The Pirates No. 1 prospect was Pittsburgh's second-round selection of the 2014 First-Year Player Draft. He began the 2017 campaign with Altoona and went 9-2 with a 2.72 ERA (26er/86.0ip) before being promoted to Indy, leaving him fourth in Altoona's history with a 2.83 ERA among pitchers with at least 20 starts. He earned a Futures Game Selection and started for the U.S. Team at Nationals Park, where he threw one hitless inning and struck out two. To cap off the season, Keller finished first in the Pirates organization with 135 strikeouts, tied for third with 12 wins and fourth with a 3.48 ERA.

In 1993, Rowdie made his first appearance on behalf of the Indianapolis Indians at Bush Stadium!






