METSCELLANEOUS: The Mets finished the year going 101-61 and finished in second place in the National League East...It was a 24-win improvement from the 2021 season... Including this year, the Mets have recorded 100 wins in a season four times in franchise history: 1986 (108), 2022 (101), 1988 (100) and 1969 (100)...The team's 101 wins are the second-most in franchise history...Only the 1986 team (108-54) finished with a better record in franchise history.

IT WAS IN THE CARDS: The Mets are headed to the Postseason for the first time since 2016 and for the 10th time in franchise history...This will mark the fourth Wild Card berth in team history...Also in 1999, 2000 and 2016...The Mets will play a best-of-three game series against the San Diego Padres starting on Friday...All games will take place at Citi Field.

WILD OUT: The Mets previously made the Postseason as the Wild Card team in 1999, 2000 and in 2016...In 1999, New York defeated the Diamondbacks, 3-1, in National League Division Series and fell to the Atlanta Braves 4-2, in the League Championship Series...The 2000 Mets defeated the Giants, 3-1 in the NLDS and the Cardinals, 4-1 in the NLCS...The team fell to the Yankees 4-1 in the World Series...The 2016 Mets fell to the Giants, 1-0, in the one-game Wild Card Game.

TO THE POST: The Mets are 51-38 all-time in Postseason play...The club's .573 winning percentage is the third-best in major league history...Only the Marlins (24-14, .632) and the Yankees (241-172, .573) have a better winning percentage...The Mets own the third-best ERA in Postseason history with 3.15 ERA...Only the Orioles/Browns (2.69) and the Athletics (3.09) have a lower ERA.

ONE, SINGULAR SENSATION: The Mets are 8-10 in the first game of a Postseason Series.

OCTOBER IN NEW YORK: The Mets own a 30-17 record at home in Postseason Play... This includes a 4-3 mark at Citi Field...The team's .638 winning percentage at home is the highest in the majors.

THREE'S COMPANY: The 2022 Mets joined the 1972 club as the only teams in franchise history that never had more than a three-game losing streak...The last such National League team to not lose more than three-in-a-row prior to 2020 was the 2014 Dodgers (three games)...Courtesy of Elias.

THE BUCK STARTS HERE: Buck Showalter owns a 1,652-1,578 (.511) career record as a manager...His 1,653 regular season wins place him 19th all-time in major league history... Showalter has now managed four teams to the Postseason...He is the fourth manager to accomplish that feat in major league history, joining Dusty Baker (five teams) and Billy Martin and Davey Johnson (four teams)...Showalter is the first manager in Mets history to record 100 victories in his first season with the club...He also joins Yogi Berra as the only managers to guide the Mets and Yankees into the playoffs.

MAX, I AM YOUR FATHER: Max Scherzer has made 17 career starts against the Padres...He is 6-3 with a 2.88 ERA (35 earned runs/109.1 innings) with 25 walks and 150 strikeouts...He made one start against San Diego this season, taking the loss on July 22 at Citi Field and allowing two earned runs on five hits with a walk, eight strikeouts in 6.0 innings of work.

MAX GETS GAME 1: Tonight, Scherzer will start a playoff series opener for the seventh time...He started G1 in the 2013, 2014 and 2016 ALDS for Detroit, the 2019 NL Wild Card Game and G1 of the 2019 World Series for Washington and the 2021 NL Wild Card Game for the Dodgers...The only pitchers with more Game 1 starts since 2013 are Clayton Kershaw and Jon Lester (10 each)...With tonight's start, Scherzer will move into a tie for eighth in Game 1 starts in the World Series era (since 1903)...Jon Lester (12 Game 1 starts) is the all-time leader.

PRESSURE IS A PRIVILEGE: In 2021 with the Dodgers, Scherzer started the NL Wild Card Game and earned his first professional save in Game 5 of the NLDS to send LA to the League Championship Series...Won the 2019 World Series with Washington, starting the decisive Game 7 at Houston...Earlier in the 2019 Postseason, took a no-hitter into the seventh inning in Game 2 of the NLCS vs. St. Louis...In 2013, struck out 34 batters in 22.1 innings over four games (three starts) for the Tigers...Started Game 4 of the ALDS, ALCS and World Series in 2012, posting a 2.08 ERA with 26 strikeouts in those three games for Detroit.

BATTING CHAMP: Jeff McNeil won the National League batting title, finishing atop the major leagues and the National League with a .326 batting average...He joins José Reyes as the only players in Mets history to be crowned an NL batting champion after hitting .337 in 2011...McNeil is the first Mets player to lead the majors in average...His .326 batting average places him sixth on the franchise's single-season list...It was the highest average to end a season since Reyes' .337 mark in 2011.

PADRES-METS NOTES: The Mets and Padres have never met in the Postseason.

STARTING OFF: The Mets starting pitchers went 70-42 with a 3.61 ERA with 232 walks and 919 strikeouts this season...They finished fifth in the majors and second in the NL in ERA...Their 919 strikeouts were third in MLB and second in the NL...Prior to 2022, the last time the Mets starting staff recorded more than 70 wins was in 1990, when the starting staff went 73-56.

HOW STRIKING: The Mets struck out 1,565 batters this season, which placed them atop the majors...The team's 1,565 strikeouts is the most in a single-season in franchise history...The previous record was 1,520 set in 2019...Mets pitchers averaged 9.79 K/9 IP, rate...Only the 2020 Mets had a higher K/9 IP ratio at 10.06...More than one of every four batters to face Mets pitching struck out this season (26.3 percent), the highest rate in the majors and the highest rate in franchise history.

CITI SLICKERS: The Mets won 54 games at home this year...That their highest total at Citi Field in franchise history...The last time the team won more than 50 games in New York was in 2000 when they went 55-26...Overall, the Mets went 54-27 at Citi Field...The team's .667 winning percentage was the fourth-highest in team history...Only the 1988 (56-24, .700), 2000 and 1986 teams (both 55-26, .679) had a better home winning percentage...The Mets posted a 3.06 ERA with 221 walks and 828 strikeouts at Citi Field...The Mets owned the second-best home ERA in the NL...The Mets struck out 828 at home this year, which was the second-most in the NL...That was the second-most in franchise history...The franchise record is 835 strikeouts at home accomplished in 2019.

REPEAT RELIEVER: Edwin Díaz was voted the National League Reliever of the Month for the months of June, July and August...Díaz is the first Major League reliever to win three consecutive Reliever of the Month Awards since he accomplished the feat himself during his Mariano Rivera AL Reliever of the Year Award-winning 2018 season... In June, Díaz made 10 appearances for the Mets while converting each of his five save opportunities...He posted a 0.93 ERA (one earned run/9.2 innings) on eight hits with a 2:1 strikeout-to-walk ratio...He became the third pitcher in franchise history to post a month in which he tallied at least 20 strikeouts while not permitting more than a run or walk, joining Alejandro Peña in September 1990 and Hall of Famer Tom Seaver in April 1972...Since the start of June to end of the season, Díaz posted a 0.65 ERA (three earned runs/41.1 innings) with 18 hits, eight walks and 80 strikeouts...He has converted all 21 saves in that period...The Mets were 51-10 when Díaz appeared in a game this year.

I WANT TO RIDE MY CYCLE: Eduardo Escobar recorded his first career cycle and the 11th cycle in franchise history on June 6 at San Diego...He finished the game going 4-5 with three runs, a double, triple, home run and six RBI...It was the first cycle recorded in the history of Petco Park...According to Elias, the last player before Escobar to finish off a cycle with a triple and home run in the eighth inning or later was Luis Gonzalez for Arizona on July 5, 2000 (triple in 8th, home run in 9th)...Escobar and Trea Turner (7 RBI, April 25, 2017) are the only players in the last 10 years with a cycle and 6+ RBIs in the same game.

WHERE IN THE WORLD IS...: The Mets went 2-4 against in six games against the Padres in 2022...This included going 1-2 on the road (June 6-8) and at home (July 22-24)...The Mets are 251-257 all-time against the Padres, including a 134-116 mark in New York and a 23-18 record at Citi Field...Jeff McNeil is a .351 (13-37) hitter with six runs, four doubles, two RBI, four walks with a .455 OBP and a .459 SLG in 13 career games against the Padres...Tomás Nido has hit .314 (11-35) with two runs, a double, a home run, four RBI, two walks with a .351 OBP and a .429 SLG in 11 games...Pete Alonso has hit .286 (16-56) with 12 runs, two doubles, two home runs, nine RBI, nine walks with a .429 OBP and a .429 SLG in 18 career games against the Friars.

SMILE LIKE YOU MEAN IT: Francisco Lindor hit 26 home runs this season...That surpasses Asdrubal Cabrera's 23 home runs in 2018 for the most by a Mets shortstop in a single season...He set the single-season record with most RBI by a shortstop, recording 107 this season...He led major league shortstops in RBI, second in walks (59) was third in home runs, tied for third in triples (5), fifth in OBP (.337) as well as OPS (.782) and ninth in SLG (.445)...Lindor led all shortstops in the majors, ranked sixth in MLB and fifth in the National League with a 6.8 fWAR this season

ONLY A FEW CAN COM-PETE: Pete Alonso has set a franchise single-season RBI record with 131 this season...His 131 RBI were tied for the top of the majors and led the National League...Only once before in franchise history has a Met finished the season with the most or tied for the most RBI...Howard Johnson recorded a career-best 117 RBI in 1991 to lead the National League...He had 27 game-winning RBI this season, the most since the stat was first tracked in 1974...His 35 go-ahead RBI were tied for the second-most in a single season in Mets history...Keith Hernandez had 36 go-ahead RBI in 1985.

QUITE THE DEBUT: After signing a three-year deal with New York last offseason, Scherzer posted a 2.29 ERA (37 ER/145.1 IP) in his first season with the Mets...That is the lowest mark in a season in his career and the best all time in a pitcher's first season with the Mets (min. 140.0 innings)...His 0.91 WHIP was not just the best mark by a Met in his first season with the club, it was the best by any Met in club history (min. 140.0 innings)...Scherzer did not allow more than four runs in any of his 23 starts this season.

LEGENDARY: Scherzer entered the 2022 season as the active leader in strikeouts...He was passed by Justin Verlander while on the IL and the two veterans have been swapping places on the leaderboard since...Verlander ended the year ranked just ahead of Scherzer with five more Ks...Scherzer now ranks 13th all-time, having passed all-time greats Fergie Jenkins, Pedro Martinez, Bob Gibson, Curt Schilling, CC Sabathia and John Smoltz this season...See below for a chart of the No. 10-19 strikeout pitchers of all-time:

LEAGUE LEADERS: Among pitchers with at least 140.0 innings pitched this season, Scherzer ranked sixth with a 2.29 ERA, ninth with a 10.71 K/9 ratio, second with a 0.91 WHIP and third with a 7.21 K/BB ratio...Among pitchers to face 500 or more batters, his .207 opponent average ranked 14th in the majors, while his .574 OPS against ranked eighth.

AGE IS JUST A NUMBER: In his age-37 season, Scherzer posted a 2.29 ERA with 173 strikeouts...Since the earned run became an official statistic in 1913, only three pitchers have posted an ERA that low with as many strikeouts at age 37 or older: Roger Clemens (1.87 ERA, 185 strikeouts at age 42 for the 2005 Astros) and Hall of Famer Dazzy Vance (2.09 ERA, 200 strikeouts at age 37 for the 1928 Brooklyn Dodgers)...Justin Verlander (1.75 ERA, 185 strikeouts at age 39) also accomplished this feat in 2022.

ALWAYS IMPROVING: Scherzer leads the majors with a 2.38 ERA over the last two seasons (min. 200.0 IP)...He had a career-best 2.46 ERA last season and topped that with a 2.29 ERA this year...No other pitcher since 1913 has thrown 140.0 or more innings and posted an ERA below 2.50 in both his age 36 and age 37 seasons...Only five pitchers have done that twice at any point after turning 36: Eddie Plank (1915-16), Babe Adams (1919-20), Hoyt Wilhelm (1959, 1965), Dennis Martinez (1991-92) and Randy Johnson (2001-02).

200: Scherzer reached 200 career wins on September 19 in Milwaukee, joining an exclusive club of active pitchers with 200+ victories...Justin Verlander (243) and Zack Greinke (223) are the only other active hurlers who have won more than 200 games in their career...He reached 200 career wins with a career record 99 games over .500 (200-101)...Elias says there are only five pitchers in the modern era whose 200th career win came with fewer losses on their résumé: Pedro Martinez (200-84), Juan Marichal (200-97), Whitey Ford (200-79), Lefty Grove (200-83) and Grover Cleveland Alexander (200-96)...Randy Johnson was also 99 games over .500 at the time of his 200th career victory.

MAX IN THE BIG APPLE: Scherzer went 4-2 with a 1.67 ERA in 10 starts at home this season...He is 14-4 with a 1.94 ERA (34 ER/157.1 IP) in his career at Citi Field...He has won 11 consecutive decisions at Citi Field (longest winning streak in the ballpark's history) from July 9, 2016-May 18, 2022.

DOUBLE THE FUN: Scherzer ended the season tied for third all-time with 110 double-digit strikeout games in his career, two more than Pedro Martinez...Roger Clemens also had 110 in his career...Nolan Ryan (215) and Randy Johnson (212) are the top two.

THE 7.0 LINE: Scherzer threw 7.0 innings eight times in 23 starts this season...Each time Scherzer went 7.0 innings this season, he finished his outing with one or no runs allowed...Despite missing a total of nine weeks on the Injured List, those eight outings of 7.0+ innings while allowing one or no runs still tied for the fourth-most in the majors.

INJURED LIST: Scherzer went on the Injured List twice with left oblique injuries...All told, he missed about nine weeks of the season (May 19-July 5 and September 4-19).
