MOBILE CONCESSION ORDERING

Spectra is teaming with VenueNext to bring mobile ordering to all events at Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park. The facility is gearing towards being as cashless and touchless as possible in the wake of health and safety protocols precipitated by COVID-

Mobile ordering minimizes staff contact and improves speed of service by allowing fans to order and purchase concessions directly from their phones. They will be able to order from their seats and then go to the permanent concession stands to pick up their order. around the stadium.

Of course, fans who prefer to make their concessions purchases using cash or credit cards as they've done previously will still be able to do so. Each permanent concession stand in the venue will be able to accommodate both mobile and traditional purchasing options. The portable concessions carts placed around the concourse will only be accepting traditional forms of payment.



QR CODE

To make the mobile ordering process easier, there will be a QR code posted throughout the stadium. This will also be on the videoboard for all to see and scan. Fans can scan these and the concessions menus will open on their phones. To scan, all fans have to do in nost instances is point their phone camera at the code, and their phone will prompt them to open a website. If their phone camera isn't able to scan the code, people may have to download an app to be able to read the QR code.





KEN YOUNG, PRESIDENT



Ken Young has been in the recreation and facility industry for over four decades since graduating from Penn State University with a Bachelor of Science in Food Service and Housing Administration. Since 1985, Young has owned a number of food service companies specializing in arena and stadium

Young is also President of three baseball teams affiliated with the Baltimore Orioles; the Triple-A International League's Norfolk Tides, the Double-A Bowie Baysox of the Eastern League, and the Single-A Frederick Keys, an entrant in the Carolina League. He purchased the Tides in 1993 and helped supervise the building of Harbor Park, a 12,000-seat baseball stadium that Baseball America proclaimed the top Minor League Baseball stadium in the country. In the fall of 2006, he purchased Bowie and Frederick from Comcast-Spectacor while also switching Norfolk's affiliation from the New York Mets to the Orioles, giving him the top three clubs in Baltimore's Minor League organization. Young is also President of the Biloxi Shuckers who began play in the Southern League in 2015. Young oversaw the Milwaukee Brewers' Double-A Affiliate's move from Huntsville following the 2014

In 2001, Young led an ownership group to purchase the Calgary Cannons Baseball Club and in 2002, he moved the club to Albuquerque where the franchise has set new standards of success since its inception in 2003. The Isotopes have finished in the top five in Pacific Coast League attendance in each year of their existence, setting a record with 593,606 fans in 2009, and hosted the immensely successful Triple-A All-Star Game in 2007.

Young, who is a native of Philadelphia, now resides in Tampa and has been very active in community affairs. He has been Chairman of the licensing committee for the Outback Bowl since its beginning in 1986. He has also been on the Board of Trustees of Minor League Baseball since 1996. In 2002, Penn State University gave him the honor of Alumni Fellow.


JOHN TRAUB, VP/GENERAL MANAGER

Upon taking over as General Manager of the Albuquerque Isotopes in September 2003, John Traub has presided over a period of immense team growth and success. The Isotopes continually rank in the top 10 in attendance among all Minor League teams and in just 18 years of existence, the team has drawn over 9 million fans. Under John's stewardship, the Topes and Isotopes Park have consistently hosted large events that have had a national scope, including Major League exhibitions, Manny Ramirez's 2009 rehab assignment and the 2011 Triple-A Baseball National Championship

John was named 2007 PCL Executive of the Year and the team was singled out for recognition as well, receiving the John H. Johnson Award as the PCL's best overall franchise. The team also received the prestigious 2007 Bob Freitas Award from Baseball America as the most complete franchise in Triple-A Baseball. John was also presented with the 2007 Ambassador Award by the City of Albuquerque Convention and Visitor's Bureau and currently serves on the board of directors for

the New Mexico Bowl.

Under John's leadership, the Isotopes received the 2018 John H. Johnson Award presented annually by Minor League Baseball to recognize the complete baseball franchise-based on franchise stability, contributions to league stability, contributions to baseball in the community, and promotion of the



Having spent more than 20 years in the Pacific Coast League, John is the Chairman of the Triple-A Marketing Committee, was formerly chair of the league's Travel Committee and was instrumental in the creation of the Pacific Coast League PR Committee.

Prior to moving to Albuquerque, John spent 11 seasons with the PCL's Calgary Cannons (1992-2002). His titles included Director of Public & Media Relations (1992-96). Vice President of Baseball Operations (1997-1998) and Vice President & General Manager (1998-2002).

John co-authored his first book in 2012, entitled "Baseball ... A Helluva Life" - telling stories of the legendary life of Minor League Baseball executive Dave Rosenfield. The book is available online at Amazon.com.

The Los Angeles native began his career in 1988, serving as a public relations intern for the California Angels, where he remained as an intern for the better part of four seasons. He also worked as a public relations intern for the Los Angeles Dodgers during their 1988 post-season. He is a 1987 graduate of UCLA, earning a BA degree in Psychology. John and his lovely wife Liz have two children (Joe and Sophie) and live in Albuquerque along with their Wire Fox Terrier, Walter.

ACCESSIBLE SEATING

Accessible seating is reserved for guests with accessible requirements and their companions. Guests requiring accessible seating may purchase one (1) accessible seat and up to three (3) companion seats adjacent to the accessible seat. Depending upon availability, seats for additional guests will be located as close as possible to the accessible space.

Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park is committed to working with guests on a case-by-case basis to adequately accommodate individual needs. All ticket sales are based on availability.

RGCU Field at Isotopes Park is fully accessible. Guests may enter RGCU Field at Isotopes Park at any of the entry gates. Ramps are provided at all entries, and there are elevators that will take patrons to the Club Level if they choose those

ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT

No alcoholic beverages may be brought into or removed from RGCU Field at Isotopes Park. New Mexico State Law prohibits the sale of alcoholic beverages to persons under the age of 21.

Please note the following policies:

- Patrons will be required to show proper proof of age when purchasing alcoholic beverages at RGCU Field at Isotopes Park.
- New Mexico Law prohibits patrons from purchasing and/or possessing more than two alcoholic beverages at a time.
- Alcohol will not be served after the bottom of the 7th inning. This policy varies
- The Albuquerque Isotopes and Spectra Food Services & Hospitality reserve the right to deny the sale of alcoholic beverages to any quests.
- Do not allow anyone to attempt to drive if intoxicated. Assist guests to the Guest Services Booth to arrange a ride.

ATMS

There are three Enterprise Bank & Trust ATMs located inside RGCU Field at Isotopes Park. Locations are on the Club Level and on the concourse behind Sections 102 and 105.

AUTOGRAPH REQUESTS

Due to Major League Baseball's directives regulating player/fan interaction during COVID-19, players are not permitted to sign autographs at this time. Under normal circumstances, guests may make autograph requests from the Isotopes and visiting teams up to 15 minutes prior to game time. The best access to the players would be along the retaining walls near the dugouts. Guests are asked not to climb or lean on top of the dugouts and will be asked to move 15 minutes prior to game time per Major League Baseball rules.

BABY CHANGING TABLES

Baby changing tables are located in all restrooms at RGCU Field at Isotopes Park. There are "Family Restrooms" located on the concourse (both 1st and 3rd base side), Club Level and Press Level.

BACKPACKS AND OTHER BAGS

Each fan may carry one bag that is clear plastic, vinyl or PVC no larger than 12" x 6" x 12" or a one-gallon clear plastic freezer bag (Ziploc bag or similar). Additionally, fans may also carry a small clutch purse no larger than 4.5" x 6.5", with or without a handle or strap, that is subject to search.

For guests with medical or childcare needs such as diapers, wipes, formula, bottles or breast pumps, those items must be brought in a medical or diaper bag and those bags are subject to search upon entry into the stadium.

Backpacks are not permitted

Prohibited items will not be allowed inside the ballpark (see "prohibited items" for more information).

BANNERS AND SIGNS

Commercial banners and signs are not allowed in RGCU Field at Isotopes Park without express written consent from the Albuquerque Isotopes

BEVERAGES. FOOD. & CONTAINERS

No bottles, cans, food, beverages or containers may be brought into RGCU Field at Isotopes Park, with the exception of sealed bottled water. Spectra Food Services & Hospitality will make every effort to accommodate fans with dietary

BLAKE 5 LOTABURGER KIDS FUN RUN

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Blake's Lotaburger Kids Fun Run may be suspended. In normal circumstances however, kids 12 and under have the opportunity to run the bases after every Isotopes home game (they must be able to do so without a parent accompanying them), weather permitting. Listen to announcements for further details. Parents must remain in the seating area. Kids enter the field on the 1st base side (Section 118/120) and exit the field via the gate at Section 115. Parents are instructed to be at Section 115's exit along the concourse to meet their child as they exit the field at the Kiddie Korral pickup area. After every Monday game, the Isotopes allow adults to run the bases as well. For the safety of the children, Albuquerque Police Officers are present on the field.



COVID-SAFE PROCEDURES

Due to the global pandemic caused by COVID-19, the ballpark will operate according to the COVID-Safe Practices (CSPs) approved by the State of New Mexico. The Isotopes Park CSPs are located under the "Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park" tab on the Isotopes website at www.abqisotopes.com. Please note that in cases where there are inconsistencies between COVID-Safe Practices and normal circumstances, the state-approved CSPs will be implemented.

eL JIMADOR FIESTA DECK

Operation of the el Jimador Fiesta Deck may be modified due to COVID-19 restrictions. In normal circumstances, it is an exclusive hospitality area located on the Club Level and accommodates groups of 40 to 50. Those interested in booking an event on the Fiesta Deck can contact the Isotopes Group Sales Department at (505) 924-2255.

ELEVATORS

The stadium's two public elevators are located at the main entrance (McKernan Hall) and inside the gate near the 3rd base stairwell. The elevators provide access for Suite and Club seat holders, disabled guests, Isotopes front office staff and Press Box personnel. If assistance is needed, fans may also take the 3rd base elevator to access Sections 201, 203 and 205. Use of elevators may be altered due to COVID-19.

EXCHANGEABLE TICKETS

This service is suspended during COVID-19. Under normal circumstances however, you can make your individual game ticket as flexible as your everchanging schedule by selecting the "Exchangeable Ticket" option when purchasing your tickets. For an additional \$5 charge per ticket, you are purchasing a fully transferable ticket that can be exchanged for a ticket of equal or lesser value, based on availability, for any non-restricted home game (excludes July 4 and any USL soccer games and non-Isotopes events). This is a great option if you think your plans may change and you may not be able to attend the game for which the tickets were originally purchased. Your "Exchangeable Ticket" is fully transferable at any time prior to or after the game date, provided the ticket has not yet been used. Transfers must take place exclusively at the Isotopes Park Box Office. There are no refunds/credits given for tickets exchanged for a lesser value. Seating is based on availability at the time of exchange at the Isotopes Park Box Office. Tickets must be transferred within the same season and cannot be transferred to another season.

EXIT PROCEDURE

Guests are asked to exit the stadium through the designated exits located on the concourse. There are two main exits located on the 1st and 3rd base sides. In the event of an emergency, there are two additional emergency exits adjacent to Section 123 on the 3rd base side and Section 122 on the 1st base side. To help ensure everyone's safety, Isotopes Park has a no re-entry policy. Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodations are up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and are strictly limited to emergencies only.

FANS CODE OF CONDUCT

The Isotopes are committed to creating a safe, comfortable and enjoyable experience for our guests at RGCU Field at Isotopes Park.

Our staff will proactively intervene to support an environment where guests can enjoy the RGCU Field at Isotopes Park experience free of unacceptable behavior, including the following:

- Foul/abusive language or obscene gestures.
- Intoxication or other signs of impairment related to alcohol consumption.
- Displays of affection not appropriate in a public, family setting.
- · Obscene or indecent clothing.
- Any disruption of the game or event, including throwing of objects or trespassing on the playing field or in restricted areas.
- · Sitting in a location other than the guest's ticketed seat.
- · Fighting, taunting or making threatening remarks or gestures.

Any guest not adhering to the above code or behaving in an unruly manner will be removed from the ballpark. The Albuquerque Isotopes and Isotopes Park management reserve the right to determine what unruly or unacceptable behavior is.

FIELD SURFACE

Our field consistently ranks as one of the top venues in all of Minor League Baseball, recently selected by STMA as the 2014 and 2016 PCL Field of the Year and the 2013 Professional Baseball Field of the Year. Our state of the art playing surface is a four variety Kentucky bluegrass blend, growing in a root zone mixture of 92% sand and 8% peat. The turf and infield skin are maintained using John Deere equipment. The field is equipped with underground drainage and the irrigation system is composed of a Hunter ICC controller, and Hunter I-20, I-25 and I-40 heads.

FIELD TRESPASSING

Any guest attempting to enter the field of play before, during or after an event without authorization will be removed from the stadium and subject to criminal prosecution and/or fines.

FIRST AID STATION

The First Aid Station is located on the concourse behind Section 102/104. If you need immediate assistance, please notify a staff member or visit the Guest Services Booth.

FIRST GAMI

The first game in Isotopes history was April 3, 2003 at the Memphis Redbirds. The first Isotopes home game was April 11, 2003 vs. the Oklahoma RedHawks.

FORMS OF PAYMENT

During COVID-19, fans are encouraged to use cashless payments whenever possible. Cash, Baseball Bucks, Visa, MasterCard, Discover and American Express are accepted for ticket purchases at the Isotopes Park Box Office, Isotopes Pro Shop, Fun Zone Ticket Booth, all permanent concession stands and select portable concession stands. Baseball Bucks are also accepted throughout the ballpark, however certain restrictions may exist for use of Baseball Bucks

FOUL BALLS AND HOME RUNS

Batted balls and other objects leaving the field of play can be dangerous and we ask that you stay alert at all times. The extended safety netting should not give fans a false sense of safety and attention must still be paid towards protecting yourself and others in your party. Guests are permitted to keep any baseballs that are hit into the stands. However, guests may not enter the field to retrieve balls or otherwise interfere with balls in play. At no time should a foul or home run ball be thrown back onto the field of play (violators will be subject to ejection).

FUN ZONE

The Fun Zone may not be operated due to COVID-19 restrictions. During normal times however, the Isotopes Park Fun Zone is located above the berm in the right field area of the stadium. The area contains various attractions for kids, including a playground for small children, carousel, multiple inflatable bounce houses and a gravity-drop ride called "Topes Tower." Tickets for these attractions may be purchased at the Fun Zone Ticket Booth during games.

GATE TIMES

Stadium gates will open one hour and five minutes before the start of each game and all stadium amenities will be available. On occasion, stadium gates will open earlier than the stated time. All gate opening times are listed at www. abqisotopes.com and are subject to change.

GIFT SHOP

GIVEAWAYS

Promotional items, or "giveaways," are available on selected game dates to fans that possess a valid ticket on a first-come, first-served basis. One item per guest, age restrictions may apply. Guests must be in attendance at the game to receive a promotional item.

GUEST SERVICES

The Guest Services Booth, located behind Section 102 on the concourse, will be open the same time as the gates and will stay open until approximately 30 minutes following the game to assist with lost items, lost guests, emergencies, accommodations or any other questions or concerns that may arise.

JACK DANIEL 5 OLD NO. 7 CLUB

This area may be operated differently due to COVID-19 restrictions. The Jack Daniel's Old No. 7 Club is an exclusive hospitality area located behind Section 123 designed for groups of 20 to 28 (these numbers are reduced under COVID-19 restrictions). LOST AND FOUND

During games, guests may inquire about lost and found items at the Guest Services Booth. To inquire about lost and found items after a game, guests may call the Albuquerque Isotopes Administrative Office at (505) 924-2255 during business hours from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Items will be held for seven days before being discarded or donated.

LOST CHILDREN

If a child becomes lost or separated from their group, they should notify the nearest staff member and security will be informed. A lost child will be taken to the Guest Services Booth. Parents looking for their child should follow the same procedure. The Isotopes encourage guests to instruct their children what to do if they become lost or separated.

McKERNAN HALL

McKernan Hall is located at the Suite and Club entrance located directly behind home plate on the concourse. McKernan Hall is dedicated to the late Pat McKernan, former Albuquerque Dukes General Manager, who was highly respected in Minor League Baseball and New Mexico. McKernan Hall is a tribute to professional baseball in Albuquerque and includes the Albuquerque Professional Baseball Hall of Fame. Only patrons holding Suite and Club Level tickets may enter through McKernan Hall during events.

MERCHANDISE

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Isotopes Park Pro Shop operation may be altered. The Isotopes Park Pro Shop is open during all home games starting when gates open. The Pro Shop is also open Monday through Friday year-round from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm and on game-day Saturdays from 12:00 pm to 4:00 pm. Fans can always shop online 24/7 at www.abqisotopes.com or place a phone order by calling (505) 222-4059.

MESSAGE BOARD

The video board can be used to display birthday and anniversary announcements during select innings of the game. There will be a charitable donation required for all birthday and anniversary announcements along with wedding proposals and other special requests. These fees will be donated to a selected charity at the end of the season. All requests must occur 24 hours in advance of the day of the game and can be submitted by visiting the "Fan Zone" tab on team's website at www.abgisotopes.com.

MILLER LITE STADIUM CLUB

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Miller Lite Stadium Club lounge may be closed. Located on the Club Level, the Miller Lite Stadium Club is available for Club seat and Suite holders. PAGING (IN-STADIUM)

Paging is available for emergency situations only (i.e. lost children, phone emergencies, etc.). Guests can visit the Guest Services Booth to request a PA announcement. The Isotopes reserve the right to deny any announcement request.

PARKING

The University of New Mexico owns and controls most of the parking lots surrounding RGCU Field at Isotopes Park. Fans are charged \$5.00 to park in the surrounding UNM lots. Vehicles with four or more people are allowed to park in the Stadium East Lot for free. Vehicles displaying a disabled permit or placard are allowed to park for free at the UNM

Staff and general public may not park in the three lots on RGCU Field at Isotopes Park property (Lots A, B and C). Only credentialed media, disabled and Suite Holder permit parking is allowed in these lots.

Season Ticket Holders who have purchased a discounted permit may park in the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park. The permit must be displayed in their vehicles to gain access to the lots.

There are a limited number of disabled parking spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis in lots A and C. Overflow disabled parking is available adjacent to the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park on a first-come, first-served basis. Availability of parking lots surrounding the stadium is subject to change.

PETS & SERVICE ANIMALS

Pets, other than service animals, are not permitted inside Isotopes Park. Service Animals, as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act, are welcome at RGCU Field at Isotopes Park, provided they are accompanied by the handler and leashed at all times.

PROGRAMS

Programs will not be sold due to COVID-19 restrictions. The 2021 Souvenir Program will be available online via the Isotopes website (www. abqisotopes.com). PROHIBITED ITEMS

No bottles, cans, food, beverages or containers may be brought into RGCU Field at Isotopes Park, with the exception of sealed bottled water. For everyone's safety, the Isotopes do not allow laser pointers, noisemakers, fireworks, weapons, nets or any other item that may be considered dangerous or may interfere with another fan's enjoyment of the game. Please be aware this is a partial list of prohibited items and any questions should be directed to the Administrative Offices at (505) 924-2255.

RADIOS

Hand-held radios are welcome at Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park as long as they do not interfere with other guests' enjoyment of the game. The Isotopes reserve the right to ask any guest to discontinue use of such devices.

RAIN CHECK POLICY

If an official game is not played, that being 4½ innings if home team is leading or 5 innings if game is tied or if visiting team is leading, the ticket may be used as a rain check. In this case, the ticket may be exchanged for a ticket of equal or lesser value, based on seating availability, for any future 2021 regular season, non-restricted home game (excludes July 4). Exchanges are accepted exclusively at the Isotopes Park Box Office. Tickets for official games which are suspended after becoming official contests do not qualify as rain checks.

To help ensure everyone's safety, RGCU Field at Isotopes Park has a no re-entry policy. Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodations are up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and are limited to emergencies only.

RESALE & DISTRIBUTION OF TICKETS

Isotopes tickets are the property of the Albuquerque Isotopes and may not be sold or distributed. Attempted or actual resale or distribution of tickets at any price is prohibited. Isotopes management reserves the right to confiscate any tickets being sold or distributed.

SAFETY

Fans' safety is our utmost concern. We take pride in RGCU Field at Isotopes Park being a safe environment for everyone and we ask all of our guests to abide by the Fans Code of Conduct (see above). For your own well-being, please be aware that bats and balls leaving the field of play can be dangerous and we ask you to stay alert at all times. For the safety of everyone in the facility, we ask that if you see something suspicious or if you observe violations of the Fans Code of Conduct, report the situation to a member of the Isotopes staff or directly to Albuquerque Police Officers who are patrolling the park.

SCHEDULES

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, pocket schedules are not available for the 2021 season. Under normal circumstances however, pocket schedules are available at the Isotopes Park Box Office, Pro Shop and Guest Services Booth. You can also find the schedule online at www. abqisotopes.com.

Guests should sit only in the seats for which they hold valid tickets. Guests may be asked to show their ticket stub if there is confusion over a specific seat.



What is an Isoto

Since the team's inception in 2003, the nickname "Isotopes" has become one of the most popular and unique monikers in all of baseball

Webster's Dictionary and Nuclear Scientists define an Isotope as:

i•so•tope\ n: any of two or more species of atoms of a chemical element with the same atomic number and position in the periodic table and nearly identical chemical behavior but with differing atomic mass and different physical properties.

Homer Simpson and baseball fans, on the other hand, define "Isotopes" as the nickname of a fictional Minor League baseball team in the popular animated sitcom The Simpsons. In the 2001 Simpsons episode "Hungry, Hungry Homer," the Springfield Isotopes threatened to move to Albuquerque until Homer went on a hunger strike, ultimately preventing the team from moving.

The name Isotopes was chosen for its originality and popularity after it won a "Name the Team" contest, garnering 57% of over 120,000 votes. Other suggested names in the contest included Atoms, Dukes, Roadrunners, and 66ers. The extensive amount of nuclear research in the Albuquerque area provides another great link to the team name.





The distinctive "A" logo and the "Isotopes" wordmark incorporate both the nickname's scientific and fictional inspirations, creating a brand that is unique and fun. Both logos were originally conceived by Kevin Kierst, who at the time was working as the clubhouse manager for the Norfolk Tides and now serves as the Minor League Equipment Coordinator for the New York Mets. After the design's conception, both logos were then tweaked by local designer Vaughn Weeden to create the brand that has become a favorite throughout the Land of Enchantment and beyond.

Fans across the nation seem to agree, making Isotopes merchandise annually one of the top 10 sellers in Minor League Baseball since the team began in 2003.

Atomic Isotope

ISOTOPES PACIFIC COAST LEAGUE GENEALOGY









The Pacific Coast League added the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers to the 10-team circuit in 1963, before the club changed their name to the Dallas Rangers in 1964. The franchise moved to Vancouver, British Columbia in 1965, playing as the Vancouver Mounties until 1969. Following the 1969 campaign, the Mounties relocated to Salt Lake City, Utah where they were known as the Bees (1970), Angels (1971-74) and the Gulls (1975-84). The franchise moved north of the border once again in 1985, emerging as the Calgary Cannons. The franchise played in Calgary for 18 years before relocating in 2003 to their current home in Albuquerque and became the Isotopes.









Warren Schaeffer is in his first season as the Albuquerque Isotopes manager. The campaign marks Schaeffer's ninth in the Rockies organization after serving as Double-A Hartford's skipper in 2018 and 2019.

The 36-year-old enters the 2021 campaign with a 344-347 record over his five-year career at the helm, a winning percentage of .498. Schaeffer started his managerial tenure with the Single-A Asheville Tourists from 2015-17. In his first season with Ashville, he guided the Tourists to the South Atlantic League Championship Series.

Schaeffer had a .500 winning percentage in his two years with Hartford including a 73-66 record in 2019.

The Western Pennsylvania native began his coaching career in 2013-14 as a hitting coach for Short-Season Tri-City in the Northwest League.

Before entering the coaching ranks, Schaeffer played six years in the Minor Leagues, all in the Rockies .971 fielding percentage at shortstop organization. An infielder, he was over his career. selected by Colorado in the 38th round of the 2007 First-Year Player Schaeffer and his wife, Callie, Draft and proceeded to play for have two children, Beauman and Rookie Level Casper (2007), Short- Emerson, and reside in Asheville, Season Tri-City (2007), Single-A N.C. He graduated from Greensburg Asheville (2008), High-A Modesto Central Catholic High School in 2003 (2009), Double-A Tulsa (2010-12) in Greensburg, Penn. The Virginia and Triple-A Colorado Springs Tech University alumni was the (2010-11).



Pedro Lopez Hitting donah

Pedro Lopez enters his first season as the hitting coach for the Isotopes. 2021 is his second year in the Rockies organization, as he was originally slated to be the supervisor with Rookie Level Grand Junction prior to the cancellation of the 2020 Minor League season. Lopes played 13 seasons professionally (1988-2000) with stints in the San Diego Padres organization (1988-94), Milwaukee Brewers (1995-96) and Houston Astros (1998-00). Lopez was originally selected by the Padres in 21st round of 1988 amateur draft. He reached as high as Triple-A, playing parts of five seasons at the highest level of the Minors with Las Vegas (1994) then New Orleans (1995-96) and again (1999-00).



Blaine Beatty

Beatty joins the Isotopes for his first season in Albuquerque as a pitching coach. The 55-year-old is in his second year with the Rockies organization after serving as pitching coach for Rookie Level Grand Junction in 2019. Prior to joining the Rockies, Beatty spent 13 seasons with the Baltimore Orioles organization (2006-18), most recently serving as the pitching coach for High-A Frederick from 2017-18. Before joining the Orioles, he served as a pitching coach in the Mets system (2003-05) and the Pirates system (1998-02). Beatty played 12 seasons (1986-1997) professionally with stints in the Orioles organization (1986-87), Mets (1988-91), Expos (1992), Pirates (1993, 96-97) and Reds (1994-95). The Texas native appeared in seven Major League games (one start) with the Mets between 1989-91, recording a 2.30 ERA (4er/15.2ip) and 10 strikeouts.



Adhede Teffer

Hoshi Mizutani joins the Isotopes as the Athletic Trainer after having previously served in the same capacity for the Rockies Double-A affiliate, the Hartford Yard goats, in 2018 and 2019. Mizutani was a graduate assistant athletic trainer for the Portland State University softball program in 2014-15. He also assisted with men's and women's cross country teams in the fall, football in the summer, and assisted at the athletic treatment center during the academic year.



Physical Parlomence Coech

The 2020 campaign is Bailey's first as the Isotopes Physical Performance Coach. The Greeley, CO resident began working in professional baseball in 2016 with the Rockies Short-Season affiliate in Boise before serving as Double-A Hartford's Physical Performance Coach from 2017-19. Bailey graduated from the University of Northern Colorado with a bachelor's degree in Sports and Exercise Science in 2015. He also played baseball for Trinidad State Junior College from 2009-10 in Trinidad, CO.



Chris Aynn

Bullpan Caddar

Glynn is in his third season as the Isotopes bullpen catcher. The Waseca, MN native played collegiately at Wabash Valley College, Augustana University and at the University of Wisconsin Parkside. Following college he worked for Triple-A Rochester in 2014, Single-A Cedar Rapids in 2015 and High-A Fort Myers in 2016 as a videographer, bullpen catcher and batting practice pitcher. Chris' father, Gene Glynn, has spent 18 years as a coach in the Major Leagues with the Twins, Rockies, Expos, Cubs and Giants.



Gone Grown

Over the course of six seasons of the partnership between the Albuquerque Isotopes and Colorado Rockies, growth has been a consistent theme. When the two sides agreed to a Player Development Contract at the end of the 2014 season, there was hope around the Duke City that many future Rockies stars would stop at what is now named Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park along the way. Flash forward nearly seven years, and fans in Albuquerque have been rewarded by seeing much more than a small glimpse of the future in Denver.

In 2015, the first season of the affiliation, an up-and-coming infield prospect named Trevor Story was promoted from Double-A New Britain to the Triple-A Isotopes midway through the season. It was apparent early on that Story was a star in the making, but his primary position was shortstop, and Troy Tulowitzki was still holding down the fort in the Major Leagues. However, things would soon take a dramatic turn. Tulowitzki was dealt to the Toronto Blue Jays in a late-night deal just four days before the trade deadline in 2015, and Story suddenly had a clear path to Denver. The Irving, Texas native finished that season with some dramatic statistical anomalies - the same amount of doubles (20), home runs (10) and runs batted in (40) during his time in Albuquerque as he did in Hartford.

The next spring, it was clear Story was ready to rumble at the highest level. He had a torrid spring training and broke camp as the Rockies' Opening Day shortstop, then promptly smashed two home runs off Zack Greinke in the season opener. Story ended up with seven long balls in his first six games of his career to set an MLB record, and wound up as the National League Rookie of the Month for April 2016. Despite a thumb injury that ended his season prematurely, Story finished his rookie campaign with 27 home runs and 72 RBI in just 97 contests.

Story quickly became a major piece in leading the Rockies to back-to-back playoff appearances in 2017 and 2018, the first time the franchise ever reached the postseason in consecutive years. He went deep in the 2017 NL Wild Card Game at Chase Field to bring Colorado within a run in the eighth inning, but the Diamondbacks' four triples were too much that night in an 11-8 victory. The last two pre-pandemic seasons were the most productive of Story's career to date, as he was voted a National League All-Star in 2018 and 2019, going deep off Charlie Morton in the

2018 Midsummer Classic. Story combined for 72 home runs and 193 runs batted in during his two All-Star campaigns, while also frequently utilizing his speed and stealing a total of 50 bases across the two seasons. His last non-rehab game in the Minor Leagues was September 7, 2015 for the Isotopes in Sacramento.

Moving from the plate to the mound, pitching in the thin air of Denver is a task that requires extreme mental toughness, and Kyle Freeland has been able to conquer the unpredictability of







this nature by making sure his highs have outweighed the lows throughout his Major League career. Freeland pitched to a 3.91 ERA in 12 starts with Albuquerque during the second half of the 2016 season, very respectable numbers in what was then known as the Pacific Coast League.

Freeland, who was born in Denver and grew up a Rockies fan, had a solid rookie year in the big leagues with an 11-11 record and 4.10 ERA, but his 2018 performance was off the charts. The southpaw ranked eighth in all of MLB with a 2.85 ERA and finished 17-7 in the regular season, tied for the second-most victories by a Rockies hurler in club history. Freeland's crowning moment that year came when he was given the ball in a do-or-die situation, the 2018 NL Wild Card game against the Cubs at Wrigley Field. He responded by firing 6.2 scoreless frames of four-hit ball in a game improbably won by Colorado 2-1 in 13 innings when Tony Wolters singled in the eventual game-winning run off Kyle Hendricks.

2019 was the toughest year, statistically speaking, of Freeland's professional career, as he ended up with a 6.73 ERA in 22 outings for the Rockies, while also being sent down to Albuquerque for a period of time.

However, if the pandemic-altered 2020 campaign could very well prove to be a turning point where Freeland was able to get back on track. He trimmed his ERA by nearly two and a half runs and was one of the leaders in an overall strong starting rotation during the 60-game season.

The phrase "see them here one day, they're in the big leagues the next" is uttered so often around Minor League Baseball, and fans in both Albuquerque and Denver have seen this over the years. The close proximity between the two cities allows for roster moves to frequently be made back and forth, while players like Story and Freeland made brief stops in Triple-A as they were ascending towards stardom at Coors Field.

MINOR LEAGUE BASEBALL 101



How many different Minor League teams and leagues are there?

Minor League Baseball is comprised of 120 teams situated in 11 different leagues. These leagues are divided by classifications: Triple-A, Double-A, High-A and Low-A. The Isotopes play at the highest Minor League Level, Triple-A, and are part of the Triple-A West.

Are the Albuquerque Isotopes owned by the Colorado Rockies?

No. Although once a commonplace, today only a handful of Major League teams own any of their affiliates. The Isotopes are privately owned by a group of investors led by team President Ken Young.



How do the Isotopes get their players?

The Isotopes do not scout, sign, release, or trade players. Since the Isotopes have a Player Development License with the Colorado Rockies, all players are under contract with the Rockies organization. All player moves are dictated by the Rockies front office.

Are some Isotopes on the Rockies' Major League Roster?

Yes. The Rockies can have up to 40 players signed to a Major League contract, but from the start of the season through August 31, can only have 26 players on their active roster. The other players are optioned to their Minor League affiliates and are subject to recall. If a Major League player is injured and placed on the Injured List, the Rockies may recall one of their 40-man roster members playing in the Minors. After September 1, teams must carry 28 players.

Are there limits to the number of times a player can be optioned?

Yes. A Major League club can option a player to the Minors for no more than three seasons, after which the club must place the player on waivers in order to "outright" him to the Minors. For example: If Joe Smith has been on the Rockies' 40-man roster but has been sent to the Minors in each of the last three years, the Rockies cannot keep him on the 40-man roster and send him back to the Minors a fourth season.

They must keep him on the 26-man active roster or "outright" him to the Minors, which takes him off of the club's 40-man roster and makes him available for all other Major League organizations to claim off of waivers. If he is not claimed, or "clears" waivers after two business days, Joe Smith can elect to stay with the Rockies or become a free agent.

If some of the Isotopes are on the Major League (or 40-man) roster, what kind of contracts do the other players have?

They are signed to a Minor League contract and are not subject to being recalled. This does not mean that the player cannot be promoted to the Major League club, but to do so, the Big League team must purchase his contract from the Minor League team and assign

him to the 40-man roster. phrase "purchase contract" comes from an older era when Minor League teams actually owned contracts of their players and Major League clubs would have to buy them out of their contracts.) If the Major League club's 40-man roster is full, the team must make room by either releasing a player or placing a player on the 60day Injured List.


