HELP IS ON THE WAY

36-year-old MLB veteran Patrick Corbin gets the ball for Dunedin in game one of Saturday's doubleheader, just a day after the Blue Jays announced they'd signed Corbin to a one-year, \$1 million deal. Corbin has 13 seasons of big league experience under his belt, most recently with the Rangers in 2025 after longer stints with both the Nationals and D-backs. Last season with Texas, Corbin posted a 4.40 ERA over 155 1/3 innings. Corbin was a MLB All-Star in 2013 and 2018, and won the 2019 World Series with the Nationals, recording the win in Game 7. Sportsnet's Ben Nicholson-Smith reported that Corbin has been "working out extensively" and is already tossing 80 pitches during bullpen sessions.

YOUNG SAVAGE

Just under a year after making his first professional start in Dunedin, Trey Yesavage was back at TD Ballpark on Friday to begin his path back to the majors. Making his first rehab start, Yesavage (shoulder impingement) gave up one run on one hit (an inside-the-park home run), struck out three and walked one in 2.2 innings. 30 of the 44 pitches Yesavage threw were for strikes.

BLAINE MEANS BUSINESS

On the first pitch that Blue Jays No. 15 prospect Blaine Bullard saw as a pro, he ripped a triple into right-center field off of Pirates No. 3 prospect Seth Hernandez for his first pro hit. Bullard then came around to score the first run of Friday's opener on a Peyton Williams single. He also brought home a run on an infield single in the 7th inning which tied the ballgame at 4-4. His first pro RBI, the base hit came on the 9th pitch of the at-bat.

HE'S GOT GUTS

Troy Guthrie was initially slated to start Opening Day for the Blue Jays on Thursday, but the opener was rained out and Guthrie was moved to the bullpen to pitch in a piggyback role following Trey Yesavage on Friday. In his full-season debut, Guthrie dealt three perfect innings with four strikeouts. The 20-year-old from Lakewood Ranch, FL owned a 2.28 ERA in 11 games for the league-champion FCL Blue Jays last season.

WHAT UP SKIP

First-year Manager Ryan Casteel takes over at the helm for the Dunedin Blue Jays in 2026. Casteel enjoyed a 14-year professional playing career, spending time in the Atlanta Braves, Colorado Rockies, and Seattle Mariners organizations, over which he was a four-time Minor League All-Star. Casteel retired from playing in 2024 and immediately joined the Braves as a Triple-A coach for the second-half of the 2024 season, then served as a coach for the FCL Braves in 2025. Casteel takes over for Gil Kim, who accepted a position as Tampa Bay Rays Infield Coordinator.

JOJO! HAVE YOU LEARNED NOTHING?

Blue Jays 2025 first-rounder JoJo Parker is making his professional debut for Dunedin this season. Ranked as the organization's No. 2 prospect by MLB Pipeline, the 19-year-old left-handed-hitting infielder was selected eighth overall out of Purvis High School (MS), forgoing his commitment to Mississippi State...As a senior in 2025, Parker hit .465 across 37 games, driving in 70 runs while posting a .665 on-base percentage, earning Mississippi Gatorade Player of the Year honors. He slapped a single at 109.1 MPH in the Blue Jays Spring Breakout game, and launched home runs in Minor League Spring Training at 109.3 MPH and 111 MPH.

HOW THEY GOT HERE

The Blue Jays Opening Day roster features 14 players acquired in the MLB Draft, eight signed as undrafted free agents, six players inked as international free agents, and two players signed as minor league free agents. The roster also features 10 players selected in the 2025 MLB Draft and seven undrafted free agents signed following last year's draft. A total of 12 players return after spending time in Dunedin last year, while 11 players were part of the FCL Blue Jays' 2025 championship roster.

2025 IN REVIEW

Despite missing the playoffs for a third consecutive season, the 2025 Dunedin Blue Jays tallied the most wins in the team's Class-A era (since 2021). A total of 19 players earned their first promotion to High-A, while five members of Dunedin's Opening Day roster advanced as far as Double-A: Trey Yesavage, Johan Simon, Gage Stanifer, Khal Stephen (CLE), and Colby Martin (MIA), Martin and Yesavage both reached Triple-A, and Yesavage reached the big leagues. The Blue Jays also welcomed a cast of rehab assignments throughout the year, including Alek Manohar, Daulton Varsho, Andrés Giménez, Kendry Rojas, and Josh Kasevich.

WHAT DO YA HEAR?

The Blue Jays are tabbed as having the 15th farm system in baseball per MLB Pipeline, up 12 spots from their spot a year ago at 27. The system features three top 100 MLB Pipeline prospects in the likes of Trey Yesavage (12), JoJo Parker (45), and Arjun Nimmala (77).

HANDING OUT HARDWARE

Earlier this spring, the Blue Jays announced their 2025 Minor League Award winners, recognizing Trey Yesavage as Pitcher of the Year, RJ Schreck as Offensive Player of the Year, Cade Dougherty as Defensive Player of the Year, and Victor Arias as Baserunner of the Year.

2026 DUNEDIN BLUE JAYS COACHING STAFF

Ryan Casteel | Manager Year with Toronto: 1 | Year with D-Jays: 1 | Born: Chattanooga, TN

Casteel makes his managerial debut in 2026, joining the Blue Jays organization after a 14-year professional playing career. Casteel spent time in the Colorado Rockies, Seattle Mariners, and Atlanta Braves farm systems, while also playing winter ball in Australia and Puerto Rico. A four-time minor league All-Star, he was named Australian Baseball League MVP in 2013 after earning California League Catcher of the Year honors that summer with the Mariners' High-A Modesto Nuts. Casteel spent parts of six seasons at the Triple-A level, including the final four years of his career with the Gwinnett Strippers. After being placed on the Gwinnett Development List for much of the 2024 season, Casteel was activated for a July series against Jacksonville and delivered a ninth-inning, walk-off home run on July 12 in his first game in nearly two months, lifting the Strippers to a 7-6 win after entering as a late-game defensive replacement. Two days later, on July 14, he announced his retirement following a nearly 900-game minor league career. Casteel immediately transitioned into a coaching role with Gwinnett and served as a coach with the FCL Braves in 2025 before stepping into his first managerial role. Was Arizona Fall League teammates with Blue Jays Farm Director Joe Scalfani in 2014 for the Salt River Rafterers on a team that won the AFL Championship and also included Byron Buxton, Trevor Story, Taylor Rogers, Max Kepler, and Tyler Heineman.

Brett Kennedy | Pitching Coach Year with Toronto: 2 | Year with D-Jays: 1 | Born: Galloway, NJ

Kennedy enters his first season as Dunedin's Pitching Coach and second with the Blue Jays organization after leading the Complex League Champion FCL Blue Jays pitching staff in 2025. Kennedy enjoyed a nine-year professional playing career, including MLB service time with the San Diego Padres in 2018 and the Cincinnati Reds in 2023. A Fordham University graduate, Kennedy takes over for fellow Ram Cory Riordan, who was named the Blue Jays' Pitching Coordinator after three seasons in Dunedin.

Nash Knight | Hitting Coach Year with Toronto: 3 | Year with D-Jays: 3 | Born: Denton, TX

Knight returns for his third season as Dunedin's Hitting Coach. Under Knight's guidance in 2025, Dunedin ranked among the Florida State League's top offensive clubs, finishing fourth in batting average (.244) and home runs (85), second in slugging percentage (.371), and third in OPS (.716). Through the first 46 games of the 2025 season, the Blue Jays led the league in home runs (41), on-base percentage (.368), slugging percentage (.416), OPS (.784), and runs scored (292). Eight position players earned their first promotions to High-A in 2025 under Knight, including JR Freethy, who reached Double-A by season's end. The Denton, Texas native spent six seasons as a player in the Blue Jays organization from 2015–2021, reaching the Triple-A level. He also spent time with the Rangers and Twins in his final season on the diamond 2022. A Dallas Baptist University product, Knight hit .245/.350/.352 while playing in 556 career minor league games. Knight suited up for Dunedin in parts of two seasons, playing 105 career games at TD Ballpark in his career, notably playing all nine positions in a game on Spet. 2, 2018 for a team managed by Casey Candaele. Was a member of 2017 FSL Co-Champion Dunedin team which was managed by current Toronto skipper John Schneider and included future big leaguers including Vladimir Guererro Jr, Bo Bichette, Lourdes Gurriel Jr, Jordan Romano, and Ryan Borucki. Majored in kinesiology at DBU. Brother, Austin, has coached at DBU, Texas A&M, and most recently coached in the Mariners organization.

Ashley Stephenson | Bench Coach Year with Toronto: 4 | Year with D-Jays: 2 | Born: Mississauga, ON.

Stephenson returns for her second season on Dunedin's coaching staff and fourth with the Blue Jays organization. Stephenson spent the 2025 season as a Position Coach for Dunedin, primarily working with the outfielders. She spent the prior two seasons in the same role with the High-A Vancouver Canadians, where she helped guide the club to a Northwest League championship in 2023. Inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame in 2024, Stephenson has enjoyed a storied multi-sport career. She starred collegiately in hockey at Wilfrid Laurier University, winning four conference titles and a CIS National Championship before playing professionally in both the National Women's Hockey League and Canadian Women's Hockey League. On the diamond, Stephenson represented Canada's women's national baseball team from 2004–2018, earning two Team MVP honors, an All-Star selection at third base at the 2008 IBAF World Cup, and the 2011 Baseball Canada Jimmy Rattlesnake Award, which was later renamed in her honor. In 2022, she became the first woman to manage a Canadian national baseball team, leading her squad to two victories over Team USA in the Friendship Series, before joining the Blue Jays organization.

Andy Fermin | Position Coach Year with Toronto: 9 | Year with D-Jays: 1 | Born: Cleveland, OH.

Fermin joins the Dunedin staff as a Position Coach in his first season with the club. A former infielder in the Blue Jays farm system from 2010–2016, Fermin has remained with the organization in a coaching capacity following his playing days. He served as a coach with the Double-A New Hampshire Fisher Cats from 2017-2019 and was part of the 2018 Eastern League championship staff under current Toronto Manager John Schneider. He served as Hitting Coach for the DSL Blue Jays in 2021 and managed the club from 2022–2023. He returned stateside as manager of the FCL Blue Jays in 2024 before serving as the club's Bench Coach in 2025. Fermin returns to Dunedin after spending parts of three seasons at TD Ballpark as a player in 2014-2016. His father, Felix, played mainly shortstop over 903 MLB games from 1987-1996 while with Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Seattle and Chicago (NL).

Antonio Caceres | Ast. Pitching Coach Year with Toronto: 26 | Year with D-Jays: 2 | Born: Cotui, DR

Caceres spent the past three years as the Pitching Coach for the FCL Blue Jays. A lifelong member of the Blue Jays organization, Caceres was signed out of the Dominican Republic by Toronto when he was 17. He played in their minor league system from 1995-1998, before he transitioned to a pitching coach role in 2000. He's spent the past 24 years working as a pitching coach at the lower levels of the farm system, mentoring stars over the years including Aaron Sanchez, Noah Syndergaard, Joe Musgrove, Jordan Romano, Daniel Norris, and Roberto Osuna. Has served as Pitching Coach under Dennis Holmberg for 10 seasons, also working under current Blue Jays coaches Brent Lavalley, Jose Mayorga, Cesar Martin, Dallas McPherson, and current Miami Marlins Manager Clayton McCullough.

- Corbin made his MLB debut with the Diamondbacks in 2012 and was named an All-Star in 2013. He started for the Diamondbacks on Opening Day in 2018, and Corbin was named an All-Star for the second time in his career in 2018 before joining the Washington Nationals for the 2019 season.
- He signed a six-year deal worth \$140 million with Washington, and went 14-7 with a 3.25 ERA during his first season, receiving Cy Young votes. He also served as a postseason hero in the Nationals 2019 World Series Championship run. He started Game 1 of the NLDS against the Los Angeles Dodgers and pitched six innings, surrendering only one earned run. He would pitch twice more in the NLDS, entering in both games three and five. He started NLCS Game 4, recording the win in the Nationals' pennant-clinching victory. In the 2019 World Series against the Houston Astros, Corbin relieved Max Scherzer in Game 1, pitching a scoreless sixth inning. In Game 7, Corbin pitched the sixth, seventh, and eighth innings, allowing no runs and just two hits. He was the winning pitcher, leading to the Nationals' first championship in franchise history. Corbin's 13.88 K/9 in the 2019 playoffs was the third highest by a pitcher in a single MLB postseason. Corbin won the 2019 Warren Spahn Award, awarded to the best Left-Handed Pitcher in MLB.
- After making two All-Star teams and receiving Cy Young votes in two different times through the first seven seasons of his career, since 2020, Corbin has a 5.41 ERA, which is the highest among pitchers with at least 600 innings on the mound over that stretch. He's remained a workhorse, though, tossing at least 150 innings in each of the past five seasons.
- Over the first seven seasons of his MLB career from 2012-2019, Corbin was one of the most consistent pitchers in MLB, owning a 3.80 ERA and 1.27 WHIP in 205 games.
- Over his last six MLB seasons, Corbin has thrown to a 5.41 ERA in 137 games with a 1.51 WHIP.

SCOUTING REPORT: The right-hander wields a three-pitch mix that features a fastball that sits in the 93-95 range and tops out at 98 MPH, a gyro slider that's his main put-away pitch that produced solid whiff rates, and a changeup that flashes potential with more usage down the line. Ligon joins the Blue Jays with an arsenal highlighted by a mid-to-high-90s fastball and is another example of Toronto betting on stuff after he struggled with his command at Mississippi State, but still struck out 27.9 per cent of hitters in 2025.

COLLEGE NOTES: Began collegiate career by pitching two years at the University of Miami in 2021 and 2022, before transferring to Mississippi State for the 2023, 2024, and 2025 seasons. Ligon became a full-time starter as a grad senior in 2025 after only throwing 23.2 innings in 2024 and relieving 13 of his 15 appearances. Ligon hit 100 MPH in the Cape Cod League last summer, and said he got emotional in the dugout when he got back and found out he hit 100 MPH on trackman, saying that's something every baseball player dreams of. On baseball atmosphere at Mississippi State: would be stopped on the street and asked to take photos and sign autographs. "Starkville definitely is a baseball-only place," Ligon said. "The people there love their baseball and they kind of live and die with the wins and losses.
