the nation in minor league attendance and capturing the Southern League crown behind manager George Scherger. The Sounds beat cross-state rival Memphis for the Western Division title, then defeated Columbus for the SL championship. Pitcher Scott Brown captured the one honor that had eluded Nashville pitchers for years, winning the ERA title with a 2.40 mark.

In 1980, the Sounds switched affiliations, becoming a part of the famed New York Yankees organization, and remained at the top of their game. Skippers Stump Merrill and Johnny Oates and players such as Steve Balboni, Don Mattingly, Buck Showalter, Otis Nixon, Willie McGee, Pat Tabler, Dan Pasqua, and Jamie Werly helped lead Nashville to 1st or 2nd place finishes in their division from 1980-84. In 1982, Brian Dayett brought Music City its second Southern League championship with a dramatic 12th-inning homer. Two years later, Jim Deshaies fired the club's first no-hitter.

In 1984, Schmittou purchased the Evansville Triplets of the American Association and in 1985 moved the franchise to Nashville. Nashville's Southern League franchise was moved to Huntsville (as the Sounds became a Triple-A franchise for the first time), but the Southern League would later make a unique reappearance at Greer.

The Sounds' initial Triple-A affiliation was with the Detroit Tigers from 1985-86. Although Nashville failed to win any titles during this two-year period, there were several individual accomplishments worth mention. Scotti Madison and Bruce Fields posted back-to-back American Association batting titles, and Bryan Kelly tossed the club's second no-hitter.

## NASHVILLE BASEBALL HISTORY

Sounds alumni were well-represented at the major-league level in 1985. Don Mattingly of the Yankees (1981 Sounds) picked up the American League's Most Valuable Player Award, while the National League MVP honor went to Willie McGee of the Cardinals, a Sounds player in 198081.

In 1987, the Sounds rejoined the Cincinnati farm system, this time as the Reds' Triple-A affiliate. Over the first three seasons (1987-89), Nashville fans enjoyed the opportunity to watch players who eventually made up two-thirds of Cincinnati's 1990 World Series championship roster. The Sounds also experienced success in 1990, winning an Eastern Division championship in a onegame playoff with Buffalo after both clubs finished the regular season in a tie. The extra-inning affair was one of the most exciting games in club history and was ended by Chris Jones' two-run homer in the top of the 18th inning.

Greer Stadium was the site of a rare baseball occurrence in 1988, when Nashville and Indianapolis exchanged no-hitters on back-to-back nights in early August. Jack Armstrong fired a no-no one night after Indianapolis' Randy Johnson registered a no-hitter against the Sounds, although Nashville was able to post a 1-0 victory in the contest due to a handful of Indians errors.

Over the early '90s, Nashville became a solid member of the American Association and set its all-time attendance mark when 605,122 fans came out to Greer Stadium in 1990. The Sounds switched affiliations again in 1993, this time becoming the top farm club of the Chicago White Sox. In their first year with the Sox, the Sounds won an Eastern Division crown and continued to enjoy excellent attendance, drawing over 400,000 fans for the fifth consecutive year.

The 1993 season also brought two additions to the Greer Stadium landscape: the signature, guitar-shaped scoreboard and a second professional team.

Following the ' 92 campaign, Charlotte moved up to the Triple-A level and when a proposed transfer of the Double-A franchise to New Orleans was blocked shortly before the season began, the Southern League suddenly had a homeless club. Sounds owner Larry Schmittou offered the use of Greer Stadium for the 1993 season. The Nashville Xpress -- a Twins affiliate -- would schedule home games during Sounds road trips, offering pro ball on a daily basis to local fans.

The Double-A Xpress won the first half in the West, but fell to eventual SL champion Birmingham in the playoff opener, while the Sounds went on to the American Association Championship Series before falling to Iowa in extra innings in Game 7. The Xpress were back for one more season in 1994 before relocating to Wilmington, N.C. for the 1995 season. The '94 Southern League campaign brought perhaps the most famous visitor to Greer Stadium -- Birmingham outfielder Michael Jordan, who was the talk of minor league baseball during his one-year retirement from the Chicago Bulls, made several appearances in Nashville.

On the Triple-A front, the Sounds experienced great success during their five-year affiliation with the White Sox, winning a pair of Eastern Division crowns and appearing in the 1994 American Association championship (lost to Indianapolis). Fans were provided the opportunity to watch future major-league stars such as Magglio Ordonez, Ray Durham, and James Baldwin, while many of the players who would go on to make up the 2000 AL West champion White Sox fine-tuned their skills at Greer Stadium.

The American Association disbanded in 1997 and the Sounds joined the Pacific Coast League as a member of the Pittsburgh Pirates organization -- their fifth major league organization. Along with a new big-league affiliate came a new logo, color scheme, and uniform. The Sounds spent seven seasons as a Bucs affiliate, making the playoffs once over that span.

## NASHVILLE BASEBALL HISTORY

Outfielder Chad Hermansen blasted 92 home runs in his five seasons as a Sound (1998-2002) to become the franchise's all-time leader in that category. Left-handed slugger Ivan Cruz (1999-00) became a crowd favorite with his jaw-dropping home runs. Catcher Craig Wilson burst onto the scene in 2000, falling one short of the club record with 33 homers. The PCL All-Star tied a Sounds record in June of that year by swatting three longballs in one game. And catcher Humberto Cota led the Sounds with 71 RBI in 2001 to earn the Pittsburgh Pirates' Minor League Player of the Year award.

Journeyman right-hander John Wasdin added his name to the record book in dramatic fashion during his first start of the 2003 season. The 30 -year-old tossed the Sounds' first perfect game and only the second nine-inning perfecto in the 100 -year history of the Pacific Coast League. Wasdin's gem against Albuquerque propelled Nashville to a 14-1 start, which they rode to an Eastern Division title (their first in 10 years) and a berth in the PCL Championship Series (where they were swept by Sacramento, 3-0).

Following the 2004 season, the Sounds changed affiliates once again, welcoming the Milwaukee Brewers to town as the sixth different major-league franchise to set up shop in Music City.

In the club's first season as a Brewers affiliate in 2005, the Sounds captured the Pacific Coast League championship -- the club's first-ever Triple-A title and the city of Nashville's first professional championship in 23 years, dating back to the Sounds' Southern League title in 1982.

Greer Stadium began showing its age in the 2000s and Sounds ownership initiated discussions with government officials about the possibility of a new ballpark for the city. Nashville Mayor Karl Dean announced in November 2013 that an agreement had been made for a new home for the Sounds.

In 2015, the Sounds moved into a brand new, state-of-the-art facility at the old Sulphur Dell site. The $\$ 47$ million dollar First Tennessee Park opened on April 17, 2015 when the Sounds topped the Colorado Springs Sky Sox, 3-2, in ten innings. Along with the new ballpark, the Sounds enjoyed their first season with a new affiliate - the Oakland Athletics. The Sounds finished in third place in the American Southern Division with a 66-78 record and missed the playoffs for the eighth consecutive season.

The second year with the new affiliate brought a season full of success. The Sounds finished with a record of 83-59 record in the regular season, the best in the Pacific Coast League. The 83 wins were tied for fifth-most in franchise history, and were the most a Nashville team has had since the 2007 team won 89 games. They returned to the playoffs for the first time since that 2007 season and won the franchise's fifth division title since joining the PCL in 1998.

The season ended in heartbreak, however, as Nashville met the Oklahoma City Dodgers in the American Conference Finals where the season came to a dramatic end in game five. After winning game one at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark, the Sounds dropped game two the next night. They came back to win game three at home to take a 2-1 series lead, but the Dodgers won game four, $7-1$, to set up a deciding game. In a game that featured five lead changes, the Sounds blew a 9-7 lead in the eighth inning and lost game five, 10-9.

In 2017, the Sounds finished 68-71, good for second place in the American Southern Division. Despite the sub- 500 record on the field, fans flocked to First Tennessee Park in record numbers. 22 sellouts were recorded during the season, and the Sounds averaged a PCL-best 8,861 fans per game at home. Prior to the start of the 2018 season, Trevor Hoffman became the first Nashville Sounds player to be inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

2018 would be Nashville's final season as the Triple-A affiliate of the Oakland Athletics. Manager Fran Riordan led the club to a $72-68$ record despite constant roster turnover. On August 3, 2018, the Sounds notched franchise win number 3,000 with a $6-2$ win over Fresno. On August 28, 2018, Nashville won its 1,500th game as a member of the Pacific Coast League. The 2018 season was highlighted by Nick Martini's incredible franchise-record, 66 -game on-base streak. In four years as the A's Triple-A affiliate, the Sounds finished with a 289-276 record.

## NASHVILLE BASEBALL HISTORY

Following the 2018 season, a major franchise change occurred for the Sounds. On September 20, 2018, in a press conference at First Tennessee Park, the Sounds and Texas Rangers entered into a four-year Player Development Contract, making the Sounds the new Triple-A affiliate of the Texas Rangers. The offseason of change continued when the Sounds revealed their Remastered identity. The team changed all logos, marks and uniforms in a November 15 presentation at First Tennessee Park.

The new era of Nashville Sounds baseball began when First Tennessee Park hosted the first Major League Baseball exhibition game on March 24, 2019. The Sounds hosted the Texas Rangers in front of a record-breaking crowd of 11,824 on a Sunday afternoon.

Momentum continued into the 2019 season in which the ballpark hosted 23 sellouts as the Sounds finished third in average attendance in all of Minor League Baseball. On the field, Nashville finished in third place in the Pacific Coast League's American Northern Division with a 6672 mark. The season was highlighted by several team records set by pitcher Tim Dillard and the power display from prolific duo of Matt Davidson (33) and Patrick Wisdom (31) who combined to hit 64 home runs.

Following the 2019 season, the Sounds were named the 2019 Triple-A winner of Baseball America's coveted Freitas Award. The Freitas Awards have been presented by Baseball America annually since 1989 and recognize franchises for their community involvement, long-term business success and consistent operational excellence.

2020 brought a multitude of events to both Nashville and the Sounds. In the late hours of March 2 and early hours of March 3, a tornado ravaged Nashville and the Germantown neighborhood that is home to the ballpark. The iconic guitar scoreboard was severely damanged and a large portion needed to be rebuilt. The roof to the ballpark also suffered significant damage.

During the rebuild phase of the guitar and roof repair, First Tennessee Park officially changed to First Horizon Park. In the first five years of the park, a total of $2,844,713$ fans entered the gates and 98 games were sold out.

The tragic tornado was only a sign of things to come. The Covid-19 pandemic hit Minor League Baseball hard. In early July, the entire minor league season was cancelled.

The long-standing agreement between Major League Baseball and Minor League Baseball ended on September 30, 2020 which meant significant changes were ahead. On December 9, 2020, the Sounds received an invitation from the Milwaukee Brewers as part of MLB's new player development structure. The organization officially accepted the invitation and became the new Triple-A affiliate of the Brewers.

## JOHN WASDIN'S PERFECT GAME

April 7, 2003 is a day that will live forever in the baseball history books. It just happened to be a perfect day for John Wasdin.
The 30-year-old Nashville Sounds starter fired the first perfect game in the team's 26-year history in a $4-0,100$-pitch victory over the visiting Albuquerque Isotopes at Greer Stadium.

The rare achievement was only the second nine-inning perfect game in the 100 -year history of the Pacific Coast League. Wasdin struck out Isotopes pinch hitter Rob Stratton on four pitches to

close the game before he was mobbed by his teammates just in front of the mound following his first start of the season.

Wasdin matched a Nashville individual-game record with 15 strikeouts in the contest, including the final two batters he faced, to etch his name in the record books. 72 of his 100 pitches were thrown for strikes.

Nashville manager Trent Jewett addressed the entire Sounds team about the night's significance in the Greer Stadium clubhouse immediately following the game.
"A lot of you have been in baseball a long time, but what you just witnessed, you'll never see anything more magical or more difficult," Jewett said. "Absolutely unbelievable."

Third baseman Mike Gulan provided the biggest defensive plays behind Wasdin, snaring a sharply-hit Matt Treanor line drive back-handed just inside the third-base line to record the first out of the ninth inning and making an outstanding barehand play on a Jesus Medrano bunt in the top of the fourth to nail the Isotope by a step.

Wasdin's perfect game was Nashville's first no-hit effort since Jack Armstrong tossed one against Indianapolis on August 7, 1988, and was the fourth by a Sounds hurler and eighth overall in a game involving the Sounds. Oklahoma City's
Rick Helling fired a perfect game against the Sounds in 1996.

## MANNY PARRA'S PERFECT GAME

Sounds left-hander Manny Parra made history on June 25, 2007 at The Dell Diamond in Round Rock, Texas, throwing a perfect game in Nashville's 3-0 victory over the Express in his second career Triple-A start.

The 24 -year-old hurler was mobbed near the mound by teammates shortly after 9:43 p.m. as first baseman Brad Nelson gloved a game-ending popup off the bat of pinch hitter Jesse Garcia as Parra etched his name into the record books.
"I don't think I even watched it come down," Parra said. "I was thinking, 'Is this really happening?' It was unbelievable. It's something I never thought I'd do. I've never even seen a no-hitter in person."

Parra's teammates mobbed the Sacramento native at the mound as the remaining opposing fans at The Dell Diamond gave him a standing ovation.
"It's the greatest feeling I've ever had," Parra said.
Parra (1-1), who earned his first career Triple-A victory with the historic effort, set a new career high with 11 strikeouts in the contest. He had previously fanned 10 batters on five occasions.

The southpaw, who threw 107 pitches including 77 strikes, did not face a three-ball count against any batter until the bottom of the seventh inning and worked through three-ball counts only three times all evening.

The rare achievement was only the third nine-inning perfect game in the 104 -year history of the Pacific Coast League - and the second by a member of the Nashville Sounds.


Tacoma's John Halama threw the first PCL perfecto on July 8, 2001 before the Sounds' John Wasdin duplicated the feat on April 7, 2003 at Greer Stadium.

It was the sixth no-hit effort by a Sounds hurler (second perfect game) and 11th overall no-hitter in a game involving the Sounds in the club's 30 -year history.

## 24-INNING GAME

The Nashville Sounds were on the short end of a 5-4 loss to the New Orleans Zephyrs as the teams participated in a Pacific Coast League record-tying 24-inning marathon on May 5th \& 6th, 2006 at Greer Stadium.

The 24 -inning contest, which finished with a game time of eight hours and seven minutes, was the longest in both teams' histories and matched the existing PCL mark originally set on June 8, 1909 in a game between San Francisco and Oakland then equaled on September 10, 1911 in a game between Sacramento and Portland.

Zephyrs catcher Wiki Gonzalez provided the game-winner when he drove in pitcher-turned-rightfielder Chris Schroder with a one-out RBI single up the middle off Mike Meyers that glanced off the glove of Sounds second baseman Jermaine Clark. Schroder had drawn a one-out walk and moved to second on a Josh Labandeira single.

The game-deciding run was the first scored by either team in 15 innings as both teams remained scoreless from the 10th through the 23rd frames. The Sounds and Z's completed the final six innings of the contest on Saturday, May 6th after playing to a 4-4 tie through 18 innings the previous night before the game was halted due to a curfew rule.

## SKEETER BARNES 1979, 1988-1990

William Henry "Skeeter" Barnes III ranks as one of the all-time fan favorites at Greer Stadium and currently stands as the Nashville Sounds career leader in hits (517), doubles $(94)$, at-bats $(1,898)$, and games played (514).

He played two stints with the Sounds, in 1979 (AA-Reds) and again from 1988-90 (AAA-Reds) and ranks among the top three in every major offensive category on the Nashville career leaderboard.

Barnes enjoyed success during both stints as a member of the Sounds. He was a member of Nashville's first Southern League championship-winning squad in 1979, pacing the club with 145 games played in his second year as a pro.


He excelled at the plate in his second go-around in Music City, pacing the Triple-A American Association with 39 doubles in 1989 to earn a spot on the league's postseason All-Star team and led the circuit with 156 hits in 1990, a year in which he also ranked among the league leaders with 83 runs scored and 34 stolen bases in helping guide the Sounds to a berth in the American Association championship series (Nashville lost to Omaha, 3-2).

The 16 -year veteran spent time in the Cincinnati, Montreal, Philadelphia, St. Louis, Milwaukee, Pittsburgh, and Detroit organizations during his pro career after being selected by the Reds in the first round (16th overall selection) of the June 1978 draft.

Barnes spent parts of nine major league seasons with the Reds, Expos, Cardinals, and Tigers and accumulated a . 259 average over 353 ML games. It was Skeeter's versatility as a utility player that earned him a spot in the big leagues. Barnes played seven different positions at the major-league level, a feat that most cannot list on their resume.

Additional highlights of Barnes' major- and minor-league career include:

- Hit a career-high . 368 for the rookie-level Billings Mustangs during his first pro season in 1978 ... and lost the Pioneer League batting race by nearly 100 points to teammate Eddie Milner, whose .462 mark still stands as an unsurpassed standard in any minor league season of 200 or more at-bats.
- Selected as team MVP and Eastern League All-Star in 1982 after a full year with Waterbury (AA-Reds).
- Initiated a triple play for Detroit on July 3, 1992, catching an attempted squeeze bunt by Seattle's Omar Vizquel, tagging Dave Valle and throwing to first baseman Cecil Fielder to force out Harold Reynolds in the fifth inning.

Skeeter Barnes' \#00 was retired by the Nashville Sounds in the early 1990s.

# DON MATTINGLY 1981 

Donald Arthur Mattingly played just one season in Nashville but made quite an impression on Music City while manning first base for the New York Yankees' Double-A affiliate in 1981.

Mattingly batted .316 (173-for-547) with seven homers and 98 RBIs in 141 games with the Sounds that season. He led the team in games played, hits, doubles (35) and RBIs; his 35 doubles were also the tops in the Southern League that year.

He also ranked among team leaders in hitting (2nd), at-bats (2nd), runs scored (4th-74), homers (T-4th), and walks (2nd-64). Mattingly only struck out an impressive 55 times in his 547 at-bats that year.

At the end of the year, he was named the Yankees' Minor League Player of the Year as well as to the TOPPS and Southern League All-Star teams.
"Donnie Baseball" established himself as one of the preeminent major-league stars of the 1980s. He hit for average and power, fielded his position at first base with brilliance and displayed a work ethic and charisma reminiscent of Yankee greats of the past.


He became an everyday major league player in 1984 and hit 23 homers en route to capturing the batting title on the last day of the season with a . 343 average that edged teammate Dave Winfield's .340 . In doing so, he became the first Yankee left-handed hitter to bat over .340 since Lou Gehrig hit . 351 in 1937.

Mattingly established himself as a dominant hitter from 1984 through 1989. In each of those seasons, he hit over .300, collected more than 186 hits, and -- except for 1988 -- drove in 100 or more runs. During that period, no major league player had more RBIs than his 684 , and only Wade Boggs $(1,269)$ had more hits than Mattingly's 1,219. Mattingly displayed his power in 1985 when, batting third in the Yankee lineup, he amassed career highs of 35 home runs and a league-leading 145 RBIs en route to being named AL MVP (note: Willie McGee, another former Sound and Mattingly's teammate on the 1981 Nashville squad, captured the NL MVP award that year while playing for the St. Louis Cardinals).

In 1986, Mattingly set new Yankees marks for doubles (53) and hits (238) in a season, becoming the first Yankee since Lou Gehrig to log three consecutive 200-hit seasons. During the 1987 season, Mattingly set or tied five remarkable major league records. He hit six grand slams to set a new single-season mark (he had never hit one prior to 1987). He tied Dale Long's 1956 record by homering in eight consecutive games from July 8-18. His 10 homers during that period were a major league record for total homers in an eight-game streak, and his concurrent streak of 10 games with at least one extra-base hit broke Babe Ruth's 1921 AL record. The power streak ended on July 20, the night Mattingly tied the major league record of 22 putouts by a first baseman in a nine-inning game.

From 1985 through 1989, he won five consecutive Gold Glove awards at first base. Along with Chick Gandil (1916-1919) of the legendary Chicago "Black Sox," Mattingly (1984-1987) holds the record of leading AL first basemen in fielding percentage for four consecutive years. Upon his retirement in 1997, his .996 lifetime fielding percentage at first base tied him for the all-time lead. His extraordinary fielding skills allowed him to play second base and third base on a few occasions despite throwing left-handed.

Don Mattingly returned to Greer Stadium on August 12, 1999, when his \#18 was retired by the Nashville in an on-field ceremony.

## JEFF HEM - PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

Jeff Hem continues to serve as the "Voice Of The Sounds" for the 2021 season. He enters his 10th year in Music City and his 17th overall season behind the microphone.

In 2012, Hem arrived in Nashville with eight seasons and over 1,100 games of professional baseball experience under his belt. He spent the previous seven seasons with the Single-A Kane County Cougars of the Midwest League, including 2009 when the Cougars, then an A's affiliate, were managed by former Sounds skipper Steve Scarsone.

Career highlights for the 39-year-old include making his regular season Major League broadcast debut in June 2018 with the Oakland A's for a doubleheader at the Chicago White Sox, being part of the radio broadcast team for the Triple-A All-Star Game in Columbus, Ohio, in July 2018, and calling the inaugural game at First Horizon Park on April 17, 2015. While with the Cougars, he also enjoyed the opportunity to call two minor league games at Wrigley Field in Chicago and Busch Stadium in St. Louis.

His additional duties for the Sounds include sponsorship and corporate sales and performing public speaking engagements. In the offseason, Hem continues to call the play-by-play action for several college and high school games on television and radio.

A native of Aurora, Illinois and a graduate of the University of Iowa, Hem began his broadcasting career while in college before completing an internship with the Battle Creek Yankees en route to gaining his position with Kane County. He and his wife, Alissa, reside in Hendersonville, Tenn., with their two children.

## BASEBALL TERMINOLOGY \& GUIDELINES

Consecutive-Game Hitting Streak: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if a player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit by pitch, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if a player has a sacrifice fly or no hit.

Consecutive-Game Playing Streak: A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one-half inning on defense or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running experience only shall not extend the streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

Day/Night Game: Any game scheduled to start at or after 5:00 p.m. will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start before $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. and is delayed by rain or for any other reason, it shall be considered a day game. However, both games of a twi-night doubleheader shall be considered night games. When afternoon and night games are played on the same day and separate admissions are charged, they will be counted as one day and one night game and will not be considered a doubleheader.

Determining Games Back in Standings: Determine the games above .500 of team in first place, minus the games above .500 of the team you're trying to figure out. Example: If the team in first is 5 games above .500 and you are trying to figure out how many games back a team is that is one game above .500 , then $5-1=4$, so the team is 4 games back. Or the number of fewer wins plus the number of extra losses than the leader in the standings, divided by 2 .

Magic Number: Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

Qualifying Marks: In order to qualify for a league batting title, a player must have a minimum of 2.7 plate appearances per team game. To qualify for an earned run average title, a pitcher must have accumulated a minimum of 0.8 inning pitched per game.

Quality Start: Defined as a start where a pitcher lasts six or more innings and gives up three or fewer earned runs.
Save Rule: Credit a pitcher with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions: (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club; (2) He is not the winning pitcher; and (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions: (a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning; or (b) He enters the game, regardless of the count, with the potential tying run on either base, or at bat, or on deck; or (c) He pitches effectively for at least three innings. No more than one save can be credited in each game.

Hold Rule: The hold is not an official statistic, but it was created as a way to credit middle relief pitchers for a successful outing. If a reliever comes into a game to protect a lead, gets at least one out and leaves without giving up that lead, he is credited with a hold. You cannot get a save and a hold in the same game.

Winning Pitcher: The starting pitcher will be credited with the win only if the pitcher has pitched at least five complete innings and his team not only is in the lead when he is replaced, but remains in the lead the remainder of the game. EXCEPTION: The "must-pitch-five-complete-innings" rule in respect to the starting pitcher shall be in effect for all games of six or more innings. In a five-inning game, credit the starting pitcher with a game won only if he has pitched at least four complete innings and his team not only is in the lead when he is replaced, but remains in the lead for the remainder of the game. When the starting pitcher does not meet the preceding criteria and more than one relief pitcher is used, the victory shall be awarded on the following basis:

1. When, during the tenure of the starting pitcher, the winning team assumes the lead and maintains it to the finish of the game, credit the victory to the relief pitcher judged by the official scorer to have been the most effective.
2. Whenever the score is tied, the game becomes a new contest insofar as the winning and losing pitcher is concerned.
3. Once the opposing team assumes the lead, all pitchers who have pitched up to that point are excluded from being credited with the victory, except the current pitcher.
4. The winning relief pitcher shall be the one who is the pitcher of record when his team assumes the lead and maintains it to the finish of the game. EXCEPTION: Do not credit a victory to a relief pitcher who is ineffective in a brief appearance, when a succeeding relief pitcher pitches effectively in helping his team maintain the lead. In such cases, credit the succeeding relief pitcher with the victory.

Determining Batting Average: Divide the number of at-bats by the number of hits.
Determining Earned Run Average: Take the number of earned runs, multiply by nine, and divide by innings pitched.
Determining Fielding Percentage: Divide the total number of putouts and assists by the combined total of putouts, assists, and errors.

Determining Slugging Percentage: Divide the total bases of all hits by the total times at bat (at-bats do not include walks, sacrifices, times awarded first base on interference or obstruction, or when hit by pitcher).

Determining On-Base Percentage: Add hits, walks, and hit by pitches, then divide by the combined total of at-bats, walks, hit by pitches, and sacrifice flies (times awarded first base on interference or obstruction are not figured into OBP).

Major League Rookie Status: A player is considered a rookie if he has no more than 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the big leagues. He is not a rookie if he has spent more than 45 days on a major-league roster during the 25 -player limit, even if he has fewer than 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched (service time requirement excludes stints on the DL or in the military).

## TRANSACTION TERMINOLOGY

Options: When a player is on the $40-\mathrm{man}$ roster and in the minor leagues, he is on "optional assignment." Players have three option years and can be sent up and down as many times as the club chooses within those seasons but will only be charged with one option per season. When a player is "out of options," he will have to clear irrevocable waivers in order to be removed from the 40 -man roster and sent to the minor leagues.

Waivers: If a player placed on major league waivers is not claimed by another team within two business days after waivers have been requested, then the player has "cleared waivers" and the team has secured waivers for the remainder of the waiver period. The team can do one of three things:

1. Send the player to the minors via outright assignment; or
2. Trade the player to another team, even if the trading deadline has passed; or
3. Release the player.

Note: Any trades involving a 40-man roster player (July 31 through the end of the regular season) may only involve players who have cleared major league waivers.

If a player does not clear waivers (claimed by another team or teams), the club requesting waivers may withdraw the waiver request. If the club does not withdraw the waiver request, the player's contract is assigned as follows:
a. If only one claim is entered, the player's contract is assigned to that claiming club.
b. If more than one club in the same league makes claims, the club currently lower in the standings gets the player.
c. If clubs in both leagues claim the player, preference shall always go to the club in the same league as the club requesting waivers.

Designated For Assignment: This transaction allows a club to open a roster spot for up to a 10-day period while waiting for a player to clear waivers, after which he must be released, traded, or assigned to the minor leagues.

Recalled vs. Contract Selected: If a player is on the 40-man roster, he is "recalled." If not, then his "contract is selected" from the minor league team. A player must be added to the $40-$ man roster when his contract is selected.

Rule 5 Draft: A player not on the 40-man roster is eligible for this yearly December draft if:

1. The player was 18 or younger when he first signed a pro contract and this is the fourth Rule 5 draft since he signed; or
2. He was 19 or older when he first signed a pro contract and this is the third Rule 5 draft since he signed.

Major League Rehab Assignment: A major league player may be assigned to a minor league affiliate for the purpose of injury rehabilitation for a maximum of 20 days for non-pitchers and 30 days for pitchers.The player continues to receive his major league salary. Any service with the minor league club shall be deemed major league service. Rehabilitation assignments do not count as optional assignments.

Pacific Coast League Roster Limits: Class AAA rosters are limited to 25 active players throughout the entire playing season. Minor League Disabled List: Players placed on the disabled list must remain on the list for a minimum of seven consecutive days. Players on the D.L. do not count toward a team's roster limit.

Determining On-Base Percentage: Add hits, walks, and hit by pitches, then divide by the combined total of at-bats, walks, hit by pitches, and sacrifice flies (times awarded first base on interference or obstruction are not figured into OBP).

Major League Rookie Status: A player is considered a rookie if he has no more than 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the big leagues. He is not a rookie if he has spent more than 45 days on a major-league roster during the 25 -player limit, even if he has fewer than 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched (service time requirement excludes stints on the DL or in the military).

## NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE

Nashville is the capital of Tennessee and the entertainment, cultural, and commercial center of the Mid- South. With a metropolitan population of more than 2 million people, Nashville has the largest population of any metropolitan area in Tennessee, which puts it among the 40 largest in the nation. In the past 15 years, the population of the Nashville area has grown by nearly 30 percent.

During the winter of 1779-1780, James Robertson and John Donelson founded a settlement at Big Salt Lick by the Cumberland River at the present site of the city. They built forts on both sides of the river, naming one of them Fort Nashborough in honor of Francis Nash, a Revolutionary War general. In 1784, the town was named Nashville, and it was incorporated as a city in 1806. The city serves as the final resting place of two U.S. presidents -- Andrew Jackson and James K. Polk.

Nashville is a pleasant mix of big-city entertainment and "down home" friendliness. Nashville's location places it near the nation's population center. Major cities such as St. Louis, Cincinnati, Memphis, Atlanta, \& Birmingham can all be reached by car within 3-5 hours.

The city is also the cornerstone of the Mid-South economy. It has become a leader in printing and publishing, music and entertainment, finance and insurance, healthcare management, manufacturing, and tourism.

Internationally-known companies with corporate headquarters in Nashville include:
American General, Bridgestone/Firestone, Caterpillar Financial, CNA Insurance, Cracker Barrel, Dollar General, Gaylord Entertainment, Genesco, HCA, Primus Automotive Financial Services, Shoney's, and Thomas Nelson, Inc.

In addition, BellSouth, Caremark, Dell Computer Corp., Gibson Guitar Corp., Ingram Industries, Lifeway Christian Resources, Nissan, O'Charley's, and Saturn also have significant corporate operations in the city.

When it comes to having a good time, Nashville has many entertainment options, offering a multitude of sporting events, recreational opportunities, the largest movie theatre east of the Mississippi River, restaurants, parks, and shopping malls.

The sports landscape in Nashville includes three major-league teams. The Tennessee Titans have brought the National Football League to Nashville. The Titans play in the 68,000 -seat Nissan Stadium, which is located on the east bank of the Cumberland River across from downtown. In addition, the Nashville Predators have introduced the National Hockey League to the mid-state. They play in the state-of-the-art 18,000 seat Bridgestone Arena. Nashville was awarded an MLS franchise that kicked off play as Nashville SC in February 2020. And, of course, the Sounds, a constant in the city since 1978, compete in the Pacific Coast League as the eldest active pro sports franchise in Middle Tennessee.

The city is also home to numerous special events. In the past decade alone, the city has hosted events such as the U.S. Figure Skating Championships, the NCAA men's and women's basketball tournaments, the SEC men's and women's basketball tournaments, numerous AAU national championships, and the U.S. Swimming Championships. Each year, Nashville hosts the highly-popular Country Music Marathon and the Music City Bowl, which pits teams from the Big Ten and SEC against one another each December at Nissan Stadium.

Known as "Music City USA", Nashville is a city who music tastes range from country to rock to gospel. The city has several major concert venues and many big-name concert tours make a stop in Nashville. The city also serves as home to the Grand Ole Opry, the nation's longest-running weekly radio show, and the Country Music Hall of Fame. Nashville also serves as the center of the country music industry and is one of the top recording centers in the nation.

The nightlife in downtown Nashville is always an intriguing scene. Along with the music clubs, where some of today's top country music stars got their start, there is the Hard Rock Café and the Wildhorse Saloon. All of these are located around historic Second Avenue, the focal point of downtown.

Nashville's cultural environment has helped the city earn its other nickname, the "Athens of the South." Nashville is well-known as a major education center. The area's 18 accredited four-year and postgraduate institutions are an integral part of the economic and cultural identity of the area.

The city also offers numerous cultural and artistic venues. It is home to nine performing arts facilities, including the Tennessee Performing Arts Center which is the home to a wide range of events, including Broadway musicals and performances by the Nashville Ballet, Nashville Opera, and the Nashville Symphony, which performs in the state-of-the-art Schermerhorn Center.

The city is also home to seven art galleries, 25 museums (including the Tennessee State Museum), numerous historic sites (like The Hermitage -- home of President Andrew Jackson, an exact replica of the Parthenon, and the Natchez Trace Parkway), and an upgraded public library system that includes a $\$ 50$ million downtown library.
