METSCELLANEOUS: The Mets enjoyed a day off on Saturday...On Friday, the Mets defeated the Dodgers, 12-6, in Game 5 of the NLCS at Citi Field...The Mets are down 3-1 to the Dodgers in the NLCS...New York defeated the Phillies, three-games-to-one in the NLDS...The Mets defeated the Brewers, two-games-to-one in the National League Wild Card Series.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY! Keith Hernandez celebrates his birthday today...We wish him well...Hernandez's number 17 was retired by the Mets on July 9, 2022...He is fourth in club history in batting average (.297) and in on-base percentage (.387)...The 11-time Gold Glove winner and holds the record for most Gold Gloves won by a first baseman and is a member of the Rawlings Gold Glove Hall of Fame...The five-time All-Star was inducted into the Mets Hall of Fame in 1997.

KEEP THE CAR RUNNING: New York's 12 runs in Game 5 of the NLCS were tied for the second-most in a Postseason game by the Mets along with their 12 runs in Game 4 of the 2006 NLCS at St. Louis...The team set a franchise record with 13 runs in Game 3 of the 2015 NLDS, also against the Dodgers.

STRIKE THAT: In Game 5 of the NLCS, the Mets became the first team to not strike out in a Postseason game since the Angels in Game 2 of the 2002 World Series...Overall, it was the 11th such postseason instance overall and the 3rd in the expansion era (1961)... Courtesy of Sarah Langs.

FIVE FOR FIGHTING: Game 5 of the NLCS marked the fourth time this Postseason that the Mets scored at least five runs in an inning, following a five-run fifth inning in Game 1 of the Wild Card Series against Milwaukee; a five-run eighth inning in Game 1 of the NLDS at Philadelphia; and a five-run second inning in Game 2 of the NLCS against Los Angeles...Per Elias, the Mets are the fifth team (sixth occurrence) with at least four five-run innings in a single Postseason and the first since the Rangers had five five-run innings en route to their World Series Championship last October.

EXTRA, EXTRA: Francisco Lindor and Jesse Winker each hit a triple in Game 5 of the NLCS, marking the first time in Mets Postseason history that New York had multiple triples a game...Along with his triple in Game 1 of the Wild Card Series against Milwaukee, Winker is the first Mets player with multiple triples in a single Postseason...Starling Marte finished Game 5 of the NLCS going 4-5 with three doubles, three RBI and a run scored...Marte is the sixth Mets player with four hits in a Postseason game, joining Daniel Murphy (G4 NLCS, 2015); Carlos Delgado (G1 NLDS, 2006); Kevin McReynolds (G6 NLCS, 1988); Lenny Dykstra (G3 WS, 1986); and Rusty Staub (G4 WS, 1973)...He is the first Mets player with three doubles in a Postseason game.

CHASING THE PENNANT: The Mets are playing in the NLCS for the ninth time in franchise history and the first time since 2015...The Mets are 28-20 (.583) all-time in the National League Championship Series.

EIGHT IS GREAT: According to Elias, the Mets are the eighth team to reach the League Championship Series after being 11+ games under .500, joining: 2019 Nationals, 2013 Dodgers, 2005 Astros, 1989 Blue Jays, 1984 Royals, 1974 Pirates and the 1973 Mets.

LA LA LAND: The Mets are facing the Dodgers for the fourth time in Postseason history...They faced off in the 2015 NLDS (3-2), the 2006 NLDS (3-2) and the 1988 ALDS (3-4)...Overall, the Mets are 11-9 against the Dodgers in the Postseason.

PICK SIX: The Mets are 4-2 in Game 6 of a Postseason Series...This includes a 2-0 record on the road and an 2-2 record at home...The Mets defeated the Dodgers 5-1 in Game 6 of the 1988 NLCS in Los Angeles.

DO OR DIE: The Mets are 11-8 in potential elimination games...This includes a 2-0 record this year, 3-3 record on the road, an 8-5 record in Flushing and a 2-3 record at Citi Field.

TO THE POST: The Mets are 59-45 all-time in Postseason play...The club's .567 winning percentage is the third-best in major league history...Only the Marlins (24-16, .600) and the Yankees (250-180, .581) have a better winning percentage...The Mets own the sixth-best ERA in Postseason history with 3.23 ERA.

TO RYNE OWNSELF BE TRUE: Ryne Stanek has appeared in 29 Postseason games...He is 4-0 with a 2.57 ERA (8 ER/28.0 IP) with eight walks and 29 strikeouts in the playoffs.

DODGERS-METS NOTES: The Mets are 6-4 all-time in the Postseason at Dodger stadium.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN: The Mets are 5-3 on the road during the 2024 Postseason...All-time, they are 26-24 on the road in the Postseason...New York finished the season going 43-38 away from Citi Field in 2024...The Mets surpassed their road win total of 2023 (32-49)...The Mets hit .254/.316/.416 on the road this year...They ranked seventh in the majors in AVG and SLG and were 10th in OBP.

IN THE CITY: The Mets are 8-8 during the Postseason at Citi Field...Overall, the Mets are 34-21 at home in the Postseason...Their .618 winning percentage at home is the second-best mark in the majors.

THE YOUNG AND THE RESTLESS: Mark Vientos is the third-youngest player (24 years, 300 days) with 10+ total bases in a playoff game, doing so in Game 2 of the NLDS... He was only older than Carlos Correa (21y, 20d) in Game 4 of the 2015 ALDS and Manny Ramirez (23y, 134d) in Game 2 of the 1995 ALCS...Vientos is now the third Mets player with three extra-base hits in a playoff game, joining Lucas Duda in Game 4 of the 2015 NLCS and Gary Carter in Game 4 of the 1986 World Series.

ON THE MARK: Through his first 12 career Postseason games, Mark Vientos is batting .333 (17-51) with four homers, 12 RBI, two doubles, two walks, seven runs, a .358 OBP and a .966 OPS...His seven multi-hit games are tied with Edgardo Alfonzo and Cleon Jones, for the most ever in a single Postseason in Mets' history...John Olerud (1999) and Todd Zeile (2000) each had six multi-hit games in the Postseason...Marty Barrett (1986), Troy Glaus (2002) and Marquis Grissom (1996) hold the single-Postseason record with nine multi-hit games each.

AIN'T IT GRAND: Mark Vientos connected for his first career grand slam in Game 2 of the NLCS at Dodger Stadium...He is the first player since Bryson Stott (2023 WC, G2) to hit a Postseason grand slam for his first career grand slam...Per Elias, he is one of 13 players to accomplish the feat including Jordan Luplow (10/8/2021); Ronald Acuña Jr. (10/7/2018); Paul Goldschmidt (10/4/2011); Shane Victorino (10/2/2008); Kazuo Matsui (10/4/2007); Mark Lewis (10/6/1995); Ron Gant (10/7/1992); José Canseco (10/15/1988); Mike Cuellar (10/3/1970); Chuck Hiller (10/8/1962); and Bobby Richardson (10/8/1960)... Francisco Lindor connected for his second career Postseason grand slam in Game 4 of the NLDS...He also cleared the bases on October 6, 2017 with Cleveland vs. New York-AL...His two Postseason grand slams are tied with Shane Victorino and Jim Thome for the most in MLB history.

SAVE ME: In Game 3 of the NL Wild Card Series, David Peterson became the first pitcher in franchise history to record his first career save in the Postseason...He became the 19th pitcher to have earned their first career save in the playoffs...Courtesy of Elias.

THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM: Game 2 of the NLCS marked the third time in Postseason history that a club hit a leadoff home run and a grand slam in the same game...Courtesy of Sarah Lands...New York is the first club to accomplish the feat since the Orioles in Game 1 of the 1996 ALDS...The first club to ever accomplish the feat is the Yankees, who did so in Game 5 of the 1953 World Series, also against the Dodgers.

BACK-TO-BACK: The Mets have hit back-to-back home runs twice in the Postseason... On October 21, 2015 in Game 4 of the NLCS, Lucas Duda and Travis d'Arnaud hit back-to-back home runs in the first inning...On October 9, 1988 in Game 4 of the NLCS, Darryl Strawberry and Kevin McReynolds went back-to-back in the fourth inning.

EVERYBODY HITS: In Game 2 of the NLCS, each player in the Mets starting lineup safely reached base, marking the second time this Postseason that every batter in New York's starting lineup reached base...They also did so in Game 2 of the Wild Card Series against Milwaukee...Overall it is the sixth time in Mets Postseason history that each batter in the starting lineup reached base safely after they also accomplished the feat on October 30, 2015 (G3 WS); October 15 2006 (G4 NLCS); October 11, 2000 (G1 NLCS); and October 17, 1973 (G4 WS).

ADDICTED TO THE PLAYOFFS: J.D. Martinez has appeared in 41 Postseason games, batting .285 (39-137) with 16 runs, five doubles, 10 home runs, 34 RBI, 24 walks, a .390 OBP and a .540 SLG.

CLOSING TIME: In Game 2 of the NLCS, Edwin Diaz became the sixth pitcher (10th occurrence) in Mets Postseason history to record a save of more than three outs...It was the first since Jeurys Familia did so in Game 1 of the 2015 NLCS (1.1IP)...Familia also did it in Game 5 of the 2015 NLDS (2.0 IP) and Game 1 of the 2015 NLDS (1.1IP)...There have been 13 players in franchise history to record a save in the Postseason...Jeurys Familia owns the franchise record with five Postseason saves...Armando Benitez, Tug McGraw and Billy Wagner are tied for second with three saves each...Diaz has recorded two Postseason saves with the Mets, tied for the fifth-most.

HAPPY TRAILS: According to Sarah Langs, the Mets entered this year 6-27 when trailing entering the eighth inning in franchise history in the postseason...After the Game 1 win in the NLDS, they are now 2-0 in such games this Postseason...The only teams with more such wins in a single Postseason are the 1996 Yankees (5 wins), the 1980 Phillies (4 wins), the 2015 Royals (3 wins) and the 1986 Mets (3 wins)...The Mets won Game 3 of the NLWCS and Game 1 of the NLDS after trailing entering the eighth inning...According to Elias, the Mets are the eighth team to win back-to-back Postseason games when trailing in the eighth inning or later in each, joining: the 2015 Royals, 2004 Red Sox, 2001 Yankees, 1999 Mets, 1996 Yankees, 1992 Blue Jays and the 1980 Phillies.

NOTHING EXTRA: The Mets scored six runs without recording an extra-base hit in their NLDS Game 1 win against the Phillies...It marks the second time in franchise history that the team scored six runs without an extra-base hit in a Postseason game...The only other coinurance was Game 6 of the 1986 World Series...Courtesy of Mathew Brownstein.

WILD OUT: The Mets previously made the Postseason as the Wild Card team in 1999, 2000, 2016 and in 2022...In 1999, New York defeated the Diamondbacks, 3-1, in National League Division Series and fell to the Atlanta Braves 4-2, in the League Championship Series...The 2000 Mets defeated the Giants, 3-1 in the NLDS and the Cardinals, 4-1 in the NLCS...The team fell to the Yankees 4-1 in the World Series...The 2016 Mets fell to the Giants, 1-0, in the one-game Wild Card Game...The Mets lost a best-of-three-game series to the San Diego Padres, dropping two games to one in 2022 at Citi Field.

DIVISION BELL: The Mets appeared in the Division Series for the first time since 2015... They defeated the Phillies, three-games-to-one...Overall, it was their ninth appearance in the series...The Mets are 15-5 all-time in the series...Their .750 winning percentage in the series is the best in the National League...That is tied with the Blue Jays (.750) for the best mark in the majors...This includes a 9-1 record at home in the Division Series.

IN A CLINCH: The Mets are 13-9 in clinching games, including 2-0 this year...New York has clinched a spot in the NLCS for the first time since 2015...The Mets clinched their first Postseason series at Citi Field after defeating the Phillies, 4-1, in Game 4 of the NLDS.

FOR PETE'S SAKE: In game three of the NL Wild Card Series, Pete Alonso hit the 10th go-ahead homer in the ninth inning or later in a winner-take-all game in Postseason history...It was the first ever with a team trailing.

MANAEA NEWS & NOTES

LAST TIME OUT: Picked up his second consecutive win in game two against the Dodgers...He went five innings and allowed two earned runs while striking out seven.

POSTSEASON: Has appeared in six postseason games and has started five of them... Is 2-3 with a 6.57 ERA (18 ER/24.2 IP) with nine walks and 26 strikeouts.

SEVENTH HEAVEN: : Manaea has completed at least 7.0 innings in nine of his 32 starts during the regular season... That is tied for the sixth-most in the National League... Manaea recorded back-to-back starts of 7.0 scoreless innings and 10 or more strikeouts on 7/30 against Minnesota and 8/5 at St.Louis...Manaea joins Tyler Glasnow and Spence Schwellenbach as the only pitchers in the majors this season with consecutive starts of 7.0 or more innings and double-digit strikeouts...Manaea is the only one of three to not allow a run in both of those starts...He is the first Mets pitcher to throw 7.0 or more innings and record 10 or more strikeouts in consecutive starts since Max Scherzer (4/19/22 (2) - 4/25/22)...The southpaw joins Dwight Gooden (Two Separate Occasions) and Tom Seaver (Three Separate Occasions) as the only pitchers in franchise history to post back-to-back starts of 7.0 or more scoreless innings and double-digit strikeouts... He is just the 10th left-handed pitcher in major league history with back-to-back starts of 7.0 or more scoreless innings and 10 or more strikeouts (Last: Chris Sale, 6/24/18-6/30/18).

WRITING A CHECK FOR 10K: The Mets had six games in which the starter has struck out 10 or more batters this year...Four of those performances were by Sean Manaea... Manaea is the just the seventh left-handed pitcher in franchise history with four or more double-digit strikeout games in a season joining Sid Fernandez (1985-1986, 1988, 1990 1992), Jerry Koosman (1968, 1976), Johan Santana (2008-2009) and Jon Matlack (1974)...His 11 strikeouts on July 30 vs. Minnesota were the most in a game by a Mets left-handed pitcher since Steven Matz's 11-strikeout performance on September 1, 2018 at San Francisco and were the most by a Mets southpaw at Citi Field since April 24, 2012 when Johan Santana struck out 11 Marlins hitters...In his last start, August 27 at Arizona, Manaea became the first Met since Jacob deGrom (9/30/22 at Atlanta) to record 11 strikeouts and not issue a walk.

SPECTACULAR STRETCH: Since the start of July, Manaea is second in the majors in quality starts (12), first in innings (105.1), sixth in strikeouts (108) and sixth in WHIP (0.93)... Since June 14, Manaea has allowed three or fewer runs 17 times, which is tied for most in the majors during that span with Chris Sale (17).

CAREER YEAR: Manaea recorded a career-high in innings pitched (181.2), tied a career-high in wins (12), and tied a career-high in starts (32). He also finished with the second-lowest ERA of his career (3.47)...His best came in 2019 when he only appeared in five games.

RIGHTY DOMINATION: Held right handed hitters to a .190 batting average, compared to his career average to right handed hitters being at .250. It was the lowest batting average he's held right handers to in his career (in a season where he appeared in more than five games).

WHAT A MIGHTY GOOD MANAEA: In his first career start with the Mets, April 1 vs. Detroit, Manaea did not allow a hit through his first 5.2 innings...It was the longest no-hit bid by a Mets pitcher in their team debut and the second-longest no-hit bid by a Mets pitcher in their first career start with team...Tracy Stallard threw 6.0 no-hit in his first career start with the Mets on June 2, 1963 vs. Pittsburgh after making 13 relief appearances to begin his career with New York...He joined Kenny Rogers (7/28/99) as the only Mets pitcher to allow one hit and throw 6.0 or more innings in their team debut... He recorded eight strikeouts, which tied Johan Santana (3/31/08) for the most punch outs by a Mets left-handed pitcher in their team debut and were tied for the seventh-most by any Mets pitcher in their team debut...Credit *Elias*.

SWEEPIN SAMOAN: At the end of May 2023, Manaea introduced a sweeper to his arsenal...Last season, the pitch generated a 35.1 percent whiff rate and kept batters to a .140 average and .163 slugging percentage...In 2024 the southpaw allowed just 26 hits in 135 plate appearances ending with the offering, for a .193 batting average with 61 strikeouts... His 44.9 K% with the pitch is the 20th best in the majors, while his 41.9 whiff% is the 12th-best mark in the majors this season (Min. 25 Plate Appearances).

SINK OR SWIM: Manaea has thrown his sinker 44.7% of the time, the highest usage rate of any of his six pitches in his arsenal...The southpaw has a run value of 15 with his sinker, which is the fifth-best mark in the majors. He also has 71 strikeouts via the sinker which is the highest mark in the majors.
