It was announced January 27, 2020, that Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania native and Central Columbia High School graduate Doug Davis will manage the RailRiders for the 2021 season. He is the 13th manager in SWB franchise history, and just the fifth in Yankees-era history (2007-Present). He joins Dave Miley (2007-15), Al Pedrique (16-17), Bobby Mitchell (2018) and Jay Bell (2019) as SWB skippers to serve under the Yankees affiliation.

Davis enjoyed an 11-year professional career, which included spending parts of two years in Major League Baseball. He spent three seasons coaching with the RailRiders under three different managers, serving as the Defensive Coach in 2017 under Pedrique, the Bullpen Coach in 2018 under Mitchell and the Bench Coach in 2019 under Bell.

Davis, 58, has been in coaching since 1995, serving as a minor league manager for eight seasons. As a manager, he owns a career 515-484 record including championships with Pittsfield in the NY-Penn League in 1997 and Capital City (Columbia, SC) in the South Atlantic League in 1998. From 2007-2016 he was on staff in the Toronto Blue Jays system and before that he spent two seasons in the big leagues as the Florida Marlins bench coach from 2003-04, winning the World Series against the Yankees in 2003 with former SWB Pitching Coach Tommy Phelps on the roster.

In between coaching stints, Davis served as the Minor League Field Coordinator for the Montreal Expos (2001), Florida Marlins (2002, 2005), and Toronto Blue Jays (2009-2016).



Selected in the ninth round of the 1984 MLB Draft out of

NC State, the former catcher played professionally for 11 seasons between 1984 and 1994 in the minor league systems of California, Kansas City and Texas. He made it to the big leagues on two separate occasions, scoring one run in six games with the Angels in 1988 and he collected a hit in his only MLB at-bat with the Rangers in 1992.

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HISTORIC EFFORT: BOYLE TOSSES NO-HITTER IN FIRST TRIPLE-A START

Right-hander Sean Boyle pitched a seven-inning no-hitter in game two of a doubleheade on August 19 at Worcester; his first start with the RailRiders.

Sean Boyle said that he was "definitely a little surprised" when Hudson Valley Renegades manager Dan Fiorito told him that he was getting promoted from High-A all the way to Triple-A to join the Scranton/Wilkes-Barre RailRiders. But it was a challenge he was ready for.

Growing up on Long Island, Boyle didn't play organized baseball until he was in ninth grade. That year he tried out for his high school's baseball team and was cut on just the third day of tryouts. He feels like that was the best thing that could have happened.

"That was exactly what I needed, you know, because I wanted to play and I'm competitive," Boyle said. "So I took that as that's the fuel that sparked this fire and, or to keep the fire going." He made the team the next year and continued to work so hard on refining his game that after two years at Suffolk County Community College he received an offer to play Division I baseball at perennial power Dallas Baptist University. In 2018, the Yankees made Boyle their selection in the 25th round of the June Amateur Draft.

Boyle started this year with Low-A Tampa before quickly earning a promotion to Hudson Valley. A rash of injuries across the Yankees system necessitated his emergency call-up in early August, and he showed he belonged.

Across two relief appearances, the right-hander allowed only one run in 8.1 innings of work.



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With the RailRiders playing a doubleheader at Worcester on Thursday, August 19, Boyle was tabbed to make his first Triple-A start in the second game.

No one knew to expect what came next. Boyle had never thrown more than 4.1 innings or 66 pitches in a professional outing, and this would be just his seventh career start. The RailRiders gave him a 2-0 lead in the top of the first, then he got to work.

Boyle issued a two-out walk to Worcester's Franchy Cordero in the first inning, then retired the next 14 batters he faced. He hit Jeremy Rivera with a pitch with one out in the sixth, but entered the seventh and final inning of the game with a no-hitter intact. However, he had to face the 3-4-5 batters in the Red Sox lineup.

He struck out Cordero for the first out. Then 2018 International League MVP Joey Meneses hit a ground ball up the middle that shortstop Kyle Holder made a play on for the second out. Finally, Connor Wong lifted a soft fly ball to right field that settled in Socrates Brito's glove for the third out. Ninety-five pitches and a complete-game no-hitter.

"In the bullpen, things were not going my way," Boyle said after the game. "But I mean, at the end of the day, you just got to go up the zone and, you know, go out there with whatever stuff you got. And that's zero staring me down pretty early. But I mean, what? I got nothing to lose, you know, having fun up here. So it was cool to finish that one off."

It was the second no-hitter thrown by the RailRiders this season, with Luis Gil, Reggie McClain

and Stephen Ridings combining for a nine-inning no-no against the Rochester Red Wings at PNC Field on July 21.

"You talk about guys that walk in, and he walked around like he had been there. And it was just impressive to see him go about his day," said Yankees Director of Pitch Development Desi Druschel, who has been with the RailRiders as the interim pitching coach for the past few weeks. "You'd never know that he was making his Triple-A debut. It's just kind of business as usual."

It was the kind of day that Boyle will never forget. He was named Triple-A East Pitcher of the Week for the outing, but unfortunately was sent down to Double-A Somerset shortly afterward. While that move is necessitated by the major league Yankees getting healthier, it's clear that it won't be long before we see Boyle back in Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on a more permanent basis.

"It's incredible. I mean, I know my role I came up here to help the team out, you know," Boyle said. "To come up here and get that opportunity, but then to do well feels even better."




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ALL ABOARD: TREY TRAIN MAKES FIRST STOP IN NEW YORK

Outfielder Trey Amburgey blossomed in 2021, helping RailRiders to impressive start and earning his first big-league call to New York.

Not everyone has their own hype man, but somehow Amburgey landed Kratz banging the drum.

While Kratz was tweeting, Amburgey was providing the reason. In early May, the RailRiders outfielder hit .455 with three home runs and 12 runs batted in over six games before a groin strain sent him to the Injured List. He returned on May 29 and picked up where he left off.

He hit safely in each of his first 18 games of the season. It was actually a 20 game hitting streak dating back to the final two games in 2019. Amburgey also reached safely in the final eight games of that summer.

"20 game hit streak for Trey Amburgey. Great guy and great player." - June 14

The hitting streak came to an end, but the on-base streak kept rolling. On June 24, Amburgey matched Brandon Drury's 2018 franchise record on-base streak at 32 straight.

"I didn't worry about the on-base streak, but I knew what was going on, especially after my hitting streak ended," Amburgey said. "I got to thinking back to the end of 2019. I kept thinking I got on base a few times without a hit and I looked back and saw that I did. Might as well keep this going now."

On June 26, Kratz resorted to reverse psychology.

"Don't call Trey Amburgey up."

The on-base streak continued into July, eventually ending in game two of a doubleheader against Syracuse, reaching 42 consecutive games when it was finally snapped.

"Any record is a good record," Amburgey stated, "especially one like that. I got the ball after I set the record and it's still in my locker to this day."

In mid-July with Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on the road in Worcester, the rumblings of Amburgey getting a big-league call grew louder and New York finally heeded the call.

"We had the doubleheader in Worcester (July 15) and I played the first game," Amburgey said. "I hadn't been playing both games of a doubleheader and I didn't play in game two. I took it

like any normal day. I sat in the dugout, watched the team. We got back into the clubhouse after the second game. It had been pouring the last three innings. Doug [Davis] was like 'Hey. Thanks for grinding that out. Let's get them tomorrow and Trey Amburgey... you are going to the big leagues.' Just like that. So everyone was quiet and listening and then just exploded. I just sat there a little stunned and everyone came over to congratulate me."

"It was the loudest I have ever heard a clubhouse erupt with cheers and laughter and clapping, " said RailRiders Manager Doug Davis. I think he was overwhelmed by it. That kind of thing never gets old because it is so important from a team standpoint... from an organizational standpoint. Everyone is pulling for a player like Trey."

Amburgey was thrilled to have the support of the team but didn't forget the guy conducting his hype train.

"It was awesome," Amburgey said. "He was one of the first people I reached out to when I got called up. I thanked him for everything. The Trey Train... that was fun. I don't know if it will keep going, but it was fun to be a part of that and see all the tweets. Gave me a good laugh every day."

"He deserved the opportunity," Davis explained. "He has put together a terrific year. He put together a great year in 2019. He is a run producer. He has power. He plays well defensively. He has every attribute you are looking for

and he was just waiting for that opportunity and that chance. He has been waiting for it... but we have all been waiting too. And we got that first chance to see him put on a New York Yankee uniform."

On July 16, Trey Amburgey made his Major League debut for the New York Yankees, batting eighth and playing right field.

"The first thing I thought when I put the Yankees jersey on was that it feels different, Amburgey said. "It's something different, especially since I was in the Bronx playing the Red Sox. It doesn't get any better than that. It's a different feeling. We put on the pinstripes in Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, but to put on the actual New York Yankees pinstripes is a blessing."

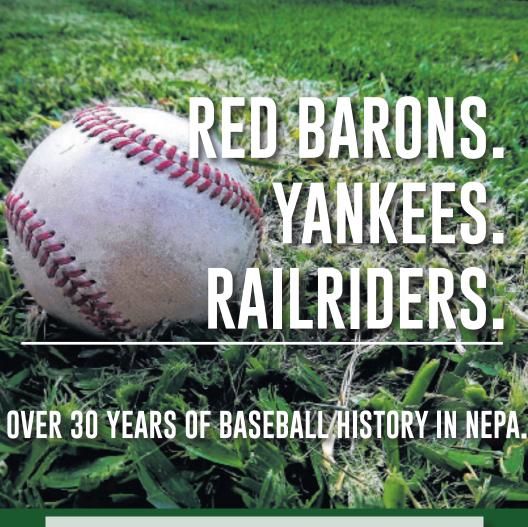
Amburgey went hitless in his first game and tweaked his hamstring a few days later in his second game, forcing him out of the lineup and onto the injured list.

"Obviously, I go up and it's the COVID cancelation game, then a rain delay Saturday and I got hurt on Sunday. It wasn't the storybook call-up, but to get the validation that I belong there meant a lot. Now it's about getting back and staying."

And no one has any doubt that Amburgey will accomplish that goal.

"Trey is as good as it gets when it comes to perfecting his craft," said RailRiders Hitting Coach Casey Dykes. "He has put a lot of time and work in over the last few weeks to get back to where he was at the beginning of the year."

Perhaps the conductor should blow the whistle and alert the world that the Trey Train is boarding once again and ready to leave the station. Next stop... a return to New York.



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Q&A WITH YANKEES DIRECTOR OF PITCHING SAM BRIEND

Yankees Director of Pitching was in Scranton/Wilkes-Barre during the last homestand to check in on some players and Joe Vasile caught up with him for a few moments.

After spending three years as the director of player development at the renowned Driveline Baseball in Seattle, Washington, Sam Briend is in his second year as the Yankees Director of Pitching. He spent most of 2020 working with pitchers at the Yankees Alternate Training Site, and this year has traveled around to different levels of the organization to work with pitchers and coaches up and down the system. Briend was recently working with the RailRiders, and the GuideRail caught up with him for a chat.

GuideRail: Recently we've seen Luis Gil go up to the majors and pitch really well for the Yankees. It feels like he is one of many guys who have taken huge steps forward since 2019. What's the biggest difference in him that has allowed him to have this breakout season?



Sam Briend: Yeah, I mean, people forget Luis Gil is kind of still a young kid. And I think the alternate site last year was huge for him, we were able to do a lot just in terms of refining [the slider and changeup] for him, really kind of cleaning up some stuff to improve his command. And it's a lot of maturity. As he gets a little bit older, as he understands who he is, as both a pitcher as a person what it takes from a routine standpoint, what it means to actually be a professional pitcher. And Luis has been awesome, he has a great makeup and is a hard worker. And he's dominated a lot of those things. We've constantly kind of raised the bar at each step to make sure like that we were challenging [him], and we believe failure is a positive thing in this organization. We want

to give you enough that you might have some struggles and then you bounce back and you continue to grow. You learn more from those instances versus always having success. Anytime you challenge Luis at all, he always rises to those challenges. I think that's been the biggest growth from him just from the maturity standpoint and then being able to refine his secondary pitches and get them in the zone a little more.

GR: When you talk about struggles, Deivi Garcia comes to mind as someone who has had some this year. What are some of those challenges he's faced and where do you see him being at right now?

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Briend: Yeah, his numbers have really been trending up. This last stretch here, you can start to see a lot of the underlying stuff and still like the numbers are not where we would like them to be, and they're not where he would like them to be. But you're really starting to see that development kind of come back. And like we just talked about with Luis Gil like, he's a really young kid people forget he's 22 years old, right? And it's the first time he's ever really had to face that adversity because he tore through the minors. Being so young and being in this



position, it's one of those things that we think about in the long term from him. From that standpoint, from a maturity standpoint from a growth standpoint, he's just going to continue to rise and develop. And I think it's good to have these adversities, understand who you are as a pitcher, understand what makes you successful. When you get put in those positions, how do I get the train back on track? And that's where we are right now. And I think we're gonna see that kind of continue to happen here over the last few weeks of the season, as he's been making these adjustments that have started to get him some of those underlying results. And then I think in the end, it'll start to give him those prettier era numbers, batting average numbers and whatnot, as he as he wraps up.

GR: The RailRiders bullpen has been a real strength this season, and Braden Bristo has been one of its most consistent members. What is it about him that really sticks out to you and the Yankees?

Briend: I mean, the first thing you got to start with is he's incredibly intelligent. Like, obviously, we're an organization that believes in a lot of information and providing that to players. And Bristo is one of those guys who really understands it and understands what he's trying to do. On top of that, you actually get into how skilled he is as a player -- extremely athletic, really able to make adjustments and kind of fine-tune his stuff. That's what it was this year, it's about providing that constant feedback of what direction we're trying to go and what we need to do to drive results. He's been awesome. He easily makes those adjustments and has continued to evolve his game throughout the year.

GR: We've talked to a lot of pitchers this year, you talk about all the information, especially guys who have been in other organizations, universally they say the Yankees have so much more information, it feels like that they're getting some much more input on their game. What are some of the important things that you're looking for? I know spin rates are a big thing these days? But what are some of the other things that as an organization, the Yankees are looking to see out of guys to try to gauge performance outside of just the traditional era, and those kinds of numbers that fans are familiar with?

Briend: Yeah, I mean, it all comes down to results at the plate for sure. And it's really individual, like I think a lot of times you look at the spin rate, or you look at the movement and all these different things, and you get carried away chasing things. And we're all we're

after is what is that individual strength? What makes him successful? And then how can we support that as much as possible? How can we make that strength even stronger, or what are the secondary pieces that augment that strength? And then how do we evolve those to help that play up or protect that in certain instances. So it's really about finding out who the player is and is as an individual, and then bolstering that from there.

GR: A couple of guys who we haven't seen with the RailRiders yet that it made a lot of noise around the organization this year, Ken Waldichuk down with Hudson Valley and Somerset, and also Hayden Wesneski is having a really good year, too. What have you seen those two and what that's fueled their fast rise all the way up to Double-A?

Briend: Yeah, I think we have a lot of guys kind of in that boat. Hayden and Waldie are two obvious ones, though, were the remote training stuff. We did a lot of work with our players in 2020, despite not having them at the complex. Those guys really ran with that you've seen velocities kind of increased there, you've seen stuff increase there. And so Hayden and Waldie again, it's finding ways to challenge them. While Ken out-stuffed his way through High-A, completely just dominated his competition, but he wasn't in the zone as much as we would like. So that promotion through Double-A and now as you watch he's in the strike zone more, he's throwing more first-pitch strikes, and you're continuing to see their growth. I mean [RailRiders reliever] Ron Marinaccio was in a similar boat to Waldie and Wesneski. He's up five miles an hour [on the fastball] on average, and then a secondary addition of a slider. Now he always had one of our organization's best change-ups, and you're watching him just aggressive in the zone. And there are still some of those learning curves. How do you sequence pitches? How do you best use now that you have a completely different repertoire? Same for Waldie and Wes. They've added a lot of velocity. Waldie has been up to 98, and some of our remote stuff less has been up to 99. Their averages are around 90 to 94 most of the time, but then they've got that plus velo. So it's really been about learning who they are as a pitcher now and being able to harness that and then figure out how to sequence the stuff now that it's completely different than what they had in 2019.

GR: On that note, Stephen Ridings another guy who, was substitute teaching six months ago, but now throwing 101 up in the big leagues. How was the process of getting him from where he was pitching in the Pioneer League two years ago to now being a big league contributor?

Briend: Again, it's basically just our philosophy to find out who the individual is, and granted Ridings is a little bit separate story he did a lot of work outside at [Yankees Director of Player Health and Performance Eric] Cressey's and that, but it's basically understand who the individual is understand how they move, understand what their strengths are, and then how can we build on that foundation? What aspects of development do we need to address? And then if we can just address the lowest hanging fruit and then continue to build from there and then you start peeling back those layers of the onion, and you can develop players better because you're attacking their needs versus trying to fit guys into a cookie-cutter mold, which you're not going to have success with everybody. And the goal is to get as many guys as possible to become big leaguers. So you have to find the individual and I think that's our separating characteristic.

WHAT'S NEXT: SWB ANNOUNCES 2022 REGULAR SEASON SCHEDULE

2022 season opens April 5 on the road and is slated for 144 games with an even home and road split running through September 21.

The Scranton/Wilkes-Barre RailRiders, Triple-A affiliate of the New York Yankees, are pleased to announce their schedule for the 2022 season. The RailRiders will open their season on April 5 on the road and conclude a 144-game schedule on September 21, split evenly with 72 games at home and 72 on the road.

The 2022 schedule is comprised of 23 six-game series and two three-game sets. After only playing within Triple-A East's Northeast Division in 2021, the club will now take on division rivals 102 times and play 42 games against inter-divisional opponents. The RailRiders are in the Northeast Division along with the Buffalo Bisons (Toronto), Lehigh Valley IronPigs (Philadelphia), Rochester Red Wings (Washington), Syracuse Mets (New York Mets) and Worcester Red Sox (Boston).

Scranton/Wilkes-Barre begins the 2022 season in Syracuse on April 5 and plays its home opener one week later on April 12 against the Norfolk Tides (Baltimore). The RailRiders will travel to Buffalo and host Lehigh Valley during the month as well.

The team travels to Rochester and Worcester during May, while it hosts Syracuse, a first-ever meeting with the Jacksonville Jumbo Shrimp (Miami) and starts a series against Lehigh Valley at PNC Field.

Home games in June include contests against the IronPigs, Red Wings and Bisons, while road swings hit Syracuse and Toledo (Detroit). After concluding a series at home against Buffalo on July 3, Scranton/Wilkes-Barre travels to Worcester for a game on July 4. The team returns home on July 12 to host the Louisville Bats (Cincinnati). After the Triple-A All-Star break from July 18-21, the RailRiders head down the turnpike for a three-game set versus the IronPigs. They conclude July in Rochester against the Red Wings.

August opens with 12 home dates over 13 days, from August 2 through 14, with the Bisons and Red Sox welcomed to town. A 12-game, 13-day road trip to the St. Paul Saints (Minnesota) and the Omaha Storm Chasers (Kansas City) follows; the first time in history that the RailRiders will play either of those two clubs. The month ends with the first two games of a six-game set against Syracuse at PNC Field.

In September, the RailRiders host the Mets, travel to play the Durham Bulls (Tampa Bay) and return to Moosic to play Worcester. The year's final series is another three-game set against Lehigh Valley on the road from September 19-21.

Game times and promotions will be announced at a later date.
