## NEW YORK METS [75-87] <br> FOURTH PLACE, NL EAST, 29.0 GB

METSCELLANEOUS: The Mets went 75-87 in the 2023 regular season, finishing in fourth place and 29.0 games back in the National League East

OPENING DAY IS THE GREATEST: The Mets opened their 62nd season on March 30 against the Marlins in Miami...In the history of Major League Baseball, the Mets (41-21, .661) have the best winning percentage on Opening Day...Research courtesy of Elias...After losing their first eight Opening Day contests, the Mets have won 41 of their last 54 Opening Day games (.759)...The Mets have won 14 of their last 18 openers, including six of the last seven.

PUT THEM IN THE HALL!: On Saturday, June 3, infielder Howard Johnson, LHP AI Leiter and broadcasters Gary Cohen and Howie Rose were inducted into the Mets Hall of Fame in a pre-game ceremony...The Mets Hall of Fame now has 34 members...Longtime PR executive and current VP of Alumni PR and Team Historian Jay Horwitz was also honored with the Mets Hall of Fame Achievement Award for his contributions to the organization

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: The Mets featured five players who made their major league debut this season - Kodai Senga (April 2), Zach Muckenhirn (May 3 (G2)), Josh Walker (May 16), Grant Hartwig (June 19) and Ronny Mauricio (September 1).

THE EAST IS A BEAST: The Mets went 25-27 against the NL East... The team posted a 4.41 ERA against their division, while hitting 237/.315/.395.

IN THE CITI: New York secured a winning season at Citi Field in 2023 going 43-38 at home...The Mets have earned a winning season at Citi Field in each of the last three seasons...The Mets smashed 116 home runs at Citi Field...That was the second-most home runs at home in team history...Only the 2019 team (126) hit more at home.. New York batted .234/.317/.414 at Citi Field.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN: The Mets went 32-49 on the road in 2023... The team posted a 4.73 ERA while batting $.241 / .316 / .401$...The Mets went 47-34 on the road in 2022.

LET'S GO STREAKING: The Mets won a season-high six straight games from July 1 - July 7 ... The team won five straight from May 17-21... All five wins during that streak were decided by one run...That is tied for the longest such streak in franchise history (July 20-24, 1984)... New York finished 25-28 in one-run games.

LET'S NOT GO STREAKING: The Mets dropped a season-high seven straight games from June 2-9...It was their longest losing streak since the team lost seven straight June 23-29, 2019.

THEY'RE OUT OF MY LEAGUE: The new schedule format had New York playing a total of 46 Interleague games in 2023, more than double their previous high for a single season (20)...The Mets went 19-27 against the American League...Overall, New York owns a 254254 record in Interleague play.

EXTRA, EXTRA: The Mets went $7-3$ in extra-innings...Their . 700 winning percentage was tied for the third-best in the majors...Over the last two years, New York is 17-5 in extra-inning games.

TWIN BILLS: The Mets played six doubleheaders in 2023...The team split a twinbill on May 1 vs. Atlanta, were swept by the Tigers in Detroit on May 3, took two from the Guardians in New York on May 21, were swept against the Braves on August 12, split a doubleheader on September 27 vs. Miami and swept their final twinbill of the year on September 30 vs. Philadelphia...The Mets have played 30 double dips since 2021, more than any other team in the majors...The Mets have earned at least a split in 28 of those 30 twinbills over the last two years...New York has swept nine of their last 17 doubleheaders, including two this year and six DH sweeps last season.

EIGHT IS GREAT: The Mets went 63-2 when leading after eight innings...The team began the season 27-0 in those games...The streak was snapped with a 13-10, 10 -inning loss against the Braves on June 8 in Atlanta...The loss also snapped a streak of 122 wins when ahead after eight innings, which began following a loss on September 6, 2021 at Washington...It was the longest streak in franchise history, surpassing the previous high of 117 games.

THE BEST THING THAT'S EVER BEEN MINE: Pete Alonso was selected to the National League All-Star team...It marked Alonso's third career All-Star nod, tied with Keith Hernandez for the most by a Mets first baseman...Alonso is the 13th Met in club history to make at least three All-Star rosters...He participated in the 2023 Home Run Derby, making him the 10th player to compete in the HR Derby at least four times, joining Ken Griffey Jr. (eight), Mark McGwire (seven), Barry Bonds (six), Sammy Sosa (six), Albert Pujols (five), Lance Berkman (four), Robinson Canó (four) and David Ortiz (four).

BEAUTIFUL GHOSTS: Kodai Senga was added to the National League All-Star team this season...He became the fifth Mets rookie All-Star, joining Tom Seaver (1967), Jerry Koosman (1968), Dwight Gooden (1984) and Pete Alonso (2019)...Additionally, Senga became the eighth Japanese-born rookie selected to an All-Star team, joining Hideo Nomo (1995), Ichiro Suzuki (2001), Hideki Matsui (2003), Hideki Okajima (2007), Kosuke Fukudome (2008), Yu Darvish (2012) and Masahiro Tanaka (2014).

NL ROOKIE OF THE MONTH: Francisco Alvarez was named NL Rookie of the Month for July...The 21-year-old hit . 275 with eight home runs, 16 RBI , six walks, 14 runs, a .623 SLG and a .974 OPS...The backstop led NL rookies in home runs, RBI, SLG, and OPS and tied for second in total bases (43), ranked third in extra-base hits (8) and was fifth in OBP (.351) and eighth in batting average (.275)...Alvarez scored a run in each of his first seven games of the month, with hits in six of the seven contests and home runs in five of the games. He had five multi-hit games including three straight from July 5-7.

NL PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Pete Alonso was named the National League Player of the Week presented by Chevrolet for the period ending July 30...Alonso earned his third career selection after previously winning the award on June 24, 2019 and September 26 last year...His selection last September was the last time a Mets player earned Player of the Week honors...The 28 -year-old hit . 304 (7-23) with four home runs, 12 RBI, two walks, an .826 SLG and a . 370 OBP during the week...He led MLB in RBI, was tied for the NL lead in home runs, and ranked second in total bases (19), fourth in slugging and sixth in OPS (1.196)...The three-time All-Star had twomulti homer games during the week.

OUCH: The Mets were plunked 107 times this season, the secondmost in the majors and the most in the NL...Only the Mariners (111) were hit by more pitches...Last season, the team was hit by a franchise-record 112 pitches...Over the last three years, the Mets have been plunked by 313 pitches, by far the most in the majors.. The Reds are second with 289 HBP

DINGERS!: The Mets featured eight players who recorded at least 10 home runs (Pete Alonso-46, Francisco Lindor - 31, Francisco Alvarez - 25, Brandon Nimmo-24, Daniel Vogelbach - 13, DJ Stewart - 11, Jeff McNeil - 10, Tommy Pham - 10)...The team record is 10 players with 10 or more home runs, done in 2017...The 2019 team featured nine players, while the 2007 and 2005 teams featured eight players as well...The Mets socked 215 home runs...That was the fourth-most in the National League...The 2022 Mets hit 171 home runs...The 2023 team became the fifth team in franchise history record 200 or more homers in a year...The team's 215 home runs were the fourth-most in a single season in franchise history...The previous four years with 200 or more homers are: 2019 (242), 2017 (224), 2016 (218) and 2006 (200).

SUBWAY SERIES: The Mets went 2-2 against the Yankees, splitting the series in The Bronx and in Queens...The Amazin's are 62-80 vs. the Yankees all-time during the regular season...The Mets are 110-148-2 vs. the Yankees combined in the regular season, World Series, Spring Training, 2020 Summer Camp, Mayor's Trophy Games, Mayor's Challenge Games and the Big Apple Series.

THREE'S COMPANY: The 2023 Mets tied a franchise record with three players recording at least 25 homers (Pete Alonso, Francisco Lindor and Francisco Alvarez)...Carlos Beltrán, Carlos Delgado, David Wright accomplished the feat in 2006 and 2008...The Mets also did it in 1999 (Edgardo Alfonzo, Mike Piazza, Robin Ventura) and 1987 (Howard Johnson, Kevin McReynolds, Darryl Strawberry).

CONNECT FOUR: The Mets featured four players who hit 20 or more home runs: Pete Alonso, Francisco Alvarez, Francisco Lindor and Brandon Nimmo...The last time was in 2019, when the Mets had a franchise-record five players who recorded at least 20 home runs.

STEAL THIS ALBUM: The Mets led the major leagues with a $88.7 \%$ success rate in stolen bases...The team stole 118 bases in 133 attempts...It's the highest success rate in Mets history...The previous high was $82.3 \%$ which was accomplished in 2004....From May 11June 29 the Mets stole a franchise-record 35 consecutive bases.

FOR PETE'S SAKE: Pete Alonso recorded his second season with 45 or more home runs, becoming the only player in franchise history to do so...He recorded his third season with 40 or more home runs...He became the fifth player in major league history with three or more seasons of 40 or more homers in their first five years, joining Ralph Kiner (four), Ryan Howard (three), Albert Pujols (three) and Eddie Mathews (three)... He is the only player in franchise history with multiple seasons of 40 or more home runs...He finished third in the majors and in the NL with 46 homers...Alonso's 192 home runs since he entered the league in 2019 are the most in the major leagues.

100: Pete Alonso finished the season with 118 RBI, second in the major leagues... He will enter the 2024 season two RBI away from 500 for his career...Alonso's 498 RBI since he entered the league in 2019 are the most in the majors...He will seek to become the 10th player in Mets history to record 500 RBI...His 118 RBI this season are the sixthmost by a Met in a single season... He became the fourth player in Mets history to record three or more seasons with 100 or more RBI... David Wright is the franchise leader with five such seasons...Carlos Beltrán and Darryl Strawberry also recorded three seasons each.

KING OF QUEENS: Pete Alonso has hit 85 home runs at Citi Field in his career...That is the most in the history of the ballpark... His 85 home runs at home is the fifth-most in franchise history.

THE ICEMEN COMETH: Alonso is a lifetime .370 (10-27) hitter with a 1.309 OPS in extra innings...Alonso has 35 extra-base hits, including 17 home runs, in the ninth or later in his career (both marks lead the majors since 2019)... His 42 RBI in the ninth or later are tied for fifth in the majors since 2019, trailing Eugenio Suárez (47), Brandon Crawford (46), Juan Soto (46) and Vladimir Guerrero Jr. (43).

WALK IT LIKE I TALK IT: Pete Alonso recorded his fourth career walk-off home run on May 17 vs. Tampa Bay...lt was the first walk-off victory by the Mets in 2023...Alonso's four career walk-off home runs tie a franchise record with Chris Jones, Kevin McReynolds, Cleon Jones, Mike Piazza and Wilmer Flores.

HOMERS ARE SICK: From May 16-19, Pete Alonso homered in four straight games for the second time in his career...Alonso homered in four straight games from August 5-9, 2019...He became the second player in franchise history to homer in four consecutive games twice joining Mike Piazza (May 17-21, 1999 and August 13-16, 1999).

GRANNIES ARE SICKER: Alonso smashed his third career grand slam on May 19 vs. Cleveland...He joins Todd Hundley (April 26, 1995) and Carl Everett (September 13, 1997) as the only other players in franchise history to hit a game-tying grand slam.

INTERLEAGUE PETE: Pete Alonso has hit 43 home runs in Interleague Play since the 2019 season... His 43 home runs against the AL is a franchise record, and the most among any player since 2019...Mike Piazza was the previous record holder with 28 Interleague homers.

30-30: Francisco Lindor became the fourth player in Mets history to collected 30 steals and 30 home runs in a season... He joined join David Wright (2007), Howard Johnson $(1991,1989,1987)$ and Darryl Strawberry (1987)....He joined Barry Larkin (1996), Álex Rodríguez (1998), Jimmy Rollins (2007), Hanley Ramírez (2008) and Bobby Witt Jr. (2023) as the only shortstops in major league history with a 30/30 season...In addition, joined Johnson, Rollins, José Cruz (2001), Carlos Beltrán (2004) and José Ramírez (2018) as the only switch hitters with a $30 / 30$ season.

THIS IS 200!: Francisco Lindor launched his 200th career home run on June 27 against Milwaukee...He is the 11th shortstop in major league history to reach the 200-career home run mark (min. 60\% career games at SS)... He became the 14th player to hit his 200th career home run in a Met uniform (last: Todd Frazier, June 20, 2019 at Chicago-NL)...He was the seventh Met to accomplish the feat at home (last: David Wright, August 24, 2012 vs. Houston).

TWO-FERS: In two games on September 27 vs. Miami, Francisco Lindor hit a total of three home runs...He joined Dave Kingman (Apri 26, 1981), Tommie Agee (May 11, 1969) and Gil Hodges (May 30, 1962) as the only Mets in franchise history with three homers across a doubleheader...Courtesy of Sarah Langs... He was the first Met since Brandon Nimmo (October 4, 2022 vs. Washington) to homer in both games of a doubleheader...It was the 32 nd time a Met has homered in both games of a doubleheader...It marked his 15th career multihomer game and his first since homering from both sides of the plate on April 15, 2022 vs. Arizona.

SMILE LIKE YOU MEAN IT: On July 6 vs. Arizona, Francisco Lindor had his first career five-hit game, going 5-5 with two triples and a solo homer... He is the second Met with two triples and a home run in the same game, joining Joe Christopher (August 18, 1964)...He became just the seventh player in the modern era (since 1901) with five or more hits, including two triples and at least one home run, in a single game...The last player to do so was Dmitri Young on May 6, 2003, with the others being Willie Mays (1958), Hoot Evers (1950), Rogers Hornsby (1916), Cy Seymour (1907) and Harry Davis (1901).

I DECLARE fWAR: Francisco Lindor ranked eighth in the majors and fifth in the National League with 6.0 fWAR...Since he joined the Mets, Lindor has posted a 16.8 fWAR....Only Freddie Freeman (19.9), Mookie Betts (18.7) and Trea Turner (17.1) have posted a higher mark in the Senior Circuit...His 16.8 fWAR since 2021 is sixth in the majors.

STRIKE THAT: Senga recorded 202 strikeouts in his first season in the major leagues...That is the second-most strikeouts by a rookie in franchise history...Doc Gooden recorded 276 strikeouts in his rookie season in 1984...His 202 strikeouts were tied for the eighth-most in the NL...He is the 13th pitcher in franchise history to record 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Jacob deGrom and Noah Syndergaard were the last pitchers to do so in 2019...Tom Seaver owns the franchise record with nine such seasons.

SENGA GENESIS: Senga finished his first season in the major leagues going 12-7 with a 2.98 ERA ( 55 ER/166.1 IP) with 77 walks and 202 strikeouts...His 12 wins were tied for the most in franchise history in a single-season by a Japanese born player...Masato Yoshii also had 12 in 1999.... His 2.98 ERA ranked fifth in the majors and second in the National League...His 2.98 ERA is the seventh-lowest by a Japaneseborn pitcher in MLB history (min. 100 innings).

KODAI, THE FRIENDLY GHOST: On April 2 in Miami, Kodai Senga became the 64th pitcher whose major league debut came in a start for the Mets... He joined Masato Yoshii as the only two Japaneseborn pitchers to make his MLB debut in a start for the Mets...Including Senga, 16 Mets have started and earned a win in their major league debut (eight Mets have won in relief in their MLB debut).

K IS FOR KODAI: Senga was one of three pitchers in the majors, and the only rookie, who recorded 12 strikeouts in a game three times.. Only 11 other pitchers in Mets history have struck out 12 or more in a game multiple times in one season: Dwight Gooden, Tom Seaver, Jacob deGrom, David Cone, Nolan Ryan, Al Leiter, R.A. Dickey, Pedro Martinez, Jerry Koosman, Matt Harvey and Sid Fernandez.

WE FOUND NIMMO: Brandon Nimmo recorded career-highs in games played (151), hits (162), RBI (68) and home runs (24) and matched his high in doubles (30) ...He finished 13th in the NL with a 363 OBP, while his six triples were tied for the eighth most in the NL...Nimmo safely hit in 25 of his last 27 games to end the season, batting .339/.398/.625 in that span with 18 extra-base hits and 17 RBI.

TRIPLES MAKES IT SAFE. TRIPLES IS BEST: Brandon Nimmo tripled twice in the May 26 victory at Colorado... He became the 15th player in franchise history to record two triples in the same game and the first since Amed Rosario did so on July 10, 2018 vs. Philadelphia... Since 1901, Brandon Nimmo is the fifth player in MLB to record two triples and walk thrice in the same game joining Dexter Folwer (July 4, 2010), Shane Victorino (May 10, 2010), Mike Schmidt (July 23, 1977) and Mike Mitchell (September 26, 1909-G1)...He has collected 29 in his career...That places him seventh on the Mets all-time list

FOREVER YOUNG: On May 9 at Cincinnati, Francisco Alvarez recorded his first career multi-homer game...Per Sarah Langs, he is the fifth-youngest player since 1900 with a multi-homer game as a catcher...He is the sixth Met age 21 or younger with a multi-homer game and the first since David Wright on June 2, 2004 vs. Florida.

ATTABOY ALVAREZ: In the second game of a doubleheader on September 30 vs. Philadelphia, Francisco Alvarez hit two home runs in a game, including first career grand slam...He tied Darryl Strawberry with a franchise-leading four multi-homer games before turning 22... Courtesy Sarah Langs...His 25 homers were the fourth-most ever by a rookie catcher in a season (Min. 60\% games at C)...He finished tied for second with Corbin Carroll in the majors among rookies in homers...Only Gunnar Henderson had more with 28...His 63 RBI were the sixth-most by a Mets rookie in a season...On September 30, he set a career-high with six RBI to join Pete Alonso (6, August 15, 2019), Wilmer Flores ( $6,2 x$, June 2, 2014 and September 16, 2014), David Wright ( 6, August 5,2004 ) and Jeromy Burnitz (7, August 5, 1993) as the only Mets rookies with six or more RBI in a game...Became one of seven Mets catchers with six or more RBI in a game.

DO IT ALL FOR THE ROOKIE: Francisco Alvarez joined Pete Alonso ( 53 HR in 2019) and Darryl Strawberry ( 26 in 1983) as the only Mets rookies to have 20 or more home runs... He became the ninth rookie catcher in major league history with 20 or more homers in a season

HERE'S THE CATCH: Alvarez recorded 25 home runs in his age 21 season or younger...Among all major league catchers, only Johnny Bench (26 homers in 1969) had more...Research courtesy of Sarah Langs... His 23 home runs as a catcher were the second-most in the majors behind Cal Raleigh's 24.

GIVE ME A BREAK: In 67 games following the All-Star break, Jeff McNeil batted .291/.337/.438 with 38 runs, 12 doubles, three triples, seven home runs and 29 RBI..In 89 games before the break, McNeil slashed $.253 / .331 / .328$ with three home runs and 26 RBI.

YANKEE CLIPPERS: Jeff McNeil has hit 337 (30-89) with 12 runs, five doubles, two home runs, 13 RBI, six walks with a .398 OBP and a .461 SLG in 24 career games against the Yankees...His .337 average against the Yankees is the third-highest among active players (min. 80 plate appearances)...His .337 batting average against the Yankees is the highest in franchise history ( min .50 plate appearances).

HEY MR. DJ, TURN THE MUSIC UP: On August 30 vs. Texas, DJ Stewart drove in a career-high-tying four runs, plated the gamewinning run with a walk-off hit by pitch and had his second multihomer game of the season...It was the 10th time in Mets history a player had two home runs and a walk-off RBI in the same game...This instance was the first in franchise history in which the walk-off RBI did not come on the second of that player's two home runs in the game...Research courtesy of Elias.

FEELS LIKE THE FIRST TIME: On August 17 at St. Louis this trio of Mets recorded notable Mets "firsts": José Quintana (win), Trevor Gott (save) and Tim Locastro (home run)...It marked the first time three Mets had notched those Mets "firsts" in the same game since April 20, 1967, when Tommy Davis hit his first Mets homer, Don Shaw was credited with his first Mets save and starter Tom Seaver picked up his first Mets - and career - win...The only other time such a triplet of events occurred in the same game was one week earlier, April 13, 1967, when the starter was also Seaver (his MLB debut), Chuck Estrada claimed the victory in relief for his first and only Met win; Ron Taylor notched his first Met save, while Jerry Buchek delivered his first Met homer...Credit to Faith and Fear in Flushing research.

JULY! JULY! JULY!: The Mets won their first six games in July for only the second time in club history, also going 6-0 to begin the month in 1991...New York ended up winning its first 10 games in July of 1991, its longest win streak ever to begin the month...New York went 14-9 in July, good for a .609 winning percentage...That was the fourth-best in the majors and the best in the National League...The team posted a 3.40 ERA in July, the fourth-lowest ERA in the majors and the second-lowest in the National League...New York's rotation posted a 3.48 ( $50 \mathrm{ER} / 129.1 \mathrm{IP}$ ) in that span with 49 walks and 128 strikeouts...Their 3.48 ERA was the fifth-best in the majors and the third-best in the Senior Circuit.

NEXT CHAPTER: Mike Vasil walked one and struck out one in the seventh inning for the National League in the 2023 SiriusXM Futures Game...The 23 -year-old combined to make 26 starts between Double-A Binghamton and Triple-A Syracuse where he went 5-6 with a 4.65 ERA ( $64 \mathrm{ER} / 124.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ) with 46 walks and 138 strikeouts... He was selected by the Mets in the eighth round of the 2021 FirstYear Player Draft out of the University of Virginia.

SECOND ACT: The Mets recorded 33 quality starts following the AllStar break, which tied for second in the majors...The team was sixth in the NL with a 4.18 ERA after the break...In September/October, New York posted a 3.56 ERA, which placed third in the NL and sixth in the majors.

A TO Z: On July 5, at Arizona, New York was down to a two-out, two-strike situation in the ninth inning, trailing, 1-0, before Francisco Alvarez launched a game-tying solo shot...Mark Canha followed with an RBI triple to give the Mets a lead they would not relinquish... SEE YOU SOON!: The Mets will open the 2024 regular season on Thursday, March 28 vs. Milwaukee at Citi Field...The Mets opening homestand continues Saturday and Sunday vs. the Brewers before Detroit visits New York, Monday, April 1-Wednesday, April 3...The Mets will open the 2024 Spring Training Grapefruit League schedule on Saturday, February 24 at Clover Park in Port St. Lucie vs. the St. Louis Cardinals...The Mets and Yankees will meet in Spring Training for the first time since 2018 with games on Tuesday, March 5 in Port St. Lucie and on Friday, March 22 in Tampa.

2023, RETURN OF LUCCHESI: Lucchesi pitched to a 4-0 record with a 2.89 ERA (15 ER/46.2 IP) this season in his return to the majors after missing the entirety of the 2022 season due to undergoing "Tommy John" surgery... Finished the season with a 1.31 WHIP and .251 opponent average while tallying 32 strikeouts...Lucchesi collected three quality starts this season, more than both 2020 and 2021 combined (both of which were shortened seasons).

ALL I DO IS WIN: Established a career-high winning streak with four wins this season after picking up wins in each of his four decisions... His wins came on April 21 at San Francisco, August 18 at St. Louis, September 13 against Arizona and September 27 in the first game of a doubleheader against Miami.

CAREER-HIGHS: This season, Megill established career bests in starts (25), innings (126.1), strikeouts (105) and quality starts (six) surpassing his previous highs of 18 starts, 89.2 innings, 99 strikeouts and four quality starts set in 2021.

THE FRANCHISE HAS COMPANY: On April 7, the Mets home opener vs. Miami, Megill threw 6.0 scoreless innings and allowed three hits...Megill joined Tom Seaver (April 5, 1983) as the only other pitcher in franchise history to throw 6.0 shutout innings and allow three hits or fewer in a home opener...Courtesy of Elias.

STARTING OFF ON THE RIGHT FOOT: Megill earned the win in each of his first three starts of the season...It was the 28th time in franchise history that a starting pitcher won each of their first three starts to begin the season.

AMAZIN' IN APRIL: Megill went 3-1 with a 3.96 ERA (11 ER/25.0 IP) this April... Since 2022, Megill's seven wins in April are tied with Gerrit Cole for the thirdmost in the majors...Only Clayton Kershaw and Joe Ryan (eight each) have more wins in April over the last two seasons...Megill's 2.89 ERA (17 ER/53.0 IP) in April since 2022 is the fifth-lowest mark in the NL and the 16th-lowest mark in the majors, while his .216 opponent's batting average is the sixth-lowest mark in the NL and the 16th-lowest mark in the majors during the month over the last two seasons (min. 45.0 IP).

STARTER/RELIEF: Peterson made a career-high 21 starts and went 2-8 with a 5.24 ERA ( $60 \mathrm{ER} / 103.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ) in those starts...In six relief appearances, Peterson went 1-0 with a 2.25 ERA ( 2 ER/8.0 IP).

## QUINTANA NEWS \& NOTES

METS DEBUT: Quintana made his first start with the Mets on July 20 against his former team, the Chicago White Sox....Quintana signed a two-year contract with New York on December 9, 2022...The southpaw began the season on the IL due to a stress fracture in his rib cage...Underwent surgery on March 17.

300 CLUB: In his start on September 17, Quintana became the 11th active pitcher to reach 300 career starts and joined Clayton Kershaw, Madison Bumgarner and Wade Miley as the only active left-handed pitchers with 300 or more career starts.

ACROSS LEAGUE LINES: For his career, Quintana owns a 3.34 ERA (85 ER/229.0 IP) in 42 Interleague games...That is the 10th-lowest mark among active pitchers in the majors (Min. 200.0 IP)...Opened the season with four straight starts against interleague opponents, tied for the second-longest such streak in major league history...Courtesy of Elias.

HOT STREAK: Quintana's homerless inning streak came to an end at 97.1 innings in his start on August 12 at St. Louis after allowing a solo homer to Tyler O'Neill to lead off the bottom of the seventh inning...The last pitcher before Quintana to reach 90.0 + homerless innings was Tyson Ross (100.0 IP) in 2015...Courtesy of Elias.

LEFT 'EM SPEECHLESS: Reached 1,500 career strikeouts in his start vs. Colorado on August 16, 2022...Quintana currently ranks fourth among active MLB lefties in strikeouts $(1,592)$ behind Clayton Kershaw $(2,944)$, Chris Sale $(2,189)$, Madison Bumgarner $(2,070)$.

YOU GOTTA MAKE 'EM EARN IT: Quintana allowed three earned runs or fewer in each of his 19 starts from July 23, 2022 to August 23, 2023...Is the longest such streak of his career and was the longest such active streak in the majors by a starting pitcher (excluding openers)...Quintana's streak of 16 straight starts allowing two earned runs or fewer came to an end in his start against Kansas City on August 1, 2023.

A PERFECT 10: The lefty pitcher struck out a season-high 10 batters on September 23 in Philadelphia...The fifth highest amount of strikeouts he has ever recorded in a game throughout his career...Was his first double-digit strikeout game since August 13, 2019 when he struck out a career-high 14 batters.

ON THE LEADERBOARD: Since 2022, Quintana has pitched to a 2.32 ERA (18 ER/62.0 IP) in September/October, the sixth-lowest mark in the majors during that span (min 50.0 IP )...Last season Quintana owned the lowest ERA (0.89) in Major League Baseball during the month of September last year and is the lowest ERA in any month in his career...Since 2022, Quintana has allowed 13 home runs, tied for the lowest total during that span (min 150.0 IP ).

## SENGA NEWS \& NOTES

200 CLUB: Became the 13th pitcher in Mets history to record 200+ strikeouts in a season, joining Dwight Gooden as the only Mets rookie to have 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Became the 18th rookie in the Modern Era (Since 1900) and the sixth in the Wild Card Era (Since 1995) with 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Joins Hideo Nomo (236), Yu Darvish (221) and Daisuke Matsuzaka (201) as the only Japanese-born rookies with 200 or more strikeouts in a season.

METS ROOKIE MILESTONES: Became the 13th pitcher in Mets history to record 200+ strikeouts in a season, joining Dwight Gooden as the only Mets rookie to have 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Finished the season with a 2.98 ERA ( 55 ER/166.1 IP), the ninth-lowest mark by a Mets rookie in franchise history (Min. 100.0 IP)...His 29 starts tied with Masato Yoshii for the ninth-most by a Mets rookie in a season...Became just the 11th rookie in franchise history to record double-digit wins in a season, while his 12 wins rank tied for seventh among Mets rookies.
ROOKIE SENG-SATION: In his first season as a major leaguer, Senga became the 11th rookie in Mets history to reach double-digit wins in a season...He is the 18th rookie in the Modern Era (since 1900) and the sixth in the Wild Card Era (since 1995) with 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Is one of 11 rookie pitchers in the Modern Era with 200 or more strikeouts and a sub-3.00 ERA.

SPOOKY GOOD: Senga led all rookie pitchers in bWAR (4.5) and fWAR (3.4)...He was the only rookie to qualify for the ERA title...Finished the season ranked fifth in the majors and second in the NL with a $2.98 \mathrm{ERA}(55 \mathrm{ER} / 166.1 \mathrm{IP}$ ), the fifth-lowest mark by a Mets rookie in franchise history.

HARD TO HIT: In his rookie season, Senga had three starts of 7.0 or more innings with two or fewer hits allowed, which tied for the second-most such starts in the majors this season...Additionally it tied with Dwight Gooden for the most such starts by a Mets rookie in a single season...Only Nolan Ryan $(4,1970)$ and Jacob deGrom $(5,2015)$ have had more such starts in a single season in franchise history.

SENGA GENESIS: Senga recorded 202 strikeouts through his first 29 career major league games, the fourth-most by a Mets pitcher in franchise history...Only Dwight Gooden (251), Matt Harvey (217) and Noah Syndergaard (210) have recorded more during that span...His 202 strikeouts are the third-most by a Japanese born pitcher through 29 career games...He trails only Hideo Nomo (244) and Yu Darvish (221)... Senga's 2.98 ERA is the seventh-lowest mark by a Mets pitcher through their first 29 career major league games (Min. 100.0 IP).

KODAI THE FRIENDLY GHOST: Senga led all major league rookies with 12 wins this season, and tied for 11th in the National League overall in that category... His 202 strikouts also led all major league rookies, and tied for eighth in the National League.

I LOVE MY NEW HOME: Senga's 2.42 ERA ( $25 \mathrm{ER} / 93.0 \mathrm{IP}$ ) at Citi Field was the secondbest home mark in the majors among qualifiers...Senga held opposing batters to a . 179 average at home, the third lowest-mark in the majors among qualifiers...His $12.00 \mathrm{~K} / 9$ rate at home was the fifth-highest in the majors among qualifiers.
HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: On July 8, Major League Baseball announced that Kodai Senga was added to the National League All-Star team, which took place on July 11 at T-Mobile Park in Seattle...Senga joined Pete Alonso (2019), Dwight Gooden (1984), Jerry Koosman (1968) and Tom Seaver (1967) as the only Mets rookies selected to an All-Star Game...He is the eighth Japanese-Born rookie ever to be selected to an All-Star Game joining Masahiro Tanaka (2014), Yu Darvish (2012), Kosuke Fukudome (2008), Hideki Okajima (2007), Hideki Matsui (2003), Ichiro Suzuki (2001) and Hideo Nomo (1995).

PUTTING THE K IN FORK: Senga's "ghost fork" accounted for 110 of his 202 strikeouts during his rookie campaign...The pitch had a 59.5 percent whiff rate and a 28.2 percent putaway rate...Opponents managed just 18 hits in 163 at-bats ending with the forkball, a .110 batting average.

MLB DEBUT NOTES: Senga became the 64th pitcher whose major league debut came in a start for the Mets...New York has had one pitcher make his MLB debut as a starter in each of the previous three seasons: José Butto in 2022, Tylor Megill in 2021 and David Peterson in 2020 (the Mets won each of those three games)...Senga allowed one run over 5.1 innings on three hits, three walks and eight strikeouts in his major league debut...His eight strikeouts were tied for the fourth-most by a Japanese-born pitcher in their major league debut and tied for the third-most by a Mets pitcher in their major league debut.

METS-JAPAN CONNECTION: Senga is the 14th Japanese-born player to appear in at least one game for the Mets, the most by any major league team...Prior to Senga, the last Japanese-born player to appear in a game for the Mets was OF Norichika Aoki in 2017.

NPB CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: Prior to joining the Mets, Senga spent 11 seasons in Japan's NPB with the Fukuoka Softbank Hawks...During his NPB career he posted a 87-44 record with a 2.59 ERA ( 313 ER/1,089.0 IP) and 1,252 strikeouts ( $10.3 \mathrm{~K} / 9.0$ )... He was also a three-time NPB All-Star (2013, 2017 and 2019), a two-time Pacific League Best Nine Award winner (2019 and 2020) and a two-time Mitsui Golden Glove Award winner (2019 and 2020).
