BACK IN THE POSTSEASON: After a 10-year drought, the Tigers advanced to the postseason for the 17th time in franchise history and the first time since 2014. The Tigers secured a Wild Card spot for the second time, joining the 2006 team. The Tigers swept the Astros in the Wild Card series, before falling to the Guardians in five games in the AL Division Series. Detroit, which was eight games under .500 after the game on August 10 at San Francisco, became the second MLB team ever to make the playoffs in a non-shortened season after being eight-or-more games under .500 in August or later, joining the 1973 New York Mets.

ABOUT THE POSTSEASON ROSTER: The Tigers featured a young roster throughout the postseason. During the Wild Card round, the average age of Detroit's 26-man roster was 26.47, which was the youngest playoff roster since Cleveland in 2022 (26.33). Prior to this year's postseason, only Matt Vierling had previous playoff experience. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the Tigers were the first team to have 0 or 1 players with previous postseason experience since the 2002 Los Angeles Angels.

SECOND-HALF SURGE: The Tigers posted a Major League best 31-13 record from August 11 until the end of the season. It was the team's best record over the final 44 games of a season since 2011, when Detroit went 32-12. The Tigers led the Majors with a 2.72 ERA (401.0IP/121ER) from August 11 until the end of the season, while also ranking first with a +62 run differential.

TRIPLE CROWN TARIK: Tarik Skubal won the American League Pitching Triple Crown, finishing first in wins (18), ERA (2.39) and strikeouts (228). He became the third pitcher in franchise history to win the Triple Crown, joining Justin Verlander (2011) and Hal Newhouser (1945). Detroit is the second organization to have three different pitchers win the Triple Crown since 1913, joining the Los Angeles Dodgers (Clayton Kershaw (2011), Sandy Koufax (three times) and Dazzy Vance (1924)).

SKUBAL SNACKS: In addition to leading the American League in the Triple Crown categories, Tarik Skubal also ranked highly in several other areas. He led the AL in FIP (2.51), fWAR (5.9), bWAR (6.3), opponent slugging percentage (.311) and opponent OPS (.558), while ranking second in WHIP (0.92), opponent on-base percentage (.247), strikeouts per 9.0 innings (10.69) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (6.51) and fourth in opponent batting average (.201), walks per 9.0 innings (1.64) and home runs per 9.0 innings (0.70).

KEEP CALM AND KERRY ON: Kerry Carpenter continued to be one of the most impactful hitters in the Tigers lineup in 2024. Despite only playing in 87 games due to injury, Carpenter led the team with 16 multi-RBI performances, while ranking second with 18 home runs and tied for third with 57 RBI. Among American League hitters with at least 250 plate appearances during the season, Carpenter ranked second in ISO (.303), third in slugging percentage (.587), sixth in home run rate (6.1%) and seventh in OPS (.932).

HOLTON DOWN THE OPPOSITION: Tyler Holton put together an impressive 2024 season, pitching in nearly every role for the Tigers bullpen. From June 29-September 18, Holton had a 4-0 record with six saves, a 0.38 ERA (47.1IP/2ER) and 37 strikeouts. Dating back to 1913, his 0.38 ERA was the lowest in any 33-game span by a Tigers pitcher (min. 40.0 innings), while it was the lowest for any MLB pitcher since Cla Meredith from July 23-September 26, 2006. For the season, Holton led all Major League pitchers (min. 90.0 innings) with a 0.78 WHIP, a .173 opponent batting average, a .222 opponent on-base percentage and a .500 opponent OPS, while ranking second with a 2.79 opponent slugging percentage and third with a 2.19 ERA (94.1IP/23ER).

OUT OF THE PARKER: Parker Meadows returned from the injured list on August 3 and was a key contributor over the final two months of the season. Over 47 games from August 3 until the end of the season, Meadows slashed

.296/.340/.500 with 10 doubles, five triples, six home runs and 23 RBI. Meadows had a 2.0 fWAR in that span, which ranked tied for fifth in the American League. On September 5 at San Diego with the Tigers trailing 3-0, Meadows hit a go-ahead grand slam with two outs and two strikes in the top of the ninth. Prior to his blast, the last Tigers go-ahead grand slam when trailing with two strikes and two outs in the ninth came on June 21, 1988 vs. New York (AL) when Alan Trammell hit a grand slam off Cecilio Guante. According to Stats Perform, it was just the second grand slam by a team on the road, down by three and an out away from being shut out, joining Ted Williams, who did so on August 27, 1955 vs. Detroit.

CHIEF KEITH: Colt Keith finished the season with a team-leading 35 multi-hit games, which was tied for the best among American League rookies and tied for fourth among all rookies. Keith became Detroit's second rookie since 1988 to log 130-or-more hits, 30-or-more extra-base hits and 60-or-more RBI in a season, joining Nick Castellanos in 2014. From May 8 until the end of the season, Keith ranked fourth among MLB rookies (min. 200 plate appearances) in batting average (.284), hits (118) and total bases (178) and fifth in RBI (53).

ON THE MOUND: The Tigers pitching staff ranked among the best in the Majors throughout the season. Detroit finished the season with a 3.61 team ERA (1447.0IP/581ER), which ranked third in the American League and fourth in the Majors. It marked Detroit's lowest season ERA since also having a 3.61 ERA in 2013. The Tigers finished second in the big leagues with a 1.16 WHIP, 3.72 FIP, .292 opponent on-base percentage, .372 opponent slugging percentage, .664 opponent OPS and 2.59 walks per 9.0 innings and fourth with a 3.25 strikeout-to-walk ratio and 0.99 home runs per 9.0 innings.

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: Riley Greene and Tarik Skubal were selected to the American League All-Star Team for the first time in their career. Both players were voted in through the player ballot. It was the first time the Tigers have had multiple All-Stars (not counting 2022 when Miguel Cabrera was a Commissioner's selection) since 2017. Greene was the Tigers youngest All-Star outfielder since Willie Horton in 1965, while Skubal was the first homegrown Detroit starting pitcher to be selected to the All-Star Game since Justin Verlander in 2013.

ONE-RUN GAMES: The Tigers finished the season with a 31-24 record in one-run games. Detroit won 13 of its last 15 games decided by one run. The Tigers 55 one-run games was tied with Seattle for the most in the Majors and were the most in a season for Detroit since also playing 55 in 1976.

LEADING OFF WITH A BANG: The Tigers recorded nine leadoff homers during the 2024 season with Matt Vierling hitting three, Riley Greene and Parker Meadows two each and Andy Ibáñez and Wenceel Pérez one apiece. The nine leadoff round-trippers were the most in a season for Detroit in franchise history, besting the previous mark of eight, which happened in 2016, 2009 and 2007.

ALL GAS. NO BRAKES: One of the major keys to the Tigers success in the second half of the season was their athleticism and aggressiveness on the basepaths. From August 1 until the end of the season, Detroit led the Majors by going first to third 41 times. During that stretch, the Tigers were thrown out just once, posting a 97.6% success rate. DOWN ON THE FARM: In addition to the success of the Major League club, the Tigers throughout strong performances had the organization in 2024. Four of Detroit's affiliates advanced to the postseason this season, led by Double A Erie, which won the Eastern League championship for the second straight year, and the FCL Tigers, which won the Complex League. Single A Lakeland advanced to the Florida State League championship series and the DSL Tigers 2 advanced to the Dominican Summer League playoffs.

Akil Baddoo (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Saw time with both Detroit and Triple A Toledo in 2024...played in 31 games with the Tigers, batting .137/.220/.301 with two doubles, two triples, two homers and five RBI, while he hit .238/.340/.418 with 21 doubles, five triples, nine homer runs and 35 RBI in 82 games with the Mud Hens.
- Made his season debut for the Tigers on May 12 vs. Houston, where he entered as a defensive replacement and went 1x1 with a triple.
- Drew two walks in the second inning on June 15 against Houston...he was the first Tigers player to draw multiple walks in an inning since Austin Jackson on August 23, 2010 vs. Kansas City.
- Launched a two-run home run on June 23 vs. Chicago (AL) to give Detroit a 5-0 lead in the first...notched his second homer of the year...marked the fourth first inning extra-base hit by the Tigers, a feat last accomplished in the first frame on August 8, 2020 at Pittsburgh.
- Provided the walk-off dramatics in the 10th inning on August 14 vs. Seattle with a double to center field...marked his second career walk-off hit (other, April 6, 2021 vs. Minnesota)...notched Detroit's fifth walk-off win of the year and fourth since July 13.

Javier Báez (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Was limited to 80 games with the Tigers in 2024, hitting .184/.221/.294 with 12 doubles, six home runs and 37 RBI.
- Had a pair of stolen bases on April 21 vs. Minnesota, recording the 11th multistolen base game of his career.
- Reached base safely in 12 out of 13 games with at least one at-bat from April 14-30, including hits in 10 of those games.
- Went 3x5 on May 17 at Arizona with two doubles and five RBI...marked his fifth career game with five-or-more RBI (last, July 14, 2018 at San Diego).
- Went 4x5 on May 18 at Arizona with two doubles and a RBI...recorded his ninth career four-hit game and posted consecutive games with three-or-more hits for the second time in his career (other, three straight from April 13-16, 2019)... became the first Tiger with back-to-back multi-double performances since J.D. Martinez on June 13-14, 2016.
- Was caught stealing in the first game of the doubleheader on May 29 vs. Pittsburgh, snapping his streak of consecutive stolen base attempts at 19, dating back to September 16, 2022...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, it was the longest stolen base streak by a Tiger since Quintin Berry was successful in 21 consecutive stolen base attempts from May 25-September 29, 2012.
- Slashed .390/.378/.561 with seven doubles and 24 RBI with runners in scoring position and ranked fifth in the American League with a .390 batting average with runners in scoring position through June 2.
- Reached base safely three times on July 11 vs. Cleveland, including two walks... notched his third time this year reaching three-or-more times in a game (last, May 18 at Arizona) while marking his first game doing so with multiple walks since April 14, 2023 vs. San Francisco.
- Joined New York (NL)'s Francisco Lindor as the only other active Puerto Ricanborn player with 1,200 career games following the July 13 game vs. Los Angeles (NL).
- Hit a two-run homer in the seventh inning on July 27 vs. Minnesota...after not homering in 50 consecutive games from April 15-July 24, he homered in three consecutive games for the third time in his career (last, June 21-24, 2022)... according to the Elias Sports Bureau, Báez became the first player in Tigers history to homer in three straight games while hitting ninth in the batting order and the first MLB player to do so since Danny Jansen from May 6-8, 2021... recorded multi-RBI games in three consecutive contests for the third time in his career (last, April 14-18 Gm. 1, 2023).
- Hit a go-ahead, two-run homer in the bottom of the eighth inning on August 15 vs. Seattle...marked his 10th career go-ahead homer in the eighth inning-orlater (last, April 26, 2022 at Minnesota).
- Placed on the injured list on August 23 due to lumbar spine and hip inflammation and missed the rest of the season.

Beau Brieske (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Pitched in 46 games, including 12 starts, for the Tigers in 2024, finishing with a 4-5 record, 3.59 ERA (67.2IP/27ER) and 69 strikeouts...set career highs in strikeouts, wins, holds (6), opponent batting average (.224), slugging percentage (.354) and OPS (.664).
- Made his season debut for the Tigers on May 15 vs. Miami, throwing a scoreless inning with one hit allowed, one walk and one strikeout.
- Delivered 2.1 shutout innings on May 20 at Kansas City...logged his longest career outing without allowing a baserunner while becoming the first Tigers reliever to throw 2.0-or-more innings without surrendering a baserunner since Tyler Holton on August 16, 2023 at Minnesota.
- Threw a scoreless 2.2 innings in relief on May 24 vs. Toronto, giving up one hit while walking two and striking out two...became the first Tiger to make consecutive relief appearances of 2.1+ innings while allowing one hit-or-fewer since Drew Smyly did so in 2014.
- Pitched 3.0 scoreless innings and gave up one hit with four strikeouts on June 3 at Texas...marked the longest relief outing of his career...became the first Tiger reliever to allow one baserunner-or-fewer with four-or-more strikeouts over three-or-more innings since Tyler Alexander did so on September 6, 2019 at Oakland.
- Threw 2.1 innings on July 6 at Cincinnati, giving up two runs on one hit with two walks and five strikeouts, his most in a relief appearance in his career.
- Picked up his second win of the season and seventh of his career on August 18 vs. New York (AL), entering in the 10th inning and allowing one unearned run on one hit with one strikeout.
- Started September 13 and 14 vs. Baltimore, combining to throw 2.1 hitless innings with two walks and three strikeouts...became the first Tigers pitcher to start back-to-back team games, which were on consecutive days, since George Uhle on August 4-5, 1929.

- Picked up his third win of the season on September 21 at Baltimore, pitching 2.0 hitless innings with one walk and one strikeout...worked out of a ninth inning jam, retiring all three batters after entering with no outs and the winning run at third.
- Closed out the game on September 24 vs. Tampa Bay, delivering 2.0 innings and allowed one run on one hit with three strikeouts...marked his first save of the season and third of his career.
- Appeared in 12 games, including five as a starter, in September, and had a 2-2 record with one save, a 1.06 ERA (17.0IP/2ER) and 15 strikeouts.
- Pitched in six games during the playoffs, combining for a 0-1 record, two saves, a 1.50 ERA (6.0IP/1ER) and six strikeouts.
- Made his postseason debut on October 1 at Houston, walking one in a scoreless two-thirds of an inning to pick up the save...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became the first pitcher in franchise history to record a save in his first career playoff game.
- Earned his second save of the postseason on October 7 at Cleveland, striking out two in a perfect ninth inning.
- Punched out three in 2.0 perfect innings out of the bullpen on October 9 vs. Cleveland...started his postseason career with 5.1 no-hit innings with two walks and six strikeouts in his first four outings.

Kerry Carpenter (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Appeared in 87 games with the Tigers and slashed .284/.345/.587 with 16 doubles, five triples, 18 homers and 57 RBI...led the team with 16 multi-RBI performances.
- Among American League hitters with at least 250 plate appearances during the season, he ranked second in ISO (.303), third in slugging percentage (.587), sixth in home run rate (6.1%) and seventh in OPS (.932).
- Had a go-ahead, pinch-hit RBI single in the ninth inning on April 9 at Pittsburgh... was his second career go-ahead hit in the ninth inning (other, April 18, 2023 vs. Cleveland (Game 1)).
- Continued his hot streak at the plate on April 19 at Minnesota, posting the first four-hit game of his career and driving in two.
- Drove in at least one run in seven consecutive games from April 16-22, the longest streak by a Tigers hitter since Miguel Cabrera had a RBI in seven straight from August 6-12, 2013.
- Launched a pair of home runs on May 11 vs. Houston, hitting a two-run shot to cap off the seven-run second and adding a solo blast in the fourth...was his first multi-homer game since August 12, 2023 at Boston.
- Equaled a career high with four RBI on May 17 at Arizona, going 2x5 with a double and a triple...was his third career four-RBI game (last, August 23, 2023 vs. Chicago (NL)).
- Hit a pinch-hit RBI triple in the seventh inning May 19 at Arizona, but was thrown out trying to stretch it to an inside-the-park home run...was the first Tigers pinch hitter to be thrown out at home while stretching a triple into an inside-the-park home run since Ira Flagstead in 1922.
- On the injured list from May 29-August 13 with a lumbar spine stress fracture.
- In his return from the injured list on August 13 vs. Seattle, he crushed a pair of homers, and drove in three...marked his fourth career multi-homer game and his second this season (other, May 11 vs. Houston).
- Turned the August 14 game vs. Seattle around with a game-tying, two-run homer in the eighth inning...marked his second career game-tying homer in the eighth inning-or-later (other, September 7, 2022 at Los Angeles (AL)).
- Recorded the second four-hit game of his career on September 11 vs. Colorado, finishing the contest 4x4 with a double, a triple and a RBI.
- Belted a pair of home runs on September 22 at Baltimore, recording his third multi-homer game of the season and the fifth of his career
- Launched a grand slam on September 29 vs. Chicago (AL)...notched his 18th blast of the season and second grand slam of his career (last, August 23, 2023 vs. Chicago (NL))...from August 13 until the end of the season, he led the team (min. 25 plate appearances) in homers (10), RBI (28), batting average (.286), slugging percentage (.605) and OPS (.954).
- Played in seven games during the postseason, going 5x19 with a homer and four RBI.
- Made his postseason debut on October 1 at Houston, going 0x2 as a pinch hitter.
- Recorded his first postseason hit on October 2 at Houston, going 1x4 with a run.
 Ripped a go-ahead, three-run homer with two outs and two strikes in the ninth inning on October 7 at Cleveland...marked the third go-ahead homer with two outs in the ninth inning in Tigers postseason history, joining Magglio Ordoñez in Game 4 of the 2006 ALCS vs. Oakland and Al Kaline in Game 1 of the 1972 ALCS at Oakland...according to Stats Perform, Carpenter's blast was also the first two-out, two-strike, go-ahead homer in the ninth inning of a postseason game since Kirk Gibson in Game 1 of the 1988 World Series vs. Oakland.

Dillon Dingler (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Spent most of the 2024 season with Triple A Toledo, before being called up for his Major League debut in late July...hit .308/.379/.559 with 15 doubles, 17 home runs and 52 RBI in 71 games with the Mud Hens, while he batted .167/.195/.310 with five doubles, two triples, one home run and 11 RBI in 27 games with Detroit.
- Named the International League Player of the Week on July 29 after going 9x15 with two doubles, four homers and eight RBI with the Mud Hens from July 23-27.
- Made his Major League debut on July 29 vs. Cleveland, starting at catcher and going 1x3 with a double and a RBI...recorded his first big league hit and RBI with a double in the seventh off Tanner Bibee...became the first Tiger to record an extra-base hit and run batted in his Major League debut since Akil Baddoo on April 4, 2021 vs. Cleveland...became the first Tiger to reach base safely multiple times in his debut since Ryan Kreidler on September 2, 2022.
- Launched the first home run of his Major League career on August 11 at San Francisco, hitting a two-run shot in the second inning off Hayden Birdsong...

- finished the game 2x4 with a double, a homer and two RBI, recording his first career multi-hit and multi-RBI game.
- Recorded his second career multi-hit, multi-RBI game on September 21 at Baltimore, going 2x4 with a triple and two RBI.
- Was on the Tigers postseason roster for the Wild Card and Division Series rounds, but did not appear in a game.

Mason Englert (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Appeared in 12 games, including one start, with the Tigers in 2024, going 1-0 with a 5.40 ERA (21.2IP/13ER) and 16 strikeouts...also pitched in 28 games with Triple A Toledo, compiling a 3-1 record with a 3.24 ERA (41.2IP/15ER) and 60 strikeouts.
- Made his season debut for the Tigers on May 23 vs. Toronto, throwing the ninth inning...was his first Major League appearance since July 22, 2023 vs. San Diego.
- Pitched a shutout ninth inning on May 26 vs. Toronto, picking up his first win of the season...marked his fifth career win and first since June 29, 2023 at Texas.
- Delivered 2.0 shutout innings in Game One of the doubleheader on May 29 vs. Pittsburgh, allowing no hits and no walks while striking out two.
- Offered a career-high 3.1 innings in relief on June 5 at Texas, allowing three runs, one earned, on four hits with one walk and one strikeout.
- On June 12 vs. Washington, entered with the bases loaded and no outs in the eighth inning and escaped the inning without allowing a run, striking out one batter.

Alex Faedo (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Pitched in a career-high 37 games for the Tigers in 2024, posting a 5-3 record with a 3.61 ERA (57.1IP/23ER) and 55 strikeouts.
- Picked up his first win of the year on April 23 at Tampa Bay...was his first win since July 23, 2023 vs. San Diego.
- Threw 34.2 innings in relief from the start of the season through June 4, which ranked second in the American League and fourth in the Majors.
- Made his first start of the season on July 6 at Cincinnati, working 2.0 scoreless innings with one hit allowed and two strikeouts.
- Earned his fifth win of the season on July 20 at Toronto, throwing 2.0 scoreless innings with one hit allowed and three strikeouts.
- Made his final start of the season on August 20 at Chicago (NL), allowing one hit with one walk and one strikeout in 1.2 innings...over his six games started this season, he owned a 2.22 ERA (8.1)P/2ER) with 10 strikeouts.
- Was placed on the injured list on August 25 with a right shoulder strain and missed the rest of the season.

Jason Foley (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Pitched in 60-or-more games for the third consecutive season, appearing in 69 games in 2024 and going 3-6 with a career-high 28 saves, a 3.15 ERA (60.0IP/21ER) and 46 strikeouts.
- Ranked tied for fifth in the American League and tied for ninth in the Majors with 28 saves.
- Started the season with eight consecutive scoreless appearances, throwing 8.1 innings with four hits allowed, four walks and nine strikeouts.
- Became the first Tiger to log seven saves through his first 11 appearances since Shane Greene had nine saves in his first 11 outings of 2019...became only the second Tiger to do so while boasting a 0.00 ERA over that span (also, Fred Gladding in 1967).
- Earned his fourth career multi-inning save on June 21 vs. Chicago (AL), striking out one in 1.1 scoreless innings.
- Picked up his third win of the season and seventh of his career on August 3 vs. Kansas City, allowing two unearned runs on one hit with one strikeout in 2.0 innings...marked his seventh career relief appearance of 2.0 innings.
- Notched his 16th save of the season on August 15 vs. Seattle, striking out one in a perfect ninth inning...was his first save since July 10 vs. Cleveland.

- Launched his first career grand slam in the fifth inning on July 21 at Toronto for his sixth homer of the year...with Jake Rogers' grand slam on July 20 and Malloy's on July 21, they became the first Tigers to hit grand slams in consecutive games since Jhonny Peralta and Alex Avila on July 28-30, 2013...his four RBI set a career high.
- Saw his career-long 17 game on-base streak end after going 0x5 on July 27 vs. Minnesota...over the streak, which was the longest by a Tiger this season, he slashed .304/.400/.607 with one triple, five homers, nine runs scored and 12 RBI.
- Had a go-ahead sacrifice fly in the bottom of the eighth inning on September 26 vs. Baltimore...was his first career go-ahead RBI in the eighth inning-or-later.
- Appeared in all seven of the Tigers postseason games, going 5x8 with a double... reached base safely in eight-of-11 plate appearances and had a 1.477 OPS.
- Made his playoff debut on October 1 at Houston, going 1x2 with a walk.
- Posted his first postseason multi-hit performance on October 7 at Cleveland, going 2x3.

Matt Manning (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Started five games with the Tigers this year, going 0-1 with a 4.88 ERA (27.2IP/15ER) and 23 strikeouts...over 15 outings, including 14 starts, with Triple A Toledo, he went 2-5 with a 4.28 ERA (69.1IP/33ER) and 72 strikeouts.
- Pitched the second game of the twin bill on April 4 at New York (NL), throwing 5.2 no-hit innings with four walks and three strikeouts...was his second career start with no hits allowed.

Zach McKinstry (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Played in more than 100 games for the second straight season, appearing in 118 for the Tigers and batting .215/.277/.337 with 14 doubles, five triples, four homers and 23 RBI.
- Finished the season 16-for-16 in stolen base attempts...joined Lawrence Butler as the only MLB players to steal at least 15 bases during the season and not be thrown out...was the first Tiger to do so since Quintin Berry went 21-for-21 in 2012.
- Had a triple and a homer on June 4 at Texas, marking the second time in his career he has done so (other, September 16, 2022 vs. Colorado).
- Launched a two-out, two-run home run in the eighth inning on July 7 at Cincinnati for his third homer of the year...marked his first game with three-ormore runs batted in since July 1, 2023 at Colorado
- Recorded a pair of doubles on August 13 vs. Seattle to give him his 10th career game with multiple extra-base hits (last, June 23, 2024 vs. Chicago (AL)).
- Had a game-tying, pinch-hit RBI single in the 10th inning on August 18 vs. New York (AL)...marked his second career game-tying or go-ahead hit in extra innings (other, July 1, 2023 at Colorado).
- Recorded his 100th career RBI after smacking a two-run blast in the ninth inning on August 24 at Chicago (AL)...marked his fourth homer of the year.
- Went 1x3 with a double on August 31 vs. Boston, extending his hitting streak to a career-best 11 games, which was the longest by a Tigers hitter this season... over the streak, he went 16x30 with three doubles, a homer and five RBI.
- Named Tigers Player of the Month for August after batting .368/.411/.544 with seven doubles, one triple, one home run and seven RBI in 23 games...among American League players with at least 70 plate appearances during the month, he ranked fourth in batting average and on-base percentage, ninth in OPS (.955) and tied for ninth in doubles.
- Appeared in five of Detroit's postseason games, going 3x7 with two doubles, a homer and a RBI.
- Made his playoff debut on October 1 at Houston as a defensive replacement.
- Recorded his first career postseason hit on October 2 at Houston, going 1x3 with a double.
- Launched a game-tying solo homer in the fifth inning on October 10 vs. Cleveland...marked his first career postseason homer and was Detroit's first Postseason homer at Comerica Park since Victor Martinez in Game 4 of the 2013 ALDS vs. Oakland.

Parker Meadows (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Appeared in 82 games for the Tigers this season, slashing .244/.310/.433 with 12 doubles, six triples, nine homers and 28 RBI...also played in 51 games with Triple A Toledo, batting .292/.388/.495 with 11 doubles, three triples, eight homers and 25 RBI.
- Returned to the Tigers lineup on July 5 at Cincinnati and hit his third home run
 of the season, a solo shot in the third inning.
- Went 2x4 with a run scored and a triple on August 10 at San Francisco, recording his fifth straight multi-hit game since being reinstated from the injured list on August 3...became the first Tigers rookie to have multiple hits in five consecutive games since Harold Castro from September 10-15, 2019.
- Had the game-winning hit on August 18 against the Yankees, hitting a walk-off single in the 10th inning to score Zach McKinstry...marked Meadows' second career walk-off hit (other, August 25, 2023 vs. Houston)...finished the game with three hits, notching his third career three-hit game.

- Went 1x4 with a run scored on September 1 vs. Boston, extending his hitting streak to a career-best 10 games, over which he hit .310/.356/.548 with three doubles, two triples, one home run and three RBI.
- Hit a go-ahead grand slam with two outs and two strikes in the ninth inning on September 5 at San Diego...prior to Meadows' blast, the last Tigers go-ahead grand slam when trailing with two strikes and two outs in the ninth came on June 21, 1988 vs. New York (AL) when Alan Trammell hit a grand slam off Cecilio Guante...according to Stats Perform, it was just the second grand slam by a team on the road, down by three and an out away from being shut out, joining Ted Williams, who did so on August 27, 1955 vs. Detroit...the homer came on a 100.7 MPH fastball, the fastest pitch a Tigers batter has hit for a home run in the Statcast Era.
- Hit his first career leadoff homer on September 10 vs. Colorado...became the first Tiger with multiple hits, runs, RBI and walks in a game since Spencer Torkelson on July 2, 2023 at Colorado
- Over 47 games from August 3 until the end of the season, he slashed .296/.340/.500 with 10 doubles, five triples, six homers and 23 RBI...had a 2.0 fWAR in that span, which ranked tied for fifth in the American League.
- Played in all seven of Detroit's postseason games, going 7x26 with two doubles, a homer and a RBI...hit safely in all seven games, matching a franchise record for longest hitting streak to begin a postseason career, equaling Charlie Gehringer's seven-game stretch from October 3-9, 1934.
- Went 1x4 with a run scored in his postseason debut on October 1 at Houston.
- Hit a solo homer in the sixth inning on October 2 at Houston for his first career
 postseason round-tripper...notched Detroit's first homer in the postseason
 since Nick Castellanos in Game 3 of the 2014 ALDS at Baltimore...marked the
 sixth go-ahead homer in the sixth inning-or-later in Tigers postseason history
 (last, Delmon Young, Game 3 of the 2011 ALDS vs. New York (AL)).

Casey Mize (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- In his first MLB action since 2022, Mize appeared in 22 games, including 20
- starts, and posted a 2-6 record with a 4.49 ERA (102.11P/51ER) and 78 strikeouts.
 Picked up his first win of the season on April 21 vs. Minnesota, pitching 6.0 shutout innings with five hits allowed, three walks and four strikeouts...marked his first victory since August 24, 2021 at St. Louis...threw 6.0-or-more scoreless innings in a start for the second time in his career (other, April 12, 2021 at Houston).
- Recorded his fourth quality start of the season on May 15 vs. Miami, tossing 6.0 innings and giving up two runs on two hits with one walk and six strikeouts... marked his sixth career start with two-or-fewer hits allowed (last, September 24, 2021 vs. Kansas City) and his first when throwing at least 6.0 innings.
- Posted his first career double-digit strikeout game on June 24 vs. Philadelphia, fanning 10 in 4.1 innings...became the second starter in Tigers history to record 10-or-more strikeouts in 4.1 innings-or-less, joining Reese Olson on August 28, 2023 vs. New York (AL).
- Made the first relief appearance of his professional career on September 26 vs. Tampa Bay, allowing a run on three hits with four strikeouts in 2.0 innings.
- Was on the Tigers 26-man roster for the Wild Card series, but did not appear in a game.

Keider Montero (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Saw his first Major League action in 2024, appearing in 19 games, including 16 starts, and going 6-6 with a 4.76 ERA (98.1IP/52ER) and 77 strikeouts...also started 13 games with Triple A Toledo, compiling a 1-4 record with a 5.03 ERA (48.1IP/27ER) and 54 strikeouts.
- Made his Major League debut in the second game of the doubleheader on May 29 vs. Pittsburgh, allowing four runs on five hits with one walk and five strikeouts in 4.1 innings.

- Named American League Player of the Week for the week ending September 15 after throwing 14.0 scoreless innings with eight hits allowed, one walk and six strikeouts in two starts...was the first Tiger to win AL Player of the Week since Miguel Cabrera on April 25, 2022 and the first pitcher to do so since Spencer Turnbull on May 24, 2021.
- Appeared in two postseason games, including one start, and threw 3.0 shutout innings with one hit allowed and three strikeouts.
- Threw 2.0 scoreless innings in his postseason debut on October 5 at Cleveland, allowing one hit and striking out three...became the fifth reliever in Major League history to make his Postseason debut in the American League Division Series and throw 2.0+ innings with three-or-more strikeouts (last, Cody Morris vs. New York on October 16, 2022 in Game 4).
- Made his first career playoff start on October 9 vs. Cleveland, working a perfect inning on just six pitches...tied Johnny Cueto (Game 1 of 2012 NLDS) for the second-fewest pitchers by a starter in postseason history, trailing only Wade Miley's five pitches in Game 5 of the 2018 NLCS.

Reese Olson (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Made 22 starts for the Tigers in 2024, posting a 4-8 record with a 3.53 ERA (112.1IP/44ER) and 101 strikeouts...set a career high in games (22) and innings pitched (112.1)
- Worked a career-high 8.0 scoreless innings on May 14 vs. Miami, allowing three hits with no walks and six strikeouts.

- Allowed a home run to Michael Massey leading off the second inning on May 20 at Kansas City, snapping his streak of innings without allowing a homer to start the season at 48.1...in the Wild Card Era (since 1955), that was the third-longest streak by a Tigers starting pitcher to begin the season and sixth longest by any Tiger.
- Pitched 6.1 innings on May 25 vs. Toronto, giving up an unearned run on three hits with three walks and four strikeouts...allowed one earned run-or-fewer in six consecutive starts from April 26-May 25, over which he had a 0.77 ERA (35.0IP/3ER) with six hits allowed, 11 walks and 29 strikeouts...became the second Tiger in franchise history to post a sub-2.00 ERA while allowing 40-orfewer hits through his first 10 starts of a season, joining Tom Timmermann in 1972.
- Pitched a scoreless 6.0 innings on June 17 vs. Atlanta...marked the fourth time this season he has thrown at least 5.0 shutout innings in a start.
- Was sidelined from July 21-September 15 with a right shoulder strain.
- Pitched in two postseason games, including one start, giving up two runs on eight hits with two walks and eight strikeouts in 9.0 innings.
- Made his postseason debut on October 6, pitching in relief and giving up a run on three hits with one walk and four strikeouts in 5.0 innings...became the first pitcher to throw 5.0-or-more innings in relief in his first career Postseason game since Ed Willett on October 11, 1909 vs. Pittsburgh.
- Started Game 4 of the ALDS vs. Cleveland, allowing a run on five hits with one walk and four strikeouts in 4.0 innings.

Wenceel Pérez (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- In his first season of Major League action, he played in 112 games with the Tigers, slashing .242/.300/.383 with 16 doubles, six triples, nine homers and 37 RBI...also saw time in 15 games with Triple A Toledo, batting .164/.270/.382 with two doubles, two triples, two homers and eight RBI.
- Made his Major League debut on April 8 against the Pirates, entering as a pinch hitter in the seventh inning and going 0x2.

- Notched his second straight multi-hit game on May 14 vs. Miami, finishing the contest 2x4 with a double...from April 19-May 14, Pérez hit .324/.395/.544 with two doubles, two triples, three home runs and eight RBI in 19 games.
- Hit a pair of triples and drove in a career-high four runs on May 18 at Arizona... became the first Tiger to record a multi-triple game within the first 28 games of his big league career since Jake Wood in 1961.
- Posted the first four-hit game of his Major League career on June 15 at Houston, going 4x6 with two RBI.
- Hit a game-tying pinch-hit homer in the eighth inning on July 6 at Cincinnati, a two-run shot off Fernando Cruz...marked his first career pinch-hit homer and was the first by a Tiger since Tyler Nevin on September 27, 2023...was also the first game-tying pinch-hit homer by a Tiger in the eighth inning-or-later since Robbie Grossman on July 26, 2021 at Minnesota.
- Had his first career walk-off hit in the 11th inning on August 3 vs. Kansas City... also notched a walk-off fielder's choice on July 14 vs. Los Angeles (NL).
- Hit the first leadoff homer of his career and his ninth homer this season on August 7 at Seattle.
- Played in six postseason games and went 5x20 with a double and a RBI.
- Had a pair of hits on October 1 at Houston, becoming the first Tiger to record a multi-hit effort in his playoff debut since Andrew Romine on October 2, 2014 at Baltimore.
- Went 2x2 on October 10 vs. Cleveland, including a pinch-hit, go-ahead RBI single in the sixth inning.

Jake Rogers (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Spent the entire 2024 season with the Tigers, playing in 102 games and batting .197/.255/.352 with 16 doubles, one triple, 10 homers and 36 RBI.
- Ranked fifth among Major League catchers with 13 defensive runs saved.
- Went 2x5 with two runs scored and two doubles on May 7 at Cleveland... marked his first career game with multiple doubles.
- Hit two solo home runs in the 2-1 win over Texas on June 3...logged his first multi-homer game of the season and the third of his career (last, September 17, 2023 at Los Angeles (AL))...marked the first time a Tiger hit two solo home runs in a 2-1 win since Norm Cash on May 8, 1971 vs. Kansas City.
- Crushed a two-run home run on June 30 at Los Angeles (AL) that traveled a career-long 443 feet.
- Belted his third career grand slam (last, May 7, 2023 at St. Louis) on July 20 at Toronto...marked his second game this year and ninth of his career with threeor-more runs batted in.
- Notched his first triple of the year on July 22 at Cleveland...was his first triple since hitting three in 2021.
- Drove in a career-best seven runs and went 3x5 with two doubles and a grand slam on August 13 vs. Seattle...his seven RBI were the most by a Tigers player since Ryan Raburn also drove in seven on July 25, 2007 at Chicago (AL)...it also tied the most in a game by a catcher in franchise history, equaling Bill Freehan on September 8, 1974 at New York (AL) and Rudy York on August 31, 1937 vs. Washington...became the first backstop to do so in all of baseball since Elias Díaz did so on September 9, 2022 vs. Arizona...his seven RBI matched the most in Comerica Park history, achieved most recently by Chicago (AL)'s Avisaíl García on September 14, 2017...was the second Tiger to do so in Comerica Park history, joining Bobby Higginson on June 13, 2000 vs. Toronto.



- Drilled a game-tying RBI double down in the ninth inning on August 30 vs. Boston...was his first career game-tying hit in the ninth inning-or-later.
- In his playoff debut on October 1 at Houston, he became Detroit's 10th different catcher to ever record a postseason multi-hit effort (last, Alex Avila on October 13, 2013 at Boston).
- Went 1x2 with a double and a walk on October 9 vs. Cleveland, reaching base safely in each of his first five games this postseason...became the third Tigers catcher to record a postseason on-base streak of five games-or-better, joining Alex Avila (12 games in 2012) and Mickey Cochrane (twice, six games in 1934 and five games in 1935).

Bryan Sammons (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Saw his first Major League action in 2024, appearing in six games with the Tigers and going 1-1 with a 3.62 ERA (27.1IP/11ER) and 18 strikeouts...also made 22 appearances, including 20 starts, with Triple A Toledo, and went 6-7 with a 4.15 ERA (102.0IP/47ER) and 102 strikeouts.
- Made his Major League debut on July 29 vs. Cleveland, tossing 7.1 innings of relief, allowing five runs on four hits, walking one and striking out five batters... his 7.1 innings pitched were the most by a Tigers reliever making their debut since Roger Mason pitched 8.0 innings on September 4, 1984 vs. Baltimore... also marked the longest debut outing by a Tiger since Andy Van Hekken threw a complete game shutout on September 3, 2002 vs. Cleveland.
- Delivered 4.1 innings in relief on August 8 at Seattle, allowing one run on two hits with one walk and four strikeouts...became the third Tiger since 1938 to throw 13.0+ innings in relief over his first three career appearances (last, Joey Wentz in 2023).
- Threw 5.2 innings in relief on August 14 vs. Seattle, allowing one run on two hits with two walks and four strikeouts...became the fifth Tiger ever, and first since Eric King in 1986, to throw multiple relief outings of 4.0-or-more innings with three-or-fewer hits allowed prior to his fifth career appearance...became the eighth pitcher in MLB history to have three of his first four career relief appearances go 4.0-or-more innings while allowing four hits-or-fewer (last, Kansas City's Atlee Hammaker in 1981).

Tarik Skubal (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Enjoyed a breakout season in 2024, starting 31 games and posting an 18-4 record with a 2.39 ERA (192.0IP/51ER) and 228 strikeouts...his 18 victories were the most by a Tigers pitcher since Max Scherzer also won 18 in 2014.
- Won the American League Pitching Triple Crown, finishing first in wins (18), ERA (2.39) and strikeouts (228)...became the third pitcher in franchise history to win the Triple Crown, joining Justin Verlander (2011) and Hal Newhouser (1945).
- In addition to leading the AL in the Triple Crown categories, he also ranked highly in several other areas...led the AL in FIP (2.51), fWAR (5.9), bWAR (6.3), opponent slugging percentage (.311) and opponent OPS (.558), while ranking second in WHIP (0.92), opponent on-base percentage (.247), strikeouts per 9.0 innings (10.69) and strikeout-to-walk ratio (6.51) and fourth in opponent batting average (.201), walks per 9.0 innings (1.64) and home runs per 9.0 innings (0.70).
- Earned a spot on the American League All-Star Team for the first time in his career after being voted on through the player ballot...was the first homegrown Detroit starting pitcher to be selected to the All-Star Game since Justin Verlander in 2013...threw a perfect second inning, retiring Christian Yelich, Alec Bohm and Teoscar Hernández.
- Named the Tigers nominee for the 2024 Roberto Clemente Award, baseball's most prestigious individual honor for Major Leaguers.
- Made his first career Opening Day start on March 28 at Chicago (AL), delivering 6.0 shutout innings on Opening Day, allowing three hits and no walks with six strikeouts...became the fifth pitcher in franchise history to throw 6.0-or-more scoreless innings and strike out six-or-more batters in an Opening Day start (last, Justin Verlander in 2012).
- Started the home opener on April 5 vs. Oakland, becoming the first Tigers pitcher to start both the regular season opener and the home opener since Mike Moore in 1993.
- Struck out 12 batters with two runs allowed on six hits over 6.0 innings on May 5 at New York (AL).
- Threw 6.1 innings on May 11 vs. Houston, allowing two runs on seven hits with two walks and seven strikeouts...delivered two pitches at 100 MPH, marking his first time reaching that velocity...became the first Tigers starting pitcher to throw a pitch 100 MPH-or-faster since Justin Verlander in 2012.
- Pitching 6.0 scoreless innings with one hit allowed and six strikeouts on May 17 at Arizona...from September 3, 2023-May 17, 2024, Skubal had a 10-0 record with a 1.48 ERA (85.0IP/14ER), 12 walks, 109 strikeouts and four home runs allowed...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, Skubal is the third starting pitcher since 1913 to have a 14-start span with an ERA below 1.50, 100-or-more strikeouts, 12-or-fewer walks and four-or-fewer home runs, joining Clayton Kershaw (twice, 9/29/15-6/4/16 and 5/1/16-9/19/16) and Jacob deGrom (4/5/21-7/1/21) while being the only starter with such a stretch while also earning 10 wins.
- Earned his seventh win of the season in the first game of the doubleheader on May 29 vs. Pittsburgh, pitching 7.0 shutout innings with three hits allowed, one walk and eight strikeouts...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he was the sixth pitcher since 1913 to have at least 80 strikeouts, walked 11-or-fewer and posted an ERA of 2.01-or-lower in his first 11 starts of a season and the first since Gerrit Cole in 2021.
- Threw the fastest pitch of his career on June 9 vs. Milwaukee, firing a 101.7 MPH fastball...ranked as the second-fastest pitch by any Major League starting pitcher (not counting openers), trailing only Pittsburgh's Paul Skenes, who reached 101.9 MPH on May 11 vs. Chicago (NL)...was also tied for the fastest pitch by any Tigers pitcher in the Statcast Era (since 2015), equaling Bruce Rondon, who threw a 101.7 MPH pitch on July 18, 2015 vs. Baltimore.
- With his start on June 9 vs. Milwaukee, he lowered his season ERA to 1.92, the lowest by a Tigers pitcher through the first 13 starts of a season since Al Benton (0.99) and Hal Newhouser (1.83) in 1945.

- Allowed just one run on three hits with no walks and a career-high 13 punchouts on July 7 vs Cincinnati...became just the second lefthanded pitcher in franchise history to have a game with 13-or-more strikeouts, zero walks and no more than one run allowed, joining Mickey Lolich on July 1, 1968 vs. California...also became the first Tigers pitcher to win 10-or-more games before the All-Star break since Rick Porcello (12) and Max Scherzer (11) in 2014.
- Threw a career-high 8.0 innings and allowed one run on four hits with eight strikeouts on August 31 vs. Boston...recorded his 200th strikeout of the season, becoming the first MLB pitcher to reach that milestone in 2024 and just the fourth lefthanded pitcher in franchise history to do so, joining Mickey Lolich (seven times), Hal Newhouser (twice) and Matthew Boyd (once).
- Turned in the longest outing of his career on August 31 vs. Boston, pitching 8.0 innings and giving up one run on four hits with no walks and eight strikeouts to earn his 16th win of the season.
- Made his final start of the season on September 24 vs. Tampa Bay, pitching 7.0 shutout innings with two hits allowed, one walk and seven strikeouts for his 18th win of the season.
- Started three games during the postseason, compiling a 1-1 record with a 2.37 ERA (19.0IP/5ER) and 20 strikeouts...started his playoff career by not allowing a run in 17.0 consecutive innings, tied for the fifth-longest streak in MLB history and longest since Ian Anderson started his postseason career with 17.2 straight scoreless innings in 2020.
- Dominated in his postseason debut on October 1, working 6.0 scoreless innings with four hits allowed, one walk and six strikeouts...became the fourth pitcher in franchise history to throw 6.0-or-more shutout innings in his first career playoff game, joining Max Scherzer on October 2, 2011 at New York (AL) and Joe Coleman on October 10, 1972 vs. Oakland...was the 10th Tigers starter to earn a win in his first career Postseason appearance (last, Max Scherzer on October 2, 2011 at New York (AL)) and first southpaw to do so since Mickey Lolich (October 3, 1986 at St. Louis).
- Turned in another dominant start on October 7 at Cleveland, working 7.0 shutout innings with three hits allowed, no walks and eight strikeouts...became the first pitcher in franchise history to have a postseason outing of 7.0 scoreless innings while allowing zero walks and no more than three hits...threw 6.0-ormore shutout innings in each of his first two postseason starts...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became the first Tiger and sixth pitcher in MLB history to do so, joining Corey Kluber (2016), Steve Avery (1991), Dave Righetti (1981), Joe Niekro (1980- 81) and Christy Mathewson (1905).

Trey Sweeney (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Was acquired by the Tigers at the trade deadline and saw his first Major League action with Detroit, playing in 36 games and batting .218/.269/.373 with five doubles, four homers and 17 RBI...also combined to play in 107 games between Triple A Toledo and Triple A Oklahoma City, hitting .267/.345/.450 with 28 doubles, three triples, 15 home runs and 71 RBI.
- Made his Major League debut on August 16 vs. New York (AL), starting at shortstop and going 1x3...recorded his first big league hit with an infield single in the seventh inning.
- Launched his first Major League home run on August 21 at Chicago (NL), a tworun, 414-foot shot to center in the top of the second inning.
- Hit a towering two-run blast on September 4 at San Diego...marked his second career big league blast, and first in a left-on-left matchup.
- Went 4x4 with a homer, two RBI and a walk on September 8 at Oakland... became just the seventh player in franchise history to have four hits, a homer, a stolen base and a walk in the same game and first since Miguel Cabrera on July 7, 2013...became the first Tigers hitter to have a four-hit performance within the first 19 games of his Major League career since Will Rhymes in 2010.
- Launched a three-run blast in the first inning on September 11 vs. Colorado... logged his fourth home run of the year...was the second Tigers shortstop since 2009 with six-or-more hits, four-or-more runs scored and five-or-more RBI over any three game span (last, Javier Báez from June 21-24, 2022).
- Roped a two-RBI double down the line on September 18 at Kansas City...was his sixth multi-RBI game of the season...became the first Tigers player to have six games with two-or-more RBI within the first 28 games of his career since Hoot Evers in 1946.
- Earned MLB's Electric Play of the Week for his game-saving catch in the bottom of the ninth inning on September 21 at Baltimore.
- Played in all seven of Detroit's postseason games, going 2x22 with two RBI.
- Hit a two-out RBI single on October 1 at Houston, his first postseason hit and RBI...marked the first playoff left-on-left, two-out RBI by a Tiger since Sean Casey faced New York (AL)'s Randy Johnson on October 6, 2006.

Spencer Torkelson (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Played in 92 games for the Tigers in 2024, batting .219/.295/.374 with 21 doubles, one triple, 10 home runs and 37 RBI...also appeared in 58 games with Triple A Toledo and hit .239/.356/.442 with 13 doubles, 11 homers and 43 RBI.
- Brought in the go-ahead run on April 14 vs. Minnesota with a single in the eighth inning...was his first career go-ahead hit in the eighth inning-or-later... finished the game 2x4 with a double and a RBI.
- Belted his second home run of the season on May 13 vs. Miami, a 446-foot, goahead two-run bomb to left field...was his first career go-ahead homer in the eighth inning-or-later.

- Made his Tigers debut on September 5 at San Diego, pitching a shutout eighth inning and earning the first win of his Major League career.

Will Vest (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Spent the entire 2024 season with the Tigers, appearing in a career-high 69 games and posting a 3-4 record with two saves, a 2.82 ERA (70.1IP/22ER) and 63 strikeouts.
- Inherited 49 runners during the season, which was tied for the third most in the Majors...were the most for a Tigers reliever since Phil Coke inherited 52 in 2014.

- Reached base in four of 10 plate appearances in the Wild Card Series at Houston, going 2x8 with a RBI and two walks.
- Reached base four times on October 7 at Cleveland, going 2x3 with a double and two walks...was the first Tiger to reach base four times in a postseason game since Austin Jackson on October 16, 2013 vs. Boston.

Ryan Vilade (Baseball-Reference Player Page)

- Appeared in 17 games with the Tigers this season, hitting .178/.208/.244 with one home run and five RBI...also played in 108 games with Triple A Toledo, batting .278/.346/.449 with 24 doubles, two triples, 13 homers and 64 RBI.
