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

REMEMBERING TOMMY



Tommy Lasorda 1927-2021

SPOKANE, Wash. - Hall of Fame manager Tommy Lasorda, who guided the 1970 Spokane Indians to a Pacific Coast League championship and later won a pair of World Series titles with the Los Angeles Dodgers, has died. He was 93 years old.

"We are deeply saddened by the passing of Tommy Lasorda, one of the most iconic figures in the history of our franchise," said Spokane Indians Senior Vice President Otto Klein. "Tommy was a larger-than-life personality and true ambassador for the sport who left an indelible mark on the Spokane Indians. Our thoughts are with his family and friends in this difficult time."

A native of Norristown, Pa., Lasorda was a talented minor league

pitcher - including a 25-strikeout performance in 1948 - and spent parts of three seasons in the majors with the Brooklyn Dodgers (1954-55) and Kansas City Athletics (1956). After wrapping up his playing career in 1960, Lasorda became a scout for the Dodgers before finding his true calling as manager. He spent one season with the Pocatello Chiefs and three with the Ogden Dodgers before being promoted to Spokane in 1969.

The Indians finished 71-73 that season as a young team, that featured a pair of 19-year-olds in Bill Buckner and Bobby Valentine, underwent growing pains against the veteran-laden teams of the PCL. Everything clicked for Lasorda and Spokane the following year though, with the Indians posting a

94-52 record (26 games ahead of the Portland Beavers in the North Division) before sweeping the Hawaii Islanders for the PCL title. Players from that team would go on to account for 21 All-Star selections and 23 World Series appearances, and Baseball America would later recognize the 1970 Indians as the best minor league team in the second half of the 20th century. Lasorda would spend one more year in Spokane (69-76) before returning to the majors as the Dodgers third base coach in 1973, where he remained until taking over for Walter Alston as manager in 1977.

Lasorda led the Dodgers to backto-back pennants in 1977 and 1978 and captured his first World Series title against the arch-rival Yankees in 1981. He steered the Dodgers to another Fall Classic victory in 1988, four games to one over the Oakland Athletics, and continued at the helm in Los Angeles until his retirement in 1996. Overall, Lasorda finished with a 1599-1439 (.526) record in 21 seasons and collected eight NL West titles, four NL Pennants, and a pair of World Series. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1997, becoming the 15th manager and fifth Indians alum, joining Stan Coveleski, George Kelly, Duke Snider, and Hoyt Wilhelm, to be enshrined in Cooperstown.

Lasorda continued as an active force in baseball following his retirement from the Dodgers and won a gold medal as manager of the U.S. Olympic Baseball Team in 2000 at the Sydney Olympics. He was honored by the Spokane Indians in 2007, becoming one of four permanent members of the team's Rim of Honor. Lasorda was still a part of the Dodgers organization at the time of his passing, serving as a special advisor to the chairman in his seventh decade with the franchise. He is survived by his wife, Jo, daughter, Laura, and granddaughter, Emily.

"In a franchise that has celebrated such great legends of the game, no one who wore the uniform embodied the Dodger spirit as much as Tommy Lasorda," Dodger president and CEO Stan Kasten said. "A tireless spokesman for baseball, his dedication to the sport and the team he loved was unmatched. He was a champion who at critical moments seemingly willed his teams to victory. The Dodgers and their fans will miss him terribly. Tommy is quite simply irreplaceable and unforgettable."





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HOMETOWN HERO



RICK CLARK

The Spokane Indians announced on January 11th that they were fielding nominations for this month's Hometown Hero, Within minutes, nominations began rolling in, each one with the same nominee, a name that is becoming more and more familiar throughout the Spokane community - Rick Clark. You may have seen Rick featured in Mike Rowe's Returning the Favor, or read about him in any number of media features throughout the past several months. His work with Giving Back Packs and Spokane Quaranteam has garnered local and national media attention and helped thousands in need.

Rick Clark hasn't always been a household name. Born and raised in Spokane, Rick has struggled with poverty and homelessness throughout most of his life. In 2015, he found himself squatting in a trailer in Medical Lake with no job and no car. Knowing something needed to change, he hopped on a bus and made his way into town to enroll at Spokane Community College. On his first day of class, Rick met a homeless man named Jared, who had been robbed of his backpack full of belongings the night before. Rick posted on Facebook about this encounter later that evening, encouraging friends and family to help him fill a new backpack full of necessities for Jared. As a result of Rick's initial post, 25 backpacks were filled and just like that, Giving Back Packs was born. Over the past five years, 6,500 backpacks have been filled and donated.

When the Coronavirus Pandemic hit in early 2020, the logistics surrounding Giving Back Packs became harder to coordinate. Rick once again turned to his Facebook network, this time to help local restaurants through a new initiative, Spokane Quaranteam. A \$200 goal was set for day one. Rick raised \$500. On day two, he raised \$1,000. Word quickly spread of this initiative and Rick's Facebook group continued to grow. Spokane Quaranteam has raised over \$250,000, helped 150 local restaurants, and has donated over 17,000 meals to homeless shelters,

first responders, truck drivers, senior centers, and grocery store workers. The Facebook group that Rick started not only has over 28,000 members, but has sparked Quaranteam communities to show up in other cities around the US.

Rick transferred to Gonzaga after receiving a scholarship and graduated with his bachelor's degree. He is currently working toward a master's degree in Organizational Leadership. One of Rick's many goals is to someday teach, noting how inspired he has been by some of his professors throughout his journey. He even plans to give a TED Talk in October of this year. He hopes to find people who are looking for that break in life and who haven't seen their best days. He wants to show them that they have a purpose beyond what they can imagine – because he's lived that firsthand!

When asked if he had any advice to others who are struggling, Rick gave us this powerful message: "Get yourself connected – Force yourself to reach out to others and be a part of something. You don't have to wait until you're ok to help others."

Who is your favorite Spokane Indians mascot and why? Ribby because we love to hang out at his cage in right field.




What is your favorite memory at Avista stadium?
