FALL CLASSIC: The Yankees clinched their 41st American League pennant and are playing in their first World Series since 2009...the Yankees' 41 World Series appearances and 27 World Series championships are the most all-time (next-most: Dodgers, 22 appearances; Cardinals, 11 championships).
▶ Are facing the Dodgers in the World Series for the 12th time, with the Yankees winning eight championships (1941, '47, '49, '52, '53, '56, '77 and '78) and losing three times (1955, '63 and '81)...**according to OptaSTATS, the Yankees and Dodgers' 12 matchups in the World Series are tied with the Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers for the most common championship round matchup in the four Major sports** (MLB/NBA/NFL/NHL).

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees defeated the Dodgers, 11-4, on Tuesday in World Series Game 4 at Yankee Stadium...**RHP Luis Gil** (4.0IP, 5H, 4R/ER, 2BB, 1K, 2HR) started and did not record a decision...**SS Anthony Volpe** (2-for-3, 3R, 1 double, 1HR, 4RBI, 1BB, 2SB) hit a go-ahead grand slam in the third inning, becoming the 15th player in franchise history to hit a grand slam in the postseason and the ninth Yankee to do so in a World Series game...**C Austin Wells** (2-for-3, 2R, 1 double, 1HR, 1RBI, 1BB, 1SB) hit his second career postseason HR with a solo shot in the sixth inning...**2B Gleyber Torres** (1-for-5, 1R, 1HR, 3RBI) hit his seventh career postseason home run with a three-run shot in the eighth inning...**LF Alex Verdugo** (1-for-4, 1R, 2RBI) drove in two runs...**Yankees relievers** combined to toss 5.0 scoreless innings of relief.
▶ Their 11R were their most in a postseason game since 2020 ALWC Game 1 at Cleveland (12R) and their most in a World Series Game since 1978 World Series Game 5 vs. Los Angeles (12R).

ALL ON THE LINE: Tonight marks the Yankees' second potential elimination game of the 2024 postseason...the Yankees have won three of their last four potential elimination games (since 2022) and are 10-6 in those games since 2017.

▶ The Yankees are 1-3 in a postseason series of at least seven games for the fifth time in franchise history (see chart)...are the 96th team in Major League history to trail 1-3 in a postseason series of at least seven games and the 49th to do so in a World Series...14 teams have won a seven-game series after trailing 1-3 and six have done so in the World Series (2016 Cubs, 1985 Royals, 1979 Pirates, 1968 Tigers, 1958 Yankees and 1925 Pirates).

PEN PALS: Yankees relievers tossed 5.0 scoreless innings of relief on Tuesday in Game 4 of the World Series...**have allowed just 1R/ER in 16.0 innings over their last three games** (since World Series Game 2)...have posted a 2.47 ERA (58.1IP, 16ER) this postseason.

- ▶ **RHP Luke Weaver** has not allowed a run in nine of his 11 postseason appearances, going 1-0 with four saves and a 1.93 ERA (14.0IP, 3ER) and 15K...has held opponents to a .152 BA (7-for-46) this postseason...has not allowed an earned run in 25 of his last 28 games (since 8/16, including the postseason), going 4-0 with eight saves, a 1.34 ERA (33.2IP, 5ER) and 48K.
- ▶ **RHP Tommy Kahnle** has not allowed an ER in eight postseason appearances this year (8.2IP), going 1-0 with one save...has held opponents to a .133 BA (4-for-30) in those games...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 16 of his last 17 appearances (since 9/3), going 1-1 with two saves, a 1.10 ERA (16.1IP, 2ER) and 16K...has not allowed an earned run in 22 of 26 career postseason appearances, going 2-0 with two saves, a 2.40 ERA (30.0IP, 8ER) and 29K.
- ▶ **RHP Clay Holmes** has not allowed a run in 16 of 18 career postseason appearances, going 3-1 with a 1.37 ERA (19.2IP, 3ER)...including the postseason, has not allowed a run in 15 of his last 17 appearances (since 9/19), going 3-1 with one save and a 1.72 ERA (15.2IP, 3ER).
- ▶ **LHP Tim Hill** has posted a 1.08 ERA (8.1IP, 1ER) this postseason...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 24 of his last 27 games (since 8/14), going 1-0 with a 0.95 ERA (28.2IP, 3ER).

DYNAMIC DUO: INF Anthony Volpe and **C Austin Wells** were the fifth set of Yankees teammates age 25-or-younger to each homer in the same World Series game, joining Tony Kubek and Mickey Mantle in 1957 World Series Game 3, Billy Martin, Gil McDougald and Mantle in 1953 World Series Game 5, Mantle and Martin in 1953 World Series Game 2, and Joe DiMaggio and Charlie Keller in 1939 World Series Game 3.

HIGH VOLPAGE: INF Anthony Volpe hit a go-ahead grand slam in the third inning on Tuesday in World Series Game 4...**was the 15th player in franchise history to hit a grand slam in the postseason and only the ninth Yankee to hit a grand slam in a World Series game**, joining Tino Martinez (1998 WS Game 1), Joe Pepitone (1964 WS Game 6), Bobby Richardson (1960 WS Game 3), Bill Skowron (1956 WS Game 7), Yogi Berra (1956 WS Game 2), Mickey Mantle (1953 WS Game 5), Gil McDougald (1951 WS Game 5) and Tony Lazzeri (1936 WS Game 2).

- ▶ **At 23 years, 184 days old, was the third-youngest Yankee to hit a grand slam in the postseason**, trailing only Mickey Mantle (21y, 349d in 1953 WS Game 5) and Gil McDougald (23y, 143d in 1951 WS Game 5)...**was also the fourth-youngest player in Major League history to hit a grand slam in a World Series game**, trailing only Mantle, Addison Russell (22y, 283d in 2016 WS Game 6) and McDougald.
- ▶ **Was the first Yankees shortstop to hit a grand slam in a World Series game and just the second to do so in a postseason game**, joining Didi Gregorius (2019 ALDS Game 2).
- ▶ Marked the fourth go-ahead grand slam by a Yankee in the postseason and third in a World Series game (also Gio Urshela in 2020 ALWC Game 2, Tino Martinez in 1998 WS Game 1 and Gil McDougald in 1951 WS Game 5).
- ▶ With 2SB and 4RBI on Tuesday, **became the second player in Major League history to record at least 4RBI and multiple stolen bases in postseason game and first to do so in a World Series game** (also Shane Victorino in 2008 NLDS Game 2).

COLE TRAIN: RHP Gerrit Cole will make his 22nd career postseason start and 12th with the Yankees tonight in World Series Game 5...will mark his fourth career World Series start and second of the series...**tonight will mark his seventh career start in a potential elimination game and fourth with the Yankees**...is 2-3 with a 3.62 ERA (32.1IP, 13ER) and 39K in those six games (2022 ALDS Game 4 at Cleveland, 2021 ALWCG at Boston, 2020 ALDS Game 5 at Tampa Bay in San Diego, 2019 ALDS Game 5 vs. Tampa Bay with Houston, 2015 NLWC vs. Chicago-NL with Pittsburgh and 2013 NLDS Game 5 at St. Louis with Pittsburgh)...**has allowed 3R-or-fewer in five of those starts and 2R-or-fewer in four of those starts**.

- ▶ **Is 1-0 with a 2.82 ERA (22.1IP, 7ER) in four postseason starts this year**...the Yankees are 3-1 in those starts...has allowed 3ER-or-fewer in each of those four starts and 2ER-or-fewer in three of those starts.
- ▶ **Is 1-1 with a 3.15 ERA (20.0IP, 7ER) and 19K in four career World Series starts**.

GLEYBER DAY: INF Gleyber Torres hit his seventh career postseason home run and second of the 2024 postseason with a three-run shot in the eighth inning...has reached base in each of his 13 games this postseason, batting .264/.375/.434 (14-for-53) with 10R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 8RBI, 10BB and 1SF.

- ▶ Has reached base in each of his last 16 postseason games (since 2022 ALCS Game 2), the longest such streak by a Yankee since Derek Jeter's 21-game on-base streak in the postseason from 2007 ALDS Game 4 to 2010 ALCS Game 2.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

THE GREAT JUAN: OF Juan Soto owns a 24-game postseason on-base streak (since 2022 Wild Card Series Game 2 with San Diego)...his current on-base streak is tied with **Carlos Beltrán (24-game streak from 2004-12) and Carlos Ruiz (24-game streak from 2008-10) for the sixth-longest streak in the postseason in Major League history**, trailing only Miguel Cabrera's 31-game streak from 2011-13, Chase Utley's 27-game streak from 2007-09, Jose Altuve's 25-game streak from 2017-19, Pablo Sandoval's 25-game streak from 2012-14 and Boog Powell's 25-game streak from 1966-71...is batting .292/.396/.551 (26-for-89) with 17R, 5 doubles, 6HR, 16RBI, 15BB, 1HP, 1SB and 1SF over that span.

- ▶ **In 11 career World Series games, has hit .317/.440/.683 (13-for-41) with 10R, 3 doubles, 4HR, 8RBI, 9BB and 15B**.
- ▶ Has reached base in each of his 13 games this postseason, including reaching base multiple times in nine of those games...is batting .319/.441/.638 (15-for-47) with 10R, 3 doubles, 4HR, 9RBI, 11BB and 1SF this postseason.

TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 30, 2001: The Yankees earn their first win of the World Series, defeating the Diamondbacks by a score of 2-1 in Game 3 at Yankee Stadium. Arizona is held to only three hits, as Roger Clemens earns the win and Mariano Rivera records a save.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 31, 2009: The Yankees hit three home runs and rally from a 3-0 deficit to defeat the Phillies, 8-5, in Game 3 of the World Series.

Oct. 31, 2001: Derek Jeter earns the nickname "Mr. November" in Game 4 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, as New York rallies for a 3-2 win over Arizona to tie the series at two games apiece. Tino Martinez hits a two-out, two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth, and Jeter follows with a two-out, "walk-off" solo homer in the 10th.

FRIDAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Nov. 1, 2009: The Yankees take a 3-games-to-1 lead over the Phillies in the World Series, scoring three runs in the top of the ninth inning en route to a 7-4 win at Citizens Bank Park.

Nov. 1, 2001: The Bombers rally for a 3-2 win over the Diamondbacks in Game 5 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, as Scott Brosius hits a tying two-run homer in the bottom of the ninth inning and Alfonso Soriano delivers a "walk-off" single that scores Chuck Knoblauch in the 12th.

TONIGHT'S WORLD SERIES GAME 5 STARTING PITCHER: RHP GERRIT COLE (1-0, 2.82)

RHP Gerrit Cole will make his 22nd career postseason start and 12th with the Yankees in Game 5 of the World Series tonight...the 34-year-old will start on regular four days' rest...will mark his fourth career World Series start and second of the this year's series...last started on Friday in Game 1 of the World Series at Dodger Stadium and did not record a decision (6.0IP, 4H, 1R/ER, 0BB, 4K, 0HR)...went 8-5 with a 3.41 ERA (95.0IP, 78H, 38R/36ER, 29BB, 99K, 11HR) in 17 regular season starts this year...is 11-6 with a 2.91 ERA (126.2IP, 96H, 45R/41ER, 32BB, 150K, 19HR) in 21 career postseason starts...as a Yankee, is 5-2 with a 3.25 ERA (61.0IP, 22ER) and 72K in 11 postseason starts...in 125 regular season starts with the Yankees, is 59-28 with a 3.12 ERA (759.0IP, 263ER) and 915K...has allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 98 of those 125 starts...was unanimously named the American League Cy Young Award winner in 2023, becoming the sixth player in Yankees history to win the award, joining Roger Clemens (2001), Ron Guidry (1978), Sparky Lyle (1977), Whitey Ford (1961) and Bob Turley (1958)...the six-time All-Star (2015, '18-19, '21-23) has finished in the top-five of Cy Young Award voting six times (first in 2023, second in 2019 and 2021, fourth in 2015 and 2020, and fifth in 2018)...since 2018, leads the Majors (regular season) in wins (94), strikeouts (1,517) and shutouts (five), ranks second in WAR among pitchers (30.6 – FanGraphs), K/9.0IP (11.65), winning percentage (.712, min. 60 decisions) and opponents' OBP (.260), tied for second in complete games (seven), third in opponents' BA (.205), opponents' OPS (.615), WHIP (1.00) and K/BB (5.11), fourth in ERA (2.97) and innings pitched (1,171.2), seventh in opponents' SLG (.355) and eighth in starts (190)...owns two of the Yankees' top three single-season strikeout records and three of the top-eight records (his 257K in 2022 are the most in franchise history, his 243K in 2021 are the third-most in franchise history and his 222K in 2023 are tied for seventh-most in Yankees history)...was originally selected by the Yankees in the first round (28th overall) of the 2008 MLB First-Year Player Draft but did not sign and went on to play at UCLA for three seasons (2009-11)...was the first overall pick of the 2011 First-Year Player Draft, the 15th pitcher (and 11th right-hander) to be chosen first...is the fifth player selected first overall to play for the Yankees, joining Alex Rodriguez, Darryl Strawberry, Tim Lincecum and Ron Blomberg...signed a nine-year contract extending through the 2028 season with a player opt-out following the 2024 season on 12/18/19.

LAST START: Last started on Friday in Game 1 of the World Series at Dodger Stadium and allowed just 1R/ER in 6.0IP in the Yankees' 6-3 loss in extra innings (4H, 0BB, 4K, 0HR)...allowed his only run on a sac fly to Will Smith in the fifth inning...retired 13 of his first 14BF...marked his eighth career postseason Game 1 start...also marked the ninth time in his career that he tossed at least 6.0IP and allowed 1R-or-fewer in a postseason game...is just one of three pitchers to record as many games through his first 21 career postseason appearances, joining Curt Schilling (10) and John Smoltz (nine).

2024 POSTSEASON: Is 1-0 with a 2.82 ERA (22.1IP, 7ER) in four postseason starts this year...the Yankees are 3-1 in those starts...has allowed 3ER-or-fewer in each of those four starts and 2ER-or-fewer in three of those starts.

- Started on Friday in Game 1 of the World Series at Dodger Stadium and allowed just 1R/ER in 6.0IP (4H, 0BB, 4K, 0HR)...allowed his only run on a sac fly to Will Smith in the fifth inning...retired 13 of his first 14BF...marked his eighth career postseason Game 1 start...also marked the ninth time in his career that he tossed at least 6.0IP and allowed 1R-or-fewer in a postseason game...is just one of three pitchers to record as many games through his first 21 career postseason games, joining Curt Schilling (10) and John Smoltz (nine).
- Started in ALCS Game 2 vs. Cleveland at Yankee Stadium and did not record a decision (4.1IP, 6H, 2R/ER, 4BB, 4K, 0HR)...allowed a run on a sac fly in the fifth inning...exited the game with the bases loaded and RHP Clay Holmes allowed only one inherited runner to score.
- Earned the win in the Yankees' series-clinching victory in ALDS Game 4 at Kansas City (7.0IP, 6H, 1R/ER, 0BB, 4K, 0HR)...retired 14 of his first 15BF...allowed his only run in the sixth inning on an RBI double to Vinnie Pasquino...marked his ninth career postseason start that he tossed at least 7.0IP.
- Did not record a decision in the Yankees' 6-5 win in ALDS Game 1 vs. the Royals at Yankee Stadium (5.0IP, 7H, 4R/3ER, 2BB, 4K, 1HR)...marked his seventh career start in Game 1 of a postseason series...allowed a sac fly to Tommy Pham in the second inning and a two-run HR to MJ Melendez in the fourth inning...exited the game with one man on and LHP Tim Hill allowed the inherited runner to score.

2024: In 17 regular season starts this season, went 8-5 with a 3.41 ERA (95.0IP, 78H, 38R/36ER, 29BB, 99K, 11HR)...opponents batted .220/.290/.358 (78-for-355, 11HR); LH .209/.285/.330 (43-for-206, 5HR); RH .235/.296/.396 (35-for-149, 6HR)...**allowed 2R-or-fewer in 12 of his 17 starts this year, including 10 of his final 13 starts (since 7/12) and 11 of his final 15 (since 6/30)...** **allowed 1ER-or-fewer in seven of his final nine starts (8/10-8/29/26), nine of his final 13 starts (7/12-9/26) and 10 of his final 15 (6/30-9/26).**

- Allowed 19 of his 38R and seven of his 11HR in three of his starts: 6R/4HR on 6/25 at the Mets, 6R/3HR on 7/24 vs. the Mets, and 7R/0HR on 9/14 vs. Boston... **in his 14 other starts, went 8-2 with a 1.89 ERA (81.0IP, 17ER) and 93K.**
- Went 7-4 with a 2.67 ERA (77.2IP, 23ER) and 80K in his final 13 starts from 7/12-9/26...was 5-3 with a 2.25 ERA (60.0IP, 15ER) and 61K over his final 10 starts of the season from 8/4-9/26.**
- Posted a 1.04 HR/9.0IP (11HR/95.0IP) ratio...allowed just 2HR over his final 10 starts (60.0IP) from 8/4-9/26 after allowing 9HR in his first seven (35.0IP) from 6/19-7/24...did not allow a HR in his final five starts (32.0IP) from 9/2-26.
- Recorded at least 7K in nine of his 17 starts.
- Started after a Yankees loss nine times...the Yankees went 7-2 in those games with Cole going 6-2 with a 3.59 ERA (52.2IP, 21ER) in those games...allowed one-or-zero runs in six of those nine starts.
- Missed the first 75 games of the season on the 60-day injured list with right elbow inflammation...marked his first I.L. stint this season and his first non-COVID injured list stint since September 2016.

VS. LOS ANGELES-NL: In nine career starts vs. the Dodgers (including the postseason), has gone 4-2 with a 4.61 ERA (52.2IP, 27ER)...has allowed 3ER-or-fewer in seven of those nine starts...tonight will mark his first start vs. the Dodgers at Yankee Stadium.

- As a Yankee, is 1-0 with a 1.50 ERA (12.0IP, 2ER) in two starts vs. Los Angeles-NL...prior to this series, had not faced the Dodgers since 6/3/23 at Dodger Stadium (W, 6.0IP, 4H, 1R/ER, 2BB, 5K, 0HR, 1HP).

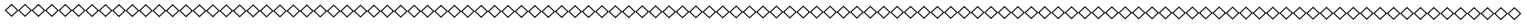
