WILD CARD CARDINALS: The Cardinals captured 2nd place (via head-to-head tie breaker over Cincinnati) in the N.L. Central and a 5th seed in the National League Playoffs, going 30-28, as they concluded their 129th season of play in the Senior Circuit, finishing 3.0 games back of 1st place Chicago.

A SEASON LIKE NO OTHER: The Cardinals played the fewest games (58) in their franchise history, two games fewer than the St. Louis Brown Stockings who played a 60-game season in 1877, going 28-32 and finishing 4th in the National League. **SUMMER CAMP:** The Cardinals Summer Camp, held at Busch Stadium, was the team's first pre-season training camp to be held in St. Louis since 1919.

COVID, QUARANTINE & RENTAL CARS: On July 30, the Cardinals began to learn that they had a number of players & staff who had tested positive for COVID-19, postponing their weekend series in Milwaukee...in all, 10 players & 8 staff members tested COVID positive, forcing the team to quarantine in Milwaukee for eight days. After additional positive tests, the team's season was suspended for 16 days (14 games postponed) from July 30-August 14 before they returned to the playing field on Sat., August 15 for a double-header at the White Sox...with an abundance of caution, the entire traveling party drove individually in 45 rental cars to the Windy City on Fri., August 14 for that resumption of play.

PERSEVERANCE: The Cardinals played their final 53 games in 44 days from August 15 to Sept. 27 with only two off-days (last on Sept. 9) with 11 double-headers (13-9 record in those games and three double-header sweeps).

NEXT MAN UP: The Cardinals had 44 different players appear for them in 2020 (19 position players, 25 pitchers) with 21 different players spending time on the Injured List...13 players made their MLB debuts, including four in the same game (first time since 1955) and seven over a two-day span August 15-16, the most since the New York Yankees (1944)...the team made an incredible 151 player transactions from Opening Day on July 24 until the end of the season on Sept. 27.

AN ERA OF EXCELLENCE: Under the ownership of **Bill DeWitt, Jr.** and his partners, the Cardinals have posted a 2,161-1,783 (.548) record since 1996, advancing to the postseason 15 times. The Cardinals were N.L. Champions in 2004, 2006, 2011 and 2013 and captured their 10th World Championship in 2006 and their 11th World title in 2011. The Cardinals 74 postseason wins since 1996 are 2nd in the majors, behind only the Yankees (111) and their 144 postseason games in that period are also 2nd to the Yankees (189). The Cardinals have advanced to the postseason in eight (2009, '11, '12, '13, '14, '15, '19, '20) of their 13 seasons (2008-20) under President of Baseball Operations **John "Mo" Mozeliak** and have had winning seasons in each of their 13 seasons since Mozeliak was named General Manager prior to the 2008 season.

GAMES THAT MATTER: Since Opening Day of 2011, the Cardinals have played 1,512 regular season games, out of 1,515, during which they still maintained playoff aspirations and had not yet been eliminated.

SAN DIEGO CONNECTIONS

Tommy Edman was born in and resides in San Diego, Calif...graduated from La Jolla Country Day School, where he was a National Merit Scholar.

Tyler Webb pitched in four games for San Diego in 2018 before being selected off waivers by St. Louis (June 29, 2018).

In 2014, The Padres won the rights to negotiate with **Kwang Hyun Kim** when he was posted by the KBO's SK Wyverns during the previous posting system that awarded rights to the highest blind bidder...sides were unable to reach an agreement and Kim returned to the KBO.

Pitching Coach **Mike Maddux** pitched parts of two years with San Diego (1991-92)...signed with the Padres as a free agent (March 31, 1991)...traded by San Diego to the Mets for pitchers **Mike Freitas** and **Roger Mason** (December 17, 1992).

Tommy Pham played parts of four seasons in St. Louis (2014-18)...selected by the Cardinals in the 16th round of the 2006 MLB draft...traded by St. Louis to Tampa Bay with international bonus money for pitchers **Genesis Cabrera**, **Roel Ramirez**, and outfielder **Justin Williams** (July 31, 2018).

Greg Garcia played six seasons in a Cardinals uniform (2014-19)...was originally selected by St. Louis in 7th round of the 2010 MLB draft...was college teammates with **Kolten Wong** at the University of Hawaii (2009-10).

Pierce Johnson pitched three seasons (2010-12) at Missouri State University...set the school's single-season record with 119 strikeouts in 2012.

Jayce Tingler was born in and resides in Smithville, Mo...Played college baseball at the University of Missouri, where he was All-Big 12 Conference in 2003 as a senior.

Trevor Rosenthal pitched parts of six seasons with St. Louis (2012-17) where he was a 2015 NL All-Star when he set the franchise single-season saves record (48)...ranks 5th all-time in franchise history with 121 saves...drafted by the Cardinals in the 21st round of the 2009 MLB Draft.

Luis Perdomo was originally signed by St. Louis as an International free agent (Nov. 20, 2010)...pitched five seasons in the Cardinals minor league organization (2011-15).

Padres Baseball Ops Advisor **Ian Kinsler** played his junior season (2003) at the Univ. of Missouri.

Padres Baseball Ops Advisor **Allen Craig** played parts of five seasons (2010-14) with St. Louis, where he was a 2013 NL All-Star and member of 2011 World Series Champion Cardinals.

Hall of Famer **Ozzie Smith** was selected by San Diego in the 4th round of the 1977 MLB Draft...played four seasons with San Diego (1978-81)...traded by San Diego with pitchers **Al Olmsted** and **Steve Mura** to St. Louis for pitcher **Luis DeLeon**, outfielder **Sixto Lezcano** and shortstop **Garry Templeton** (Dec. 10, 1981).

Cardinals Hall of Famer **Ray Lankford** played parts of two seasons for San Diego (2001-02)...traded by St. Louis with cash to the Padres for pitcher **Woody Williams** (August 2, 2001).

Father of Padres infielder, **Fernando Tatís Jr.**, **Fernando**, played three seasons with St. Louis (1998-2000)...is famously remembered for hitting two grand slams in one inning (April 23, 1999 at Los Angeles), both off of **Chan Ho Park**.

Padres Associate Manager **Skip Schumaker** played eight years in St. Louis (2005-12)...member of 2011 World Series Champion Cardinals...selected by St. Louis in the 5th round of the 2001 MLB Draft...traded by St. Louis to the Dodgers for infielder **Jake Lemmerman** (Dec 12, 2012).

Padres Bullpen Catcher/Coaching Asst. **Peter Summerville's** younger brother, **Andrew**, was selected by St. Louis in the 12th round of the 2017 MLB draft...pitched two minor league seasons in the Cardinals organizations.

Joey Lucchesi pitched two seasons at Southeast Missouri State (2015-16).

Cardinals Hall of Famer and broadcaster **Jim Edmonds** played part of the 2008 season for San Diego (26 games)...traded by St. Louis to San Diego for **David Freese** (Dec. 14, 2007).

Cardinals Hall of Famer **Mark McGwire** was the Padres bench coach for three seasons (2016-18).

Padres broadcaster **Carlos Hernandez** appeared in 17 games for St. Louis in 2000...became a Cardinal via trade with the Padres (July 31, 2000), packaged with infielder **Nate Tebbbs** for pitcher **Heathcliff Slocumb** and current Memphis (AAA) manager **Ben Johnson**, who played parts of two seasons in San Diego (2005-06).

R.I.P. BASE BURGLER: The Cardinals and all of base-ball were saddened to learn of the passing of Hall-of-Famer **Lou Brock** on Sunday, Sept. 6 at age 81...the team is currently wearing a uniform patch in Lou’s memory that displays his retired number 20 and his iconic signature.

CARDINALS & PADRES: The Cardinals are facing the Padres for the first time since 2019, when they went 2-4 (1-2 at PETCO Park) against the Padres, last meeting on 6/30/19 in San Diego (5-3 win). St. Louis leads its all-time series against the Friars, 288-202, including a 126-118 mark in San Diego and a 25-26 mark at PETCO Park. **POSTSEASON:** The Cardinals are 9-1 (4-0 at San Diego) in postseason games against the Padres; sweeping both the 1996 & 2005 Division Series along with a 3-1 series win in the 2006 NLDS.

BEST OF THREE: The 2020 Wild Card, and its best-of-three format, will not be a first for the Cardinals...they squared off with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1946 in a best-of-three series after both teams had finished the season tied at 96–58....that first-ever tie-breaker series decided the winner of the NL pennant...the Cardinals won the series, sweeping it in two games, before going on to win the 1946 World Series over Boston.

GAME ONE’S: In Cardinals’ postseason history, St. Louis has an overall record of 21-23 in Game 1 action...since 1987, in postseason series that involved St. Louis, the winner of Game 1 has gone on to win 24 of the 31 series.

FALL BALL: The Cardinals are 2nd only to the New York Yankees in all-time postseason games played (406-256) and postseason wins (237-133).

WINNING WAYS: The Cardinals posted their 13th consecutive winning season in 2020, their 20th in the last 21 seasons, and the 80th in franchise history. They had a franchise-record 15 consecutive winning seasons from 1939-53. The Cardinals & Yankees are the only teams to have winning seasons each of the past 13 years.

THE SHILDT SHOW: Last year, **Mike Shildt**, in his first full season at the helm of the Cardinals, became the third manager to guide the Cardinals to an NL Central title, joining Tony La Russa and Mike Matheny. Shildt joined Pants Rowland (1917- Chicago White Sox) and Ed Barrow (1918 - Boston Red Sox) as the only managers who never played professionally, to take their teams to the postseason...since Shildt took over as interim manager on July 15, 2018, the Cardinals are 162-127 (.561)...he was voted BBWAA N.L. Manager of the Year in 2019, as the Cardinals went 3-6 in the postseason, winning the NLDS 3-2 over Atlanta before being swept in the NLCS 4-0 by eventual World Series Champion Washington.

DIVISION MATH: The Cardinals were 22-18 vs. the NL Central (tied with Cubs for best mark) & 8-10 vs. the American League Central...they went 5-5 vs. both CHI & MIL & 6-4 vs. both CIN & PIT.

20-20 VISION: The Cardinals were a combined 20-20 against 2020 postseason teams: (5-5) vs. CHI, (5-5) vs. MIL, (6-4) vs. CIN, (1-3) vs. MIN, (2-1) vs CWS, (1-2) vs. CLE.

WHAT’S THE DIFFERENCE? The Cardinals +11 run differential (240-229) ranked 5th best in the National League.

HIGHS & LOWS: The Cardinals were a season-best 2 games over .500 (10) times and a season low 2 games under .500 twice...the Cardinals were an even .500 (17) times, 1 game over .500 (17) times and one game under .500 (12) times...they alternated wins and losses in their final 9 games of the season for the first time in team history...their longest winning and losing streak were both (4) games in length.

THIS DEFENSE NEVER RESTS: The Cardinals led MLB in Defensive Runs Saved (33) with the Dodgers and Indians (29) the next closest...they were led by **Tyler O’Neill** 9 DRS (#1 LF in MLB and T-7th most of any player in MLB) and **Kolten Wong** 7 DRS (#2 2B in MLB)...O’Neill, **Tommy Edman** and Harrison Bader coled the team with 4 Outs Above Average (Statcast)...the Redbirds allowed MLB-fewest 8 stolen bases this season (next closest were the White Sox with 16)...the Cardinals ended the season with a season-best 6-game errorless streak.

I’LL RACE YOU: The Cardinals had three players in MLB’s top-30 in Sprint Speed (feet/second) according to Statcast with **Tyler O’Neill** (7th, 29.6), **Harrison Bader** (11th, 29.4) and **Tommy Edman** (28th, 28.9) leading the way. Tampa Bay was the only other team with a trio of players in the top 30 (16th-Kevin Kiermaier, 21st-Randy Arozarena, 30th-Brett Phillips).

HOME RUN TROTS: **Tyler O’Neill’s** average HR trot speed (20.8 seconds) was the fastest among Cardinals with multiple homers & **Yadier Molina** enjoyed his trips around the bases the longest (26.7).

FLY YOUR FLAG: The Cardinals used players from 10 different nations/territories: United States, Dominican Republic, Puerto Rico, Canada, Cuba, Mexico, Venezuela, Colombia, South Korea and Panama.

“KK’s” JOURNEY: RHP **Kwang Hyun Kim** will become only the 5th South Korean pitcher to appear in MLB postseason play, joining Chan-ho Park, Byung-hyum Kim, Hyun-Jin Ryu and Seunghwan Oh. Kim, who gained a save as the Cardinals closer on Opening Day in July, joined the rotation on Aug. 17 and led all MLB rookie starters in ERA (1.42), going 3-0 in his seven starts...is first ever pitcher to earn a save in MLB debut and also start Game 1 of a postseason series (*Elias*).

POSTSEASON PROVEN: Gold Glove catcher **Yadier Molina** enters this postseason with a Cardinals record 98 career games played in the postseason, ranking 7th all-time behind only Derek Jeter (157), Jorge Posada (119), Bernie Williams (118), David Justice (112), Ramirez (111)and Tino Martinez (99)...Yadi, who collected his 2,000th career hit on Sept. 24, leads the Cardinals with his 95 career postseason hits. Those 95 postseason hits rank 2nd all-time among catchers in MLB to Jorge Posada (103)...his 34 career postseason RBI rank 3rd all-time among MLB catchers, trailing Posada (42) and Yogi Berra (39)...**Adam Wainwright**, 3rd all-time in career wins (167) among Cardinals, owns the Cardinals career marks for post-season games (27) & strikeouts (115) and he’s 2nd in innings pitched (105.2) to Chris Carpenter (108.0)...Wainwright (4 wins, 4 saves, 14 starts) and Hall of Famer John Smoltz (15 wins, 4 saves, 27 starts) are the only pitchers in MLB postseason history to have 4 or more wins and 4 or more saves while also making 10 or more starts.

WE’RE BACK: Molina & Wainwright return 14 years later to the city and ballpark where the Cardinals began their 2006 run to a World Series title...Wainwright was 0-0 with a 0.00 ERA in three games as a reliever vs. the Padres in the 2006 NLDS, gaining a save in Game 2 at PETCO Park...Molina caught all 4 games of that series, going 4-13 (.308) with an RBI.

POSTSEASON LETTERMEN: According to *Elias*, and based on team’s 28-man rosters when the 2020 season concluded Sunday, the Cardinals have a combined 343 games of postseason experience on their roster, 3rd among the 16 teams in this year’s tourney behind only LA (514) & HOU (403)...the Cardinals have 17 players on their active roster with prior postseason experience, including 8 pitchers.

HEY, IT’S 2020: The Cardinals had just one pinch-hit this season, an **Andrew Knizner** 2-run single...eight players served as Designated Hitter, with **Brad Miller** leading the way with his 32 games and 102 at-bats...his 7 HR’s were 3rd among National League DH’s (Ozuna, ATL-14, Winker, CIN-9).

FULL HOUSE: The Cadinals 1.117 OPS with the bases loaded ranked 3rd in MLB (Padres 1st, 1.296) and their 61 RBI with the bases jammed led the majors...the Cardinals hit two grand slams (DeJong & Carpenter).

NL WILD CARD GAME 1

- Makes his first career MLB postseason appearance today as he becomes only the 5th South Korean pitcher to appear in MLB postseason play, joining Chan-ho Park, Byung-hyum Kim, Hyun-Jin Ryu and Seunghwan Oh.
- Since saves became an official stat in 1969, Kim is the first pitcher in MLB history to earn a save in his debut and then later start a playoff game that same season (*Ben Fred*).
- Joins Hyun-Jin Ryu (8GS) as the only South Korean-born pitchers to make starts in MLB Postseason history.
- Is the first South Korean in history to make a start in a Wild Card game, and joins former Cardinal and then Rockies reliever Seunghwan Oh in the 2018 Wild Card game as the 2nd appearance.
- Is the first Cardinals rookie left-handed starter since Bud Smith in Game 4 of the 2001 National League Division series vs. Arizona (W, 5-2).
- Made three relief appearances at PETCO Park for South Korea in the 2009 World Baseball Classic.
- Four-time Korean Baseball Organization (KBO) Series Champion with the SK Wyverns (2007-08, 2010, 2018).
- The Padres won the rights to negotiate with Kim under the previous blind-bid posting system in 2014, but the sides were unable to reach an agreement and Kim returned to the Korean Baseball Organization.

2020 SEASON

- Among National League pitchers with at least six starts, ranks 1st in ERA (1.62), 12th in WHIP (1.03), 11th in opp. AVG (.197), 8th in opp. OBP (.260) and 10th in opp. SLG (.324).
- Missed 12 games on the Injured List with a unspecified injury related to abdominal pain.
- Has held his opposition to three hits or less in five of seven starts this season.
- His 0.33 ERA through his first five major league starts was second best among left-handed pitchers since ERA became an official statistic in 1913 (Fernando Valenzuela, 0.20) (courtesy of Elias).
- One of only three pitchers in MLB history to have a stretch of four consecutive starts allowing no earned runs and three or fewer hits in at least five innings of work since runs became an official stat in 1912 (Jake Arrieta (CHI 2015-16) & Michael Fulmer (DET 2016), 4 each) (courtesy of Elias).
- Recorded a save in his Major League debut vs. Pirates on Opening Day (7/24)

2019 SEASON

- Named the Korea Baseball Organization “Best Pitcher” (equivalent to MLB’s Cy Young Award) with the SK Wyverns posting a 17-6 record with a 2.51 ERA in 30 starts (31 app.) and 180 strikeouts over 190.1 innings pitched.
- Led the KBO in quality starts (24) while ranking 2nd in wins (17); and 3rd in ERA (2.51) and innings pitched (190.1).
- Struck out a season-high 10 batters (5.0 IP) vs. Hanwha (5/9) and a season-high 8.0 innings vs. Kiwoom (8/8).
- Was 13-1 with a 2.30 ERA in 16 road appearances during the 2019 KBO season with SK Wyverns. Earned 13 of his 17 wins last season on the road.

CAREER

- Made his debut in 2007 as an 18-year old rookie with the SK Wyverns of the Korea Baseball Organization and was 3-7 with a 3.62 in 20 appearances (13 starts).

- Marks the 27th career postseason appearance (15th start) of his postseason career. Ranks 1st all-time in Cardinals postseason history in strikeouts (115), appearances, and trails only Chris Carpenter (18) in starts.
- Makes his first career Wild Card appearance today. At age 39.031, is oldest pitcher in MLB postseason history to start a Wild Card game. Previous oldest was Washington's Max Scherzer (35.066) in the 2019 Wild Card.
- Also is the 6th-oldest pitcher to make a postseason start in Cardinals history. The last Cardinal older than Wainwright to start a postseason game was Chuck Finley (39.320) in the 2002 NLCS vs. San Francisco.

- Will turn age 25 on October 15 (born approximately 130 miles from PETCO Park in Burbank, California).
- His second career Major League start came against the Padres on 9/6/17 in 3-1 Cardinals win at PETCO Park.

POSTSEASON CAREER

- Is lifetime 1-2 with a 4.24 ERA (17.0 IP) in three career postseason starts (all in 2019).
- The last pitcher age 23 or younger to make multiple postseason starts was RHP Luis Severino (4 GS - 2017 Yankees). The last Cardinal was RHP Michael Wacha (5 GS - 2013).
- Was 1-1 with a 2.77 ERA in two starts during the 2019 NLDS against Atlanta, striking out a Cardinals Division Series record 16 batters.
- The last Cardinal age 23 or younger to start a postseason elimination game was RHP Michael Wacha in 2013 World Series Game 6 at Boston (10/30). Wacha also made start in NLDS Game 4 at Pittsburgh (10/7/13) with 1 run over 7.1 innings in a win.
- Joined Matt Morris (2-1 loss at Arizona in 2001), Chris Carpenter (1-0 CG win at Philadelphia in 2011), and Adam Wainwright (9-7 win at Washington in 2012 and 6-1 CG win vs. Pittsburgh in 2013) as the 5th Cardinal to start an NLDS Game 5.
- Earned the win in the 2019 Division Series deciding Game 5, pitching 6.0 innings allowing one run on a solo home run and matched his postseason high with eight strikeouts. Was the first Cardinal to start an elimination game aged 23 or younger since Michael Wacha (Game 6 of 2013 World Series) at 21-years old.
- Drew a bases loaded walk in the 2019 Division Series deciding Game 5, the first Cardinals pitcher to do so since Bob Gibson in Game 4 of the 1968 World Series.
- Became the 6th pitcher in MLB postseason history and first Cardinal age 23 or younger to make two starts in a division series, joining RHP Jaret Wright (1997 Indians), LHP Fernando Valenzuela (1981 Dodgers), RHP Jarrod Parker (2012 A's), RHP Sonny Gray (2013 A's), and RHP Gerrit Cole (2013 Pirates).
- Made his postseason debut in 2019 NLDS Game 2 at SunTrust, becoming the youngest Cardinals starting pitcher to make his postseason debut since Shelby Miller (23.362) in Game 4 of the 2014 NLDS vs. Los Angeles.
- Threw 117 pitches over 7.0 innings in 2019 NLDS Game 2, most by a Cardinal in his post-season debut since Woody Williams threw 133 pitches in 7.0 innings of one-run ball in Game 2 of the 2001 NLDS at Arizona.

2020 SEASON

- Had a streak of 22 consecutive regular season starts holding his opposition to three runs or less snapped at MIL (9/15), when he surrendered a career-high nine runs. The 22-game streak was the longest in Cardinals history out-distancing Bob Gibson (19) in 1968 and Lance Lynn (19) in 2014. It came up nine games short of the MLB record by a non-opener held by the Mets' Jacob deGrom (31).
- Has held his opposition to three runs or less in eight of his nine starts.
- Threw a career high 43 pitches in the 1st inning at CHI (9/4), the most by a Cardinals pitcher in the 1st inning this season and the most since Daniel Ponce de Leon hurled 41 vs. CLE (8/28).
- The Cardinals are 5-4 in his starts this season with three losses coming when he received zero runs of support.
- Pushed his mark to 9-1 with a 0.99 ERA in 14 career starts in August, making him the MLB leader in August ERA and opponent BA (.139) since the Live Ball Era (1920).

CAREER

- In 75 career starts, is 23-7 when receiving 2 runs of support or more, and 18-1 when receiving 3 runs or more.
- Has the 4th-lowest day game ERA (2.48) among active pitchers with 20 or more starts, trailing only (Jacob deGrom 1.82, Mike Clevenger 2.21 & Clayton Kershaw 2.36).
- At age 24.283, was the 16th youngest Cardinal to make an Opening Day start (since 1904) and youngest since Joe Magrane (Age 24.275) on April 3, 1989 vs. the NY Mets.
- Has struck out 482 batters over his first 76 career games, the most ever by a Cardinal and 12th-most in National League history (since 1908).
- Recorded five double-digit strikeouts games in 2019 and has nine for his career. His eight games with 10+ strikeouts in his first 67 career games are a Cardinals record.
- Is the third Cardinal in franchise history to strike out 180 or more in two of his first three career seasons (2018-19), joining Dizzy Dean (1932-33), and Lance Lynn (2012-13).
- Struck out 231 in 2019 (6th in NL), becoming the 8th different Cardinal (19th instance) and youngest in franchise history to strike out 200 or more in a season.
- Two-time 2019 National League Pitcher of the Month award winner (August and September). Became the first NL pitcher to win the award in back-to-back months since Max Scherzer (April & May 2018) and first Cardinal to win twice in a single season since the award was first given out in 1975.
- Struck out 231, walked 55 and recorded a 2.75 ERA in 2019. Since 1885, became only the third pitcher younger than 24-years-old to record a season of at least 230 strikeouts, while permitting 55-or-fewer walks to go along with an ERA of 2.75-or-better, joining Clayton Kershaw (2011) and Mark Prior (2003).
