**TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY**  
Oct. 8, 1956: Don Larsen throws the only perfect game in MLB postseason history as the Yankees take a 3-games-to-2 lead over the Brooklyn Dodgers with a 2-0 victory in Game 5 of the World Series.



**OCTOBER BASEBALL:** The Yankees will play Game 4 of the ALDS against the Toronto Blue Jays tonight...marks their 25th appearance in the ALDS...have advanced in 15 of their previous 24 ALDS.

- ▶ Marks their 60th playoff appearance in franchise history (123 seasons, 48.8%)...their 60 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (39) and 31 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- ▶ Marks the Yankees' eighth postseason appearance in the last nine seasons (since 2017) and 26th trip to the postseason in the last 31 years (since 1995)...their 26 trips to the postseason since 1995 are the most in the Majors in that span, five more than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the next highest AL team (Boston & Cleveland: 15).
- ▶ Are one of only three teams to make the playoffs in at least eight of the last nine years (since 2017), joining the Dodgers (nine: 2017-25) and Astros (eight: 2017-24).

**YESTERDAY'S NEWS:** The Yankees overcame a five-run deficit to defeat the Blue Jays, 9-6, in ALDS Game 3 at Yankee Stadium...**LHP Carlos Rodón** (2.1IP, 6H, 6R/ER, 2BB/1IBB, 2K, 1HR, 1HP) started and did not record a decision...**RF Aaron Judge** (3-for-4, 3R, 1 double, 1HR, 4RBI, 1BB) reached base four times and drove in four runs, hitting an RBI double in the third inning and a game-tying three-run home run in the fourth inning...**DH Giancarlo Stanton** (1-for-4, 2RBI, 1SF) drove in two runs, hitting an RBI single in the first inning and a sac fly in the third inning...**2B Jazz Chisholm Jr.** (1-for-3, 1R, 1HR, 1RBI, 1BB) hit his first home run in the 2025 postseason and third career postseason home run with a go-ahead solo shot in the fifth inning...**C Austin Wells** (2-for-4, 1R, 1RBI) hit an RBI single in the fifth inning...**1B Ben Rice** (0-for-3, 1RBI, 1SF) hit a sac fly in the sixth inning...**Yankees relievers** tossed 6.2 scoreless innings (3H, 0BB, 9K).

**COMEBACK KIDS:** The Yankees overcame a five-run deficit in ALDS Game 3 vs. Toronto, marking their largest comeback win since 7/19/25 at Atlanta (also were trailing by 5R and won 12-9)...marked their largest comeback win in a postseason game since overcoming a five-run deficit in 2010 ALCS Game 1 at Texas (also trailed by 5R and won 6-5).

▶ **The Yankees became only the fifth team in Major League history to overcome a five-run deficit in a potential elimination game**, joining the Boston Red Sox in 2008 ALCS Game 5 vs. Tampa Bay (trailed by 7R), St. Louis Cardinals in 2012 NLDS Game 5 at Washington (trailed by 6R), Anaheim Angels in 2002 World Series Game 6 vs. San Francisco (trailed by 5R) and Seattle Mariners in 1995 ALDS Game 4 vs. the Yankees (trailed by 5R).

**ALL ON THE LINE: The Yankees are now 3-0 in potential elimination games this postseason**...have won six of their last eight potential elimination games (since 2022) and are 13-7 in those games since 2017.

▶ **Are 11-3 in their last 14 potential elimination games at home since 2017 and 15-6 in their last 21 such games at home since 2005.**

▶ Were down, 0-2, in the ALDS for the fourth time in franchise history (advanced in 5G vs. Oakland in 2001 and vs. Cleveland in 2017, and lost in 4G vs. Cleveland in 2007)...have forced a Game 4 in each series...also trailed, 0-2, in a best-of-five ALCS once (were swept in 3G vs. Kansas City in 1980).

**BRONX BOMBERS:** During the regular season, the Yankees owned a .405 winning percentage in games they were homerless, the third-highest winning percentage in the Majors...their .405 winning pct. in those games was 87 points higher than the Major League average (.318)...including the postseason, the Yankees have won four of their last five games (since 9/18) they did not homer, five of their last seven such games (since 9/6) and six of their last nine (since 8/17).

**SCHLITZ'S CREEK: RHP Cam Schlitler will become the 10th pitcher in Major League history and third Yankee to make his first two career postseason starts in potential elimination games**, joining Zach Eflin (2023-24), Frankie Montas (2020-24), Dakota Hudson (2019), Luis Severino (2017), Masahiro Tanaka (2015-17), Jeremy Hellickson (2011-13), Alex Cobb (2013), Hideo Nomo (1995-96) and Randy Lerch (1978-81)...**joins Hudson as the only rookie in Major League history to make his first two career postseason starts in potential elimination games.**

**WHAT A RELIEF: Yankees relievers** tossed 6.2 scoreless innings in ALDS Game 3 vs. Toronto, marking only the third time in franchise history Yankees relievers tossed at least 6.2 scoreless innings in a postseason game (also 7.2 scoreless innings in 1947 World Series Game 7 vs. Brooklyn and 6.2 scoreless innings in 1977 ALCS Game 5 at Kansas City).

**ALL RISE: OF Aaron Judge** reached base four times and drove in four of the Yankees' nine runs in ALDS Game 3 vs. Toronto, hitting an RBI double in the third inning and a game-tying three-run home run in the fourth inning...**his six career home runs in potential elimination games are the most in franchise history and tied with David Ortiz (6HR) for the most in Major League history.**

▶ **His 17 career postseason home runs are the fifth-most postseason home runs by a Yankee in franchise history**, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR), Mickey Mantle (18HR) and Giancarlo Stanton (18HR)...10 of his 17 career postseason home runs have either tied the game (three) or given the Yankees the lead (seven).

▶ His seven career ALDS home runs are tied with Giancarlo Stanton for the third-most in franchise history, trailing only Derek Jeter (10HR) and Bernie Williams (8HR).

▶ Including the postseason, has hit 7HR in his last 20 games (since 6/30/24) against Toronto and 14HR in his last 38 games vs. the Blue Jays (since 5/15/23).

▶ **Has recorded multiple hits in five of his six postseason games this year, batting .500/.577/.727 (11-for-22) with 5R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 6RBI, 3BB/1BB and 1HP.**

▶ **Has gone 4-for-6 with 1 double, 1HR, 6RBI and 1HP with RISP this postseason...including the regular season, has hit .357/.521/.679 (40-for-112) with 9 doubles, 9HR, 63RBI, 43BB/28IBB, 3HP and 75F with RISP this year.**

▶ **His 11 HR are the most by any player in the postseason this year.**

▶ Has reached base in 19 of his last 20 postseason games since 2024.

▶ Including the postseason, has hit .397/.540/.785 (48-for-121) with 40R, 5 doubles, 14HR, 27RBI, 36BB/8IBB, 4HP, 2SF and 45B over his last 36 games (since 8/27).

▶ Including the postseason, has reached base safely in each of his last 23 games (since 9/11), batting .455/.581/.896 (35-for-77) with 27R, 4 doubles, 10HR, 22RBI, 23BB/7IBB, 3HP, 2SF and 15B.

**THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in seven of his first eight seasons as manager** (credit: Elias - min. 2G managed per season), joining Dave Roberts (first 10 seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in seven of his first eight seasons with the Yankees, joining Joe Torre (each of his first 12) and Casey Stengel (nine of his first 10).

▶ His 25 career managerial wins in the postseason are the fifth-most in franchise history, trailing only Joe Torre (76), Casey Stengel (37), Joe McCarthy (29) and Joe Girardi (28)...the Yankees' 25 postseason wins since 2018 are also the second-most in the AL and the third-most in the Majors.

**HOME SWEET HOME:** Including the postseason, the Yankees are 10-1 in their last 11 games at home (since 9/11), 12-3 in their last 15 home games (since 9/6) and 16-4 in their last 20 games at Yankee Stadium (since 8/24).

**MATCHING UP:** The Yankees are facing Toronto in the postseason for the first time in franchise history...prior to this series, the Blue Jays were one of two AL teams that the Yankees had not faced in the postseason (also Chicago-AL).

**WINNING WAYS:** The Yankees posted a 94-68 (.580) record, tied with Toronto for the best record in the American League and third-best record in the Majors, trailing only Milwaukee (97-65, .599) and Philadelphia (96-66, .593)...their 94 wins matched their 2024 total.

▶ **The Yankees recorded their 33rd consecutive winning season (since 1993), marking the second-longest streak in the four major sports (MLB/NFL/NBA/NHL)**, behind only their 39 straight winning seasons from 1926-64.

▶ Including the postseason, the Yankees are 14-4 in their last 18 games (since 9/16), 17-6 in their last 23 games (since 9/11), 28-11 in their last 39 games (since 8/24), 33-14 in their last 47 games (since 8/15) and 37-17 in their last 54 games (since 8/6).

▶ Including the postseason, have won 13 of their last 15 completed series (since 8/11).

**FAN-TASTIC:** The Yankees drew an AL-best 3,392,659 fans this year despite recording just 80 home games...the Yankees' 2025 home attendance was the club's second-highest over their last nine full attendance seasons (since 2015), trailing only their total attendance in 2018 (3,482,855)...averaged 42,408 fans per home game this season, the highest home average attendance in the American League and the third-highest in the Majors, trailing only the Los Angeles Dodgers (49,537) and San Diego Padres (42,435).

▶ **The Yankees drew at least 3 million fans for their Major League-record 25th straight season when there was full attendance** (1999-2019, '22-25).

▶ Their 20 sellouts during the regular season matched their second-most at the current Yankee Stadium, trailing only their 23 sellouts in 2018 (also 20 in 2011).

## TONIGHT'S ALDS GAME 4 STARTING PITCHER: RHP CAM SCHLITTLER (1-0, 0.00)

RHP Cam Schlittler will make second career postseason start in Game 4 of the ALDS tonight vs. Toronto...the 24-year-old will pitch on extended five days' rest... **will become the 10th pitcher in Major League history and third Yankee to make his first two career postseason starts in potential elimination games**, joining Zach Eflin (2023-24), Frankie Montas (2020-24), Dakota Hudson (2019), Luis Severino (2017), Masahiro Tanaka (2015-17), Jeremy Hellickson (2011-13), Alex Cobb (2013), Hideo Nomo (1995-96) and Randy Lerch (1978-81)...made his postseason debut in ALWCS Game 3 vs. Boston on 10/2, earning the win after recording 12K over 8.0 scoreless innings (5H, 0BB)... **became the first pitcher in Major League history to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings and record at least 12K without allowing a walk in a postseason game... was just the fourth rookie pitcher in franchise history to start a "winner-take-all" playoff game**, joining Iván Nova (2011 ALDS Game 5), Mel Stottlemire Sr. (1964 World Series Game 7) and Spec Shea (1947 World Series Game 7) - credit (*Elias*)... **went 4-3 with a 2.96 ERA (73.0IP, 58H, 24R/ER, 31BB, 84K, 8HR) in 14 regular season starts**...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 12 of his 14 starts, 2R-or-fewer in 10 of his starts and 1R-or-fewer in seven starts...from when he made his Major League debut on 7/9 to the end of the regular season, ranked among AL pitchers (min. 60.0IP) in opponents' SLG (.337, fourth), strikeout rate (27.6%, sixth) and K/9.0IP (10.36, seventh)... **his 24R allowed were tied with Bill Stafford (24R in first 14GS from 1960-61) for the second-fewest by a Yankees pitcher through their first 14 career starts**, trailing only Dave Righetti (22R in first 14GS from 1979-81)... **his 84K through his first 14 career games are tied with Dave Righetti (84K in first 14G) for the fourth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Masahiro Tanaka (113K in first 14G), Orlando Hernández (97K in first 14G) and Luis Gil (88K in first 14G)...began the 2025 season in the minors, combining to go 6-6 with a 2.82 ERA (76.2IP, 67H, 30R/24ER, 26BB, 99K, 4HR) in 15 combined games (14 starts) with Double-A Somerset and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre...at the time of his Major League debut, was tied for ninth among minor league pitchers in strikeouts...among qualified Yankees farmhands, was tied for second in strikeouts and starts, ranked fourth in innings pitched, tied for fourth in wins and seventh in ERA...was selected by the Yankees in the seventh round of the 2022 First-Year Player Draft out of Northeastern University (Mass.)...is a native of Weymouth, Mass.

**DOMINANT DEBUT:** Made his postseason debut and earned the win after recording 12K over 8.0 scoreless innings in ALWCS Game 3 vs. Boston on 10/2 (5H, 0BB)... **became the first pitcher in Major League history to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings and record at least 12K without allowing a walk in a postseason game.**

- ✦ **His 12K were the most by a Yankees rookie in a postseason game** (previous: Dave Righetti (10K in 1981 ALDS Game 2 at Milwaukee)... **was the fourth rookie in Major League history to record at least 12K in a postseason game**, joining Florida's Liván Hernández (15K in 1997 NLCS Game 5 vs. Atlanta), Baltimore's Mike Boddicker (14K in 1983 ALCS Game 2 vs. Chicago-AL) and Pittsburgh's John Candelaria (14K in 1975 NLCS Game 3 vs. Cincinnati)... **was the first rookie in Major League history to record at least 12K without surrendering a walk in a postseason game.**
- ✦ **Became the fourth pitcher in franchise history to record at least 12K in a postseason game**, joining Roger Clemens (15K in 2000 ALCS Game 4 at Seattle), Gerrit Cole (13K in 2020 ALWCS Game 1 at Cleveland) and Orlando Hernández (12K in 2000 World Series Game 3 at the Mets)...joined Cole as the only two Yankees to record at least 12K and not allow a walk.
- ✦ **Became the third pitcher in franchise history to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings in a "winner-take-all" game**, joining Ralph Terry (tossed a shutout in 1962 World Series Game 7 at San Francisco) and Johnny Kucks (tossed a shutout in 1956 World Series Game 7 at Brooklyn).
- ✦ **Was the first Yankees rookie and the eighth rookie in Major League history to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings in a postseason start**...joins Oakland's Sonny Gray (8.0IP in 2013 ALDS Game 2 vs. Detroit), San Francisco's Madison Bumgarner (8.0IP in 2010 World Series Game 4 at Texas), Baltimore's Mike Boddicker (SHO in 1983 ALCS Game 2 vs. Chicago-AL), Cleveland's Gene Bearden (SHO in 1948 World Series Game 3 vs. the Boston Braves), Cleveland's Duster Mails (SHO in 1920 World Series Game 6 vs. Brooklyn), Chicago-AL's Dickey Kerr (SHO in 1919 World Series Game 3 vs. Cincinnati) and Pittsburgh's Babe Adams (SHO in 1909 World Series Game 7 at Detroit).
- ✦ **Became just the second Yankee to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings in their postseason debut**, joining Waite Hoyt (SHO in 1921 World Series Game 2 vs. the New York Giants)...his 12K were the most by a Yankee and tied for the eighth-most by a pitcher in their postseason debut in Major League history.
- ✦ **Became just the fourth rookie pitcher in franchise history to start a "winner-take-all" playoff game**, joining Iván Nova (2011 ALDS Game 5), Mel Stottlemire Sr. (1964 World Series Game 7) and Spec Shea (1947 World Series Game 7) - credit (*Elias*).
- ✦ **At 24 years, 239 days, was the fifth pitcher (12th time) in the last 29 years (since 1997) to start a postseason game for the Yankees at age 24-or-younger**, joining Deivi García (1GS at 21-years-old in 2020 ALDS Game 2), Luis Severino (6GS: four at 23-years-old in 2017 and two at 24-years-old in 2018), Iván Nova (1GS at 24-years-old in 2011 ALDS Game 5) and Phil Hughes (3GS at 24-years-old in 2010).
- ✦ Had made just 14 regular season starts in his career prior to his ALWCS Game 3 start... **according to Elias, his 14 regular season starts were the fifth-fewest by a Yankees pitcher prior to their first postseason start**, trailing only Deivi García (6GS prior to start in 2020 ALDS Game 2), Mel Stottlemire Sr. (12GS prior to start in 1964 World Series Game 2), Whitey Ford (12GS prior to start in 1950 World Series Game 4) and Wilcy Moore (12GS prior to start in 1927 World Series Game 4 - also pitched in relief in 1927 World Series Game 1).

**SCHLITTLER'S CREEK:** **Will become the 10th pitcher in Major League history and third Yankee to make his first two career postseason starts in potential elimination games**, joining Zach Eflin (2023-24), Frankie Montas (2020-24), Dakota Hudson (2019), Luis Severino (2017), Masahiro Tanaka (2015-17), Jeremy Hellickson (2011-13), Alex Cobb (2013), Hideo Nomo (1995-96) and Randy Lerch (1978-81)...joins Hudson as the only rookies in Major League history to make his first two career postseason starts in potential elimination games.

**2025:** Went 4-3 with a 2.96 ERA (73.0IP, 58H, 24R/ER, 31BB, 84K, 8HR) in 14 starts...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 12 of his 14 starts, 2R-or-fewer in 10 of his starts and 1R-or-fewer in seven starts...from when he made his Major League debut on 7/9 to the end of the season, ranked among AL pitchers (min. 60.0IP) in opponents' SLG (.337, fourth), strikeout rate (27.6%, sixth) and K/9.0IP (10.36, seventh).

- ✦ **His 24R allowed were tied with Bill Stafford (24R in first 14GS from 1960-61) for the second-fewest by a Yankees pitcher through their first 14 career starts**, trailing only Dave Righetti (22R in first 14GS from 1979-81).
- ✦ **His 84K through his first 14 career games are tied with Dave Righetti (84K in first 14G) for the fourth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Masahiro Tanaka (113K in first 14G), Orlando Hernández (97K in first 14G) and Luis Gil (88K in first 14G).
- ✦ Allowed 3R-or-fewer in each of his first nine career starts from 7/9-8/30, tying Dave Righetti (9GS from 9/16/79-8/16/81) and Herb Thormahlen (9GS from 9/29/1917(G2)-6/8/1918) for the second-longest streak to begin their career in franchise history, trailing only Joba Chamberlain (11GS from 6/3-7/30/08).
- ✦ The Yankees went 9-5 in his 14 starts, including 7-1 over his final eight starts from 8/20-9/27.

- With his 13.50 K/9.0IP, became only the fifth reliever (11th time) to post as high of a K/9.0IP ratio in a single season...his 13.50 K/9.0IP ratio was tied for the ninth-highest by a Yankees reliever in franchise history, trailing only Aroldis Chapman (16.31 in 2018 and 15.50 in 2021), Dellin Betances (15.53 in 2016 and 2018; 15.08 in 2017, 14.04 in 2015), Andrew Miller (15.29 in 2016 and 14.59 in 2015)...Betances (2014) and David Robertson (2011) also posted a 13.50 K/9.0IP.

### #75 CAMILO DOVAL—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the second time in his career (also 2021).
- Made his fifth career postseason appearance (second with the Yankees) in ALDS Game 3 vs. Toronto, tossing a scoreless inning in relief (1.0IP, 1H, 1K)...stranded an inherited runner after entering the game in the fourth inning...on Saturday in ALDS Game 1 at Toronto, tossed 2.0 perfect innings (matched his regular season career high)...including the regular season, marked just the fifth time in his career he has tossed at least 2.0IP (last on 7/2/25 at Arizona with San Francisco) and second time in the postseason (also 2021 NLDS Game 3 at Los Angeles-NL with San Francisco).
- Including the regular season, has not allowed a run in each of his last eight outings since 9/14 (8.0IP, 2H, 2BB, 9K).
- Went 4-3 with a 3.58 ERA (65.1IP, 51H, 34R/26ER, 35BB, 72K, 4HR) in 69 combined relief appearances with the San Francisco Giants and the Yankees...allowed 4HR to 278BF this season.
- Held left-handed batters to a .196/.297/.295 (22-for-112) slash line this season...allowed 22H to 128 left-handed batters faced (15BB, 1HP).
- Began the season with San Francisco, going 4-2 with 15 saves and a 3.09 ERA (46.2IP, 32H, 20R/16ER, 24BB, 50K, 2HR) in 47 relief appearances...did not allow an earned run in 38 of his 47 appearances.
- Acquired by the Yankees from the San Francisco Giants in exchange for C Jesús Rodríguez, RHP Trystan Vrieling, INF Parks Harber and LHP Carlos de la Rosa on 7/31.
- In 22 games with the Yankees, went 0-1 with one save and a 4.82 ERA (18.2IP, 19H, 14R/10ER, 11BB, 22K, 2HR)...did not allow a run in each of his last six appearances of the season from 9/14-26 (5.0IP, 1H, 2BB, 8K)...retired 14 of his 17BF over that span.

### #81 LUIS GIL—RHP

- Made his third career postseason start in ALDS Game 1 at Toronto and did not record a decision after tossing 2.2IP (4H, 2R/ER, 0BB, 2K, 2HR).
- Would mark his first career relief outing (regular season and postseason).
- In 11 starts with the Yankees in 2025, went 4-1 with a 3.32 ERA (57.0IP, 47H, 23R/21ER, 33BB, 41K, 5HR)...allowed 2R-or-fewer in nine of his 11 starts...allowed 1ER-or-fewer in five of his starts...over his final 10 starts (8/9-9/28), went 4-0 with a 2.68 ERA (53.2IP, 16ER).
- Allowed 2R-or-fewer in nine of his last 10 starts of the regular season (since 8/9), going 4-0 with a 2.68 ERA (53.2IP,16ER) in that span...tossed at least 5.0IP in nine of those starts.
- Missed the first 111 games of the season on the 60-day injured list (3/24-8/3) with a right lat strain...was placed on the 60-day I.L. on 3/24...combined to make four rehab starts with Double-A Somerset and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, posting a 5.65 ERA (14.1IP, 11H, 9R/ER, 7BB, 24K, 4HR)...was returned from rehab and reinstated from the I.L. on 8/3.

### #54 TIM HILL—LHP

- Has made the postseason for the fourth time in his career (2020, '22, '24-25).
- Made his 19th career postseason appearance and 13th with the Yankees in ALDS Game 3 vs. Toronto, earning his first win of the 2025 postseason and second of his career (1.1IP, 1K)...marked his first postseason win since 2022 NLDS Game 4 vs. Los Angeles-NL with San Diego...stranded an inherited runner after entering the game in the fifth inning... on Saturday in ALDS Game 1 at Toronto, tossed 1.1 scoreless innings (1H)...stranded an inherited runner after entering the game in the third inning.
- On 9/30 in ALWCWS Game 1 vs. Boston, retired his only batter faced for the final out in the ninth inning (0.1IP).
- In 70 relief appearances with the Yankees, went 4-4 with a 3.09 ERA (67.0IP, 23ER)...opponents batted .231/.276/.363 (58-for-251, 8HR); LH .181/.224/.220 (23-for-127, 1HR); RH .282/.328/.508 (35-for-124, 7HR).
- Did not allow an ER in 53 of his 70 appearances.
- Led the team in games pitched...made at least 60 appearances for the fourth time in his career (also 2018 with Kansas City, 2021 with San Diego and 2024 with Chicago-AL and the Yankees).
- Allowed only 13 of his 63 inherited runners to score this season...his 20.6% inherited runners scored percentage this year was the sixth-best percentage in the AL and eighth-best in the Majors.
- Ranked second among Major League relievers in groundball percentage (64.8%, second in AL).
- Has not allowed an earned run in 15 of his 16 career postseason appearances, going 1-0 with a 0.68 ERA (13.1IP, 9H, 3R/1ER, 3BB, 8K, 0HR)...made 10 relief appearances with the Yankees in 2024, posting a 1.08 ERA (8.1IP, 7H, 2R/1ER, 2BB, 3K, 0HR).

### #98 WILL WARREN—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the first time in his career.
- Made his first career postseason appearance in ALDS Game 2 at Toronto, allowing 6R/ER over 4.2IP in relief (7H, 1BB, 4K, 4HR, 1WP)...allowed both of his inherited runners to score after entering the game in the fourth inning.
- In his first full Major League season, went 9-8 with a 4.44 ERA (162.1IP, 158H, 90R/80ER, 65BB, 171K, 22HR).
- Was tied for second in the Majors (tied for first in AL) in games started...ranked eighth in the AL in K/9.0IP (9.48).
- Among Major League rookies, ranked first in strikeouts, starts and innings pitched and was tied for fourth in wins (tied for third in AL).
- Allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 24 of his 33 starts this season, including 2ER-or-fewer in 22 of those starts...according to *Elias*, his 22 starts of 2ER-or-fewer were the second-most by a Yankees rookie in a single season, trailing only Stan Bahnsen (25GS in 1968).
- According to *Elias*, his 171K this season were tied with Luis Gil (171K in 2024) for the second-most by a Yankees rookie in a single season in franchise history, trailing only Russ Ford (209K in 1910).
- Was just the third Yankees rookie to make at least 33 starts in a season, joining Stan Bahnsen (34GS in 1968), and Russ Ford (33GS in 1910)...was also the first Major League rookie to make at least 33 starts in a single season since 2009 (Nick Blackburn, 33GS with Minnesota in 2008).
- Surrendered one-or-zero home runs in 29 of his 33 starts this season, including 0HR in 15 starts...his 29 starts of one-or-zero home runs allowed were tied for the fourth-most in the Majors.

### #30 LUKE WEAVER—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the second time in his career (2024-25).
- Made his 15th career postseason appearance—and his second in as many days—in ALDS Game 2 at Toronto, retiring his only batter faced after entering the game in the eighth inning (0.1IP)...did not record an out (0.0IP, 2H, 3R/ER, 1BB) in ALDS Game 1 at Toronto...on 9/30 in ALWCWS Game 1 vs. Boston, recorded the loss after allowing 2R/ER without recording an out (0.0IP, 2H, 1BB).
- Went 4-4 with eight saves and a 3.62 ERA (64.2IP, 46H, 28R/26ER, 20BB, 72K, 10HR) in 64 relief appearances with the Yankees.
- Did not allow an ER in 49 of his 64 appearances.
- Made at least 60 appearances for the second time in his career (also 62G in 2024).
- Saw his first career postseason action in 2024, going 1-0 with four saves and a 1.76 ERA (15.1IP, 8H, 3R/ER, 2BB, 16K, 2HR) in 12 relief appearances...did not allow a run in 10 of his 12 appearances...held opponents to a .163/.200/.306 (8-for-49) slash line...recorded at least four outs in eight of his appearances and five outs in four of them...appeared in each of the Yankees' first seven postseason games...joined teammate Clay Holmes (2024) and Adam Ottavino (2019) as the only pitchers in franchise history to pitch in each of the Yankees' first seven games of a postseason...pitched in all four games of the 2024 ALDS vs. Kansas City, earning three saves over 4.1 scoreless innings (2H, 5K)...was the third player in franchise history to record three saves in a Division Series, joining Goose Gossage in 1981 and Mariano Rivera in 2000...is also one of 13 players in Major League history to record three saves in a Division Series...did not allow a run in four World Series appearances (5.0IP, 1H, 1BB, 4K, 1HP, 1BK).
- Became the first Yankee and the sixth player in Major League history to record four saves in his first five career postseason appearances (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Cody Allen, Dennis Eckersley, Jason Isringhausen, Troy Percival and Brian Wilson...also became the sixth pitcher in Major League history to record four saves in his team's first five games of a postseason (since saves became an official stat in 1969), joining Dennis Eckersley (1988 with Oakland), Mark Wohlers (1996 with Atlanta), Neftalí Feliz (2011 with Texas), Cody Allen (2016 with Cleveland) and Paul Sewald (2023 with Arizona).

### #38 DEVIN WILLIAMS—RHP

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (2023-25)...did not make Milwaukee's Wild Card rosters in 2019 and 2020, and did not appear on Milwaukee's NLDS roster in 2021.
- Made his sixth career postseason appearance in ALDS Game 3 vs. Toronto, tossing 1.1 scoreless innings of relief (1H, 2K)...marked his first career postseason outing of at least four outs and his first-such appearance regular season appearance since 9/1/23 vs. Philadelphia with Milwaukee (also 1.1IP).
- Made his fifth career postseason appearance on 10/1 in ALWCWS Game 2 vs. Boston, tossing a scoreless eighth inning (1H, 1K)...made his fourth career postseason appearance and first with the Yankees on 9/30 in ALWCWS Game 1 vs. Boston, tossed a scoreless eighth inning (1BB).
- Made 67 relief appearances for the Yankees, going 4-6 with a 4.79 ERA (62.0IP, 45H, 37R/33ER, 25BB, 90K, 5HR).
- Among Major League relievers, ranked seventh in K/9.0IP (13.06, fifth in AL) and ninth in strikeout rate (34.7%, seventh in AL)...also ranked seventh among AL relievers in strikeouts (90).
- Converted 18-of-22 save opportunities.
- His 18 saves were his second-most in a season in his career, trailing only his 36 saves in 2023 with Milwaukee...recorded double-digit saves for the fourth time in his career (also 15SV in 2022, 36SV in 2023 and 14SV in 2024).
- Made at least 60 appearances for the third time in his career (also 65 games in 2022 and 61 games in 2023 with Milwaukee).
- Did not allow a run in 43 of his final 57 games (since 4/28), holding opponents to a .171/.252/.295 (33-for-193) slash line over that stretch.
- Posted a 14.97 K/9.0IP ratio and 41.1% strikeout rate over his final 32 games (7/6-9/28), the second-highest highest K/9.0IP and strikeout rate in Majors over that span (min. 20.0IP).

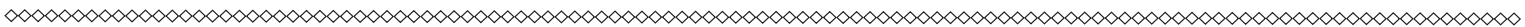
# YANKEES VS. TORONTO BLUE JAYS

**OVERALL TRENDS/FACTS:** The Yankees went 5-8 vs. the Blue Jays this season...(6G in the Bronx, 7G at Toronto)...have won or tied 25 of the last 41 series against the Blue Jays (21-16-4) since 9/29/17, including 12 of their last 22 series since 6/15/21...**IN SEASON SERIES:** Have won three of the last four season series against the Blue Jays (2024: 7-6, 2023: 7-6, 2022: 11-8) and have won or tied six of the last eight season series against Toronto (5-2-1)...**AT YANKEE STADIUM:** Went 4-2 at Yankee Stadium this year...are 42-30 in the last 72 home matchups (since 9/5/16)...are 88-56 vs. Toronto at the current Yankee Stadium...have posted a winning record in the Bronx vs. the Blue Jays in 18 of the last 22 seasons since 2004 (2-8 in 2015 and '21; 5-5 in 2022)...**AT ROGERS CENTRE:** Went 1-6 vs. the Blue Jays this year...went 3-4 at Toronto in 2024...have posted a winning road record at Toronto in three of the last five seasons...have won or tied eight of their 11 road series at Toronto (since 6/15/21).

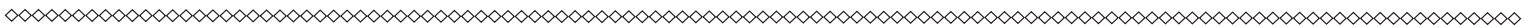
