

The Albuquerque Isotopes announced in October 2023 its new ownership partner Diamond Baseball Holdings (DBH), an organization that owns and operates select Minor League Baseball clubs affiliated with Major League Baseball (MLB).

Founded in 2021 and led by Executive Chairman Pat Battle and CEO Peter Freund, DBH is committed to elevating fan experiences, creating "centers of energy," fostering dynamic engagements for brands and highlighting the evolution of the MiLB environment through professional management, best practices, innovation and investment. It is grounded in a deep-rooted appreciation for traditions, community and the sport of baseball.

The Isotopes are regularly recognized for their ability to engage the community, including winning the Copa de la Diversión Cup thrice for the widely popular 'Mariachis de Nuevo México' promotion. DBH plans to build on the club's momentum and continue to cultivate a close relationship with Albuquerque, while further elevating the fan, player, and community experience by investing in technological innovation and expanding the activation of Isotopes Park as a social, entertainment center of the city.

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KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!

CASHLESS VENUE

RGCU Field at Isotopes Park is a cashless facility. All major credit cards and Baseball Bucks are accepted for ticket purchases at the RGCU Field at Isotopes Park Box Office, Isotopes Pro Shop, Fun Zone Ticket Booth, all permanent concession stands and portable concession stands. Digital forms of payment are also accepted at select locations.

BAG POLICY

The Albuquerque Isotopes encourage fans to leave all bags at home to speed up the entry process into the stadium.

If a fan chooses to bring in a bag, the following rules apply:

- · All bags are subject to search
- Each fan may carry one bag of any size that is clear plastic, vinyl, or PVC, or a clear plastic freezer bag (Ziploc bag or similar).
- Palm-sized clutch purses or wallets do not need to abide by the Clear Bag Policy.
- Bags within bags will not be permitted -- all items must be clearly visible within one acceptable/approved clear bag.
- For guests with medical or childcare needs such as diapers, wipes, formula, bottles, breast pumps, insulin, or medications those items may be brought in a separate non-clear medical or diaper bag, and those bags are subject to search upon entry into the stadium. Only childcare or medical items may be carried inside of these bags, all other personal items must be carried in an approved clear bag.
- Any bags not meeting these requirements will not be allowed inside the ballpark. If a bag is turned away at the gate due to not following the clear bag policy, it will need to be returned to the fan's vehicle. The Isotopes do not provide storage for bags.
- Blankets and jackets must be carried in separately and are subject to search.

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PARKING

The University of New Mexico owns and controls most of the parking lots surrounding RGCU Field at Isotopes Park and charge fans to park in these UNM lots. Payment for parking must be done by credit cards. Cash and Baseball Bucks are not accepted as forms of payment at these lots. Vehicles with four or more people are allowed to park in the Stadium East Lot for free. Vehicles displaying a disabled permit or placard are allowed to park for free at the UNM East Lot.

Only credentialed media, disabled, and Suite Holder permit parking is allowed in Lots A, B and C. Season Ticket Holders who have purchased a discounted permit may park in the Stadium West Lot directly south of RGCU Field at Isotopes Park. The permit must be displayed in their vehicles to gain access to the lots.

There are a limited number of disabled parking spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis in lots A and C. Overflow disabled parking is available adjacent to the Stadium West Lot directly south of RGCU Field at Isotopes Park on a first-come, first-served basis.

Availability of parking around the stadium is subject to change.

🔊 NO SMOKING

Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park is a non-smoking facility. We appreciate your cooperation in making the ballpark a safe, fun, family-friendly environment.

MOBILE TICKETING

Mobile tickets offer fans convenience and safety by reducing contact at all points of entry.

Tickets can not be printed or screenshot. All tickets must be managed digitally.

Plan ahead: Mobile tickets should be accessible before proceeding through the security screenings at Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park.

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FANS' 🔆 📲 GUIDE TO ISOTOPES PARK

PLEASE NOTE: Due to COVID 19 restrictions and protocols changes may have to be made to several things covered in this A-Z Guide. Should modilications need to be made during the season we will strive to do our best to communicate those to the general public

Accessible Seating

Accessible seating is reserved for guests with accessible requirements and their companions. Guests requiring accessible seating may purchase one (1) accessible seat and up to three (3) companion seats adjacent to the accessible seat. Depending upon availability, seats for additional guests will be located as close as possible to the accessible space.

Isotopes Park is committed to working with guests on a case-by-case basis to adequately accommodate individual needs. All ticket sales are based on availability.

Isotopes Park is fully accessible. Guests may enter Isotopes Park at any of the entry gates. Ramps are provided at all entries, and there are elevators that will take patrons to the Club Level if they choose those seats.

Alcohol Management

No alcoholic beverages may be brought into or removed from Isotopes Park. New Mexico State Law prohibits the sale of alcoholic beverages to persons under the age of 21.

Please note the following policies:

• Patrons will be required to show proper proof of age when purchasing alcoholic beverages at Isotopes Park.

 New Mexico Law prohibits patrons from purchasing and/or possessing more than two alcoholic beverages at a time.

• Alcohol will not be served after the bottom of the 7th inning. This policy varies for 7-inning games.

• The Albuquerque Isotopes and Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality reserve the right to deny the sale of alcoholic beverages to any guests.

• Do not allow anyone to attempt to drive if intoxicated. Assist guests to the CNM Guest Services Booth to arrange a ride.

Autograph Requests

Guests may make autograph requests from the Isotopes and visiting teams up to 15 minutes prior to game time. The best access to the players would be along the retaining walls near the dugouts. Guests are asked not to climb or lean on top of the dugouts and will be asked to move 15 minutes prior to game time per Major League Baseball rules.

Baby Changing Tables

Baby changing tables are located in all restrooms at Isotopes Park. There are "Family Restrooms" located on the concourse (both 1st and 3rd base side), Club Level and Press Level.

Bags (Clear Bag Policy)

The Albuquerque Isotopes encourage fans to leave all bags at home to speed up the entry process into the stadium.

If a fan chooses to bring in a bag, the following rules apply:

- All bags are subject to search
- Each fan may carry one bag of any size that is clear plastic, vinyl, or PVC, or a clear plastic freezer bag (Ziploc bag or similar).

 Palm-sized clutch purses or wallets do not need to abide by the Clear Bag Policy.

• Bags within bags will not be permitted -- all items must be clearly visible within one acceptable/approved clear bag.

• For guests with medical or childcare needs such as diapers, wipes, formula, bottles, breast pumps, insulin, or medications those items may be brought in a separate non-clear medical or diaper bag, and those bags are

subject to search upon entry into the stadium. Only childcare or medical items may be carried inside of these bags, all other personal items must be carried in an approved clear bag.

Banners and Signs

Commercial banners and signs are not allowed in Isotopes Park without express written consent from the Albuquerque Isotopes.

Beverages, Food & Containers

No bottles, cans, food, beverages or containers may be brought into Isotopes Park, with the exception of sealed bottled water. Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality will make every effort to accommodate fans with dietary restrictions.

Blake's Lotaburger Kids Fun Run

Kids 12 and under have the opportunity to run the bases after every Isotopes home game (they must be able to do so without a parent accompanying them), weather permitting. Listen to announcements for further details. Parents must remain in the seating area. Kids enter the field on the 1st base side (Section 118/120) and exit the field via the gate at Section 115. Parents are instructed to be at Section 115's exit along the concourse to meet their child as they exit the field at the Kiddie Korral pickup area. After every Thursday game, the Isotopes allow adults to run the bases as well. For the safety of the children, Albuquerque Police Officers are present on the field.

In addition to purchasing tickets at the Isotopes Park Box Office, fans may purchase tickets online by visiting abqisotopes.com or www.ticketmaster.com.

There are no refunds or exchanges for individual game tickets. All sales are final.

Cameras

Still and hand-held video cameras are permitted at Isotopes Park, but tripods cannot be set up that block the view of other guests. Video reproduction is strictly prohibited without express written consent from the Albuquerque Isotopes.

Children Tickets

Children two years of age and older require a ticket to enter Isotopes Park. Children under the age of two years are not required to have a ticket unless they will occupy their own seat. Children ages two through 12 are eligible for a \$2 discount (excluding May 5) in the Reserved Level only.

CNM Guest Services Booth

The CNM Guest Services Booth, located behind Section 102 on the concourse, will be open the same time as the gates and will stay open until approximately 30 minutes following the game to assist with lost items, lost guests, emergencies, accommodations or any other questions or concerns that may arise.

Comments/Suggestions

Fans may register comments and/or suggestions during games at the CNM Guest Services Booth. Fans may also email comments/suggestions to info@ abgisotopes.com or mail comments/ suggestions to our Administrative Office.

Concessions

Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality is the exclusive concessionaire at Isotopes Park. To inquire or make comments regarding food service, contact Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality directly at (505) 222-4033.

Designated Driver Program

In conjunction with the State of New Mexico's Department of Transportation, we offer a Designated Driver program to help promote responsible consumption of alcohol among our fans. Fans wishing to be identified as their group's Designated Driver can receive a free bottle of water by signing up at the CNM Guest Services Booth.

Elevators

The stadium's two public elevators are located at the main entrance (McKernan Hall) and inside the gate near the 3rd base stairwell. The elevators provide access for Suite and Club seat holders, disabled guests, Isotopes front office staff and Press Box personnel. If assistance is needed, fans may also take the 3rd base elevator to access Sections 201, 203 and 205.

Exit Procedure

Guests are asked to exit the stadium through the designated exits located on the concourse. There are two main exits located on the 1st and 3rd base sides. In the event of an emergency, there are two additional emergency exits adjacent to Section 123 on the 3rd base side and Section 122 on the 1st base side. To help ensure everyone's safety, Isotopes Park has a no re-entry policy. Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodations are up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and are strictly limited to emergencies only.

Fans Code of Conduct

The Albuquerque Isotopes are committed to creating a safe, comfortable and enjoyable experience for our guests at Isotopes Park.

Our staff will proactively intervene to support an environment where guests can enjoy the Isotopes Park experience free of unacceptable behavior, including the following:

- · Foul/abusive language or obscene gestures.
- Intoxication or other signs of impairment related to alcohol consumption.
- Displays of affection not appropriate in a public, family setting.
- Obscene or indecent clothing.

• Any disruption of the game or event, including throwing of objects or trespassing on the playing field or in restricted areas.

- · Sitting in a location other than the guest's ticketed seat.
- ·Fighting, taunting or making threatening remarks or gestures.

Any guest not adhering to the above code or behaving in an unruly manner will be removed from the ballpark. The Albuquerque Isotopes and Isotopes Park management reserve the right to determine what unruly or unacceptable behavior is.

If anyone is interfering with your enjoyment of our facility, please contact the nearest Isotopes Park Employee for assistance.

Field Dimensions

Field Surface

Our field consistently ranks as one of the top venues in all of professional baseball, selected by the SportsTurf Managers Association as the 2014 and 2016 PCL Field of the Year and the 2013 Professional Baseball Field of the Year. Our playing surface is a four variety Kentucky bluegrass blend, growing in a root zone mixture of 92% sand and 8% peat. The field was renovated prior to the 2023 season, resulting in removal of the iconic hill in center field due to Major League Baseball's concerns about player safety.

Field Trespassing

Any guest attempting to enter the field of play before, during or after an event without authorization will be removed from the stadium and subject to criminal prosecution and/or fines.

First Aid Station

The First Aid Station is located on the concourse behind Section 102/104. If you need immediate assistance, please notify a staff member or visit the CNM Guest Services Booth.

First Game

The first game in Isotopes history was April 3, 2003 at the Memphis Redbirds. The first Isotopes home game was April 11, 2003 vs. the Oklahoma RedHawks.

Forms of Payment

Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park is a cashless facility. Baseball Bucks/Visa/MasterCard/ AMEX/Discover are accepted for ticket purchases at the Isotopes Park Box Office, Isotopes Pro Shop, Fun Zone Ticket Booth, all permanent concession stands and portable concession stands. Digital forms of payment (i.e. Apple Pay and Google Pay) are also accepted at select locations.

Foul Balls and Home Runs

Batted balls and other objects leaving the field of play can be dangerous and we ask that you stay alert at all times. The extended safety netting should not give fans a false sense of safety and attention must still be paid towards protecting yourself and others in your party. Guests are permitted to keep any baseballs that are hit into the stands. However, guests may not enter the field to retrieve balls or otherwise interfere with balls in play. At no time should a foul or home run ball be thrown back onto the field of play (violators will be subject to ejection).

Fun Zone

The Isotopes Park Fun Zone is located above the berm in the right field area of the stadium. The area contains various attractions for kids, including a playground for small children, carousel, multiple inflatable bounce houses and a gravity-drop ride called "Topes Tower." Tickets for these attractions may be purchased at the Fun Zone Ticket Booth during games.

Gate Times

Stadium gates will generally open one hour and five minutes before the start of each game. On occasion, stadium gates will open 90 minutes prior to game time. All gate opening times are listed at abqisotopes.com and are subject to change.

Giveaways

Promotional items, or "giveaways," are available on selected game dates to fans that possess a valid ticket on a first-come, first-served basis. One item per guest, age restrictions may apply. Guests must be in attendance at the game to receive a promotional item. In the event that a postponed or suspended game is played or resumed on the date of a scheduled giveaway promotion, thereby causing the gates to open earlier than originally scheduled, the promotional items will be given out at the new time that the gates open.

Lost and Found

During games, guests may inquire about lost and found items at the CNM Guest Services Booth. To inquire about lost and found items after a game, guests may call the Albuquerque Isotopes Administrative Office at (505) 924-2255 during business hours from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Items will be held for seven days before being discarded or donated.

Lost Children

If a child becomes lost or separated from their group, they should notify the nearest staff member and security will be informed. A lost child will be taken to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Parents looking for their child should follow the same procedure. The Isotopes encourage guests to instruct their children what to do if they become lost or separated.

Mascot

Orbit is a large goofy alien that arrived at Isotopes Park for the team's inaugural season back in 2003. This bright orange, yellow and red alien landed late one night in center field and has made Isotopes Park his home ever since. Thanks to the Topes amazing fans, Orbit was even crowned the MiLB Mascot Mania's Best Mascot in Minor League Baseball in 2012.

Orbit can be booked for special occasions by filling out a request form found online at abqisotopes.com or by calling the Community Relations Department at (505) 222-4004 during business hours from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

McKernan Hall

McKernan Hall is located at the Suite and Club entrance located directly behind home plate on the concourse. McKernan Hall is dedicated to the late Pat McKernan, former Albuquerque Dukes General Manager, who was highly respected in Minor League Baseball and New Mexico. McKernan Hall is a tribute to professional baseball in Albuquerque and includes the Albuquerque Professional Baseball Hall of Fame. Only patrons holding Suite and Club Level tickets may enter through McKernan Hall during events.

Merchandise

The Isotopes Park Pro Shop is open during all home games starting when gates open. The Pro Shop is also open Monday through Friday year-round from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm and on game-day Saturdays from 12:00 pm to 4:00 pm. Fans can always shop online 24/7 at abgisotopes.com or place a phone order by calling (505) 222-4059.

Message Board

The videoboard can be used to display birthday and anniversary announcements during select innings of the game. A charitable donation is required for all birthday and anniversary announcements along with wedding proposals and other requests. These fees will be donated to a selected charity at the end of the season. All requests must occur 24 hours in advance of game day and can be submitted by visiting the "Fan Zone" tab on team's website at abgisotopes.com.

National Anthem Performance

Those wishing to perform the National Anthem at an Isotopes game may submit a demo to the Isotopes for consideration. Additional information regarding this process can be found at abqisotopes.com.

Orbit's O-Zone

Orbit's O-Zone is located behind the center field batter's eye and is designated for Team of the Game and Birthday Parties. Call the Group Sales Department at (505) 924-2255 for more details.

Paging (In-Stadium)

Paging is available for emergency situations only (i.e., lost children, etc.). Guests can visit the CNM Guest Services Booth to request a PA announcement. The Isotopes reserve the right to deny any announcement request.

Parking

The University of New Mexico owns and controls most of the parking lots surrounding Isotopes Park and charge Isotopes fans to park in these UNM lots. Payment for parking must be made by credit cards. Cash and Baseball Bucks are not accepted as forms of payment at these lots. Vehicles with four or more people are allowed to park in the Stadium East Lot for free. The price to park in the UNM lots is \$7 per game. UNM may charge different amounts for other events and non-lsotopes games.

Staff and general public may not park in the three lots on Isotopes Park property (Lots A, B and C). Only credentialed media, disabled, and Suite Holder permit parking is allowed in these lots. Season Ticket Holders who have purchased a discounted permit may park in the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park. The permit must be displayed in their vehicles to gain access to the lots.

There are a limited number of disabled parking spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis in Lots A and C. Overflow disabled parking is available adjacent to the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park on a first-come, first-served basis.

Availability of parking around the stadium is subject to change.

Pepsi Porch

The Pepsi Porch is an exclusive hospitality area located behind Section 123 designed for groups of 20-28. Those interested in booking an event in this area can contact the Isotopes Group Sales Department at (505) 924-2255.

Pets & Service Animals

Pets, other than service animals, are not permitted inside Isotopes Park. Service Animals, as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act, are welcome at Isotopes Park, provided they are accompanied by the handler and leashed at all times.

For everyone's safety, the Isotopes do not allow laser pointers, noisemakers, fireworks, weapons, nets or any other item that may be considered dangerous or may interfere with another fan's enjoyment of the game. Major League Baseball rules prohibit all bags, except medical bags and manufactured diaper bags, from entering the venue (see "Bags" policy, above). Please be aware this is a partial list of prohibited items and any questions should be directed to the Administrative Offices at (505) 924-2255.

All Isotopes games can be heard on KNML 610 AM/95.9 FM "The Sports Animal." Occasionally, game broadcasts may be moved to KTBL 1050 AM. Additionally, all games can be heard at abgisotopes.com.

Radios

Hand-held radios are welcome at Isotopes Park as long as they do not interfere with other guests' enjoyment of the game. The Isotopes reserve the right to ask any guest to discontinue use of such devices.

Rain Check Policy

If an official game is not played, that being 4½ innings if the lsotopes are leading or 5 innings if the game is tied or if the visiting team is leading, the ticket may be used as a rain check. In this case, the ticket may be exchanged for a ticket of equal or lesser value, based on seating availability, for any future 2024 regular season, non-restricted home game (excludes May 5). Exchanges are accepted exclusively at the lsotopes Park Box Office. Tickets for official games which are suspended after becoming official contests do not qualify as rain checks.

Rain Check Policy FAQs

SHOULD THE FANS KEEP THEIR ORIGINAL TICKETS?

- Absolutely - this is a requirement

- If they have digital tickets, the Isotopes Park Box Office staff can look up those accounts accordingly. They will need to provide your Ticketmaster account number or seat location to assist in this process.

DO THE TICKETS NEED TO BE EXCHANGED RIGHT AWAY AFTER THE GAME IS POSTPONED?

- No tickets can be exchanged whenever it's convenient for the fan.
 The Box Office will stay open after the game is called to
- accommodate fans who want to exchange their tickets at that time.
- Otherwise, fans can return any time during normal Box Office hours to make their exchanges.
- Fans can also come to the Box Office the night of the game they want to attend and make the exchange at that time keeping in mind that seating is based on availability.

- Remember, all exchanges are based on availability of seating at the time of exchange for the new game.

HOW/WHERE TO MAKE EXCHANGES?

- Exchanges must be made exclusively at the Isotopes Park Box Office.

WHAT SEATS WILL THE FAN GET FOR THE NEW GAME?

- The tickets from the postponed game will be exchanged for new seats of equal or lesser value.

- If it's possible for the fan to get the same seats for the new game, the Box Office will do their best to accommodate the request.

- Remember that all exchanges are based on availability and no upgrades are allowed on rain checks.

IF THE TICKETS ARE EXCHANGED FOR THE DATE ON WHICH THE MAKE-UP GAME HAS BEEN SCHEDULED AS PART OF A DOUBLEHEADER, ARE THE TICKETS GOOD FOR BOTH GAMES OR ONLY ONE OF THE GAMES?

- Tickets are good for both games on the date printed on the tickets.

WHAT ABOUT FANS WHO ARE ALREADY TICKETED FOR THE RESCHEDULED GAME?

- Tickets with the date of the doubleheader are valid for both games, and the fan will sit in that same seat for both games.

HOW ARE PROMOTIONS AND GIVEAWAYS HANDLED?

- If a promotional giveaway was originally scheduled on a date that has now been made part of a doubleheader, the giveaway will be handed out when the gates open for the first game.

CAN FANS GET REFUNDS INSTEAD OF RAIN CHECKS?

- As stated on the tickets, refunds are not issued.

- All fans should be directed to the Box Office for any additional questions.

Re-entry

To help ensure everyone's safety, Isotopes Park has a no re-entry policy. Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodation is up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and is limited to emergencies only.

Resale & Distribution of Tickets

Isotopes tickets are the property of the Albuquerque Isotopes and may not be sold or distributed. Attempted or actual resale or distribution of tickets at any price is prohibited. Isotopes management reserves the right to confiscate any tickets being sold or distributed.

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What is an Isotope:

Since the team's inception in 2003, the nickname "Isotopes" has become one of the most popular and unique monikers in all of baseball.

Webster's Dictionary and Nuclear Scientists define an Isotope as:

i•so•tope\ n : any of two or more species of atoms of a chemical element with the same atomic number and position in the periodic table and nearly identical chemical behavior but with differing atomic mass and different physical properties.

Homer Simpson and baseball fans, on the other hand, define "Isotopes" as the nickname of a fictional Minor League baseball team in the popular animated sitcom The Simpsons. In the 2001 Simpsons episode "Hungry, Hungry Homer," the Springfield Isotopes threatened to move to Albuquerque until Homer went on a hunger strike, ultimately preventing the team from moving.

The name Isotopes was chosen for its originality and popularity after it won a "Name the Team" contest, garnering 57% of over 120,000 votes. Other suggested names in the contest included Atoms, Dukes, Roadrunners, and 66ers. The extensive amount of nuclear research in the Albuquerque area provides another great link to the team name.





The distinctive "A" logo and the "Isotopes" wordmark incorporate both the nickname's scientific and fictional inspirations, creating a brand that is unique and fun. Both logos were originally conceived by Kevin Kierst, who at the time was working as the clubhouse manager for the Norfolk Tides and now serves as an Equipment Manager for the New York Mets. After the design's conception, both logos were then tweaked by local designer Vaughn Weeden to create the brand that has become a favorite throughout the Land of Enchantment and beyond.

Fans across the nation seem to agree, making Isotopes merchandise annually one of the top 10 sellers in Minor League Baseball since the team began in 2003.

The Pacific Coast League added the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers to the 10-team circuit in 1963, before the club changed their name to the Dallas Rangers in 1964. The franchise moved to Vancouver, British Columbia in 1965, playing as the Vancouver Mounties until 1969. Following the 1969 campaign, the Mounties relocated to Salt Lake City, Utah where they were known as the Bees (1970), Angels (1971-74) and the Gulls (1975-84). The franchise moved north of the border once again in 1985, emerging as the Calgary Cannons. The franchise played in Calgary for 18 years before relocating in 2003 to their current home in Albuquerque and became the Isotopes.

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MEET THE SKIPPER Pedro Lopez

Pedro Lopez, the eighth manager in franchise history, begins his second year at the helm for the lsotopes. It's his fourth year with the club and third different role with Albuquerque after serving as Albuquerque's hitting coach in 2021 and bench coach in 2022.

The Vega Baja, Puerto Rico, native is entering his 20th year as a Minor League manager and third at the Triple-A level (2017, Las Vegas) after stints in the Texas Rangers (2001-05, 2007) and New York Mets (2011-19) farm systems. Over his 20 seasons at the helm, Lopez has a 1,047-1,059 overall record and appeared in seven playoffs—including winning the Double-A Eastern League Championship in 2014 with the Binghamton Mets. He won his 1,000th game as a manager June 4, 2023, in a 7-1 victory over Salt Lake.

After retiring as a player following the 2000 season, Lopez began his coaching career as a bench coach for the Savannah Sand Gnats. However, he took over as interim manager in May and was later named the permanent manager on June 21. The only other non-managerial job Lopez held was hitting coach for the Bakersfield Blaze in 2006.

After managing the 2019 Single-A Columbia Fireflies, Lopez joined the Colorado Rockies organization and was slated to serve as the development supervisor for the Grand Junction Rockies prior to the cancellation of the 2020 season because of the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2021, he also changed roles. Prior to being named hitting coach, he was named development supervisor for High-A Spokane.

Lopez also has extensive experience coaching and managing in the Winter Leagues, as he has held a spot in the dugout since 2012. He has managed five seasons between the Roberto Clemente Pro Baseball League, Venezuelan League and Dominican League. During the 2017-18 season, Lopez was named Manager of the Year for the Gigantes del Cibao of the Dominican League. Over the last two seasons, he has served as the bench coach for the Estrellas Orientales, also of the Dominican League.

He also managed the 2011 Peoria Javelinas of the Arizona Fall League.

As a player, Lopez was drafted in the 21st round by San Diego in the 1988 MLB First-Year Player Draft out of Arizona Western College (Yuma, AZ). He played 13 Minor League seasons mainly as a catcher and a first baseman with the Padres, Milwaukee Brewers and Houston Astros, reaching Triple-A on four occasions. In 909 Minor League games, Lopez slashed .247/.317/.359.

Lopez is married to Gladys Rivera and has two twin daughters, Leslian Marie and Lainey Marie. The Lopez family resides in Toa Baja, Puerto Rico.

Micheral Ryen Banch Coerdh

Ryan begins his first season with the Rockies organization and will serve as the Isotopes' bench coach. This marks Ryan's second stop in Albuquerque after the former outfielder played in 33 games for the Isotopes during the 2008 season. Ryan, a 5th round draft pick by the Minnesota Twins in 1996, played in 149 MLB games over parts of five season with Twins (2002-05) and Angels (2010). After retiring in 2011, Ryan entered the coaching ranks in 2012 as a coach for the Double-A Altoona Curve (Pirates). He then managed in the Pirates and Cubs organization at three levels with stops at Single-A West Virginia (2013-14), High-A Bradenton (2015-16), Double-A Altoona (2017-19), High-A South Bend (2021) and Double-A Tennessee (2022-June 2023), while winning league titles in 2016 and 2017. Over his three years with Altoona Ryan compiled a 221-197 record-the most wins for a manager in Curve history.



Chrise Michalak Pitebing Coseb

Former left-handed pitcher Chris Michalak will serve as Albuquerque's pitching coach in 2024, his second season with the club. Michalak previously pitched for the Dukes (2000) and the Isotopes (2004 & 2008). He appeared in 61 MLB games over four seasons with Arizona (1998), Toronto (2001), Texas (2001-02) and Cincinnati (2006). Michalak's pro career spanned 17 seasons, and was a 12th round draft pick by Oakland in 1993. He finished the 2000 campaign leading the Dukes in wins (11). Michalak started the secondto-last game in Dukes history (6 IP, 2 R), Game 4 of a PCL First-Round playoff series at Memphis. Michalak retired after the 2009 season and has been coaching since. He served as the pitching coach for Hagerstown (2010-11), Potomac (2012-13) and Harrisburg (2014-17). He also was the Minor League pitching coordinator for Miami (2018-20) and coached in the Nationals organization from 2021-22.



Jordan Padheao

Eliting Coach

Jordan Pacheco, an Albuquerque native, will return for his third season as the Isotopes hitting coach. In 2023, he helped guide the club to a franchise-record 959 runs while finishing third among Triple-A teams in runs, hits (1,469) and total bases (2435), fifth in OPS (.830) and sixth in slugging (.464). During Pacheco's first campaign with Albuquerque, the Isotopes led all of Minor League Baseball in home runs (240) and was second in OPS (.836). The club also hit 14 grand slams in 2022, the most by any MiLB team ever and tied for the most slams in professional baseball history with the 2000 Oakland Athletics and 2006 Cleveland Indians. A 2004 graduate of La Cueva High School, Pacheco then attended the University of New Mexico, where he was one of the most prolific offensive players in school history. He compiled a .384 average with 59 doubles, eight triples, 25 home runs and 145 RBI over three seasons from 2005-07 and was named Mountain West Conference Player of the Year in 2007. Pacheco was drafted in the 9th round by the Rockies in 2007 and made his Major League debut with Colorado in 2011. His Major League career also included stints with the Arizona Diamondbacks (2014) and Cincinnati Reds (2015-16). Pacheco retired from playing in 2021 and spent the end of that season as an assistant coach with the Grand Junction Rockies (Pioneer League).

Rook, in his 6th year with the Rockies, began his tenure with Colorado in the same role with Short-Season Boise in 2019. He was then assigned to the same role for the Double-A Hartford Yard Goats for 2021 and 2022. A native of Greenville, TX, Rook earned a Bachelors degree from Texas A&M in 2017. He then went on to earn his Masters from the University of Denver in 2018.



Mex Schell Bullpen Gefeler

Max Schell enters his second season as Albuquerque's bullpen catcher and third within the Rockies organization. In 2022, he served as video coordinator for the ACL Rockies. He also worked as a bullpen catcher for the 2019 Lehigh Valley Ironpigs, Phillies affilaite, and 2018 Myrtle Peach Pelicans, Cubs affiliate. Schell earned a bachelor's degree in Sports Administration from Southern Illinois Carbondale.

ISOTOPES HILL 2003-2022

Known by many names, Isotopes Hill in center field was one of the most unique features in professional baseball. During construction in 2002, longtime minor league baseball executive Dave Rosenfield suggested to Isotopes owner Ken Young the new ballpark should have a signature element. The Hill featured a 4.5-foot incline and a length of 126 feet. Some outfielders showcased their athleticism with memorable circus catches. Others were helpless victims, literally falling in pursuit of a long flyball. After 19 seasons, however, Major League Baseball told the Isotopes to remove The Hill for player safety. Albuquerque won its final game with Isotopes Hill, a 4-3 victory over El Paso on Sept. 28, 2022. Whether you called it Topes Slope, Hoffman's Hill, Bernard's Berm, or simply The Hill, it was the last professional ballpark to feature an uphill slope on the playing field.



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2023 YEAR IN REVIEW

The Albuquerque Isotopes completed their 20th season of play last September, a campaign that saw several historical achievements.

For the first time ever, RGCU Field at Isotopes Park welcomed the highest cumulative total of fans in the Pacific Coast League, as 521,521 customers walked through the turnstiles in 2023. The cumulative attendance was also fifth-most in all of Minor League Baseball, the highest Albuquerque has finished in 20 seasons. Additionally, the Isotopes paced the PCL in average attendance for the second consecutive year with 7,048 per contest. Albuquerque welcomed a five-figure crowd for eight of their 74 home dates while tallying two of the top five crowds in MiLB for the campaign. For Cinco De Mayo Fiesta at "The Plaza," the club saw 15,817 fans attend while 14,591 were on hand for Lowrider Night and a bobblehead giveaway July 1. The club also welcomed it's 11th millionth fan through the Isotopes Park gates Sept. 23.

On the field, the Isotopes remained in the race for a second-half title and playoff berth until the final series of 2023. First-year manager Pedro Lopez and his coaching staff kept the team in contention despite accumulating a franchise record 278 roster moves with 80 different players appearing in at least one game, shattering the previous standard of 224 transactions in the 2018 season.

Overall, Albuquerque spent 20 total days either in sole possession of first place or tied for the top mark, their most since 2013 (37). Their longest win streak was seven games (Aug. 19-27) while they dropped a season-worst eight straight from Aug. 5-13, which took them from tied for first place to sixth, 5.0 off the pace in the second half ledger. The club also registered six winning streaks of three or more, including twice in the final 12 contests (Sept. 12-14 at El Paso, Sept. 22-24 vs. Oklahoma City).

The Isotopes notched nine series victories on the year, their most since 2019 (11) when sets primarily consisted of three or four contests. Seven series triumphs came in the second half—including winning five of six games at both Oklahoma City (Aug. 22-27) and El Paso (Sept. 12-17). Albuquerque also set a club record for most wins in a season against one team, as they were 18-6 facing off with the El Paso Chihuahuas. Their second-most triumphs over one club came via 14-10 mark versus eventual PCL champion Oklahoma City.

Albuquerque finished 32-43 on the road, their most victories away from Isotopes Park since 2016 (34). From Aug. 22-Sept. 17, they won 13 of their last 18 away contests, including a five-game triumphant streak Aug. 22-26 at Oklahoma City.

In his 19th season as a Minor League skipper, Lopez notched his 1,000th managerial win on June 4 at Salt Lake. He was presented with a ceremonial base before Albuquerque's first home game following the milestone.

The Isotopes saw 29 players recalled throughout the season, with nine making their Major League debut (Brenton Doyle, Karl Kauffmann, Blair Calvo, Coco Montes, Riley Pint, Connor Kaiser, Evan Justice, Hunter Goodman and Victor Vodnik).

The lsotopes offense was once again one of the best in the PCL, slashing .280/.366/.464 with 192 homers, 286 doubles and 1,469 hits. Albuquerque also swiped 173 bases—the second-most in franchise history with 132 of those stolen bases coming in the second half, which paced the circuit. The lsotopes established another team-record when they swiped a bag in 10-straight contests (Sept. 8-19). Additionally, the club scored 959 runs, the most in team history.

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2023 YEAR IN REVIEW

On July 30, Albuquerque and Sacramento engaged in one of the most scintillating battles in RGCU Field's history. An 11-run River Cats fifth— the most runs allowed in an inning by the Isotopes—gave Sacramento a commanding lead, which turned into a 16-11 advantage heading to the bottom of the ninth. Albuquerque, however, erupted for six runs to pull out a 17-16 victory, highlighted by a two-run single from Cole Tucker and gameending knock by Jimmy Herron.

There was also much local flair at Rio Grande Credit Union Field in 2023 from visiting PCL clubs. Chase Silseth, Mitch Garver (pictured above), Quincy Hamilton, Luis Gonzalez and Ken Giles each played against the Isotopes in the Duke City, all of whom are either Albuquerque or New Mexico natives, or played collegiately at the University of New Mexico.

The Isotopes also saw their second-straight Albuquerque Pro Baseball Hall of Fame ceremony as John Ely, a dominant right-hander pitcher with the Isotopes from 2010-12, and Gary Herron, longtime official scorekeeper and New Mexico baseball historian, were inducted July 15.

Coco Montes was voted Most Valuable Player and Power Hitter of the Year by his teammates, only the fourth Isotope to win both awards and first since Jerry Sands in 2012. The infielder paced Albuquerque with 46 multi-hit contests and recorded a pair of doubledigit hitting streaks over the final month of the season. Montes also had four separate three-hit games (April 9 vs. Salt Lake, July 25 vs. Sacramento, September 9 vs. Reno). He finished third in the PCL among qualifiers in average (.317) and OPS (.950), fourth in slugging (.550) and runs (96), seventh in hits (138) and total bases (240), tied for seventh in RBI (89) and eighth in OBP (.400). Montes also made his Major League debut June 11 vs. San Diego, collecting two knocks including a game-tying two-run homer in the eighth.

Jimmy Herron produced a breakout year, establishing career standards in hits (135), runs (106), doubles (27), RBI (83), walks (69), stolen bases (33) and homers (19). Herron's 106 runs are tied for the second-most in a campaign in Isotopes history, while he drew 69 walks, third-most on the all-time single-season ledger. He reached base in 102 of 119 games started. Herron's steal total ranks tied for third-most in a year for the Isotopes, and fifth-best in the PCL. Additionally, he finished second in the PCL in runs, fifth in stolen bases, seventh in OPS (.893), eighth in hits and tenth in slugging (.498), average and OBP (.395).

Bernard rejoined the Rockies organization and was assigned to Albuquerque June 30. He appeared in 66 games (63 starts) and produced 32 multi-hit contests. Despite playing not even half a full season with the Isotopes, he stole 26 bases in 30 attempts.

Bernard's 32 game on-base streak from July 21-Sept. 1 was the longest for any Albuquerque player. He has tallied 79 steals as an Isotope across three campaigns (2021-23), three away from breaking Dee Gordon's career mark of 81 in that category.

Aaron Schunk began his Isotopes career with a nine-game hitting streak, and reached base in 15 straight to begin the season. Schunk's 39 multi-hit contests were second on the team behind Montes. He homered in his Triple-A debut March 31 at Round Rock and launched a pair of grand slams (May 3 vs. Sugar Land, May 21 vs. Tacoma). On two instances, Schunk produced a pair of back-to-back three-hit contests (May 3-4 vs. Sugar Land, May 30-31 at Salt Lake).

Each year, Albuquerque Isotopes players vote on team awards based on performance on the field while fans also vote for their favorite Isotope and Director of Community Relations, Michelle Montoya, chooses the Community Award. The 2023 award winners are as follows.

Infielder Coco Montes was chosen by his teammates as the club's Most Valuable Player after slashing .318/.402/.555 with 22 homers, 26 doubles, five triples, 59 walks and 89 RBI in 106 games. He was named the Pacific Coast League Player of the Week for April 10-16, his second career Player of the Week laurel. Montes also made his Major League debut with the Colorado Rockies on June 11 at Coors Field in a game against the San Diego Padres. He went 2-for-3 with a homer and two RBI while playing second base. As of today, Montes is third in the PCL in OPS (.957) and average (.318), fourth in slugging (.555), tied for fourth in runs (95), sixth in total bases (239), tied for sixth in RBI (89), seventh in hits (137) and tenth in extra-base hits (53).

Montes was also voted as the Power Hitter of the Year. He is the fourth Isotope to garner both MVP and Power Hitter of the Year honors (also: Jerry Sands, 2012; Mitch Jones, 2009; and Dallas McPherson, 2008). He leads the club with 22 homers, which is tied for ninth most in the PCL. This award is voted on by his teammates.

Pitcher of the Year honors went to Tommy Doyle. The right-hander has tallied a 3.50 ERA (36.0 IP, 14 ER) with seven saves in nine chances, a 1.25 WHIP and 41:17 K:BB ratio. His seven saves are tied for the ninth-most in the PCL. He also leads the team in ERA (min. 30 IP). This award is voted on by his teammates.

Hunter Stovall showed his defensive prowess by playing all over the diamond, earning him Defensive Player of the Year honors as voted on by his teammates. He registered 51 games at second, 21 at third base, 11 at shortstop and 14 in left field. Stovall committed just one error at shortstop while tallying a .982 fielding percentage at second.

Outfielder Jimmy Herron was selected as the Mr. Hustle award winner. The Duke University product is having a breakout season, slashing .299/.398/.502 while setting career standards in hits (135), doubles, (27), RBI (83), homers (19) and steals (33). His 106 runs scored are currently tied for second on the Isotopes franchise ledger with his 33 steals ranking tied for third. In the PCL, he is tied for first in runs (106), fifth in stolen bases (33), tied for seventh in OPS (.900), eighth in hits (135), ninth in average (.299), slugging (.502) and total bases (227), tied for tenth in doubles (27). This award is voted on by his teammates.

Catcher/first baseman Jonathan Morales was chosen as the Fan Favorite, as voted on by the fans. Morales compiled a .258/.317/.429 slash line while mashing 17 doubles, 61 RBI and a career-high 14 homers. He also registered the 10th cycle in Isotopes history on July 2 vs. El Paso while driving in a career-high seven RBI.

Outfielder Trevor Boone was honored as the Jennifer Riordan Most-Community Minded Person. This award is chosen by Isotopes Director of Community Relations Michelle Montoya.





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MINOR LEAGUE BASEBALL 101

Are there are new rules for the 2023 season?

Yes. The big rule change is the ban on shifts. Each defensive club must have two infielders on either side of the second base bag with two feet touching the dirt. Once the pitch is thrown infielders can move freely. Additionally, the Automated Ball-Strike System (ABS) will return along with the ABS Challenge System in select PCL parks.

How many different Minor League teams and leagues are there?

Minor League Baseball is comprised of 120 teams situated in 11 different leagues. These leagues are divided by classifications: Triple-A, Double-A, High-A and Single-A. The Isotopes play at the highest Minor League Level, Triple-A, and are part of the Pacific Coast League. There are also the Florida and Arizona Complex Leagues held at each organizations spring training complex.

Are the Albuquerque Isotopes owned by the Colorado Rockies?


No. Although once a commonplace, today only a handful of Major League teams own any of their affiliates. The Isotopes are privately owned by a group of investors led by team President Ken Young.

How do the lsotopes get their players?

The Isotopes do not scout, sign, release, or trade players. Since the Isotopes have a Player Development License with the Colorado Rockies, all players are under contract with the Rockies organization. All player moves are dictated by the Rockies.

Are some Isotopes on the Rockies' Major League Roster?

Yes. The Rockies can have up to 40 players signed to a Major League contract. From the start of the season through August 31 they can only have 26 players on their active roster. The other players are optioned to their Minor League affiliates, subject to recall. If a MLB player is placed on the Injured List, the Rockies may recall one of their 40-man roster members playing in the Minors. After September 1, teams may carry 28 players.

MINOR LEAGUE BASEBALL 101

Are there limits to the number of times a player can be optioned?

ROTOPER

Yes. A Major League club can option a player to the Minors for no more than three seasons. after which the club must place the player on waivers in order to "outright" him to the Minors. For example: If Joe Smith has been on the Rockies' 40-man roster but has been sent to the Minors in each of the last three years, the Rockies cannot keep him on the 40-man roster and send him back to the Minors a fourth season. They must keep him on the 26man active roster or "outright" him to the Minors, which takes him off of the club's 40-man roster and makes him available for all other Major League organizations to claim off of waivers. If he is not claimed, or "clears" waivers after two business days, Joe Smith can elect to stay with the Rockies or become a free agent. Additionally, players can only be optioned to the Minors five times in one season (excluding 27th man and COVID call-ups).

If some of the Isotopes are on the Major League (or 40-man) roster, what kind of contracts do the other players have?

They are signed to a Minor League contract and are not subject to being recalled. This does not mean that the player cannot be promoted to the Major League club, but to do so, the Big League team must purchase his contract from the Minor League team and assign him to the 40-man roster. (The phrase "purchase contract" comes from an older era when Minor League teams actually owned contracts of their players and Major League clubs would have to buy them out of their contracts.) If the Major League club's 40-man roster is full, the team must make room by either releasing a player or placing a player on the 60-day Injured List.

SEVENTY FIVE YEARS LATER ROBINSON REMAINS MOST VALUABLE

On Nov. 18, 1949, neighborhood children gathered at the Robinson home in Queens to celebrate Jackie Robinson Jr.'s third birthday. For Jackie Sr., the party highlighted an offseason full of commitments: Teaching athletics at the Harlem YMCA, selling appliances, co-hosting a sports radio show and appearing in a movie about his life – where he played himself – to name a few.

But the Robinsons had more than one reason to celebrate, as Jackie Sr. had just been named the National League's Most Valuable Player. The 1949 NL batting champion, whose league-leading 37 stolen bases complemented a .342 clip, had earned 12 of 24 first-place votes to beat out the Cardinals' Stan Musial and Enos Slaughter.

"This award comes as a great surprise," Rachel Robinson, pregnant with their second child, Sharon, told New York Daily News, "but we had this party planned for little Jackie for a long time, so we'll just have to do our celebrating as a secondary feature of the birthday party."

As 1978 BBWAA Career Excellence Award winner Dick Young of the Daily News put it: "The National League's best pitchers couldn't keep Jackie Robinson off base, the best catchers couldn't keep him from running wild and the best batters couldn't catch him for the hitting title... but a threeyear-old finally managed to overshadow the Dodgers' star second sacker."

Robinson dazzled throughout his MVP campaign and Opening Day was no exception. Ebbets Field hosted 34,530 — a home opener record at the Brooklyn park — on April 19 as the Dodgers faced the Giants. Hitting cleanup, Robinson went 3-for-5 with a home run.

An early slump had Robinson hitting .188 at the end of April, but his uncharacteristic struggles wouldn't last — three weeks later, the second baseman was back up to .298 and about to post one of the best performances of his career. The May 21 game at St. Louis' Sportsman's Park offered an early look at the MVP race. Musial singled and scored a run. Slaughter went 2-for-4 with a double and two RBI. But Robinson shined brightest, going 3-for-5 with a stolen base, two doubles, three runs and a career-high six RBI, aiding an eight-run ninth inning in Brooklyn's 15-6 win.

"Pee Wee's homer was the big blow, but the performance of the afternoon was turned in by Jackie Robinson," Young wrote in the Daily News. "There's a name that belongs right up on top, in capital letters, when nominations for this year's All-Star game open.

"Robby was a hitting, fielding and running fool throughout the scrap — doing most of his magnificent work when every marker meant something. He batted in six runs, saved two more that would have put the Red Birds ahead in the sixth, and set up another with his ever-daring legwork."

Robinson was at it again three days later, leading Brooklyn to a 6-1 win over Pittsburgh with his first of eight career multi-home run games. He recorded multiple hits in 18 of 28 games in May and was hitting .360 with a 1.014 OPS by month's end, making a strong case for an All-Star selection.

The Midsummer Classic took place at Ebbets Field on July 12, and the 16th edition was unlike any other. Robinson, teammates Don Newcombe and Roy Campanella and Cleveland's Larry Doby became the first Black All-Stars in AL/NL history.

"While it was by no means the best contest of the star-studded competition, it will be remembered as a record breaker," wrote the Chicago Tribune.

The NL committed five errors in a 11-7 loss, but Robinson, making his first of six consecutive All-Star appearances, doubled and scored three runs. Newcombe and Campanella saw action, as did fellow Dodgers Pee Wee Reese, Gil Hodges, Ralph Branca and Preacher Roe.

While Robinson, at .364, led Slaughter (.328) and Musial (.301) at the end of July, his Dodgers trailed their Cardinals by a game and a half — a 15-12 July marked the worst full month of the season for Brooklyn. Remarkably, the clubs matched 20-11 records in August while Robinson's average dipped slightly to .350.

"A guy my age gets tired during the late part of a season," Robinson would later tell the Daily News. "When games were decided one way or another in the late innings, I wished I could be taken out. My legs felt tired, and the bat felt awfully heavy. I just couldn't swing right."

Robinson, 30 years into a life of peerless athletic achievements, may have felt such late-season fatigue but he hardly showed it, hitting .304 over the final 29 games with eight steals, nine extra-base hits and 25 walks. But like the batting race, the fight for the NL pennant came down to the wire. Brooklyn and St. Louis split a Sept. 21 doubleheader, leaving the Dodgers still a game-and-a-half behind the Redbirds.

As he had in May, Robinson took charge the next day and led Brooklyn to a series victory. A 19-6 thumping saw him go 2-for-5 with two walks, two RBI and four runs, helping his Dodgers pull within half a game of the NL lead.

"The Redbirds today licked their wounds and Brooklyn's battling Dodgers defiantly beat their chests," wrote the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. "The horrible 19-6 rout last night at Sportsman's Park before another standing-room-only crowd of 30,765 was the result of a ball game between a club that had to win or else and a team that could wait another day."

But St. Louis went 3-4 in their remaining games. Brooklyn, meanwhile, won four of six and secured the pennant on Oct. 2 — the season's final day — with a 10-inning victory over the Phillies. Unsurprisingly, Robinson was at the center of the clincher, reaching base three times and stealing a pair of bags while locking in his batting title. He finished with 203 hits, a .432 on-base percentage and 124 RBI.

The Dodgers returned from Philadelphia to a Penn Station overflowing with fans — the Daily News' headline read: "Welcome for Dodgers Clogs Station for Hour." A reporter on the train platform informed Robinson he was the NL batting champion. "That's fine," Robinson responded. "But I'm a lot happier about winning the game today!"

Robinson and the Dodgers suffered a disappointing five-game World Series loss to the Yankees. Still, the individual and team accomplishments made 1949 a historic year for Brooklyn's second baseman.

"It was quite a thrill to get the news," Robinson said upon being named MVP on Nov. 18. "In fact, it was my second biggest of the year. The first was the day we clinched the pennant."

"For Robinson, 30-year-old former U.C.L.A. football star and an army captain in the service, the most valuable player award came as a high point in one of the most highly publicized careers in baseball history," wrote the United Press. "One of the most fiery competitors in the game today, Robinson played in every one of the Dodgers' 156 games despite the fact that he was hampered at several periods of the season by arm and leg ailments."

While the on-field results indicated otherwise, Robinson felt the physical and mental toll of his big league career and was contemplating retiring. He grew tired of the travel throughout a 154-game season and was eager to spend more time with his family. "The strain of the last three or four years have done something to me," he told the Daily News. "Not that I have anything to worry about, but I'm jumpy and nervous all the time."

One thing was certain: Robinson refused to play for any team besides the Dodgers. "If I was sold, even this year, I'd quit," he said. "My home is here. I've made friends here. I'm not going to give all that up."

Luckily for fans and admirers nationwide, the superstar second baseman at the peak of his game wasn't quite done with baseball. Robinson would play seven more seasons and receive MVP votes in five of them. He hit .311 from 1950-56, accumulating an additional 97 home runs, 109 steals, 166 doubles and 477 RBI while earning a salary of over \$30,000 each year.

"Baseball has been mighty good to me," Robinson said after being named MVP. "And don't think I'm not grateful. I didn't have a thing before I got into this game. Neither did my wife. Now we've got this home, and we're putting money away for little Jackie's education."

On Dec. 13, 1956 – after 10 seasons where he changed the game on and off the field – the Dodgers traded Robinson to the Giants. True to his word, Robinson retired a few hours later.
