



The Sod Poodles won the half pennant on the half's last day ... rallied from an 0-2 to win the South Division Championship Series over the RockHounds ... and scored seven runs in the top of the ninth inning to defeat the Tulsa Drillers in decisive Game 5 of the Texas League Championship Series to win the league title.

The Tulsa Drillers' 2018 TL championship was "book-ended" by a pair of heartbreaking defeats in the title series (in to defeat the Drillers, capping the "Four-Peat"). In the Texas League's 2017, the RockHounds erased an 0-2 more than 130-year history, only two teams (Fort Worth in the 1920's and the RockHounds) have won three (or more) consecutive outright titles. In short, the Drillers came within two runs (2017) and one inning (2019) of becoming the third.





The RockHounds / Oakland A's affiliation began in 1999. Two of the finest people we have come to know in those two decades are (2010) LIPPIMEN and DISTIN WINCHOUSES.

Each is entering a new chapter in his baseball career.

Keith was selected by Oakland in the second round of the 1971 draft ... and has been with the A's ever since ... 50 years.

He was, by all accounts, one phone call away from a chance to play in the big leagues, but the call never came. Instead, he became a minor league manager on the A's farm in 1979 and became the director of that farm ... director of player development ... in 1992. He was in that role when the RockHounds became the A's AA affiliate in 1999 and would oversee generations of A's minor league (and future Major League) players through last season.

He will remain with the A's in the role of front office special adviser (Ed Sprague takes over as Oakland's farm director).

In 2019, "Lipp" was named winner of *Baseball America*'s prestigious Tony Gwynn Award, a lifetime achievement honor recognizing greatest contributions to the game.

When baseball resumes, another honor awaits - - he will be inducted into the Oakland Athletics Hall of Fame.

We gathered this from several sources, and it just might be the perfect "Keith Lieppman story."

It's not clear whether or not he was supposed to "let the baseball cat out of the bag," but A's manager Bob Melvin did exactly that during his first Spring Training meeting with the team (just a few months ago), telling the entire club that "Lipp" would be inducted.

The reaction from a clubhouse full of big leaguers speaks volumes about the admiration, affection and the tremendous respect the guys have for Keith. Bob Melvin said "I'd had rounds of applause in those meetings before, but nothing like that. It was deafening."

> The A's manager (and a threetime Manager of the Year) said Keith is "the most influential guy in Oakland A's history as far as player development."

> In Bob Melvin's words ... Lipp "touched so many of these guys in the organization ... and not just the players. The coaches, the managers."

> You can count Keith's friends with the RockHounds to that list.

> Keith is pictured, left, at the 1999 press conference in which the affiliation with the Oakland A's was announced ... and the franchise's new nickname, the "RockHounds," was unveiled.

When the club travels, Justin's responsibilities also include ensuring a busload of equipment arrives at the clubhouse and to set up his "traveling training room" of equipment.

Anyone who hangs around minor league baseball for any length of time (as your humble editor has done for three decades) can testify to the tireless effort required, all while spending the better part of six months away from his home and family.

His dozen seasons included a "highlight reel" of the franchise's greatest on-field accomplishments:

- Six of the teams reached the postseason
- Five went on to become Texas League champions, including the Four-Peat (2014-2017)

The odds of reaching The Show as an Athletic Trainer are much "longer" than those for a player. He is more than deserving of moving up, and the RockHounds have been remarkably fortunate to have had Justin as a member of the field staff and of our "family."

Speaking of family ... Justin is a graduate of the University of Nevada, Reno and his wife, Susan, was inducted into the Wolf Pack Athletic Hall of fame in 2009 (swimming \$ diving), which makes his post with Las Vegas a little "closer to home."

A (pretty cool) geographical sidebar - - in his 12 seasons here, Justin traveled more than 168,000 miles on the RockHounds' team bus (and that's just the destination-to-destination mileage, not including the daily in-town miles). The job of Athletic Trainer covers far more ground (figuratively and literally) at the minor league level than meets the eye.

Justin Whitehouse came to the RockHounds in 2008 and served as the club's Athletic Trainer for 12 seasons (2008-19).

For the 2020 season ... his 20th with the Oakland A's organization ... he received a long-overdue promotion, becoming Assistant Athletic Trainer for the Las Vegas Aviators of the (AAA) Pacific Coast League).

Overseeing the well-being of 25 professional baseball players is, in itself, more than a full-time job. In the Major Leagues, Director of Team Travel is a full-time job all its own; in the minors, it's added to the Athletic Trainer's "plate." out anos

Steinmann joined the Oakland organization in 2017 after spending 17 seasons as a coach and manager on the Seattle Mariners' farm. Both Connelly and Everidge joined the RockHounds in 2018 after spending two seasons (2016-17) with the Stockton Ports, Oakland'

Under "Steiny, Cons and T," the club came within one win of a

half pennant in 2019 before capturing the second half Amarillo in the South Division Championship Series.

Dilone enters his 25th season with Oakland, the six as a player, and his 19th as a coach on the A's farm (he has been Beloit's hitting coach for six seasons). Both Zdebiak and Mosiman earned their promotions to the RockHounds and the Double-A level after spending multiple seasons with Stockton of the (Advanced-A) California League.

Scott Steinmann Manager

"Steiny" came to the RockHounds in 2018 after one season with the Beloit Snappers, Oakland's in the (Single-A) Midwest League. The 2020 season marks his third with the RockHounds and fourth with the A's.

Through July of his season, the RockHounds were 47-61. *Since August 1 of 2018, the club has gone 94-76, narrowly missing a postseason berth in that season before reaching the in 2019.*

A native of Cincinnati, Ohio, Scott's playing career began with the Seattle Mariners, who signed him as a non-drafted free agent out of Miami University (Oxford, OH) on August 3, 1995. He played three seasons as a baseman and on the Mariners farm (1996-98), reaching the Double-A level in his third season, before being released in October of 1998.

He stayed with the Mariners organization, transitioning directly into coaching the following season (1999) as Seattle's roving catching instructor and, later, on the of the Everett AquaSox in the (Short-A) Northwest League. It would be the start of a 17-year stint with Mariners, during which time he served as a coach and manager at virtually every level of the club's minor league system. His tenure included nine managerial seasons, from the Rookie level up to Double-A, where he led the West Tenn Diamond Jaxx (Jackson, T

In 2005, he guided the Wisconsin Timber Rattlers to the (Single-A) Midwest League title series and, nine years later, his club in Clinton, Iowa, made a kind of history. Trailing the Bees, 17-1 (May 7 at Burlington, Iowa), the LumberKings rallied back with 19 unanswered runs for a remarkable 20-17 win, still

With the Mariners, he also served as a coach with Everett (1999, 2010 and 2012), Wisconsin (2000-01), San Bernardino (Advanced-A California League in 2002), Peoria (2006) and the Tacoma Rainiers of the (T

Tommy Everidge Hitting Coach

Oakland's 10th round selection in the 2004 draft out of Sonoma State University (Rohnert Park, California), Tommy was promoted to the RockHounds (from Stockton) at the end of the 2007 season and spent the entire '08 season with the 'Hounds, earning a selection to the Texas League Postseason All-Star Team after leading the league with 115 RBI.

That total ranks all-time in franchise history and remains the most in the Security Bank Ballpark era (which began in 2002). Ten of his ribbies came in one game (May 26 at Tulsa), in which he went 4-for-6 with two home runs (one a grand slam). *In the Texas League's 130-year history, he remains one of just <u>seven</u> players to amass 10 (or more) RBI in a single game.*

Despite his outstanding production in 2008, the Bay Area native (Glen Ellen, California) found himself back with the RockHounds to open 2009. He responded by hitting .329 with 53 RBI in 55 games before receiving his promotion to Triple-A A's.

His coaching assignment with the A's came with (Short-A) Vermont in 2014 (along with Steve Connelly) and he spent two seasons with the New York-Penn League Lake Monsters. Now in his seventh season as a coach, he was promoted to the RockHounds after spending 2016 and 2017 with Stockton.

Steve Connelly Pitching Coach

When Steve joined the Oakland organization as pitching coach for the Vermont Lake Monsters (Short-A New York-Penn League), it brought his career "full circle." He had been selected by the A's in the 24th round of the 1995 draft (out of the University of Oklahoma) and went on to reach the Major Leagues in 1998, going 0-0, with a 1.93 earned run average, in three relief appearances with the A's.

Now entering his seventh season as a pitching coach on the A's farm. "Cons" spent one season with (Single-A) Beloit (2015) and two with Stockton (2016-17) before being promoted to the RockHounds in 2018.

Prior to returning to the A's as a pitching coach, he had served in the same capacity for three years (2011-13) at the University of Alabama-Huntsville.

The Long Beach, California, native was originally drafted by the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1992 draft (25th round out of Woodrow Wilson HS in Long Beach) but elected, instead, to attend Oklahoma. 

MLB.com's Pipeline and *Baseball America* agree on the three top job candidates in Oakland:

Jesus Luzardo \$ A.J. Puk

And make no mistake, the A's have been "awaiting" with a very clear "mental picture" of putting these two left-handers in the rotation ... for some time.

Entering the 2019 season, *Baseball America* had the tandem ranked 1 \$ 2 on the A's farm. In the publication's *Prospect Handbook*, the scouting report made this bold statement, reading, in part:

"Luzardo \$ Puk could give the A's a lethal 1-2 punch at the top of the rotation."

The draft is, to the say the least, an "inexact science" and that's part of the reason A.J. is with Oakland. Baseball America rated him the # 85 prospect in the country out of high school in his home town of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, but he wasn't selected until the 35th round (by Detriot) and elected to atten the University of Florida. After three sensational seasons with the Gators, he was expected to one of the players the board in 2016. He was taken early, but because of an "inconsistent" spring, he fell "all the way" to # 6, where the A's were waiting (and probably thanking the baseball heavens for "inexact science").

Just how talented is Jesus Luzardo?

The Washington Nationals selected him (out of high school in Parkland, Florida) in the third round of the 2016 June draft, with the full knowledge that he had undergone Tommy John surgery just three months earlier. Making his pro debut the following June (June 28, 2017), he appeared in just three Gulf Coast Rookie League games on the Nats' farm before being acquired by Oakland in a high pr le trade that sent (former RockHound) Sean Doolittle to Washington (see pages xx-xx). He spent more time with the RockHounds than at any other of his stops on the way to Oakland, going 7-3, with a 2.29 ERA in 16 astoundingly good starts.

We asked, in the headline, how good he can be? Baseball America says this about how much better he can get: "Luzardo's maturity, elopment have him tracking only to becoming stronger with an already-dangerous arsenal."

The Arrival

A.J. Puk's recovery from Tommy John surgery included a brief (six games) return to the RockHounds in 2019 (he was a member of the 2017 Texas League championship club that capped the "Four-Peat") and, in all, he pitched just 25 innings before getting the call to Oakland. A.J. made his Major League debut on August 21 and Jesus (slowed slightly by minor injuries in March and July) followed on September 11. Jesus posted a 1.50 ERA (with two saves) in six games and A.J. a 3.18 in 10 appearances and each struck out more than a batter-per-inning. *Baseball America*, MLB.com ... and the A's ... think that was just the beginning.

James was dsrafted in 2015 and Daulton in 2016, yet each had made just EIGHT appearances on the mound as a pro. All that changed in a season that saw two careers get back on track to The Show.



James Kaprielian and Daul e both California natives and each w round draft choice. James was selected by the Yankees in 2015 out of UCLA (he came to the A's from New York in the Sonny Gray trade) and Daulton out of Cal in 2016.

Both opened 2019 with (Advanced-A) Stockton and for each, his '19 debut was just the ninth appearance of his pro career.

"Kap" spent the majority of his season with the Ports (a 4.47 ERA in 11 games), but he hit his stride with the RockHounds, posting a 1.63 ERA in seven games. Including a start with (AAA) Las Vegas, his comeback season ended with a 3.18 ERA in 19 games (68.0 innings).

He enters 2020 rated the A's # 12 prospect by MLB.com's Pipeline and # 14 by *Baseball America*.



"Chappy" was part of two Texas League championship clubs.

In 2014, he joined the RockHounds from (Single-A) Beloit on the last day of the regular season after third baseman Jefry Marte was injured. Beloit's season had just ended so, with (Advanced-A) in the play Matt got a chance to "sample" the Double-A level well ahead of schedule.

Minnesota's lineup ... led by former RockHound Nelson Cruz ... was scary in 2019, leading all of Major League Baseball with 307 home runs.

With the addition of another former 'Hound (this one a former American League Most Valuable Player) ... they became even scarier.

"Patience and fortitude conquer all things." -- Ralph Waldo Emerson

Chances are, the great American philosopher and poet, Mr. Emerson, would be a fan of former Rockhound Nelson Cruz, who hit 14 home runs (some of them were astounding) in a half-season here in 2004. He reached the big leagues with the Milwaukee Brewers the following year and was traded to Texas shortly thereafter.

In his first four big league seasons, combined, Nelson Cruz played in a total of 176 games and hit a total of 22 home runs.

In 2009, the Rangers gave him the chance to play everyday. Hit hit 33 home runs.

In 11 cessons since, he has hit 370 home rune, averaging 34% per season, and has reached the 400-HR plateau (see below).

He signed with Baltimore as a free agent and hit 40 homers for the time in his single season with the Orioles (2014).

From there he signed a major deal with Seattle, where sceptics said he couldn't possibly equal his totals from Baltimorre. He didn't. He surpassed them, belting 163 homers in four seasons with the Mariners (averaging 41 per season).

with the Twins, the six-time American League All-Star ripped 41 In his homers with 108 RBI, leading Minnesota to 101 wins and the AL Central crown.

Nelson Cruz had to wait ... and wait ... for his turn.

The Cubs selected Josh (out of Auburn University) in the round of the 2007 draft and he was named the top position prospect in the (Short-A) Northwest League ... and the Cubs' # 7 prospect ... as a catcher. Irony? His prospect status skyrocketed in part due to changing his position to catcher from third base. He traded to the A's and helped the RockHounds win the 2009 Texas League title, starting 102 games behind the plate and 15 at third base. The transformation had begun.

Oakland needed a third baseman and Josh seized the opportunity, becoming not just a Major League caliber player but one of the best third basemen in the game. He was traded to Toronto prior to the 2015 season and was named the American League's Most Valuable Player in his year with the Blue Jays.

After battling injuries in 2018, he signed as a free agent with the Atlanta Braves (his favorite team as a kid) for the '19 season. In a ent kind of transformation, he hit 37 home runs with 94 RBI for the NL East champion Braves and was named the National League Comeback Player of the Year.

The three-time All-Star ... former AL MVP ... and two-time Silver Slugger Award winner brings his bat, glove (and "rain") to a Twins lineup that had <u>five</u> 30-HR hitters last season.

Sean Doolice is pictured, above, with the RockHounds in 2012. If you're wondering why he's playing base, it's because he was a baseman (slash at that time. Selected by the A's in the round of the 2007 draft (out of the University of Virginia), Sean was a tremendous two-way player and there was always speculation he could pitch at the big league level. He was a top 10 prospect for Oakland as a position player (1B/OF), but was severely hampered by injuries. The decision was made to convert him to the mound and, eight seasons, a 3.02 ERA and 111 saves later, that decision was the right one.

He had two tours of duty with the A's and is in his second stint with the Nationals. His return to the Nats came via trade, one that has ted both of the clubs involved. Sean has been outstanding with Washington and one of the players the A's received in exchange for him from the Nats was **Jesus Luzardo**.





Cal State Fullerton captured the 2003 national collegiate crown. His second came in the 2019 Fall Classic

with the Washington Nationals and this one was capped off with a visit ... to 1800 Pennsylvania Avenues

Kurt was a member of the 2006 RockHounds (above) after being selected by Oakland in the second round of the 2004 draft out of Cal State Fullerton, where he won a College World Series championship and was named recipient of the Johnny Bench Award as the nation's top collegiate catcher. He reached the big leagues with the A's in 2007 and was an All-Star selection with the Minnesota Twins in 2014. A hip or strain sidelined "Zuk" for much of the '19 Fall Classic, but not before he did what every kid who ever picked a ball, glove and bat dreams of doing - - he homered (in Game 2) in the World Series. A very cool sidebar - - K waii-born player to hit a home run in the Fall Classic (he was born and raised in Wailuku, Hawaii).





FULL CIRCLE? JOE "DISCUSSING" A CALL HERE IN 1985 ... AND AS THE "PRODIGAL ANGEL" IN 2020 IN 1985, after 13 seasons with the Cubs, our franchise changed affiliations and the California Angels became our Major League parent club. The first manager of that era was Joe Maddon.

In terms of wins and losses, Joe's two Texas League seasons weren't much fun - - his clubs went a combined 121-148, which is the fourth-worst managerial winning percentage (.450) in franchise history. (Editor's note: SO sorry to bring that up, because the editor is a huge Joe Maddon fan and considers him on of the really good people in the game). Now ... where were we? Wins and losses notwthstanding, his time in West Texas was part of a remarkable journey.

In an interview held after he guided the Cubs to their World Series title in more than a centrury, Joes said **"the years prior to getting to this particular** moment, whether it was managing in rookie ball, or A ball or Double-A, all the jobs, hitting coach, roving instructor, coordinator.

When he took over here as manager in '85, Joe had already been a member of the Angels organization for a decade, and coaching. He would spent another two decades with the Halos, remaining in the minors until getting his call to The Show in 1995 (as bullpen coach). He went on to serve as base coach and, three times, was the interim big league manager. The Angels never ed him the full-time job, although the choice of Mike Scioscia certainly can't be faulted as he led the ANgels to

their only World Series apppearance (and title) in 2002. Joe was the bench coach for the Angels club that won the Fall Classic (see pages 100-103). He stayed on Mike Scioscia's thjrough 2005 (the two are pictured, right) before get ty to manege full time in The Show.



Joe waited 28 years for his first full-time shot at managing in The Show ... and he made the most of it.

With a limited budget, and while competing in the brutally tough American League East, his Tampa Bay clubs went 754-705 ... including 627-508 over his last seven seasons. In his nine-season tenure, the Devi Rays / Rays won two AL East titles and made what remains the franchise's only appearance in the World Series (2008, falling to the Phildelphia Phillies, 4-1).

Joe once drew up the Rays batting order using an 80's pop song - - Tommy Tutone's 867-5309/ Jenny. He is well known for that kind of creativity ... and for being one of the game's best tacticians.


There is another side to Joe that is, perhaps, best defined by "the story of the Angels cap."

When the Cubs broke one of the most celebrated droughts in sports history, winning the 2016 World Series, manager was seen wearing an Angels cap during the on-field celebration.

The cap belonged to Joe Maddon's dad (Joe, Sr.).

"He passed away in 2002, we won the World Series, and I've had his old Angel hat in my bag since then. So it goes everywhere." - Joe

After a win in Game 5, the Cubs trailed the 2016 World Series (vs. Cleveland), 3-games-to-2.



Before Game 6, Joe was asked about "omens."

"Omens, I don't know. I did see my dad's hat in my bag today. I carry my dad's hat with me. So the one thing I'm relying on today is my dad. I held onto his hat a little bit this morning, and that's probably an omen in a sense going into this game."

With a 9-3 win in Game 6, the Cubs forced a seventh game in the 2016 World Series, a game that was tied after nine innings and included the most historic rain delay in baseball history. The Cubs scored twice in the 10th inning and won, 8-7.

Joe later said ... "I put the cap in my back pocket in the tenth inning,"

At the moment pictured here, no one would have known Joe would return to the Angels, but perhaps the cap was an omen there, too. Full circle.



The Cooperstown Class of '19:3 x 2

On July 21, 2019, the Baseball Hall of Fame inducted to two hitters, two starting pitchers and two failed starters. The lat cess in the roation ... their respective journeys to Cooperstown began in the bullpen. Mariano Rivera and Lee Smith combined to save 1,130 Major League games. Mariano, of course, is the all-time leader, closing 652 games (not to mention his amazing postseason dominance) and the former Midland Cub ranks third in big league history with 479 saves. They entered the Hall alongside Edgar Martinez, Harold Baines, Mike Mussina and Roy Halladay (Halladay, the great Blue Jay and Phillie right-hander, passed away in 2017 and was represented at the induction ceremonty by his wife, Brandy).

Lee Smith earned place in Cooperstown with 478 MLB saves.

The first save of his professional career came in 1978 as a member of the Midland Cubs.

Homecoming

In the minors, Lee Smith struggled as a starter ... posted a career ERA of nearly 5.00 ... walked more batters than he struck out ... and very nearly quit the game rather than accept a move to the bullpen.

Forty years later, he was sitting next to Mariano Rivera ... at Cooperstown.

Lee Smith had given up on baseball.

He was just 20 years old in his season here (1978) and went 8-10, with a 5.98 earned run average as a starting pitcher for the Cubs. Manager Randy Hundley wanted to move the hard-throwing kid to the bullpen, but Lee resisted. In fact, he decided to leave pitching behind, instead giving college basketball a try (and he was a talented player) at Northwestern State University (in Natchitoches, Louisiana).

At some point between the 1978 and 1979 Texas League seasons Billy Williams, the great Chicago Cubs , convinced Lee to return to baseball, to West Texas, and to the Double-A Cubs. Exactly what Billy said has always stayed between the two men but, without that intervention, a Hall of Fame career might have ended before it began.

His 1979 season wasn't stellar, but the ERA dropped by a point (from 5.98 to 4.93), enough to warrant a promotion to (Triple-A) Wichita the following season and, ultimately, a September call-up to Chicago (1980, see below).

There is one statistical note "for the ages" from Lee's otherwise forgettable 1978 season here. Of his 30 appearances, just came in relief but ... in one of

Homecoming, Part 2 Wrigley Field September 1, 2019

On September 1, 1980, Lee Smith stepped onto a Major League pitcher's mound for the time. He was a September call-up with the Cubs and the "hill" was at Wrigley Field. Thirty-nine years later (to the day), the Cubs invited him back to the "friendly " this time not as a rookie, but as a Hall of Famer.

It's had to imagine any Minor League franchise that can surpass (or even equal) that of the Cubs-Angels-RockHounds when it comes to producing great closers. Of the 30 members of the 300-Save Club (see right), five pitched here.

Like Lee Smith, **Roberto Hernandez** struggled as a starter before emerging as one of the top closers of his era (most notably with the White Sox).

Troy Percival might be the best "story" of all, drafted by the Angels (and playing one season in the minors) as a catcher before moving to the mound (and lived the "closer's dream," a save in Game 7 of the 2002 World Series).

Bruce Sutter and **Huston Street** were "raised as relievers." With the Cubs here in 1974 and 1975 (the latter club shared a Texas League title), Bruce was developing the legendary split astball that would take him to Cooperstown.

Despite a remarkable collegiate career at the University of Texas, many questioned whether Huston would become a solid big league closer. The former Longhorn erased those doubts in a hurry. His 10-game stop with the RockHounds in 2004 was about as long as any he made in the minors and was the American League Rookie of the Year in '05.



Think the 300-save club isn't a big deal?

Both Baseball Reference \$ MLB.com require 13 or more saves for inclusion on their respective all-time lists and both show 959 pitchers with 13 or more saves in big league history, meaning far in excess of one thousand ... perhaps two thousand (?) ... pitchers have recorded a big league save. Of those ... <u>thirty</u> have recorded 300 (or more).

The list will almost certainly grow by one this season - -Aroldis Chapman enters the 2020 season with 273. Next among active relievers:

- Joakin Soria has 221 ... 79 shy ... will turn 36 this season ... and has just 43 saves in the last four seasons.

- Greg Holland has 206 .. 94 shy ... is 35 ... and has just 20 saves in the last two seasons.

Of his 206, 166 came in a four-season stretch between 2013 and 2017 (he missed one year due to injury). - No other active pitcher has as many as 200 saves.

When the only two names above yours on an MLB "all-time" list are Mariano Rivera and Trevor Hoffman ... you're in elite company.

Before the arrivals of "Mo" and "Smith was considered by many to be baseball's greatest closer. Pulitzer Prize-winning sportswriter Jim Murray called him as "**the best one-inning**



It could be said the podium at Cooperstown is the most hallowed place in the game. Lee Smith is the third franchise alum whose journey has led him there.

Bruce Sutter "checked all the boxes" as Major League closer with the Cubs, Cardinals and Braves. He was a six-time National League All-Star ... led the league in saves e times ... won the NL Cy Young (1979) ... and was a World Series champion with St. Louis (1982). He was among the to be used in the specialized role of the eighth and ninth innings and was just the third pitcher in MLB history to reach the 300-save plateau.

Bert Blyleven's time with our franchise was brief but impactful, his legendary curveball in e starts for the Angels here in 1992 as part of a (successful) comeback bid (he the season, which be his last, with the California Angels). He made his presence felt the diamond as well on during his short stay in West Texas and he returned as a featured guest at our winter sports banquet in early 1993.

Although he last pitched in The Show in 1992, "the Dutchman" (he was born in the Netherlands) still ranks all-time in strikeouts with 3,701. Hall of Fame third baseman Brooks Robinson said of Blyleven " ... his curveball was nasty, I'll tell you that. Enough to make your knees buckle. Bert was tcher—a dominating pitcher."

Lee Smith waited a long time for "the call." The role of closer is probably second only to that of designated hitter when it comes to Hall of Fame "worthy" debates. He was on the ballot for 15 years, falling short of the 75% mark required for election.

During that time, he found solace in the spirit of the man who had originally scouted him, Buck O'Neil. Buck, a great friend of our franchise and who twice graced our winter sports banquet, was the man who spoke for 17 Negro League players inducted into Cooperstown in 2006. Yet Buck, himself, fell short of election to the Hall.

"All the years and all the things he went through, I never heard him say a bad word about one soul," Lee said of Buck.

It was O'Neil who scouted him and , at age 17, Lee was selected by the Cubs in the second round (28th overall) in the 1975 draft, in part based on Buck's recommendation.

When the Today's Game Era Committee (an of the Veteran's Committee) met to review candidates for the Hall in December of 2018, the 12-member panel made Lee Smith a unanimous selection.


One of the members of that committee ... was Bert Blyleven.

Almost every kid on the planet dreams of being a big leaguer at some point. A great image of that moment in Lee Smith's childhood comes from his recollection of some pretty cool target practice. As Lee recalled, "My brother and I used to throw little plum peaches that grew on our property by our mailbox. We tried to hit the on the mailbox. I guess that is why I have always had pretty good control."

It took a while for that control to manifest itself from the pitchers' mound in West Texas (see below) and his other stops in the minors. But he rediscovered that command when he got to Wrigley Field and went from throwing "little plum



2005: Andre had a true breakout year, hitting .319 with 18 HR & 80 RBI and was named Texas League Player of the Year. The power


For a high school player to be drafted in the second round and choose not to sign might best be described as "risky." Troy was selected by the San Diego Padres in the second round of the 1994 draft out of Carlsbad (California) High School but elected, instead, to attend UCLA. The decision would be both brave ... and wise. The Angels selected him, after his junior season with the Bruins, with the third overall pick in the 1997 draft.

He did not play professionally in '97, instead starting his pro career here (see left) the following April.

A pro debut at the AA level is very unusual (in fact, it's rare) and was likely dictated by his contract (he played precisely 50 games before moving up to AAA, another move that may have been "in writing").

Contractual or not, his time in the minors was brief.

In 50 games here with the Angels, Troy hit .309 with 19 home runs. Projected over a full Texes League ceason, that's 50 Hz , and that's "tarefied air" in the minors.

The 1998 Texas League season marked the end of our franchise "Angels Era" ... but the "finishing touch" came four years later, in the World Series.

The Los Angeles Angels were "born" in 1961, making this the 60th season in their existence. In their 59 years, the Angels have reached the World Series just once but, thanks in large part to a quintet of former Midland Angels, the Halos were victorious in that lone trip to the Fall Classic.

Troy Glaus led the way with a monster Series, going 10-for-26 (.385), with three home runs and eight runs batted in. He scored seven runs and added four walks (for a 1.313 OBP) and was named the World Series MVP. Troy was brilliant throughout, beginning with a pair of solo home runs in Game 1 (he hit .347 in his career in the postseason). His biggest swing, though, came in Game 6.

The Giants had taken a 3-games-to-2 lead and were eight outs away from winning the Series, holding a 5-0 lead with one out in the last of the seventh. A two-run double Glaus' bat was part of a three-run rally that turned the game around and the Angels scored three more in the eighth to square the Series with a 6-5 win. Had he not been named MVP, the honor would have gone to ...

Tim Salmon, who went 9-for-26 (.346) and matched Glaus's total of seven runs, hitting two home runs while driving in e. Both of his homers came in Game 2 ... both came with a man on base ... and the second (in the last of the eighth) was the eventual game-winner in a wild, 11-10 win that squared the Series at a game apiece.

Garret Anderson (who ranks among the LA Angels' all-time leaders in virtually every e category) hit a solid .281 (9-for-32) and drove in six runs. Half of his ribbies came on the Series' most important swing - - a thr ence in Game 7.

Troy Percival was certainly the "Most Valuable Pitcher" in the Series, earning saves in three of the Angels' four wins. He allowed just one run in his three appearances, and that lone run came on a solo homer the bats of a guy named Barry Bonds (in the crazy, 11-10, second game). His third save came in Game 7 (a "dream" for any closer) and was followed by the iconic moment pictured here.

Bengie Molina hit .286 to go with his (as always) brilliant defense behind the dish. **Orlando Palmeiro, Ramon Ortiz** (Game 2 winning pitcher), **Scott Schoeneweis**, **Jarrod Washburn** and **Shawn Wooten** were the other franchise alums who played in the Series, as did former Midland Cub **Shawon Dunston** (with the Giants).

In 2015, the Orange County Register named its All-Time LA Angels team and we can't imagine much has changed since). The team includes Hall of Famers Nolan Ryan and Vladimir Guerrero, Mike Trout (who will join them in the Hall) e players from our "Angels Era" (1985-98):

The amazing website Baseball Reference (baseballreference.com) tells us that just shy of 20,000 (19, 960) players had appeared in the Major Leagues (through 2019). That number provides some very good perspective on Troy's career.

Of the 20,000 ... 333 players have been elected to Cooperstown.

Of the hitters (roughly 10,000), 148 hitters have 300 (or more) home runs, with a group of about a dozen more soon to reach that plateau (so we'll say 160).

In both cases, that number represents about one-and-a-half percent of every player (or hitter) in big league history.

Relative to hitting 300 home runs ... of every 200 hitters, three accomplish the feat.

Troy was not named on any of 2015's Hall ballots and, as a result, was not included after that year. But just to be listed is remarkable. We could not (anywhere) the exact number of players to have appeared on the Hall's ballots over the years, but some "rough math" says that to see your name appear, you must have been among the top 15 percent y ... among the best to ever play the game.

That, along with four All-Star selections ... two Silver Slugger Awards ... a World Series ring and being the MVP of that World Series ... adds up to a very impressive resume.
