OCTOBER BASEBALL: The Yankees will play Game 3 of the ALCS onight at Cleveland.

Marks their 19th appearance in the ALCS, marking the

- most LCS appearances by any Major League team...marks their fourth trip to the ALCS in the last eight seasons (since 2017; went to ALCS in '17, '19 and '22)...their 19 trips to the ALCS are seven more than the next AL team (Boston-12).
- Have advanced to the World Series in four of five ALCS when winning their first two games of the series...are 15-3 in a best-of-seven series in which they were Care 1 15-3 in a best-of-seven series in which they won Game 1 and Game 2.
- Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995).

WHERE WE LEFT OFF: The Yankees defeated the Guardians, 6-3, WHERE WE LEFT OFF: The Yankees defeated the Guardians, 6-3, in ALCS Game 2 at Yankee Stadium on Tuesday...RHP Gerrit Cole (4.11P, 6H, 2R/ER, 4BB, 4K, 0HR) started and did not record a decision...CF Aaron Judge (1-for-3, 1R, 1HR, 3RBI, 1SF) drove in three of the Yankees' six runs, hitting a sac fly in the second inning and his 14th career postseason HR with a two-run shot in the seventh inning...LF Alex Verdugo (1-for-3, 1 double, 1RBI, 1BB) reached base twice and hit an RBI double in the second inning...2B Gleyber Torres (3-for-5, 2R, 1 double) recorded a team-leading 3H...SS Anthony Volpe (2-for-3, 2R, 1BB) reached base three times...RHP Clay Holmes (W, 0.2IP, 1BB, 1K), LHP Tim Hill (1.2IP, 1K) and RHP Tommy Kahnle (1.1IP, 1H, 1BB, 1K) were scoreless in relief...RHP Luke Weaver (1.0IP, 1H, 1R/ER, 1HR) allowed a solo HR in the ninth inning. allowed a solo HR in the ninth inning.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

EN GARD!: The Yankees are facing Cleveland in the postseason for the seventh time in franchise history and for the second time in the ALCS (also 1998)...the Yankees have won four of their six completed postseason series against the Guardians, including each of the last three and four of their last five: 2022 ALDS (3-2), 2020 ALWCS (2-0), 2017 ALDS (3-2), 2007 ALDS (1-3), 1998 ALCS (4-2) and 1997 ALDS (2-3)...the Yankees are 17-12 in 29 postseason games vs. Cleveland.

Including the postseason, the Yankees are 6-2 vs. Cleveland this season and 24-10 vs. the Guardians since 2020.

Including the postseason, have won each of their last seven completed series vs. the Guardians (since 2022) and nine of their last 10 completed series (since 2020).

Including the postseason, are 29-8 vs. the AL Central this season and 97-42 since 2021.

THE GREAT JUAN: OF Juan Soto has reached base in 12-of-26PA this postseason, batting .350/.462/.550 (7-for-20) with 2R,

WHAT A RELIEF: Yankees relievers have posted a 0.77 ERA (23.1IP, 2ER) and 23K this postseason...have held opponents to a .159/.225/.195 (13-for-82) slash line.

> RHP Luke Weaver and RHP Clay Holmes have pitched in each of the Yankees' six postseason games...join Mariano Rivera (twice: 2004 and '09) and Adam Ottavino (2019) as the only pitchers in franchise history to pitch in each of the Yankees' first six games of a postseason.

GLEYBER DAY: INF Gleyber Torres recorded a team-leading 3H in ALCS Game 2 on Tuesday...has reached base in 13-of-30PA this postseason (7H, 6BB), hitting .292/.433/.500 (7-for-24) with 7R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 3RBI and 6BB in six games...has scored seven of the Yankees' 25R this postseason.

HIGH VOLPAGE: INF Anthony Volpe has reached base in 11-of-24PA this postseason, posting a .458 OBP in six games (5H, 6BB).

ALL RISE: OF Aaron Judge drove in three of the Yankees' six runs in ALCS Game 2, hitting a sac fly in the second inning and his 14th career postseason HR with a two-run shot in the seventh inning... his 14 career postseason home runs are the fifth-most in franchise history, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR), Mickey Mantle (18HR) and Babe Ruth (15HR).

HOLMES SWEET HOLMES: RHP Clay Holmes is 2-0 and has not allowed a run in 6.2 innings over six relief appearances this postseason...has held opponents to a .136/208/136 (3-for-22) slash line over that stretch...has not allowed a run over 14.2 innings in 12 career postseason relief appearances...his 14.2 scoreless inning streak is the second-longest scoreless streak by a Yankee to begin his postseason career, trailing only Mariano Rivera's 16.0 scoreless inning streak to begin his postseason career...also marks the fifth-longest scoreless streak by a Yankees reliever in the postseason (Mariano Rivera: 33.1IP from 1998-2000, 17.1IP from 2003-04, 16.1IP from 2005-09 and 16.0IP from 1995-96).

Including the postseason, has gone 3-0 with one save, a 1.23 ERA Including the postseason, has gone 3-0 with one save, a 1.23 ERA (14.2IP, 2ER) and 13K in his last 16 relief appearances (since 9/8).

ROAD WARRIORS: Including the postseason, the Yankees are a Major League-best 52-31 (.627) on the road this year...are 19-9 in their last 28 road games (since 7/27).

Their 50 road wins during the regular season were their most in a single season in the last 21 years (since 2004) and their most since their 51 wins in 2003...their 50 road wins were tied for their eighth-most in a single season in franchise history

- their eighth-most in a single season in franchise history.

 STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton has hit .304/.385/.652 (7-for-23) with 3R, 2 doubles, 2HR, 5RBI, 3BB and 1SB in six games this postseason.

 Is just the third player in Major League history to hit at least 13HR in his first 33 career postseason games, joining Carlos Beltrán (14HR) and Nelson Cruz (14HR).

 His career 9.15 AB/HR (13HR/119AB) ratio in the postseason is the second-best in Major League history (min. 100PA), trailing only Babe Ruth (8.60)...his 13 career home runs are the sixth-most postseason home runs in franchise history, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR), Mickey Mantle (18HR), Babe Ruth (15HR) and Aaron Judge (14HR)...including the postseason, the Yankees are 25-4 this year when Stanton homers.

 Has recorded 29RBI in 33 career postseason games, including 28RBI in his last 27 playoff games (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).

SCHMIDT'S CREEK: RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his second career postseason start tonight...including the postseason, has gone 5-5 with a 2.90 ERA (90.0IP, 29ER) and 97K in 17 starts this year...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 16 of his 17 starts, including 2R-or-fewer in 11 of those starts and one-or-zero runs in five of those starts.

In nine road starts this season (including the postseason), has gone 3-3 with a 1.62 ERA (50.0IP, 9ER). . . has allowed 2ER-or-fewer in each of his last eight road starts (since 4/13-G1 at Cleveland), going 3-3 with a 1.21 ERA (44.2IP, 6ER) over that stretch.

WALK IT OUT: Yankees batters have walked 37 times this postseason, the most walks by any Major League team through their first six games of a postseason...marks their most walks in a six-game span in the postseason since recording 38BB in six games from 2009 ALCS Games 1-6...also marks the most walks by any team in a six-game span in the postseason since the Dodgers recorded 38BB from 2017 NLDS Game 2 - 2017 NLCS Game 4.

PITCH PERFECT: Yankees pitchers have posted a 2.50 ERA (54.0IP, 15ER) this postseason, allowing 3ER-or-fewer in five of their six games.

PEN PAL: RHP Tommy Kahnle has gone 1-0 over 4.1 scoreless innings this postseason, allowing just 1H to 17BF...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 12 of his last 13 appearances (since 9/3), going 1-1 with one save, a 1.50 ERA (12.0IP, 2ER) and 13K... has not allowed a run in 18 of 22 career postseason appearances, going 2-0 with one save, a 2.81 ERA (25.2IP, 8ER) and 26K.

DREAM WEAVER: RHP Luke Weaver has posted four saves with a 1.29 ERA (7.0IP, 1ER) and 9K over six relief appearances this postseason...has recorded at least four outs in three of his four saves this postseason and at least five outs in two of them.

Has not allowed an ER in 13 of his last 14 appearances (including the postseason), striking out 33-of-65BF and holding opponents to a .115/.169/.180 (7-for-61) slash line over that stretch...over his last 23 games (including the postseason since 8/16), has gone 3-0 with eight saves and a 1.01 ERA (26.2IP, 3ER) and 42K.

TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 17, 2019: CC Sabathia makes the final appearance of his 19-year career, recording the first two outs of the eighth inning in Game 4 of the ALCS vs. Houston at Yankee Stadium before exiting the game with a left shoulder injury

Oct. 17, 2009: In Game 2 of the ALCS, the Yankees outlast the Angels with a 4-3 "walk-off" victory in 13 innings, as Jerry Hairston scores the winning run on a throwing error.

Oct. 17, 1998: Trailing the Padres by a score of 5-2 in Game 1 of the World Series, the Yankees score seven runs in the bottom of the seventh inning en route to a 9-6 victory. Chuck Knoblauch ties the game at 5-5 with a three-run homer and Tino Martinez follows with a grand slam.

Oct. 17, 1978: With a 7-2 victory at Dodger Stadium, the Yankees earn their 22nd World Series title by defeating Los Angeles 4 games-to-2 for the second consecutive season.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 18, 1999: Derek Jeter hits a two-run homer in the top of the first inning and Jorge Posada follows suit in the ninth, as the Yankes defeat the Red Sox, 6-1, in Fenway Park to wrap up a 4-games-to-1 ALCS victory.

4-games-to-1 ALLS VICTOY.

Oct. 18, 1977: The Yankees snap a 14-season World Series championship drought and claim their 21st title by defeating the Dodgers, 4 games-to-2. After homering in Games 4 and 5, Reggie Jackson secures his World Series MVP honor by belting three more home runs in Game 6, as New York earns an 8-4 victory at Yankee Stadium Stadium.

TONIGHT'S ALCS GAME 3 STARTING PITCHER: RHP CLARKE SCHMIDT (0-0, 3.86)

RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his fifth career postseason appearance (second start) in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland tonight...made his first career postseason start in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City on 10/9, allowing 2ER in 4.2IP without recording a decision (4H, 1BB, 4K, 1HP)...went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 27ER) in 16 starts this season allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 straight starts from 3/31-9/24 and 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those games...his 15 straight starts of 3R-or-fewer is tied for the longest streak by a Yankees starter in their first 15 starts of a season in franchise history (also Ron Guidry's 15GS from 4/8-6/22/78)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 35 of his last 39 starts (since 5/19/23)...in 2023, went 9-9 with a 4.64 ERA (159.0IP, 169H, 91R/82ER, 46BB, 149K, 24HR) in 33 games (32 starts) with the Yankees...has made three career Opening Day rosters (2022-24)...was selected by the Yankees in the first round (16th overall) of the 2017 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of South Carolina.

2024: Went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 71H, 31R/27ER, 30BB, 93K, 8HR) in 16 starts this season...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 straight starts from 3/31-9/24 and 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those games...his 15 straight starts of 3R-or-fewer is tied for the longest streak by a Yankees starter to begin a season in franchise history (also Ron Guidry's 15GS from 4/8-6/22/78).

- Allowed just 16R/13ER over his final nine starts (from 5/10-9/29), posting a 2.37 ERA (49.1IP, 13ER) in that span. Was placed on the 15-day injured list on 5/30 (retroactive to 5/27) with a right lat strain and was transferred to the 60-day injured list on 6/18...was
- returned from rehab and reinstated on 9/7...missed 86 team games.

 Recorded back-to-back scoreless starts for the first time in his career from 5/10-16 (0R in 8.0IP on 5/16 at Minnesota and 0R in 6.2IP on 5/10 at Tampa Bay)...was the first Yankee to record back-to-back scoreless starts of at least 6.0IP since Luis Severino from 8/23-28/23.
- Posted a career-best 17.2 scoreless innings streak from the fifth inning on 5/4 through the second inning on 5/21

- Recorded at least 6K in a career-high five consecutive starts from 5/4-26.

 Won three straight starts from 5/4-16, the second-longest streak of his career (won five consecutive starts from 6/29-7/29/23).

 Earned his fifth win of the year on 5/16 at Minnesota after tossing a career-high 8.0 scoreless innings (3H, 0BB, 8K, 1HP)...his 8K marked his most in a game this season and matched his career high (also 8K on 8/20/23 vs. Boston, 7/15/23 at Colorado, 4/28/23 at Texas and 4/23/23 vs. Toronto)... threw a career-high 103 pitches (previous: 102 on 4/19/24 vs. Tampa Bay)...is one of two Yankees pitchers this season to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings in a game (also Nestor Cortes: 8.0IP, OR on 4/8 vs. Miami).

ON A ROLL: Over his last 41 outings (40 starts) since 5/19/23 (including postseason), has gone 13-10 with a 3.57 ERA (209.0IP, 192H, 91R/83ER, 63BB, 198K, 24HR)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 36 of those 40 starts.

- Allowed 3R-or-fewer in 17 straight starts from 9/25/23-9/24/24), marking his longest such streak in his career and the third-longest such streak in franchise history, trailing only Russ Ford (20GS from 8/9(G2)/1910-5/27(G2)/1911) and Nestor Cortes (19GS from 8/15/21-6/2(G1)/22)... allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 13 of those starts.
- Recorded at least 6K in 10 of his final 14 starts this season (4/13-G1-9/29), including 7K-or-more in six of those games. Including the postseason, the Yankees have won 16 of his last 22 starts (since 9/6/23 vs. Detroit) and 23 of his last 33 starts (since 6/29/23 at Oakland)...has allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 30 of those 33 starts.
- Including the postseason, has allowed 4R-or-fewer in each of his last 25 starts (since 8/20/23 vs. Boston)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 22 of those starts and 2R-or-fewer in 14 of those starts.

POSTSEASON CAREER: Will make his second career postseason start (fifth career postseason appearance) in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland tonight... made his first career postseason start in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City on 10/9, allowing 2ER in 4.2IP without recording a decision (4H, 1BB, 4K, 1HP)...has made three career relief appearances in the postseason (2022 ALDS Game 2 vs. CLE, 2022 ALDS Game 3 at CLE and 2022 ALCS Game 1 at HOU), going 0-2 with an 11.57 ERA (2.1IP, 3ER).

HOME SWEET HOME: Made eight home starts this season, going 2-2 with a 4.50 ERA (40.0IP, 20ER) and 47K...the Yankees went 6-2 in his home starts this season.

- Going back to last season, the Yankees have won 10 of Schmidt's last 14 home starts (since 7/21/23), with Schmidt going 4-3 with a 4.52 ERA (71.2IP, 36ER) and 71K in that span. Has tossed 5.0 innings-or-more in 14 of his last 17 home starts (since 6/11/23)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 of those 17 games
- Has made 41 appearances (27 starts) in his career at Yankee Stadium, going 8-10 with one save and a 4.10 ERA (158.0IP, 143H, 80R/72ER, 50BB, 155K, 24HR) in those games.

VS. CLEVELAND: Has made four career appearances (three career starts) vs. Cleveland, going 1-0 with a 3.52 ERA (15.1IP, 6ER) and 18K against the Guardians.
