EMBRACE THE CHAOS: The D-backs are in the Postseason for the seventh time in franchise history: 1999, 2001, 2002, 2007, 2011, 2017 and **2023**.

- ♦ It is the D-backs' first National League Championship Series appearance since 2007 (Oct 11-15) when they faced the Rockies and third in club history (also: 2001 vs. Braves).
- ♦ It marks the latest the D-backs have played into a calendar year since their 2001 World Series run.
- ♦ It is the first series the D-backs are facing off with the Phillies in the Postseason and first time since 1995 in which there are 2 Postseason matchups that had never occurred previously.
- ♦ In 47 Postseason games as a franchise, the D-backs are 23-24 (.489), 14-8 @ home, 9-16 on the road.

MARTE CONTINUES: Ketel Marte has hit safely in each of his 11 career Postseason games (.362/.681 SLG; 17-47 AB, 7 XBH) to become the first D-backs' player in franchise history to do so (9th in MLB history).

- ♦ Marte joins Orlando Arcia/MIL, Roberto Alomar/TOR and Thurman Munson/NYY, who also met the feat.
- ♦ Only 5 others have had longer hit streaks to begin a Postseason career: Marquis Grissom (15), Greg Luzinski (13), Elvis Andrus (12), Nelson Cruz (12) and Darin Erstad (12).

MORENO JUST GETTING STARTED: At 23 years and 245 days, **Gabriel Moreno** became the youngest D-backs' catcher to record a caught stealing in a Postseason (Oct. 17 @ Phillies, Bot 1, B. Harper CS 2B) and fifth overall D-backs' catcher to do so, joining Rod Barajas (2 – 2001-02), Damian Miller (2 – 2001-02), Chad Moeller (1 - 2002) and Chris Iannetta (1 - 2017).

FIRST TIME IT HAPPENED IN THE POSTSEASON: The D-backs shutout loss in Game 2 of the NLCS marked the first time in franchise history they were shut out in the Postseason, after 46 consecutive games...the 46-game streak without being blanked was the second-longest active streak in the Majors, behind Minnesota's current 67-game streak.

SNAKES IN THE POSTSEASON: Entering today, the D-backs' 14 home runs are tied for second most this Postseason (also: Astros), behind the Phillies (19) and second in stolen bases (7):

DINGER POST-SZN: The D-backs' 14 home runs are tied for sixth most by a team (also: 8 others) in its first 7 games of a Postseason, behind the 2020 Yankees (17), 2004 Astros (17), 2023 Phillies (16), 2021 Red Sox (16) and 2020 Athletics (15).

- ♦ The D-backs (**Corbin Carroll, Alek Thomas, Gabriel Moreno, Ketel Marte** and **Geraldo Perdomo**) and Phillies are the only Postseason teams this season to feature 5 players who have hit 2+ home runs.
- ♦ The D-backs and Rangers are the only teams to have 8 different players hit a home run this Postseason (also: **Tommy Pham, Lourdes Gurriel Jr.,** and **Christian Walker**)...the Phillies are behind with 7.

D-BACKS POSTSEASON HOMER STREAK HALTED: Arizona's Postseason homer streak ended at 17 consecutive Postseason games dating back to the 2007 NLCS Game 3 @ Rockies, which marked the second-longest streak in MLB Postseason history, behind the Yankees (23 games from 2019-22):

POWER OF YOUTH: The D-backs' 9 home runs hit by players age 23 or younger are tied for the second most in a single Postseason (also: 2017 Astros), behind the 2015 Cubs (11) [courtesy: Sarah Langs]...the D-backs' players age 23 or younger have collected 9 home runs in a 7-game span while the Cubs and Astros played an average of 13 games in their respective Postseason runs.

- ♦ With **Geraldo Perdomo, Corbin Carroll, Gabriel Moreno** and **Alek Thomas**, the D-backs are the third team in Postseason history with 4 players age 23 or younger with a home run in a single Postseason, joining: 2020 Braves (Riley, Pache, Albies, Acuña Jr) and 2015 Cubs (Bryant, Schwarber, Soler, Báez).
- ♦ **Corbin Carroll (age 23-047), Alek Thomas (age 23-162), Gabriel Moreno (23-235)** and **Geraldo Perdomo (23-354)** became the first, second, third and fourth-youngest D-backs players, respectively, in franchise history to hit multiple home runs in a Postseason.
- ♦ **Corbin Carroll** also became the third D-backs' rookie to hit multiple home runs in a Postseason run, joining Mark Reynolds (2007) and Paul Goldschmidt (2011).
- ♦ **Gabriel Moreno** is the first catcher at age 23 or younger to collect 3+ homers in a Postseason.

1-2 PUNCH: **Corbin Carroll** and **Ketel Marte**, during this Postseason, have combined to hit .327 (18-for-55)/1.003 OPS with 3 doubles, 4 homers, 8 RBI, 7 walks and 3 stolen bases.

STEADY BULLPEN: D-backs' relievers, in their last 31 games since Sept. 5, have a 2.38 ERA (34 ER in 128.1 IP) and .206 OPP AVG.

- ♦ Arizona features the only bullpen remaining to not allow a home run this Postseason.

NO CHASE ZONE: Entering today, **Geraldo Perdomo's** 16.3% chase rate is third among remaining players this Postseason (min. 40 out-of-zone pitches) while **Christian Walker's** 17.3% is fourth:

WORTHY OF GOLD: **Christian Walker** (1B), **Alek Thomas** (CF) and **Gabriel Moreno** (C) were announced as 2023 Rawlings Gold Glove Award finalists (Top 3 at each position).

- ♦ **Walker** looks to make it back-to-back Gold Gloves after he led all first basemen this season with +12 Outs Above Average.
- ♦ **Thomas** looks to secure his first career Gold Glove in his second season with Arizona.
- ♦ **Moreno** is seeking his first career Gold Glove after recording an MLB-best +9 caught stealings above average in his first full MLB season.
 - ❑ To determine the winners at the 9 standard positions, the 30 MLB managers and up to six coaches from each team vote from a pool of players in their league, excluding players from their own team...these votes comprise 75% of the selection total, with the SABR Defensive Index counting for the other 25%.

A LONGO TIME AGO: This Postseason, **Evan Longoria** appeared in his first Championship Series game since 2008 (with Tampa Bay)...he is the fourth player (and first non-pitcher) to appear in a LCS 15+ years after his prior appearance, joining Bartolo Colón/NYM in 2015 (17 years after his 1998 appearance with Cleveland), Chuck Finley/STL in 2002 (16 years after his 1986 appearance with the California Angels) and Dennis Martínez/CLE in 1995 (16 years after his 1979 appearance with Baltimore) (source: Sarah Langs/MLB).

- ♦ **Christian Walker** was born and raised in Norristown, Pa., approx. 25 miles northeast of Citizens Bank Park.
- ♦ **Torey Lovullo** finished his 8-year big-league career with the 1999 Phillies, skipped by Terry Francona.
- ♦ **Zac Gallen** grew up in Somerdale, N.J., roughly 10 miles east of Citizens Bank Park.

WALKER-HARPER HISTORY: **Christian Walker** won the 2009 International Power Showcase High School Home Run Derby at Tropicana Field in Tampa, Fla., beating 16-year-old Bryce Harper.
♦ Walker was a stand-out high school at Kennedy-Kenrick in Norristown, Pa., where he hit .588 his senior season, was named to 2009 Philadelphia Inquirer All-S.E. Pennsylvania team and was rated No. 1 best high school player in the state of Pennsylvania.

5 CONSECUTIVE POSTSEASON WINS TO START: Through the NLDS, Arizona boasted 5 consecutive Postseason wins, which tied for the most in franchise history (also: 5 straight from Oct. 19-28, 2001)...it was the first time in franchise history where they have won 5 straight games to begin a Postseason.
♦ The D-backs joined the Rangers as the only teams to each win 4+ straight road games this Postseason, which marked the second time where 2 teams have done it in the same Postseason, joining the Royals (5) and Giants (4) in 2014, who met in the World Series.

WITH THE GAME 3 VICTORY VS. DODGERS, THE D-BACKS:

- ♦ Earned their second National League Division Series sweep in franchise history (def. Cubs 3-0 in 2007 NLDS).
- ♦ Marked the first sweep of the Dodgers in any Postseason series since the 2006 NLDS vs. Mets (LAD with 118 Postseason games since then – most in MLB)
- ♦ Secured 3+ consecutive wins vs. Dodgers for the first time since Sept. 4-6, 2017 @ Dodgers during the regular season.

IN CLINCH SCENARIOS: The D-backs are 7-2 all-time in potential clinch situations, including being 4-0 in 4 clinch opportunities at home [**Oct. 11, 2023** vs. Dodgers (W, 4-2) in NLDS; **Oct. 4, 2017** vs. Rockies (W, 11-8) in Wild Card to advance to NLDS; **Nov. 4, 2001** vs. Yankees (Game 7 - W, 3-2) to win World Series; **Oct. 14, 2001** vs. Cardinals (W, 2-1) to advance to NLCS].

NLDS NOTES

NLDS GAME 1 RECAP: The D-backs swept the Dodgers 3-0 in the National League Division Series to clinch their first NLCS berth since 2007.

- ♦ **IN GAME 1**, the D-backs earned the 11-2 victory @ Dodgers, marking their first NLDS win since Oct. 5, 2011 vs. Brewers (Game 4) and first NLDS road win since Oct. 6, 2007 @ Cubs (Game 3).
 - ❑ The D-backs tied their franchise record (third time) for home runs in a Postseason game with 4 (also: Oct. 6, 2017 @ Dodgers and Oct. 5, 2011 vs. Brewers): **Gabriel Moreno, Corbin Carroll, Alek Thomas** and **Tommy Pham**.
 - ❑ The D-backs’ 11 runs tied for the second most (third time) in a Postseason game in franchise history (also: Oct. 4, 2017 vs. Rockies and Oct. 20, 2001 @ Braves), behind the team-record 15 runs in Game 6 of the 2001 World Series on Nov. 3, 2001.
 - ❑ The D-backs’ 13 hits tied for the third most (second time) in a Postseason game in franchise history (also: Oct. 5, 2011 vs. Brewers), behind their 22 hits on Nov. 3, 2001 vs. Yankees and 17 on Oct. 4, 2017 vs. Rockies.
 - ❑ **Tommy Pham’s** 4 hits in tied the franchise record (third time) for hits in a Postseason game (also: Reggie Sanders vs. Yankees in the 2001 World Series – Game 6 on Nov. 3, 2001 and Jake Lamb vs. Rockies in the 2017 Wild Card Game on Oct. 4, 2017)...he also became the ninth D-backs player to reach base 4-or-more times in a Postseason game (last: **Corbin Carroll** and **Christian Walker** in Game 1 of NLWC @ Brewers).
- ♦ **The D-backs’ 6 runs in the first inning** marked a franchise high in the Postseason (previous: 5 on Oct. 5, 2011 vs. Brewers)...Arizona tied a franchise record for most consecutive hits in a Postseason game with 5 in the first inning (also: Game 6 of the 2001 World Series in the third inning) [courtesy: Elias Sports Bureau]...the 5 hits were by Ketel Marte (2B), Corbin Carroll (1B), Tommy Pham (1B), Christian Walker (RBI), Gabriel Moreno (HR).
 - ❑ It was the first time in Postseason history in which the first 5 batters for 1 team reached base and then scored in the first inning [courtesy: Elias Sports Bureau]...it was the first time to have each of the first 5 batters record a hit in a Postseason game since the 1972 Reds [Pete Rose, Joe Morgan, Bobby Tolan, Johnny Bench, Tony Perez].
 - ❑ The D-backs’ 5 runs tied the 1999 Braves in NLCS (Game 6) for most before recording an out in Postseason history (source: Sarah Langs).
 - ❑ It was the third time the D-backs scored 6+ runs in an inning @ Dodgers (also: 7 runs on March 31, 2019 @ Dodgers in Top 4 and 7 on July 29, 2016 @ Dodgers in Top 7).
 - ❑ The 6 runs scored in an inning were the second-most in a D-backs Postseason game behind the 8 runs in the bottom of the third inning vs. Yankees in Game 6 of the 2001 World Series on Nov. 3, 2001.
 - ❑ The 6 first-inning runs were the most vs. Clayton Kershaw in the first inning in any career start (previous high: Aug. 28, 2008 @ Nationals)...the most runs Kershaw ever allowed in any inning was 7 runs (last: 2nd inning @ Arizona on May 17, 2014).

- ♦ The D-backs became the 16th team to win Game 1 of a Postseason series by 9+ runs.
- ♦ At 38 years old, **Evan Longoria** became the oldest player in Postseason history with a hit on his birthday (Oct. 7).
- ♦ With **Corbin Carroll** and **Gabriel Moreno** homering in Game 1 of the NLDS @ Dodgers, the D-backs became the second team in Postseason history with multiple games featuring homers from multiple players age 23 or younger, joining the 2015 Cubs (3 such games).

NLDS GAME 2 RECAP: The D-backs earned the 4-2 victory @ Dodgers, marking the first time in franchise history where they won consecutive NLDS games on the road and first time with 2+ consecutive wins in an NLDS since Oct. 4-5, 2011 vs. Brewers.

- ♦ With their 3 runs in the first inning, the D-backs became the third team in baseball to score 3+ first inning runs in each of their first 2 games of a Postseason series, joining the 2002 ALDS A’s and 2000 NLDS Cardinals...only 1 team has done it in any 3 games of a Postseason series - 1993 WS Blue Jays.

- ♦ **Corbin Carroll** reached base safely 12 times in his first 4 career Postseason games, tying for the most by a rookie in his first 4 career Postseason games with Evan Carter/TEX...it tied for the third most in a player’s first 4 career Postseason games, behind only Edgar Martinez (15) and Frank Thomas (14).
- ♦ **Corbin Carroll** also became the first D-backs player to walk 3 times in a Postseason game...others in the Majors: 2017 ALDS G2 Aaron Judge, 2012 NLDS G4 Pete Kozma, 2008 ALCS G4 Jed Lowrie, 1995 NLCS G4 Chipper Jones.

NLDS GAME 3 RECAP: The D-backs slugged their way to a 4-2 clinching victory vs. Dodgers and became the first team in MLB Postseason history to hit 4+ homers in a single inning (4 in Bot 3).
♦ **Brandon Pfaadt**, at age 24-361, became the youngest pitcher to start a home Postseason game for the D-backs in franchise history (previous: Josh Collmenter [25-239] vs. Brewers on Oct. 4, 2011 in NLDS Game 3).

- ♦ The D-backs outhomered the Dodgers by 8 in the series, the highest home run difference in a Best-of-5 series in Postseason history and tied for 3rd-highest in any Postseason series behind only: 2021 World Series, Atlanta Braves +9 vs. Houston Astros and 1956 World Series, New York Yankees +9 vs. Brooklyn Dodgers.

COURTESY @OptaSTATS: **Corbin Carroll**, in his first 4 Postseason games, collected 7 hits, 6 runs, 5 walks, 4 RBI, 4 team wins, 3 extra-base hits and 2 homers...only 1 other player in MLB history had reached all of those numbers over any 4-game span in the Postseason: Lou Gehrig (1928-32).

NEVER A DOUBT: The D-backs, who finished with 16 fewer regular-season wins than the Dodgers, became the sixth team to win a Postseason series against an opponent with 16+ regular-season wins ahead [others: 1906 WS CHW (-23) def CHC, 2022 NLDS SD (-22) def LAD, 2001 ALCS NYY (-21) def SEA, 2021 NLCS ATL (-18) def LAD, 1973 NLCS NYM (-17) def CIN].

CORBIN ALWAYS IMPRESSING: **Corbin Carroll** became the first MLB player – rookie or otherwise – to record 6+ hits and 2+ homers in his first 3 career Postseason games since Stephen Drew/AZ in 2007.

ALEK'S 14-PITCH BATTLE: The 14-pitch at-bat by **Alek Thomas** in the top of the seventh in Game 1 of the NLDS on Oct. 7 marked the most pitches in a plate appearance ending in a home run in the Postseason since pitch counts have been tracked (begun in 1988) [source: Sarah Langs].

MIGHTY MERRILL: With his 6.1 scoreless innings in Game 1 of the NLDS on Oct. 7, **Merrill Kelly** became the fourth D-backs starting pitcher (fifth time) to not allow a run in a Postseason start (also: 2001, 4x - Miguel Batista on Nov. 1 @ Yankees in WS, Randy Johnson on Oct. 16 vs. Braves in NLCS and on Oct. 28 vs. Yankees in WS, Curt Schilling on Oct. 9 vs. Cardinals in NLDS).

WILD CARD NOTES

WILD CARD SERIES RECAP: The D-backs swept the Brewers 2-0 in the 2023 NL Wild Card Series to clinch their first NLDS berth since 2017...it was the first time Arizona won consecutive Postseason games since Oct. 4-5, 2011 vs. Brewers.

- ◆ **In Game 1**, the D-backs came back from a 3-run deficit, highlighted by a trio of homers (**Corbin Carroll**, **Ketel Marte**, **Gabriel Moreno**) and used a franchise Postseason-high 7 pitchers, including 6 relievers who combined for 6.1 scoreless frames, to lead to a 6-3 victory.
 - ❑ **Corbin Carroll** and **Ketel Marte** hit back-to-back home runs in the third inning to become the third pair of D-backs to go back-to-back in a Postseason game (last: Oct. 6, 2017 @ Dodgers - Ketel Marte and Jeff Mathis).
 - ❑ **Corbin Carroll** (2 hits and 2 walks), and **Christian Walker** (3 hits and 1 walk), became the seventh and eighth D-backs, respectively, to reach base 4-or-more times in a Postseason game.
 - ❑ **Corbin Carroll** and **Gabriel Moreno** marked the seventh instance in Postseason history where a team had homers from multiple players aged 23 or younger in a game and was the first time where the players made their Postseason debuts (courtesy: @Slangsonsports).
 - ❑ **Gabriel Moreno** became the second-youngest catcher to homer in his Postseason debut, older than only Brian McCann/21-228 d (2005 NLDS-Game 2) (courtesy: @Slangsonsports).
 - ❑ **Brandon Pfaadt** became the second-youngest D-backs pitcher to start a Postseason game, behind Daniel Hudson, 24, on Oct. 2, 2011 @ Brewers, and the third rookie to start a Postseason game, along with Hudson and Josh Collmenter (Oct. 4, 2011 vs. Brewers).
- ◆ **In Game 2**, the D-backs overcame a 2-run deficit after plating 1 run in the fifth and 4 in the sixth...**Alek Thomas** kickstarted the offense with a solo home run followed by a 4-hit, 4-run sixth inning.

POSTSEASON ANSWER-BACKS: The D-backs became the fourth team in Postseason history to have multi-run comeback wins in each of their first 2 games of the Postseason, joining the 1956 Dodgers, 2008 Rays and 2009 Yankees...**Evan Longoria** was a part of 2 of the teams (2008 Rays and 2023 Diamondbacks).

- ◆ In game 1 @ Brewers, the D-backs collected their first-ever Postseason win after trailing 3+ runs in a game...prior to the game, the D-backs were 0-14 in Postseason games when trailing 3+ runs.
- ◆ In game 2 @ Brewers, the D-backs overcame a 2-run deficit after plating 1 run in the fifth and 4 in the sixth.

PARADE OF ARMS: In Game 1 of the NL WC @ Brewers, the D-backs' 7 pitchers used marked the most used in a Postseason game in franchise history (previous: 6, 5x - last on Oct. 4, 2017 vs. Rockies in NL Wild Card).

- ◆ It was also the first time in franchise history where D-backs' relievers combined for 6.0+ scoreless innings in a Postseason game.

CARROLL NAMED HANK AARON AWARD FINALIST: **Corbin Carroll** was announced by MLB as a 2023 Hank Aaron Award Finalist, an honor that recognizes the most outstanding regular season offensive performer in each League...the only D-back to win the award was Paul Goldschmidt (2013).

- ◆ A committee of MLB.com journalists reviewed the top offensive statistics, accomplishments, and performances of the regular season to determine the 9 finalists for each league.

THE VETS: **Ketel Marte** and **Christian Walker**, in their seventh seasons as D-backs, are the club's longest-tenured active players, 2 of 16 players with 7-plus years as D-backs and the lone remaining members from the 2017 playoff team.

TOP 5: The D-backs' 7 Postseason appearances in 26 seasons (26.9 pct.) is the fifth-best Postseason appearance in baseball history, trailing the Yankees (48.7; 58-for-119), Rays (34.6; 9-for-26), Dodgers (31.1; 37-119) and Astros (27.9; 17-for-61) and slightly ahead of the Cardinals (26.9; 32-for-119) (1903-2023, excluding 1904 & 1994) [source: Elias Sports Bureau].

CY YOUNG CANDIDATES: **Zac Gallen** and **Merrill Kelly** made strong cases in the regular season for NL Cy Young consideration:

- ◆ **Zac Gallen** ranked second with 17 wins, 34 starts and 210.0 innings, third with 220 strikeouts, sixth with a .654 winning pct. and 1.12 WHIP, seventh with a 3.47 ERA, tied for ninth with a .238 OPP AVG.
- ◆ **Merrill Kelly** ranked fifth with a 3.29 ERA, sixth with a .222 OPP AVG, ninth with a .600 winning pct., 10th with a 1.19 WHIP.
