Isotopes Hill 2003-2022

Known by many names, Isotopes Hill in center field was one of the most unique features in professional baseball. During construction in 2002, longtime minor league baseball executive Dave Rosenfield suggested to Isotopes owner Ken Young the new ballpark should have a signature element. The Hill featured a 4.5-foot incline and a length of 126 feet. Some outfielders showcased their athleticism with memorable circus catches. Others were helpless victims, literally falling in pursuit of a long flyball. After 19 seasons, however, Major League Baseball told the Isotopes to remove The Hill for player safety. Albuquerque won its final game with Isotopes Hill, a 4-3 victory over El Paso on Sept. 28, 2022. Whether you called it Topes Slope, Hoffman's Hill, Bernard's Berm, or simply The Hill, it was the last professional ballpark to feature an uphill slope on the playing field.



KEN YOUNG, PRESIDENT



Ken Young has been in the recreation and facility industry for over four decades since graduating from Penn State University with a Bachelor of Science in Food Service and Housing Administration. Since 1985, Young has owned a number of food service companies specializing in arena and stadium business.

Young is also President of the Baltimore Orioles Triple-A affiliate, the Norfolk Tides (International League). He purchased the Tides in 1993 and helped supervise the building of Harbor Park, a 12,000-seat baseball stadium that Baseball America proclaimed the top Minor League Baseball stadium in the country.

In 2001, Young led an ownership group to purchase the Calgary Cannons Baseball Club and in 2002, he moved the club to Albuquerque where the franchise has set new standards of success since its inception in 2003. The Isotopes have finished in the top five in Pacific Coast League attendance in each year of their existence, setting a record with 593,606 fans in 2009, and hosted the immensely successful Triple-A All-Star Game in 2007.


Young, who is a native of Philadelphia, now resides in Tampa and has been very active in community affairs. He has been Chairman of the licensing committee for the Outback Bowl since its beginning in 1986. In 2002, Penn State University gave him the honor of Alumni Fellow.

JOHN TRAUB, VP/GENERAL MANAGER

Upon taking over as General Manager of the Albuquerque Isotopes in September 2003, John Traub has presided over a period of immense team growth and success. The Isotopes continually rank in the top 10 in attendance among all Minor League teams and in just 20 years of existence the team has drawn over 10 million fans. Under John's stewardship, the Topes and Isotopes Park have consistently hosted large events that have had a national scope, including Major League exhibitions, Manny Ramirez's 2009 rehab assignment and the 2011 Triple-A Baseball National Championship Game.

John was named 2007 PCL Executive of the Year and the team was singled out for recognition as well, receiving the John H. Johnson Award as the PCL's best overall franchise. The team also received the prestigious 2007 Bob Freitas Award from *Baseball America* as the most complete franchise in Triple-A Baseball. John was also presented with the 2007 Ambassador Award by the City of Albuquerque Convention and Visitor's Bureau and currently serves on the board of directors for the New Mexico Bowl.

Under John's leadership, the Isotopes received the 2018 John H. Johnson Award presented annually by Minor League Baseball to recognize the complete baseball franchise-based on franchise stability, contributions to league stability, contributions to baseball in the community, and promotion of the baseball industry. In addition, the first two Copa de la Diversión awards were given to the Isotopes for their tremendously successful



In his 36th year in the industry, John is currently a member of the Major League Baseball Professional Development League Operations Committee as well as the Pacific Coast League Schedule Committee. He was formerly the Chair of the Triple-A Marketing Committee, the Pacific Coast League Travel Committee and Public Relations Committee.

Prior to moving to Albuquerque, John spent 11 seasons with the PCL's Calgary Cannons (1992-2002). His titles included Director of Public & Media Relations (1992-96), Vice President of Baseball Operations (1997-1998) and Vice President & General Manager (1998-2002).

John co-authored his first book in 2012, entitled "Baseball ... A Helluva Life" - telling stories of the legendary life of Minor League Baseball executive Dave Rosenfield. The book is available online at Amazon.com.

The Los Angeles native began his career in 1988, serving as a public relations intern for the California Angels, where he remained as an intern for the better part of four seasons. He also worked as a public relations intern for the Los Angeles Dodgers during their 1988 post-season. He is a 1987 graduate of UCLA, earning a BA degree in Psychology. John and his lovely wife Liz have two children (Joe and Sophie) and live in Albuquerque along with their Wire Fox Terrier, Walter.

CASHLESS VENUE

Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park is a cashless facility. Baseball Bucks/Visa/MasterCard/AMEX are accepted for ticket purchases at the Isotopes Park Box Office, Isotopes Pro Shop, Fun Zone Ticket Booth, all permanent concession stands and portable concession stands. Digital forms of payment are also accepted at select locations.





BAG POLICY

The Albuquerque Isotopes encourage fans to leave all bags at home to speed up the entry process into the stadium. If a fan chooses to bring in a bag, the following rules apply:

Each fan may carry one bag of any size that is clear plastic, vinyl or PVC.

No purses or other bags are permitted in the ballpark. Bags within bags are not permitted - all items must be clearly visible within one acceptable/approved clear bag.

For guests with medical or childcare needs such as diapers, wipes, formula, bottles or breast pumps, those items must be brought in a medical or diaper bag and those bags are subject to search upon entry into the stadium. Only childcare or medical items may be carried inside of these bags, all other personal items must be carried in an approved clear bag.

Prohibited items are not allowed inside the ballpark (view the list of prohibited items in our A-Z Guide).

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO!



PARKING

The University of New Mexico owns and controls most of the parking lots surrounding Isotopes Park and charge Isotopes fans to park in these UNM lots. Payment for parking must be done by credit cards. Cash and Baseball Bucks are not accepted as forms of payment at these lots. Vehicles with four or more people are allowed to park in the Stadium East Lot for free. Vehicles displaying a disabled permit or placard are allowed to park for free at the UNM East Lot.

Staff and general public may not park in the three lots on Isotopes Park property (Lots A, B and C). Only credentialed media, disabled, and Suite Holder permit parking is allowed in these lots. Season Ticket Holders who have purchased a discounted permit may park in the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park. The permit must be displayed in their vehicles to gain access to the lots.

There are a limited number of disabled parking spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis in lots A and C. Overflow disabled parking is available adjacent to the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park on a first-come, first-served basis.

Availability of parking around the stadium is subject to change.



NO SMOKING & NO RE-ENTRY

Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park is a non-smoking facility. We appreciate your cooperation in making the ballpark a safe, fun, family-friendly environment.

To help ensure everyone's safety, Isotopes Park has a no re-entry policy. Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodations are up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and are limited to emergencies only.



MOBILE TICKETING

Mobile tickets offer fans convenience and safety by reducing contact at all points of entry.

Tickets can not be printed or screenshot. They must be managed digitally.

Plan ahead: Mobile tickets should be accessible before proceeding through the security screenings at Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park.

FANS' A GUIDE TO ISOTOPES PARK

PLEASE NOTE: Due to COVID-19 restrictions and protocols, changes may have to be made to several things covered in this A-Z Guide. Should modifications need to be made during the season, we will strive to do our best to communicate those to the general public.

Accessible Seating

Accessible seating is reserved for guests with accessible requirements and their companions. Guests requiring accessible seating may purchase one (1) accessible seat and up to three (3) companion seats adjacent to the accessible seat. Depending upon availability, seats for additional guests will be located as close as possible to the accessible space.

Isotopes Park is committed to working with guests on a case-by-case basis to adequately accommodate individual needs. All ticket sales are based on availability.

Isotopes Park is fully accessible. Guests may enter Isotopes Park at any of the entry gates. Ramps are provided at all entries, and there are elevators that will take patrons to the Club Level if they choose those seats.

Alcohol Management

No alcoholic beverages may be brought into or removed from Isotopes Park. New Mexico State Law prohibits the sale of alcoholic beverages to persons under the age of 21.

Please note the following policies:

- Patrons will be required to show proper proof of age when purchasing alcoholic beverages at Isotopes Park.
- New Mexico Law prohibits patrons from purchasing and/or possessing more than two alcoholic beverages at a time.
- Alcohol will not be served after the bottom of the 7th inning. This policy varies for 7-inning games.
- The Albuquerque Isotopes and Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality reserve the right to deny the sale of alcoholic beverages to any guests.
- Do not allow anyone to attempt to drive if intoxicated. Assist guests to the CNM Guest Services Booth to arrange a ride.

Autograph Requests

Due to Major League Baseball's directives regulating player/fan interaction during COVID-19, players may not be permitted to sign autographs. Under more normal circumstances, guests may make autograph requests from the Isotopes and visiting teams up to 15 minutes prior to game time. The best access to the players would be along the retaining walls near the dugouts. Guests are asked not to climb or lean on top of the dugouts and will be asked to move 15 minutes prior to game time per Major League Baseball rules.

Baby Changing Tables

Baby changing tables are located in all restrooms at Isotopes Park. There are "Family Restrooms" located on the concourse (both 1st and 3rd base side), Club Level and Press Level.

Bags

The Albuquerque Isotopes encourage fans to leave all bags at home to speed up the entry process into the stadium.

If a fan chooses to bring in a bag, the following rules apply:

- · All bags are subject to search
- Each fan may carry one bag of any size that is clear plastic, vinyl, or PVC, or a clear plastic freezer bag (Ziploc bag or similar).
- Bags within bags will not be permitted -- all items must be clearly visible within one acceptable/approved clear bag.
- For guests with medical or childcare needs such as diapers, wipes, formula, bottles, breast pumps, insulin, or medications those items may be brought in a separate non-clear medical or diaper bag, and those bags are subject to search

upon entry into the stadium. Only childcare or medical items may be carried inside of these bags, all other personal items must be carried in an approved clear bag.

- Any bags not meeting these requirements will not be allowed inside the ballpark. If a bag is turned away at the gate due to not following the clear bag policy, it will need to be returned to the fan's vehicle. The Isotopes do not provide storage for bags.
- · Blankets and jackets must be carried in separately and are subject to search.

Prohibited items will not be allowed inside the ballpark (see "prohibited items" for more information).

Banners and Signs

Commercial banners and signs are not allowed in Isotopes Park without express written consent from the Albuquerque Isotopes.

Beverages, Food & Containers

No bottles, cans, food, beverages or containers may be brought into Isotopes Park, with the exception of sealed bottled water. Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality will make every effort to accommodate fans with dietary restrictions.

Blake's Lotaburger Kids Fun Run

Due to COVID-19 restrictions, the Blake's Lotaburger Kids Fun Run may be suspended. In normal circumstances however, kids 12 and under have the opportunity to run the bases after every Isotopes home game (they must be able to do so without a parent accompanying them), weather permitting. Listen to announcements for further details. Parents must remain in the seating area. Kids enter the field on the 1st base side (Section 118/120) and exit the field via the gate at Section 115. Parents are instructed to be at Section 115's exit along the concourse to meet their child as they exit the field at the Kiddie Korral pickup area. After every Wednesday game, the Isotopes allow adults to run the bases as well. For the safety of the children, Albuquerque Police Officers are present on the field.

There are no refunds or exchanges for individual game tickets. All sales are final.

Cameras

Still and hand-held video cameras are permitted at Isotopes Park, but tripods cannot be set up that block the view of other guests. Video reproduction is strictly prohibited without express written consent from the Albuquerque Isotopes.

Children Tickets

Children two years of age and older require a ticket to enter Isotopes Park. Children under the age of two years are not required to have a ticket unless they will occupy their own seat. Children ages two through 12 are eligible for a \$1 discount (excluding July 3) in the Reserved Level only.

CNM Guest Services Booth

The CNM Guest Services Booth, located behind Section 102 on the concourse, will be open the same time as the gates and will stay open until approximately 30 minutes following the game to assist with lost items, lost guests, emergencies, accommodations or any other questions or concerns that may arise.

Comments/Suggestions

Fans may register comments and/or suggestions during games at the CNM Guest Services Booth. Fans may also email comments/suggestions to info@ abqisotopes.com or mail comments/suggestions to our Administrative Office.

Concessions

Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality is the exclusive concessionaire at Isotopes Park. To inquire or make comments regarding food service, contact Oak View Group (OVG) Hospitality directly at (505) 222-4033.

COVID-Safe Practices

Due to the global pandemic caused by COVID-19, the ballpark will operate according to the COVID-Safe Practices (CSPs) approved by the State of New Mexico. Additionally, the facility will operate according to Major League Baseball COVID safety mandates and precautions. The Isotopes Park CSPs are located under the "Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park" tab on the Isotopes website at abgisotopes.com. Please note that in cases where there are inconsistencies between COVID-Safe Practices and normal circumstances, the state-approved CSPs will be implemented.

Designated Driver Program

In conjunction with the State of New Mexico's Department of Transportation, we offer a Designated Driver program to help promote responsible consumption of alcohol among our fans. Fans wishing to be identified as their group's Designated Driver can receive a free bottle of water by signing up at the CNM Guest Services Booth.

el Jimador Fiesta Deck

The el Jimador Fiesta Deck is an exclusive hospitality area located on the Club Level and accommodates groups of 40 to 50. Those interested in booking an event on the Fiesta Deck can contact the Isotopes Group Sales Department at (505) 924-2255.

Elevators

The stadium's two public elevators are located at the main entrance (McKernan Hall) and inside the gate near the 3rd base stairwell. The elevators provide access for Suite and Club seat holders, disabled guests, Isotopes front office staff and Press Box personnel. If assistance is needed, fans may also take the 3rd base elevator to access Sections 201, 203 and 205. Use of elevators may be altered due to COVID-19.

Exit Procedure

Guests are asked to exit the stadium through the designated exits located on the concourse. There are two main exits located on the 1st and 3rd base sides. In the event of an emergency, there are two additional emergency exits adjacent to Section 123 on the 3rd base side and Section 122 on the 1st base side. To help ensure everyone's safety, Isotopes Park has a no re-entry policy. Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodations are up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and are strictly limited to emergencies only.

Fans Code of Conduct

The Albuquerque Isotopes are committed to creating a safe, comfortable and enjoyable experience for our guests at Isotopes Park.

Our staff will proactively intervene to support an environment where guests can enjoy the Isotopes Park experience free of unacceptable behavior, including the following:

- · Foul/abusive language or obscene gestures.
- Intoxication or other signs of impairment related to alcohol consumption.
- · Displays of affection not appropriate in a public, family setting.
- · Obscene or indecent clothing.
- Any disruption of the game or event, including throwing of objects or trespassing on the playing field or in restricted areas.
- · Sitting in a location other than the guest's ticketed seat.
- Fighting, taunting or making threatening remarks or gestures.

Any guest not adhering to the above code or behaving in an unruly manner will be removed from the ballpark. The Albuquerque Isotopes and Isotopes Park management reserve the right to determine what unruly or unacceptable behavior is

If anyone is interfering with your enjoyment of our facility, please contact the nearest Isotopes Park Event Staff for assistance.

First Game

The first game in Isotopes history was April 3, 2003 at the Memphis Redbirds. The first Isotopes home game was April 11, 2003 vs. the Oklahoma RedHawks.

Forms of Payment

Rio Grande Credit Union Field at Isotopes Park is a cashless facility. Baseball Bucks/Visa/MasterCard/AMEX are accepted for ticket purchases at the Isotopes Park Box Office, Isotopes Pro Shop, Fun Zone Ticket Booth, all permanent concession stands and portable concession stands. Digital forms of payment are also accepted at select locations.

Foul Balls and Home Runs

Batted balls and other objects leaving the field of play can be dangerous and we ask that you stay alert at all times. The extended safety netting should not give fans a false sense of safety and attention must still be paid towards protecting yourself and others in your party. Guests are permitted to keep any baseballs that are hit into the stands. However, guests may not enter the field to retrieve balls or otherwise interfere with balls in play. At no time should a foul or home run ball be thrown back onto the field of play (violators will be subject to ejection).

Fun Zone

The Fun Zone may not be operated due to COVID-19 restrictions. During normal times however, the Isotopes Park Fun Zone is located above the berm in the right field area of the stadium. The area contains various attractions for kids, including a playground for small children, carousel, multiple inflatable bounce houses and a gravity-drop ride called "Topes Tower." Tickets for these attractions may be purchased at the Fun Zone Ticket Booth during games.

Gate Times

Stadium gates will open one hour and five minutes before the start of each game and all stadium amenities will be available. On occasion, stadium gates will open earlier than the stated time. All gate opening times are listed at abqisotopes.com and are subject to change.

Gift Shop

See "Merchandise."

Giveaways

Promotional items, or "giveaways," are available on selected game dates to fans that possess a valid ticket on a first-come, first-served basis. One item per guest, age restrictions may apply. Guests must be in attendance at the game to receive a promotional item.

Lost and Found

During games, guests may inquire about lost and found items at the CNM Guest Services Booth. To inquire about lost and found items after a game, guests may call the Albuquerque Isotopes Administrative Office at (505) 924-2255 during business hours from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Items will be held for seven days before being discarded or donated.

Lost Children

If a child becomes lost or separated from their group, they should notify the nearest staff member and security will be informed. A lost child will be taken to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Parents looking for their child should follow the same procedure. The Isotopes encourage guests to instruct their children what to do if they become lost or separated.

Mascot

Orbit is a large goofy alien that arrived at Isotopes Park for the team's inaugural season back in 2003. This bright orange, yellow and red alien landed late one night in center field and has made Isotopes Park his home ever since. Thanks to the Topes amazing fans, Orbit was even crowned the MiLB Mascot Mania's Best Mascot in Minor League Baseball in 2012.

Orbit can be booked for special occasions by filling out a request form found online at abqisotopes.com or by calling the Community Relations Department at (505) 222-4004 during business hours from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Due to COVID-19 restrictions, Orbit's availability may be limited.

McKernan Hall

McKernan Hall is located at the Suite and Club entrance located directly behind home plate on the concourse. McKernan Hall is dedicated to the late Pat McKernan, former Albuquerque Dukes General Manager, who was highly

respected in Minor League Baseball and New Mexico. McKernan Hall is a tribute to professional baseball in Albuquerque and includes the Albuquerque Professional Baseball Hall of Fame. Only patrons holding Suite and Club Level tickets may enter through McKernan Hall during events.

Merchandise

The Isotopes Park Pro Shop is open during all home games starting when gates open. The Pro Shop is also open Monday through Friday year-round from 10:00 am to 5:00 pm and on game-day Saturdays from 12:00 pm to 4:00 pm. Fans can always shop online 24/7 at abqisotopes.com or place a phone order by calling (505) 222-4059.

Message Board

The videoboard can be used to display birthday and anniversary announcements during select innings of the game. A charitable donation is required for all birthday and anniversary announcements along with wedding proposals and other requests. These fees will be donated to a selected charity at the end of the season. All requests must occur 24 hours in advance of game day and can be submitted by visiting the "Fan Zone" tab on team's website at abgisotopes.com.

Miller Lite Stadium Club

Located on the Club Level, the Miller Lite Stadium Club is normally available for Club seat and Suite Holders. The Miller Lite Stadium Club is also available for rent on non-game days for corporate parties, weddings, etc.

National Anthem Performance

Those wishing to perform the National Anthem at an Isotopes game may submit a demo to the Isotopes Promotions Manager. Additional information regarding this process can be found at abgisotopes.com.

Orbit's O-Zone

Orbit's O-Zone is located behind the center field batter's eye and is designated for Team of the Game and Birthday Parties. Call the Group Sales Department at (505) 924-2255 for more details.

Paging (In-Stadium)

Paging is available for emergency situations only (i.e., lost children, etc.). Guests can visit the CNM Guest Services Booth to request a PA announcement. The Isotopes reserve the right to deny any announcement request.

Parking

The University of New Mexico owns and controls most of the parking lots surrounding Isotopes Park and charge Isotopes fans to park in these UNM lots. Payment for parking must be done by credit cards. Cash and Baseball Bucks are not accepted as forms of payment at these lots. Vehicles with four or more people are allowed to park in the Stadium East Lot for free. Vehicles displaying a disabled permit or placard are allowed to park for free at the UNM East Lot.

Staff and general public may not park in the three lots on Isotopes Park property (Lots A, B and C). Only credentialed media, disabled, and Suite Holder permit parking is allowed in these lots. Season Ticket Holders who have purchased a discounted permit may park in the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park. The permit must be displayed in their vehicles to gain access to the lots.

There are a limited number of disabled parking spaces available on a first-come, first-served basis in lots A and C. Overflow disabled parking is available adjacent to the Stadium West Lot directly south of Isotopes Park on a first-come, first-served basis. Availability of parking around the stadium is subject to change.

Pepsi Porch

The Pepsi Porch is an exclusive hospitality area located behind Section 123 designed for groups of 20-28. Those interested in booking an event in this area can contact the Isotopes Group Sales Department at (505) 924-2255.

Pets & Service Animals

Pets, other than service animals, are not permitted inside Isotopes Park. Service Animals, as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act, are welcome at Isotopes Park, provided they are accompanied by the handler and leashed at all times.

Phone Number

The main number to the Isotopes Park Administrative Office is (505) 924-2255.

Programs

The 2023 Souvenir Program is available online via the Isotopes website (abgisotopes.com).

Prohibited Items

No bottles, cans, food, beverages or containers may be brought into Isotopes Park, with the exception of sealed bottled water. For everyone's safety, the Isotopes do not allow laser pointers, noisemakers, fireworks, weapons, nets or any other item that may be considered dangerous or may interfere with another fan's enjoyment of the game. Major League Baseball rules prohibit all bags, except medical bags and manufactured diaper bags, from entering the venue (see "Bags" policy, above). Please be aware this is a partial list of prohibited items and any questions should be directed to the Administrative Offices at (505) 924-2255.

Promotional Items

See "Giveaways."

Radio Broadcasts

All Isotopes games can be heard on KNML 610 AM/95.9 FM "The Sports Animal." Occasionally, game broadcasts may be moved to KTBL 1050 AM. Additionally, all games can be heard at abgisotopes.com.

Radios

Hand-held radios are welcome at Isotopes Park as long as they do not interfere with other guests' enjoyment of the game. The Isotopes reserve the right to ask any guest to discontinue use of such devices.

Rain Check Policy

If an official game is not played, that being 4½ innings if the Isotopes are leading or 5 innings if the game is tied or if the visiting team is leading, the ticket may be used as a rain check. In this case, the ticket may be exchanged for a ticket of equal or lesser value, based on seating availability, for any future 2023 regular season, non-restricted home game (excludes July 3). Exchanges are accepted exclusively at the Isotopes Park Box Office. Tickets for official games which are suspended after becoming official contests do not qualify as rain checks.

Rain Check Policy FAQs

SHOULD THE FANS KEEP THEIR ORIGINAL TICKETS?

- Absolutely this is a requirement
- If they have digital tickets, the Isotopes Park Box Office staff can look up those accounts accordingly. They will need to provide your

Ticketmaster account number or seat location to assist in this process.

DO THE TICKETS NEED TO BE EXCHANGED RIGHT AWAY AFTER THE GAME IS POSTPONED?

- No tickets can be exchanged whenever it's convenient for the fan.
- The Box Office will stay open after the game is called to accommodate fans who want to exchange their tickets at that time.
- Otherwise, fans can return any time during normal Box Office hours to make their exchanges.
- Fans can also come to the Box Office the night of the game they want to attend and make the exchange at that time keeping in mind that seating is based on availability.
- Remember, all exchanges are based on availability of seating at the time of exchange for the new game.

HOW/WHERE TO MAKE EXCHANGES?

- Exchanges must be made exclusively at the Isotopes Park Box Office.

WHAT SEATS WILL THE FAN GET FOR THE NEW GAME?

- The tickets from the postponed game will be exchanged for new seats of equal or lesser value.
- If it's possible for the fan to get the same seats for the new game, the Box Office will do their best to accommodate the request.
- Remember that all exchanges are based on availability and no upgrades are allowed on rain checks.

IF THE TICKETS ARE EXCHANGED FOR THE DATE ON WHICH THE MAKE-UP GAME HAS BEEN SCHEDULED AS PART OF A DOUBLEHEADER, ARE THE TICKETS GOOD FOR BOTH GAMES OR ONLY ONE OF THE GAMES?

- Tickets are good for both games on the date printed on the tickets.

WHAT ABOUT FANS WHO ARE ALREADY TICKETED FOR THE RESCHEDULED GAME?

- Tickets with the date of the doubleheader are valid for both games, and the fan will sit in that same seat for both games.

HOW ARE PROMOTIONS AND GIVEAWAYS HANDLED?

- If a promotional giveaway was originally scheduled on a date that has now been made part of a doubleheader, the giveaway will be handed out when the gates open for the first game.

CAN FANS GET REFUNDS INSTEAD OF RAIN CHECKS?

- As stated on the tickets, refunds are not issued.
- All fans should be directed to the Box Office for any additional questions.

Guests who wish to exit and re-enter the facility for personal emergencies should be directed to the CNM Guest Services Booth. Re-entry accommodations are up to the discretion of the Albuquerque Isotopes and are limited to emergencies only.

Resale & Distribution of Tickets

Isotopes tickets are the property of the Albuquerque Isotopes and may not be sold or distributed. Attempted or actual resale or distribution of tickets at any price is prohibited. Isotopes management reserves the right to confiscate any tickets being sold or distributed.

Safety

Fans' safety is our utmost concern. We take pride in Isotopes Park being a safe environment for everyone and we ask all of our guests to abide by the Fans Code of Conduct (see above). For fans' own well-being, please be aware that bats and balls leaving the field of play can be dangerous and we ask you to stay alert at all times. For the safety of everyone in the facility, we ask that if you see something suspicious or if you observe violations of the Fans Code of Conduct, report the situation to a member of the Isotopes staff or directly to Albuquerque Police Officers who are patrolling the park.

Schedules

Pocket schedules are available throughout the Albuquerque community, as well as at the Isotopes Park Box Office, Pro Shop and Guest Services Booth. The schedule is also available online at abgisotopes.com.

Seating Policy

Guests should sit only in the seats for which they hold valid tickets. Guests may be asked to show their ticket stub if there is confusion over a specific seat.

Smith's Picnic Pavilion

Berm Seating is generally only available on the day of the game and can only be purchased at the Isotopes Park Box Office. On occasion, Berm Seating will be available in advance of the game, but only if all other seating levels have been sold to capacity. Tickets are required for all guests two years of age and older.

Umbrellas

Guests may bring umbrellas into Isotopes Park as long as they do not interfere with guests' enjoyment of the game or block other fans' view.

Live video streaming of all Isotopes games is available at www.milb.tv for a fee controlled by Major League Baseball.



What is an Isotope?

Since the team's inception in 2003, the nickname "Isotopes" has become one of the most popular and unique monikers in all of baseball.

Webster's Dictionary and Nuclear Scientists define an Isotope as:

i•so•tope\ n: any of two or more species of atoms of a chemical element with the same atomic number and position in the periodic table and nearly identical chemical behavior but with differing atomic mass and different physical properties.

Homer Simpson and baseball fans, on the other hand, define "Isotopes" as the nickname of a fictional Minor League baseball team in the popular animated sitcom The Simpsons. In the 2001 Simpsons episode "Hungry, Hungry Homer," the Springfield Isotopes threatened to move to Albuquerque until Homer went on a hunger strike, ultimately preventing the team from moving.

The name Isotopes was chosen for its originality and popularity after it won a "Name the Team" contest, garnering 57% of over 120,000 votes. Other suggested names in the contest included Atoms, Dukes, Roadrunners, and 66ers. The extensive amount of nuclear research in the Albuquerque area provides another great link to the team name.





The distinctive "A" logo and the "Isotopes" wordmark incorporate both the nickname's scientific and fictional inspirations, creating a brand that is unique and fun. Both logos were originally conceived by Kevin Kierst, who at the time was working as the clubhouse manager for the Norfolk Tides and now serves as an Equipment Manager for the New York Mets. After the design's conception, both logos were then tweaked by local designer Vaughn Weeden to create the brand that has become a favorite throughout the Land of Enchantment and beyond.


Fans across the nation seem to agree, making Isotopes merchandise annually one of the top 10 sellers in Minor League Baseball since the team began in 2003.

Atomic Isotope

ISOTOPES PACIFIC COAST DEAGUE GENEALOGY



The Pacific Coast League added the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers to the 10-team circuit in 1963, before the club changed their name to the Dallas Rangers in 1964. The franchise moved to Vancouver, British Columbia in 1965, playing as the Vancouver Mounties until 1969. Following the 1969 campaign, the Mounties relocated to Salt Lake City, Utah where they were known as the Bees (1970), Angels (1971-74) and the Gulls (1975-84). The franchise moved north of the border once again in 1985, emerging as the Calgary Cannons. The franchise played in Calgary for 18 years before relocating in 2003 to their current home in Albuquerque and became the Isotopes.







Pedro Lopez, the eighth manager in franchise history, begins his third year and third different role with the Isotopes after serving as Albuquerque's hitting coach in 2021 and bench coach in 2022.

The Vega Baja, Puerto Rico, native is entering his 19th year as a Minor League manager and second at the Triple-A level (2017, Las Vegas) after stints in the Texas Rangers (2001-05, 2007) and New York Mets (2011-19) farm systems. Over his 19 seasons at the helm, Lopez has a 979-977 overall record and appeared in seven playoffs—including winning the Double-A Eastern League Championship in 2014 with the Binghamton Mets.

After retiring as a player following the 2000 season, Lopez began his coaching career as a bench coach for the Savannah Sand Gnats. However, he took over as interim manager in May and was later named the permanent manager on June 21. The only other non-managerial job Lopez held was hitting coach for the Bakersfield Blaze in 2006.

After managing the 2019 Single-A Columbia Fireflies, Lopez joined the Colorado Rockies organization and was slated to serve as the development supervisor for the Grand Junction Rockies prior to the cancellation of the 2020 season because of the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2021, he also changed roles. Prior to being named hitting coach for the Isotopes, he was named development supervisor for High-A Spokane.

Lopez also has extensive experience coaching and managing in the Winter Leagues, as he has held a spot in the dugout since 2012. He has managed five seasons between the Roberto Clemente Pro Baseball League, Venezuelan League and Dominican League. During the 2017-18 season, Lopez was named Manager of the Year for the Gigantes del Cibao of the Dominican League. Over the last two seasons, he has served as the bench coach for the

Estrellas Orientales, also of the Dominican League.

Lopez also managed the 2011 Peoria Javelinas of the Arizona Fall League.

As a player, Lopez was drafted in the 21st round by San Diego in the 1988 MLB First-Year Player Draft out of Arizona Western College (Yuma, AZ). He played 13 Minor League seasons mainly as a catcher and a first baseman with the Padres, Milwaukee Brewers and Houston Astros, reaching Triple-A on four occasions. In 909 Minor League games, Lopez slashed .247/.317/.359.

Lopez is married to Gladys Rivera and has two twin daughters, Leslian Marie and Lainey Marie. The Lopez family resides in Toa Baja, Puerto Rico.

Bobby Median Berdh deadh

Bobby Meacham joins the Isotopes after serving on the Philadelphia Phillies staff as an assistant coach from 2020-June 2022. This will be Meacham's third stint with the Rockies organization as he served as the hitting coach for the Triple-A Colorado Springs Sky Sox in 1993 and a Minor League infield instructor in 2005. He has spent 10 seasons on Major League coaching staffs with the Florida Marlins (2006), San Diego Padres (2007), Yankees (2008), Houston Astros (2009-12) and Phillies. Meacham has also managed for 13 Minor League seasons, including four years at Triple-A. The Los Angeles native was selected 8th overall by the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1981 MLB First-Year Player Draft out of San Diego State University, where he helped get Tony Gwynn onto the baseball team. Meacham was then traded to the New York Yankees in 1982 and batted .236 as a shortstop for the Bronx Bombers from 1983-88.



Chris Michalak
Pitching Coach

Former left-handed pitcher Chris Michalak will serve as Albuquerque's pitching coach in 2023. This will be Michalak's fourth stop in the Duke City, as he pitched for the Dukes (2000) and the Isotopes (2004 & 2008). He appeared in 61 Major League games over four seasons with Arizona (1998), Toronto (2001), Texas (2001-02) and Cincinnati (2006). Michalak's pro career spanned 17 seasons, as he was a 12th round draft pick by Oakland in 1993. He finished the 2000 campaign leading the Dukes in wins (11). Michalak started the second-to-last game in Dukes history (6 IP, 2 R), Game 4 of a PCL First-Round playoff series at Memphis. Michalak retired after the 2009 season and has been coaching since. He served as the pitching coach for Hagerstown (2010-11), Potomac (2012-13) and Harrisburg (2014-17). He also was the Minor League pitching coordinator for Miami (2018-20) and coached in the Nationals organization from 2021-22.

Jordan Padhego

Hitting Coach

Jordan Pacheco, an Albuquerque native, will return for his second season as the Isotopes hitting coach. During Pacheco's first campaign with Albuquerque, the Isotopes led all of Minor League Baseball in home runs (240) and was second in OPS (.836). The club also hit 14 grand slams in 2022, the most by any MiLB team ever and tied for the most slams in professional baseball history with the 2000 Oakland Athletics and 2006 Cleveland Indians. A 2004 graduate of La Cueva High School, Pacheco then attended the University of New Mexico, where he was one of the most prolific offensive players in school history. He compiled a .384 average with 59 doubles, eight triples, 25 home runs and 145 RBI over three seasons from 2005-07 and was named Mountain West Conference Player of the Year in 2007. Pacheco was drafted in the 9th round by the Rockies in 2007 and eventually made his Major League debut with Colorado in 2011. His Major League career also included stints with the Arizona Diamondbacks (2014) and Cincinnati Reds (2015-16).

The 19th season of Isotopes baseball was another momentous one for the city of Albuquerque. Over the sixmonth schedule, the Isotopes welcomed "Breaking Bad" stars Bryan Cranston and Aaron Paul, who helped raised over \$100,000 for local charities through a silent auction; Hall of Fame pitcher Greg Maddux along with Grassroots Baseball founders Jeff Idelson and Jean Furth celebrating baseball along historic Route 66; the 10 millionth fan in franchise history; two of the three largest single-game crowds in Minor League Baseball; three new members of the Albuquerque Professional Baseball Hall of Fame in pitcher Dave Stewart, infielder Ron Cey and creator of the Dukes logo Richard "Dick" Moots; and countless other memorable moments at Rio Grande Credit Union Field.

All of that excitement brought in 515,498 fans through the gates over 73 openings, for an average of a Pacific Coast League-leading 7,062 fans per game—the first time in team history the Isotopes led the PCL in average attendance. Albuquerque finished second in the PCL in total attendance with two fewer openings than league-leading Las Vegas (518,221) and also had the highest (15,619 on July 30) and third-highest (15,190 on May 14) attended ballgames in MiLB this season.

The Mariachis were once again a rousing success in 2022, as a total of 60,886 attended six games at "The Plaza," an average of 10,148 per. In 22 all-time home games as the Mariachis, Albuquerque has a 16-6 record with a total attendance of 226,544 (10,297 average).

Between the lines, Albuquerque took home five PCL laurels throughout the 2022 season: Tim Lopes (April 12-17) and Wynton Bernard (April 26-May 1) each won Player of the Week; Brandon Gold (Aug. 9-14) and Matt Dennis (Aug. 23-28) each received Pitcher of the Week, while Bernard was the Player of the Month for July.

Offensively, the Isotopes had one of the best seasons in MiLB. They finished the year among the top five in all of MiLB in the following categories: homers (1st, 240); OPS (2nd, .836); total bases (2nd, 2,484); triples (2nd, 48); slugging (2nd, .483); hits (3rd, 1,402); and runs (5th, 894).

The bats not only put themselves in the Isotopes record books but MiLB's as well. Albuquerque smacked 240 homers on the year—the most in a year in franchise hostory—and clubbed 14 grand slams—breaking the MiLB record set in 1995 by Indianapolis while also tying the MLB record established by the 2000 Oakland Athletics and 2006 Cleveland Indians.

Other offensive Isotope records include: most homers in a game (8, set twice: June 15 vs. Salt Lake and June 25 at Las Vegas); most consecutive games with a homer (18); and most runs in a season (894).

Center fielder Wynton Bernard headlined the Isotopes offensive output. He was voted by his teammates as Albuquerque's unanimous Most Valuable Player—the first unanimous selection for any award in team history—leading the PCL in batting average (.333), while finishing second in slugging (.590), OPS (.977), hits (143), tied for second in extra-base hits (60), third in total bases (253), RBI (92), fifth in OBP (.387), runs (95), and doubles (31), and tied for seventh in stolen bases (30).

Bernard registered just the second 20-30 season in Isotopes history, joining Joc Pederson (2014). He was the seventh Albuquerque player to steal at least 30 bases in a season, and the first since Pederson. Bernard's six leadoff homers set a new Isotopes record, breaking Tony Abreu's mark of five (2009), while becoming the 14th Isotope to tally 90 RBI. He is also just the second Isotope to win the PCL batting title (John Lindsey, 2010, .354).

Bernard registered just the second 20-30 season in Isotopes history, joining Joc Pederson (2014). He was the seventh Albuquerque player to steal at least 30 bases in a season, and the first since Pederson. Bernard's six leadoff homers set a new Isotopes record, breaking Tony Abreu's mark of five (2009). Bernard led the team with 44-multi hit contests this season, while becoming the 14th Isotope to tally the 90 RBI. He is also just the second Isotope to win the PCL batting title, (John Lindsey, 2010, .354).

Carlos Pérez produced one of the best seasons in terms of power numbers for an Isotope, leading the team with 31 home runs and finishing second with 87 RBI. His 31 homers tied a career-high and was good for sixth-place in club history on the single-season homer chart. Pérez was tied for second in the PCL in home runs with Corey Julks, one away from tying for the lead alongside Matt Davidson and Jason Martin.

Alan Trejo became the fifth player in Isotopes history to hit three grand slams in one season (Mike Colangelo, Matt Padgett, Mitch Jones, Mike Tauchman). Trejo is also just the second player to hit four slams while

wearing an Albuquerque uniform (2021-22), joining Colangelo (2004-05). Trejo connected on the Isotopes first-ever walk-off grand slam on June 28 vs. Sugar Land. He compiled Albuquerque's longest hit streak of the season, a 15-game span from June 12-July 6 where he slashed .328/.379/.557 with five doubles, three homers, nine RBI and two stolen bases.

Michael Toglia recorded the 12th three-homer game in Isotopes history on Aug. 27 vs. Round Rock.

Elehuris Montero tied Jamie Hoffmann (2010) for the third-longest on base-streak in team history (32 games) from May 18-July 30. During the stretch, he slashed .344/.431/.609 with six doubles, two triples, eight homers and 35 RBI.

Sam Hilliard hit 13 home runs in 158 plate appearances for Albuquerque this season, averaging a homer every 12.1 plate appearances. His two-homer game on Sept. 25 at Sugar Land moved him into second place on the Isotopes all-time home run list. Hilliard currently has 62 over three seasons with the club (2019, 2021-22), just four away from tying Jordan Patterson for most in team history.

As a group, for the first time in team history, the Isotopes had five players hit 20 or more home runs (Bernard, Pérez, Sean Bouchard, D.J. Peterson, Coco Montes).

On the mound, the Isotopes recorded 19 quality starts, led by Riley Smith (six) and Brandon Gold (four). Zach Lee and Chad Smith finished tied for fourth in the PCL with 12 saves, while Lee led Minor League Baseball with 64 appearances— the most games pitched in Isotopes single-season history.

Smith tossed a seven-inning complete game shutout in Game 2 of a doubleheader vs. Salt Lake on June 18, the first Isotope to do so since Eddie Butler on Aug. 9, 2016 vs. Las Vegas (Game 1 of DH).

Lastly, Albuquerque's pitching staff recorded 1,174 strikeouts, breaking the previous single-season high of 1,135 (2013).

The 2022 season also marked the final year with Isotopes Hill in center field—the only remaining hill in all of pro baseball. A day after the final home game on Sept. 28 against El Paso, the hill removal began. The project was completed in two days.

Each year, Albuquerque Isotopes players vote on team awards based on performance on the field while fans also vote for their favorite Isotope and Director of Community Relations, Michelle Montoya, chooses the Community Award. The 2022 award winners are as follows.

Wynton Bernard was chosen by his teammates as the unanimous team Most Valuable Player – the first unanimous selection for any award in team history. He became the third player in Isotopes history to complete a 20-20 season Friday after swatting the Isotopes' MiLB record-breaking 14th grand slam by a club in a single season. As of today, Bernard is first in the Pacific Coast League (PCL) in batting average (.335), slugging (.598) and OPS (.986), second in hits (135), total bases (241) and extra-base hits (58), third in RBI (87) and OBP (.388), tied for fourth in doubles (30), fifth in runs (91) and tied for seventh in stolen bases (29). Bernard was named PCL Player of the Week for April 26-May 1 and PCL Player of the Month for July. He made his MLB debut with the Colorado Rockies on August 12.

Bernard was also chosen as the Fan Favorite, as voted on by the fans, for a second-straight season.

Pitcher of the Year honors went to right-hander Zach Lee. The Plano, TX, native has tallied 10 saves on the year, which is tied for fifth in the PCL. Lee has faced the minimum number of batters 24 times in an outing this year. His 61 games pitched also led all of MiLB (award voted by players).

Jonathan Morales has showed his defensive prowess by not only catching 41 games but also slotting in at third base 19 times and first base eight times for the Isotopes to garner Defensive Player of the Year honors. He has a .991 fielding percentage behind the dish and thrown out 32 percent of would-be base stealers (award voted by players).

Carlos Pérez has hit 28 homers – tied for third in the PCL – en route to earning Power Hitter of the Year laurels. In the PCL, he also ranks tied for fourth in extra-base hits (54) and tenth in slugging (.508). His 28 homers are the second-most in a season during his career (award voted by players).

Utility infielder Coco Montes was selected as the Mr. Hustle award winner. Montes has played 35 games at second, 32 at short and 34 at third base to go along with his .284/.362/.519 slashline. He ranks seventh in the PCL in slugging (.519), ninth in OPS (.881) and total bases (203) and tied for ninth in extra-base hits (50). Additionally, he has hit 19 homers – a career-high (award voted by players).

Manager Warren Schaeffer was honored as the Jennifer Riordan Most-Community Minded Person. Schaeffer became the second manager in Isotopes history to earn the award (Dean Treanor, 2008). This award is chosen by Isotopes Director of Community Relations Michelle Montoya.





Orbit or the famous Chile Pepper Race. It may be the roar of the crowd as their favorite Isotopes are announced and come sprinting from the dugout.



MINOR LEAGUE BASEBALL 101

Are there are new rules for the 2023 season?

Yes. The big rule change is the ban on shifts. Each defensive club must have two infielders on either side of the second base bag with two feet touching the dirt. Once the pitch is thrown infielders can move freely. Additionally, the Automated Ball-Strike System (ABS) will return along with the ABS Challenge System in select PCL parks.

How many different Minor League teams and leagues are there?

Minor League Baseball is comprised of 120 teams situated in 11 different leagues. These leagues are divided by classifications: Triple-A, Double-A, High-A and Single-A. The Isotopes play at the highest Minor League Level, Triple-A, and are part of the Pacific Coast League. There are also the Florida and Arizona Complex Leagues held at each organizations spring training complex.

Are the Albuquerque Isotopes owned by the Colorado Rockies?

No. Although once a commonplace, today only a handful of Major League teams own any of their affiliates. The Isotopes are privately owned by a group of investors led by team President Ken Young.

How do the Isotopes get their players?

The Isotopes do not scout, sign, release, or trade players. Since the Isotopes have a Player Development License with the Colorado Rockies, all players are under contract with the Rockies organization. All player moves are dictated by the Rockies.

Are some Isotopes on the Rockies' Major League Roster?

Yes. The Rockies can have up to 40 players signed to a Major League contract. From the start of the season through August 31 they can only have 26 players on their active roster. The other players are optioned to their Minor League affiliates, subject to recall. If a MLB player is placed on the Injured List, the Rockies may recall one of their 40-man roster members playing in the Minors. After September 1, teams may carry 28 players.

MINOR LEAGUE BASEBALL 101

Are there limits to the number of times a player can be optioned?

Yes. A Major League club can option a player to the Minors for no more than three seasons, after which the club must place the player on waivers in order to "outright" him to the Minors. For example: If Joe Smith has been on the Rockies' 40-man roster but has been sent to the Minors in each of the last three years, the Rockies cannot keep him on the 40-man roster and send him back to the Minors a fourth season. They must keep him on the 26man active roster or "outright" him to the Minors, which takes him off of the club's 40-man roster and makes him available for all other Major League organizations to claim off of waivers. If he is not claimed, or "clears" waivers after two business days, Joe Smith can elect to stay with the Rockies or become a free agent. Additionally, players can only be optioned to the Minors five times in one season (excluding 27th man and COVID call-ups).

If some of the Isotopes are on the Major League (or 40-man) roster, what kind of contracts do the other players have?

They are signed to a Minor League contract and are not subject to being recalled. This does not mean that the player cannot be promoted to the Major League club, but to do so, the Big League team must purchase his contract from the Minor League team and assign him to the 40-man roster. (The phrase "purchase contract" comes from an older era when Minor League teams actually owned contracts of their players and Major League clubs would have to buy them out of their contracts.) If the Major League club's 40-man roster is full, the team must make room by either releasing a player or placing a player on the 60-day Injured List.



JACKIE ROBINSON MAKING A DIFFERENCE AWARD



Dr. Charles Becknell.

The 2023 season is the 76th anniversary of Jackie Robinson integrating Major League Baseball. As part of the Isotopes celebration on April 18, we wanted to highlight not just what Robinson accomplished on the field, but also his impact off the field. Robinson was an entrepreneur, a broadcasting analyst, a sports executive, and a successful pitchman for products. Robinson was the first Black man to be a Vice President of a major corporation. He opened a bank in Harlem, built low-income housing, and was a champion for civil rights and voting rights.

In the pioneering spirit of Robinson, the Isotopes salute Dr. Charles Edward Becknell, an educator, civil rights leader, pastor, founding director of UNM's Africana Studies program and family man.

Isotopes: When I say the name Jackie Robinson, what comes to mind?

Dr. Becknell: What comes to mind, I would say pride. It was a matter of pride to see him break that barrier, and the way he carried himself. One of the things I learned from him was dignity. You can't explode, you got to handle those things in a different way. And I appreciated his calmness. I think he made more of a statement by handling things the way he did, because from him doors were opened for other black athletes to come through

Isotopes: How did Jackie Robinson impact America off the field?

Dr. Becknell: I think he opened up an avenue for discussion. He he showed people that others are worthy of being part of the discussion. He exposed treatment a lot of African Americans faced at the time. And so, you know, it was inspiring, because somebody was saying something. And kids all across the country are probably saying, I want to be like you.

Isotopes: Why do we need to continue to maintain Jackie Robinson's legacy?

Dr. Becknell: We're standing on some very broad shoulders. He was a great human being and a brave soldier to stand up to adversity, and win. So it tells us we can win, we can fight this battle and win. You know, we we look around and we say well, Jackie Robinson could have done this by himself. But Branch Rickey took the chance. And I had a similar experience. I had a man who took a chance on me and made my life a lot better. I've been in the Civil Rights field for a long time. And I've never forget those shoulders that we're standing on. And Jackie's are some of the broadest shoulders that we can stand on.

Isotopes: Tell us about the man you just mentioned who took a chance on you and what he did and how that impacted you.

Dr. Becknell: Well, it's political. Governor Jerry Apodaca was governor of the state from 1975 to 1979. He appointed me to one of the highest positions in state government. He appointed me as a member of his cabinet. As an African American, growing up in segregated Hobbs, New Mexico, we were not given much of a chance to be too much. But he offered me this job as Secretary for criminal justice. And I said, 'Jerry, are you sure you know what you're doing?' Because I had an afro. He said, 'You're the man. I believe in you, go do it.' And that just changed my life. I never would have had that opportunity had it not been for somebody outside who said, 'You can do it.'

Isotopes: What are actions that we can all take today to honor Jackie Robinson's legacy?

Dr. Becknell: Just spread the word. You know, a lot of young people don't really know much about the man. We need to have dialogues. And feedback. Like you're talking to me, what does it mean to you? We have problems in our society today because people don't talk to each other. And I think when people sit down and talk to each other, they'll find out, you know, we're not that far apart. We just have a different perspective about things. But when it comes down to it, we all want the same things. Safety in our community. We want to be appreciated. We want to be accepted. Not so much as what our abilities are, but who we are as human beings.

Isotopes: You have such a strong passion for helping people. Where did the strong passion to help people come from?


Dr Becknell: I grew up in a village. And in that village, we cared about each other. We looked out for each other. Whatever we had, we share. And I'm in the process of writing an article called "There's Room At the Table." We would sit down for Sunday dinner in the afternoon. And people would just stop by our house. And my mother would always say, 'there's room at the table for one more.' People in the community, they would plant a garden. They would grow all these vegetables, it was huge. Anybody that needed anything from that garden, they were able to go get it. Nobody took more than what they needed. It wasn't any of this hoarding. They just took what they needed. Everybody was fed. One other thing that sticks to my mind: There was this this guy who had a flat tire, elderly guy. And my dad got out, changed his tire. And the guy said, 'what do I owe you?' My dad said, 'what you owe me is to do something nice for somebody else.' And this is how we took care of each other. So that's where it came from.






