OKC Enters Fifth Year As Part of Diamond Baseball Holdings

Diamond Baseball Holdings (DBH) acquired the Oklahoma City Comets in December 2021 during DBH's inaugural year and as one of DBH's first 10 teams. Entering the 2026 season, Oklahoma City is now one of 48 Minor League Baseball teams that make up the DBH team portfolio.

DBH was founded in 2021 to support, promote and enhance Minor League Baseball Clubs affiliated with Major League Baseball through professional management, best practices, innovation and investment. Pat Battle serves as Executive Chairman and Peter Freund as CEO.



Daugherty Enters Second Season as Comets General Manager

Kyle Daugherty enters his second season, and first full season, as General Manager of the Oklahoma City Comets in spring 2026. Daugherty was appointed General Manager of the Comets in April 2025 and has been with Oklahoma City's Triple-A organization since 2010.

Daugherty joined the club as a Group Sales Coordinator and had served as Vice President, Ticket Sales for nearly 10 years. Under his guidance, the team saw consistent growth in attendance, record-breaking group sales, and the launch of innovative fan-first initiatives. His leadership helped shape the Comets' reputation as one of the most fan-friendly experiences in Minor League Baseball.

"I am truly honored to take on the role of General Manager for the Oklahoma City Comets," said Daugherty. "It's a privilege to serve our dedicated fan base and the vibrant OKC community.

"Together, we are focused on building a winning culture and delivering unforgettable experiences for Comets fans for years to come."

OKC's Affiliation with World Champion Los Angeles Dodgers Brings Success to the Field in Bricktown and at Baseball's Highest Level

Oklahoma City enters its 12th year as the Triple-A affiliate of the Los Angeles Dodgers with the start of the 2026 season and fans in the OKC metro have been fortunate to see dozens of players compete and win in Comets uniforms on their way to playing on baseball's biggest stage.

During the Dodgers' affiliation with Oklahoma City, Los Angeles has now made five World Series appearances since 2015, winning titles in 2020 and 2024 before adding a second consecutive title in 2025 — the organization's third in six seasons. The Dodgers have won five National League pennants in nine years and have had 13 consecutive postseason appearances.



The Comets have also experienced unprecedented success on the field during the affiliation since 2015. Oklahoma City has finished with 79 or more wins six times in the last 10 years. Prior to the Dodgers affiliation, OKC posted 79 or more wins just four times over a span of 17 seasons from 1998-2014.

Oklahoma City's 780 wins since 2015 are the most in the Pacific Coast League and rank third-most among all 30 Triple-A cities. OKC is the lone team in the PCL, and one of two Triple-A teams overall to record a winning record in all six halves since a split-season format began in 2023. OKC also won the PCL Championship in 2023.

Oklahoma City signed a 10-year Professional Development League (PDL) license agreement with the Dodgers in early 2021, extending the existing affiliation between the teams to keep OKC the Dodgers' highest-level minor league affiliate through the 2030 season.

The affiliation began in September 2014 when the Oklahoma City franchise was purchased by Mandalay Baseball, LLC – a partnership between Los Angeles Dodgers ownership and an investor group led by Mandalay Entertainment Chairman and CEO and Los Angeles Dodgers co-owner

Peter Guber. A two-year affiliation extension was announced in September 2018 prior to the most recent 2021 agreement, which was followed by the OKC franchise being purchased by Diamond Baseball Holdings in December 2021.

The Dodgers are the fifth MLB parent club to call Oklahoma City its Triple-A home, following the Houston Colt .45s/ Astros (1962-72; 2011-14), Cleveland Indians (1973-75), Philadelphia Phillies (1976-82) and Texas Rangers (1983-2010).



About Professional Development League (PDL) Licenses

The 2021 season brought an extended partnership between Oklahoma City and the Los Angeles Dodgers as well as significant change to Minor League Baseball.

Major League Baseball and Minor League Baseball previously operated separately and worked together via a Professional Baseball Agreement that expired Sept. 30, 2020. MLB has since taken over running affiliated Minor League Baseball and has reorganized the player development system, working to ensure new sets of standards for facilities and player working conditions throughout the Minors, as well as placing an emphasis on affiliates' geographic proximity to their Major League club partners, reducing in-season travel for players and coaches and increasing player salaries.

Oklahoma City was one of 120 Minor League Clubs to accept invitations in early 2021 to become a Professional Development League (PDL) license holder and OKC signed a 10-year partnership with the Los Angeles Dodgers to remain their Triple-A affiliate through 2030.

In addition, the 11 leagues that make up four levels of the Minor Leagues were restructured and MLB Clubs now have four full-season Minor League affiliates — one at each of the Triple-A, Double-A, High-A and Single-A levels.



Los Angeles Dodgers Win Back-to-Back World Series Titles with Several OKC Ties

The Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the Toronto Blue Jays in seven games to finish as 2025 World Series Champions, secure back-to-back World Series titles and win the team's third World Series Championship in six seasons.

The majority of players that made up the Dodgers' 26-man World Series roster competed in an Oklahoma City uniform during their careers, including 15 who did so in 2025 alone.

A total of 19 players on the Dodgers' 2025 World Series roster played for OKC at some point, including on Major League Rehab Assignments.

In 2024, 18 of the players on the Dodgers' World Series roster donned an Oklahoma City uniform at some point since the affiliation between the teams began in 2015, including those who did so as part of Major League Rehab Assignments. Additionally, a total of 12 played with Oklahoma City during the 2024 season.

In 2020, the Dodgers' World Series roster had 16 former OKC players, including eight who spent time in OKC during the 2019 season (the 2020 MiLB season was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic).

Comets Era Lands in OKC

The lights dimmed at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark and an eager crowd of about 3,000 people turned their gaze to the center field video board in the fall of 2024.

Soon an image of a glowing comet soaring through the night sky illuminated the screen as the next chapter in Oklahoma City's Triple-A baseball history was unveiled.

The Oklahoma City Comets had arrived.

The team's new Comets identity reaches back to Oklahoma baseball history, celebrates the team's current affiliation with the Los Angeles Dodgers and OKC's connections to the aerospace industry, while also looking to the future with a fun and hopeful spirit.



Team officials revealed the new name, look and brand during a free, public event and ceremony Oct. 26, 2024 at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark. The lively and festive atmosphere included carnival games, a drone

show, live band, fireworks, first looks at the team's new uniform sets, the unveiling of a 20-foot-by-20-foot Comets mural, the introduction of the team's new manager for 2025 and access to a revamped team store stocked with new merchandise.

In December 2023, OKC announced an upcoming name change and played the 2024 season as the Oklahoma City Baseball Club with the focus on creating an identity that reflected the local community.

Key stakeholders and community members played a significant role in selecting the new team name as the organization hosted focus groups and reviewed a high volume of feedback from fans via social media and email submissions.

The Comets soared to the top.

The meaning behind the new name, as well as its many ties to Oklahoma, is significant.

Hall of Fame center fielder Mickey Mantle has always had a key presence at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark and is one of the greatest baseball players to hail from the state



of Oklahoma. He was born in Spavinaw, Okla., and grew up in Commerce, Okla., becoming known as the "Commerce Comet" during his legendary career. Mantle slugged 536 home runs and won seven World Series titles during his 18 years with the New York Yankees and is one of the inspirations behind the Oklahoma City Comets name.

Mantle has been celebrated at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark for years. A nearly eight-foot-tall bronze statue of Mantle greets fans outside of the Mickey Mantle Gate entrance and his photo hangs in the Legends Lounge. Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark stands on Mickey Mantle Drive and Mantle's likeness can be seen grazing the end of each aisle of seats throughout the stadium.

As the Comets brand developed further, a space theme emerged inspired by the legendary "shooting ball" logo of Oklahoma City's parent club the Los Angeles Dodgers and Oklahoma's impact on and stake in the aerospace industry.



Additionally, space and space exploration encourages looking to the future and consider what is possible — similar to the hopeful feeling baseball fans share each spring as their team takes the field to embark on a new season or the aspirations shared by youth players on baseball diamonds throughout Oklahoma aiming to soar to success like the "Commerce Comet."

The Comets name is the sixth in Oklahoma City's Triple-A franchise history, following the Oklahoma City 89ers (1962–97), Oklahoma RedHawks (1998–2009), Oklahoma City RedHawks (2010–2014), Oklahoma City Dodgers (2015–23) and Oklahoma City Baseball Club (2024).



Introducing Wally!

The Comets' astronaut logo was recently named after Wally Funk, an Oklahoma State alumna who paved the way for women in aviation. Funk was the first female air safety investigator, Federal Aviation Administration inspector and civilian flight instructor at Fort Sill. She also served on the National Transportation Safety Board and was one of the Mercury 13.



Pacific Coast League Champions (2023)

The 2023 season ended with Oklahoma City winning the Pacific Coast League Championship.

OKC claimed its first league title since 1996 and fifth league title in the franchise's history after the team also won PCL titles in 1963 and 1965 and American Association titles in 1992 and 1996 as the 89ers.

OKC finished the regular season with a 90–58 record overall and with the most wins for an Oklahoma City team in a single season during the Bricktown era (since 1998). The team's 90 wins were the second-most wins in Oklahoma City's Triple-A history (since 1962) behind only the 1965 89ers, who finished 91–54.



Oklahoma City's 90 wins tied for the most in the Minors in 2023 with Triple-A National Championship Game opponent Norfolk (90–59) and OKC became just the second PCL team since 2006 to notch at least 90 wins, joining the 2017 Memphis Redbirds (91–50). OKC also became just the fourth PCL team over the last 23 seasons to reach 90 wins.

Oklahoma City finished in first place in the overall PCL standings in 2023, marking the fourth time that has happened during the team's Bricktown era (also 2005, 2013 and 2015). OKC held at least a share of first place in the league standings for all but seven days during the season, first from April 1-Aug. 25 and again from Sept. 2 to the end of the season.

Oklahoma City clinched the Pacific Coast League's first-half championship as well as a playoff berth June 14 with a 46–19 record — 11 days before the first half officially ended June 25. Oklahoma City went on to finish the first half with a 50–23 record, and as first-half champions earned the honor of hosting the PCL Championship Series during the final week of September.

The team went on to sweep Round Rock in two games of a best-of-three PCL Championship Series at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark.

Oklahoma City proceeded to make its first appearance in a Triple-A National Championship Game and first in postseason interleague competition during the franchise's Bricktown era (since 1998) and PCL history (1963–68; 1998–2023). OKC played International League Champion Norfolk, Triple-A affiliate of the Baltimore Orioles, to close out the season. OKC put together a four-run rally with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning, but Norfolk held on to defeat OKC, 7–6, in the Triple-A National Championship Game.

Golden Bobblehead - Best In-Game Promotion/Feature (2021)

Between innings on a warm July evening in 2021, Revel: Speed Painter stood in front of a large, black canvas and finessed paint with brushes and his hands. In under two minutes, he completed a portrait of baseball legend Jackie Robinson — live and upside down. He went on to speed paint Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher Clayton Kershaw and a ballpark image as well later in the evening.



The unique performance won Oklahoma City its first-ever Golden Bobblehead award during the December 2021 Baseball Winter Meetings in Orlando. The Golden Bobblehead awards are given annually by Minor League Baseball for the top promotional activities and events MiLB's 120 teams develop and put on during the year. Six awards were given out for the 2021 season and Oklahoma City won the Golden Bobblehead for Best In-Game Promotion/Feature for Revel's performance.

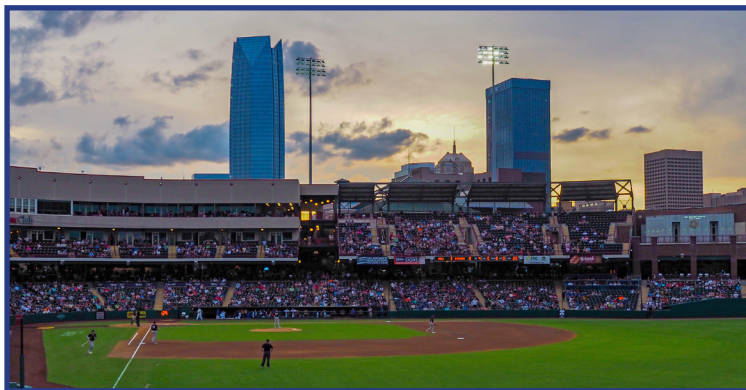
Best of the Ballparks presented by Ballpark Digest (2020)

Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark stood tall after topping the competition and winning the 2020 Triple-A Best of the Ballparks presented by *Ballpark Digest*. The contest involved all 30 Triple-A teams in a bracket-style tournament from June 18-July 10, 2020. Popular vote through the publication's website determined winners each round.

Triple-A Bob Freitas Award (2018)

Baseball America named Oklahoma City the winner of the 2018 Triple-A Bob Freitas Award, presenting the honor during the 2018 Baseball Winter Meetings in Las Vegas.

The annual award is given to one team in each of the four classifications of Minor League Baseball and the criteria are based on community involvement, long-term business success and consistent operational excellence.

Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark opened in April 1998 and was constructed as part of the original Metropolitan Area Projects or MAPS.

MAPS is "Oklahoma City's visionary capital improvement program for new and upgraded sports, recreation, entertainment, cultural and convention facilities" funded by a temporary one-cent sales tax approved by OKC voters in December 1993, according to the City of OKC website.

OKC was considered to be the first city in the United States to undertake a public facility enhancement project of this size. The original MAPS tax expired July 1, 1999 and during the 66 months it was in effect collected more than \$309 million and about \$54 million more in interest on deposited tax revenue, according to the City of OKC website.

The \$34 million Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark was the first project completed under original MAPS, that also included projects such as the Bricktown canal, Paycom Center, Civic Center Music Hall, the Oklahoma River and the former Cox Convention Center. The dedication of the Ronald J. Norick Downtown Library in August 2004 completed the original MAPS projects.

Former Oklahoma City Mayor Mick Cornett:



"If you wanted to trace Oklahoma City's renaissance back to a single moment, I think it would be the opening of Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark. We were coming through a rough time in Oklahoma City's history. No one knew what a completed MAPS project would look like and some people wondered whether the city could actually pull this off. But when the public walked into the beautiful ballpark, and it exceeded all expectations, they realized Oklahoma City had — in baseball talk — hit this one out of the park. There was a sense of pride and unity, and the beginning of a momentum that still exists today."

Former Pacific Coast League President Branch B. Rickey:



"As I look back over this track record of ours in Minor League Baseball, I would say there is no facility that I can point to, no other facility, that has been a more impressive accomplishment ... Never before had I witnessed such a historical importance of a ballpark in a marketplace — and never since."

Additional Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark Facts and Figures

Exterior: About 480,000 bricks make up the ballpark's exterior.

Wall Heights: Majority of OF: 8 feet, 3 inches; LF Miller Lite Landing: 11 feet, 8 inches; RF: 19 feet, 3 inches

CF Video Board: Stands 32 feet tall by 56 feet wide (almost 1,600 square feet); added in 2016.

LF LED Board: Stands 10 feet tall by 185 feet long; replaced in 2025 after originally added for the 2011 season.

Playing Field: Turf installed in 2019 consists of drought-tolerant Bermuda grass called TifTuf. The field's gravity-based drainage system is capable of draining 24 inches of rain per hour.

A new baseball season brings fresh upgrades and amenities to Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark. Recent ballpark improvements, include:

2026

- New exterior fencing replaced ballpark's original fence.
- Audio and video upgrades, adding new concourse speakers and renovating the production room.
- Kulture City Sensory Room added down right field line as well as certification as a KultureCity Sensory Inclusive ballpark.
- First base stairs replaced.
- Exterior signage replaced, including at each ballpark entrance.
- Dugout flooring replaced.
- Playground resurfaced and concrete replaced in several areas around ballpark.
- Mickey Mantle Plaza enclosed, creating a new mix and mingle space in the ballpark.

**2025**

- Comets branding introduced throughout ballpark.
- Concourse mural added inside home plate Johnny Bench Gate.
- Left field LED board replaced.
- LED boards installed along first base line and at entry gates.
- Work continued on multi-year HVAC and fire suppression system projects.

**2024**

- Five new Walker Companies 4Topp's tables added at Section 109.
- Mechanics of main elevators replaced.
- Work continued on multi-year HVAC and fire suppression system projects.
- Left field hospitality deck rebranded to Miller Lite Landing.

2023

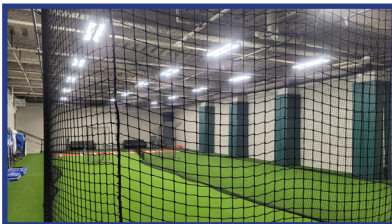
- Home and visiting clubhouses renovated, redesigned and expanded, creating updated and larger kitchen facilities, a dining area, new office spaces for coaches, new (and more) locker stalls, an expanded weight room, new athletic training equipment, updated batting tunnels with new lighting, flooring, netting and addition of a social space, new laundry equipment and a new home video room. A women's locker room was also redesigned and upgraded.
- Green wall pads surrounding the inside of the playing field replaced and additional padding added to increase player safety.
- Home and visiting bullpens reworked to assist with loose material containment and reduce tripping hazards; Overhang of the home bullpen expanded.



- Slope of the stadium's crowned infield eliminated creating a flat infield surface.
- ParTea Pad added to the right-center field lawn.
- Updates and renovations made to the right field Skyline Deck hospitality area, replacing the railing and reworking the bar service space.

2022

- Two new hospitality areas added — the Party Porch in the lower level seating bowl and the 405 Club premium seating area on the second floor Club level.
- New point of sale system installed as the stadium became a cashless facility and added multiple new forms of digital payment.
- Four large fans added to the ceiling of the concourse behind home plate to help circulate air.
- Other behind-the-scenes projects included heating, ventilation and air conditioning improvements as well as water intrusion mitigation as part of multi-phase projects.

Oklahoma City Triple-A Baseball Hall of Fame

The Oklahoma City Triple-A Baseball Hall of Fame was formed in 2023 as part of the 25th anniversary celebration of Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark.

The first nine Hall of Fame selections made in 2023, 2024 and 2025 were chosen by a five-person committee comprised of media members, baseball historians and civic leaders that worked alongside members of the Oklahoma City Comets front office.

In 2025, infielder/outfielder John Poff, pitcher Scipio Spinks and former Vice President and General Manager Jim Weigel were inducted. All three inductees played key roles during the franchise's early 89ers era.

In 2024, first baseman Steve Balboni, infielder Nick Capra and former OKC 89ers co-owner, president and general manager Patty Cox

were inducted. All three inductees played key roles in the team's history during the 89ers era of 1983-97.

In 2023, manager Bobby Jones, pitcher R.A. Dickey and outfielder/designated hitter Jason Botts were inducted as part of the inaugural class. Each played key roles in the team's history during the franchise's Bricktown era, which began in 1998 and was celebrated throughout the ballpark's 25th anniversary season in 2023.

The Oklahoma City Triple-A Baseball Hall of Fame also includes the re-enshrinement of 24 individuals who were selected as part of the Oklahoma City 89ers Hall of Fame between 1981-89.

OKC Comets Rookie League

The OKC Comets Rookie League is celebrating its eighth season in 2026 with its highest-ever registration numbers.

The Rookie League formed in 2018 in partnership with Oklahoma City Parks and Recreation to increase youth baseball participation in the community, as well as foster an environment that emphasizes leadership, teamwork and sportsmanship.

The OKC Comets help provide resources and reduce costs in order to make baseball more accessible to area youth.



The league consists of several co-ed divisions to accommodate boys and girls in multiple skill levels and age groups. Teams compete in divisions of 4U T-Ball, 6U T-Ball, 8U Coach Pitch baseball, 10U Kid Pitch baseball and 12U Kid Pitch baseball.



Registration fees help cover operation expenses such as umpires and field maintenance. The OKC Comets provide a jersey, hat and belt for each participant as well as equipment for each team.

Practices are held once per week and the Rookie League season includes seven games from late March to May at Wheeler Park.

The Rookie League is committed to enriching the lives of our youth and fostering a love of the game. The league provides a developmental, fun, and safe environment for the enjoyment of the game of baseball. Cielo Azul de Oklahoma City

The OKC Comets will take the field as Cielo Azul de Oklahoma City Aug. 28-30, 2026 as the team continues participation in Minor League Baseball's "Copa de la Diversión™" or "Fun Cup™".



MiLB.com describes Copa de la Diversión as "a season-long event series specifically designed to embrace the culture and values that resonate most with participating teams' local U.S. Hispanic/Latino communities."

Copa de la Diversión began with four teams in 2017 and had 93 participating teams in 2025 — the program's eighth season. Oklahoma City debuted its Cielo Azul identity in 2018 and went on to be named one of five finalists for the inaugural Copa de la Diversión by MiLB that season. The trophy is now awarded annually by a panel of industry experts and civic leaders based on a club's ballpark experience during Copa nights, community engagement and philanthropic impact.



In addition to players and coaches wearing Cielo Azul jerseys and hats, the gameday environment during ¡Celebración Cielo Azul! has included Latin music, specialty concession items, festive concourse decorations, unique entertainment, live performances, a Spanish-speaking public address announcer and bilingual game programs. Cielo Azul merchandise is available for purchase in the Team Store.



Community initiatives have also been a key component of ¡Celebración Cielo Azul!, including a kickoff event at Supermercados Morelos during its initial season, pregame recognitions of leaders in OKC's Hispanic and Latino communities, as well as partnering with the Latino Community Development Agency (LCDA). The LCDA's mission is to improve the quality of life in the Latino community through education, leadership, services and advocacy. The organization has received donations from tickets sold to groups and as part of a special ticket package in previous seasons.



Cielo Azul translates to "Blue Sky." The concept started with the idea of creating a brand that celebrated the richness and depth of Hispanic and Latino culture in the United States, linked to the team's identity as a Los Angeles Dodgers affiliate and connected with our home state of Oklahoma.

Pitcher Fernando Valenzuela, a hero within the Dodgers organization and beyond, would look into the sky as part of his windup. From this, the idea of Cielo Azul was born.

The primary blue color within the logo recalls the expansive view of the blue sky in Oklahoma. Having "azul" in the name creates a connection to Dodger blue. The blue sky also reflects the diversity of the Hispanic and Latino community in Oklahoma and the U.S. living under that shared blue sky. The accent colors of red, gray and cream reflect the landscape that the team and community call home. The primary and secondary Cielo Azul logos feature the scissor-tailed flycatcher design as an additional tribute to the state of Oklahoma.

OKC Comets Reading Challenge

The OKC Comets also encourage Reading Challenge participants to take part in the OKCPS ReadOKC and Metropolitan Library System Summer Reading challenges for chances to win additional prizes for their time spent reading.

The OKC Comets MVP Program: Encouraging STEM Education is in the midst of its 10th year thanks to partner Devon Energy.

Oklahoma elementary school teachers in second, third and fourth grade are eligible to register for the free, statewide Oklahoma City Comets MVP Program that incentivizes teachers and students to participate in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) curriculum. The program rewards students for their STEM achievements both inside and outside of the classroom.

The MVP Program impacted more than 22,000 students during the 2024-25 academic year and has experienced tremendous growth since the program began in 2016.

Participation in the MVP Program was initially only open to Oklahoma City Public Schools third- and fourth-grade classrooms in 2016-17. After a successful start, the program expanded in 2017-18 to include additional metro-area classrooms in the Mid-Del, Putnam City, Edmond and Norman school districts. The MVP Program became available statewide in 2018-19 and added second-grade classrooms for the 2021-22 academic year.

Participating teachers receive all necessary MVP Program materials free of charge, as well as tickets to an OKC Comets game honoring MVP teachers and students. MVP students receive tickets to an OKC Comets game recognizing their participation and success throughout the school year and also receive an exclusive MVP baseball hat.

Manager Scott Hennessey

Scott Hennessey joins the Comets for his second season as manager after reaching 500 career wins last summer.

In his first season as Comets manager, Hennessey led the team to an 84-66 record, marking the team's third season with 80-plus wins since 2021. The Comets finished with the second-best overall record in the Pacific Coast League. Following the season, Comets outfielder Ryan Ward earned Pacific Coast League MVP honors, becoming the second Oklahoma City player to win the honor in three seasons, joining Michael Busch in 2023.

Hennessey recorded the 500th win of his managerial career in July 2025. He previously served as manager of Double-A Tulsa — a fellow Dodgers affiliate — from the middle of the 2017 season through 2024. With 455 career wins with the Drillers, including 16 playoff victories, he is the second-winningest manager in Tulsa professional baseball history since 1905.

In 2018, Hennessey led the Drillers to the team's first Texas League title in 20 years. The team also advanced to the playoffs four times under Hennessey, including to the Texas League Championship Series in 2017 and 2019.

Hennessey's squads in Tulsa finished with a winning record in six of his seven seasons and advanced to the postseason four times. The six consecutive winning seasons by the Drillers from 2017-23 is the longest streak in franchise history.

During the 2023 season, Hennessey was diagnosed with squamous cell carcinoma and spent most of that year receiving chemotherapy treatments but returned to the dugout prior to season's end. He is now cancer free.

Hennessey has been a member of the Dodgers organization since 2007, first serving as an amateur scout in Florida before transitioning to coaching in player development in 2017.

Hennessey also has coaching experience at the high school and junior college levels. He helped Cowley College in Kansas to back-to-back Junior College World Series titles in 1997 and 1998 as an assistant coach and has since been inducted into the Tiger Athletic Hall of Fame. He had a brief professional playing career with the Kansas City Royals organization during the 1990s.

He is Oklahoma City's fourth manager during the team's affiliation with the Los Angeles Dodgers, following Travis Barbary (2019-24), Bill Haselman (2016-18) and Damon Berryhill (2015).

Hitting Coach Dylan Nasiatka

Dylan Nasiatka enters his second season as Oklahoma City's hitting coach.

In 2025, the Comets offense finished fourth among the 120 teams across Minor League Baseball in runs scored, fifth in home runs and first in walks. Oklahoma City's .276 batting average was its highest in seven years, while its 936 runs scored were the team's second most in the Bricktown era and the team's 188 home runs ranked third all-time. At the conclusion of the season, outfielders Ryan Ward and Esteyru Ruiz were named MiLB Triple-A All-Stars.

Nasiatka joined the Comets after spending the 2024 season with Double-A Tulsa and has been a minor league coach in the Dodgers organization since 2020. He has also spent time with Single-A Rancho Cucamonga and High-A Great Lakes.

He will also serve as the Dodgers' assistant hitting coordinator this season.



Ryan Dennick

Pitching Coaches Ryan Dennick and David Anderson

Both Ryan Dennick and David Anderson return for their second season as the team's pitching coaches. The Comets pitching staff in 2025 led the Pacific Coast League with 1,408 strikeouts, also ranking fourth overall in the Minors. Oklahoma City allowed the league's fewest home runs and ranked second-best in opponent batting average.

Dennick returns to OKC after previous stops with the team as a player and staff member. He served as a pitching coach with Double-A Tulsa from 2022-24 and was also the pitching coach for

High-A Great Lakes in 2021.

Dennick pitched for Oklahoma City during the 2015 season and returned to the team as its development coach in 2018. He played for the Cincinnati Reds in 2014 and played professionally from 2009 through 2016.

Anderson spent three seasons with High-A Great Lakes from 2022-24. In each of his three seasons with the Loons, Great Lakes led the Midwest League in strikeouts and finished in the top four in ERA.

He began his tenure in the Dodgers organization in 2020 as a development coach and received his first assignment as a pitching coach in 2021 with the Rookie-level Arizona Complex League Dodgers. Anderson also has collegiate coaching experience with Muhlenberg College, Cornell University and Emory University. He served as the head coach of the Fayetteville SwampDogs of the collegiate Coastal Plain League in 2018-19.

Bench Coach Joe Thon

Joe Thon enters his first season with Oklahoma City as the team's bench coach.

Thon held the same role with High-A Great Lakes last season, his first with the Dodgers organization.

Prior to joining the Dodgers organization, Thon managed in the Houston Astros system for three seasons with Class-A Fayetteville (2022) and Double-A Corpus Christi (2023-24), combining for a 177-227 record. Thon first joined the Astros organization in 2021 to serve as Fayetteville's development coach.

The son of 15-year MLB veteran and former National League All-Star Dickie Thon, "Dickie Joe" Thon played professionally for seven seasons between the Toronto Blue Jays and St. Louis Cardinals organizations, reaching as high as Double-A Springfield (STL) in 2017.

In 2011, Thon was diagnosed with kidney disease during a routine physical in Spring Training. His condition worsened in 2025 and received a kidney donation from his father in December.



David Dahl

Outfield/Assistant Hitting Coach David Dahl

After formally retiring from his playing career in December 2025, David Dahl begins his coaching career with Oklahoma City as an outfield coach and assistant hitting coach this season.

The 10th overall pick of the 2012 MLB Draft and a 2019 National League All-Star with the Colorado Rockies, Dahl played 350 games in the Major Leagues with four different teams across parts of seven seasons (2016, 2018-21 and 2023-24).

Dahl played for Oklahoma City in 2023 and was a part of the team's Pacific Coast League Championship that season, hitting .282 with 21 doubles, eight homers and 39 RBIs in 54 games.



Griffin Boyte

Athletic Trainers Griffin Boyte and Josh DiLoreto

Head athletic trainer Griffin Boyte begins his fourth season as a member of Oklahoma City's athletic training team. Boyte has worked as an athletic trainer within the Los Angeles Dodgers organization since 2019, with previous assignments in Arizona in 2019 and High-A Great Lakes during the 2021-22 seasons.

Before joining the Dodgers, Boyte also spent the 2018 season as an athletic training intern for the Arizona Diamondbacks' Double-A affiliate in Jackson, Tenn. Boyte is originally from Jackson, Tenn., and received his bachelor's degree in athletic training from Union College in Tennessee.



Josh DiLoreto

DiLoreto enters his second season with the Comets and spent the prior three seasons with Triple-A El Paso (2022-24) and was named the 2024 Pacific Coast League Athletic Trainer of the Year by the Professional Baseball Athletic Trainers Society.



Paul Fournier

Paul Fournier is entering his fifth season in the Dodgers organization and brings 18 years of experience as a Major League Strength and Conditioning Coach to Oklahoma City. Fournier spent 10 years with the Philadelphia Phillies, including eight years as the club's Major League Strength and Conditioning Coach.

Prior to joining Philadelphia, Fournier was the Major League Strength and Conditioning Coordinator for the Florida Marlins between 2003-11. He began his career in pro baseball with the Montreal Expos in 1995 and was the organization's minor league coordinator for athletic training and conditioning for six years. In 1999, Fournier was awarded the organization's John McHale Award for top performers in player development. Fournier is originally from Nova Scotia but currently makes his home with his family in North Carolina, and he is a graduate of Northeastern University.

Quarles joins Oklahoma City this season after serving as the performance coach with Double-A Tulsa the last two seasons.

The 2026 season marks his fifth year with the Dodgers organization after also working as the performance coach with High-A Great Lakes for two seasons. Quarles has also worked at the collegiate level for Memphis, Kentucky, Mississippi State and Clemson.

Quarles also worked as the interim softball head coach of Williams Baptist University from 2018-19, was the pitching coach of the baseball program from 2016-17 and pitched for the team prior to his coaching stint. He graduated from Williams Baptist with a Bachelors of Science in Biology and a minor in Physical Education and also earned Masters of Science in Performance Enhancement and Rehabilitation Injury from California University at Pennsylvania.

Oklahoma City Posts 80-Plus Wins for Third Time in Four Seasons; Ryan Ward Named PCL MVP



**Best Record in East Division • 84-66 Record Overall
46-29 First Half Record • 38-37 Second Half Record**

The newly rebranded Oklahoma City Comets took the field for the first time in 2025 and went on to finish with the second-best record in the Pacific Coast League and with the league's Most Valuable Player Ryan Ward.

The Comets finished with 84 overall wins, reaching the benchmark for the third time in four seasons. The Comets finished with a winning record in both the first and second halves of the 2025 season, becoming the lone PCL team, and just one of two Triple-A teams overall, to record a winning record in all six halves since the split-season format began in Triple-A in 2023.

The Comets held at least a share of first place in the overall PCL standings every day from July 20-Sept. 3 and again following a Sept. 19 win.

Ward led the Minors with 36 home runs, 122 RBI, 73 extra-base hits and 315 total bases. The outfielder became the second OKC player in the last three years to win PCL MVP, along with Michael Busch (2023), and the third OKC player during the team's Bricktown era (since 1998) to take the league's top honors, also joining Nelson Cruz (2008).

Ward set Oklahoma City single-season records during the Bricktown era with 164 hits, 122 RBI and 113 runs scored. His 122 RBI were the most by a PCL player since Mark Trumbo also had 122 for Salt Lake in 2010. Ward's 36 home runs were the second-most in a season for an OKC player and one shy of Nelson Cruz's 2008 Bricktown-era record.

Ward also set Bricktown-era records for career home runs (90) and RBI (318). He became one of 13 Bricktown-era players for OKC to hit three homers in a game May 29, 2025 in Las Vegas. He also recorded five hits in that game. Ward hit a grand slam with the Comets last season against Round Rock and also recorded a walk-off inside-the-park homer against El Paso.

Ward and fellow outfielder Esteuru Ruiz were named PCL Postseason All-Stars.

Ruiz set an OKC single-season record with 62 stolen bases. He recorded a PCL-leading 63 total stolen bases in 2025, including one with Las Vegas where he started the season.

Other notable season milestones included:

- The Comets finished with the best road record in the PCL at 45-30. The 2025 season marked the fifth straight season the Comets finished with a winning road record and third straight with at least 40 wins in away games.
- Austin Gauthier drew 93 walks to set a new single-season record for OKC players during the Bricktown era. His walk total led the PCL.
- As a team, the Comets drew 747 walks — the most in the Minors on offense during the season and the most in a season by an OKC team during the Bricktown era.
- OKC's 195 stolen bases set a new team single-season record during the Bricktown era.
- The Comets allowed the fewest home runs in the league with 144 and also recorded a league-leading 1,408 strikeouts. However, the Comets also allowed a Minors-leading 782 walks — the most in a single season by an OKC team during the Bricktown era.
- The Comets suffered eight losses when leading after eight innings and were charged with 41 blown saves — the most blown saves by any team at any level of the Minors during the MLBAM stat-tracking era (since 2005). Between 2021-24, OKC had a total of six losses combined when leading after eight innings. OKC also suffered 12 walk-off losses during the season — their most in a season since at least 2013.

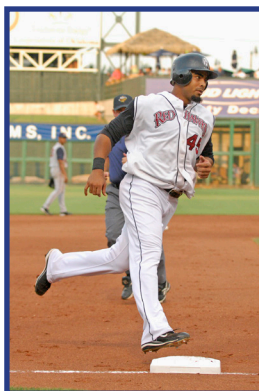

- In 2023, Oklahoma City won its first PCL Championship since rejoining the league in 1998. Previously, Oklahoma City won first-round series and advanced to the PCL Championship Series in 1999, 2008 and 2016, but lost.

- Prior to 2023, Oklahoma City last won a baseball championship in 1996 when the Oklahoma City 89ers won the American Association championship. Additionally, the 89ers won PCL titles in 1963 and 1965. OKC won the 2023 and 1963 titles on its home field.

- OKC's 2-0 sweep of Round Rock in the 2023 PCL Championship Series became the first playoff series sweep by an OKC team during the Bricktown era.

- Prior to a Game 1 win in the 2023 PCL Championship Series, OKC had lost the first game of each of its previous 12 playoff series. The team's lone other opening win in a playoff series (since 1998) came in the first round against Omaha in 1999 at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark.

- In 2023, Oklahoma City made its first appearance in a Triple-A National Championship Game and first in postseason interleague competition during the franchise's Bricktown era (since 1998) and PCL history (1963-68; 1998-2023).

Triple-A Championship Format

The Triple-A seasons in both the Pacific Coast League and International League will be split into halves for a fourth consecutive season, with the first half ending June 21. The second half will begin June 23 and the regular season will conclude Sept. 20. The first-half winners will host the second-half winners in a best-of-three LCS slated to begin Sept. 22 in both the PCL and IL. The two LCS winners will advance to Las Vegas for the Triple-A National Championship Game Saturday, Sept. 26.

The PCL has won 10 of the 18 winner-take-all games against the IL since the championship game's inception in 2006. Last season, the Jacksonville Jumbo Shrimp (Marlins) defeated the Las Vegas Aviators (Athletics), 8-7, on a walk-off two-run home run by Jacob Berry.



Experimental Rules for Triple-A from MLB (Please note experimental rules may be modified throughout the season)

- **Pitch Clock:** The pitch clock will continue to be utilized to improve pace of play with the majority of guidelines remaining the same as those in place during the 2025 season. Pitchers must begin the natural movement associated with the delivery of the ball to the batter within 15 seconds when the bases are empty and within 18 seconds if there is a runner on base. The designated times between batters (0:30) and for inning breaks/pitching changes (2:15) also remain the same. Batters will be required to be in the batter's box and alert to the pitcher with at least eight seconds remaining and catchers must be in the catcher's box with at least nine seconds remaining. A violation by the pitcher or catcher results in an automatic ball and a violation by the hitter results in an automatic strike. **New for 2026:** 1) Teams will be assessed a mound visit if play is stopped for the purpose of addressing a PitchCom issue. If the team is out of mound visits, a pitch clock violation will be assessed; 2) The clock will no longer stop and reset when the catcher leaves his position to give defensive signals. If the catcher is unable to return to the catcher's box with at least nine seconds remaining on the clock, a pitch clock violation will be assessed; 3) Mound visits must end and all coaches and players, other than the pitcher, must be off the dirt of the mound and moving toward their positions or the dugout before the mound visit clock reaches zero otherwise a pitch clock violation will be assessed; 4) When a batter requests time, the home plate umpire will grant time, point at the batter, then immediately reset the pitch clock. Batters must return to the batter's box and be alert to the pitcher before the clock reaches eight seconds remaining.
- **ABS Challenge System:** The automated strike zone, known as ABS, returns to Triple-A in 2026 along with the challenge system. Umpires will call balls and strikes during games, but players can challenge the result of the pitch by tapping the top of their heads or batting helmets. The challenge will be resolved by the ABS system, which will either uphold the initial call or overturn it and the results will be displayed on the video board or scoreboard. The umpire will announce which player is challenging and the pitch call. Following the video payout of the challenge result, the umpire will announce the result of the challenge and the revised count. Each team has two challenges per game, which are retained when used successfully. Starting in May, teams will have the opportunity to challenge check swings.
- **Infield Positioning:** Shift rules require the defensive team to have no more than two infielders on either side of second base prior to a pitch being thrown and each infielder must be standing on the infield. When an illegally positioned infielder is the first player to touch a batted ball, the batter will be entitled to first base and all runners will advance one base. If the defensive team violates the rule in any other circumstance, a ball will be added to the count. In all cases, the manager of the team at bat has the option to accept the appropriate penalty or the result of the play.

Requests for daily credentials and credentialed media workspace must be requested online at okccomets.com/pressbox at least 24 hours in advance and include signed acceptance of Minor League Baseball's 2026 Credential Agreement.

The OKC Comets cannot issue a credential until the MiLB agreement form has been signed and completed.

Additional Info/Reminders:

• Credentials permit access to the Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark, Volney Meece Memorial Press Box, camera wells and platforms, playing field (pregame only; prior approval required) and the Joe Carter Parking Lot.

• Credentialed media are prohibited from requesting autographs.

• Credentials are not transferable and no guests, spouses or children of media members will be issued passes.

• Credential bearer assumes all risks incidental to the game of baseball, whether occurring prior to, during or after the game, including but not limited to the risk of being injured by or in connection with any thrown bat or thrown or batted ball. Bearer agrees that the Oklahoma City Comets, its agents and affiliates, are not liable for resulting injuries.

• Credential bearer grants the Oklahoma City Comets and its designees unrestricted right to use holder's name, voice, image and likeness in any recording taken at the game, for any purpose and in any media known or subsequently developed.

Please bring a photo I.D. to pick up your credential. You must also complete a MiLB Credential Agreement form prior to receiving your credential.

Parking: Parking will be available in the Joe Carter Lot located at the northeast corner of Joe Carter Avenue and Reno Avenue east of Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark. Please show your credential for admittance into the lot.

Entrance: If arriving at the ballpark prior to gates open (one hour prior to first pitch), please use the first base gate on the south side of the ballpark along Reno Avenue. If arriving after gates open, use any open gate. Allow bags and equipment to be searched as requested by ballpark security officials.

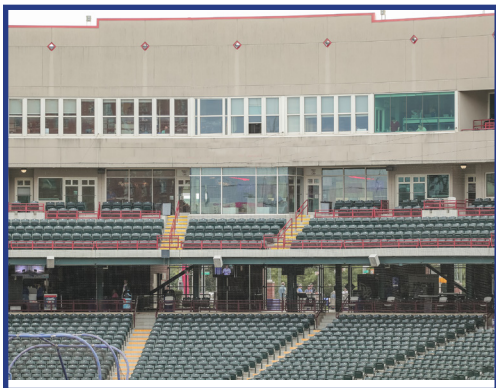
Volney Meece Memorial Press Box: The press box is located on the third floor of the ballpark and is accessible from the elevators and stairs near the first and third base entrances to the suites. Proper credentials are required for admittance. Please submit requests for reserved workspace in advance.

Photographers are also allowed to shoot from the platforms near the elevators on the second or third levels or from the outfield lawn seating area. Select Comets games will be broadcast on local television and 12 games are scheduled to broadcast in the Los Angeles Dodgers' broadcast territory via Spectrum Sportsnet LA — the television home of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Alex has served as Director of Communications and Broadcasting for the Oklahoma City Comets since 2012 and has called more than 1,800 Triple-A games with Oklahoma City. Earlier in his career, he spent three seasons as the Director of Broadcasting and Media Relations for the High Desert Mavericks, the former High-A affiliate of the Seattle Mariners.

Since coming to Oklahoma City, Alex has been named the winner of the Oklahoma Association of Broadcasters award for "Best Play-By-Play" two times. He has also been recognized by *Ballpark Digest* for an outstanding achievement in Minor League Baseball play-by-play.

In 2020, Alex handled play-by-play duties for the Perfect Game All-American Classic held at Chickasaw Bricktown Ballpark that was broadcast to a national audience on SiriusXM Radio.

Outside of baseball, Alex has also covered football, basketball, hockey, softball, and volleyball at different levels, ranging from high school to NCAA Division I. He has recently spent his baseball offseasons working with the men's and women's basketball programs at Mid-America Christian University and covering other collegiate sports.

Alex is originally from St. Louis and graduated from Northwestern University, where he majored in both journalism and political science.

Frequently occurring transactions and how they are defined*:

- **Player Recalled** - A player is called up by his Major League club. A player is recalled (rather than having his contract selected) if he is already on the MLB club's 40-man roster.
- **Contract Selected** - A player is called up by his Major League club. A player has his contract selected (rather than being recalled) if he is not already on the MLB club's 40-man roster.
- **Injured List** - MLB has varying injured lists based on the player's position and injury. The 7-day Injured List is limited to players who have endured a concussion or concussion-like symptoms. For other injuries, position players must remain on the Injured List for a minimum of 10 days and pitchers must remain on the Injured List for a minimum of 15 days. When a player is placed on the Injured List, he does not count against a club's active roster limit. When a player is placed on the 60-day Injured List, along with having to sit out for 45 extra days, he is no longer counted against an MLB club's 40-man roster. The Minor Leagues have a 7-day Injured List for both position players and pitchers.
- **Assigned** - A player is assigned to a new team within his organization or to his organization's extended Spring Training. A player is not considered "assigned" to a Major League club. It generally refers to a player being assigned to a Minor League team, a Spring Training camp or extended Spring Training.
- **Optioned** - A player is sent from his Major League club to one of its Minor League affiliates. When a player is optioned, he remains on the MLB club's 40-man roster. Position players must remain with a Minor League affiliate for a minimum of 10 days after being optioned and a pitcher must remain with a Minor League affiliate for a minimum of 15 days, unless he is recalled to replace a member of the Major League roster who has been placed on the Injured List.
- **Sent Outright ("Outrighted")** - A player is sent from his Major League club to one of its Minor League affiliates. When a player is outrighted, he is removed from the MLB club's 40-man roster.
- **Designated for Assignment** - When a MLB club designates a player for assignment, it allows the club to open up a roster spot while it figures out what to do with the player. Most often a player is designated for assignment so the club can open up his roster spot while it waits for him to clear waivers. A club may also designate a player for assignment while it tries to trade him to another club. A club's 40-man roster must be full before a player can be DFA'd, and the player is immediately removed from all rosters when he is designated.
- **Released** - An MLB club removes a player from its organization. Some players need to clear waivers before they can be released, hence they would be designated for assignment first. Other players, particularly those released from Minor League affiliates, need not clear waivers.
- **Claimed Off Waivers** - There are various situations in which a player may end up on waivers. It is usually a precursor to the player being released, traded or reassigned to a Minor League club. Any other team can put in a claim on a waived player within a certain time frame. If more than one team claims the same player, the team winning the claim is determined by which claiming team had the worst record in the same league (American or National) as the team that waived the player and then, if no one in the same league claims him, the claiming team in the other league with the worst record.
- **Traded** - A player has been traded from one Major League organization to another. Minor Leaguers are not traded from affiliate to affiliate but rather MLB organization to MLB organization. The new MLB organization can then assign the player to one of its affiliates.
- **Restricted List** - The restricted list is for players who are suspended because of failure to adhere to the Minor League Drug Prevention and Treatment Program. It also may be used if a player violates contract terms or fails to appear for a team or camp assignment. An example of the latter is a foreign player who cannot join his team because of visa problems.
- **Suspended** - A player is suspended, usually for an on-field incident, and is not allowed to play. He still counts against a team's active roster limit.
- **Temporarily Inactive List** - If a Minor League player is away from a team for a few days because of a personal matter, travel to an All-Star game, etc., and is not placed on the IL, he is placed on the Temporary Inactive List for a minimum of three days.
- **Bereavement List** - A player is temporarily inactive to attend to a personal matter like a family medical emergency or a death in the family. This can last from three to seven days.
- **Development List** — A healthy player is placed on the Development List and temporarily removed from game action to allow them to focus on development, conditioning or to create flexibility with a team's active roster.
