FALL CLASSIC: The Yankees clinched their 41st American League pennant and are playing in their first World Series since 2009...the Yankees' 41 World Series appearances and 27 World Series championships are the most all-time (next-most: Dodgers, 22 appearances; Cardinals, 11 championships).

- ▶ **Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history** (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- ▶ Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995).
- ▶ Are facing the Dodgers in the World Series for the 12th time, with the Yankees winning eight championships (1941, '47, '49, '52, '53, '56, '77 and '78) and losing three times (1955, '63 and '81)...**according to OptaSTATS, the Yankees and Dodgers' 12 matchups in the World Series are tied with the Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers for the most common championship round matchup in the four Major sports** (MLB/NBA/NFL/NHL).

WHERE WE LEFT OFF: The Yankees fell to the Dodgers, 4-2, on Saturday in World Series Game 2 at Dodger Stadium...**LHP Carlos Rodón** (3.1IP, 6H, 4R/ER, 0BB, 3K, 3HR) started and took the loss...**RF Juan Soto** (2-for-4, 2R, 1HR, 1RBI) reached base twice and hit his 11th career postseason home run with a game-tying solo shot in the third inning...**DH Giancarlo Stanton** (1-for-4, 1RBI) drove in the Yankees' other run with an RBI single in the ninth inning...**1B Anthony Rizzo** (0-for-1, 1BB, 2HP) reached base three times...**RHP Jake Cousins** (1.0IP, 2H), **LHP Tim Hill** (1.1IP, 1K), **RHP Clay Holmes** (1.1IP, 1BB, 2K) and **RHP Mark Leiter Jr.** (1.0IP) combined to toss 4.2 scoreless innings of relief.

FLIP THE PAGE: The Yankees are 0-2 in a postseason series for the 16th time in franchise history...have won Game 3 in nine of their previous 15 series that they started 0-2, including six of their last eight series and seven of their last 10 series...have gone on to win six of their previous 15 postseason series when starting 0-2.

- ▶ Are 0-2 to begin a World Series for the ninth time in franchise history...have gone on to win the World Series four times after trailing 0-2, including twice against the Dodgers (won in 1996 vs. Atlanta, 1978 vs. Los Angeles, 1958 vs. Milwaukee and 1956 vs. Brooklyn).

PEN PALS: Yankees relievers allowed just 2H over 4.2 scoreless innings of relief on Saturday in Game 2 of the World Series...have posted a 2.87 ERA (47.0IP, 15ER) this postseason.

- ▶ **RHP Luke Weaver** has not allowed a run in seven of his nine postseason appearances, going 1-0 with four saves and a 2.25 ERA (12.0IP, 3ER) and 12K...has held opponents to a .171 BA (7-for-41) this postseason...has not allowed an earned run in 23 of his last 26 games (since 8/16 including the postseason), going 4-0 with eight saves, a 1.42 ERA (31.2IP, 5ER) and 45K.
- ▶ **RHP Tommy Kahnle** has not allowed an ER in seven postseason appearances this year (7.2IP), going 1-0 with one save...has held opponents to a .148 BA (4-for-27) in those games...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 15 of his last 16 appearances (since 9/3), going 1-1 with two saves, a 1.17 ERA (15.1IP, 2ER) and 15K...has not allowed an earned run in 21 of 25 career postseason appearances, going 2-0 with two saves, a 2.48 ERA (29.0IP, 8ER) and 28K.
- ▶ **RHP Clay Holmes** has not allowed a run in 14 of 16 career postseason appearances, going 2-1 with a 1.53 ERA (17.2IP, 3ER)...including the postseason, has not allowed a run in 13 of his last 15 appearances (since 9/19), going 2-1 with one save and a 1.98 ERA (13.2IP, 3ER).
- ▶ **LHP Tim Hill** has posted a 1.29 ERA (7.0IP, 1ER) this postseason...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 22 of his last 25 games (since 8/14), going 1-0 with a 1.00 ERA (27.0IP, 3ER).

GLEYBER DAY: INF Gleyber Torres has reached base in each of his 11 postseason games, batting .289/.389/.422 (13-for-45) with 9R, 3 doubles, 1HR, 5RBI, 8BB and 1SF.

STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton hit an RBI single in the ninth inning in Game 2 of the World Series on Saturday...**has recorded 38RBI in 38 career postseason games, including 37RBI in his last 32 postseason games** (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota)...**his 14RBI this postseason are tied with Cecil Fielder (14RBI in 1996) and Reggie Jackson (14RBI in 1978) for the fourth-most by a Yankee in a single postseason** (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), trailing only Alex Rodriguez's 18RBI in 2009, Scott Brosius' 15RBI in 1998 and Bernie Williams' 15RBI in 1996.

- ▶ **Since the 2020 ALDS, has hit .417/.423/1.167 (10-for-24) with 6HR, 22RBI, 1BB and 1SF with RISP in 26 postseason games.**
- ▶ Has 4HR in his last five games, 5HR in his last seven games and 6HR in his last nine games (since ALDS Game 3).
- ▶ **His 6HR this postseason are tied for the most by a Yankee in a single postseason in franchise history**...Stanton also hit 6HR in 2020, Alex Rodriguez hit 6HR in 2009 and Bernie Williams hit 6HR in 1996...**is the only Yankee and one of just three Major League players to hit at least 6HR in a single postseason multiple times**, joining Corey Seager (8HR in 2020 and 6HR in 2023) and Nelson Cruz (8HR in 2011 and 6HR in 2010).
- ▶ **Six of his last eight postseason home runs (since 2022) have either tied the game (one) or given the Yankees the lead (five).**
- ▶ Has hit .279/.354/.744 (12-for-43) with 7R, 2 doubles, 6HR, 14RBI, 5BB/1BB and 1SB in 11 games this postseason.
- ▶ **His 17 career postseason home runs are the most by a Major League player in his first 38 career postseason games** (previous: Carlos Beltrán & Nelson Cruz-16HR).
- ▶ **His 17 career postseason home runs are the fourth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR) and Mickey Mantle (18HR).
- ▶ **His career 8.18 AB/HR (17HR/139AB) ratio in the postseason is the best in Major League history** (min. 100PA).
- ▶ **Has recorded five go-ahead RBI this postseason...is one of just three players in Yankees history to record at least five go-ahead RBI in a single postseason** (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), joining Bernie Williams (seven in 1996) and Chris Chambliss (five in 1976).

BIGGER THAN BASEBALL: Earlier today, **Major League Baseball** and the **New York Yankees** hosted a 2024 World Series Legacy announcement detailing plans to build a new sensory room at One World Middle School in the Bronx...the special 2024 World Series Legacy Project aims to provide a sensory-safe place at the school to serve all students, including those who are neurodivergent...the **New York Yankees Foundation** is matching MLB's grant, which will also provide for enhanced and expanded programming at the school...the Yankees established a relationship with One World Middle School earlier this year to collaborate on the redesign of a sensory room at Yankee Stadium, which opened officially during ALDS Game 1.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

THE GREAT JUAN: OF Juan Soto reached base twice and hit a game-tying solo HR in the third inning on Saturday in World Series Game 2...marked his 11th career postseason home run and his fourth in a World Series game...**nine of his 11 career postseason home runs (including each of his four this postseason) have either tied the game (three) or given his team the lead (six).**

- ▶ **In nine career World Series games, has hit .353/.463/.765 (12-for-34) with 9R, 2 doubles, 4HR, 8RBI, 7BB and 1SB.**
- ▶ Has reached base in each of his 11 games this postseason, including reaching base multiple times in eight of those games...is batting .350/.460/.700 (14-for-40) with 9R, 2 doubles, 4HR, 9RBI, 9BB and 1SF this postseason.
- ▶ **In his postseason career, has hit .355/.500/.548 (11-for-31) with 3 doubles, 1HR, 17RBI, 9BB, 1HP and 1SF with RISP.**

NOBODY BEATS THE RIZZ: INF Anthony Rizzo has reached base in each of his seven games this postseason, batting .368/.520/.421 (7-for-19) with 1R, 1 double, 4BB and 2HP.

SCHMIDT'S CREEK: RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his third career postseason start tonight...including the postseason, has gone 5-5 with a 2.95 ERA (94.2IP, 31ER) and 99K in 18 starts this year...**has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 17 of his 18 starts, including 2R-or-fewer in 12 of those starts.**

TONIGHT'S WORLD SERIES GAME 3 STARTING PITCHER: RHP CLARKE SCHMIDT (0-0, 3.86)

RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his sixth career postseason appearance (third start) in World Series Game 3 vs. Los Angeles-NL tonight...made his last postseason start in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland on 10/17, allowing 2ER in 4.2IP without recording a decision (5H, 2BB, 2K, 1HR)...made his first career postseason start in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City on 10/9, allowing 2ER in 4.2IP without recording a decision (4H, 1BB, 4K, 1HP)...went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 27ER) in 16 starts this season... **allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 straight starts from 3/31-9/24 and 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those games...his 15 straight starts of 3R-or-fewer was tied for the longest streak by a Yankees starter in their first 15 starts of a season in franchise history (also Ron Guidry's 15GS from 4/8-6/22/78)**...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 35 of his last 39 regular season starts (since 5/19/23)...in 2023, went 9-9 with a 4.64 ERA (159.0IP, 169H, 91R/82ER, 46BB, 149K, 24HR) in 33 games (32 starts) with the Yankees...has made three career Opening Day rosters (2022-24)...was selected by the Yankees in the first round (16th overall) of the 2017 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of South Carolina.

2024: Went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 71H, 31R/27ER, 30BB, 93K, 8HR) in 16 starts this season... **allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 straight starts from 3/31-9/24 and 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those games...his 15 straight starts of 3R-or-fewer is tied for the longest streak by a Yankees starter to begin a season in franchise history (also Ron Guidry's 15GS from 4/8-6/22/78)**.

- ✦ The Yankees went 11-5 in his starts this year.
- ✦ **Allowed just 16R/13ER over his final nine starts (from 5/10-9/29), posting a 2.37 ERA (49.1IP, 13ER) in that span.**
- ✦ Was placed on the 15-day injured list on 5/30 (retroactive to 5/27) with a right lat strain and was transferred to the 60-day injured list on 6/18...was returned from rehab and reinstated on 9/7...missed 86 team games.
- ✦ Recorded back-to-back scoreless starts for the first time in his career from 5/10-16 (OR in 8.0IP on 5/16 at Minnesota and OR in 6.2IP on 5/10 at Tampa Bay)...was the first Yankee to record back-to-back scoreless starts of at least 6.0IP since Luis Severino from 8/23-28/23.
- ✦ Posted a career-best 17.2 scoreless innings streak from the fifth inning on 5/4 through the second inning on 5/21.
- ✦ Recorded at least 6K in a career-high five consecutive starts from 5/4-26.
- ✦ Won three straight starts from 5/4-16, the second-longest streak of his career (won five consecutive starts from 6/29-7/29/23).
- ✦ Earned his fifth win of the year on 5/16 at Minnesota after tossing a career-high 8.0 scoreless innings (3H, 0BB, 8K, 1HP)...his 8K marked his most in a game this season and matched his career high (also 8K on 8/20/23 vs. Boston, 7/15/23 at Colorado, 4/28/23 at Texas and 4/23/23 vs. Toronto)...threw a career-high 103 pitches (previous: 102 on 4/19/24 vs. Tampa Bay)...is one of two Yankees pitchers this season to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings in a game (also Nestor Cortes: 8.0IP, OR on 4/8 vs. Miami).

ON A ROLL: Over his last 42 outings (41 starts) since 5/19/23 (including the postseason), has gone 13-10 with a 3.58 ERA (213.2IP, 197H, 93R/85ER, 65BB, 200K, 25HR)... **has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 37 of those 41 starts.**

- ✦ **Allowed 3R-or-fewer in 17 straight starts from 9/25/23-9/24/24, marking his longest such streak in his career and the third-longest such streak in franchise history**, trailing only Russ Ford (20GS from 8/9(G2)/1910-5/27(G2)/1911) and Nestor Cortes (19GS from 8/15/21-6/2(G1)/22)...allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 13 of those starts.
- ✦ Recorded at least 6K in 10 of his final 14 starts this season (4/13-G1-9/29), including 7K-or-more in six of those games.
- ✦ Including the postseason, the Yankees have won 16 of his last 23 starts (since 9/6/23 vs. Detroit) and 23 of his last 34 starts (since 6/29/23 at Oakland)...has allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 31 of those 34 starts.
- ✦ Including the postseason, has allowed 4R-or-fewer in each of his last 26 starts (since 8/20/23 vs. Boston)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 23 of those starts and 2R-or-fewer in 15 of those starts.

POSTSEASON CAREER: Will make his third career postseason start (sixth career postseason appearance) in World Series Game 3 vs. Los Angeles-NL tonight...made his last postseason start in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland on 10/17, allowing 2ER in 4.2IP (5H, 2BB, 2K, 1HR) without recording a decision...made his first career postseason start in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City on 10/9, allowing 2ER in 4.2IP without recording a decision (4H, 1BB, 4K, 1HP)...has made three career relief appearances in the postseason (2022 ALDS Game 2 vs. CLE, 2022 ALDS Game 3 at CLE and 2022 ALCS Game 1 at HOU), going 0-2 with an 11.57 ERA (2.1IP, 3ER).

HOME SWEET HOME: Made eight home starts this season, going 2-2 with a 4.50 ERA (40.0IP, 20ER) and 47K...the Yankees went 6-2 in his home starts this season.

- ✦ Going back to last season, the Yankees have won 10 of Schmidt's last 14 home starts (since 7/21/23), with Schmidt going 4-3 with a 4.52 ERA (71.2IP, 36ER) and 71K in that span.
- ✦ Tossed 5.0 innings-or-more in 14 of his last 17 home starts (since 6/11/23)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 of those 17 games.
- ✦ Has made 41 appearances (27 starts) in his career at Yankee Stadium, going 8-10 with one save and a 4.10 ERA (158.0IP, 143H, 80R/72ER, 50BB, 155K, 24HR) in those games.

VS. LOS ANGELES-NL: Tonight will mark his first career appearance vs. the Dodgers (regular season and postseason)...in 14 career Interleague games (10 starts), has gone 3-3 with a 5.15 ERA (50.2IP, 29ER)...in four career starts vs. the NL West, is 1-1 with a 3.93 ERA (18.1IP, 8ER).

FOR STARTERS: Over his 53 career Major League starts (16 in 2024, 32 in 2023, three in 2022, one in 2021 and one in 2020), has gone 14-17 with a 4.10 ERA (263.2IP, 264H, 136R/120ER, 83BB, 261K, 33HR)... **has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 35 of his last 39 starts** (since 5/19/23).

THE RIGHT STUFF: Has limited right-handed batters to a .225/.286/.361 (141-for-628) slash line in his career.

CAREER NOTES: Over his first five seasons with the Yankees (2020-24), has gone 19-20 with two saves and a 3.95 ERA (314.2IP, 304H, 158R/138ER, 109BB, 311K, 38HR) in 83 career games (53 starts).

- ✦ Made his Major League debut in Game 2 on 9/4/20 at Baltimore after never having pitched professionally above Double-A in his career.
- ✦ Did not pitch in 2017 while recovering from "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow.
- ✦ Was drafted by the Yankees in the first round (16th overall) of the 2017 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of South Carolina...in three seasons at South Carolina (2015-17), produced a 15-9 record and 3.21 ERA (229.2IP, 82ER) in 45 games (36 starts).

- Did not allow an earned run in 44 of his 50 appearances this season, including 39 of his final 43 games from 6/12-9/27, posting a 1.47 ERA (36.2IP, 6ER) and 40K over that 43-game stretch.
- Has not allowed an ER in 33 of his last 35 appearances since 7/19 (including the postseason), going 1-1 with two saves and a 1.13 ERA (32.0IP, 4ER) over that stretch.

- In three appearances this postseason, has gone 1-0 and allowed 1R/ER over 3.1IP (2H, 3BB/2IBB, 2K)...has stranded each of his four inherited runners in those games.
- Retired each of his three batters faced in Game 2 of the World Series at Los Angeles-NL (1.0IP).
- In 60 combined relief appearances with Chicago-NL and the Yankees in 2024, went 4-5 with a 4.50 ERA (58.0IP, 55H, 34R/29ER, 22BB, 86K, 8HR).
- Began the season with the Chicago Cubs, going 2-4 with a 4.21 ERA (36.1IP, 27H, 20R/17ER, 13BB, 53K, 2HR) in 39 relief appearances...made 21 relief appearances with the Yankees, going 2-1 with a 4.98 ERA (21.2IP, 28H, 14R/12ER, 9BB, 33K, 6HR).
- Among Major League relievers this season, ranked eighth in K/9.0IP (13.34).
- Including the postseason, has recorded multiple strikeouts in 26 of his appearances and 3K in 14 of those games.
- Was acquired by the Yankees from the Chicago Cubs in exchange for INF Ben Cowles and RHP Jack Neely on July 30, 2024.

#58 TIM MAYZA—LHP

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (also 2022-23 with Toronto).
- Has tossed 1.1 scoreless innings in two postseason appearances this season (2H, 2BB, 1K).
- Combined with the Toronto Blue Jays and Yankees to go 0-2 with a 6.33 ERA (42.2IP, 54H, 34R/30ER, 15BB, 28K, 5HR) in 50 appearances...opponents batted .309/.359/.486 (54-for-175, 5HR); LH .244/.298/.314 (21-for-86, 1HR); RH .371/.416/.652 (33-for-89, 4HR).
- Recorded at least 1K in each of his final seven appearances of the season from 9/4-29... matched the third-longest streak of his career, trailing only his 10 straight games with at least 1K from 9/20/17-5/4/18 and eight straight games from 9/12/23-3/30/24 (also seven straight games from 8/15-27/17).
- Including the postseason, has allowed just 1R/ER over his last 9.0IP (since 9/14).

#0 MARCUS STROMAN—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (also 2015-16 with Toronto)... did not appear on the Yankees' ALDS roster vs. Kansas City.
- In five career postseason starts, has gone 1-1 with a 4.40 ERA (30.2IP, 29H, 16R/15ER, 7BB, 21K, 4HR).
- In his first season with the Yankees, went 10-9 with one save and a 4.31 ERA (154.2IP, 167H, 81R/74ER, 60BB, 113K, 19HR) in 30 games (29 starts)...opponents batted .277/.349/.431 (167-for-603, 19HR); LH .296/.372/.474 (86-for-291, 10HR); RH .260/.327/.391 (81-for-312, 9HR).
- Allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 20 of his 29 starts, 2ER-or-fewer in 14 of those starts and 1ER-or-fewer in 11 of those starts.
- His 49.8 groundball percentage was the fourth-highest in the AL and eighth-highest in the Majors (min. 150.0IP).
- Was named by Major League Baseball as the Yankees' 2024 nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award on 9/9...marked his third career nomination (also 2017 with Toronto and '23 with Chicago-NL).
- Earned his first save of the season (second of career) on 9/17 at Seattle after allowing 1R/ER over 3.0 innings of relief (5H, 0BB, 3K, 1HR)...marked his first relief appearance of the season and the ninth of his career (first since 9/16/23 at Arizona with Chicago-NL).

#30 LUKE WEAVER—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the first time in his career.
- Has not allowed a run in seven of nine relief appearances this postseason, recording one win, four saves and a .171 opponents' BA (7-for-41).
- Appeared in each of the Yankees' first seven postseason games...joined teammate Clay Holmes (2024) and Adam Ottavino (2019) as the only pitchers in franchise history to pitch in each of the Yankees' first seven games of a postseason.
- Tossed 1.2 scoreless innings in Game 1 of the World Series at Los Angeles-NL (0H)...allowed an inherited runner to score on a sac fly by Mookie Betts in the eighth inning.
- Became the first Yankee and one of six players in Major League history to record four saves in his first five career postseason appearances (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Cody Allen, Dennis Eckersley, Jason Iringhausen, Troy Percival and Brian Wilson... also became the sixth pitcher in Major League history to have four saves in his team's first five games of a postseason (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Dennis Eckersley (1988 with Oakland), Mark Wohlers (1996 with Atlanta), Neftalí Feliz (2011 with Texas), Cody Allen (2016 with Cleveland) and Paul Sewald (2023 with Arizona).
- Became the fourth player (ninth time) in franchise history to record multiple saves of at least five outs in a single postseason (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Goose Gossage (six such saves in 1981), Mariano Rivera (five such saves in 2003, four such saves in 2000 and '01, and two such saves in 1998, '99, and 2009) and Aroldis Chapman (two such saves in 2017)... is the only Yankee to record at least two saves of at least five outs in his first five career postseason appearances and just the seventh pitcher in Major League history to accomplish the feat.
- Was the first pitcher since Kenley Jansen in 2017 to record three saves of more than three outs in a single postseason...is just the third pitcher in Major League history (since saves became an official stat in 1969) to record at least three saves of four-or-more outs in their first five career postseason games, joining Jeurys Familia (three in 2015) and Byung-Hyun Kim (three in 2001).
- Was the third pitcher in Major League history (since saves became an official stat in 1969) to record at least three saves of at least four outs in their first five career postseason games, joining Jeurys Familia (three in 2015) and Byung-Hyun Kim (three in 2001).
- Pitched in all four games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City, earning three saves after tossing 4.1IP (2H, 5K)...is the third player in franchise history to record three saves in a Division Series, joining Goose Gossage in 1981 and Mariano Rivera in 2000...is also one of 13 players in Major League history to record three saves in a Division Series.
- Became the third player in franchise history (since saves became an official stat in 1969) to record a five-out save in one of their first three career postseason appearances (1.2IP in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City), joining Tommy Kahnle's six-out save (ALDS Game 4 vs. Cleveland in 2017) and Ken Clay's 11-out save (ALCS Game 1 at Kansas City in 1978).
- In 62 relief appearances for the Yankees, went 7-3 with four saves and a 2.89 ERA (84.0IP, 52H, 28R/27ER, 26BB, 103K)...opponents batted .176/.248/.334 (52-for-296, 10HR); LH .162/.253/.261 (23-for-142, 3HR); RH .188/.244/.403 (29-for-154, 7HR)...set a career high in appearances and tied his career high in wins (also 2017 and '18 with St. Louis).
- His 103K were the most by a Yankees reliever in a single season since Dellin Betances (115K in 2018)...were also tied with Jay Howell (103K in 1984) and Rich Gossage (103K in 1980) for the eighth-most by a Yankees reliever in a single season, trailing only Betances (135K in 2014, 131K in 2015, 126K in 2016 and 115K in 2018), Mariano Rivera (130K in 1996), Gossage (122K in 1978) and Joe Page (114K in 1947).

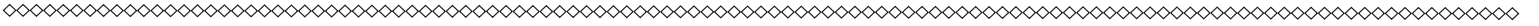
YANKEES VS. LOS ANGELES DODGERS

POSTSEASON TRENDS/FACTS: The Yankees are 0-2 in their current World Series vs. Los Angeles...have previously faced the Dodgers in the World Series a record 11 times, with the Yankees winning eight championships (1978, '77, '56, '53, '52, '49, '47, '41) and losing three times (1981, '63, '55)...the Dodgers are one of five franchises to defeat the Yankees in at least three postseason series, joining the Tigers (three wins in three postseason series), the Cardinals (three wins in five postseason series), the Red Sox (three wins in five postseason series) and the Astros (four wins in four postseason series)...squared off in seven Subway Series before the Dodgers left Brooklyn prior to the 1958 season.

OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS: The Yankees went 1-2 vs. the Dodgers this year...3G in the Bronx...are 11-11 all time in regular season games vs. the Dodgers...**IN SEASON SERIES:** Are 3-3-1 all time in season series against the Dodgers...**AT YANKEE STADIUM:** Went 1-2 at Yankee Stadium this year...are 3-5 all time vs. Los Angeles-NL at the current Yankee Stadium...the Dodgers did not play a regular season game at the original Yankee Stadium...**AT DODGER STADIUM:** Are 8-6 all time against the Dodgers at Dodger Stadium...are 29-21 at the venue all time (21-15 vs. Los Angeles-AL from 1962-65 when they played at the stadium)...most recently visited Chavez Ravine in 2023, winning 2-of-3 matchups from 6/2-4.

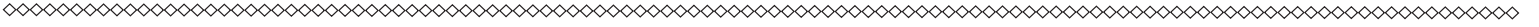
