TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 14, 2000: Roger Clemens tosses a one-hitter (9.0IP, 15K, 2BB) in the Yankees' 5-0 win over the Mariners in Game 4 of the ALCS. Clemens remains the only pitcher in baseball history to strike out at least 15 batters and allow one hit-or-fewer in a postseason game.

Oct. 14, 1978: The Yankees tie the World Series at two games apiece by defeating the Dodgers, 4-3, at Yankee Stadium. Lou Piniella delivers a two-out, "walk-off" single that scores Roy White in the 10th inning.

Oct. 14, 1976: Chris Chambliss' ninth-inning, "walk-off" HR off Royals pitcher Mark Littell gives the Yankees a 7-6 win and sends the club to the World Series for the first time since 1964. It also marks the club's first pennant with Principal Owner George Steinbrenner.

Oct. 14, 1964: Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle hit back-to-back homers during a five-run eighth inning that helps the Yankees defeat the Cardinals, 8-3, at Busch Stadium, forcing a seventh game in the World Series.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 15, 2001: After losing the first two games of the ALDS to Oakland, the Yankees complete their comeback with a 5-3 win over the A's in Game 5 at Yankee Stadium. New York's bullpen allows only two hits in 4.2 scoreless innings.

Oct. 15, 1923: Trailing 4-1, the Yankees score five runs in the top of the eighth inning en route to a 6-4 win over the Giants at the Polo Grounds, giving the Yankees a 4-games-to-2 World Series win for the franchise's first title in their inaugural season at Yankee Stadium.

OCTOBER BASEBALL: The Yankees will play Game 1 of the ALCS tonight vs. Cleveland.

- **Marks their 19th appearance in the ALCS, marking the most LCS appearances by any Major League team...marks their fourth trip to the ALCS in the last eight seasons** (since 2017; went to ALCS in '17, '19 and '22)...**their 19 trips to the ALCS are seven more than the next AL team** (Boston-12).
- **Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history** (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995)...their 25 trips to the postseason since 1995 are the most in the Majors in that span, four more than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the next highest AL team (Boston & Cleveland: 14).
- Are one of just four teams to make the playoffs in at least seven of the last eight years (since 2017), joining the Dodgers (eight: 2017-24), Astros (eight: 2017-24) and Braves (seven: 2018-24).

WHERE WE LEFT OFF: The Yankees advanced to the ALCS with a 3-1 win over the Royals at Kauffman Stadium on Thursday... **RHP Gerrit Cole** (7.0IP, 6H, 1R/ER, 0BB, 4K, 0HR) earned the win after allowing just 1R/ER over 7.0 innings... **RF Juan Soto** (1-for-4, 1RBI) hit an RBI single in the first inning... **2B Gleyber Torres** (2-for-5, 1R, 1 double, 1RBI) hit an RBI single in the fifth inning... **DH Giancarlo Stanton** (2-for-3, 1 double, 1RBI, 11BB) hit an RBI single in the sixth inning... **CF Aaron Judge** (1-for-2, 1R, 1 double, 2BB) reached base three times... **RHP Clay Holmes** (1.0IP, 1K) tossed a perfect eighth inning... **RHP Luke Weaver** (1.0IP, 2K) tossed a perfect ninth inning to earn his third save of the postseason.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager **Aaron Boone** is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

GAME WON: The Yankees are 7-3 in their first game of a playoff series since 2018 (lost 2018 ALDS Game 1 at Boston, 2021 AL Wild Card Game at Boston and 2022 ALCS Game 1 at Houston)...are 17-9 in their last 26 such games (since 2004 ALCS Game 1).

EN GARD! The Yankees are facing Cleveland in the postseason for the seventh time in franchise history and for the second time in the ALCS (also 1998)...the Yankees have won four of their six completed postseason series against the Guardians, including each of the last three and four of their last five: 2022 ALDS (3-2), 2020 ALWC (2-0), 2017 ALDS (3-2), 2007 ALDS (1-3), 1998 ALCS (4-2) and 1997 ALDS (2-3)...the Yankees are 15-12 in 27 postseason games vs. Cleveland.

- The Yankees are 4-2 vs. Cleveland this season and 22-10 vs. the Guardians since 2020 (including the postseason).
- **Including the postseason, have won each of their last seven series vs. the Guardians (since 2022) and nine of their last 10 series (since 2020).**
- **Including the postseason, are 27-8 vs. the AL Central this season and 95-42 since 2021.**

THE GREAT JUAN: OF **Juan Soto** has reached base in 7-of-18PA this postseason, batting .286/.389/.357 (4-for-14) with 1R, 1 double, 2RBI, 3BB and 1SF.

- **Has hit 3HR in six games vs. the Guardians this year**...has hit 4HR in his last eight games vs. Cleveland (since 6/14/23).
- **In his career against Cleveland's RHP Alex Cobb, has hit .636/.667/1.273 (7-for-11) with 1 double, 2HR and 1BB.**

PEN PAL: RHP **Tommy Kahnle** has tossed 3.0 scoreless innings this postseason...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 11 of his last 12 appearances (since 9/3), going 1-1 with one save, a 1.69 ERA (10.2IP, 2ER) and 12K...has not allowed a run in 17 of 21 career postseason appearances, going 2-0 with one save, a 2.96 ERA (24.1IP, 8ER) and 25K.

HIGH VOLTAGE: INF **Anthony Volpe** has reached base in 7-of-16PA this postseason, posting a .438 OBP in four games.

STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF **Giancarlo Stanton** hit .375/.444/.688 (6-for-16) with 1R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 4RBI, 2BB and 15B in four games in the ALDS...over the Yankees' last three games, has driven in four of the Yankees' eight runs...**his three go-ahead RBI matched the most by a Yankee in an ALDS** (also Don Mattingly's three go-ahead RBI in the 1995 ALDS)...only **Bernie Williams** (four in 1996 ALCS), **Chris Chambliss** (four in 1976 ALCS) and **Lou Gehrig** (four in 1928 World Series) have recorded more go-ahead RBI in a postseason series in franchise history (since RBI became an official stat in 1920).

- **Has recorded 28RBI in 31 career postseason games, including 27RBI in his last 25 playoff games** (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).
- Has hit .277/.344/.643 (31-for-112) with 17R, 5 doubles, 12HR, 28RBI, 13BB, 2SB and 3SF in 31 career postseason games...17 of his 31 hits have gone for extra bases.
- Hit his 12th career postseason HR with a go-ahead shot in the eighth inning in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City...**his 12HR are tied with Yogi Berra and Reggie Jackson for the sixth-most postseason home runs in franchise history**, trailing only **Bernie Williams** (22HR), **Derek Jeter** (20HR), **Mickey Mantle** (18HR), **Babe Ruth** (15HR) and **Aaron Judge** (13HR).
- **Is just the third player in Major League history to hit at least 12HR in his first 31 career postseason games**, joining **Carlos Beltrán** (14HR) and **Nelson Cruz** (13HR)...**his career 9.33 AB/HR (12HR/12AB) ratio in the postseason is the second-best in Major League history** (min. 100PA), trailing only **Babe Ruth** (8.60).

WALK IT OUT: **Yankees batters walked 27 times during the ALDS, their second-most walks ever in a division series** (32BB in five games in 1995)...the Yankees' 27BB are the most walks through their first four games of a postseason in franchise history (previous: 26BB in first four games in 2020).

- Have recorded at least 5BB in four straight games, matching their second-longest streak in the postseason in franchise history, trailing only a five-game streak from 1981 ALCS Game 3 - 1981 World Series Game 4.
- Their 5.78 PA/BB ratio this postseason is the best by any team in the playoffs.
- The Yankees' Major League-leading 672BB this year were their most in a single season in the last 21 years (since 2004) and most since their 684BB in 2003...marked just the fourth time in the last 74 years (since 1951) that the Yankees have recorded as many walks in a season (718BB in 1999, 684BB in 2003 and 676BB in 1997).

WHAT A RELIEF: **Yankees relievers did not allow an earned run over 15.2 innings in the ALDS and held the Royals to a .148/.207/.148 (8-for-54) slash line during the ALDS**...marked just the third time in Major League history a bullpen tossed at least 15.0 innings in a postseason series without allowing an ER (since ER became an official stat in 1913), joining the 2017 Los Angeles Dodgers (OER in 17.0IP in NLCS) and 1991 Minnesota Twins (OER in 18.1IP in ALCS).

DREAM WEAVER: RHP **Luke Weaver** recorded three saves and tossed 4.1 scoreless innings of relief over four appearances in the ALDS...**has not allowed an ER over his last 12 appearances (including the postseason), striking out 29-of-55B and holding opponents to a .115/.164/.135 (6-for-52) slash line over that stretch**...over his last 21 games (including the postseason since 8/16), has gone 3-0 with seven saves and a 0.75 ERA (24.0IP, 2ER) and 38K.

HOLMES SWEET HOLMES: RHP **Clay Holmes** has tossed 5.0 scoreless innings of relief over four appearances this postseason...**has not allowed a run over 13.0 innings in 10 career postseason relief appearances...his 13.0 scoreless inning streak is the second-longest scoreless streak by a Yankee to begin his postseason career**, trailing only **Mariano Rivera's** 16.0 scoreless inning streak to begin his postseason career.

- Including the postseason, has gone 2-0 with one save, a 1.38 ERA (13.0IP, 2ER) and 11K in his last 14 relief appearances (since 9/8).

GLEYSER DAY: INF **Gleyber Torres** reached base in 8-of-20PA during the ALDS (3H, 5BB), posting a .400 OBP in four games...scored four of the Yankees' 14R.

TONIGHT'S ALCS GAME 1 STARTING PITCHER: LHP CARLOS RODÓN (0-1, 9.82 ERA)

LHP Carlos Rodón will make his fourth career postseason appearance (third start) and his second with the Yankees in Game 1 of the ALCS tonight...made his postseason debut with the Yankees in ALDS Game 2 vs. Kansas City, recording the loss after allowing 4R/ER over 3.2IP (7H, 0BB, 7K, 1HR, 1WP)...**over his final 13 starts of the regular season from 7/14-9/27, went 7-2 with a 3.00 ERA (72.0IP, 57H, 26R/24ER, 27BB, 90K, 12HR)**...made 32 starts with the Yankees, going 16-9 with a 3.96 ERA (175.0IP, 157H, 81R/77ER, 57BB, 195K, 31HR)...**his 16 wins and 32 starts were both career highs...his 195K and 175.0IP marked his second-most in a single season in his career**, trailing only his 237K and 178.0IP in 2022 with San Francisco...**was tied for second in the AL and tied for third in the Majors in wins**...also ranked fourth in the AL in K/9.0IP (10.03), tied for fifth in starts, and ranked seventh in strikeouts...**allowed 3R-or-fewer in 24 of his 32 starts, including 2R-or-fewer in 20 starts and one-or-zero runs in 11 starts**...his 195K were the 10th-most by a Yankees left-handed pitcher in franchise history and the most since CC Sabathia recorded 197K in 2012...recorded at least 6K in 18 of his starts and at least 8K in nine of those starts...allowed 5H-or-fewer in 22 of his starts this season, including 3H-or-fewer in 10 of those starts...since 2021, ranks fourth in the Majors with an 11.14 K/9.0IP ratio, trailing only Blake Snell (11.99), Shohei Ohtani (11.39) and Dylan Cease (11.20)...ranks seventh in double-digit strikeout games (19) over that span, trailing only Gerrit Cole (24), Snell (22), Corbin Burnes (21), Cease (21), Kevin Gausman (21) and Ohtani (20)...has recorded at least 10K and 0BB in seven games, tied for the fifth-most such games in the Majors during that stretch...trails only Jacob deGrom (10), Cole (nine), Burnes (nine) and Gausman (nine)...is a two-time All-Star (2021 and 2022)...was selected by the Chicago White Sox in the first round (third overall) of the 2014 First-Year Player Draft...signed a six-year Major League contract with the Yankees extending through the 2028 season on 12/21/22.

2024: Made 32 starts with the Yankees, going 16-9 with a 3.96 ERA (175.0IP, 157H, 81R/77ER, 57BB, 195K, 31HR)...**allowed 3R-or-fewer in 24 of his 32 starts, including 2R-or-fewer in 20 starts and one-or-zero runs in 11 starts.**

- ✦ **His 16 wins and 32 starts were both career highs...his 195K and 175.0IP marked his second-most in a single season in his career**, trailing only his 237K and 178.0IP in 2022 with San Francisco.
- ✦ **Was tied for second in the AL and tied for third in the Majors in wins**...also ranked fourth in the AL in K/9.0IP (10.03), tied for fifth in starts, and ranked seventh in strikeouts.
- ✦ His 195K were the 10th-most by a Yankees left-handed pitcher in franchise history and the most since CC Sabathia recorded 197K in 2012...recorded at least 6K in 18 of his starts and at least 8K in nine of those starts.
- ✦ Allowed 5H-or-fewer in 22 of his starts this season, including 3H-or-fewer in 10 of those starts.
- ✦ **Went 8-1 with a 2.69 ERA (60.1IP, 42H, 19R/18ER, 9BB, 56K, 9HR) over a 10-start span from 4/22-6/10**...nine of his 10 starts in that span were quality starts...tossed at least 6.0IP in nine of those starts...allowed 2R-or-fewer in eight of those starts and one-or-zero runs in five starts...of his 19R/18ER allowed over that span, 7R/6ER came in his start on 5/2 at Baltimore.
- ✦ Over his final 13 starts of the year (7/14-9/27), went 7-2 with a 3.00 ERA (72.0IP, 24ER) and 90K...the Yankees went 8-5 in those starts...allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 10 of those 13 starts.
- ✦ In five September starts, went 2-0 with a 2.20 ERA (28.2IP, 7ER) and 34K.

ON A ROLL: **Over his final 13 starts in the regular season from 7/14-9/27, went 7-2 with a 3.00 ERA (72.0IP, 57H, 26R/24ER, 27BB, 90K, 12HR)**...allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 10 of those 13 starts, including one-or-zero earned runs in five of those starts...recorded 42K over his last six starts of the season from 8/28-9/27 (34.1IP).

- ✦ Tossed at least 6.0IP in four of his last seven starts of the season (8/23-9/27).
- ✦ Won seven of his last 12 starts of the season (7/22-9/27) after going winless in his previous six starts from 6/15-7/14.

HOME SWEET HOME: Went 9-2 with a 3.11 ERA (81.0IP, 61H, 31R/28ER, 27BB, 91K, 15HR) in 14 regular season starts at home this season...allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 13 of those starts, including 2ER-or-fewer in 11 starts.

- ✦ **Over his last eight home starts of the regular season from 7/3-9/27, went 5-1 with a 2.54 ERA (46.0IP, 30H, 15R/13ER, 19BB, 56K, 9HR)....allowed 3ER-or-fewer in all eight starts, including one-or-zero runs in three starts.**

POSTSEASON CAREER: Will make his fourth career postseason appearance (third start) and his second with the Yankees in Game 1 of the ALCS tonight...has made three career postseason appearances (two starts), going 0-2 with an 11.37 ERA (6.1IP, 11H, 8ER, 4BB, 10K, 1HR).

- ✦ Made his Yankees postseason debut in ALDS Game 2 vs. Kansas City, recording the loss after allowing 4R/ER over 3.2IP (7H, 0BB, 7K, 1HR, 1WP).
- ✦ His other two postseason appearances were with the White Sox...made his postseason debut in Game 3 of the 2020 AL Wild Card Series at Oakland, allowing 2ER in relief without recording an out (1H, 2BB/1BB)...made his first career postseason start in Game 4 of the 2021 ALDS vs. Houston, recording the loss after allowing 2ER in 2.2IP (3H, 2BB, 3K, 0HR, 1HP).

- Recorded at least 1K in each of his final seven appearances of the season from 9/4-29...matched the third-longest streak of his career, trailing only his 10 straight games with at least 1K from 9/20/17-5/4/18 and eight straight games from 9/12/23-3/30/24 (also seven straight games from 8/15-27/17).

#0 MARCUS STROMAN—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (also 2015-16 with Toronto).
- Did not appear on the Yankees' ALDS roster vs. Kansas City.
- In five career postseason starts, has gone 1-1 with a 4.40 ERA (30.2IP, 29H, 16R/15ER, 7BB, 21K, 4HR).
- In his first season with the Yankees, went 10-9 with one save and a 4.31 ERA (154.2IP, 167H, 81R/74ER, 60BB, 113K, 19HR) in 30 games (29 starts)...opponents batted .277/.349/.431 (167-for-603, 19HR); LH .296/.372/.474 (86-for-291, 10HR); RH .260/.327/.391 (81-for-312, 9HR).
- Allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 20 of his 29 starts, 2ER-or-fewer in 14 of those starts and 1ER-or-fewer in 11 of those starts.
- His 49.8 groundball percentage was the fourth-highest in the AL and eighth-highest in the Majors (min. 150.0IP).
- Was named by Major League Baseball as the Yankees' 2024 nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award on 9/9...marked his third career nomination (also 2017 with Toronto and '23 with Chicago-NL).
- Earned his first save of the season (second of career) on 9/17 at Seattle after allowing 1R/ER over 3.0 innings of relief (5H, 0BB, 3K, 1HR)...marked his first relief appearance of the season and the ninth of his career (first since 9/16/23 at Arizona with Chicago-NL).

#30 LUKE WEAVER—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the first time in his career.
- Pitched in all four games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City, earning three saves after tossing 4.1IP (2H, 5K)...is the third player in franchise history to record three saves in a Division Series, joining Goose Gossage in 1981 and Mariano Rivera in 2000...is also one of 13 players in Major League history to record three saves in a Division Series.
- Tossed 1.2 scoreless innings in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City (2H)...became the third player in franchise history (since saves became an official stat in 1969) to record a five-out save in one of their first three career postseason appearances, joining Tommy Kahnle's six-out save (ALDS Game 4 vs. Cleveland in 2017) and Ken Clay's 11-out save (ALCS Game 1 at Kansas City in 1978).
- In 62 relief appearances for the Yankees, went 7-3 with four saves and a 2.89 ERA (84.0IP, 52H, 28R/27ER, 26BB, 103K)...opponents batted .176/.248/.334 (52-for-296, 10HR); LH .162/.253/.261 (23-for-142, 3HR); RH .188/.244/.403 (29-for-154, 7HR)...set a career high in appearances and tied his career high in wins (also 2017 and '18 with St. Louis).
- His 103K were the most by a Yankees reliever in a single season since Dellin Betances (115K in 2018)...were also tied with Jay Howell (103K in 1984) and Rich Gossage (103K in 1980) for the eighth-most by a Yankees reliever in a single season, trailing only Betances (135K in 2014, 131K in 2015, 126K in 2016 and 115K in 2018), Mariano Rivera (130K in 1996), Gossage (122K in 1978) and Joe Page (114K in 1947).
- Among Major League relievers this season, ranked third in innings pitched (84.0IP, first in AL) and tied for third in strikeouts (103, tied for third in AL).
- Recorded four-or-more outs in 31 of his 62 outings this season, the fourth-most among Major League relievers, trailing Michael Tonkin (35), Ryan Yarbrough (34) and Pedro Avila (33)...20 of those 31 appearances were scoreless, tied for the fourth-most such games in the Majors among relievers, trailing only Tyler Holton (25), Derek Law (22) and Pedro Avila (21).
- Recorded five-or-more outs in 23 games this season, the fifth-most such games in the Majors among relievers...15 of those appearances were scoreless, the fifth-most such games in the Majors among relievers.
- Did not allow a run in 18 of his final 21 games from 8/3-9/29, including 15 of his final 17 appearances (8/16-9/29)...over his final 17 appearances, went 3-0 with four saves and a 0.92 ERA (19.2IP, 2ER) and 33K...posted a 15.10 K/9.0IP ratio during that stretch and held opponents to a .147/.227/.206 (10-for-68) slash line over that span.
- Recorded multiple strikeouts in 10 of his 12 appearances (including the postseason) since 9/6, striking out 29-of-55BF and posting a 17.02 K/9.0IP ratio (29K/15.1IP) over that span...has not allowed an earned run in that stretch going 3-0 with seven saves and a .115 opponents' BA (6-for-52) in those games.
