



2024 AT 24: The Giants finished the regular season 80-82 to miss the playoffs for a third consecutive season...SF finished in fourth place in the National League West, 18.0 games out of first place and 9.0 games out of the third and final Wild Card spot.

OUTSIDE LOOKING IN, AGAIN: This season marks the seventh time in the last eight years (since 2017) in which the Giants have missed the Postseason with the 107-win 2021 season being the outlier.

CHANGING OF THE GUARD: The Giants announced on September 30 that they parted ways with President of Baseball Operations **Farhan Zaidi**, a role he'd held since November 6, 2018, and elevated 2012 NL MVP and three-time World Series Champion **Buster Posey** to the President of Baseball Operations role.

- ▶ Posey, who has been a Principal Partner with the Giants for over two seasons, played 12 seasons with the Giants (2009-2021).
- ▶ SF went 453-417 (.521) with one Postseason berth (2021) in six seasons under Zaidi.
- ▶ Additionally, the Giants will be hiring a General Manager after moving **Pete Putila** off the role following the end of the 2024 season.

CAN'T GET OVER THE HUMP: The Giants struggled to get over the .500 hump this season, playing just 29 games at or above .500 (15 above .500).

- ▶ The Giants went 8-14 (.364) in games in which a win would get them to .500, getting outscored 99-93 in such games.

NICE TO MEET YOU: The Giants finished this season with 58 total players, eighth-most in MLB and fifth-most in the NL (Miami led MLB with 70 players).

- ▶ The 58 players were third-most in Giants franchise history, trailing only the 2019 and 2022 teams, who had 64 and 66 players, respectively.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: Rookies again played a major part for the Giants, with 13 players making MLB debuts, surpassing their total (12) from a year ago.

- ▶ The 13 MLB debuts were tied for most in MLB with the A's and White Sox.
- ▶ The 13 players who debuted were: **OF Jung Hoo Lee** (March 28), **LHP Erik Miller** (March 28), **RHP Landen Roupp** (March 29), **RHP Kai-Wei Teng** (March 31), **RHP Nick Avila** (April 1), **RHP Randy Rodríguez** (May 4), **RHP Mason Black** (May 6), **IF Trenton Brooks** (May 28), **RHP Spencer Bivens** (June 16), **LHP Raymond Burgos** (June 24), **RHP Hayden Birdsong** (June 26), **OF Grant McCray** (August 14) and **RHP Trevor McDonald** (September 29).

HOMESICK: The Giants were 42-39 at home compared to 38-43 on the road...the last few weeks of the season saw a reversal, however, as SF ended the year winning 9 of its final 12 road games while going 3-10 at home in September.

INJURIES: The Injury bug bit the Giants hard this season with 1,445 total games missed by players on the Injured List, Bereavement List or Paternity List.

- ▶ In Spring Training, SF was already without **RHP Alex Cobb** (left hip surgery) and **LHP Robbie Ray** (left elbow UCL surgery) before another potential rotation option, **RHP Tristan Beck**, needed surgery to remove an aneurysm in his right arm.
- ▶ After a late start in Spring, **LHP Blake Snell** was placed on the Injured List twice and the Paternity List once, missing 59 total games on inactive lists.
- ▶ Another piece of the rotation, **RHP Keaton Winn**, missed the final 86 games of the season with right elbow inflammation, while top prospect **LHP Kyle Harrison**, missed 43 games with two separate injuries.
- ▶ On the position player side, the Giants lost star rookie **OF Jung Hoo Lee** for the final 4+ months of the season with a dislocated left shoulder, as well as SF's 2023 home run leader **IF Wilmer Flores** (right knee tendonitis) for the final 60 games.

HONORING OUR LEGENDS: The Giants celebrated the life of Hall-of-Famer **Willie Mays**, as well as the history of the Negro Leagues when they played against the St. Louis Cardinals at historic Rickwood Field on June 20 in Birmingham, AL.

- ▶ Mays had passed away two days prior while the Giants were playing in Chicago at Wrigley Field...you can find a link to a video tribute narrated by Jon Miller [here](#).
- ▶ The Giants also celebrated the life of Hall-of-Famer **Orlando Cepeda**, who passed away on June 28, with a pregame ceremony at Oracle Park on Fiesta Gigantes Day on September 15 vs. San Diego.

PACKING THE PARK: The Giants averaged 33,097 fans at home games, which was 10th-best in MLB...last season, SF averaged 30,866 fans per game (17th in MLB)...this season's attendance bump for SF was an increase of 2,231 fans/game.

- ▶ The 2,647,736 fans at Giants games in 2024 were the franchise's most since the pre-pandemic 2019 season (2,707,760).
- ▶ The Giants had 13 sellouts after totaling three in 2023.
- ▶ The season-high attendance was September 1 in which 41,187 fans were on hand.

2024 REGULAR SEASON NOTES

TEAM BATTING NOTES

THE OFFENSE: The Giants finished the season with a .701 OPS, 19th of 30 MLB teams (and 11th of 15 NL teams)...the .701 OPS was an improvement over the .695 mark from last season, which ranked T-26th in MLB and 15th in the NL...SF hit 177 homers, T-16th in the Majors (T-8th in the NL).

- ▶ The power mostly came on the road with 112 homers (fifth in MLB) and a .707 OPS (T-13th) on the road compared to 65 homers (29th) and a .695 OPS (21st) at home.
- ▶ Of the 177 homers, 128 of them came off righties with a .686 OPS....SF hit 49 of its 177 homers vs. lefties with a .740 OPS.
- ▶ Five was the Giants' magic number in terms of overall runs scored in a game, going 49-12 (.803) when scoring five or more runs, and 33-5 (.868) when scoring six or more runs...when scoring fewer than five runs, SF was 31-70 (.307).

COMEBACK KIDS: The Giants were one of the better teams at coming back from deficits, with their 37 such wins ranking T-9th in MLB and T-5th in the National League.

- ▶ The Giants tied for the MLB lead with 11 walk-off wins, which were their most since they had 12 walk-off wins in 2013.
- ▶ SF had one of the more memorable road trips in late May...the road trip included four straight comeback wins when trailing through 7.0 innings, which was the first time that happened in Giants franchise history (since 1901) per *SportRadar*.

THE STRIKEOUTS...: The Giants struck out 1,452 times in 2024, an improvement over their franchise record number of strikeouts set last season (1,492)...they were also the fifth-most in Giants franchise history, behind 2023, 2018 (1,467), 2022 (1,462) and 2021 (1,461).

- ▶ SF's 1,452 strikeouts were 11th-most in the Majors and sixth-highest total in the National League.

RISPY BUSINESS: Capitalizing with runners in scoring position proved to be a major obstacle for the 2024 Giants offense...below is a table of where SF in MLB with ranked with RISP.

ROOKIES AT THE PLATE: Giants rookie hitters posted a .704 OPS, which was eighth-best overall in MLB, and third-best among teams with at least 700 plate appearances by rookies behind Milwaukee (.729) and Chicago-NL (.709).

OPS BY POSITION, A BREAKDOWN: Below is a chart of the Giants OPS by position this year and in parentheses is where that OPS ranked in the Majors.

NO FLY ZONE: Even with a late-season emphasis on the run-game, the Giants still finished with 68 stolen bases, which ranked as fewest in the National League and second-fewest in MLB (Minnesota with 65).

- ▶ The Giants' 68 steals were their most since 2018 (77 steals).
- ▶ **IF/OF Tyler Fitzgerald** (17 stolen bases) and **IF Matt Chapman** (15 stolen bases) became the first pair of Giants teammates to both have 15+ stolen bases in a season since **OF Grégor Blanco** and **OF Ángel Pagán** had 16 stolen bases each in 2014.

TEAM PITCHING NOTES

PITCHING IN: The Giants pitching staff finished the season with the 19th-ranked ERA in MLB (10th in the NL) with a 4.10 mark.

- ▶ Following the All-Star Break, SF pitchers had a 3.63 ERA, which was 10th in MLB and fifth in the NL.
- ▶ One season after allowing the fewest walks in MLB (403), SF allowed 526 free passes, which were 10th-most in the Majors.

CLUTCH: The Giants had a 62-4 record (.939) when holding the lead heading into the 8th inning, which was the eighth-best record in MLB and fifth-best in the NL.

- ▶ Giants pitchers had a 3.13 ERA (ninth-best in MLB) when the game was considered late and close according to *Stathead*.

START ME UP: Giants starters logged a 4.22 ERA, ninth-best in the NL and 18th of 30 MLB teams.

- ▶ SF had a 9.4 fWAR, which was 23rd in MLB and 12th in the NL.
- ▶ In terms of FIP (Fielding Independent Pitching), SF logged a 3.84 mark, second-best in the NL and fifth-best in MLB.
- ▶ SF's starters had a 3.39 BB/9, which was fourth-highest in MLB and second-highest in the NL behind Miami's 3.60 mark.
- ▶ All of this was done while Giants starters threw the fewest innings in the NL and second-fewest in the Majors, logging 778.2 innings (ahead of Detroit's 753.0 innings).
- ▶ Below is a chart of SF's starter breakdowns by month.

YOUNG ARMS: Rookie pitchers shouldered a major load for SF with 536.1 innings pitched, second-most in MLB behind Oakland's 572.0 innings...the 536.1 innings accounted for 37.4% of the Giants' innings pitched.

- ▶ The 536.1 innings by rookies were most by a Giants club since the 1975 club that had 541.1 innings thrown by rookies.

GRAB THE BULL BY THE HORNS: For the second consecutive season, the Giants' bullpen led the NL in innings, logging 655.0 frames...only Detroit (694.0) had more.

- ▶ Over the final two months SF's bullpen had a 3.13 ERA, fifth-best in MLB and second-best in the NL behind Milwaukee's 2.70 mark...over the first three months of 2024, the SF bullpen had a 4.35 ERA, which was fourth-highest in MLB.
- ▶ The SF 'pen earned the strikeout crown with 658...SF relievers had a 0.95 HR/9, which was eighth lowest in MLB.
- ▶ In terms of fWAR, SF's bullpen fWAR was 2.8, 21st in MLB and 13th in the NL...the SF pen had a 5.6 fWAR in 2023.
- ▶ The bullpen logged a 3.76 FIP, sixth-best among 'pens in MLB.

TEAM DEFENSE NOTES

BY TRADITIONAL METRICS: An emphasis on improved defense was made by SF and it paid off with a 40-error improvement on defense...after leading the Majors with 117 errors in 2023, SF had 87 errors in 2024, which was T-14th in MLB.

- ▶ SF's .985 fielding percentage was tied for T-13th best in MLB.
- ▶ The 87 errors were the fewest by SF since 2021 (80), and tied with 2017 for third-fewest in a full season since 2016 (72).

BY OUTS ABOVE AVERAGE: Despite the improvement in fielding percentage and errors from last season, the Giants' defense had a -8 Outs Above Average (20th in MLB), a decrease compared to its +16 OAA (ninth in MLB) from a season ago.

- ▶ SF infielders combined for a +11 OAA in the infield (11th in MLB) after being +29 in 2023...SF outfielders had a -19 OAA (28th in MLB, 15th in NL) after being -13 last season.

BY DEFENSIVE RUNS SAVED: According to Fangraphs, SF finished the year -15 defensive runs saved, 23rd of 30 MLB teams.

FROM THE SIS COMPUTERS: The Giants ended the year at 333 defensive misplays & errors (87 errors, 246 misplays)...that ranked tied with the Mets for seventh-most...last year's team had 365 defensive misplays & errors (117 errors, 248 misplays).

ON THE GROUND...: SF turned 73.1% of grounders and bunts into outs, 14th-best in MLB per *SIS*...Cleveland was best in MLB (75.4%)...SF ranked 30th in infield positioning runs saved (+1).

IN THE AIR: SF turned 64.5% of balls hit in the air into outs, 29th in MLB ahead of only the Rockies (63.2%) per *SIS*...on balls hit to the outfield, SF converted 58.3% into outs, which ranked 27th.

BEHIND THE DISH: The Giants allowed 146 stolen bases, third-most in MLB behind Pittsburgh (154) and St. Louis (153)...in the second-half, however, SF allowed 51 steals, which was tied for 14th in MLB.

- ▶ SF's 15 passed balls were second-most in MLB (SD, 16).

2024 REGULAR SEASON NOTES

INDIVIDUAL HITTER NOTES

I AM THE CHAP-TAIN NOW: IF **Matt Chapman** finished off one of the best seasons by a third baseman in Giants franchise history by winning the 2024 Willie Mac Award.

- ▶ Chapman led SF in runs scored (98), hits (142), doubles (39), home runs (27), RBI (78), walks (64) and extra-base hits (68).
- ▶ His 68 extra-base hits were the most by a Giant since **IF Pablo Sandoval** had 74 in 2009, and he also became the second third baseman in franchise history to reach 30 doubles, 20 homers and 10 steals in a season, joining **IF Freddie Lindstrom** (1930).
- ▶ Defensively, Chapman led all third basemen with 17 DRS, which was also tied for fifth-best in MLB at any position...his 11 outs above average were tied for most among 3B's with MIL's **Joey Ortiz**.
- ▶ In off-the-field achievements, Chapman celebrated the last month of the season with the birth of his first child (Gia Alexandra) on September 19, and a six-year contract extension worth \$151 million on September 4.

ALL-STAR(AMOS): OF **Heliot Ramos** capped off his All-Star campaign by doing something no one had ever done before, becoming the first right-handed hitter to hit a "splash hit" homer at Oracle Park when he did so on September 15 vs. San Diego.

- ▶ He became the first Giants homegrown outfielder to make an All-Star team since **OF Chili Davis** in 1986, slashing .298/.365/.523 with 29 runs, 11 doubles, 14 homers, 46 RBI and an .888 OPS in 60 games during the first half.
- ▶ Entering the season at age 24, Ramos was the youngest Giant with 20+ homers in a season since **IF Pablo Sandoval** had 23 in 2011...was also the youngest SF outfielder with 22+ homers since **OF Jack Clark** had 22 HR in 1980 (also at 24 years old).
- ▶ After being recalled on May 8, he ranked among the NL leaders vs. lefties in hits (40, T-6th), extra-base hits (20, T-2nd), homers (10, T-2nd), RBI (24, T-10th) and OPS (1.189, 1st).

GIVING THEM FITZ: Rookie **IF/OF Tyler Fitzgerald** had a breakout second half of the season.

- ▶ Fitzgerald slashed .293/.350/.537 with 44 runs, 17 doubles, 14 home runs, 29 RBI and an .887 OPS as a shortstop...the other four players to appear at shortstop for SF (**IF Marco Luciano**, **IF/OF Brett Wisely**, **IF Casey Schmitt** and **IF Nick Ahmed**) combined to slash .252/.293/.368 with 10 runs, 16 doubles, five homers, 34 RBI and a .660 OPS.
- ▶ He hit his 15th career home run on August 13, joining **OF Willie Mays** as the only two in Giants franchise history with 15 or more home runs in their first 59 career games (with a plate appearance), (Mays had 16 homers in 59 games in 1951).
- ▶ Fitzgerald was named the National League Rookie of the Month in July...he led MLB rookies with eight homers and a 1.239 OPS, tied for the lead with 11 extra-base hits, was third with a .321 batting average and was fourth with 15 RBI.
- ▶ He became the first Giants rookie with 17 steals since **OF Rajai Davis** had 17 in 2007.

CHANGING OF THE GUARD: The Giants traded their longest tenured player, **OF Austin Slater** (debuted June 2, 2017), to the Reds on July 7...with his exit, **OF Mike Yastrzemski** assumed the role of longest tenured Giant (debuted on May 25, 2019)...behind Yastrzemski are **RHP Logan Webb** (debuted August 17, 2019) and **RHP Tyler Rogers** (debuted August 27, 2019).

BEHIND THE DISH: C **Patrick Bailey** was one of the most valuable catchers in MLB...his 4.4 fWAR was third-best among catchers behind MIL's **William Contreras** (5.4) and SEA's **Cal Raleigh** (5.4).

- ▶ His 1.85 catcher pop time to second base was tied for best in the Majors, while his 16 catcher framing runs and 52.5% strike rate were best in MLB...Bailey's 20 DRS were the most among MLB catchers and tied for second-most at any position.

MATOS MANIA: OF **Luis Matos** provided a boost to the offense after two of SF's starting outfielders, **OF Jung Hoo Lee** (left shoulder dislocation) and **OF Michael Conforto** (right hamstring strain) went down with injuries on May 12 and 13.

- ▶ Matos had 17 RBI in his first six games of the year with a PA, the most by a Giant in his first six games of a season in club history.
- ▶ The hot week earned him NL Player of the Week after going 10-for-26 (.385) with two homers, 16 RBI, three doubles, three runs scored and a .731 slugging percentage in six games.
- ▶ Following the award, however, Matos slashed .183/.214/.275 with 10 runs, two doubles, three homers, eight RBI and a .489 OPS over 37 games at the MLB level the rest of the year.

INDIVIDUAL PITCHER NOTES

WEBB GEMS: One year after finishing second in the NL Cy Young voting, **RHP Logan Webb** earned his first career All-Star nod...he became the first homegrown (drafted and developed) Giants pitcher to be named to an All-Star Game since **LHP Madison Bumgarner** was selected to the team in 2016.

- ▶ Webb's 204.2 innings this season ranked third-best in MLB (tops in the NL) behind SEA's **Logan Gilbert** (208.2) and KC's **Seth Lugo** (206.2ip)...Webb also ranked among the NL leaders in ERA (3.47, 10th), quality starts (20, T-2nd), fWAR (4.4, 5th) and FIP (2.96, 2nd).
- ▶ He tied his career-high with 33 starts and also reached the 200.0 inning plateau for the second-straight season...Webb is the first Giant with consecutive 200.0 inning seasons since **RHP Jeff Samardzija** did so in 2016 and 2017.
- ▶ Since the start of the 2022 season, Webb has thrown the most innings in the Majors (613.0).
- ▶ Webb tossed his second career shutout on July 31 vs. Oakland (1-0 win)...joined RHP **Greg Maddux** as the only MLB players to toss multiple 9+ inning 1-0 shutouts in under two hours in the Wild Card era (since 1995) (*Stats, LLC*).

SNELLZILLA: After signing late in Spring, and an injury-plagued/ineffective first three months of the season, **LHP Blake Snell** reestablished himself as one of the best pitchers in MLB in July.

- ▶ Beginning July 1, Snell finished atop the MLB leaderboard with a 1.23 ERA, 0.78 WHIP, .123 opposing batting average, .382 opposing OPS, 1.78 FIP and .203 BABIP...he also finished third in the Majors over that span with 114 strikeouts.
- ▶ Snell threw the 18th no-hitter in Giants franchise history on August 2 at Cincinnati...it was the first SF no-hitter since **RHP Chris Heston** tossed one on June 9, 2015 at the Mets.
- ▶ The southpaw rarely gave up hard contact, with his opposing hard-hit rate of 28.9% ranking as the best in the Majors (min. 200 batted ball events).
- ▶ His 1.23 ERA over his last 14 games of the season (since July 9 vs. Toronto) was the lowest ERA by a Giant in a 14-game span since **RHP Bobby Bolin** had a 1.21 ERA from June 16-August 19, 1968 (min. 80.0ip).

A NEW SHERIFF IN TOWN: **RHP Ryan Walker** moved his way into the closer role with a dominant season...he converted all 10 save opportunities he was given after taking over the role.

- ▶ Walker was a workhorse for the Giants bullpen, with his 76 games ranking fifth-most in MLB and second-most in the NL behind teammate **RHP Tyler Rogers** (77 games).
- ▶ In the second half of the season, Walker had a 1.21 ERA (4er, 29.2ip) in 28 games, which was the seventh-best ERA in MLB over that span (min. 29.0ip)...he allowed just two earned runs over his last 22 games (24.1 innings) dating to July 30.
- ▶ The righty struck out 99 in 80.0 innings...his 97 strikeouts as a reliever (had two as an opener on April 24) were the most by a Giants reliever in a single season since **RHP Robb Nen** struck out 110 in 1998.

JUST DO IT: **RHP Tyler Rogers** finished the season with 77 games pitched, most in the NL and fourth-most in MLB...his 339 games pitched since he debuted on August 27, 2019 are most in MLB over that span.

- ▶ His 1.03 ERA at home was the best by a Giants pitcher since **RHP Félix Rodríguez** had a 0.91 ERA in 2001 (min. 35.0 innings pitched at home)...Rogers did not allow a run at home in 21.1 innings (23 games) from May 17-September 5.
- ▶ He walked six batters (two were intentional) in 70.1 innings...his 2.1% walk rate was the lowest in MLB (min. 200 BF).

DOVAL OFFICE: **RHP Camilo Doval**, an All-Star in 2023, was optioned to Triple-A on August 9 after a tough eight-game stretch from July 14-August 8...he recorded two blown saves in seven opportunities with an 8.59 ERA (7er, 7.1ip), 1.91 WHIP and six walks in that span.

- ▶ Doval's strikeout rate went from 31.0% in 2023 to 28.8% in 2024, while his 9.3% walk rate last season jumped to 14.4%.
- ▶ The difference this season was the damage vs. Doval's cutter, which he threw 34.8% of his pitches, and his sinker, which saw its usage rate fall from 30.0% last year to 14.2% this year...his cutter's opposing average jumped from .175 to .284 this year with 10 doubles and two homers coming on the pitch in 2024 (three doubles and zero homers in 2023).

2024 GIANTS MINOR LEAGUE HIGHLIGHTS

SEASON IN REVIEW: The 2024 Giants farm system finished with a combined record of 277-273 (.504) between their affiliates in **Triple-A Sacramento** (80-70), **Double-A Richmond** (64-74), **High-A Eugene** (59-72) and **Single-A San Jose** (74-57)...SF had 13 players make their MLB debut, which was tied for second-most in MLB behind Oakland (14)...their 13 debuts are tied for the fourth-most in franchise history and are the most since they also had 13 in 2019...the biggest jump of the season was made by **1B Bryce Eldridge**, who started 2024 in San Jose and made his way to Sacramento in September.

SOUTH BAY SUPERSTARS: The **San Jose** Giants had the strongest season among the Giants affiliates, as they finished first in the CAL North and clinched a playoff berth...SJ finished among the top of all Single-A teams in extra-base hits (359; 3rd), slugging percentage (.380; 4th), batting average (.249; 5th), RBI (646; 5th), and runs scored (702; 6th)...the Giants pitching staff had a California League-leading 4.01 ERA...San Jose's playoff appearance was their 17th in its last 20 seasons.

OCTOBERFEST: **San Jose** continued its five-season playoff streak after finishing first in the California League with a 74-57 (.565) record...for the second straight year, the Giants fell to Modesto 2-0 in the CAL North division series.

ROCKIN' ROOKIES: The Giants organization's three rookie ball teams between the Arizona Complex League and Dominican Summer League finished 102-67 (.604), led by the **DSL Giants Black**, who finished the season 40-13 (.755) and clinched the DSL Central Division title, and the **DSL Giants Orange**, who went 29-27 (.518)...the **ACL Giants** finished their season 33-27 (.550) and earned a Wild Card spot...ACL Giants pitchers finished the season with a 5.03 ERA, which was the fifth-best in the league...2024 was the second-straight season that every rookie ball affiliate finished above .500.

WELCOME TO THE FARM: SF saw seven of its 2024 draft picks make their pro-ball debuts in San Jose this season, including all of its top-4 picks of **OF James Tibbs III** (1st round, 13th overall), **OF Dakota Jordan** (4th round, 116th overall), **OF Jakob Christian** (5th round, 149th overall), **OF Robert Hipwell** (6th round, 178th overall)

THE BRYCE IS RIGHT: First baseman **Bryce Eldridge** produced one of the greatest minor league seasons in recent Giants history, playing 116 games across four levels (SAC, RIC, EUG, SJ)...Eldridge was drafted 16th overall in 2023 and began this season at Single-A San Jose, rose to High-A Eugene on June 28, reached Double-A Richmond on September 3 and was promoted to Sacramento on September 14...he was awarded Giants 2024 Minor League Player Of The Year by *Baseball America* after slashing .291/.374/.516 with 76 runs, 27 doubles, two triples, 23 homers, 92 RBI and 59 walks across all four Minor League levels...Eldridge was named to the 2024 All-MiLB Prospect Team at designated hitter by *MLB Pipeline*.

NEVER TOO YOUNG: After posting a 2.51 ERA and holding opponents to a .196 average across 13 starts in Double-A (48.1ip) and Triple-A (9.0ip), **RHP Hayden Birdsong** was called up to make his MLB debut on June 26...Birdsong became one of seven Giants starting pitchers to make their MLB debut prior to 23 years old since 2000.

AND NEVER TOO OLD: **RHP Spencer Bivens** made his Major League debut on June 16 after posting a 2.81 ERA (13er, 41.2ip) and a 1.18 WHIP across 21 appearances in Triple-A to start the season...at 29 years and 354 days old, he became the oldest Giant to make his MLB debut since **IF/OF Jason Krizan** on April 29, 2022 (at 32 years, 305 days old), and the oldest Giants pitcher to make his MLB debut since **RHP Jean Machi** on September 3, 2012 (at 30 years, 215 days old).

THE FUTURE IS NOW: **OF James Tibbs III**, SF's 1st round pick, made his pro-ball debut with San Jose...after going 17-for-41 (.415) with nine runs, four doubles and two RBI in nine games with San Jose, Tibbs III was promoted to High-A Eugene, where he hit .137 (9x67) with five runs, a double, two homers and four RBI (17g).

BONANZA: **OF Bo Davidson** earned CAL Player of the Week twice in the month of August after slashing .471/.597/.941 with 14 runs, three doubles, three triples, five homers and 19 RBI over 15 games...the .471 average was the highest average for a single month among all MiLB players in 2024 (min. 60 PA)...Davidson was named the second half Team MVP by San Jose after finishing the season with a .328/.438/.608 slash line.

GIANT STRIDES: The four Giants full-season affiliates stole a combined 581 bases...**OF Jonah Cox** led the organization with 58 stolen bases, the most by a Giant since Johneshwy Fargas had 59 with San Jose in 2015.

THE FUN DOESN'T HAVE TO STOP: Eight Giants players will be participating in this year's Arizona Fall League (AFL), which kicked off on Monday, October 7th... **RHP Marques Johnson, RHP William Kempner, RHP Cale Lansville, RHP Elijah Pleasants, RHP Tyler Vogel, IF Bryce Eldridge, IF Charlie Szykowny, and OF Bo Davidson** will be suiting up for the Scottsdale Scorpions under Manager **Dennis Pelfrey**, who has managed Double-A Richmond for the last three years.

GRAND SLAMMIN: The Giants' four Minor League teams hit a combined 22 grand slams, led by San Jose, who hit nine...**Bo Davidson's** three grand slams this season were tied for most by a single player in all the minors.

OTHER NOTABLE PERFORMANCES: **IF David Villar** reached base safely in 34-straight Minor League games, which was the fourth-longest on-base streak in Triple-A in 2024...**C Luke Shliger** had a 31-game on-base streak from June 1 to August 2 between **San Jose** (29 games) and **Eugene** (one game), where he hit .389 (44x113) with 15 walks...**OF Carter Howell** led the entire Giants organization with 30 doubles, while **Jonah Cox** led the organization with eight triples.

COACHING HONORS: The Giants' Minor League Development Staff received multiple recognitions this year...**Ydwin Villegas** was awarded California League Manager of the Year after leading **San Jose** to the best record in the league (74-57)...**Juan Ciriaco** earned DSL Manager of the Year after leading the **DSL Giants Black** to a franchise-best 40-13 record.

2024 SEASON: The 23-year-old made his MLB debut with the Giants, appearing in 16 games for SF...Birdsong was selected in the 6th round of the 2022 draft out of Eastern Illinois (Charleston, IL)...he went 5-6 with a 4.75 ERA (38er, 72.0ip), with the Giants going 6-10 in his outings.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: Had his contract selected from Triple-A Sacramento on June 26 and made his MLB debut that night vs. Chicago...tossed 4.2 innings and allowed three runs on six hits with five strikeouts in the outing...at 22 years and 306 days old, Birdsong became one of seven Giants starting pitchers to make their MLB debut prior to turning 23 years old since 2000, joining **RHP Jerome Williams** (2003), **RHP Matt Cain** (2005), **RHP Tim Lincecum** (2007), **LHP Madison Bumgarner** (2009), **RHP Logan Webb** (2019) and **LHP Kyle Harrison** (2023).

2024 IN THE MINORS: Began the year at Double-A Richmond and posted a 4-2 record with a 2.05 ERA (11er, 48.1ip) with 61 strikeouts in 11 starts for Double-A Richmond before being promoted to Triple-A Sacramento on June 11...made two starts for Sacramento after the promotion and posted a 5.00 ERA (5er, 9.0) with 14 strikeouts before his eventual MLB debut on June 26.

EARLY ARRIVAL: Birdsong became the second Giant from the 2022 draft to reach the Majors, joining **OF Wade Meckler** (eighth round), who did so last year...there are just four players from the first round of that 2022 draft that have reached the Majors overall (IF Jackson Holliday with Baltimore, IF Zach Neto with the Angels, OF Jordan Beck with Colorado, IF Brooks Lee with Minnesota)...at the time of his debut, there were just 12 players selected ahead of Birdsong (6th round, 30th pick) in that 2022 draft that had made their debuts.

LIKE, REALLY EARLY: According to Grant Brisbee of *The Athletic* Birdsong's 169.2 minor league innings were the fewest thrown by a Giant before their Major League debut since **RHP Tim Lincecum** debuted in 2007 with only 62.2 minor league innings under his belt.

LIGHTS OUT: Recorded 12 strikeouts in his start against Colorado at Coors Field on July 21, the most he'd ever accumulated in an outing in his professional career...in fact, his 12 punchouts were the most by a Giants pitcher ever at Coors Field...they were also the most by a Giants rookie since **Tim Lincecum** fanned 12 on July 1, 2007.

FINISH STRONG: Birdsong struck out 10 of the first 15 batters he faced in SF's final game of the season on September 29 vs. St. Louis and totaled 11 strikeouts in the outing...his 10 strikeouts through his first 4.0 innings were tied for most by a Giants pitcher in the divisional era (since 1969) with **LHP Blake Snell** (July 27, 2024) and **RHP Jason Schmidt** (August 30, 2002), per *Sarah Langs*...paired with his 12 strikeouts in his July 21 outing at Coors Field, the rookie became the first Giants rookie pitcher with multiple 10+ strikeout games since **RHP Chris Heston** had two in 2015.

CURVY AND CONFIDENT: Birdsong threw 259 curveballs at the MLB level and batters were just 8-for-55 (.145) with 27 strikeouts off the pitch...his .145 opponent average against the curveball was sixth-best in the NL and 11th-best in the Majors, and his 45.0% strikeout was sixth-best in the Majors (min. 250 pitches).

HEAVY LIFTING: Birdsong worked a combined 129.1 innings between Double-A Richmond (48.1ip), Triple-A Sacramento (9.0ip) and the Giants (72.0ip), passing his innings total from last year (100.2 innings across three levels), which was his first full year in pro ball after being drafted in 2022.

THE FUTURE IS NOW: The Illinois native entered the 2024 campaign as the Giants #6 prospect according to *Baseball America* and #7 according to *MLB.com*...he has since graduated from the prospect rankings given his accrued MLB time this year but is still one of SF's younger pitching hopefuls having just turned 23 on Aug. 30.

WITH THE GIANTS: The 24-year-old made his Major League debut with SF on May 6 at Philadelphia and went on to make nine appearances (eight starts) in 2024 at the Major League level...also made 20 starts this year for Triple-A Sacramento.

FAMILY TIME: Made his debut with SF on May 6 at Philadelphia in the ballpark he grew up going to as a child...Black was born and raised in nearby Scranton, PA before attending Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA...Black had nearly 60 family and friends on hand for his debut at Citizens Bank Park...Black was the seventh Giant, and sixth pitcher, to make his Major League debut this season...allowed five runs on eight hits in 4.1 innings in SF's 6-1 loss.

YOU'LL NEVER FORGET YOUR FIRST...: Picked up the first win of his Major League career in Kansas City on September 20 with 5.2 shutout innings in the Giants 2-1 victory over the Royals...the 5.2 innings were the most Black had thrown in his brief MLB career and just the second time he reached the 5.0-inning mark in his seven prior MLB starts...it was also Black's first scoreless outing in the Majors and also the first in which he did not surrender a home run.

SECOND STINT: Pitched a bit better in his second stint with the Giants from August 31 through the end of the season...allowed two runs or fewer and pitched at least 4.0 innings in three of the five outings but still had a 4.91 ERA (12er, 22.0ip) in the five games...struck out 21 and walked eight while opponents hit .287 off him.

THE MIXTAPE: Black adjusted his pitch mix during his four August outings at Triple-A and his five outings back in the Majors resembled what was working for him down in AAA...below is a breakdown of his pitch mix of his last five starts w/SF versus his first four MLB games (three starts) in May of this year.

THE HOMERS: Allowed at least one homer in seven of his nine MLB games, surrendering seven total home runs in 36.1 MLB innings (1.73 HR/9ip)...Black did manage to hold the opposition without a homer in his last two starts (at KC and at Arizona) over 8.1 innings...in the minors this year, Black allowed 12 homers in 84.1 innings at AAA (1.28 HR/9ip).

SEAMHEAD: After his return to the Majors on August 31, Black struck out nearly a batter per inning, whiffing 21 hitters in 22.0 innings of work (8.6 K/9)...11 of the 21 punchouts in that time came with his four-seam fastball...however, hitters were 8-for-26 (.308) off his four-seamer in the five starts (seven singles, one homer).

WITH SACRAMENTO: In 20 starts for the River Cats, Black went 5-6 with a 4.59 ERA (43er, 84.1ip), a 1.39 WHIP and 87 strikeouts...he was named the PCL Pitcher of the Week on April 14 for his 5.0 no-hit innings vs. El Paso on April 12...he had a terrific first six outings at AAA, going 2-1 with a 1.01 ERA (3er, 26.2ip) before making his MLB debut w/SF on May 6.

AUGUST AT AAA: Black had a 2.91 ERA (7er, 21.2ip) in four starts at the Triple-A level in August before returning to the big league roster on August 31...it was his best month since being optioned down to Triple-A after his first stint w/SF ended in late May...prior to August, Black had an 8.25 ERA (33er, 36.0ip) with one quality start over his previous 10 AAA outings from May 28-July 26.

2024 SEASON: Was the youngest player on the Giants' Opening Day roster...entered the season as the Giants' No. 1 prospect per MLB.com (No. 23 overall)...posted a 7-7 record with a 4.56 ERA (63er, 124.1ip) and 118 strikeouts in 24 starts with the Giants posting a 14-10 record in those outings.

INNINGSFEST: Worked a career-high 124.1 innings with San Francisco in 2024...last season, Harrison tossed 102.1 innings between Triple-A Sacramento and the Giants...his previous career-high in innings pitched came in 2022 when he worked a combined 113.0 innings between High-A Eugene and Double-A Richmond.

START VS. FINISH: Went 4-1 with a 3.60 ERA (22er, 55.0ip) with 49 strikeouts and a 1.27 WHIP over his first 10 starts of the season with the Giants posting an 8-2 record in those games...posted a 3-6 record with a 5.32 ERA (41er, 69.1ip) with 69 strikeouts over his final 14 starts with the Giants going 6-8 in those games.

LOTS OF PUNCHOUTS: Dating back to 2023, Harrison struck out 66 batters over his first 13 big league games...according to *Stats, LLC*, since 1901, only two other Giants lefties have struck out 66-or-more batters through their first 13 games with the Giants: **LHP Shawn Estes** (71) and **LHP Andrew Suárez** (66).

COMFORTABLE AT COORS: Tossed a then career-high 7.0 shutout innings on May 7 at Colorado, becoming the sixth Giants pitcher to throw at least 7.0 shutout innings at Coors Field...Harrison joined **Barry Zito** (April 9, 2012; 9.0ip), **Tim Lincecum** (June 11, 2008; 7.0ip), **Matt Cain** (April 17, 2007; 7.0ip), **Jason Schmidt** (July 17, 2004; 8.0ip) and **Russ Ortiz** (August 28, 2002; 8.0ip)...he then spun 5.0-scoreless innings on July 19 in Colorado, which extended his scoreless innings streak at Coors Field to 12.0 innings...it marked the fifth longest scoreless innings streak at Coors Field in Giants History (see chart below)...according to *OptaSTATS*, Harrison was the first visiting pitcher ever to have two scoreless starts of 5.0+ innings at Coors Field in the same season.

IN GOOD COMPANY: Matched his career-best with 11 strikeouts in his start on July 26 vs. Colorado...he became the first Giant with 11 strikeouts and one hit or fewer allowed in a game since **LHP Madison Bumgarner** against the Diamondbacks in 2016.

THE FASTBALL: Harrison relied heavily on his four-seam fastball, throwing it 57.7% of the time...he threw 1,198 four-seam fastballs and held opponents to a .249 average with 79 strikeouts...he started the year off averaging 93+ MPH on his fastball and finished the year averaging closer to 91 MPH...overall this year, his fastball had a +7 run value.

CHANGE IT UP: He threw his changeup a lot more in 2024, throwing it 19.7% of the time, compared to 11.1% of the time last season...opposing hitters hit .287 with a .435 SLG%...he also finished with a 21.5% whiff percentage on the changeup with a K% of 11.9% which were both the lowest out of his pitches...overall this year, his changeup had a -6 run value, which was the lowest of all his pitches.

HIT HARD: Harrison has a hard hit percentage of 44.1% which ranks him in the bottom 10% in MLB...he is second on the team behind **Logan Webb** who has a hard rate percentage of 46.2% in the bottom 4% of the league.

RISP MANAGEMENT: Opponents hit .275 (30-for-109) with 45 RBI off him with runners in scoring position overall...over his final three starts, opponents were 8-for-22 (.364)...Harrison struggled with RISP and two outs this year with opponents going 20-for-58 (.345) with a .939 OPS.

ON THE INJURED LIST: Rolled his right ankle while working out in the Giants' gym on June 15 and was placed on the 15-day Injured List the next day with a right ankle sprain...was supposed to start that day against the Angels and instead hit the IL that morning...**RHP Spencer Bivens** was called up from Triple-A to take his roster spot...ended up missing 20 games with the injury and was activated on July 6 in Cleveland.

ON THE IL ROUND 2: Had the worst start of his career on September 3 vs. Arizona...lasted just 2.2 innings and allowed six runs on seven hits with three strikeouts...was placed on the 15-day injured list with left shoulder inflammation three days later on September 6 and was shut down for the remainder of the season.

ORANGE AND BLACK: Hicks signed with San Francisco as a free agent on January 18, 2024 on a four-year deal worth \$44 million... in his first season in San Francisco he posted a 4-7 record with a 4.10 ERA in 29 games (20 starts).

PUSH TO START: To start the 2024 season, Hicks transitioned from his previous role as a reliever into a traditional starting role...he posted a 4-7 record with a 4.01 ERA (44er, 98.2ip), 90 strikeouts and a .255 opponents average in 20 games started...after pitching a career-high 98.2 innings and showing signs of fatigue, he was moved to the bullpen on July 28, so the Giants could watch his innings...he made nine appearances out of the Giants' bullpen, posting a 4.91 ERA (6er, 11.0ip) with a .340 opponent average.

SOLID START: Was one of the Giants' best starters to begin the year, as he went 4-1 with a 2.33 ERA (15er, 58.0ip) and a 1.09 WHIP over his first 11 starts...during that stretch, his 2.33 ERA ranked as the seventh-best ERA in the National League, while his 53.0% groundball rate was fifth-highest in the NL and his .603 opposing OPS ranked 12th in the league.

FIRST TO 7.0IP: On April 5th, Hicks became the first Giants pitcher to pitch 7.0 innings in 2024...he tossed a career-high 91 pitches and 7.0 frames, surpassing his previous inning high mark of 5.0 innings from March 30, 2024 at San Diego and May 13, 2022 vs. SF (w/STL).

IN GOOD COMPANY: Following his start on April 10, he became the seventh Giants starter since 1912 to pitch 5.0+ innings and allow one earned run or fewer in each of his first three starts with the franchise joining **LHP Carlos Rodón** (first four starts in 2022), **RHP Al Worthington** (first four starts in 1953), **RHP Anthony DeSclafani** (first three starts in 2021), **RHP Bill Swift** (first three starts in 1992), **RHP Mike LaCoss** (first three starts in 1986), and **RHP Sailor Stroud** (first three starts in 1915) (*Elias*).

HIGH-FIVE: Hicks pitched 5.0+ innings in 10 of his first 11 starts (the only one he didn't was May 3 at PHI)...in those starts he allowed one earned run or fewer in seven of the 11 outings.

TOUGH STRETCH: Over his next nine starts, Hicks posted a 0-6 record with a 6.42 ERA (29er, 40.2ip) and a .315 opponents average...he pitched 5.0+ innings in just four of those nine starts.

INTO THE BULLPEN: In his first appearance out of the bullpen on July 28, he allowed two runs, both earned, in 2.0 innings of work... he then had six scoreless appearances out of the 'pen (7.0ip) and logged his first save as a Giant and first since August 28, 2023 with Toronto on August 19 vs. CWS...allowed four runs in 2.0ip over his final two relief appearances of the season.

20+ STARTS AND A SAVE: Became the first Giants pitcher to have both 20 starts and one save in a season since **Tim Lincecum** had 26 starts and a save in 2014.

TRYING NOT TO SINK: Used his sinker 51.5% of the time year finished the season with a .341 opponents average with 21 extra base hits allowed and just 23 strikeouts...opponents hit .424 (42-for-99) with just eight strikeouts off his sinker from June through September...in April and May, opponents combined to hit .283 (34-for-120) with 13 strikeouts off his sinker.

SWEPT AWAY: His second most used pitch this year was his sweeper, which he used 24.1% of the time...he held opponents to a .152 average (12-for-79) with 27 strikeouts.

SPLIT SECOND: Held opponents to a .181 (17-for-94) average with 38 strikeouts off his splitter...he's used the pitch 19.1% of the time this year and it has been his best pitch at producing whiffs (40.8% rate)...last season, he used his splitter just 1.6% of the time.

TIME ON THE IL: Was placed on the 15-day Injured List on August 27 with right shoulder inflammation and missed 18 games...was reinstated on September 14 and pitched one game before being placed back on the 15-day IL on September 20 again with right shoulder inflammation for the remainder of the season.

RACK UP THE INNINGS: Hicks logged a career-high 109.2 innings in 2024, besting his previous high of 77.2 innings his rookie campaign in 2018...he threw 1,958 pitches overall this season, which is over 600 more pitches than his previous highest pitch total for the year of 1,274 in 2018 with St. Louis (77.2ip).

RAY GUN: After being acquired in an offseason trade with Seattle that sent OF Mitch Haniger, RHP Anthony DeSclafani and cash to the Mariners, **LHP Robbie Ray** made seven starts for the Giants at the Major League level in 2024 following his return from Tommy John and left flexor tendon repair surgery...he made his season debut with SF on July 24 at Dodger Stadium and made six more starts before landing on the IL on August 26 with a left hamstring strain following his early departure from his August 25 outing at Seattle (left after 3.0 innings with left hamstring tightness).

HEALED UP: Ray missed the SF's first 101 games of the 2024 season after recovering from surgery to repair his left flexor tendon as well as Tommy John surgery on May 3, 2023...the surgeries were performed by Dr. Keith Meister.

THE REHAB PROCESS: He made 10 rehab appearances (nine starts) in the minors for SF, logging a 3.38 ERA (11er, 29.1ip) with 45 strikeouts, six walks and four homers allowed...he wound up making four starts at the ACL level, three starts at Single-A San Jose and appeared in three games (two starts) at Triple-A Sacramento.

THE HAMMY: Ray was working through his left hamstring strain in early September and even threw a live BP at Oracle Park on September 10...he felt fatigue during the session and cut it short...he threw bullpens and a few more live BPs down a the Giants Papago Park complex in Arizona as the season wound down.

QUITE A RETURN: The 32-year-old made his Giants debut on July 24 at the Dodgers with 5.0 no-hit innings and earned the win in SF's 8-3 victory...Ray allowed one run after walking two and hitting two in the 1st inning...he went on to strike out eight Dodgers in his 86-pitch outing...his 5.0 no-hit innings in his debut vs. LA was the longest no-hit bid by a Giants starter in his team debut in the expansion era (1961)...it was the longest in a Giants debut since **Juan Marichal** in his debut (7.2 hitless innings) on July 19, 1960 vs. PHI.

STILL GOT THE STRIKEOUT STUFF: Ray struck out 7+ batters in four of his seven starts and struck out 43 batters in 30.2 innings (12.6 K/9)...overall, Ray fanned 33.3% of the total batters he faced w/SF this year (43-of-129).

HOME/ROAD: In limited action, Ray allowed four runs in 13.0 road innings (three starts) for a 2.77 road ERA...opposing hitters batted .095 off Ray in those three outings...in four starts at Oracle Park, Ray had a 6.11 ERA (12er, 17.2ip) with opposing hitters batting .250 with an .848 OPS.

BATTER UP: In his seven outings, Ray limited opposing hitters to a .189 clip (20-for-106)...he actually fared better against righties, limiting them to a .153 average (13-for-85) and a .627 OPS...left-handed hitters were 7-for-21 (.333) with a pair of homers and a 1.036 OPS.

THE LONG BALL: Was bitten by the long ball in only three of his seven starts but still allowed six total home runs in 30.2 innings at the MLB level.

CITY BY THE BLAKE: The reigning NL Cy Young winner made 20 starts for SF...Snell joined SF late in the spring on a two-year, \$62 million contract (includes an opt out after the 2024 season).

A NEW MAN: After returning from the IL on July 9, Snell went 5-0 with a 1.23 ERA (11er, 80.1ip), 114 strikeouts, a 0.78 WHIP and a .123 opposing batting average over that span.

👉 Prior to that stretch, Snell was 0-3 with a 9.51 ERA (25er, 23.2ip), 31 strikeouts and a 1.94 WHIP in his first six starts as a Giant.

👉 His 1.23 ERA over his last 14 games of the season was the lowest ERA by a Giant in a 14-game span since **RHP Bobby Bolin** had a 1.21 ERA from June 16-August 19, 1968 (min. 80.0ip).

👉 Snell had 99 strikeouts over his last 11 starts (since July 27), which was the most by a Giant since **RHP Tim Lincecum** struck out 102 from June 17-August 12, 2009.

👉 Below is a chart of where Snell ranked in MLB after July 1.

GOTTA GET AHEAD: Opponents slashed .122/.194/.178 with a .372 OPS in at-bats in which he got ahead 0-1 in the count...when Snell fell behind 1-0, opponents slashed .262/.392/.426 with an .818 OPS.

SOFT CONTACT: Snell's had an opposing hard-hit rate of 28.9%, which was in the top 1% of the Majors (fourth-best in MLB among qualified pitchers)...when bringing the filter to a minimum of 200 batted ball events, Snell's 28.9% hard hit rate was the best in MLB.

CURVE IT: Opponents hit .111 (14x126) against Snell's curveball with 70 strikeouts and a +10 run value in 2024...Snell threw 340 curveballs after returning from the IL on July 9, holding opponents 11-for-102 (.108) with 57 strikeouts and 93 swing and misses vs. his main breaking ball.

CHANGE IT UP: The lefty's changeup was very good over the last month of the season...opponents swung and miss 31 times while going 2-for-28 (.071) with 14 strikeouts since August 30 (five starts).

FAST TIMES: Snell's four-seam fastball, which he threw 46.4% of the time, had a .200 opposing batting average (29x145) with 42 strikeouts and a .303 slugging percentage...in his Cy Young-winning 2023 season, opponents hit .255 with a .389 slugging percentage and 65 strikeouts...in his last 14 starts, however, opponents were 12-for-104 (.115) with one extra-base hit (a double) and 33 strikeouts.

BLAKKKKKKKE: His five double-digit strikeout games this year were tied for fourth-most in the Majors...ATL's Chris Sale, CWS' Garrett Crochet and LAD's Tyler Glasnow led the league with six each...Snell's 35 career 10+ strikeout games are ninth-most among active players, and fourth-most among active lefties.

LIMITING THE FREE PASSES: Snell cut his walk rate down in 2024...a year after posting a 13.3% walk rate, Snell posted a 10.3% mark this season.

NO-NO REVISTED: His no-hitter on August 2 was the 18th in Giants franchise history and first since **RHP Chris Heston** tossed one on June 9, 2015 at the Mets.

👉 Snell is the fifth left-handed pitcher to throw a no-no in Giants history joining **George Wiltse**, **Rube Marquard**, **Carl Hubbell** and **Jonathan Sánchez**.

👉 According to *Sarah Langs* via *Elias*, Snell became the fifth reigning Cy Young winner to throw a no-hitter...the other four are Jake Arrieta (2016), Clayton Kershaw (2014), Bob Gibson (1971) and Sandy Koufax (1964).

DOWN AND OUT: Snell missed a total of 59 games with three different trips to the inactive list...he first missed 25 games (April 23-May 22) with a left adductor strain, then missed three games (May 23-May 26) on the Paternity List and lastly missed 31 games with a left groin strain (June 3-July 9).

SWING AND A MISS: Snell forced 51 swing and misses while striking out 26 over a two-start span (August 2 at Cincinnati and July 27 vs. Colorado)...vs. Colorado, Snell forced 30 swing and misses, which were the most by a Giants pitcher in the pitch-tracking era (since 2008) in the regular season, surpassing the 29 swing and misses forced by **Tim Lincecum** on July 13, 2013 at San Diego (no-hitter).

REHABS: Snell was very impressive in both rehab stints, going 1-0 with a 2.41 ERA and 32 strikeouts in five combined rehab outings for Single-A San Jose and Triple-A Sacramento...in his Mother's Day rehab start for San Jose on May 12, Snell tossed an immaculate inning.

RARE 1-2 PUNCH: Per *Sarah Langs* and *Elias*, the duo of **LHP Blake Snell** and **RHP Logan Webb** made the Giants just the seventh team in MLB history to have both of the top-2 Cy Young Award vote getters from the prior season.

2024 SEASON: Wrapped up his sixth Major League season matching a career-best 33 starts (also done last year) on his way to a 13-10 record and 3.47 ERA...made at least 32 starts for a third straight season, becoming the first Giants pitcher to start in 32 games for three consecutive years since **Madison Bumgarner** (2014-2016)... Webb is also one of just eight Major League pitchers to have started 32+ games in each of the last three seasons (2022, 23 and 24).

MR. 200: Reached the 200.0 inning mark in his last outing of the year on September 24 at Arizona to finish the year at an NL-leading 204.2 innings...after leading the Majors in innings last year (216.0), Webb became the first Giants pitcher to throw at least 200 innings in two consecutive seasons since **Jeff Samardzija** did so in 2016 and 2017.

RANK AND FILE: Webb's 204.2 innings ranked third overall in the Majors, trailing only SEA's Logan Gilbert (208.2) and KC's Seth Lugo (206.2)...the right-hander also ranked among the top of the NL leaderboards in quality starts (20, T-2nd), FIP (2.96, 2nd), fWAR (4.4, 5th) and ERA (3.47, 10th).

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: Earned his first career All-Star selection in 2024, joining **OF Heliot Ramos** as the two Giants in the Midsummer Classic...Webb became the first homegrown (drafted and developed) Giants pitcher to be named to an All-Star Game since **Madison Bumgarner** was selected to the team in 2016.

DADDY LONG LEGS: Webb finished at least 7.0 innings on 15 different occasions, most of any pitcher in the Majors...Webb became the first Giants pitcher to record as many such games in consecutive seasons since **Bumgarner** did it in 2015 (19) and 2016 (15)... the last MLB pitcher with 15+ games of at least 7.0 innings pitched in two straight seasons was **Jacob deGrom**, who did so in 2018 (21) and 2019 (19).

SHUT THE FRONT DOOR: Threw his second career shutout on July 31 in SF's 1-0 victory against the A's...limited Oakland batters to just five hits with a walk and six strikeouts, achieving the feat in just one hour & 55 minutes (106 pitches)...the outing marked his third career complete game and first since September 25, 2023 vs. San Diego...Webb's previous career shutout came on July 9, 2023 vs. Colorado, when SF also won the game 1-0 in one hour and 56 minutes...the right-hander joined **Greg Maddux** as the only MLB players to toss multiple 9+ inning 1-0 shutouts in under two hours in the Wild Card era (since 1995) (*Stats, LLC*).

KEEP 'EM IN THE YARD: Didn't allow a home run in a career-best 45.1 consecutive innings between July 20 and August 27...overall, Webb gave up just 11 homers on the season, tied for second-fewest among qualified pitchers behind ATL's Chris Sale (nine)...Webb's 0.48 HR/9ip were a career-best and ranked as the second-best figure in the Majors, trailing only Sale (0.46).

KILLA WHALE: Was 7-5 with a 2.83 ERA (32er, 101.2ip) in 15 starts at Oracle Park in 2024...the Giants went 9-6 in Webb's 15 starts and are 40-20 in his 60 regular season starts at Oracle since the beginning of 2021...Webb in that span is 29-17 with a 2.53 ERA and three complete games (two shutouts).

BOOTS ON THE GROUND: Led the Majors with 353 produced ground balls and owned a 57.2% ground ball rate on the season, fourth-best in the Majors behind HOU's Framber Valdez (61.7%), ATL's Max Fried (59.2%) and PHI's Cristopher Sánchez (58.3%).

THE LONG GAME: Since the start of 2022, Webb has thrown 613.0 innings, most in the Majors in that time ahead of Aaron Nola (598.0) and Corbin Burnes (590.0).

DOUBLE DIPPING: Induced 25 double plays on the season, most in the NL and second-most in MLB behind HOU's Framber Valdez (32).

DOG DAYS OF SUMMER: Webb's shutout on July 31 set the pace for an exceptional month of August where he went 3-0 with a 2.16 ERA (8er, 33.1ip), 29 strikeouts and a .176 opponents average across five starts...the .176 clip was his second-lowest opposing average at any single month in his career, trailing only his .173 BAA in May of 2021.

I'VE WATCHED A CHANGE IN YOU: Webb's changeup had a -4 run value in 2024 after having +28 run value last season (the second-most valuable pitch in the league behind AL Cy Young Award winner Gerrit Cole's fastball)...his most valuable pitch in 2024 turned out to be his sinker, which had a +17 run value...the pitch was tied with Zack Wheeler for the second-most valuable sinker in MLB, trailing only PIT's Paul Skenes (+18).

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: Webb struggled in the first inning all season, allowing 19 runs on 37 hits in his 33 outings...his 5.18 ERA in the inning ranked as the sixth-highest figure among qualified NL pitchers...however, the numbers indicated Webb was mostly unlucky in the inning, with his 2.72 FIP in the inning ranking as the fifth-best figure in NL.

IL STINTS: Was slowed in Spring by elbow soreness in late February and pitched in just two Cactus League games in late March...made his first Opening Day roster and started in nine games before making his first trip to the IL on May 17 with a right forearm strain...Winn sustained the injury in his start on May 14 against the Dodgers and was removed in the 5th inning...he underwent an MRI the next day which revealed a Grade 1 muscle strain.

REHAB: Made one rehab appearance in the Arizona Complex League on June 4 and worked 3.2 innings out of the 'pen...struck out six in the outing and gave up just one run (solo home run) on two hits with two walks...was reinstated on June 9 after missing 20 games and made another three starts before landing in the IL once again on June 22 with right elbow inflammation.

ON THE MEND: A month into his second IL stint (July 24), Winn was then transferred to the 60-day and underwent season-ending surgery to undergo ulnar nerve transposition...the procedure was performed by Dr. Steve Shin in Los Angeles on July 29.

A TALE OF TWO HALVES: Winn had two extremely contrasting halves of the season...below are his numbers through six starts on the season compared to his final six outings leading up to his season-ending surgery.

STRONG STRETCH: Earned the win in three consecutive starts between April 17-28, limiting batters to one run and four hits or fewer in each of the three outings...posted a 1.50 ERA (3er, 18.0ip) with 15 strikeouts and 11 hits (.183 BAA) to go with his 3-0 record in those starts.

WINN-ING WAYS: Winn threw at least 4.0 innings and allowed six hits or fewer in each of his first 11 career Major League starts, a stretch that dated to his first career start on June 29, 2023 through April 28...the 11 starts marked the second-longest such streak by any Giants player to begin their MLB career in the modern era (since 1901)...only **Albert Suárez** had a longer streak (12).

RICKWOOD GAME: Was the starter for SF in the Rickwood Game against the Cardinals on June 20...the jewel event took place at historic Rickwood Field, the oldest professional baseball stadium in the United States, and the place where late **Willie Mays** started his professional career with the Birmingham Black Barons of the Negro American League in 1948...Winn suffered the loss after giving up five runs on five hits over just 2.2 innings in what was his final appearance of the season.

BANANA SPLIT: Winn's trademark is his splitter, which he used 40.5% of the time on the season...25 of his 48 strikeouts came off the pitch and he limited opponents to a .215 clip with seven extra-base hits...Winn's 40.5% rate marked the highest splitter usage of any starting pitcher in MLB this season.

WEAK SPOT: Batters hit the ball hard off Winn this year...his 93.1 mph average exit velocity this season was the highest figure in MLB among qualified pitchers, with his 50.6% hard hit rate ranking second behind CHC's Ben Brown (51.4%).

SECOND GUESSING: In his final five starts of the season, Winn allowed 13 earned runs over 7.2 innings in his second time through the lineup (15.26 ERA)...batters were 16-for-36 (.444) with three homers and three walks in those situations...in seven outings prior, the right-hander had given up just six runs (3.60 ERA) and held opponents to a .149 clip (7x47) when facing a batter a second time (15.0ip).

- ▶ Lee traveled to Los Angeles on May 16 for a consultation with Dr. Neal ElAttrache, who concurred with the Giants' opinion to undergo surgery to repair the torn labrum and stabilize the shoulder capsule in his non-throwing arm.
- ▶ Lee had a similar procedure in 2018 while playing for Kiwoom in the Korea Baseball Organization - he initially dislocated his shoulder on a slide into a base, rehabbed the injury, then had surgery when the shoulder popped out again on a dive in the outfield.
- ▶ Lee underwent season-ending surgery on June 4 in Los Angeles...the surgery was performed by Dr. Neal ElAttrache.
- ▶ Slugged his first career homer in his third MLB game on March 30 at SD...hit his first career Oracle Park homer on April 20th vs. ARI with his first career leadoff home run.
- ▶ Suffered a right foot contusion while fouling a ball off his foot in Colorado on May 8 and missed three games nursing the injury...was inserted back into the lineup on May 12 vs. Cincinnati and exited the game in the 1st inning after dislocating his left shoulder mentioned above.
- ▶ Had an 11-game hitting streak from April 7-20 and a 13-game on-base streak from April 7-22.
- ▶ Struck out just 13 times in his 158 PA...his 8.2 K% was third-best in MLB at the time he went down.
- ▶ Lee swung and missed at just 24 of the 569 pitches he saw (4.2%).

- ▶ Named NL Player of the Week for the week ending May 20 after going 10-for-26 (.385) with two homers, 16 RBI, three doubles, three runs scored and a .731 slugging pct. in six games...led the Majors in RBI, tied for NL lead in extra-base hits (5) and total bases (19); tied for third in hits (10), ranked fourth in slugging pct., tied for eighth in batting avg., and ninth in OPS (1.116).
- ▶ Was the first Giant to win the award since **Brandon Belt** in 2018.
- ▶ Optioned back to AAA on June 5 after going 9-for-55 from 5/21-6/4.
- ▶ Won PCL Player of the Week on June 17 after batting .464 with six doubles, five home runs and 13 RBI over a six-game series at Reno.
