N.L. CENTRAL CHAMPIONS: The 2019 N.L. Central Champion St. Louis Cardinals concluded their 128th season of play by winning their 12th N.L. Central title and their first since 2015...the Cardinals took over sole possession of first place following their win on August 23 and held it for the remainder of the season, edging Milwaukee by 2.0 games.

AN ERA OF EXCELLENCE: Under the ownership of Bill DeWitt, Jr. and his partners, the Cardinals have posted a 2,131-1,755 (.548) record since 1996, advancing to the postseason 14 times. The Cardinals were N.L. Champions in 2004, 2006, 2011 and 2013 and captured their 10th World Championship in 2006 and their 11th World title in 2011. The Cardinals 72 postseason wins since 1996 are 2nd in the majors, behind only the Yankees (106). The Cardinals have advanced to the postseason in seven (2009, '11, '12, '13, '14, '15, '19) of their 12 seasons (2008-19) under President of Baseball Operations John "Mo" Mozeliak.

DIVISION DANDIES: The Cardinals won their first NL Central title since 2015 and a share of their 12th overall (co-winners with Houston in 2001)...the Cardinals have won outright NL Central titles in 1996, 2000, 2002, 2004, 2005, 2006, 2009, 2013, 2014, 2015 & 2019 since the division was formed in 1995.

CARDINALS & BRAVES: The Cardinals went 2-4 (1-2 at SunTrust) against the Braves in 2019, but have not faced each other since May 26. St. Louis leads its all-time series against the Braves, 1,082-975, including a 6-3 mark at SunTrust Park. **POSTSEASON:** The Cardinals are 11-4 (5-3 in Atlanta) in postseason games against the Braves; winning the 2012 Wild Card game at Turner Field, sweeping the 1982 NLCS (3-0; 1-0 at ATL) and the 2000 Division Series (3-0; 1-0 at ATL). Atlanta won their 1996 NLCS meeting, 4-3.

DIVISION SERIES: The Cardinals are a combined 34-18 (.654 winning pct.) in Division Series games and have won 10 of the 13 Division Series that they have taken part in, including four by 3-0 sweeps...the only Division Series that they've failed to win were in 2001 vs. Arizona when they were considered the Wild Card team and they stretched that series to a fifth and final game, 2009 when they were swept in three games by the Dodgers and 2015 when they lost 3-1 to the Cubs...the Cardinals .654 winning pct. in DS play is tops among clubs with a minimum of 20 games played...only the NY Yankees (48) have won more Division Series games then the Cardinals (34)...this is the eighth time in their 14 Division Series appearances that the Cards have not held home field advantage... they are 5-2 in Division Series when they did not hold home field advantage... overall, they are 18-7 in Division Series home games & 16-11 on the road.

HIGH FIVE: The Cardinals are 11-3 in their previous best-of-five postseason series, posting an overall record of 37-18 in those games...aside from their 13 Division Series best-of-five series wins, the Cardinals also defeated the Atlanta Braves, 3-0, in the old best-of-five LCS format in 1982.

GAME TWO'S: In Cardinals' playoff history, St. Louis has an overall record of 24-18 in Game 2 action, including a 9-4 mark in Division Series Game 2's (4-2 on road)...the Cardinals are trying to take a 2-0 Division Series lead for the first time since 2006 (at SD) and for the 6th time all-time in DS play...they have swept 4 of the previous 5 Division Series that they led 2-0.

ATLANTA CONNECTIONS

Adam Wainwright was born in Brunswick, Georgia and resides in St. Simon's Island, Georgia... attended Glynn Academy in Brunswick...originally selected by the Braves in the 1st round (29th overall) of the 2000 MLB Draft...acquired by St. Louis from Atlanta with pitchers Jason Marquis and Ray King for outfielder J.D. Drew and catcher Eli Marrero (Dec. 13, 2003).

Dexter Fowler was born in Atlanta...graduated from Milton (Ga.) High School...collected his first career hit (9/10/08) vs. Atlanta...was an Astros teammate of **Dallas Keuchel** in 2014.

Matt Wieters was born in and resides in Atlanta, ...played three seasons at Georgia School of Technology (2005-07) where he appeared at catcher and closer...elected to the Georgia Tech Sports Hall of Fame in 2017.

José Martínez played parts of two minor league seasons (2013-14) in the Braves organization, sandwiched around 28 games with the independent Rockford Aviators.

José Martínez and Ronald Acuña Jr. are third cousins...both were born in La Guaira, Venezuela.

John Brebbia resides in Smyrna, Georgia.

John Gant pitched in 20 games for Atlanta during his 2016 MLB debut season...became a Cardinal via trade with the Braves, packaged with pitcher Chris Ellis and infielder Luke Dykstra for pitcher Jaime Garcia (Dec. 1, 2016).

Jack Flaherty was high school teammates with Braves pitcher Max Fried and White Sox pitcher Lucas Giolito while at Harvard-Westlake High School in Los Angeles, Calif.

Mike Maddux is the older brother of Greg Maddux, a Hall of Fame pitcher for Atlanta for 11 seasons (1993-2003), who won three Cy Young and 10 Gold Gloves Awards, was a six NL All-Star, and member of the 1995 World Series team.

Mike Maddux (pitching) and Braves third base coach Ron Washington (manager) were on the Texas Rangers coaching staff that lost to St. Louis in the 2011 World Series.

First Base Coach **Stubby Clapp** played the 2003 season for the Richmond Braves (AAA).

Braves pitching coach **Rick Kranitz** was originally selected by the Cardinals in the 3rd round of the 1977 MLB January Draft, but did not sign.

Cardinals Hall of Fame catcher **Ted Simmons** currently serves as a Braves Major League scout... played final three seasons with Atlanta (1986-88).

Braves broadcaster **Brian Jordan** was selected by the Cardinals in the first round (30th overall) of the 1988 MLB Draft...played first seven professional seasons in St. Louis (1992-98).

Braves Baseball Communications Manager **Jonathan Kerber** began his pro career with the Rookie Level New Jersey Cardinals (2004).

Braves Manager Brian Snitker was born in nearby Decatur, Illinois...graduated from Macon (III.) High School...managed Adam Wainwright on Greenville Braves in 2003.

Hall of Fame Manager **Joe Torre** played for and managed both the Cardinals (1969-74 & 1990-95) and Braves (1966-68 & 1982-84)...became a Cardinal via trade with Atlanta, exchanged for future Hall of Famer **Orlando Cepeda**.

Hall of Famer **Bob Gibson** was a Braves Pitching Coach under manager **Joe Torre** (1982-84).

Braves Special Advisor to Player Development Terry Pendleton was selected by St. Louis in the 7th round of the 1982 MLB Draft...played seven years in a Cardinals uniform (1984-90)...won Gold Gloves at third base in 1987 and 1989.

Braves broadcaster Chip Caray was born in St. Louis in 1965...graduated from Parkway West High School in 1983...briefly broadcast Cardinals games in the early 1990s...his father, Skip Caray, was born in St. Louis in 1939...graduated from Webster Groves High School and the University of Missouri...previously broadcast for the Tulsa Oilers (AA-Cardinals), and basketball for Saint Louis University and St. Louis Hawks...his grandfather, Harry Caray, was born in St. Louis in 1914...graduated from Webster Groves High School...was a Cardinals broadcaster for 25 years (1945-69).

FALL BALL: The Cardinals are 2nd only to the NY Yankees in all-time postseason games played (397-248) and postseason wins (232-131)...St. Louis (52) is ranked 3rd behind the Yankees (85) and Atlanta Braves (55) in all-time Division Series games played and they are 2nd to the Yankees in Division Series games won (48-34).

WINNING WAYS: The Cardinals posted their 12th consecutive winning season in 2019, and the 79th in franchise history. The Cardinals & Yankees are the only teams to have winning seasons each of the past 12 years.

THE SHILDT SHOW: Mike Shildt, in his first full season at the helm of the Cardinals, is the third manager to guide the Cardinals to an NL Central title, joining Tony La Russa and Mike Matheny. Shildt joins **Pants Rowland** (1917 Chicago White Sox) and **Ed Barrow** (1918 - Boston Red Sox) as the only managers who never played professionally, to take their teams to the postseason...since Shildt took over as interim manager on July 15, 2018, the Cardinals are 132-99 (.571).

DIVISION MATH: The Cardinals were 46-30 vs. the NL Central, 18-15 vs. the East, 18-15 vs. the West and 9-11 vs. the American League.

MATCH-UPS: The Cardinals most wins came against Pittsburgh (14), and their most defeats were against the Cubs & Brewers (9). The Cardinals most wins at home (6) came against the Cubs, Reds & Brewers and their best match-up on the road was against the Pirates (8-1). The Cardinals were a combined 22-24 against 2019 postseason teams: (10-9) vs. MIL, (5-2) vs. WSH, (2-4) vs. ATL, (4-3) vs. LAD, (1-2) vs. HOU, (0-4) vs. OAK.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE: The Cardinals +102 run differential (764-662) ranked 4th best in the National League.

HIGHS & LOWS: The Cardinals were a season-best 23 games over .500 following their win on Sept. 23 and season low 2 games under .500 following their loss on May 29. The Cardinals spent 77 days in 1st place and their biggest division lead was 4-1/2 games (Sept. 8) and their greatest deficit was 5-1/2 games (June 9).

MONDAY FUNDAY: The Cardinals were a Major League best 14-2 on Mondays

PLAYERS PLAY: The Cardinals used 43 players in 2019, including 14 who were age 24 or younger. The youngest players were age 22 (Jordan Hicks, Junior Fernandez and Genesis Cabrera) and the oldest 37 (Adam Wainwright).

FLY YOUR FLAG: The Cardinals used players from eight different nations: United States, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Canada, Cuba, Mexico, Venezuela and Panama.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: The Cardinals had eight players make their Major League debuts in 2019: Randy Arozarena, Genesis Cabrera, Tommy Edman, Junior Fernandez, Ryan Helsley, Andrew Knizner, Rangel Ravelo, Lane Thomas.

FAN-TASTIC: The Cardinals surpassed the 3 million mark in season attendance for the 16th-straight season (2004-19) and the 23rd time overall...the Cardinals season total of 3,480,393 (42,968 per game avg.) ranked 2nd only to the Dodgers in MLB, was 5th-best in franchise history and included 22 sell outs.

INJURED LIST: The Cardinals had 18 players spend time on the Injured List in 2019, down from their 36 in 2018. Two players missed the entire season due to injury (LHP Brett Cecil and LHP Tony Cingrani).

ALL STARS: The Cardinals Ione All-Star game representative was shortstop Paul DeJong (MLB selection), who made his first appearance in the mid-summer Classic.

MONTHLY HONORS: Paul Goldschmidt was voted the NL Player of the Month in July and **Jack Flaherty** took NL Pitcher of the Month honors in both August and September.

WORST TO FIRST: The Cardinals set a club record with just 66 errors and posted a league-best .998 fielding pct. and tied the White Sox for the majors lead in double plays with 170. The Cardinals led the majors with 133 errors in 2018 and became the first team to go from worst to first in errors in back-to-back seasons.

POSTSEASON RESUMES: The Cardinals began the playoffs with a combined 281 games of postseason experience on their roster, 4th among this year's playoff field behind the Dodgers (591), Astros (383) and Yankees (359).

Oct. 4, 1942 Cardinals defeated New York 9-6 at NY in Game 4 of the World Series to give the club a 3-1 lead.

Oct. 4, 1944 In Game 1 of the all-St. Louis World Series vs. the Browns, the Cardinals lost 2-1. The Browns only had two hits.

Oct. 4, 1967

Bob Gibson threw a six-hit, 10-K complete game for a 2-1 win in Game 1 of the World Series vs. Boston. The only run scored against him came from Boston pitcher, Jose Santiago, who hit a solo home run in the 3rd.

Oct. 4, 2005 Won 8-5 over San Diego in Game 1 of the Division Series as Chris Carpenter went 6.0 shutout innings for the win. Jim Edmonds had 3 hits & Reggie Sanders drove in 6 runs on two hits, including a grand slam.

Oct. 4, 2014 Lost 3-2 to the Dodgers at Dodger Stadium in Game 2 of the National League Division Series, behind 7.0 scoreless frames from Zack Greinke. Matt Kemp hit a game-winning solo homer off Pat Neshek in the eighth.
