THE PIRATES: finished the season with a 71-91 (.438) record and in fifth place in the National League Central...Played in a Major League-high 60 one-run games (went 25-35 in those games; 16-9 at home and 9-26 on the road), their most in a season since also playing in 60 one-run games in 2014 (31-29)...Had the seventh-lowest staff ERA (3.76) in Major League Baseball...Used 57 players (tied for the 12th-most in all of MLB) and had nine players make their MLB debut.

TEAM LEADERS: **Oneil Cruz** paced the squad in home runs (20) and stolen bases (38), and his 38 steals were tied with New York's **Juan Soto** for the most in the National League...**Bryan Reynolds** led in hits (144), doubles (38), runs (68) and RBI (73)...**Andrew McCutchen** had the most walks (67) for the third straight season...**Paul Skenes** led the pitching staff in ERA (1.97), wins (10), innings pitched (187.2) and strikeouts (216)...**David Bednar** led the team in saves (17).

AWARD WINNERS: The Pittsburgh Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America voted **Andrew McCutchen** as the winner of the Chuck Tanner Award (most cooperative with the media)...**Paul Skenes** won the Steve Blass Award (the team's best pitcher) and the Roberto Clemente Award (team MVP).

PITCHING DOMINANCE: Pirates pitchers allowed one or zero runs in 42 games, the most in all of Major League Baseball (Chicago-NL ranked second with 40 such games)...Pittsburgh had 37 such games prior to September, the staff's most in that time frame since 1968 (39).

EXTRA! EXTRA! Pirates batters recorded at least one extra-base hit in each of their final 61 games, dating back to July 22 vs. Detroit...It marked their longest single-season streak since a 64-game streak from June 1-August 14, 2019.

ERA MOVEMENT: The Pirates' team ERA improved from 5.08 in 2021 to 4.66 in 2022 to 4.60 in 2023 to 4.15 in 2024 to 3.76 in 2025...It was the first time that they improved their team ERA in four straight seasons since the stat became official in the National League in 1912...No other MLB team has improved its team ERA in each of the last four seasons.

SHUT 'EM DOWN: The Pirates had a Major League-best 19 shutouts, tied with 1968 for their second-most in a season in the Live Ball Era (since 1920), behind only 1992 (20)...Pittsburgh had 15 of the 19 shutouts at home, its most home shutouts in a season since 1920...The 15 home shutouts were the most by any team since New York-NL (16) in 2010.

HOW SWEEP IT IS: Pittsburgh swept seven series (all three-game series), including sweeps of National League East champion Philadelphia (June 6-8), American League wild card Detroit (July 21-23) and National League West champion Los Angeles (September 2-4)...Each of the Pirates' seven sweeps came from June 6 onward, tied with New York (AL) and Toronto for the third-most in all of Major League Baseball in that time, trailing only Milwaukee (10) and Seattle (nine)...Their seven series sweeps of at least three games were their most in any season since 2015 (11 such sweeps).

OFF AND RUNNING: The Pirates began their 139th season of professional baseball in the National League with a 5-4 loss on March 27 at Miami...It was the earliest Pittsburgh has started a season, surpassing the previous date of March 28 (2019 and 2024)...The Pirates have gone 74-65 in 139 National League openers (57-50 on the road and 17-15 at home).

SAME-CITY OPENERS: The Pirates opened at Miami's loanDepot park for the second consecutive year...It marked the first time that Pittsburgh began the season on the road in the same city since opening in St. Louis in both 1982 and 1983.

PITTSBURGH STEALERS: Pittsburgh had six stolen bases on Opening Day (March 27) at Miami, a club record for the most steals in a season opener (it marked the Pirates' most steals in an away game since also stealing six bases on May 25, 1981 at Wrigley Field)...The Pirates stole 14 bases through the first three games of the season, a club record since at least 1900, per the Elias Sports Bureau (the previous record was 10 in 1907)...The only other Major League team in the Live Ball Era (since 1920) to record 14 stolen bases through their first three games was the 1984 Cleveland Indians.

FAST FACT: Pittsburgh stole 19 bases through its first seven games, the most by any National League team since the 1913 New York Giants (23) and tied for the Pirates' most in any seven-game span this century (also April 23-30, 2023).

412 DAY: The Pirates' Home Opener was played on April 4 vs. New York (AL)...It marked their third straight Home Opener against an American League team (also 2023 vs. Chicago and 2024 vs. Baltimore)...Per the Elias Sports Bureau, the only other Major League team to have interleague play for three straight Home Openers since the league moved to year-round interleague in 2013 was Texas (2022-24)...Pittsburgh will open its 2026 home slate on April 3 vs. Baltimore.

WE'RE #1: Catcher **Henry Davis** (the first-overall draft selection in 2021) and pitcher **Paul Skenes** (the top pick in 2023) became the first pitcher-catcher battery composed of two former number-one draft picks to play in a game together when they did that in a 10-3 win on April 14 vs. Washington...Skenes struck out six batters over his 6.0 innings in the victory.

RARE OCCURRENCE: Pittsburgh's 1-0 win on April 17 vs. Washington was its second 1-0 victory with the run coming via leadoff home run since at least 1900, per the Elias Sports Bureau (**Oneil Cruz** hit his first career leadoff home run in the win)...That also happened in a six-inning victory on September 14, 1993 at Florida, when **Carlos Garcia** hit a leadoff bomb...Cruz also hit his first career grand slam in his final at-bat of the Pirates' 6-1 win on April 16 vs. the Nationals...According to OptaStats, he became one of only nine players in Major League history to hit a grand slam and a leadoff home run in a 1-0 victory in the same season, and he was the only one to do that in back-to-back games (either order).

NEW MAN IN CHARGE: **Don Kelly**, who was born in Butler, Pennsylvania, and played in 25 games with the Pirates in 2007, became the 42nd manager in team history on May 8...**Derek Shelton** was relieved of his duties following a 12-26 start to the season...Kelly led Pittsburgh to a 3-2 win in his managerial debut on May 9 vs. Atlanta...The Pirates' 3.59 staff ERA from May 9 until the end of the season ranked fourth in all of Major League Baseball, behind Milwaukee (3.38), Texas (3.46) and Cleveland (3.52)...Their .988 fielding percentage from May 9 onward ranked sixth in Major League Baseball...Pittsburgh's 37-25 (.597) record at PNC Park under Kelly was the ninth-best home mark in the league...The Pirates recorded a 59-65 overall record under Kelly, including a 32-33 mark following the All-Star break...The 45-year-old Kelly, who played collegiately at Point Park College from 1999-2001, had his contract extended on September 29.

LATE NIGHT BUCN: The start of the game on June 5 vs. Houston was delayed by weather from 6:40 p.m. to 10:02 p.m...It was the latest start for a game in Pittsburgh since July 6, 1987, when the second game of a doubleheader vs. San Francisco at Three Rivers Stadium did not begin until 10:07 p.m. due to a weather delay...The June 5 game was the second in PNC Park history (since 2001) to begin at 10 p.m. or later...The other came on June 4, 2010 vs. San Francisco, when the game's start was delayed by weather and did not begin until exactly 10 p.m. (the Giants won, 6-4).

FOUR SCORE: The Pirates went 46-21 when scoring at least four runs, including 32-9 over their final 41 such games (since June 6 vs. Philadelphia)...Their .780 winning percentage in such games from June 6 onward was seventh in MLB.

YOU ALWAYS REMEMBER YOUR FIRST: **Isaac Mattson** and **Braxton Ashcraft** each earned their first Major League win in Pittsburgh's consecutive victories on June 7 and June 8 vs. Philadelphia, respectively...Per the Elias Sports Bureau, they became only the second pair of Pittsburgh relievers since at least 1893 to each earn their first Major League win in back-to-back team games, along with **Rick White** and **Ravelo Manzanillo** (April 15-16, 1994 vs. Los Angeles-NL).

FOR STARTERS: Pittsburgh starting pitchers recorded at least 10 outs in each of the first 79 games (the streak was snapped on June 23 at Milwaukee)...It was the longest such streak by any Major League team at any point in 2025, and it was the Pirates' longest such streak to begin a season during the Modern Era (since 1901)...It was Pittsburgh's longest such streak at any point of a season since its starters did that in 100 consecutive games from May 10-August 29, 2012.

HOW OFFENSIVE: The Pirates outscored the Mets by 26 runs (30-4) from June 27-29...Per the Elias Sports Bureau, Pittsburgh's +26 run differential was tied for its fourth-best in a three-game series in team history (also outscored the Boston Beaneaters by 26 runs from August 9-11, 1887, when the team was known as the Pittsburgh Alleghenys), trailing May 13-1935 at Philadelphia (+31), September 15-16, 1975 at Chicago (+29) and July 20-21, 1940 vs. Boston (+27)...The Pirates became the only MLB team since 1901 to score at least 30 runs, allow four or fewer runs and strike out at least 25 batters in a three-game series.

LUCKY NO. 7: The Pirates won each game of their three-game sweep from June 27-29 against New York (NL) at PNC Park by at least seven runs (9-1 on June 27, 9-2 on June 28 and 12-1 on June 29)...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it marked only the third time in franchise history that they won each game of a three-game series by at least seven runs...Pittsburgh also accomplished that feat from May 29-30, 1893 vs. Baltimore and May 13-15, 1935 at Philadelphia.

4x7: During each of their four straight wins from June 27-30, the Pirates scored at least seven runs in every game and allowed two or fewer runs in every game... Per the Elias Sports Bureau, it marked just the third time in team history that Pittsburgh scored at least seven runs and allowed two or fewer runs in every game of a four-game winning streak...The Pirates also accomplished that twice during separate four-game winning streaks in 1911 (July 24-27 and July 29-August 1).

HISTORIC HOMESTAND: The Pirates outscored their opponents, 43-4, during a 6-0 homestand from June 27-July 2 (they swept New York-NL from June 27-29 and St. Louis from June 30-July 2)...They became the only Major League team during the Modern Era (since 1901) to score 43 or more runs and allow four or fewer runs over any six-game span...Pittsburgh's +39 run differential marked its best in any six-game span since posting a +40 run differential (53-13) from September 15-19, 1975...In the three-game sweep of the Cardinals, the Pirates didn't allow a run, marking just the third time since at least 1901 where they didn't allow a run in an entire three-game series (also June 4-6, 1903 vs. Boston and October 2-3, 1976 vs. St. Louis)...It was also Pittsburgh's first perfect homestand of at least six games since it won each of its seven games from June 28-July 4, 2004 vs. St. Louis (June 28-30, 3-0) and Milwaukee (July 2-4, 4-0).

CASHING IN AT PNC: With his third-inning strikeout of **Masyn Winn** in the Pirates' 5-0 win on July 2 vs. St. Louis, **Mitch Keller** became PNC Park's all-time strikeouts leader (since 2001), surpassing **Paul Maholm** (383)...Keller also ranks second in stadium history with 83 games started, behind only Maholm (100).

PERFECTO FOR GREENSBORO: Three pitchers combined on a perfect game when the High A-Greensboro Grasshoppers defeated the Aberdeen IronBirds, 2-0, on July 4...**Khristian Curtis** started and struck out 10 batters in 6.0 innings...**Jake Shirk** followed with 2.0 perfect frames, fanning four batters...**Michael Walsh** wrapped it up with two strikeouts in the ninth inning...It was the first nine-inning perfect game for any full-season team in the minors since 2017...It was also the first perfect game for a Pirates affiliate since **John Wasdin** retired 27 batters for the Triple-A Nashville Sounds on April 7, 2003 vs. Albuquerque.

SHOOTING BLANKS: After shutting out St. Louis in a three-game sweep from June 30-July 2, the Pirates were blanked in three straight games at Seattle from July 4-6...Per the Elias Sports Bureau, they became one of five teams in Major League history to participate in six straight shutouts, along with the 1903 Pirates, the 1919 Chicago Cubs, the 1949 Chicago White Sox and the 1953 Washington Senators...It also marked the eighth time in the Modern Era (since 1901) that they were shut out in three consecutive games...Prior to this season, that had not happened since 1968, when it happened twice (August 3-5 and August 28-30).

PERFECTO #2 FOR GREENSBORO: High-A Greensboro tossed its second perfect game in nine games with a 4-0 win on July 13 vs. the Bowling Green Hot Rods...**Hung-Leng Chang** (5.0ip), **Joshua Loeschorn** (2.0ip), **Jake Shirk** (1.0ip) and **Jarod Bayless** (1.0ip) combined to strike out seven batters in the win.

CRUZ CONTROL: **Oneil Cruz** participated in Major League Baseball's Home Run Derby on July 14 at Atlanta's Truist Park, becoming the seventh Pirate to ever participate in the event and the first since **Josh Bell** in 2019 at Cleveland's Progressive Field...Cruz advanced to the semifinals, where he was defeated by Seattle's **Cal Raleigh**, the eventual champion, 19-13...He was the first Pirate to ever advance past the opening round, and his 34 total home runs were the most by a Pirate in the derby, surpassing Bell (18)...Cruz' 20 home runs in the regular season were tied for the second-most among National League center fielders.

PAUL-STAR GAME: **Paul Skenes** started for the National League in the Major League Baseball All-Star Game on July 15 at Atlanta's Truist Park (he was named the starter by manager **Dave Roberts** on July 12)...It marked his second straight ASG start, making him the first pitcher and one of five players ever to start in the All-Star Game in each of his first two Major League seasons, per the Elias Sports Bureau...He joined **Joe DiMaggio** (seven, 1936-42), **Ichiro Suzuki** (four, 2001-04), **Rod Carew** (three, 1967-69) and **Frank Robinson** (two, 1956-57)...Skenes struck out two batters and threw 14 pitches in his scoreless inning.

MAKE IT A DOUBLE: The Pirates recorded eight doubles in their 8-5 victory on July 22 vs. Detroit...It set a club record for most doubles in a game at PNC Park and marked the team's most in a game since August 24, 2002 at Milwaukee (nine)...Prior to that, the Pirates hadn't had at least eight doubles in a home game since August 4, 1998 vs. Colorado at Three Rivers Stadium (nine)...Pittsburgh had three players (**Spencer Horwitz**, **Tommy Pham** and **Oneil Cruz**) record multiple doubles on July 22, marking the first time that had happened for the team since **Brian Giles**, **Abraham Nunez** and **Pokey Reese** on August 24, 2002.

ELITE COMPANY: With his game-winning home run on July 28 at San Francisco, **Andrew McCutchen** reached 10 home runs for the 17th straight season (since 2009)...Per the Elias Sports Bureau, he became one of 11 players in Major League history to hit at least 10 home runs in each of his first 17 seasons, joining **Hank Aaron** (23, 1954-76), **Eddie Murray** (20, 1977-96), **Carl Yastrzemski** (20, 1961-80), **Barry Bonds** (19, 1986-2004), **Albert Pujols** (19, 2001-19), **Frank Robinson** (19, 1956-74), **Harold Baines** (18, 1980-87), **Mickey Mantle** (18, 1951-68), **Jeff Kent** (17, 1992-2008) and **Willie McCovey** (17, 1959-75).

EMPLOYEE OF THE MONTH: **Paul Skenes** was named the National League's Pitcher-of-the-Month for July after posting a 0.67 ERA (27.0ip/2er) across his five starts...He became the eighth different Pirates pitcher (10th instance) to win the award (which dates back to 1975), the first since **Iván Nova** in April 2017.

IN THE BIG INNING: In the Pirates' 17-16 loss on August 1 at Colorado, they became the second team in Major League history to have a first inning where they scored at least nine runs, recorded at least 10 hits, hit a grand slam (**Oneil Cruz**) and hit a three-run home run (**Andrew McCutchen**), according to OptaStats...The other instance came in the Cincinnati Reds' 30-12 victory over the Louisville Colonels on June 18, 1893...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Pittsburgh's 10 hits in the first inning were its most in any inning since also recording 10 hits in the ninth inning of an 18-2 win on August 6, 1959 at St. Louis.

THREE'S COMPANY: **Andrew McCutchen**, **Bryan Reynolds** and **Nick Gonzales** all had two hits in the first inning on August 1 at Colorado...It was the first time that the Pirates had three players with two hits in an inning since **Craig Wilson**, **Jason Bay** and **Jose Castillo** did that in the ninth inning of a 14-4 win on June 27, 2004 at Cincinnati...**Spencer Horwitz** also singled and walked in the inning, marking the first time the Pirates had four players reach base safely two times in an inning since Wilson, Bay, **Tike Redman**, **Randall Simon** and **Bobby Hill** did it in the second inning of an 11-0 win on July 9, 2004 at Montréal.

PEGGY'S THREE-HOMER DAY: **Liover Peguero** had three home runs and five RBI as the leadoff batter on August 2 at Colorado...He became the third Pirates player to hit three home runs and drive in all of the team's runs in a game, joining **Roberto Clemente** (May 15, 1967 at Cincinnati) and **Willie Stargell** (April 10, 1971 at Atlanta)...It was also the 24th three-home run game in team history, the first since **Michael Pérez** in an 8-7 win on June 30, 2022 vs. Milwaukee.

TAPPING THE ROCKIES: **Liover Peguero** hit three home runs and had five RBI out of the leadoff spot on August 2 at Colorado, while **Spencer Horwitz** hit two home runs and had six RBI while batting leadoff on August 3 at Coors Field...Per OptaStats, Pittsburgh became the first Major League team to get at least five RBI from its leadoff batter in consecutive team games since **RBI** became an official statistic in 1920...**Andrew McCutchen** (August 1), Peguero (August 2) and Horwitz (August 3) all had at least three hits and five RBI in their respective efforts, marking only the third time in Major League Baseball (since 1920) where a team had a player with at least three hits and five RBI in three straight team games, per the Elias Sports Bureau...That also happened for New York (AL) from August 23-25, 1939 (**Bill Dickey**, **Charlie Keller** and **Joe Gordon**) and Boston from May 9-11, 2016 (**Jackie Bradley Jr.**, **Travis Shaw** and Bradley Jr.).

30 SOMETHING: Pittsburgh and Colorado each scored exactly 30 runs in the three-game series from August 1-3...The Pirates' only other three-game series in the Modern Era (since 1901) where them and their opponent each scored at least 30 runs came from June 23-25, 1950 at Brooklyn (were outscored, 47-31).

A LONG TIME COMING: Pittsburgh walked off San Francisco in the ninth inning on August 4 after trailing, 4-3, after eight innings...It marked the Pirates' first and only victory of the season when trailing after eight innings...Prior to that night's win, Pittsburgh's last win when trailing after eight innings came on August 25, 2024 vs. Cincinnati...The Pirates had been 0-55 on the season when trailing after eight innings and had lost 71 consecutive games overall in such situations.

WALK THIS WAY: Pittsburgh had four games where a player drew four walks (**Oneil Cruz** on March 29 at Miami and May 3 vs. San Diego, **Joey Bart** on August 1 at Colorado and **Andrew McCutchen** on August 7 vs. Cincinnati)...The only other time in the Modern Era (since 1901) that the Pirates had four games where a player drew four walks in a season came in 1945 (also four)...They were the first Major League team to have four such games since Toronto in 2014.

WANNA BE STARTING SOMETHING: Pirates starting pitchers made five straight starts (from August 20 vs. Toronto to August 25 at St. Louis) where they allowed one or zero runs, issued one or zero walks and struck out at least five batters...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, they were one of just two Major League rotations since at least 1893 to accomplish that feat...Chicago (NL) also achieved that in five consecutive starts from September 29-October 3, 2015.

SPECIAL K: Pirates pitchers struck out 259 batters in the month of August, the sixth-most strikeouts in Major League Baseball...The 259 strikeouts were their third-most in a calendar month in the Modern Era (since 1901)...Pittsburgh pitchers struck out 268 batters in September 2015 and 264 batters in August 2019.

FINAL ACT: Pittsburgh allowed zero runs and zero walks in each of its final two home games (September 20-21 vs. the Athletics), marking the third time in the Modern Era (since 1901) that the Pirates did that in back-to-back games (also May 2-5, 1920 and July 12-13, 2001)...In the win on September 21, **Jared Triolo** and **Joey Bart** each had four hits (including a double and a home run) and three RBI...The only other time in the Modern Era where the Pirates had multiple players with such performances in a game came in a 20-10 win on August 1, 1970 at Atlanta, when **Bob Robertson**, **Willie Stargell** and **Jose Pagan** all did it.

HOME COOKING: The Pirates went 44-37 at PNC Park, their most home wins in a season since going 44-36 in 2018...Pittsburgh's .543 winning percentage at PNC Park was its sixth-best mark in stadium history (since 2001), behind only the 2015 (.654), 2014 (.630), 2013 (.617), 2012 (.556) and 2018 (.550) seasons.

NO FIREWORKS: Pittsburgh did not record a walkoff home run, marking only its fourth season in PNC Park history (since 2001) without a walkoff home run (also 2002, 2005 and 2007)...The Pirates were one of only four Major League teams without a walkoff home run (also Chicago-AL, Cincinnati and Philadelphia).

MINOR LEAGUE RECAP: Pittsburgh's minor league affiliates posted a .554 winning percentage, the third-best mark among all Major League organizations...It was the organization's best winning percentage since 2003 (.569)...Double-A Altoona, High-A Greensboro and the rookie-level DSL Pirates Black and Gold teams all advanced to the postseason...**Konnor Griffin** finished the season rated by MLB Pipeline and Baseball America as the No. 1 prospect in all of baseball...He became the second Pirates farmhand to ever be named Baseball America's Minor League Player of the Year, joining pitcher **Mike Bielecki** (1984).

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: **Hunter Barco** was the ninth Pirate to make his Major League debut on Sept. 23 at Cincinnati, joining **Thomas Harrington** (April 1 at Tampa Bay), **Tsung-Che Cheng** (April 9 vs. St. Louis), **Matt Gorski** (April 24 at Los Angeles-AL), **Braxton Ashcraft** (May 26 at Arizona), **Cam Sanders** (August 5 vs. San Francisco), **Bubba Chandler** (August 22 vs. Colorado), **Cam Devanney** (August 31 at Boston) & **Rafael Flores** (Sept. 17 vs. Chicago-NL).

INDISPENCEABLE: **Spencer Horwitz** had three hits (including two home runs), four RBI, two walks and three runs scored in the 9-3 win on September 26 at Atlanta...He became one of four Pirates in the Modern Era (since 1901) to post those stats or better in a game, joining **Ralph Kiner** (August 16, 1947 vs. St. Louis), **Brian Giles** (September 27, 2002 at Chicago-NL) and **Craig Wilson** (May 11, 2004 at Colorado)...His .314 (60-for-191) average from July 21 until the end of the season ranked seventh in Major League Baseball among those with at least 200 plate appearances (his .941 OPS in that time ranked ninth in MLB).

Paul Skenes • RHP • 23 yrs old • #30 • Service Time (2.000)

- Was selected to the National League All-Star team for the second straight season, the first Pirates player to earn All-Star recognition in each of his first two seasons...The last Major League pitcher to be an All-Star in their first two seasons was Yu Darvish, who had three straight All-Star selections to begin his career (2012-14).
- Became the third starting pitcher in franchise history to be named an All-Star in back-to-back years, joining Rip Sewell (1943 and 1944) and Bob Veale (1965 and 1966).
- Became the first pitcher in MLB history and one of five players ever to start in the All-Star Game in each of his first two big league seasons, along with Joe DiMaggio (seven years from 1936-42), Ichiro Suzuki (four years from 2001-04), Rod Carew (three years from 1967-69) and Frank Robinson (two year from 1956-57).
- Was the club's nominee for the national Roberto Clemente Award.
- Was the recipient of the Roberto Clemente Award (Team MVP) and the Steve Blass Award (Team's Best Pitcher), voted on by the Pittsburgh Chapter of the BBWAA.
- Was selected the 2025 Baseball Digest/Inside Edge MLB Pitcher of the Year - the first Pittsburgh pitcher to be naned MLB Pitcher of the Year by the publication in the award's 32-year history.
- Set the franchise record for most strikeouts by a RHP in a season (previous mark was 210 by Mitch Keller in 2023) and finished with the fifth-most strikeouts in a single season by a Pirates pitcher.
- Posted the first sub-2.00 ERA for a Major League starting pitcher since Justin Verlander's 1.75 ERA with the Astros in 2022.
- Also became just the fourth pitcher in the Live Ball Era (since 1920) to record an ERA as low as 1.97 in his age-23 season or younger, joining Dwight Gooden (1985, age 20 - 1.53), Vida Blue (1971, age 21 - 1.82) and Dean Chance (1964, age 23 - 1.65).
- Became the third Pittsburgh pitcher -- joining Wilbur Cooper (1.87 in 1916) and Babe Adams (1.98 in 1919) -- to finish a season with a sub-2.00 ERA.
- Is one of three Pirates pitchers -- joining Howie Camnitz (1908, 1909) and Babe Adams (1909, 1919) -- who have recorded multiple seasons with a sub-2.00 ERA and 130-plus innings pitched.
- Became the fifth pitcher in the Live Ball Era (since 1920) to produce back-to-back seasons with an ERA under 2.00 at any point in their careers (minimum: 20 starts), joining Hal Newhouser (1945-46), Sandy Koufax (1963-64), Greg Maddux (1994-95) and Clayton Kershaw (2013-14).
- His 1.96 career ERA is the lowest among pitchers who made at least 50 starts in their first two seasons (since 1920).
- Led the Major Leagues in ERA, becoming the first Pirates pitcher to do so since John Candelaria in 1977 (2.34).

- Led the National League in WHIP, tied for second in strikeouts, ranked fourth in innings pitched and fourth in batting average against.
- Produced 12 scoreless outings, the most by a Pirates starter since 1901...Trevor Williams had the previous low-mark with 11 in 2018.
- His 0.84 ERA in the first inning was the best in MLB.
- Was the Opening Day starter; at 22 years and 302 days, he became Pittsburgh's youngest O.D. starter since Frank Killen (22 years, 148 days) in 1893 and the youngest O.D. starter for any MLB team since Miami's José Fernández (21 years, 243 days) in 2014.
- Became the fastest No. 1 overall selection to make an Opening Day start...According to Major League Baseball, the previous quickest to do so were Mike Moore (top pick in 1981 and Opening Day starter in 1984) and Stephen Strasburg (top pick in 2009 and Opening Day starter in 2012).
- Struck out seven batters and was charged with two runs in 5.1ip and received a no-decision on Opening Day (3/27 at Miami) after leaving the game with a 4-1 lead.
