OCTOBER BASEBALL: The Yankees play Game 2 of the ALCS tonight vs. Cleveland.

- ▶ **Marks their 19th appearance in the ALCS, marking the most LCS appearances by any Major League team...marks their fourth trip to the ALCS in the last eight seasons** (since 2017; went to ALCS in '17, '19 and '22)...**their 19 trips to the ALCS are seven more than the next AL team** (Boston-12).
- ▶ Have advanced to the World Series in eight of their 11 previous ALCS when winning Game 1.
- ▶ **Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history** (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- ▶ Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995)...their 25 trips to the postseason since 1995 are the most in the Majors in that span, four more than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the next highest AL team (Boston & Cleveland: 14).

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees defeated the Guardians, 5-2, in ALCS Game 1 at Yankee Stadium on Monday...**LHP Carlos Rodón** (6.0IP, 3H, 1R/ER, OBB, 9K, 1HR) started and earned the win...**RF Juan Soto** (2-for-3, 1R, 1HR, 1RBI, 1BB) reached base three times and hit his eighth career postseason HR — his first as a Yankee — with a go-ahead solo HR in the third inning...**DH Giancarlo Stanton** (1-for-3, 2R, 1HR, 1RBI, 1BB) reached base three times and hit his 13th career postseason home run with a solo shot in the seventh inning...**2B Gleyber Torres** (1-for-4, 1R, 1BB), **1B Anthony Rizzo** (1-for-3, 1BB) and **LF Alex Verdugo** (1-for-3, 1BB) each reached base twice...**RHP Clay Holmes** (1.0IP, 1K) tossed a scoreless seventh inning...**LHP Tim Hill** (0.1IP, 3H, 1R/ER) allowed a run in the eighth inning...**RHP Luke Weaver** (1.2IP, 1BB, 4K) tossed 1.2 scoreless innings to record his fourth save of the postseason.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager **Aaron Boone** is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

EN GARD! The Yankees are facing Cleveland in the postseason for the seventh time in franchise history and for the second time in the ALCS (also 1998)...the Yankees have won four of their six completed postseason series against the Guardians, including each of the last three and four of their last five: 2022 ALDS (3-2), 2020 ALWCs (2-0), 2017 ALDS (3-2), 2007 ALDS (1-3), 1998 ALCS (4-2) and 1997 ALDS (2-3)...the Yankees are 16-12 in 28 postseason games vs. Cleveland.

- ▶ Including the postseason, the Yankees are 5-2 vs. Cleveland this season and 23-10 vs. the Guardians since 2020 (including the postseason).
- ▶ **Including the postseason, have won each of their last seven completed series vs. the Guardians (since 2022) and nine of their last 10 completed series (since 2020).**
- ▶ **Including the postseason, are 28-8 vs. the AL Central this season and 96-42 since 2021.**

THE GREAT JUAN: **OF Juan Soto** reached base three times and hit his eighth career postseason HR — his first as a Yankee — with a go-ahead solo HR in the third inning on Monday in ALCS Game 1...including the postseason, **has hit 4HR in seven games vs. the Guardians this year and has hit 5HR in his last nine games vs. Cleveland (since 6/14/23).**

- ▶ Has reached base in 10-of-22PA this postseason, batting .353/.455/.588 (6-for-17) with 2R, 1 double, 1HR 3RBI, 4BB and 15F.

WHAT A RELIEF: **Yankees relievers have posted a 0.48 ERA (18.2IP, 1ER) and 20K this postseason...have held opponents to a .167/.225/.167 (11-for-66) slash line.**

HOLMES SWEET HOLMES: RHP **Clay Holmes** has tossed 6.0 scoreless innings of relief over five appearances this postseason...**has not allowed a run over 14.0 innings in 11 career postseason relief appearances...his 14.0 scoreless inning streak is the second-longest scoreless streak by a Yankee to begin his postseason career,** trailing only Mariano Rivera's 16.0 scoreless inning streak to begin his postseason career.

- ▶ Including the postseason, has gone 2-0 with one save, a 1.29 ERA (14.0IP, 2ER) and 12K in his last 15 relief appearances (since 9/8).

STANTON ISLAND: **DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton** reached base twice and hit his 13th career postseason home run with a solo shot in the seventh inning in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland...**is just the third player in Major League history to hit at least 13HR in his first 32 career postseason games,** joining Carlos Beltrán (14HR) and Nelson Cruz (14HR)...**his career 8.85 AB/HR (13HR/115AB) ratio in the postseason is the second-best in Major League history** (min. 100PA), trailing only Babe Ruth (8.60)...including the postseason, the Yankees are 25-4 this year when Stanton homers.

- ▶ **His 13 career home runs are tied with Aaron Judge for the fifth-most postseason home runs in franchise history,** trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR), Mickey Mantle (18HR) and Babe Ruth (15HR).
- ▶ **Has recorded 29RBI in 32 career postseason games, including 28RBI in his last 26 playoff games** (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).
- ▶ Has hit .368/.455/.789 (7-for-19) with 3R, 2 doubles, 2HR, 5RBI, 3BB and 1SB in five games this postseason...over the Yankees' last four games, has driven in five of the Yankees' 13R.
- ▶ Has hit .278/.348/.661 (32-for-115) with 19R, 5 doubles, 13HR, 29RBI, 14BB, 2SB and 3SF in 32 career postseason games...18 of his 32 hits have gone for extra bases.

COLE TRAIN: RHP **Gerrit Cole** will make his fifth career postseason start vs. the Guardians tonight...**is 4-0 with a 1.98 ERA (27.1IP, 6ER) and 41K in four postseason starts against Cleveland...has allowed 2R-or-fewer and recorded at least 8K in each of those starts.**

- ▶ In 15 combined regular season and postseason starts vs. Cleveland, has gone 11-2 with a 2.59 ERA (100.2IP, 29ER) and 114K...as a Yankee, is 8-1 with a 2.64 ERA (64.2IP, 19ER) and 75K in 10 starts vs. Cleveland (regular season and postseason).
- ▶ Including the postseason, has recorded at least 8K in nine of his last 14 starts vs. Cleveland (since 5/27/18).

WALK IT OUT: **Yankees batters have walked 34 times this postseason, the most walks by any Major League team through their first five games of a postseason...also matches the most walks by any Major League team in a five-game span in the postseason** (the 1998 Yankees also recorded 34BB in five games from 1998 ALCS Game 4 - 1998 World Series Game 2).

- ▶ Have recorded at least 5BB in each of their five games this postseason, matching their longest streak in the postseason in franchise history (also had a five-game streak from 1981 ALCS Game 3 - 1981 World Series Game 4).

DREAM WEAVER: RHP **Luke Weaver** earned his fourth save of the postseason on Monday in ALCS Game 1 after striking out 4-of-6BF over 1.2 scoreless innings...**became the first Yankee and one of six players in Major League history to record four saves in his first five career postseason appearances** (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Cody Allen, Dennis Eckersley, Jason Isringhausen, Troy Percival and Brian Wilson...**also became the sixth pitcher in Major League history to have four saves in his team's first five games of a postseason** (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Dennis Eckersley (1988 with Oakland), Mark Wohlers (1996 with Atlanta), Neftali Feliz (2011 with Texas), Cody Allen (2016 with Cleveland) and Paul Sewald (2023 with Arizona).

- ▶ **Is the fourth player (ninth time) in franchise history to record multiple saves of at least five outs in a single postseason** (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Goose Gosage (six in 1981), Mariano Rivera (five in 2003, four in 2000 and '01, and two in 1998, '99, and 2009) and Aroldis Chapman (two in 2017)...**is the only Yankee to record at least two saves of at least five outs in his first five career postseason appearances and just the seventh pitcher in Major League history to accomplish the feat.**

▶ Is the first Major League pitcher since Kenley Jansen in 2017 to record three saves of more than three outs in a single postseason...is just the third pitcher in Major League history (since saves became an official stat in 1969) to record at least three saves of four-or-more outs in their first five career postseason games, joining Jurys Familia (three in 2015) and Byung-Hyun Kim (three in 2001).

- ▶ Has recorded four saves and has tossed 6.0 scoreless innings over five relief appearances this postseason...**has not allowed an ER over his last 13 appearances (including the postseason), striking out 33-of-61BF and holding opponents to a .105/.164/.123 (6-for-57) slash line over that stretch...**over his last 22 games (including the postseason since 8/16), has gone 3-0 with eight saves and a 0.70 ERA (25.2IP, 2ER) and 42K.

GLEYBER DAY: INF **Gleyber Torres** has reached base in 10-of-25PA this postseason (4H, 6BB), posting a .400 OBP in five games...has scored five of the Yankees' 19R this postseason.

#17 AARON BOONE—MANAGER

- Has reached the postseason in six of his seven managerial seasons with the Yankees (2018-22, '24).
- Guided the Yankees to their 59th postseason in franchise history and their 21st division title (since the Divisional Era began in 1969) with an AL-best 94-68 (.580) record in 2024...marked the Yankees 32nd consecutive winning season and seventh such season under Boone.
- Earned his 557th career managerial win on 6/11 at Kansas City, surpassing Billy Martin (556-385) for seventh place on the Yankees' all-time list.
- Managed his 1,000th game with the Yankees on 8/24 vs. Colorado.
- Earned his 600th career managerial win on 9/21 at Oakland, becoming the seventh Manager in Yankees history to accomplish the feat, joining Joe McCarthy (1,460-867-21), Joe Torre (1,173-767-2), Casey Stengel (1,149-696-6), Miller Huggins (1,067-719-10), Ralph Houk (944-806-7) and Joe Girardi (910-710).
- His 603 career managerial wins rank seventh on the Yankees' all-time list, trailing only Joe McCarthy (1,460-867-21), Joe Torre (1,173-767-2), Casey Stengel (1,149-696-6), Miller Huggins (1,067-719-10), Ralph Houk (944-806-7) and Joe Girardi (910-710).

#19 JON BERTI—INF

Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 3G

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (2020, '23-24).
- Did not play in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland.
- Was 2-for-7 with 1BB in two games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Made his first career Major League appearance at first base in ALDS Game 2... according to MLB Network/*Elias*, became the third player in Major League history to start at a position for the first time during the postseason (min. 300 regular season games played)...joined Cleveland's Carlos Santana (LF in Game 3 of 2016 World Series) and St. Louis' Jake Flowers (3B in Game 2 of 1931 World Series).
- In 25 games with the Yankees in the regular season, batted .273 (18-for-66) with 10R, 1HR, 6RBI, 6BB, 1HP and 5SB...appeared defensively at 3B (18G/17GS), 2B (2G/1GS) and LF (1G/0GS)...missed 111 team games this season on the injured list over two separate stints (4/11-5/4, 5/25-9/9).

#95 OSWALDO CABRERA—INF/OF

Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G

- Has made the postseason for the second time in his career (2022, '24).
- All three of his postseason hits in his career have gone for extra bases (2 doubles/1HR).
- Entered the game as a defensive replacement at 1B (Rizzo) in the ninth inning in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland (did not bat).
- Was 1-for-5 with 3BB in two games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- In 109 games with the Yankees, batted .247 (74-for-299) with 47R, 11 doubles, 8HR, 36RBI, 21BB, 1HP, 4SB and 35F...appeared defensively at 3B (74G/62GS), 2B (13G/7GS), 1B (13G/5GS), SS (6G/4GS), RF (3G/1GS) and LF (3G/0GS)...posted career highs in runs scored, hits, home runs and RBI.
- Hit safely in 19 of his final 22 starts of the season from 7/6-9/28, batting .321 (26-for-81) with 17R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 9RBI, 8BB, 15F and 2SB in those games.

#13 JAZZ CHISHOLM JR.—INF/OF

Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (2020, '23-24).
- Was 0-for-4 in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland.
- Appeared in all four games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City (2-for-15, 2R, 1HR, 1RBI, 1BB, 1SB).
- Combined with the Marlins and Yankees to hit .256/.324/.436 (144-for-562) with 74R, 21 doubles, 4 triples, 24HR, 73RBI, 53BB and 40SB in 147 games...appeared defensively in centerfield (97G/95GS), at third base (45G/GS) and second base (3G/2GS)...marked his first career appearances at 3B...set career highs in hits, home runs, runs scored, RBI, doubles, walks, stolen bases, extra-base hits (49), total bases (245) and games played.
- Was one of four players in the Majors to record 20HR and 40SB, joining Cincinnati's Elly De La Cruz (25HR/67SB), Los Angeles-NL's Shohei Ohtani (54HR/59SB) and Cleveland's José Ramírez (39HR/41SB).
- In 46 games with the Yankees, batted .273/.325/.500 (48-for-176) with 28R, 7 doubles, 11HR, 23RBI, 14BB and 18SB...hit safely in 33 of his 46 games with the Yankees and reached base safely in 35 of those games.
- Despite playing in only 46 games with the Yankees, ranked second on the team with 18SB, trailing only Anthony Volpe's 28SB...according to *Elias*, his 18SB match the fifth-most by a Yankee in his first 46 games with the club, trailing only Fritz Maisel (24SB in 1913), Rickey Henderson (22SB in 1985), Bert Daniels (19SB in 1910) and Dave Fultz (19SB in 1903)...Mickey Rivers (18SB in 1976), Willie Randolph (18SB in 1976) and Tommy L. McMillan (18SB in 1912) also recorded 18SB in their first 46 games with the club.

#89 JASSON DOMÍNGUEZ—OF

Current Postseason Hitting Streak: N/A

- Has made the postseason for the first time in his career.
- Did not appear in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland.
- Did not appear in the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Batted .179 (10-for-56) with 8R, 1 double, 2HR, 4RBI, 11BB and 5SB in 18 games over two stints (8/18, 9/9-end of season) with the Yankees...appeared defensively in LF (13G/12GS) and CF (4G/4GS).
- Began the season on the 60-day IL due to "Tommy John" reconstruction surgery recovery.
- Hit 6HR in his first 20 career games, tied with Shelley Duncan (6HR in 2007) and Steve Whitaker (6HR in 1966) for the third-most HR by a Yankee through their first 20 career games, trailing only Gary Sánchez (8HR from 2015-16) and Kevin Maas (7HR in 1990).

#12 TRENT GRISHAM—OF

Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G

- Has made the postseason four times (2019, '20, '22, '24).
- Did not appear in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland.
- Did not appear in the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Has hit .169 (11-for-65) with 10R, 1 double, 3HR, 7RBI, 9BB and 3HP in 19 postseason games...drove in a run in six straight postseason games from 2020 NLDS Game 2 - 2022 NLDS Game 1, becoming the first player in Padres history to collect an RBI in six consecutive postseason games (previous: Jim Leyritz - five straight games in 1998)...his seven-game postseason hitting streak from 2020 NLDS Game 1 - 2022 NLDS Game 1 matched the second-longest postseason hitting streak in Padres history, trailing only Tony Gwynn's eight-game streak in 1984 (Alan Wiggins also had a seven-game streak in 1984).
- Appeared in 76 games for the Yankees, batting .190 (34-for-179) with 21R, 8 doubles, 9HR, 31RBI, 22BB, 4HP, 2SF and 1SB...played in 69 games (52 starts) in centerfield.

#99 AARON JUDGE—OF

Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G

- Has made the postseason for the seventh time in his career (2017-22, '24).
- Was 0-for-2 with 1R, 1RBI, 1BB and 1SF in ALCS Game 1 vs. Cleveland...hit a sac fly in the fourth inning.
- Appeared in all four games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City (2-for-13, 2R, 1 double, 5BB, 1SB)...hit a double in the sixth inning in ALDS Game 4 (1-for-2, 1R, 1 double, 2BB, 1SB).
- Has 13HR in 49 career postseason games, tied with Giancarlo Stanton for the fifth-most postseason home runs by a Yankee in franchise history...trails only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR), Mickey Mantle (18HR) and Babe Ruth (15HR).
- His 5HR in 22 postseason games at Yankee Stadium are the most postseason home runs at the current Yankee Stadium.
- Has reached base in 20 of his 22 postseason games at Yankee Stadium.
- Has four career ALCS homers, tied for the fifth-most in Yankees history behind Bernie Williams (9HR), Derek Jeter (7HR), Graig Nettles (5HR) and Alex Rodriguez (5HR).
- His six go-ahead HR in the postseason rank fourth in Yankees history behind Babe Ruth (eight), Bernie Williams (eight) and Derek Jeter (seven).

JUDGE—cont.

- Hit .322/.458/.701 (180-for-559) with 122R, 36 doubles, 1 triple, 58HR, 144RBI, 133BB, 9HP, 2SF and 10SB in 158 games for the Yankees...set career highs in batting average, on-base percentage, slugging percentage, OPS (1.159), hits, doubles, RBI, walks, times on base (322), total bases (392), extra-base hits (95) and games played (158)...was named to his sixth career All-Star team (2017-18, '21-24).
- His Major League-leading 58HR were the fifth-most by a Yankee in a single season and tied for the fifth-most in AL history, trailing only his 62HR in 2022, Roger Maris' 61HR in 1961 and Babe Ruth's 60HR in 1927 and 59HR in 1921...became just the fourth player in Major League history and second Yankee to hit at least 58HR in multiple seasons, joining Sammy Sosa (three: 1998, '99, 2001), Mark McGwire (three: 1997, '98 and '99) and Babe Ruth (two: 1921 and '27).
