OCTOBER BASEBALL: The Yankees will play Game 3 of the ALDS tonight at Kansas City (1-1 so far).

- ▶ Marks their 24th appearance in the ALDS...have advanced in 14 of their previous 23 ALDS
- Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29). Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995)...their 25 trips to the postseason since 1995 are the most in the Majors in that span, four more than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the
- than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the next highest AL team (Boston & Cleveland: 14).

 Are one of just four teams to make the playoffs in at least seven of the last eight years (since 2017), joining the Dodgers (eight: 2017-24), Astros (eight: 2017-24) and Braves (seven: 2018-24).

WHERE WE LEFT OFF: The Yankees fell to the Royals, 4-2, in ALDS Game 2 on Monday at Yankee Stadium...LHP Carlos Rodón (3.2IP, 7H, 4R/ER, 0BB, 7K, 1HR, 1WP) made his third career postseason appearance (second start) and took the loss after allowing 4R/ER over 3.2IP...DH Giancarlo Stanton (1-forafter allowing 4H/ER over 3.2IP...DH Giancarlo Stanton (1-for-4, 1RBI) drove in the Yankees' first run with an RBI single in the third inning...3B Jazz Chisholm Jr. (1-for-4, 1R, 1HR, 1RBI) hit his first career postseason HR with a solo HR in the ninth inning... CF Aaron Judge (1-for-3, 1BB), 2B Gleyber Torres (0-for-3, 1R, 2BB) and SS Anthony Volpe (1-for-3, 1BB, 1SB) each reached base multiple times...1B Jon Berti (1-for-4) made his first career Major League appearance at first base...Yankees relievers combined to toss 5.1 scoreless innings, striking out 8-of-20BF.

STRIKEOUT MACHINE: Yankees pitchers struck out 15 batters in ALDS Game 2 vs. Kansas City, matching their most strikeouts in a postseason game in franchise history (also 15K in 2000 ALCS Game 4 at Seattle and 15K in 2017 ALDS Game 5 at Cleveland).

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

TURNING POINT: When entering ALDS Game 3 tied 1-1, the Yankees have gone 6-7 in Game 3...in those 13 ALDS, the team that won Game 3 has won 11-of-13 series (the Yankees won 2022 ALDS vs. Cleveland after losing Game 3 and lost 1997 ALDS vs. Cleveland after winning Game 3)...are 14-9 all-time in ALDS Game 3's.

MATCHING UP: The Yankees are facing the Royals in the postseason for the fifth time: also the 1980 ALCS (0-3), 1978 ALCS (3-1), 1977 ALCS (3-2) and 1976 ALCS (3-2).

FIRST THINGS FIRST: INF Jon Berti made his first career Major League appearance at first base in ALDS Game 2...according to MLB Network/Elias, became the third player in Major League history to start at a position for the first time during the postseason (min. 300 regular season games played)...joined Cleveland's Carlos Santana (LF in Game 3 of 2016 World Series) and St. Louis' Jake Flowers (3B in Game 2 of 1931 World Series).

VERDAWGO: OF Alex Verdugo has reached base in 4-of-8PA this postseason, going 3-for-7 (.429) with 2R, 1RBI and 1BB...has reached base in 12 of 13 career postseason games, hitting .327/.400/.449 (16-for-49) with 7R, 3 doubles, 1HR, 7RBI, 6BB and 1SB.

GLEYBER DAY: INF Gleyber Torres has reached base in 5-of-10PA this postseason (1H, 4BB)...has reached base in 27 of 33 career postseason games, batting .275/.374/.467 (33-for-120) with 21R, 5 doubles, 6HR, 19RBI, 19BB and 6SB.

Including the postseason, has reached base safely in 50 of his last 52 games (since 8/2), batting .302/.380/.425 (64-for-212) with 36R, 8 doubles, 6HR, 23RBI, 28BB and 2SF over that span...has reached base multiple times in 31 of those games

ROAD WARRIORS: The Yankees were a Major League-best 50-31 (617) on the road during the regular season...their 50 road wins were their most in a single season in the last 21 years (since 2004) and their most since their 51 wins in 2003...their 50 road wins were ted for their eighth-most in a single season in franchise history.

▶ Went 17-9 in their final 26 road games (7/27-9/22).

SCHMIDT'S CREEK: RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his first career

- SCHMIDT'S CREEK: RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his first career postseason start and fourth postseason appearance tonight at Kauffman Stadium...in 16 starts this season, went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 71H, 31R/27ER, 30BB, 93K, 8HR)...allowed 3R-orfewer in 15 of his 16 starts, including 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those starts and one-or-zero runs in five of those starts.

 ▶ Allowed 3R-or-fewer in each of his first 15 starts of the season from 3/31-9/24...was just the second pitcher in Yankees history to allow 3R-or-fewer in each of his first 15 starts of a season, joining Ron Guidry (also first 15 starts in 1978)... allowed 3R-or-fewer in 17 straight starts from 9/25/23-9/24/24, the third-longest such streak in franchise history, trailing only Russ Ford (20GS from 8/9(G2)/1910-5/27(G2)/1911) and Nestor Cortes (19GS from 8/15/21-6/2(G1)/22).

 ▶ In eight road starts this season, went 3-3 with a 1.39 ERA (45.1IP,

In eight road starts this season, went 3-3 with a 1.39 ERA (45.1IP, 7ER)...allowed 1ER-or-fewer in each of his final seven road starts from 4/13(G1)-9/19, going 3-3 with a 0.90 ERA (40.0IP, 4ER) over that stretch...his seven-start streak of 1ER-or-fewer on the road was tied with Al Downing's seven-start streak in 1968 for the longest single-season streak in franchise history (since ER became an official stat in 1913)...was also tied for the third-longest such streak in the Majors in the last 19 years (since 2006), trailing only Dylan Cease's nine-start streak from 5/7-8/11/22 and Kevin Gausman's eight-start streak from 4/1-5/30/21.

WALK IT OUT: Yankees batters have walked 13 times over their first two postseason games...marks just the third time in franchise history the Yankees have recorded as many walks over

franchise history the Yankees have recorded as many walks over their first two games of a postseason (16BB in first two playoff games in 2019 and 15BB in first two postseason games in 2020).

The Yankees' Major League-leading 672BB this year were their most in a single season in the last 21 years (since 2004) and most since their 684BB in 2003...marked just the fourth time in the last 74 years (since 1951) that the Yankees have recorded as many walks in a season (718BB in 1999, 684BB in 2003 and 676BB in 1997).

PEN PALS: Yankees relievers tossed 5.1 scoreless innings in ALDS Game 2 vs. Kansas City...have not allowed an earned run over 9.1 innings this postseason...have held the Royals to a .182/.250/.182 (6-for-33) slash line during the ALDS.

- RHP Clay Holmes has tossed 2.2 scoreless innings of relief this postseason...has not allowed a run over 10.2 innings in eight career postseason relief appearances...including the postseason, has gone 2-0 with one save, a 1.69 ERA (10.2IP, 2ER) and 10K in his last 12 relief appearances (since 9/8).
- PRHP Luke Weaver has not allowed an ER over his last 10 appearances (including the postseason), striking out 27-of-45BF and holding opponents to a .095/.156/.119 (4-for-42) slash line over that stretch...over his last 19 games (including the postseason since 8/16), has gone 3-0 with five saves and a 0.84 ERA (21.11P, 2ER) and 36K.

BRONX BOMBERS: During the regular season, Yankees batters led the Majors in home runs (237) and walks (672), ranked third in OBP (.333, first in AL), runs scored (815, first in AL), runs per game (5.03, first in AL), OPS (.761, first in AL) and pitches per plate appearance (3.99, second in AL), fourth in SLG (.429, second in AL) and ninth in BA (.248, fourth in AL), extra-base hits (495, fourth in AL) and PA/K (4.71, sixth in AL).

STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton drove in the Yankees' first run in ALDS Game 2 with an RBI single in the third inning...has recorded 25RBI in 29 career postseason games, including 24RBI in his last 23 playoff games (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).

ALL THAT JAZZ: INF/OF Jazz Chisholm Jr. hit his first career postseason home run in ALDS Game 2 with a solo HR in the ninth inning...in 48 games with the Yankees (including the postseason), has batted .272/.322/.505 (50-for-184) with 30R, 7 doubles, 12HR, 24RBI, 14BB and 19SB...has hit safely in 35 of his 48 games with the Yankees and has reached base safely in 37 of those games.

ALL RISE: OF Aaron Judge hit .322/.458/.701 (180-for-559) with 122R, 36 doubles, 1 triple, 58HR, 144RBI, 133BB, 9HP, 2SF and 10SB in 158G this season...led the Majors in HR, RBI, OBP, SLG, OPS (1.159), walks, times on base (322), game-winning RBI (24), go-ahead RBI (32) and WAR among position players (11.2 - FanGraphs), ranked second in total bases (392, first in AL) and extra-base hits (95, first in AL), third in BA (third in AL), fourth in runs scored (third in AL) and multi-hit games (55 second in AL) and eighth in hits (180 fifth in AL) games (55, second in AL) and eighth in hits (180, fifth in AL).

RHP Clarke Schmidt will make his fourth career postseason appearance (first start) in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City tonight...last pitched on 9/29 vs. Pittsburgh, allowing 4ER in 4.0IP without recording a decision (3H, 4BB, 5K, 2HP)... went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 27ER) in 16 starts this season allowed **3R-or-fewer in 15 straight starts from 3/31-9/24 and 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those games...his 15 straight starts of 3R-or-fewer is tied for the longest streak by a Yankees starter in their first 15 starts of a season in franchise history (also Ron Guidry's 15GS from 4/8-6/22/78)...** has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 35 of his last 39 starts (since 5/19/23)...in 2023, went 9-9 with a 4.64 ERA (159.0IP, 169H, 91R/82ER, 46BB, 149K, 24HR) in 33 games (32 starts) with the Yankees...has made three career Opening Day rosters (2022-24)...was selected by the Yankees in the first round (16th overall) of the 2017 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of South Carolina.

2024: Went 5-5 with a 2.85 ERA (85.1IP, 71H, 31R/27ER, 30BB, 93K, 8HR) in 16 starts this season...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 15 straight starts from 3/31-9/24 and 2R-or-fewer in 10 of those games...his 15 straight starts of 3R-or-fewer is tied for the longest streak by a Yankees starter to begin a season in franchise history (also Ron Guidry's 15GS from 4/8-6/22/78).

- Posted a career-best 17.2 scoreless innings streak from the fifth inning on 5/4 through the second inning on 5/21

- Recorded at least 6K in a career-high five consecutive starts from 5/4-26. Won three straight starts from 5/4-16, the second-longest streak of his career (won five consecutive starts from 6/29-7/29/23). Earned his fifth win of the year on 5/16 at Minnesota after tossing a career-high 8.0 scoreless innings (3H, 0BB, 8K, 1HP)...his 8K marked his most in a game this season and matched his career high (also 8K on 8/20/23 vs. Boston, 7/15/23 at Colorado, 4/28/23 at Texas and 4/23/23 vs. Toronto)... threw a career-high 103 pitches (previous: 102 on 4/19/24 vs. Tampa Bay)...is one of two Yankees pitchers this season to toss at least 8.0 scoreless innings in a game (also Nestor Cortes: 8.0IP, 0R on 4/8 vs. Miami).

ON A ROLL: Over his last 40 outings (39 starts) since 5/19/23, has gone 13-10 with a 3.57 ERA (204.1IP, 188H, 89R/81ER, 62BB, 194K, 24HR)...has allowed 3R-or-fewer in 35 of those 39 starts.

- Allowed 3R-or-fewer in 17 straight starts from 9/25/23-9/24/24), marking his longest such streak in his career and the third-longest such streak in franchise history, trailing only Russ Ford (20GS from 8/9(G2)/1910-5/27(G2)/1911) and Nestor Cortes (19GS from 8/15/21-6/2(G1)/22)... allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 13 of those starts.
