What does it mean to host/adopt a player?

Throughout minor league baseball, host family and adoptive family programs play a vital role in the development of young baseball players.

The majority of the Black Bears' players are young, and new to the minor league system. They are unable to see their families due to their hectic schedules, and are hundreds (if not thousands) of miles away from home. These programs give our players the opportunity to feel part of a loving, family

environment, while adjusting to life at the

professional level of baseball. By

What to Expect When Hosting/Adopting a Player

- ➤ Players lead busy, active, lives; with practice, strength training, community engagements, and games, their days are generally tightly scheduled.
- ➤ Due to the schedule of games, they may be gone for 6 to 7 days at a time.
- Players are expected to be polite, respectful, and courteous when with their host/adoptive families. Host families are encouraged to set and enforce their own *reasonable* house rules. Remember: they are adults, and busy ones, at that!
- Promotions are a good thing! Except they can happen quite unexpectedly. If a player is promoted, we will notify you as soon as possible (if it happens in the middle of the night, for example, players know to leave a note for host families). Once a player leaves the team, you can choose to continue participating in the program. At that time, a different player will be assigned, or the spot may be left open in the event the hosted/adopted player returns.
- ➤ Host families are compensated \$200 per month, per player, for providing accommodations.

More Quick Facts:

- Many of the Black Bears' players are new draft picks or international players.
- * Average age of a Black Bears player is 22.
- ❖ Typically, the Black Bears hold 5 to 8 international players on their roster during the season.
- * Players can be promoted or "called up" to higher levels of baseball (including MLB), at any given time; they can also be sent down to lower levels of the minor leagues.

- ➤ Be a second family!
