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
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DOUG DAVIS

DID YOU KNOW?: DAVIS' FIRST MANAGER IN THE MINOR LEAGUES WAS HAZLETON, PA NATIVE JOE MADDON, WHO EVENTUALLY LED THE CHICAGO CUBS TO THE 2016 WORLD

It was announced January 27, 2020, that Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania native and Central Columbia High School graduate Doug Davis will manage the RailRiders for the 2021 season. He is the 13th manager in SWB franchise history, and just the fifth in Yankees-era history (2007-Present). He joins Dave Miley (2007-15), Al Pedrique (16-17), Bobby Mitchell (2018) and Jay Bell (2019) as SWB skippers to serve under the Yankees affiliation.

Davis enjoyed an 11-year professional career, which included spending parts of two years in Major League Baseball. He spent three seasons coaching with the RailRiders under three different managers, serving as the Defensive Coach in 2017 under Pedrique, the Bullpen Coach in 2018 under Mitchell and the Bench Coach in 2019 under Bell.

Davis, 58, has been in coaching since 1995, serving as a minor league manager for eight seasons. As a manager, he owns a career 515-484 record including championships with Pittsfield in the NY-Penn League in 1997 and Capital City (Columbia, SC) in the South Atlantic League in 1998. From 2007-2016 he was on staff in the Toronto Blue Jays system and before that he spent two seasons in the big leagues as the Florida Marlins bench coach from 2003-04, winning the World Series against the Yankees in 2003 with former SWB Pitching Coach Tommy Phelps on the roster.

In between coaching stints, Davis served as the Minor League Field Coordinator for the Montreal Expos (2001), Florida Marlins (2002, 2005), and Toronto Blue Jays (2009-2016).



Selected in the ninth round of the 1984 MLB Draft out of

NC State, the former catcher played professionally for 11 seasons between 1984 and 1994 in the minor league systems of California, Kansas City and Texas. He made it to the big leagues on two separate occasions, scoring one run in six games with the Angels in 1988 and he collected a hit in his only MLB at-bat with the Rangers in 1992.



REPRESENTING NATIONS: THREE RAILRIDERS HELP THEIR NATIONAL TEAMS

Robinson Chirinos, Kellin Deglan and Trevor Lane left the RailRiders in May and June to represent their countries and help their National Teams try to reach Tokyo Olympics.

Trevor Lane couldn't have been prouder to represent his country as a member of the USA Baseball roster for the 2021 World Baseball Softball Confederation (WBSC) Americas Qualification event for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games. The same can be said for Kellin Deglan and Robinson Chirinos, members of Team Canada and the Venezuelan national team, respectively.

The trio of RailRiders were among the hopefuls who competed in the Baseball Americas Qualifier, which began on May 31 with eight teams competing against one another in the hopes of earning an Olympic bid. The format of the tournament allowed the team with the best record at the end of the qualifier to earn an automatic berth to the Summer Olympics in

Tokyo. The Americas Qualifier opened with three games of pool play. The top two finishers in each pool advanced to the Super Round, where they played two more games. The second-place and third-place finishers advanced to the Final Qualifier in Mexico, where they had one last chance to qualify for the Olympics.

"I was first contacted after Spring Training ended and we began the Alternate Site," Lane said. "I was told I was part of the pool of players that could possibly be selected to make the team. I thought that was a really cool opportunity and it motivated me to continue to play hard, stay focused and control what I could control. The RailRiders were in Rochester, N.Y. a week before the Americas Qualifier began when I got the call that I was on the team. It was a quick turnaround, but it was quite the experience."

The 26-man team from the United States was made up of 14 pitchers and 12 position players currently not on an MLB 40-man roster and featured 12 former national team alumni, 14 players with Major League experience, four World Series champions, four former MLB All-Stars and four MLB Pipeline top-100 prospects in baseball.

"Going into the clubhouse, I knew there was going to be a bunch of guys that I used to watch on TV," Lane said. "I learned a lot from them on and off the field. It was definitely a privilege to be



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on that roster and share the experience with some veterans who've had such successful careers. I really appreciated playing with all of them. From a position player standpoint, Todd Frazier, Jon Jay and Matt Kemp were leaders in the dugout. Edwin Jackson and David Robertson were our leaders in the bullpen and as a pitching staff. They motivated us, taught us and inspired us. It was definitely special."

Lane and his U.S. teammates began the Baseball Americas Qualifier with a convincing 7-1 victory over Nicaragua in Port St. Lucie, Fla. The RailRiders southpaw made his first appearance for the stars and stripes in an 8-6 triumph over the Dominican Republic. Lane was credited with the victory after throwing 0.2 IP out of the bullpen.

After its third contest against Puerto Rico was washed out by rain, the United States advanced to the Super Round as the top finisher in Group A. The Red, White and Blue dominated Canada on June 4, 10-1, to open Super Round competition before beating Venezuela on June 5, 4-2. This victory over Venezuela punched their ticket to Tokyo.

"It was pretty cool when we qualified for the Olympics," Lane said. "Before being selected to the team, I didn't know what the process was like and especially this year with Covid-19 made things different. It honestly surprised me when I found out the United States hadn't already qualified for the games. We were pretty confident as a team from the very beginning and we all knew we were going to win it."

As for Deglan and Team Canada, there was nothing more they could have asked for to open

the qualifier. Former bigleaguer Andrew Albers and two relievers combined to no-hit Colombia as Canada opened up its Baseball Americas Olympic Qualifier with a 7-0 victory. Deglan was behind the dish for the entirety of the no-hitter, stealing a couple of extra strikes with framing and doing the pitch-calling for his hurlers.

"It was a great game to be behind the plate, that's for sure," Deglan said. "We had Andrew Albers pitching who is in Triple-A with the Minnesota Twins and he pitched seven scoreless. He was just dominating these guys and was hitting the corners. He is fastball dominant, but we used his

off-speed the second and *Credit: Todd Hiller* third time through the order a little more. He was just in total control."



While the focus of the game was the commanding start from Albers to set up the no-hitter, the pitcher had high praise for his catcher.

"Deglan did a great job behind the plate," Albers told Baseball America. "He called a great game and did a really good job framing some tight pitches, so we got some calls that way. I was able to pound the outer half of the zone and miss some contact early, and that really helped open up the lineup a little bit the second time through, and we switched sides of the plate. The fastball command was really good, and we worked off that."

Team Canada proceeded to defeat Cuba, a country that has long been a powerhouse in baseball. Canada opened the scoring with a three-run first inning and never trailed in the matchup, but a late comeback from Cuba—plating two runs each in the seventh and ninth frames—made things interesting before the Canadian team shut the door and eliminated Cuba.

"It was really cool to beat Cuba," Deglan said. "It was a night game in St. Lucie and they definitely had a home crowd with the number of Cuban-American fans in the stadium. They were loud and supportive of Cuba, making it a great environment. We scored right away in the first, which took the crowd out of it a bit, but it was amazing."

The efforts of Team Canada's run fell just short in a loss to the Dominican Republic later the same week at the Baseball Americas Qualifier. The Canadians dropped three games in the super round, falling to the Dominican Republic, United States and Venezuela, and failed to qualify for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

"It meant a lot to be on the Canadian roster," Deglan said. "Anytime you get the opportunity to

represent your country you are playing for so much more than yourself and your teammates. Everyone back home is watching closely and we want to do well, to make our countrymen proud. It brings a different type of butterflies pregame."

Chirinos and the Venezuelan national team opened play and defeated Cuba by a final of 6-5 with Chirinos providing a solo home run. In its second match-up of the tournament, Venezuela had a walk-off 3-2 win over Columbia. Chirinos went 1-for-3 with a single and a walk.

"The atmosphere was really different," Robinson said. "The first game we played was against Cuba and that stadium was packed. The fans were loud and it was so

unbelievable. It brings your focus and concentration to another level. To play against Cuba and beat them the first day, it just set the tone for the rest of the tournament. There are so many people from Cuba in Florida, so that game was especially packed and they were loud the whole game. It was really fun."

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Matching up with Canada in its next game, Venezuela continued to show its offensive and defensive prowess in a 5-0 victory. The team allowed just one hit and worked around four walks to keep the Canadians off the board, while its offense helped Venezuela to a perfect 3-0 record in group play. Chirinos couldn't have been happier about the team's success and for the opportunity to play an important role for his country.

"If for some reason I wasn't in the MLB, I knew I wanted to play for this team," Chirinos said. "As a baseball player and a guy from Venezuela, you really don't dream about being in the Olympics. You sign as a professional player and the only goal you have in your mind is to become a big league player. The work you put in everyday, that is the dream you have when you are a little kid. This is the Olympics, we are talking about the best players in the world who have been working their whole lives to get to this point and I am getting this opportunity."

Things took a turn for the worse for Venezuela as the Super Round began. After being pounded by the Dominican Republic in a 14-4 loss, Venezuela also fell to the United States and lost the opportunity to qualify out of the tournament.

The Venezuelan national team, who finished third place in the Americas Qualifier, had one more chance to qualify for the Olympics by participating in the Final Qualifier in Puebla, Mexico from June 22-26 along with Australia, the Dominican Republic and the Netherlands.

Venezuela, which has never made the Olympics, advanced to the final qualifier game in Puebla after beating the Netherlands 10-0 on Friday in a game that ended two innings early by the mercy rule. Chirinos supplied a three-run home run to the offensive showing. However, the Dominican Republic defeated Venezuela 8-5 in the next contest to earn the sixth and final spot in the baseball tournament at the Tokyo Olympics next month.

"I was not expecting to be on this team, but when we were in Florida I started to dream about making it to Tokyo," said Chirinos. "It was mind blowing when I realized how big it would be if we made it to the Olympics. We did everything on the field and off the field to have a chance and we did. We had a chance in the last game and we were so close to making it to the Olympics. It is amazing how when you play for your country, how fast the team comes together. You put your pride to the side and give everything you have to your team and country. It was really cool."

With all rounds of the qualifier concluded, Team USA will move on towards Tokyo. The Olympic baseball tournament will begin on Tuesday, July 27 at Fukushima Azuma Baseball Stadium and Yokohama Baseball Stadium. The U.S. joins the Dominican Republic, Israel, Japan, Korea and Mexico in the six-team field. While the U.S. Olympic baseball roster was announced without Lane making it past the final cut, perhaps most important was the opportunity to represent his country and proudly wear the United States jersey.

"It was definitely a privilege and it was special to represent the United States," Lane said. "I never thought I'd be here as a kid, so it shows what hard work and dedication can accomplish. It was surreal to play for my country and wear the United States of America jersey. All I wanted to do was make my country proud."

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FRIAR FAITHFUL: GWYNN'S INFLUENCE FELT BY ALLEN

Greg Allen was traded by Cleveland to his hometown San Diego Padres last summer, allowing him to return to the area where his legendary college coach made a lasting impact.

Being traded for the first time is never easy. While moving from one team to the next is an inevitable part of baseball for all but a select few, there is still a wave of emotions that accompanies the moment.

On August 31, 2020, RailRiders outfielder Greg Allen experienced that for the first time. The Cleveland Indians – the organization that drafted him in 2014 – traded him along with Mike Clevinger and a player to be named later to the San Diego Padres for six players.

"It was definitely a blessing. At the time being traded was a little bit of a whirlwind of emotions and events. Things were moving pretty fast," said Allen, who grew up in San Diego. "But once the dust settled I was in San Diego and got to be home ... live at home for the time that I was there. It was everything I could have imagined. You grow up being from San Diego having a chance to watch the Padres come up, just to be able to don that uniform and be on the field, to be able to call me a Padre there for a little bit was awesome."

Allen grew up a big Padres fan and was five years old when they reached the World Series in 1998, falling in four games to the juggernaut Yankees. Like many kids across Southern California, he idolized Padres right fielder Tony Gwynn – the Hall of Famer who earned the nickname "Mr. Padre" by spending his entire 20-year career in San Diego.

After retiring from baseball following the 2001 season, Gwynn began working as a volunteer assistant coach at San Diego State University, and took over as the program's head coach in 2003. Nine years later, Allen stepped onto campus to play baseball for his boyhood idol.

"There's definitely a star-struck factor," said Allen of playing for Gwynn. "I think for me, that was one of the biggest selling points, just having a chance to stay in my backyard and come and play for a program whose head coach is a guy like that. It was everything I could have imagined to be."

Allen immediately thrived under Gwynn, taking over a regular spot in the lineup and batting

.306 as a freshman. He followed that up with a .299 performance as a sophomore in 2013, while stealing 25 bases. Allen was a key catalyst on that 2013 Aztecs team which won the Mountain West Conference tournament to earn an NCAA Regional bid.

But his time at San Diego State also aligned with trying times in Gwynn's life. Mr. Padre was diagnosed with salivary gland cancer in 2010, and had to take time off for treatments in the ensuing years. Allen's junior season at SDSU in 2014 was the program's best under Gwynn – a 42-21 record and a second straight NCAA Regional appearance – but it was also his last. He passed away on June 16, 10 days after Allen was drafted.



"He was one of the most stand-up, classy people I have had a chance to be around, both on and off the field," Allen says of Gwynn. "The way he went about his business, the way he cared for his players and everything else. You could tell that he truly cared for us. That meant a lot to the guys."

While Allen first and foremost remembers the lessons taught by Gwynn off the field, the baseball lessons sunk in, too. Watching him play is like watching a highlight reel of Gwynn from the early days of his career in the 1980s – good speed and a simple approach.

"He would repeat three things to us: Get in position, see the baseball and swing the knob [of the bat]," Allen said of Gwynn's hitting advice. "As far as a hitting approach goes, it might be tough for people to grasp that he would make that concept of hitting so simple for his guys.


"He really focused on slowing the


game down. And that was a message he preached to us as freshmen in college. It was something that he felt was important at any competitive level, whether you're a freshman, junior, sophomore or you're playing at the highest stage in baseball, he really focused on slowing the game down, staying within yourself and not making things harder than what it already is."

Gwynn's lessons both on and off the field have made Allen a popular and successful player on the field with fans and in the clubhouse with his teammates.

There is a saying that you should never meet your heroes, but it's safe to say that Allen disagrees with that: "I'm very, very grateful for the time I had to be able to spend there and play under him."

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ALUMNI UPDATE: CHECKING IN ON A FEW 2019 RAILRID

Scranton/Wilkes-Barre's 2019 club won the last-ever International North crown, but several key members of the roster have moved on.

As we wind our way through the 2021 season, let's take a look at where some former RailRiders' staff and players from the 2019 playoff team landed and how they are doing. The stats and records listed below were current as of 7/02/21.

Jay Bell

In 2019, Jay Bell managed the RailRiders to a 76-65 record during the regular season, ultimately winning the International League North Division title on September 3. Bell had worked his way up through the Yankees organization, reaching the postseason with each club he skippered.

In 2020, Bell moved on to the Los Angeles Angels organization and was given the reins of their new Double-A club in Madison, Alabama. This season, the Rocket City Trash Pandas are 25-24, two and a half games out of first in Double-A Southeast's North Division.

Tommy Phelps

Tommy Phelps was slated to be the RailRiders Pitching Coach in 2020, which would have marked his fifth straight season in that role. He spent 11 seasons in total within the Yankees organization, having coached in Trenton and Tampa before joining Scranton/Wilkes-Barre. His staffs in SWB routinely led the International League in ERA or strikeouts year after year.

During the off-season, Phelps was hired by the Miami Marlins. He currently serves as the organization's Assistant Pitching Coordinator.

Phil Plantier

Phil Plantier spent two seasons as the RailRiders Hitting Coach under managers Bobby Mitchell (2018) and Jay Bell (2019). In 2018, the club was among the International League's top offensive clubs in several major categories. In 2019, the RailRiders set a franchise record for home runs in a season under his tutelage.

In late 2020, Plantier left the Yankees organization and was hired by the Miami Marlins. He is currently serving as the hitting coach for the Jacksonville Jumbo Shrimp, the Marlins new Triple-A affiliate. Plantier works alongside former RailRiders Manager Al Pedrique, who was also hired by Miami before the 2021 season.

Rex Brothers

The Yankees signed Rex Brothers to a Minor League free agent deal for the 2019 season and assigned him to Scranton/Wilkes-Barre. The left-hander appeared in 34 games out of the

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RailRiders bullpen, posting an 0-3 record with a 4.93 ERA. He struck out 81 and walked 36 betters over 45.2 innings pitched.

Before the 2020 season, Brothers signed with the Chicago Cubs and began the year at their alternate site. He went on to make three appearances for the Cubs last summer. This season, he is a mainstay in their bullpen, having worked 31 games with a 3.45 ERA over 28.2 innings pitched with 49 strikeouts and 16 walks.

Daniel Camarena

Daniel Camarena was drafted by the Yankees in 2011 and made his Scranton/Wilkes-Barre debut in 2016. He made 34 appearances for the RailRiders over a four-year stretch, including 31 starts. He was selected to the Yankees Active roster in July of 2019, but did not pitch and ultimately missed the final two months of the season with an injury.

The southpaw spent 2020 at the San Diego Padres alternate site and began 2021 with the El Paso Chihuahuas. In 10 games for El Paso this year, he is 3-2 with a 3.74 Earned Run Average. On June 19, Camarena made his Major League debut for San Diego.

Cale Coshow

After Cale Coshow's 2019 season ended prematurely owing to an elbow injury which required Tommy John surgery, he is back in baseball for the 2021 season.

On May 4, he announced on Twitter that he had signed a contract with the Detroit Tigers organization after nearly two years out of the game. In 14 appearances through the end of June, Coshow is 2-1 with a 4.32 ERA, and has struck out 25 batters in 25.0 innings. He also has racked up two saves.

J.P. Feyereisen

The team-leader in wins in 2019, J.P. Feyereisen made his MLB debut with the Milwaukee Brewers on July 24, 2020, allowing a run in 1.0 inning against the Chicago Cubs. He began 2021 with Milwaukee, but was traded to Tampa Bay on May 21 along with pitcher Drew Rasmussen for shortstop Willy Adames and pitcher Trevor Richards. Overall, the righty is 4-3 with a 2.00 ERA in 36 games in the majors this season.

Adam Giardino

A member of the SWB radio booth in the 2018 and 2019 seasons, Adam Giardino has left minor league baseball. He broadcasts college sports for numerous schools in New England, including at his alma mater, the University of Connecticut. During the 2020 pandemic, Giardino founded a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, the Black Play-By-Play Broadcaster Grant and Scholarship Fund, helping traditionally underrepresented minorities get their start in broadcasting. Gosuke Katoh

In 2019, Gosuke Katoh was a late addition to the initial roster and flourished in his first Triple-A season. Over 83 games, Katoh hit .279 with 11 home runs, 39 runs batted in and 42

walks. His versatility was crucial for Manager Jay Bell, who used Katoh at all four infield spots and a few appearances in left field. Katoh also authored several of the RailRiders key walk-off moments.

After spending 2020 at the Miami Marlins alternate site, Katoh signed with his hometown San Diego Padres for 2021. In 39 games this season for the Padres Triple-A affiliate in El Paso, he is batting .293 with a pair of home runs, five batted in a and a .374 on-base percentage.

Erik Kratz

Another fan-favorite, Erik Kratz spent the final year of his 18-year career with the New York Yankees in 2020, batting .321/.367/.393 in 16 games. The 40-year-old gained fame for his friendship and relationship with 21-year-old pitcher Deivi Garcia, the largest age gap of any Yankees battery since 1906. Kratz has since retired from baseball and is active on Twitter, where he can frequently be found lobbying the Yankees to call up RailRiders outfielder Trey Amburgey.

Ryan McBroom

After being traded to the Kansas City Royals on August 31, 2019, SWB fan favorite Ryan McBroom has appeared in 64 big league games with the Royals, batting .265/.320/.426 with 6 HR and 16 RBIs. McBroom collected his first big league hit in his first at-bat, singling to right-center off Detroit's Daniel Norris. He has spent most of the 2021 season with the Triple-A Omaha Storm Chasers where he has been among the Triple-A East leaders in home runs all season, hitting 15 through the end of June.

Logan Morrison

Logan Morrison only played 43 games with the RailRiders in 2019, but etched his name into the record books with 11 home runs in the month of June. After utilizing an opt-out clause in his contract, he latched on with the Phillies, splitting the rest of the year with Philadelphia and Triple-A Lehigh Valley.

LoMo played in nine games in 2020 with Milwaukee and began 2021 with the High Point Rockers of the independent Atlantic League, and recently had his contract purchased by the Cincinnati Reds. He is currently a member of the Louisville Bats, where he is hitting .340/.456/.617 in 14 games.

Breyvic Valera

The Yankees claimed Breyvic Valera off waivers from San Francisco on May 12, 2019, and was assigned to the RailRiders. The versatile infielder shined in his time with Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, batting .315 over 83 games with 13 home runs and 49 runs batted in. He was selected by the Yankees in July and appeared in 12 games with New York.

This season, Valera is playing for the Buffalo Bisons in the Toronto Blue Jays organization. He is batting .288 for Buffalo over 29 games played. Buffalo is playing its home games in Trenton, New Jersey, while the Blue Jays use Sahlen Field as their makeshift home. Trenton, of course, was the Yankees Double-A home from 2003-2020.

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RAILRIDERS RADIO NETWORK

The flagship of the RailRiders Radio Network is The Mothership; Bold Gold's oldies station that hit the airwaves in 2020 and added a frequency to expand the coverage. Scranton/Wilkes-Barre games can be heard locally on 1400 AM, 1440 AM, 93.5 FM, 106.7 FM and 107.9 FM. This array of frequencies for The Mothership gives the RailRiders coverage across both Lackawanna and Luzerne Counties, as well as into Wayne and Pike Counties in the Pocono Lake Region.

NEW ENDINGS: 2021 SEASON EXTENDED FOR MILB

Whirlwind season will add 10 games to end of the schedule, extending RailRiders baseball into October for the first time in history.

Last week, Minor League Baseball announced that the 2021 season will be extended across all full-season levels. Triple-A teams will add two five-game series to the end of their current schedules while each of the lower full-season levels will hold a one-week postseason.



After the 2020 season was canceled due to the global pandemic and Major League Baseball reformed its Minor League structure, hopes were high for baseball in 2021. Schedules were announced in early in the season with start dates set for early April. The RailRiders season was initially scheduled to start on April 6.

Ultimately, however, Major League Baseball pushed the Minor League season back four weeks due to COVID-19 concerns and to allow for an increase in vaccinations across the country, both among its players and the fan bases that attend games at every level.

While the season started late, no major changes were made to the schedule other than eliminating the first few weeks of the year. The Minor League All-Star breaks were lost in lieu of a few additional July games. At the outset of the campaign, no playoffs were

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scheduled with the hope truly focused on completing a successful 120-game schedule (22 less than what was originally planned in Triple-A).

With the rise in vaccine options and vaccinated individuals across the country, protocols began to change. Stadium capacities began to rise, masking and distancing procedures have been altered and a sense of pre-2020 norms returned in many stadiums.

With all factors considered, Major League Baseball felt comfortable in announcing the changes to the final month of the schedule.

At the Double-A, High-A and Low-A levels, the top two teams in each league will compete in a best-of-5 series, beginning Tuesday, Sept. 21. At the time of this writing, the New York Yankees affiliates in each full season classification are in first place in their respective divisions.

The Triple-A East schedule was originally scheduled to end on Sunday, September 19. Clubs across the RailRiders' league will begin a five-game series on Wednesday, September 22, followed by another five-game set beginning on September 29.

Triple-A West, which was slated to end on Tuesday, September 21, will add its two additional series starting on September 23 and 29, respectively.

This extends the Triple-A regular season Sunday, October 3, and league champions will be crowned based off their overall records.

The RailRiders final home game was scheduled for September 12 against the Rochester Red Wings. Once the schedule is updated with new dates and opponents for the additional ten games, information will be released regarding season tickets, partial plans and single-game ticket sales.
