

RIBAULT TROJANS TAKE SECOND STRAIGHT HIGH SCHOOL HERITAGE CLASSIC

The Ribault High School Trojans bested the Raines High School Vikings 8-3 in five innings on Feb. 15 at 121 Financial Ballpark to win the High School Heritage Classic, taking the A. Philip Randolph Cup for the second time in the four-year Classic history.

Both teams wore customized Jacksonville Red Caps uniforms to commemorate the Negro American League team that played in Jacksonville from 1938 until 1942. Ribault High School won the A. Philip Randolph Cup, which honors the legacy of local Civil Rights icon Asa Philip Randolph.

After Raines opened the scoring with two runs in the top of the first inning, Ribault plated three in the bottom of the first inning to grab the lead. The Trojans added in each of the remaining innings to secure the win.



JAX IN THE WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC

The 2023 World Baseball Classic ended with Team Japan taking down defending champion Team USA for their first WBC title since 2009. There were several former Jacksonville player involved in this year's classic.

From the 2022 Jumbo Shrimp, Richard Bleier, Jake Fishman, and Ryan Lavarnway represented Team Israel. Also from last season, Ray-Patrick Didder was on Team Netherlands, while Lorenzo Quintana (pictured left) played for Team Cuba. Pablo Lopez and Elieser Hernandez were on Team Venezuela along with former Jumbo Shrimp reliever José Quijada.

Other former Jacksonville players included Austin Barnes for Team Mexico, Jake Esch, McKenzie Mills and Anfernee Seymour played for Great Britain. JT Realmuto and former manager Dino Ebel reprensented Team USA.



IT'S A HIT WITH THE JUMBO SHRIMP

is splitter darts down at the last second, almost like a pelican preying on a fish in water. It's Eli Villalobos' signature pitch, one that confuddled hitters all season long, first in Double-A and then in Triple-A following a promotion.

The pitch is natural to him, as if he's been throwing it for years, maybe even a decade. Only, he hasn't; he learned the splitter in the beginning of the season, a mere months ago. As that pitch has taken off, so has his career, stemming in his recent addition the Miami Marlins' 40-man roster.

Perhaps diving into the splitter is the perfect analogy for Villalobos' pitching career; it seemed so natural that he had to have been doing it forever. Yet it's something that he almost casually picked up that, in an instant, magically took.

For nearly as long as he's played baseball, even counting the time so far in his professional career, Villalobos has mainly been a catcher. He started behind the plate around 10 years old, continuing to backstop through high school and his first season of junior college. Including the 2022 season, he's been a full-time pitcher for only six years; there are some pitchers that spend that much time in the college ranks alone.

"It's (pitching and catching) similar when you're in the game," said Villalobos. "As a pitcher, you're in control of so much, but as a catcher, you're so important to every play. You always have something you're in charge of each play, each pitch, you have something going on. I do miss catching, but I have a lot of fun when I'm on the mound."

After hitting .292 as a catcher and part-time first baseman in his final season at Sonora High School (Calif.), Villalobos caught nine games at Golden West College (Calif.), where he went 8-for-18 (.444) at the plate. He had signed up to play in a collegiate summer league, with his aim to return to Golden West as a catcher for the 2017 season. But, with one decision, everything changed.

"I was planning on going back to catch for a second year," Villalobos said. "I was playing in a small summer ball tournament. It was local, nothing big. I caught the first seven innings of a game and we needed an arm to throw the last two, and I volunteered."

You never know who might be watching. It's a mantra that players hear all the time as they work to catch a lucky break to get noticed by a team or school.

Villalobos didn't know it at the time, but Long Beach State's then-new pitching coach, Dan Ricabal, was sitting in the stands, watching. He was at the game to scout someone else, but when Villalobos entered in the eighth inning, he could not take his eyes off this tall, slender right-hander.


"I went up there and threw nothing but fastballs for two innings. I didn't know how to throw anything else," said Villalobos. "And the new pitching coach for Long Beach State was there looking at the starter for the other team and got in contact with my coaches after that game and basically just said he thinks I should keep pitching. A couple weeks after that, I threw my first-ever bullpen in front of him and the head coach for Long Beach, and got offered a scholarship after that and went there for that next year."

You never know who might be watching. What if Villalobos hadn't volunteered that day? Would someone else have eventually looked at his frame and arm and put him on the mound? Would he have progressed far as a catcher? Or would his career be over, and instead of preparing for the chance to maybe make his major league debut at some point in 2023, would he be doing something completely different with his life?

As if he had been pitching forever, Villalobos needed no transitional period to the mound, let alone doing so at one of the top Division I programs in the country. He helped the Dirtbags to the nation's eighth-best staff ERA, a 42-20-1 record, Big West Conference Championship and NCAA Tournament appearance. It marked the program's most wins in nearly 20 years, with Villalobos pitching to a 3.56 ERA in 23 games. And although Long Beach State faltered a bit the following season, falling to fifth in the conference, it was not because of the performance of Villalobos, who posted a 3.72 ERA in 28 games, including two starts.

You never know who might be watching. The catcher who volunteered one day to be a pitcher and earned a scholarship as a result heard his name called at the 2018 MLB First-Year Player Draft. Clearly, at some point during his two years at Long Beach State, the Marlins had seen something they liked. With their 14th round selection, Miami plucked Villalobos. He was the 417th overall pick.

However, this time, Villalobos struggled with a transition. He posted a 6.10 ERA across three levels in 2018 following the draft. With Short Season A Batavia in 2019, his ERA improved just barely to 6.08.

Even after a solid 2021 season (3.63 ERA, 14.5 K/9 between Low-A Jupiter and High-A Beloit), Villalobos' career ERA in 112.2 minor league innings was a grisly 5.11. Something needed to change. Luckily, Double-A Pensacola pitching coach Dave Eiland had a potential answer.

Part of Villalobos' troubles in the professional ranks stemmed from his inability to throw a consistently strong changeup. Sure, his fastball velocity was in the mid-to-high 90s, but he needed another pitch. Eiland asked Villalobos, what about a splitter instead?

"He (Eiland) brought it up to me. I couldn't throw a changeup to save my life, it was never any good," Villalobos said.
"He asked me if I had ever thrown a splitter, and we played with some different grips, just worked on it in catch-play pretty repeatedly until I got comfortable with it and started breaking it out into games. The more we threw it, the more natural it felt and I started to get the feel for the release point and how I needed to pronate it that little bit, the grips, all that, and it's just become very comfortable. I would say it's my go-to pitch right now."

What about a splitter instead? Debuting it in real games at a new level a mere weeks after learning the pitch, Villalobos registered a 3.38 ERA with 75 strikeouts in 61.1 innings (11.0 K/9) for Double-A Pensacola. On August 21, he earned a promotion to Triple-A Jacksonville.

The results for the Jumbo Shrimp were exactly like Villalobos experienced when he picked up pitching for the first time, and years later, when he learned the splitter: natural, as if he'd been doing this forever.

The La Habra, Calif., native yielded a lone unearned run over his first 10 Triple-A appearances, ceding only seven hits in 14.0 innings. He finished the Jumbo Shrimp campaign with a sparkling 1.04 ERA and 26 punchouts in 17.1 frames (13.5 K/9). Weeks later, the Marlins added him to the 40-man roster to protect him from the Rule 5 draft.

"We worked on the changeup for years and just couldn't figure it out," said Villalobos. "I think that the splitter just really plays into the high arm slot I have now. Being so over-

the-top, it just sort of helps it flow out of the fingers."

That makes it sound so simple. It flows out of the fingers.

But think back to what Villalobos said about pitching: It's fun
to be on the mound.

Perhaps there's the lesson of all this right there. Why not try, why not embrace something new, simplify it and enjoy the ride?

Eli Villalobos dominated Triple-A as if he'd been there all along this journey. As if he didn't learn pitching just six years ago. As if he didn't learn how to throw his signature roller-coaster-dropping splitter six months ago.

In mere months, he could get the call to the major leagues. If his career is any indication, it might seem pretty clear early on that this one-time catcher was meant to pitch in the big leagues all along.

Bragan Field at 121 Financial Ballpark, which opened in 2003, is one of the premier Minor League ballparks in North America.

The ballpark was the first completed project of the Better Jacksonville Plan. Featuring an old-fashioned design, brick facade and a grass seating berm, 121 Financial Ballpark reminds fans of the days of yesteryear and preserves all of the wonderful tradition baseball has to offer. The vivid sight lines capture the action up-close while providing fans with comfortable seating and easy access to concessions and restrooms.

121 Financial Ballpark features 12 luxury skyboxes, four skydecks, HD videoboards in left field and along the out-field walls, and a one-of-a-kind Tiki Terrace at the left field corner.

The ballpark has hosted three Major League Baseball exhibitions (2006, 2010, 2015), four ACC Baseball Tournaments (2006-09) and two Southern League All-Star games (2003, 2013). The 2013 Southern League All-Star game boasted a league-record 9,373 fans in attendance.

In 2016, owner Ken Babby invested \$1.8 million into the ballpark to add a new groups area directly behind the home

bullpen, a Tiki Terrace near the left-field foul pole, renovations to all 12 private suites and expansion of the suite-level, third-floor lounge to give all fans a climate-controlled space to overlook the playing field.

Since 2007, 121 Financial Ballpark has hosted a game in the annual college baseball series between in-state rivals, Florida State and Florida. The annual installment brings capacity crowds to 121 Financial Ballpark for their storied rivalry.

The ballpark features nearly 6,000 stadium-style chairs and can accommodate more than 11,000 fans with berm and bleacher seating. Has 12 luxury skyboxes and four sky decks, each of which having private seating. Ballpark is also completely wheelchair accessible, including the dugouts, camera wells and playing field.

The total estimated cost is \$34 million, paid for by Jack-sonville residents as part of a tax approved in 2000 to fund the "Better Jacksonville Plan," an initiative to improve the city's infrastructure. The adjacent Jacksonville Veterans Memorial Arena was also funded through the plan and was completed in November 2003.

HOW TO KEEP SCORE



BASEBALL BASICS: HOW TO KEEP SCORE

DIFFERENT FANS have different methods of keeping a scorecard, and many use their own notations. But here's a simple method:


If the hitter grounds out to shortstop, for example, write in "6-3," which shows the shortstop threw him out at first base. If the hitter flies out to left field, write a "7."

If the batter gets a hit, write in the hit according to which base he reached. Each corner of the box represents a base, with the lower-right corner being first.

If he singles, put a "-" in the lower right. If he doubles, write a "=" in the upper right, and so on. For a walk, use "BB" in the lower right. As the runner advances, mark the appropriate symbol in the appropriate corner.

If a runner scores, put a circle at the bottom of the box, and inside the circle put the symbol of the play and/or the player that drove him in. For example, if the No. 5 hitter drives in two runs with a single, mark his single in the bottom right of his box and mark a circle with the number "5" in it in the boxes of the runners who score. (Some people like to use uniform numbers here, so you can tell who did what, even after lineup changes.)

At the end of each inning, total the hits and runs for that inning only. At the end of the game you'll be able to add the innings total to get the game score





MEET THE 2023 JUMBO SHRIMP COACHING STAFF By: Scott Kornberg

After eclipsing 1,300 managerial wins in 2022, Daren Brown returns as Jacksonville's manager for the second consecutive season in 2023. The Jumbo Shrimp staff will also feature holdovers Jeremy Powell (pitching coach) and Jose Ceballos (defensive coach). Former Jacksonville Expo Greg Colbrunn will take over as the team's hitting coach while Victor Di Diego will be the team's video manager. Sandy Krum will serve as the club's athletic trainer with Tim Rodmaker back as the strength & conditioning coach.

In Brown's first season with Jacksonville in 2022, the Jumbo Shrimp finished with an 80-69 (.537) record, placing third in the International League East Division. After stellar performances throughout the season, the Jumbo Shrimp saw 12 players from their 2022 roster make their major league debuts. Brown also juggled a franchise-record 79 players, including Jacksonville highs for both pitchers (39) and starting pitchers (25).

Powell enters his 11th season in Miami's organization and his fifth as the club's Triple-A pitching coach, including his third year with the Jumbo Shrimp. In 2022, Powell guided the Jacksonville staff to top-five rankings in the International League East in shutouts (1st, 12), ERA (T-3rd, 4.19) and saves (T-5th, 38). His tenure with the Marlins began with the GCL Marlins (2012-13) before rising to

Low-A Greensboro (2014-15), High-A Jupiter (2016-17) and Triple-A New Orleans (2018-19). Powell's coaching career commenced in 2010 with the Diamondbacks as a pitching coach for the amateur development summer scout teams.

Originally drafted by the Montreal Expos in the fourth round of the 1994 draft out of Highlands High School (Calif.), Powell pitched for the Expos from 1998-2000. He also played in Japan's Nippon Professional Baseball from 2001-08, compiling a 3.97 ERA and recording 10-plus wins in four campaigns. Powell's playing career concluded with Triple-A Indianapolis in the Pirates' farm system in 2009-10.

After worked the last three years as a hitting consultant for the Marlins in their minor league system, Colbrunn will join the 2023 season as the Jumbo Shrimp's hitting coach. Prior to his time with the Marlins, he spent 2017-18 seasons as a minor league hitting coordinator for the New York Yankees.

Colbrunn moved into coaching in 2006 as the hitting coach for the Charleston RiverDogs, then a Yankees affiliate in the South Atlantic League, until 2010. He was named the manager of the RiverDogs for the 2010 season before moving back into the hitting coach role again for

the 2011-12 seasons. Following his six-year stint in the Yankees' organization, he was added to John Farrell's staff as a hitting instructor for the Boston Red Sox for 2013 and 2014 seasons. During the Red Sox championship 2013 campaign, the Red Sox led the majors in runs scored (853), runs per game (5.27), slugging (.446), OBP (.349), OPS (.795), total bases (2,521) and extra-base hits (570).

Prior to his coaching career, Colbrunn was selected by the Montreal Expos in the sixth round of the 1987 draft out of Fontana High School (Calif.). He played with the Double-A Jacksonville Expos in both 1989 and 1990 before debuting in the major leagues with Montreal in 1992. During his 13-year big league career with the Expos, Marlins, Twins, Braves, Rockies, D-backs and Mariners, Colbrunn hit .289 with a .799 OPS. He has won two World Series titles, first with the 2001 Diamondbacks and later while coaching the 2013 Red Sox.

The 2021 Marlins' Staff Member of the Year, Ceballos returns as Jacksonville's defensive coach for the fifth time in six years. The 2023 season will mark his 11th campaign in Miami's system. Last season while guiding Jacksonville's defense, Ceballos helped the Jumbo Shrimp to a leaguehigh 149 double plays. The club also ranked fourth in caught stealing percentage (24.5 percent).

A native of Caracas, Venezuela, Ceballos played in the Marlins' organization from 2007-13, reaching as high Double-A Jacksonville for a one-game stint in 2012. He began coaching with the Marlins in 2014 with Greensboro. After two seasons with the Grasshoppers, Ceballos spent the 2016 campaign as a coach with Jupiter before joining the Jumbo Shrimp's staff from 2017-19.

Rodmaker is also part of the Jacksonville staff for the second year in a row. Prior to joining the Marlins' organization, he spent 15 seasons in the Chicago White Sox organization as a strength & conditioning coach. He served in the same role with High-A Winston-Salem in 2021 (also 2013) and Double-A Birmingham from 2015-20. He also logged time

with Low-A Kannapolis from 2007-09 and 2011-12 and Rookie-level Great Falls in both 2010 and 2014. An Indiana native, Rodmaker interned at DePaul University as its strength & conditioning room assistant before joining the White Sox.

A native of Lincolnwood, Ill., Krum's athletic training experience dates back to 1987 in the Cincinnati Reds' organization. After four years with the Reds, Krum worked in the Pittsburgh Pirates' organization from 1991-2000, winning the Minor League Athletic Trainer of the Year Award in 1994 and 1998. He moved to the big leagues as the Chicago Cubs' assistant athletic trainer from 2001-04. Following his time with the Cubs, Krum worked with the men's Pro Tennis Circuit (USTA), and also earned a coveted medical team position at the 2006 Men's US Open. In 2007, he moved to NBC to work as a certified athletic trainer with the show, *The Biggest Loser*. He then served as the CEO of SAK Group, Inc. in Chicago from 2013-19 before joining the Marlins' oganization in 2019.

A native of Palm Beach Gardens, Fla., Di Diego enters his second season in the Marlins' organization. He spent the 2022 season as the video manager for Low-A Jupiter. Di Diego graduated with his MBA in Business/Sport Business Management from the University of Central Florida in 2019.



DAREN BROWN I MANAGER I SECOND SEASON

After eclipsing 1,300 career managerial wins during the 2022 season, Daren Brown returns as Jacksonville's manager for the second consecutive campaign.

In Brown's first year with Jacksonville in 2022, the Jumbo Shrimp finished with an 80-69 (.537) record.

placing third in the International League East Division. After stellar performances throughout the season, the Jumbo Shrimp saw 12 players from their roster make their major league debuts. Brown also juggled a franchise-record 79 players, including Jacksonville highs for both pitchers (39) and starting pitchers (25).

A native of Holdenville, Okla., Brown holds a 1,340-1,325 (.503) record as a minor league manager. The 55-year-old is currently in his third stint as a Triple-A skipper. He piloted Triple-A Tacoma in the Seattle Mariners' organization from 2007-13 and again in 2019, tallying 494 victories. which marks the most wins for any manager in Rainiers franchise history. Brown led Tacoma to consecutive division titles in 2009 and 2010, and during that latter season, helped the Rainiers win the franchise's first outright Pacific Coast League Championship since 1969. Over this time period, Brown also earned a pair of call ups to the Mariners' coaching staff, including a stint as the club's interim manager for the final 50 games of the 2010 season.

After working as Seattle's baserunning coordinator in 2014 and bunting and baserunning coordinator in 2015, Brown steered Double-A Jackson to a 84-55 (.604) record and Southern League Championship in 2016. He skippered Double-A Arkansas during the 2017-18 seasons before returning to Tacoma for the 2019 campaign. In 2021, Brown managed the Kinsport Axmen, a summer collegiate baseball team in the Appalachian League.

The son of former major leaguer Paul Brown, who pitched for parts of four seasons with the Philadelphia Phillies from 1961-63 and 1968, Daren was selected in the 29th round of the 1989 draft out of Southeastern Oklahoma State University. He pitched for five seasons in Toronto's organization from 1989-93, reaching as high as Double-A Knoxville. From 1994-99, Daren served as a player-coach (1994-97) and player-manager (1998-99) for Amarillo of the independent Texas-Louisiana League. He retired as a player following the 1999 season, which saw Brown win the circuit's Manager of the Year and Amarillo take the league championship, and managed the Dillas for one more season.




