SEE YOU SOON!: The Mets will open their 2022 Spring Training Grapefruit League schedule on Saturday, February 26 against Miami in Jupiter, FL and will open their home schedule the following day, Sunday, February 27 against Houston at Clover Park in Port St. Lucie, FL...The team will open the 2022 regular season on Thursday, March 31 against the Washington Nationals at Citi Field...The opening homestand will continue Saturday and Sunday vs. the Nationals before the Atlanta Braves visit Citi Field, Monday, April 4-Tuesday, April 5.

FIRST OF ALL: The Mets were in first place from Saturday, May 8 until Saturday, August 8...It was a streak of 90 consecutive days in first place... This was their longest run atop the East in the last 14 seasons...The 2007 Mets (135 days in a row) were the last iteration of the club to be in first longer than 90 days in a row, per Elias...The Mets spent a total of 103 days in first place...New York became the first club in major league history to spend that many days in first place and end up with a losing record.

IN THE CITI: The Mets recorded a winning season at home for the second time in the last three years (also, 2019)...New York finished its home schedule with a 47-34 (.580) record, a 3.42 ERA, 251 walks and 767 strikeouts...The team's 47 home wins were tied for eighth in the majors and tied for fourth in the NL...The team's 3.42 ERA at home was the fifth-best in the majors and the fourth-best in the NL...The team's 767 strikeouts at home were the fourth-most in franchise history.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN: The Mets finished the year going 30-51 (.370) with a 4.39 ERA, 224 walks and 686 strikeouts on the road...The team's 30 wins were tied for 23rd in the majors...Outside of 2020, the team's 30 road wins were the fewest for the franchise since they went 29-52 in 2009...Despite this, the Mets' 686 road strikeouts were a franchise record, edging the 2019 Mets by one punchout.

HERE'S THE PITCH: The Mets pitching staff in 2021 ranked in the top 10 in the majors in several rate stats, including: ERA (3.90, ninth in MLB), strikeout percentage (25.1%, fifth in MLB), walk percentage (8.2%, ninth in MLB), strikeout-to-walk ratio (3.06, seventh in MLB), WHIP (1.23, seventh in MLB) and hits per 9 innings (7.97, 10th in MLB)...New York allowed two runs or fewer in 55 of their 162 games in 2021, just over one-third of their games, 10th-most in the majors...The team held their opponents to four runs or fewer 107 times, tied with the Rays for third in the majors, trailing only the Dodgers (111) and Giants (109).

HOW STRIKING: Despite throwing the fewest innings in the majors in 2021, the Mets ranked 12th in the majors and sixth in the NL with 1,453 strikeouts... No team in the last 14 seasons that has ranked last in the majors in IP has finished higher than 25th in the majors in strikeouts...The 2007 Tampa Bay Devil Rays (30th in IP, second in K) were the last club to rank last in IP and finish higher on the MLB strikeout leaderboard.

STRIKE THAT: Over the last five years, the Mets have struck out 6,367 batters...That ranks eighth in the majors and third in the NL...Only the Dodgers (6,749) and Brewers (6,503) have struck out more in the National League in that span.

THE PEN IS MIGHTIER: The Mets bullpen allowed one or zero runs in 93 of their 160 games this season...The only teams whose bullpens held opponents to one or no runs more frequently were the Giants (99 times) and Dodgers (94 times), who finished with the two best records in the majors, and the Mariners (94 times), whose 33 wins in one-run games led the majors (Mets were tied for second with 31 one-run wins in 2021)... Overall, the Mets bullpen posted a 3.90 ERA (258 earned runs/595.2 innings) with 245 walks and 658 strikeouts...Their 3.90 ERA ranked ninth in the majors and fifth in the NL...Their 658 strikeouts were a franchise record...The previous high was 592 by the 2017 team...Despite ranking 18th in the majors in innings from relievers, the Mets bullpen had the ninth-most strikeouts in the majors, thanks to a 25.8% strikeout rate that was the sixth-best in MLB.

LUIS ROJAS: The Mets went 77-85 in Luis Rojas' second season as Mets skipper after going 26-34 in 2020...Rojas combined to go 103-119 (.464) in his two years...New York announced on October 4 that they declined the option for 2022 for Rojas.

THE GAME OF RISP: The Mets hit .238/.324/.370 with runners in scoring position in 2021...The team's .238 average ranked 25th in the majors, while their .334 OBP was 18th and their .704 OPS was 26th...The team put up a .225/.316/.359 slash line with RISP following the All-Star break...The team's .225 average in that span was 29th in the majors.

WINNING!: The Mets went 44-32 with a 3.43 ERA against teams with a record below .500...They hit .245/.323/.416 against those teams...This compared to a 33-53 record with a 4.31 ERA and a .233/.308/.368 slash line against teams that were .500 or better.

LET'S GO STREAKING: The Mets won a season-high seven straight games from May 5-12...From August 28 to September 4, the Mets also won seven straight games, including the resumption of the April 11 suspended game on August 31.

DAY TRIPPER: The Mets finished with a 28-21 record with a 3.87 ERA (178 earned runs/414.0 innings) in day games...This included a 14-7 record with a 3.40 ERA (68 earned runs/180 innings) in day games at Citi Field in 2021... The team's .571 winning percentage during the daytime was ninth in the majors and sixth in the Senior Circuit.

REPLACE-METS: The Mets used 64 players in 2021...It is a franchise record for most players used in a season, surpassing the 56 used by the 2018 Mets...New York used 19 starting pitchers, tied for the most in the majors and the second most starters the team has used in a season in team history...The team used a franchise-record 20 in 1967...New York used 42 different pitchers this season, tied for the most any team has used in one year in MLB history.

DOUBLE BUBBLE: The Mets played 14 doubleheaders in the 2021 season... According to Elias, the last time a team played 14 or more doubleheaders in a season was in 1979, when the Mets played 19 doubleheaders and the Expos played 15...New York swept doubleheaders from Philadelphia on April 13, against the Rockies on May 27, vs. the Nationals on August 12 and vs. Miami on September 28, all at Citi Field...They split doubleheaders in Colorado on April 17, in St. Louis on May 5, in Washington on June 19, vs. Atlanta on June 21, vs. Philadelphia on June 25, at New York-AL on July 4, vs. Milwaukee on July 7, vs. Pittsburgh on July 10, vs. Atlanta on July 26 and at Washington on September 4...The Mets went 11-3 in the first game of a doubleheader and 6-8 in the second game.

ONE SINGULAR SENSATION: The Mets went 31-35 in one run games in 2021...The 66 one-run games were the most in franchise history for a single-season and the most in the majors since 1993, when the Royals played 70 games decided by one run...The 1969 and 1985 Mets both played 64 one-run games...The 31 one-run victories were tied for the second-most in the majors this year and the 35 losses by one-run were the most in the majors and tied for the fifth-most in team history...From August 25-September 11, the Mets dropped eight consecutive one-run games...That is a franchise record, surpassing a previous high of six consecutive one-run losses from June 9-19, 1998.

THEY'RE OUT OF OUR LEAGUE: The Mets went 9-11 in Interleague play... The team's .511 winning percentage (226-216) is the second-best mark in the Senior Circuit vs. AL clubs since Interleague play began in 1997.

THE EAST IS A BEAST: The Mets went 39-37 against the NL East this season...They posted a 3.58 ERA (255 earned runs/640.1 innings) and hit .243/.314/.400 against the division.

AUGUST: The Mets went 9-19 (.321) in the month of August...The .321 winning percentage was tied for the 10th-lowest in the month of August in team history...Included in that month was a stretch where the Mets went 2-11 vs. the Dodgers and Giants over a span of 13 consecutive games.

LET'S NOT GO STREAKING: From August 13-26, the Mets played 13 straight games against the Dodgers and Giants...According to Elias, they were the first team to play 13 straight games against teams with a .600 winning percentage or better at least 100 games into a season since the 1980 Blue Jays...Toronto when went 4-9 in that stretch.

WHO SAYS WINS IN RELIEF DON'T MATTER?: The Mets bullpen finished tied for fourth in the majors and second in the NL with 45 wins this season... No team in Mets history has earned more wins from the 'pen...The previous team record was 32 wins from relievers in 2006 and 2019...The Rays (2018, 2019, 2021) are the only club to ever have 50 or more wins from the bullpen in a season...Mets relievers went 45-28 (.616) overall...Jeurys Familia won nine games in relief, third-most in the NL and the most by a Met since 2000.

WALK IT OFF: The Mets recorded 11 walk-off victories in 2021...That was tied for fourth in the majors and third in the NL...Philadelphia, Oakland and Colorado led the majors with 12 walk-off victories apiece...The team's 11 walk-off wins are tied for the third-most in franchise history with the 2006 and 1963 teams...New York had more walk-off wins only twice: in 1971 (14) and in 1983 (12)...The Mets recorded two walk-off wins in 2020 and eight in 2019.

EXTRA SPECIAL: New York went 11-7 in extra-inning games in 2021...The 11 wins tied for third-most in the majors, tied for the fifth-most in franchise history and were the most since the Mets also had 11 victories in extra-innings in 2004.

THIS STREAK GOES TO 11: In 11 games from May 8 - June 12 and again from June 14-26, the Mets allowed three runs or fewer in each home game...That was the longest streak in the majors in 2021...The last time the Mets had a longer such stretch was when they went a franchise-record 14 home games allowing three runs or less from May 2-31, 1965.

WHAT AN ENTRANCE: The Mets welcomed fans back to Citi Field for the first time since 2019 on April 8 against Miami with a 3-2, walk-off victory over the Marlins...Michael Conforto was hit by a pitch with the bases loaded to give the Mets the victory...It was the third walk-off HBP in franchise history...The last time the Mets won a game in walk-off fashion with a hit-by-pitch was June 22, 2011 when Justin Turner was hit by Brad Ziegler in the 13th inning to give the Mets a 3-2 win over the Oakland A's...The only other time it occurred was April 23, 1992 when Daryl Boston was plunked in the 13th inning to give the Mets a 1-0 win over the Cardinals...It was New York's fourth home opener that ended in a walk-off win and the first since the Mets edged the Phillies, 1-0, in 14 innings on March 31, 1998 on Alberto Castillo's RBI single...The other two instances were April 9, 1985, when Gary Carter slugged a solo homer in the 10th inning in his first game with the team to beat St. Louis, 6-5 and April 8, 1975, when Joe Torre delivered a RBI single in the ninth inning to beat the Phillies, 2-1.

BIRTHDAY BOMBS: On Opening Day, April 8 against Miami, Jeff McNeil crushed a game-tying home run to lead off the ninth inning...He was the 16th player in Mets history to hit a home run on his birthday...The home run snapped an 0-10 start to the season...Mike Piazza is the franchise leader with three home runs on his birthday (September 4).

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: Taijuan Walker was selected to his first All-Star team, while Jacob deGrom was selected to his fourth All-Star Game...Walker went 7-3 with a 2.50 ERA (25 earned runs/90.0 innings) with 30 walks and 95 strikeouts in 16 starts) prior to the All-Star break (this does not include the April 11 makeup game)...At the time of the All-Star Game, Walker's 2.50 ERA (25 earned runs/90.0 innings) ranked ninth in the majors and eighth in the National League and his 156 ERA+ ranked ninth in the NL...His 2.50 ERA through his first 16 starts as a Met was sixth-lowest ERA in Mets history through 16 starts with the team...His 1.03 WHIP was the third lowest behind only Pedro Martinez (0.82) and Matt Harvey (1.01) through 16 starts with the team...Walker tossed 1.0 inning in the Midsummer Classic, allowing a solo home run to Mike Zunino and striking out one batter.

TASTE THE ROCKIES: Infielder Brett Baty and catcher Francisco Álvarez were selected to participate in the 2021 SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game, which was played at Coors Field...Álvarez hit a solo home run in the contest...Baty was selected in the first round (12th overall) in the 2019 First-Year Player Draft out of Lake Travis High School in Texas...Francisco Álvarez, a non-drafted free agent, is the top rated prospect in the organization according to MLB.com, while Baty ranks fourth...Following the All-Star Break, Baty was promoted to Double-A Binghamton.

DERBY DAY: Pete Alonso was crowned the 2021 Home Run Derby Champion...Alonso defeated Baltimore's Trey Mancini to earn his second Derby title...He is the only Met to win the competition twice and is the lone player in team history to win the derby outright...He is the second player in franchise history to win the Derby, joining Darryl Strawberry, who shared the victory with Wally Joyner in 1986...Alonso became the fourth player to win the Derby twice and the third to win back-to-back titles...The last player to win back-to-back Home Run Derby titles was Yoenis Céspedes in 2013 and 2014.

TAP THE ROCKIES: In game one of a doubleheader on April 17, the Mets struck out 17 in only 7.0 innings...That tied a Coors Field single-game record...The Mets struck out 17 of the 26 batters (65.4%) they faced...It was the highest single-game percentage in Mets history...It marked the fourth time in franchise history that the Mets struck out 17 or more batters in a game that was 9.0 innings or less, a mark they matched an additional two times in 2021...Their franchise record is 19, which has been done twice before: October 6, 1991 at Philadelphia and April 22, 1970 vs. San Diego.

PITCHERS WHO RAKE: Mets pitchers batted .146 (36-247) with seven doubles, eight RBI, 10 walks and a .359 OPS...The team's .146 average as well as their .359 OPS were the highest in the National League and ranked fourth in the majors...Jacob deGrom led the staff, batting .364 (12-33) with four runs, a double and six RBI.

IN A PINCH: As a team, the Mets pinch hitters batted .259/.326/.430 with 31 runs, 21 doubles, eight home runs, 48 RBI, 23 walks and a .756 OPS...Their .259 average was the highest in the Senior Circuit and third in the majors...The team's 21 pinch-hit doubles led the majors and were a franchise record, while their 48 RBI were second-most in franchise history and in MLB this year...The only Mets team with more pinch-hit RBI was the 1983 club, which collected 50 RBI...Brandon Drury led the majors with a .367 (11-30) batting average as a pinch-hitter...He batted .367/.387/.767 in those spots with four runs, three doubles, three home runs, nine RBI and a walk...He became the first Met with at least three pinch-hit homers in a season since Kelly Johnson (four, 2016) and his three pinch-hit HR were tied for the fifth-most in a season in Mets history.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: The Mets featured seven players who made their major league debut this season - Patrick Mazeika (May 5), Jake Hager (May 15), Johneshwy Fargas (May 17), Khalil Lee (May 17), Tylor Megill (June 23), Thomas Szapucki (June 30) and Akeem Bostick (July 29)...Fargas and Lee's debut marked the first time the Mets had two players make their major league debuts in the same game before rosters expand in September since April 29, 2015...That day, LHP Jack Leathersich and RHP Hansel Robles played their first game.

TWO BIRDS, ONE MILESTONE: Jake Hager and Khalil Lee each recorded his first career hit in the 12th inning on the May 21 game in Miami...It was the first time that two players recorded their first career hit in extra-innings and in the same inning in the major leagues since a pair of Mets also did so in 1965...On April 14, 1965 Ron Swoboda homered and Danny Napoleon singled in the 11th inning as the Mets fell to the Astros, 7-6, at Shea Stadium...Research courtesy of Elias.

OUCH: The Mets were plunked 94 times this season...That was the fourth-highest total in the majors and third-highest in the NL...The Mets were hit by 42 pitches following the All-Star break, only Oakland (48) was hit more in that span...Since the start of the 2019 season, the Mets have been plunked 234 times...That is the most in the majors in that span.

DOUBLE DARE: From June 19 to July 10, the Mets played six doubleheaders in a span of 22 days...The Mets became the second team in last 35 seasons to play six doubleheaders in a span of 22 days or fewer...The 2020 Cardinals played six in a span of 14 days (September 5-18)...The last time the Mets played six or more twinbills in 22 days or fewer was in 1979 (six in 11 days from September 18-28)...Courtesy of Elias.

TWINSIES: Pete Alonso homered in both games of the July 4 doubleheader at Yankee Stadium...It was the 30th time a Met has homered in both games of a twinbill...He is the first to do so since Shawn Green accomplished the feat on September 6, 2006 vs. Atlanta...Courtesy of Elias.

METS-YANKEES TWINBILLS: July 4 marked the eighth doubleheader between the Mets and Yankees...The Mets won game one, 10-5 at Yankee Stadium and fell to the Yankees in the nightcap, 4-2...It was the fifth doubleheader with both games at Yankee Stadium...The three other doubleheaders were split stadium doubleheaders...On June 27, 2008, the Mets won 15-6 at Yankee Stadium and lost 9-0 at Shea Stadium, on June 28, 2003, the Mets lost 7-1 at Yankee Stadium and 9-8 at Shea Stadium and on July 8, 2000, the Mets lost 4-2 at Shea Stadium and 4-2 at Yankee Stadium.

SUBWAY SERIES: The Mets went 4-2 against the Yankees this season, scoring a franchise-record 44 runs against their crosstown rivals...The two teams faced each other a total of six times this year, three games from July 3-4 in The Bronx and from September 10-12 at Citi Field...The two teams went 3-3 against each other in 2020...The Mets earned their first season Subway Series victory since 2013, when they went 4-0 against the Yankees...The Mets and Yankees have gone .500 against one another in each of the previous three seasons.

SQUIRRELS ON THE POND: Jeff McNeil recorded an RBI on a bunt base hit with the bases loaded in the third inning in the September 10 game vs. the Yankees...According to Elias, that was the third bunt single with no outs and the bases loaded in the last 30 seasons...It was the second in Mets history, joining Bill Pulsipher who had one on September 6, 1995.

CRAZY COMBO: New York scored 10 runs in the sixth inning on July 9 vs. Pittsburgh...It was the team's first double-digit run-scoring inning since the fourth inning on September 11, 2020 at Toronto in Buffalo...The Mets had not scored 10 runs in an inning at home since their 12-run third inning vs. San Francisco on April 29, 2016 (highest scoring inning in Mets history)...Francisco Lindor clubbed a grand slam, the Mets' first of the year...Jonathan Villar homered from both sides of the plate...The Mets became the first team in MLB history to accomplish all three of those feats in the same game...Courtesy of Stats.

THREE'S COMPANY: On September 12 vs. Yankees, Francisco Lindor became the 14th player (15th time) in Mets history to hit three home runs in a game (last, Robinson Canó, July 23, 2019 vs. San Diego)...It was the fourth three-homer game by a Met at home in club history (Canó also last time) and the first three-HR game in Subway Series history...Lindor is the second Mets shortstop to do so (also, José Reyes, August 15, 2006)...Only two other Mets shortstops have had multiple multi-homer games in one season: José Reyes in 2017 and Asdrúbal Cabrera in 2016.

SIDE-TO-SIDE: Jonathan Villar (July 9 vs. Pittsburgh) and Francisco Lindor (September 12 vs. the Yankees) homered from both sides of the plate in the same game for the Mets this year...The last time two Mets did so in one year was 2018 (José Reyes and Asdrúbal Cabrera)...That feat has now been accomplished by 11 different Mets in franchise history a total of 25 times.

DON'T CALL IT A COMEBACK: The Mets became the third team in the modern era to lose a game after having a six-run lead and then win a game after falling six runs behind the following day...The Mets fell to the Pirates, 9-7, on July 17 and won the following day against the Pirates, 7-6...They joined the Rays on July 27-28, 2019 and the Braves on July 13-14, 1997... Courtesy of Stats, Inc...The team's July 18 victory in Pittsburgh marked the second time in franchise history that the Mets won a game after falling behind by at least six runs in the first inning...The Mets also did this on July 13, 1997 at Atlanta...The team trailed 6-0 in first inning and went on to win 7-6 in 10 innings.

CIN CITY: On July 19 at Cincinnati, the Mets became the second team in MLB history to hit back-to-back home runs in the first inning and back-to-back blasts in extra innings in the same game...The other instance was the Pirates on September 3, 1950 (Danny O'Connell and Ralph Kiner in the first and then Pete Castiglione and Bob Dillinger in the 10th inning)...Courtesy of Stats, Inc...That same game marked the second time the Mets had two players with three RBI off the bench...Kevin Pillar and James McCann each collected three RBI in the 15-11 victory...On September 27, 2001 at Montreal, Desi Relaford had a two-run homer and an RBI double after entering as a substitute and Mike Piazza had a pinch-hit, bases-clearing double in the ninth inning as New York came back from being down 6-2 to win, 12-6... Since RBI became official in 1920, only 28 other games have featured a team getting three or more RBI off the bench from multiple players...The Dodgers were the last to do it, getting a game-tying pinch-hit three-run homer from Chris Taylor and a walk-off three-run PH blast from Will Smith on June 23, 2019 vs. Colorado.

I DON'T WANNA BE A PIRATE: The Mets played seven straight games against the Pirates from July 10-18...This included four games in New York before the All-Star break and three games in the Steel City immediately following the break...The Mets have played seven or more consecutive games against the same opponent within a season only once before in franchise history, when they played seven straight vs. the Cubs from August 31 to September 3, 1967...Courtesy of Elias...Before 2021, the Mets had never ended the first half and opened the second half against the same opponent...The last time it happened in the majors was the Giants and A's in 2018.

NO 1.00: Aaron Loup finished the year with a 0.95 ERA (six earned runs/56.2 innings) in 65 games this year...He became the first player in Mets history to record an ERA below 1.00 with at least 20.0 innings pitched in a season...Jacob deGrom's 1.08 ERA (11 earned runs/92.0 innings) was the second lowest ERA in franchise history...In 2014, Josh Edgin set the record with a 1.32 ERA (four earned runs/27.1 innings).

BUSCH LEAGUE: Loup allowed only two earned runs over his last 50 games, posting a 0.40 ERA (two earned runs/45.1 innings) with 14 walks and 44 strikeouts in that span...He was 6-0 with a 0.95 ERA (six earned runs/56.2 innings) with 16 walks and 57 strikeouts this season...This includes two starts where he tossed 3.0 scoreless innings as an opener... In 34 games following the All-Star break, he posted a 0.31 ERA (one earned run/28.2 innings) with 10 walks and 23 strikeouts...He held left-handed hitters to a .167 (14-84) average, surrendering just two extra-base hits.

MOVIN' ON UP: Michael Conforto has hit 132 home runs, which is seventh on the team's all-time list...Carlos Beltrán is sixth with 149 home runs as a Met...Pete Alonso has hit 106 home runs and is sole possession of 14th on the team's all-time home runs list...José Reyes is next with 108 home runs...15 players, including Alonso, have hit 100 or more home runs with the franchise...Alonso's 106 home runs are the most in the majors since he entered the league in 2019.

A CENTURY: Pete Alonso become just the eighth player in major league history to hit 100 or more homers within his first three major league seasons...He became the second-fastest player in major league history to hit 100 home runs, reaching the mark in his 347th career game...Only Ryan Howard (325 games) was faster.

MULTIPLICITY: Pete Alonso recorded four multi-home run games this season...It matched his career-high, as he collected four multi-homer games in 2019...He has recorded 11 multi-home run games in his career... His 11 multi-homer games are tied for the eighth-most in franchise history... Darryl Strawberry owns the franchise record with 22 such games.

ROAD WARRIOR: Alonso batted .288/.373/.618 with 54 runs, 14 doubles, three triples, 25 home runs, 61 RBI, 32 walks and a .991 OPS in 77 games on the road this year...In 75 games at home, Alonso hit .234/.313/.414 with 27 runs, 13 doubles, 12 home runs, 33 RBI, 28 walks and a .727 OPS...He collected 61 RBI on the road this year, which ranked fourth in the majors... That is 10th in franchise history...Carlos Beltran set the franchise record with 78 in 2006.

FOR PETE'S SAKE: Pete Alonso had a career-best 11-game hitting streak from August 15-26...He batted .333 (15-45) with eight runs, a double, a triple, four home runs, 10 RBI, a .388 OBP and a .667 SLG in that span... In 74 games following the All-Star Game, Alonso hit .275/.361/.560 with 42 runs, 15 doubles, three triples, 20 home runs, 45 RBI, 32 walks and a .921 OPS...This compared to a .250/.328/.478 slashline with 17 home runs and 49 RBI in 78 games before the break.

SWEET 16: Jeff McNeil owned a career-best 16-game hitting streak from July 7-30...He hit .390 (23-59) with eight runs, five doubles, two home runs, 14 RBI, four walks, a .438 OBP and a .576 SLG in that span...The streak was part of a career-best 19-game on-base streak...He posted a .425 OBP in the streak that ended on August 1...McNeil also had an 18-game on-base streak from April 23 to June 21 this year.

SIMPLY A-MAZEIKA: Patrick Mazeika drove in the game-winning run with a pinch-hit fielder's choice in the 10th inning on May 7 vs. Arizona...It was his first career RBI and just his second career plate appearance...The last player whose first career RBI was a game-winner was Will Smith of the Dodgers on June 1, 2019...Prior to Mazeika, the last Met whose first career RBI was a walk-off was Esix Sneed on September 21, 2002 vs. Montreal... Days later on May 11 vs. Baltimore, Mazeika had his second walk-off fielder's choice of the week...His two walk-off fielder's choices are tied for the most in Mets history with Carl Everett, who also had two walk-off FC in the span of one week, September 1 and September 4, 1996...He is the first player since RBI became official in 1920 with multiple walk-off RBI within his first four career games...The last time one player had each of the Mets' last two walk-off RBI was when Wilmer Flores had each of the Mets' first three walk-off RBI in 2018...He is the first player since 1955 with three RBI before his first hit...He is the first with multiple walk-offs before a hit in at least 100 years...Courtesy of Elias, MLB and ESPN Stats and Info.

WHAT COULD'VE BEEN: Jacob deGrom put up one of the best first-half performances in major league history, then spent the entire second half on the Injured List with right forearm tightness...His 1.08 ERA before the All-Star break was the second-best ever, behind only Bob Gibson's 1.06 ERA in his historic 1968 season...He limited baserunners to an extent never before seen in MLB history, posting a 0.55 WHIP...The next-best first-half WHIP was produced by Clayton Kershaw, who had a 0.73 mark before the break in 2016.

WHAT WAS: After deGrom's final start of the season, July 7, he led the majors with a 1.08 ERA, had an MLB-leading 146 punchouts and paced the majors in several rate stats (14.28 K/9, 1.08 BB/9, 13.27 K/BB, 0.55 WHIP, 3.91 H/9)...DeGrom was tied for the Mets lead with seven wins and ended up tied for third on the team in that category with only Marcus Stroman (10 wins) surpassing him among Mets starters...Despite missing the entire second half of the season, deGrom finished just a dozen strikeouts shy of the team lead, held by Stroman (158), who started a major league-high 33 games, 18 more than deGrom.

HALFWAY TO 3K: DeGrom reached the 1,500-strikeout milestone in his last outing of the season, the 198th start of his career...Yu Darvish reached that mark faster than any pitcher in major league history (197 games) earlier in the 2021 season...DeGrom became the second-fastest ever to 1,500 strikeouts...Randy Johnson held the mark before Darvish, reaching 1,500 strikeouts in 206 games.

IT'S BEEN A GREAT EIGHT: Through his eighth major league season, deGrom holds a 2.50 ERA in 1,261.2 innings...Of the 452 pitchers to compile at least 1,250 IP through career season No. 8 since the earned run became official in 1913, only eight have posted a lower ERA...The last pitcher to outdo deGrom in that regard was Clayton Kershaw, who had a 2.43 ERA through eight major league seasons...Tom Seaver (2.47) is the only Met to top deGrom.

ANALYTICS HATE HIM!: DeGrom improved throughout the game each pass through his opponent's lineup...The first time through, the opposition hit .144 (19-132) with a .466 OPS...Second time through, those marks dropped to .133 (16-120)/.375 OPS...The third time through, opponents were just 5-55 (.091) with a .332 OPS...DeGrom faced three batters a fourth time this year, retiring all three...His .091 opponent average the third time through is the lowest ever (min. 60 batters faced in that situation).

BREAKING 100-YEAR-OLD RECORDS, NBD: DeGrom had a 0.50 ERA through 12 starts this season, the lowest mark through a dozen starts (Dutch Leonard held the old mark with a 0.74 ERA in his first 12 starts of the 1914 season)...There have been only two other occurrences of a pitcher holding a 0.50 ERA or lower over any single-season 12-start span in major league history (min. 20.0 IP to exclude openers): Jake Arrieta had a 0.41 ERA over his last 12 starts of his historic 2015 Cy Young season and Bob Gibson threw 12 complete games in a row, including eight shutouts, in 1968 to post a 0.50 ERA over that stretch.

OH, OKKKKKKKK: on April 17, deGrom struck out nine batters in a row to set a personal best, falling one shy of tying the all-time record of 10 straight strikeouts in a row...Not only did he whiff nine men in a row, but that run was part of a stretch of 11 consecutive outs recorded via a strikeout, the longest single-game streak in Mets history...Max Scherzer was the last pitcher in the majors to record at least 11 straight outs by way of a strikeout (12 straight on May 6, 2018)...Thanks to Elias...DeGrom also fanned eight in a row on July 1 at Atlanta, marking the fourth time in his career he has struck out eight or more in a row...Nolan Ryan (twice) is the only other pitcher to do that more than once.

PITCHER OF THE deMONTH: Jacob deGrom was named the National League Pitcher of the Month for April and June...He became the first pitcher in team history to win the Award twice in one season...The two-time Cy Young Award winner made five starts in April and went 2-2 with a 0.51 ERA (two earned runs/35.0 innings) with four walks and 59 strikeouts...He tied Nolan Ryan (1978) for the most strikeouts through a pitcher's first five appearances of a season (since 1893)...His 0.51 ERA after five starts is the lowest ERA in team history...David Cone held the previous record for lowest ERA through five starts (0.72 ERA in 1988)...It is the 279th instance since earned runs became official of a pitcher having at least 55 strikeouts in a month and deGrom's ERA was the lowest of any of them...Courtesy of ESPN Stats & Info...Matt Harvey was the last Met to win the award, doing so in April of 2013...DeGrom made five starts in June and went 3-0 with a 0.67 ERA (two earned runs/27.0 innings) with four walks and 40 strikeouts...He hit .333 (3-9) in the month with three RBI.

SCORELESS STREAK: DeGrom equaled his personal best with a 31.0 scoreless inning streak from May 25-June 26...It was tied for the third-longest streak in team history...DeGrom also went 31.0 scoreless innings from 2019-2020.

ON THE MARC: Marcus Stroman finished the season ninth in majors and eighth in the NL with a 3.02 ERA, the best full-season mark of his career (min. 162.0 IP)...Ranked 13th in the majors and 10th in the NL in ERA+ (133)...He finished the season 16th in the NL with 179.0 IP despite more than a quarter of his starts coming in seven-inning doubleheader games...Landed 10th in the NL with a 2.21 BB/9 ratio...Stroman finished the season with a 0.86 HR/9 ratio, good for sixth in the NL and ninth in the majors...Stroman ranked seventh in the majors and fifth the NL with a 50.8 percent ground ball rate.

THOR'S BACK: Noah Syndergaard returned to the mound on September 28 vs. Miami and tossed 1.0 scoreless inning with two strikeouts, tossing 10 pitches, nine for strikes...It was his first appearance since September 29, 2019 vs. Atlanta...He made two starts this year, allowing two earned runs in 2.0 innings with two strikeouts...Syndergaard tore his right ulnar collateral ligament in March 2020 and underwent "Tommy John" surgery on March 26, 2020 at the Hospital for Special Surgery in West Palm Beach...He began this season on the 60-Day IL...In 121 career games (120 starts), all with the Mets, Syndergaard owns a 47-31 record with a 3.32 ERA (265 earned runs/718.0 innings) with 166 walks and 777 strikeouts.

TYLOR THE CREATOR: Tylor Megill struck out 28 in 24.0 innings through his first five major league starts...That put him tied for sixth in team history with teammate Jacob deGrom...Overall, Megill finished with 99 strikeouts in 18 games, a total of 89.2 innings...His 99 strikeouts were the most by a Mets rookie since Steven Matz struck out 129 in 22 starts, a total of 132.1 innings in 2016.

OVER THE HILL AND VERY CLOSE: Rich Hill, at 41 years and 136 days, was the second-oldest pitcher ever to make their Mets pitching debut... He trails only Warren Spahn (43 years, 356 days) when he made his Mets debut against the Houston Astros on April 14, 1965...Courtesy of Sports Radar...He was the ninth player to start a game for the Mets over the age of 40...He joined Bartolo Colón, Tom Glavine, Orlando Hernandez, Orel Hershiser, Warren Spahn, Frank Tanana, Miguel Batista and David Cone.

KING OF THE HILL: Rich Hill earned his first victory as a member of the Mets in his 12th start and 13th appearance with the Mets...Before Hill, the most recent pitcher without a win in each of their first 10 or more starts with the Mets was Pete Falcone, who went 13 starts with the Mets without receiving a victory from April 11-June 17, 1979...He earned the win on June 25 vs. Pittsburgh...The franchise record is 20 starts to begin a career with the Mets without receiving a win...It is held by Bob Miller from April 21 - September 23, 1962...Miller earned the win in his last start and appearance with the Mets in 1962, tossing a complete game as the Mets defeated the Cubs, 2-1 at Wrigley Field...Courtesy of Elias.

TERRIFIC 12: Walker had a 2.12 ERA (16 earned runs/68.0 innings) through his first 12 starts as a Met...That was the third-lowest ERA in Mets history through 12 starts with the team behind only Al Leiter and Terry Leach (1.70)...Pedro Martínez (.151) and Matt Harvey (.182) are the only pitchers with a better opponent batting average through 12 starts with New York than Walker's .184 mark...Martínez (.451), Leach (.505) and Dwight Gooden (.511) are the only pitchers to top Walker's .513 OPS against in his first 12 starts with the Mets...Through his first 12 starts with the Mets, Walker posted a 1.00 WHIP, tied for third-lowest after Martínez (0.67) and Leach (0.90).

WORKING OVERTIME: Kevin Pillar tied for the major league lead with eight RBI in extra innings this season...Those eight RBI came courtesy of three swings: a two-run double on September 3 at Washington, a three-run shot on August 18 at San Francisco and a three-run home run on July 19 at Cincinnati...Only 11 players have had more extra-inning RBI in a season since by-inning stats began being tracked in 1974...All eight of Pillar's extra-inning RBI came on the road...Since 1974, only Matt Kemp has had more road extra-inning RBI in a season (nine in 2009)...His eight RBI in extras is a franchise record...The previous record was six RBI held by Tim Lincecum (1963), George Foster (1984) and Darryl Strawberry (1986).

IN GOOD COMPANY: Francisco Lindor recorded his 1,000th career hit on October 2 at Atlanta...He joined Ernie Banks and Cal Ripken Jr. as the only shortstops in major league history with at least 1,000 hits and 150 home runs in their first seven seasons.

SMILE LIKE YOU MEAN IT: Francisco Lindor recorded his 200th career double on June 25 vs. Philadelphia...He became just the third shortstop in MLB history with 200 or more doubles and 100 or more steals in their first seven seasons, joining Jimmy Rollins (231 doubles/207 steals) and Hanley Ramirez (214 doubles/216 steals)...Courtesy of Sports Radar...He is the 14th shortstop with at least 200 doubles by his seventh major league season...He joined Xander Bogaerts and Starlin Castro as the other active shortstop to accomplish the feat.

BABY GRAND: Francisco Lindor hit a grand slam on July 9 vs. Pittsburgh and hit his second grand slam as a Met on September 30 vs. Miami...The last Met to hit two slams in a single season was Amed Rosario in 2019.

SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER: Lindor reached the 20-homer mark for the fourth time, thanks to a torrid September during which he hit nine home runs and drove in 25 runs...He had 11 home runs and 38 RBI total from April-August...Lindor became just the second Mets shortstop to reach 20 home runs in a single-season...Asdrúbal Cabrera holds the club record when he hit 22 homers as a shortstop in 2016.

JUNE BLOOM: In 79 games after June 1, Francisco Lindor batted .252/.340/.482 with 51 runs, 11 doubles, three triples, 16 home runs, 52 RBI, 35 walks, six steals and an .822 OPS...This included a .267/.359/.574 slash line with 21 runs, four doubles, nine home runs, 25 RBI, 15 walks and a .933 OPS in 27 games in September.

WHO'S ON FIRST?: On May 24 vs. Colorado, James McCann played his first career game at first base...It was his 635th career game in the major leagues...He never appeared at first base in 359 career minor league games...He appeared in the infield only once in his professional career, playing third base on May 14, 2014 in a game with Toledo against Syracuse.

SO MANY THINGS THAT I WANT TO SAY: On June 9 at Baltimore, two Mets outfielders hit two home runs for the Mets, Kevin Pillar and Billy McKinney...They became the second pair of Mets outfielders each with two homers in the same game...The other pair was Darryl Strawberry and Kevin McReynolds on, April 4, Opening Day in 1988...Courtesy of Elias.

ED, EDD AND EDDY: Edwin Díaz finished seventh in the majors and fifth in the National League with 32 saves...His 89 strikeouts as a reliever ranked fifth in the NL and 12th in the majors...Díaz became the seventh player in franchise history to record at least 30 saves in a season...John Franco is the franchise leader with five such seasons...Overall, he has recorded 64 saves with the Mets...That places him 11th on the franchise's all-time list...Skip Lockwood is 10th with 65...He finished the year going 5-6 with a 3.45 ERA (24 earned runs/62.2 innings) with 23 walks, 89 strikeouts, a .195 (43-221) opponents batting average and a 1.05 WHIP...In three seasons in New York, Díaz is 9-14 with 64 saves, a 4.00 ERA (65 earned runs/146.1 innings) with 59 walks and 238 strikeouts...His 238 strikeouts in that span is the third-highest total in the majors...Only Liam Hendriks (272) and Josh Hader (271) have struck out more...Additionally, his 238 strikeouts are the 14th most by a reliever in franchise history...Turk Wendell is 13th with 259.

INVADER NIM: Brandon Nimmo batted .292/.401/.437 with 51 runs, 17 doubles, three triples, eight home runs, 28 RBI, 54 walks, five steals with an .838 OPS in 92 games this year...His 17 doubles were the second-highest total in his career...He recorded a career-high 28 doubles in 140 games in 2018...His eight home runs are the second-highest total he has recorded in a single season, matching his 2019 and 2020 seasons...Nimmo hit 17 blasts in 2018...If he qualified, his .401 OBP would rank tied for third in the majors...His .393 career on-base percentage ranks second in team history, behind only John Olerud's .425 mark (min. 1,000 plate appearances).

JAVY A NICE DAY: The Mets acquired two-time All-Star infielder Javier Báez along with RHP Trevor Williams and cash considerations from the Chicago Cubs in exchange for minor league outfielder Pete Crow-Armstrong on July 30...In 47 games with the Mets, Báez hit .299/.371/.515 with 32 runs, nine doubles, nine home runs, 22 RBI, five steals and an .886 OPS...Báez recorded 13 walks in 47 games with the Mets...This compared to 15 walks in 91 games with the Cubs...He walked a total of 28 times this season...His career-high is 30 walks, which he accomplished in 2017.

30 FOR 23: Javier Báez became the 30th Met in team history to homer in his first game with the team after he hit a blast on July 31 vs. Cincinnati... The last Met to homer in his team debut was Aaron Altherr (May 24, 2019 vs. Detroit).

MAZEL TOV: From September 14-29, Javier Báez had a 13-game hitting streak...It was the second-longest of his career...His longest streak is 15 games which he accomplished from May 1-17, 2019...He hit .356 (16-45) with six runs, two doubles, one home run, six RBI, seven walks and a .909 OPS in that span...It was the second-longest hitting streak by a Met this year...Jeff McNeil had a 16-game streak from July 7-30.

NOBODY LIKES YOU WHEN YOU'RE 23: From September 5-30, Báez had a career-high 23-game on-base streak...He hit .386 (32-83) with 18 runs, four doubles, four home runs, 13 RBI, 10 walks, five steals, a .469 OBP, a .578 SLG and a 1.047 OPS in that span...His previous career-high was 15-games from May 1-17, 2019...It is the longest on-base streak by a Met this year...Michael Conforto had the previous high of 20 games, from August 1-21.

BÁEZ BLASTS: Javier Báez hit his 25th home run of the season on August 27 vs. Washington...He joined Max Muncy, Matt Olson, Rhys Hoskins, and Nolan Arenado as the only infielders to hit 25 home runs in each of the last three full seasons (2018-2019, 2021)...He is now one home run away from 150 for his career.

IT'S LONELY AT THE TOP: New York's leadoff hitters combined to post a .401 OBP in their 162 leadoff plate appearances this season...That was tied for the highest mark in the majors with Baltimore...Brandon Nimmo (76 games) and Jonathan Villar (50 games) combined to hit leadoff in over three-quarters of the Mets' games this year...Nimmo slashed .312/.421/.500 in his leadoff PA and Villar slashed .342/.500/.474.

DOUBLE SHOT: On September 2 vs. Miami, Carlos Carrasco allowed a leadoff home run to Miguel Rojas on the first pitch he threw...In the bottom of the first, Jonathan Villar countered, going deep on the first pitch he saw...According to Elias, it was the first time since at least 1985 (as far back as their pitch tracking data goes) that both team's leadoff hitters homered on the first pitch of their leadoff plate appearance.

ACCESS DENIED: New York catchers caught 26 runners attempting to steal a base this season...The team's 26 catcher caught stealings were tied for third in the majors and tied for second in the National League...James McCann tied for eighth in the majors and tied for fifth in the NL with 13 catcher caught stealings...Tomás Nido tied for 11th in the majors and tied for seventh in the NL with 11...Mets catchers caught seven baserunners in 2020, which tied for 14th in the majors and caught 20 would-be base stealers in 2019, which ranked tied for 17th.

MINOR LEAGUE AWARDS: Catcher Francisco Álvarez was named the organization's 2021 Minor League Player of the Year, RHP Adam Oller was named the Minor League Pitcher of the Year, infielder Kevin Villavicencio was named the Mets top position player in the Dominican Summer League and RHP Joel Díaz was tabbed as the Mets best pitcher in the DSL...Álvarez began the season with the St. Lucie Mets (A) and batted .417 (20-48) with 12 runs scored, five doubles, two home runs, 12 RBI, 15 walks and a 1.213 OPS in 15 games before being promoted to High-A Brooklyn, where he spent the remainder of the season...With the Cyclones, the 19-year-old catcher had a record-breaking season establishing a new-franchise high mark with 22 home runs, which also ranked tied for fourth in the High-A East division...Álvarez also ranked third in slugging (.538), fifth in OPS (.889) and 10th in on-base percentage among all High-A East players. The Venezuela native led all Mets minor leaguers in RBI (70), extra-base hits (43), and slugging (.538) and tied for the organization lead with 24 home runs...Oller, 26, led all Mets minor leaguers with 138 strikeouts in his first season in the organization...The right-hander from Conroe, TX, made 23 starts, posting a 9-4 record with a 3.45 ERA (46 earned runs/120.0 innings) while holding opposing batters to .212 batting average and averaging 10.4 strikeouts per 9.0 innings splitting the season between Binghamton (AA) and Syracuse (AAA).

FUTURE'S SO BRIGHT, GOTTA WEAR SHADES: Five Mets prospects were named Minor League All-Stars...Khalil Lee (Mets' No. 8 prospect) led Triple-A in OBP and was one of three Triple-A East All-Star outfielders...Infielder Mark Vientos (Mets' No. 6 prospect) was a Double-A All-Star at third base...Outfielder Jake Mangum (Mets' 2019 fourth-round pick) was also a Double-A All-Star...Catcher Francisco Álvarez and infielder Ronny Mauricio New York's No.1 and No. 3 prospects, respectively, represented Brooklyn (A) for the High-A East All-Stars...Mauricio was tabbed as the High-A East Division's Top MLB Prospect...INF/OF Brett Baty, the Mets' No. 2 prospect, was named the Arizona Fall League's Hitter of the Week after its first week of play.

HONORING HIS LEGACY: The New York Mets wore a "41" Tom Seaver tribute patch on the right sleeve of their home and road uniforms during the 2021 season...Seaver passed away on August 31, 2020 at age 75...Seaver won 311 games, had a 2.86 ERA and struck out 3,640 batters over a 20-year major league career that spanned from 1967-1986, earning 12 All-Star selections in the process...He won three Cy Young Awards with the team in 1969, 1973 and 1975 as well as the NL Rookie of the Year Award in 1967.

HELLO, JERRY: The Mets retired Jerry Koosman's number 36 in a pregame ceremony on August 28...Koosman, who is the winningest left-hander in team history (140 wins), became the third player to have his number retired by the Mets, joining Tom Seaver (#41) and Mike Piazza (#31)...The Mets have also retired #14 for Manager Gil Hodges, #37 for Manager Casey Stengel and #42 across baseball for Jackie Robinson...Koosman ranks second in team history in starts (346), complete games (108), innings (2,544.2) and shutouts (26), third in strikeouts (1,799) and sixth in ERA (3.09)...Koosman signed with the Mets in 1964 when he was scouted while he was pitching with the Army. He played for the Mets from 1967-1978.

METS HALL OF FAME: LHP Jon Matlack, RHP Ron Darling and infielder Edgardo Alfonzo were inducted into the Mets Hall of Fame on July 31 in an on-field ceremony at Citi Field...The three new additions bring the total membership of the Mets Hall of Fame to 30...Al Jackson was posthumously honored with the Mets Hall of Fame Achievement Award for contributions to the organization...This group was scheduled to be celebrated in 2020, but due to the pandemic, the ceremony was moved to this year.

METS HONOR JUAN ALICEA: The New York Mets named the Spanish Radio Booth at Citi Field in honor of Juan Alicea...Alicea joined the organization in April of 1969 and has served in a variety of capacities including scouting and community relations before finding his home in the Spanish broadcasting booth in 1982, where he's been ever since...Alicea has been behind the mic for over 4,000 Mets games, including being the leading voice on the International Spanish Network during the 1986 postseason which aired throughout the United States and Latin America...The Mets radio booth was named in honor of Bob Murphy on August 17, 2002 and the television booth was named in honor of Ralph Kiner on that same day.

NEVER FORGET: The New York Mets held a ceremony prior to the September 11 game vs. the Yankees surrounding the 20th anniversary remembrance of 9/11...The club wore first responder caps during batting practice and the game...Caps from the FDNY, NYPD, Port Authority Police Department, Department of Sanitation and Department of Correction were all represented to commemorate their bravery and sacrifice... Organizations represented on the field during the 20th Anniversary of 9/11 were Tuesday's Children, The Visionary Network from the 9/11 Museum, Answer the Call – New York Police and Fire Widows' & Children Benefit Fund, which was created by Rusty Staub, The Feel Good Foundation, helping those suffering from 9/11 related illnesses and Mets employees who lost loved ones on 9/11 and those who worked tirelessly at Shea Stadium to aid the support effort.

ROBERTO CLEMENTE AWARD NOMINEE: Pete Alonso is the New York Mets nominee for the 2021 Roberto Clemente Award, baseball's most prestigious individual honor for Major Leaguers...The Roberto Clemente Award is the annual recognition of a Major League player who best represents the game of baseball through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy and positive contributions, both on and off the field...Alonso donated a portion of his Home Run Derby winnings to his Homers for Heroes charity...On Monday, September 27, held a charity event, The Battle of the Boroughs presented by Citi at Maimonides Park, the home of the Brooklyn Cyclones...Fans watched the top youth baseball players from around NYC compete in a home run derby hosted by Alonso, with all proceeds to benefit Pete Alonso's Homers for Heroes...The organization recognizes the outstanding work of those who generally go unnoticed and inspire others to go out in their community and do the same.

HEART & HUSTLE AWARD: The Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association named Kevin Pillar the Mets the 2021 Heart and Hustle Award winner...This award honors players who demonstrate a passion for the game of baseball and best embody the values, spirit and traditions of the game...The Heart and Hustle Award is also the only award in Major League Baseball that is voted on by former players...One player from each Major League team is chosen by the committees based on their passion, desire and work ethic demonstrated both on and off the field.

I AM NOT THROWIN' AWAY MY SHOT: The Citi Field vaccination site has now administered over 200,000 vaccinations, Mayor Bill de Blasio and the New York Mets announced...The site vaccinates an average of 1,200 people daily...That is the most of any New York City-operated site... On January 12, Mayor Bill de Blasio along with Mets Owner, Chairman and CEO Steve Cohen, announced that Citi Field will become a 24/7 vaccination site, operated by the NYC Health + Hospitals Test & Trace Corps...The site has been open since February 10 and began by offering the free vaccine to eligible Queens residents, along with priority appointments for TLC and food service workers from across the five boroughs...The clinic has since expanded its eligibility to all New Yorkers...The Citi Field vaccination site, located at 36-2 Seaver Way, is open 24/7 Monday through Saturday, with vaccines available at no cost to walk-ins or appointments.

CARRASCO NEWS & NOTES

METS DEBUT: Carrasco came over to the Mets in a January trade with Cleveland along with Francisco Lindor...He injured his right hamstring in spring training and began to ramp up for the season in July on a rehab assignment...Made his debut with the Mets on July 30 in a start against the Reds at Citi Field after being activated from the 60-Day Injured List...After surrendering a leadoff home run to Jonathan India on the first pitch of his season, Carrasco retired 12 of the last 15 batters he faced and did not yield another run.

#59 IS #57: Carrasco became the 57th player used by the Mets this season, breaking the previous franchise record of 56 players used in 2018...The Mets used a franchise record 64 players this season...He became the 17th starter used by the Mets this year...The Mets used 19 starters this year...Only the 1967 Mets used more starters with 20.

FIRST IS THE WORST: Carrasco had a 13.50 ERA (18 earned runs/12.0 innings) in the first inning this season...Among the 189 other pitchers to make at least 10 starts in 2021, just one had a higher ERA (Cleveland's J.C. Mejia, 16.03)...Carrasco's 6.00 HR/9 rate in the opening frame was by far the highest in the majors...Andrew Heaney (3.91 HR/9) was the next-closest...Carrasco had a 3.89 ERA (18 earned runs/41.2 innings) in all subsequent innings...Carrasco pitched a scoreless first inning in just two of his starts this season: August 4 at Miami and October 2 at Atlanta.

PITCH MIX...REMIX: Carrasco relied on his four-seam fastball about 40 percent of the time in 2021, his highest usage rate of the pitch since 2017...His 20 percent usage rate on his slider was his lowest since that 2017 season...He has used his changeup more in the last two seasons (27 percent in 2020, 25 percent in 2021) than he has in any season since his first major league campaign in 2009.

DOING THE SPLITS: Carrasco faced roughly the same amount of lefties and righties this season...Right-handed batters had far better numbers off Carrasco, accounting for nine of his 12 homers allowed...RHB put up a .947 OPS, compared to just a .693 OPS from left-handed hitters...Righties hit Carrasco's fastballs very well, going 21-49 (.429) with an .898 SLG in 55 plate appearances ending on a heater...In 69 PA against RHB ending in a breaking or offspeed pitch, his foes were 13-66 (.197)...Lefties saw the opposite results: In 60 PA against LHB ending with a fastball, his opponents batted .189 (10-53) and in 53 PA ending with offspeed pitches or breaking balls, left-handers hit .306 (15-49).

OFFSEASON SURGERY: On October 19, Carrasco underwent successful surgery to remove a bone fragment from his right elbow...Mets Medical Director Dr. David Altchek performed the procedure at the Hospital for Special Surgery in Manhattan.

STRONG STRETCH: From August 20-September 18, Carrasco pitched to a 3.51 ERA (13 earned runs/33.1 innings) in six starts, four of which came against clubs that finished with a winning record...He allowed three earned runs or fewer and tossed at least 5.0 innings in all six outings...He pitched his best start of the season on August 26 vs. San Francisco, needing just 78 pitches to complete 7.0 frames...In that start vs. the Giants, retired the final 13 men he faced allowed just one hit in his last 6.0 innings after allowing two runs in the first inning.

7.0 IS A GIANT NUMBER: Carrasco's season-high 7.0-inning performance against San Francisco on August 26 made him one of just 13 pitchers to finish at least 7.0 innings in a game against MLB's top regular-season team in 2021.

VENEZUELAN SENSATION: On September 2, Carrasco passed Wilson Alvarez to move into sixth on the all-time strikeout list by a Venezuelan-born pitcher...He needs 267 punchouts to enter the top five...Carrasco is 11 wins away from becoming the eighth pitcher from Venezuela to reach 100 career wins.

FREE PASSES AT A PREMIUM: Carrasco issued one or no walks in walk or fewer in each of his first eight starts with the Mets, walking a total of six batters in that span...Only three pitchers have walked fewer batters in their first eight starts with the Mets (Bartolo Colón, Bob Friend and Dennis Ribant each walked five)...Carrasco walked 12 batters over his final four outings of the year.

HOME/ROAD: Despite allowing three times as many home runs at home than on the road, Carrasco posted a lower home ERA (5.93) than road ERA (6.17) this season...He had a 3.47 ERA (nine earned runs/23.1 innings) over his last four home starts after pitching to a 14.14 ERA in his first three outings at Citi Field...He allowed three earned runs or fewer and zero home runs in each of his first three road starts before being tagged for five runs in each of his last two away starts, serving up a total of three home runs in those two games.

200 STARTS: On August 20 at Dodger Stadium, Carrasco made his 200th career start...Since his debut in 2009, Carrasco is one of 66 pitchers to start at least 200 career games and he is one of 43 active pitchers to reach the 200-start mark...Carrasco is one of nine pitchers from Venezuela with at least 200 career starts.

deGROM NEWS & NOTES

WHAT COULD'VE BEEN: deGrom put up one of the best first-half performances in major league history, then spent the entire second half on the Injured List with right forearm tightness...His 1.08 ERA before the All-Star break was the second-best ever, behind only Bob Gibson's 1.06 ERA in his historic 1968 season...He limited baserunners to an extent never before seen in MLB history, posting a 0.55 WHIP...The next-best first-half WHIP was produced by Clayton Kershaw, who had a 0.73 mark before the break in 2016.

WHAT WAS: After deGrom's final start of the season, July 7, he led the majors with a 1.08 ERA, had an MLB-leading 146 punchouts and paced the majors in several rate stats (14.28 K/9, 1.08 BB/9, 13.27 K/BB, 0.55 WHIP, 3.91 H/9)...DeGrom was tied for the Mets lead with seven wins and ended up tied for third on the team in that category with only Marcus Stroman (10 wins) surpassing him among Mets starters...Despite missing the entire second half of the season, deGrom finished just a dozen strikeouts shy of the team lead, held by Stroman (158), who started a major league-high 33 games, 18 more than deGrom.

OVERPOWERING HEATER: DeGrom used his fastball 57.4 percent of the time this year...Even giving hitters a better than 50-50 chance of guessing what was coming, the pitch was nearly untouchable, with batters going 26-165 (.158) with 62 strikeouts in at bats ending on the fastball...He averaged 99.2 mph on the offering, the highest ever by a starting pitcher.

IT'S BEEN A GREAT EIGHT: Through his eighth major league season, deGrom holds a 2.50 ERA in 1,261.2 innings...Of the 452 pitchers to compile at least 1,250 IP through career season No. 8 since the earned run became official in 1913, only eight have posted a lower ERA...The last pitcher to outdo deGrom in that regard was Clayton Kershaw, who had a 2.43 ERA through eight major league seasons...Tom Seaver (2.47) is the only Met to top deGrom.

SEASON RECAP: Had his Opening Day start delayed by one series due to Washington's COVID-19 outbreak, allowing him to start both the Mets' season opener, April 5 at Philadelphia, and home opener, April 10 vs. Miami, combining to allow one run in 14.0 IP in those starts, the former a 6.0-shutout inning outing and the latter a 14-strikeout performance...Fanned 14 in just 6.0 innings at Colorado on April 17...On April 23 vs. Washington, authored the best start of his career, a two-hitter with a career-high 15 strikeouts, his third outing in a row with at least 14 punchouts...Missed two weeks with right side tightness, then came off the IL May 25 and kicked off a career-high-tying 31.0-inning scoreless streak that spanned his next seven starts, all of which resulted in Mets victories...Ended a season-opening streak of 13 straight starts allowing two earned runs or fewer as he finally cracked for three runs in the first inning at Atlanta on July 1, then facing a first-and-third, no-out jam in the second before retiring the final 18 batters he faced in his fourth 14-K output of the year...Registered another double-digit strikeout game, his seventh of 2021, in his final start of the year, July 7 vs. Milwaukee.

THE EXCELLENCE IS SUSTAINABLE: DeGrom owns a 1.94 ERA over the last four seasons in 91 starts...That is the best mark in the major leagues in that span (min. 400.0 IP)...Justin Verlander is second with a 2.56 ERA since 2018 and no other pitcher has an ERA below 2.70...Since 1920, only five other starting pitchers have held an ERA of 1.94 or lower over a span this long: Hal Newhouser, Sandy Koufax, Bob Gibson, Greg Maddux and Clayton Kershaw.

THERE ARE 14 IN A JAKER'S DOZEN: DeGrom struck out at least 14 in a game four times this year, all of which came within the Mets' first 81 games of the season...The only other pitcher with four games with at least 14 strikeouts halfway through a season is Randy Johnson (1993 and 1999)...DeGrom has seven games with 14 or more strikeouts in his career, all since 2019...Gerrit Cole (six) has the next-most 14+ K games in the last three seasons...Max Scherzer has three...No one else has more than two...Three of deGrom's 14-strikeout games have featured a line with zero walks...He is the fifth pitcher ever with three games in a single season with at least 14 punchouts and no walks...The others with three 14-K, 0-BB games in a season: Roger Clemens (1997), Randy Johnson (2001), Yu Darvish (2013) and Gerrit Cole (2019)...DeGrom whiffed 14 or more in three consecutive starts from April 10-23, striking out a total of 43 batters in that span...Only three pitchers have racked up more punchouts in a three-game span in major league history: Nolan Ryan (47), Pedro Martinez (46) and Randy Johnson (45)...Martinez (1999) and Gerrit Cole (2019) are the only two pitchers ever with three-straight games with 14 or more strikeouts.

HALFWAY TO 3K: DeGrom reached the 1,500-strikeout milestone in his last outing of the season, the 198th start of his career...Yu Darvish reached that mark faster than any pitcher in major league history (197 games) earlier in the 2021 season...DeGrom became the second-fastest ever to 1,500 strikeouts...Randy Johnson held the mark before Darvish, reaching 1,500 Ks in 206 games.

CAN'T TOUCH THIS: Led the majors (min. 300 batters faced) in opponent average (.129), OBP (.160), SLG (.242) and OPS (.402)...Of his 324 batters faced, just 43 came with runner(s) in scoring position...In those scenarios, his foes produced a .139/.233/.167 line, going just 5-36 with a double and 17 strikeouts.

WINNING: The Mets won all eight of deGrom's starts in May and June...It was the third time in his career he's led New York to victory in eight straight outings.

CAN'T SPELL JAKE WITHOUT A 'K': Reached the 100-strikeout mark on June 11 vs. San Diego after just 61.2 IP in 2021...According to ESPN Stats & Info, that was the fastest any starting pitcher has ever reached 100 strikeouts in a campaign.

ANALYTICS HATE HIM! DeGrom improved throughout the game each pass through his opponent's lineup...The first time through, the opposition hit .144 (19-132) with a .466 OPS...Second time through, those marks dropped to .133 (16-120)/.375 OPS...The third time through, opponents were just 5-55 (.091) with a .332 OPS...DeGrom faced three batters a fourth time this year, retiring all three...His .091 opponent average the third time through is the lowest ever (min. 60 batters faced in that situation).

BREAKING 100-YEAR-OLD RECORDS, NBD: Had a 0.50 ERA through 12 starts this season, the lowest mark through a dozen starts (Dutch Leonard held the old mark with a 0.74 ERA in his first 12 starts of the 1914 season)...There have been only two other occurrences of a pitcher holding a 0.50 ERA or lower over any single-season 12-start span in major league history (min. 20.0 IP to exclude openers): Jake Arrieta had a 0.41 ERA over his last 12 starts of his historic 2015 Cy Young season and Bob Gibson threw 12 complete games in a row, including eight shutouts, in 1968 to post a 0.50 ERA over that stretch.

EASY AS 1-2-3: Ehre Adrianza hit a leadoff triple (overturned from an out call on replay review) off deGrom on July 1...The three-bagger snapped a streak of 37 consecutive hitters retired in the first inning by deGrom, including 12 straight 1-2-3 first innings...According to ESPN Stats & Info, that was the longest streak in the last 90 seasons.

OH, OKKKKKKKKK: Struck out nine batters in a row to set a personal best, falling one shy of tying the all-time record of 10 straight strikeouts in a row on April 17...Not only did he whiff nine men in a row, but that run was part of a stretch of 11 consecutive outs recorded via a strikeout, the longest single-game streak in Mets history...Max Scherzer was the last pitcher in the majors to record at least 11 straight outs by way of a strikeout (12 straight on May 6, 2018)...Thanks to Elias...DeGrom also fanned eight in a row on July 1 at Atlanta, marking the fourth time in his career he has struck out eight or more in a row...Nolan Ryan (twice) is the only other pitcher to do that more than once.

HE'S AN ELITE HITTER TOO: Batted .364 (12-33), hitting safely in 10 of his 15 starts...Even though he missed half of the season, still finished the year tied for third among pitchers with 12 hits, tied for fifth with six RBI and tied for ninth with four runs scored.

HILL NEWS & NOTES

WITH THE METS: Hill, acquired from the Rays on July 23 in exchange for RHP Tommy Hunter and minor league catcher Matt Dyer, went 1-4 in 13 games (12 starts) with New York and allowed 29 runs, 27 earned, on 62 hits in 63.1 innings, good for a 3.84 ERA...He walked 19 and struck out 59 in his 13 appearances for the Mets...Allowed three runs or fewer in 12 of his 13 outings, including each of his last 11...The Mets were the 11th team for which he's played.

WITH TAMPA BAY: Was 6-4 with a 3.87 ERA in 19 starts with the Rays before being traded...Was 5-4 with a 2.85 ERA (22 earned runs/75.0 innings) in his last 15 starts since April 26, yielding two runs or fewer 10 times over that stretch and one run or fewer in eight of those 15 starts...Among starting pitchers over that stretch, he ranked 15th in the majors and fourth in the AL in ERA, and ranked eighth in the majors and second the AL with a .199 opponent average (55-276)...Posted scoreless innings streaks of 20.2 IP and 16.0 IP...All stats min. 75.0 innings pitched.

LONGEST STREAK EVER: Hill has gone 51 consecutive starts allowing no more than four runs and no more than eight hits...That is the longest streak of all time, one longer than Jacob deGrom's also-active streak of 50 such starts in a row.

FINISHED ON A HIGH NOTE: After going winless in his first 12 games (11 starts) with New York, Hill earned a victory in his last outing of the season, September 30 vs. Miami...Asked afterwards if it meant anything to him to pick up a win with the Mets in his final start of the year, Hill said "Absolutely, it was emotional. It meant a lot. Getting traded over here, I had high expectations and I wanted to contribute more down the stretch than I did but to get one last start at home in front of these great fans, it meant a lot."

HILL'S HOOK: Used his curveball on 40.3 percent of his pitches thrown, the second-highest rate in the majors behind Drew Smyly (42.0)...Had 48 punchouts on curveballs thrown 75 mph (or slower), second-most in the majors behind Adam Wainwright (54)...His 86 swings-and-misses on curveballs of that speed are second to Wainwright's 104.

REJUVENATED RICH: Since returning to the majors after pitching in independent ball in 2015, Hill has been one of the majors' top starting pitchers by ERA, winning percentage and opponent average...His 3.15 ERA in the last seven seasons ranks sixth (min. 600 IP) in the big leagues behind Jacob deGrom (2.47), Clayton Kershaw (2.50), Max Scherzer (2.75), Justin Verlander (2.94), Corey Kluber (3.13) and Gerrit Cole (3.14)...Only Scherzer (.200), Verlander (.204), Kershaw (.209) and deGrom (.211) have held their foes to a lower average than Hill (.212)...Hill's .625 win percentage (50-30) ranks tied for 12th since 2015 (min. 100 starts).

OVER THE HILL, YEAH (WAIN)WRIGHT: Rich Hill was 41 years, 186 days old when he faced off against Adam Wainwright on September 13 at Citi Field...Wainwright was 40 years, 14 days old on the day of that matchup...It was the first time a Mets starting pitcher who aged 40 or older faced an opposing starter also 40 or older since June 18, 2015 when the Mets faced the Blue Jays as Bartolo Colon (42 years, 25 days) dueled R.A. Dickey (40 years, 232 days)...This was also the last time it happened in MLB...The oldest combined age for a starting pitcher matchup featuring a Mets starter came in September 2007 when Tom Glavine (41 years, 173 days) faced Philadelphia's Jamie Moyer (44 years, 300 days)...Courtesy of Elias.

METS WHO PLAYED FOR THE YANKEES: Hill became the 147th player to suit up for both the Mets and Yankees...He was the eighth player to join that list in 2021...Brandon Drury, Cameron Maybin, Billy McKinney, Stephen Tarpley and Mason Williams all played for the Mets this year after previously appearing in a Yankees uniform...Jay Bruce and Darren O'Day made their Yankees debuts in 2021 after previous stints with the Mets.

AWARD SZN: Named AL Pitcher of the Month for May after going 3-1 with a 0.78 ERA (three earned runs/34.2 innings) and 36 strikeouts in six starts...It marked his third career monthly honor, joining July 2017 (with LAD) and May 2016 (with OAK)...According to YES Network and Stats LLC, was the fourth pitcher (fifth time) since 1947 to lead his league in ERA in a month at age 41 or older (min. 25 IP)...He joined Roger Clemens (Houston) in May 2005, Nolan Ryan (Texas) in September 1992 and June 1991, Hoyt Wilhelm (Chicago-AL) in August 1965 and Satchel Paige (Cleveland) in August 1948.

QUACK QUACK, RICH HILL IS BACK: Hill is calling Long Island home for the second time in his pro career...He pitched for the Long Island Ducks in 2015 after he was released by the Nationals in June of that season...He said of his stint in independent ball in 2015: "I'm not 100 percent sure when I'll retire...I'll probably be pitching until I'm 70, like Bill Lee." ...He ditched his sidearm delivery and asked a Red Sox executive to watch him throw at his former high school in Massachusetts...He warmed up with his nephew's American Legion team and impressed the Red Sox, who ended up signing him to a minor league deal after two dominant starts for the independent Long Island Ducks...The bobbleheads from his short stint in the independent league sell for between \$50-60 on eBay.

LUCCHESI NEWS & NOTES

TOMMY JOHN: Suffered a torn UCL in his left elbow during his final start of the season, June 18 at Washington...Underwent Tommy John surgery on June 24.

EN FUEGO: In his final five outings of the year (May 22-June 18), Lucchesi put up his five longest and strongest starts of the season...He pitched to a 1.19 ERA (three earned runs/22.2 innings) with 24 strikeouts and just six walks in that span...Of the 111 other pitchers to throw at least 20.0 innings in that span, just two had a lower ERA: Jacob deGrom (0.33) and Sean Manaea (0.84)...It was the lowest ERA he's ever posted in a five-game stretch in his career.

SEASON RECAP: Made his Mets debut in relief on April 7 at Philadelphia, tossing 2.0 scoreless innings...His next appearance was his first start of the year, April 17 at Colorado...That game started a stretch of three starts in which he had a combined 12.46 ERA (12 earned runs/8.2 innings)...In his next outing, a 3.1-inning relief appearance, he allowed just one unearned run vs. the D-backs on May 8...He pitched out of the pen again a week later, yielding four runs in 1.2 innings at Tampa Bay on May 15...Tossed 4.0 shutout innings and racked up a season-high eight punchouts in his next start, allowing just one hit to the Marlins on May 22...That started a span of five consecutive starts allowing one or no runs to end his season.

STAY CHURVY: Lucchesi's signature curve was been effective during his 11 appearances, generating a whiff rate of 33.3 percent...He only allowed 10 hits off the pitch in 52 plate appearances ending with the pitch, with batters generating a .204 BAA...He struck out 17 batters with the pitch, tossing it 36.9 percent of the time...The pitch had an average velocity of 78.6 mph and was hit hard only 33.3 percent of the time.

SWISS ARMY KNIFE JOEY: When coming out of the bullpen, Lucchesi owned a 5.14 ERA (four earned runs/7.0 innings) in three games...Opponents hit .231 (6-26) with a .695 OPS when facing him in relief...As a starter, he totaled 31.1 innings with a 4.31 ERA (15 earned runs/31.1 innings), a .248 BAA (28-113) and a .729 OPS against.

HELLO, OLD FRIENDS: Faced his old team, the Padres, twice in a row in June...Entering his first appearance against San Diego, the Padres had scored the sixth-most runs in the majors...Lucchesi pitched well each time out, limiting his former mates to just two earned runs over 9.2 innings in those games.

MEET THE MET: Lucchesi (pronounced loo-KAY-see) just completed his first season with the Mets after coming over to New York in an offseason trade with the Padres...His nickname is Joey Fuego...Trying to scheme up a creative Twitter handle while at Southeast Missouri State, Lucchesi asked his college teammates for a nickname...One of them suggested "Fuego," and years later, he still goes by the pseudonym...Gets a haircut the day before every start...When he arrives at a new mound, he prefers to spend time on the mound and visualize the start...He did it in college before every Friday night start...Also calls his father, Kenneth, before each start and the two talk through the next day's game.

HAPPY CHURVE DAY: Lucchesi gained fame for a pitch he calls a "churve"...He holds it deep in his palm like a classic circle changeup, and for most of his college career, that's all it was - a basic changeup...Early in his pro career, he began tinkering with his wrist action as he threw it, snapping off the pitch like a breaking ball...It soon became his go-to putaway weapon.

MEGILL NEWS & NOTES

IT'S ALL ABOUT MEGILL: Megill, the Mets' eighth-round selection in the 2018 First-Year Player Draft, was brought up to the majors for his big league debut on June 23 after making eight starts in the minors (five at Double-A Binghamton and three at Triple-A Syracuse)...He remained on the active roster for the rest of the season, making 18 starts for the Mets...Among pitchers to make their first 18 career starts with the Mets, Megill ranks seventh with 99 strikeouts in those 18 games...He allowed two runs or fewer in 10 of his first 18 career starts.

ALLOW ME TO INTRODUCE MYSELF: Was one of 20 rookie pitchers to start more than 15 games this season...Among the 27 major league rookies to toss at least 75.0 innings this season, Megill ranked fifth in strikeouts per nine (9.94), ninth in walks per nine (2.71) and sixth in strikeouts per walk (3.67).

HOT LIKE THE JULY SUN: Megill received votes for both NL Pitcher of the Month and NL Rookie of the Month after posting a major league-leading 1.04 ERA in July (min. 25.0 IP)...Only two other pitchers in Mets history have had a better ERA in the month of July: Jon Matlack had 0.86 ERA in July 1972 and Rick Aguilera had a 0.89 ERA in July 1985.

FANTASTIC FOUR: The Mets won the first four of Megill's starts this season... The last time the Mets won four straight starts to begin a pitcher's tenure with the team was in 2019, when New York won each of Marcus Stroman's first four starts after he was acquired in July of that year...The only pitcher who began his career with the Mets with a longer streak of team wins in his starts to start his career is Terry Leach (Mets won his first five career starts, but they were spread over five seasons from 1981-1985 with dozens of relief appearances between them).

THE RIGHT STUFF: Megill held right-handed batters to a .200 batting average, the 10th-best mark in the NL (min. 175 batters faced)...His .244 opponent OBP against righties ranked fourth in the NL behind Max Scherzer (.211), Trevor Bauer (.227) and Corbin Burnes (.232).

HIGHLIGHTS: Megill posted a 2.04 ERA through his first seven starts, becoming the 16th pitcher in the modern era to allow one or no runs in a start five times within his first seven career games...He blanked the Pirates for 6.0 innings on July 17 and shut out the Blue Jays for 6.0 frames in his next start on July 23...The last Mets rookie to have back-to-back scoreless starts of at least 6.0 innings was Steven Matz, who did so on April 29 and May 4, 2016...Megill and Nolan Ryan are the only Mets ever with two scoreless starts within their first six career games.

I JUST WANT TO CELEBRATE: Megill became the 11th pitcher in Mets history to start a game on his birthday... He is the first Mets player ever with a July 28 birthday...He hit a single and scored in the third inning...Only three other Mets pitchers have recorded a hit on their birthday: Steven Matz (2018), Fernando Salas (2017) and Ron Darling (1986)...Darling is the only other Mets pitcher who has scored a run on his birthday (he scored twice).

MTA-GILL: Megill's first entry in the Subway Series rivalry was a 7.0-inning gem, his longest start of the season...He racked up a season-high 10 strikeouts for his first career double-digit strikeout performance on September 10 at Citi Field...Joined Steven Matz (2015) and Hisanori Takahashi (2010) as the only Mets rookie starting pitchers to beat the Yankees in the regular season and tied Masato Yoshii (June 28, 1998) for the most strikeouts by a Mets rookie against the Yankees...Became the first Met rookie since David Peterson (September 19, 2020) to strike out 10 batters in a game.

FINISHED STRONG: Megill snapped a streak of six straight starts allowing multiple runs in his final outing of the season, October 1 at Atlanta...He threw 5.0 shutout innings against the NL East champs, allowing just one hit with a walk and six strikeouts.

2021 IN THE MINORS: Megill made eight starts between Binghamton (AA) and Syracuse (AAA) this season...He was 2-1 with a 3.35 ERA (15 earned runs/40.1 innings), walked 12 and struck out 59...He averaged 13.16 strikeouts per 9.0 innings and walked just 2.68 per 9.0 IP.

AT THE PLATE: After going 0-7 in his first five starts, Megill finished the year batting .286/.318/.429 in his final 13 starts (starting July 23), going 6-21 with three doubles, a run scored and a walk...From July 23 through the end of the season, no pitcher besides Shohei Ohtani had more doubles and just Ohtani and German Marquez had more hits.

MAJOR LEAGUE GENES: Tylor's brother Trevor plays in the Chicago Cubs system...Trevor also made his major league debut this season...Elias notes that there have been three other pairs of brothers to make their major league debut in the same season since 2000: Scott & Tyler Heineman, (2019), Joe & A.J. Jimenez (2017) and Donovan & Jhonatan Solano (2012).

PETERSON NEWS & NOTES

INJURIES: Was placed on the 10-Day Injured List on July 1 with right side soreness...In a separate injury, Peterson later underwent surgery to repair a right foot fifth metatarsal fixation on July 27...Dr. Mark Drakos at the Hospital for Special Surgery performed the procedure...Peterson missed the remainder of the year.

STRONG STRETCH: In three starts from June 14-25, he went 1-0 with a 1.08 ERA (two earned runs/16.2 innings), allowed just six hits and struck out 14.

HOME COOKING: Peterson went 2-2 with a 2.84 ERA (10 earned runs/31.2 innings) with 27 strikeouts in six starts at Citi Field...He tossed a quality start in five of his six outings at home...Peterson has compiled a 5-2 mark with a 3.26 ERA (18 earned runs/49.2 innings) in 10 career starts at home.

ON THE ROAD: Peterson was 0-4 with a 7.97 ERA (31 earned runs/35.0 innings) in nine starts away from Citi Field...His 7.97 road ERA was the highest in franchise history (min. 35.0 innings).

TIMES ARE CHANGIN': Peterson limited his opponents to eight hits off his changeup in 42 at-bats ending with the pitch (.190 BAA)...Last season, his foes hit .333 (12-36) off his changeup...Peterson threw 183 changeups this year and 175 were thrown to right-handed batters.

INCREASE IN K/PER 9: In 2021, Peterson averaged 9.31 strikeouts per nine innings...In his rookie campaign in 2020, he averaged 7.22 strikeout per nine.

RAMMING DOWN RIGHTIES: Since his debut in 2020, Peterson is 24th in the NL with a .231 (70-320) opponent's batting average vs. right-handed batters...It is the eighth-best mark against righties among National League lefties.

LEFTIES: Peterson joined Jerry Koosman (1968), Jon Matlack (1973-1975), Sid Fernandez (1986-1987), Jason Jacome (1995) and Jon Niese (2010-2012) as the only left-handers in team history to start one of the team's first three games of the year at age 25 or younger when he started on April 7 at Philadelphia.

CLOSE GAMES: All seven of Peterson's starts from April 27-June 2 came in games decided by one run...That was the longest streak in the majors since 2017, when Jimmy Nelson started seven one-run games in a row...This streak ties Ron Darling's (July 25-August 27, 1988) for the longest by a Met...The last major leaguer to start eight consecutive one-run games was San Diego's Tim Worrell (August 4-September 15, 1993).

LUCKY SEVEN: Peterson allowed one earned run on three hits over 6.0 innings with 10 strikeouts on April 14 vs. Philadelphia...He did not issue a walk...He became the seventh left-hander in Mets history to strikeout 10 or more and not issue a free pass...The last left-hander to do so was Chris Capuano on August 26, 2011...In addition, Peterson tied his career-high with 10 strikeouts in that game...He also recorded 10 strikeouts on September 19, 2020 vs. Atlanta.

LONG OUTING: He worked a career-high 7.1 innings on May 14 at Tampa Bay...He surrendered four hits, two runs, earned, issued two walks and struck out nine in a no-decision.

STROMAN NEWS & NOTES

MR. RELIABLE: After opting out of the 2020 season, Stroman made a career-high-tying 33 starts this season, tied for the major league lead with six others...The 33 starts match his total from 2017 with Toronto and were the most by a Mets pitcher since Bartolo Colón made 33 starts in 2016...He has made 30 or more starts in four of the five full seasons since 2016, tied for the most such campaigns in the majors...Stroman did not miss a scheduled start this season and pitched 5.0 innings or more in 29 of 33 starts...In the four starts in which he did not complete 5.0 innings, one (April 11 vs. Miami) was suspended after 0.1 inning due to rain...Another (June 22 vs. Atlanta) ended prematurely for Stroman due to injury, a sore left hip that did not require an IL stint nor cost him any more time than that one outing.

ON THE MARC: Stroman finished the season ninth in majors and eighth in the NL with a 3.02 ERA, the best full-season mark of his career (min. 162.0 IP)...Ranked 13th in the majors and 10th in the NL in ERA+ (133)...He finished the season 16th in the NL with 179.0 IP despite more than a quarter of his starts coming in seven-inning doubleheader games...Landed 10th in the NL with a 2.21 BB/9 ratio...Stroman finished the season with a 0.86 HR/9 ratio, good for sixth in the NL and ninth in the majors...Stroman ranked seventh in the majors and fifth the NL with a 50.8 percent ground ball rate.

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS: Stroman began the year with wins in each of his first three starts (not counting his suspended game start on April 11)...He allowed one or no earned runs in each of his first five outings and allowed more than two earned runs only twice in 11 April/May starts...He twice tossed a season-high 8.0 innings, once at Coors Field on April 18 and again in Cincinnati in his finest outing of the year, a one-hit performance on July 21...He set a season-high with nine strikeouts at San Francisco on August 17 against the club that finished with the top record in the majors this season...He crossed the 1,000-inning threshold for his career on August 28 vs. Washington...Kept his ERA under 3.00 all season until his final two starts.

CAREER YEAR: Stroman set career-bests in ERA (3.02), WHIP (1.15), strikeout rate (21.6%), walk rate (6.0%), hits per nine innings (8.09) and K-BB ratio (3.59).

THIRD TIME THROUGH: Stroman posted a .208 batting average the third time through the order, the fourth-lowest mark among NL pitchers (min. 150 batters faced the third time through the order)...Only Max Scherzer (.158), Walker Buehler (.175) and Adam Wainwright (.180) had lower marks...Among pitchers with at least 150 batters faced the third time through the order, Stroman posted a .647 OPS, the seventh-best mark in the NL.

STROADMAN: Stroman ranked seventh in the majors this year with a 3.03 ERA on the road (34 earned runs/101.0 innings)...Has made 22 road starts since arriving to the Mets in 2019...His 3.02 road ERA (43 earned runs/128.1 innings) ranks fourth in Mets history (min. 20 road starts) behind Tom Seaver (2.63), Walt Terrell (2.88) and Jacob deGrom (2.94).

ELECTRIC SLIDER: Stroman relied on his slider about a quarter of the time this season (22.8 percent)...In 162 plate appearances ending with the slider, batters hit .184 (28-152) with 52 strikeouts...In the second half, opponents slashed .164/.203/.288 against the pitch...His .164 BAA vs. his slider ranked seventh in the majors and his .210 wOBA against the slider ranked fifth in MLB after the break.

FEELING SIX-Y: The Mets went 11-6 in games where Stroman went at least 6.0 innings this year and 5-11 when he did not complete 6.0 IP...Stroman completed at least 6.0 innings in eight straight starts (May 11-June 17) before leaving in the second inning due to injury on June 22...Those eight consecutive 6.0+ inning starts were good for the longest streak of his career...Stroman had a 2.50 ERA (14 earned runs/50.1 innings) over that stretch.

HIGH FIVE: Stroman threw 5.0 innings or more and allowed two earned runs or fewer in 21 of his 33 starts this season, a total topped by just three pitchers this season, the Dodgers' Walker Buehler (25), Julio Uriás (23) and Max Scherzer (22)...He allowed two earned runs or fewer in 24 starts this year, tied for second in the major leagues behind Buehler (25 such starts).

SWING AND A MISS: Stroman recorded the ninth-highest whiff percentage (47.9) among the 35 pitchers with 400 pitches swung at outside the strike zone.

EXTRA, EXTRA: Stroman allowed 43 extra-base hits this season, tied for the fifth-fewest among all 39 pitchers in the majors who qualified for the ERA title this year...He ranked 13th in the majors in opponent SLG (.362).

WALKER THE PURPLE CARPET: Walker made his first career All-Star roster in 2021...At the time of his selection, he was 7-3 with a 2.50 ERA in his stellar first half...He appeared in the Midsummer Classic at Coors Field, pitching one inning...He allowed a solo homer to Mike Zunino and struck out one...Walker was chosen as a replacement for teammate Jacob deGrom.

TALE OF TWO HALVES: Entered the break ranked 12th in the majors and ninth in the National League with a 2.50 ERA...Walker's numbers declined in the second half after his All-Star level performance in the first half...He went 0-8 with a 7.13 ERA (51 earned runs/64.1 innings) in 13 second-half starts...Allowed 20 home runs in 64.1 innings after the break after surrendering just six in 94.2 innings before the break...Opponents had an .861 OPS against him after the All-Star game, compared to a .573 OPS against Walker in the first half.
