**FALL CLASSIC: The Yankees clinched their 41st American League pennant and are making their first trip to the World Series since 2009...the Yankees' 41 World Series appearances and 27 World Series championships are the most all-time** (next-most: Dodgers, 22 appearances; Cardinals, 11 championships).

- ▶ **Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history** (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- ▶ Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995).

**WHERE WE LEFT OFF:** The Yankees clinched their 41st American League pennant with a 5-2 win in 10 innings on Saturday in ALCS Game 5 at Cleveland...**LHP Carlos Rodón** (4.2IP, 5H, 2R/ER, 1BB, 6K, 0HR) started and did not record a decision...**DH Giancarlo Stanton** (1-for-4, 1R, 1HR, 2RBI) hit his 16th career postseason home run with a game-tying two-run shot in the sixth inning...**RF Juan Soto** (3-for-5, 1R, 1 double, 1HR, 3RBI) hit a go-ahead, game-winning three-run home run in the 10th inning...**RHP Mark Leiter Jr.** (0.2IP, 2BB/1BB), **LHP Tim Hill** (1.1IP, 1H, 1BB), **RHP Jake Cousins** (1.1IP, 1BB, 4K) and **RHP Luke Weaver** (W, 2.0IP, 1H, 1K) combined to toss 5.1 scoreless innings of relief.

**GAME WON:** The Yankees are 8-3 in their first game of a playoff series since 2018 (lost 2018 ALDS Game 1 at Boston, 2021 AL Wild Card Game at Boston and 2022 ALCS Game 1 at Houston)...are 18-9 in their last 27 such games (since 2004 ALCS Game 1).

**ROAD WARRIORS:** Including the postseason, the Yankees are a Major League-best 54-32 (.628) on the road this year...are 21-10 in their last 31 road games (since 7/27).

- ▶ The Yankees are 4-1 on the road this postseason...matches their most wins on the road in a single postseason in the last 21 years since 2004 (recorded four road wins in 2009)...with a win tonight, would match their third-most road wins in a postseason (went 8-0 on the road in 1996, 6-3 in 2000, 5-1 in 1998 and '99, and 5-3 in 2003).

**HIGH VOLTAGE: INF Anthony Volpe** has reached base in 17-of-37PA this postseason, batting .310/.459/.345 (9-for-29) with 6R, 1 double, 1RBI, 8BB and 2SB.

- ▶ Is just the second Yankee in the last 28 years (since 1997) to reach base in each of his first nine career postseason games, joining Luke Voit (first nine from 2018-20).

**THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone** is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

- ▶ His 21 postseason wins are the fifth-most by a Yankees Manager in franchise history, trailing only Joe Torre (76), Casey Stengel (37), Joe McCarthy (29) and Joe Girardi (28).

**RIVALRY RENEWED:** The Yankees are facing the Dodgers in the World Series for the 12th time, with the Yankees winning eight championships (1941, '47, '49, '52, '53, '56, '77 and '78) and losing three times (1955, '63 and '81)...**according to OptaSTATS, the Yankees and Dodgers' 12 matchups in the World Series are tied with the Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers for the most common championship round matchup in the four Major sports** (MLB/NBA/NFL/NHL).

**COLE TRAIN: RHP Gerrit Cole** will make his 21st career postseason start and third career World Series start tonight...will start Game 1 of a postseason series for the eighth time in his career...is 11-6 with a 2.98 ERA (120.2IP, 40ER) and 146K in 20 career postseason starts...has allowed 2R-or-fewer in 13 of his 20 career postseason starts and 1R-or-fewer in nine of those starts...has tossed at least 7.0 innings in nine of his 20 starts...has tossed at least 6.0IP in 13 of his 20 starts.

**GLEYBER DAY: INF Gleyber Torres** has reached base in 18-of-45PA this postseason, batting .297/.400/.432 (11-for-37) with 9R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 5RBI, 7BB and 1SF.

**STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton** was named the ALCS MVP after hitting 4HR in five games, including a game-tying two-run HR in the sixth inning of ALCS Game 5 at Cleveland...drove in seven of the Yankees' 29R during the ALCS.

- ▶ **Has 3HR in his last three games, 4HR in his last five games and 5HR in his last seven games (since ALDS Game 3).**
- ▶ **His 5HR this postseason are tied for the fourth-most by a Yankee in a single postseason in franchise history,** trailing only his own 6HR in 2020, Alex Rodriguez (6HR in 2009) and Bernie Williams (6HR in 1996)...Harrison Bader (5HR in 2022) and Reggie Jackson (5HR in 1977) also hit 5HR in a single postseason...**is one of nine Major League players and the only Yankee to hit at least 5HR in a single postseason multiple times.**
- ▶ Five of his last seven postseason home runs (since 2022) have either tied the game (one) or given the Yankees the lead (four).
- ▶ Has homered in three straight postseason games for the second time in his career (also 5G from 2020 ALWCS Game 1 - 2020 ALDS Game 3).
- ▶ Has hit .294/.385/.794 (10-for-34) with 6R, 2 doubles, 5HR, 11RBI, 5BB and 1SB in nine games this postseason.
- ▶ **His 16 career postseason home runs are the most by a Major League player in his first 36 career postseason games** (previous: Carlos Beltrán & Nelson Cruz-15HR).
- ▶ **His 16 career postseason home runs are the fourth-most in franchise history,** trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR) and Mickey Mantle (18HR).
- ▶ **His career 8.13 AB/HR (16HR/130AB) ratio in the postseason is the best in Major League history** (min. 100PA).
- ▶ Including the postseason, the Yankees are 27-5 this year when Stanton homers.
- ▶ **Has recorded 35RBI in 36 career postseason games, including 34RBI in his last 30 postseason games** (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota)...has 11RBI this postseason.
- ▶ Has hit .309/.363/.723 (29-for-94) with 15R, 9 doubles, 10HR, 26RBI, 8BB and 1SB in 25 career regular season games at Dodger Stadium...**including the 2022 All-Star Game, has hit 1HR in 26 games at Dodger Stadium.**
- ▶ **Since the 2020 ALDS, has hit .409/.417/1.227 (9-for-22) with 6HR, 21RBI, 1BB and 1SF with RISP in 24 postseason games.**

**BRONX BOMBERS: Yankees batters scored at least 5R in each of their five ALCS games, matching their longest streak in a single postseason in franchise history** (also 5G from 1998 ALCS Game 5 - 1998 World Series Game 3)...is also tied for their third-longest streak in the postseason in franchise history, trailing only an eight-game streak from 2009-10 and a seven-game streak from 1928-32.

**THE GREAT JUAN: OF Juan Soto** hit his 10th career postseason HR with a go-ahead, game-winning three-run HR in the 10th inning of ALCS Game 5 at Cleveland on Saturday...**in his postseason career, has hit .355/.488/.548 (11-for-31) with 3 doubles, 1HR, 17RBI, 8BB, 1HP and 1SF with RISP.**

- ▶ **Is celebrating his 26th birthday today** (DOB: 10/25/98)...**was just the fifth player in Major League history to hit at least 10HR in the postseason prior to his 26th birthday,** joining Carlos Correa (11HR from 2015-19), Randy Arozarena (10HR from 2019-20), Alex Bregman (10HR from 2017-19) and Albert Pujols (10HR from 2001-05).

- ▶ Has homered in back-to-back games in the postseason for the third time in his career...has 3HR in his last five games (since ALCS Game 1).
- ▶ Has reached base in each of his nine games this postseason, batting .333/.439/.667 (11-for-33) with 6R, 2 doubles, 3HR, 8RBI, 7BB and 1SF.

**DYNAMIC DUO: OF Juan Soto and DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton have each recorded four go-ahead RBI this postseason...are two of just six players in Yankees history to record at least four go-ahead RBI in a single postseason** (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), joining Bernie Williams (seven in 1996), Chris Chambliss (five in 1976), Hideki Matsui (four in 2003) and Lou Gehrig (four in 1928).

**PITCH PERFECT: Yankees pitchers** have allowed 3ER-or-fewer in six of their nine postseason games, posting a 3.27 ERA (82.2IP, 30ER).

- ▶ **Yankees starters** have allowed 2ER-or-fewer in seven of their nine starts...**Yankees relievers** have posted a 2.56 ERA (38.2IP, 11ER) this postseason.

### SOTO—cont.

- Hit .288/.419/.569 (166-for-576) with 128R, 31 doubles, 4 triples, 41HR, 109RBI, 129BB and 75B in 157 games with the Yankees...set career highs in runs scored, hits, home runs, total bases (328) and extra-base hits (76)...appeared in both right field (145G/GS) and left field (6G/GS)...was named to his fourth career All-Star team.
- His 769 career walks are the most by a Major League player prior to his 26th birthday and the fourth-most by a player through his first 936 career games, trailing only Ted Williams (856), Max Bishop (822) and Frank Thomas (775).
- His 201 career home runs are tied with Albert Pujols for the sixth-most by a Major League player prior to his 26th birthday, trailing only Jimmie Foxx (222), Eddie Mathews (222), Alex Rodriguez (216), Mel Ott (211) and Mickey Mantle (207)...hit his 200th career home run at 25 years, 328 days old, becoming the seventh-youngest player in Major League history to reach 200 career home runs, trailing only Mel Ott (25y, 144d on 7/24/34), Eddie Mathews (25y, 242d on 6/12/57), Albert Pujols (25y, 257d on 9/30/05), Jimmie Foxx (25y, 266d on 7/15/33), Mickey Mantle (25y, 279d on 7/26/57) and Alex Rodriguez (25y, 289d on 5/12/01).

### #27 GIANCARLO STANTON—OF Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 3G

- Has made the postseason for the sixth time in his career (2018-22, '24).
- Has hit .294/.385/.794 (10-for-34) with 6R, 2 doubles, 5HR, 11RBI, 5BB and 1SB in the 2024 postseason...has recorded at least 1RBI in seven of his nine games.
- Was named the ALCS MVP after hitting 4HR in five games vs. Cleveland (4-for-18, 5R, 4HR, 7RBI, 3BB).
- Has homered in three straight postseason games for the second time in his career (also 5G from 2020 ALWCS Game 1 - 2020 ALDS Game 3).
- Has 3HR in his last three games, 4HR in his last five games and 5HR in his last seven games (since ALDS Game 3).
- Hit his fifth home run this postseason and the 16th of his career with a game-tying two-run shot in the sixth inning in ALCS Game 5 at Cleveland (1-for-4, 1R, 1HR, 2RBI).
- Hit his fourth home run this postseason and the 15th career postseason HR with a three-run shot in the sixth inning on Friday in ALCS Game 4 at Cleveland (1-for-4, 1R, 1HR, 3RBI).
- His 5HR this postseason are tied for the fourth-most by a Yankee in a single postseason, trailing only his own 6HR in 2020, Alex Rodriguez (6HR in 2009) and Bernie Williams (6HR in 1996)...Harrison Bader (5HR in 2022) and Reggie Jackson (5HR in 1977) also hit 5HR in a single postseason...is one of nine Major League players and the only Yankee to hit at least 5HR in a single postseason multiple times.
- Has recorded four go-ahead RBI this postseason...is one of just six players in Yankees history to record at least four go-ahead RBI in a single postseason (since RBI became an official stat in 1920)...also Bernie Williams (seven in 1996), Chris Chambliss (five in 1976), Juan Soto (four in 2024), Hideki Matsui (four in 2003) and Lou Gehrig (four in 1928) accomplished the feat.
- His three go-ahead RBI in the ALDS vs. Kansas City matched the most by a Yankee in an ALDS (also Don Mattingly's three go-ahead RBI in the 1995 ALDS)...only Bernie Williams (four in 1996 ALCS), Chris Chambliss (four in 1976 ALCS) and Lou Gehrig (four in 1928 World Series) have recorded more go-ahead RBI in a postseason series in franchise history (since RBI became an official stat in 1920).
- Recorded 3H and drove in two of the Yankees' 3R in ALDS Game 3 at Kansas City, including a go-ahead RBI double in the fourth inning and a game-winning solo shot in the eighth (3-for-5, 1R, 1 double, 1HR, 2RBI, 1SB)...was the first Yankee to hit a go-ahead home run in the eighth inning-or-later since Raúl Ibañez hit a "walk-off" HR in the 12th inning in 2012 ALDS Game 3 vs. Baltimore...recorded his second career stolen base in the postseason in the sixth inning and his first stolen base including the regular season since 8/3/20 vs. Philadelphia.
- Five of his last seven postseason home runs (since 2022) have either tied the game (one) or given the Yankees the lead (four).
- Has batted .269/.342/.677 (35-for-130) with 22R, 5 doubles, 16HR, 35RBI, 16BB, 3SF and 25B in 36 career postseason games...has reached base safely in 30-of-36 postseason games...16 of his 35 hits in the postseason are home runs and 21 are extra-base hits (5 doubles, 16HR)...has hit 34RBI in his last 30 playoff games (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).
- Has 16HR through his first 36 career postseason games, the most by any Major League player...has 15HR in his last 28 postseason games since 2019 ALCS Game 1...homered in five straight games from 2020 AL Wild Card Series Game 1 through 2020 ALDS Game 3, the longest postseason homer streak in franchise history and tied with Adolis García (5G in 2023), George Springer (5G from 2017-18) and Carlos Beltrán (5G in 2004) for the second-longest in Major League history (Daniel Murphy, 6G in 2015).
- His 16HR in the postseason are the fourth-most in Yankees history, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR) and Mickey Mantle (18HR)...had 10HR in 15 postseason games from 2019 ALCS Game 1 through 2022 ALDS Game 5...was just the third player in Major League history to hit at least 10HR over a 15-game span in the postseason, joining Babe Ruth (11HR from 1926 World Series Game 4 through 1932 World Series Game 3) and Jim Thome (10HR from 1998 ALDS Game 1 through 1999 ALDS Game 5).
- Did not record a strikeout in 27 consecutive PA (from first PA of ALDS Game 2-first PA of ALCS Game 3)...marks his longest such streak without recording a strikeout in his career (regular & postseason).
- His 8.13 AB/HR ratio in the postseason is the best in Major League history (min. 100PA)...also ranks fourth in SLG (.677) and ninth in OPS (1.019).
- His three career HR in "winner-take-all" postseason games are tied with Jose Altuve, Didi Gregorius, Bill Skowron, Yogi Berra, Troy O'Leary and Kiké Hernández for the second-most home runs in "winner-take-all" games in Major League history, trailing only Aaron Judge (4HR).
- Including the postseason, the Yankees are 27-5 when he has homered this season.
- Hit .233 (97-for-417) with 49R, 20 doubles, 27HR, 72RBI and 38BB in 114 games with the Yankees.
- Has hit 429 home runs through 1,649 career games, the sixth-most home runs through 1,649 career games, trailing only Mark McGwire (504HR), Babe Ruth (466HR), Alex Rodriguez (442HR), Ken Griffey Jr. (432HR) and Albert Pujols (431HR).

### #25 GLEYBER TORRES—INF Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 2G

- Has made the postseason for the sixth time in his career (2018-22, '24).
- Has reached base in 18-of-45PA (11H/7BB) in the 2024 postseason, batting .297/.400/.432 (11-for-37) with 9R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 5RBI, 7BB and 1SF...has reached base multiple times in seven of his nine postseason games this year.
- Batted .364/.400/.409 (8-for-22) with 5R, 1 double, 2RBI, 2BB and 1SF in the ALCS vs. Cleveland.
- Reached base in 8-of-20 PA in the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- In 40 career postseason games, has batted .285/.374/.450 (43-for-151) with 27R, 7 doubles, 6HR, 22RBI, 22BB, 1SF and 6SB...has reached base safely in 34 of those games.
- Hit his first five career postseason home runs at age 23-or-younger, tied for the fourth-most by a player in Major League history prior to his 24th birthday, trailing only Carlos Correa (7HR), Juan Soto (7HR) and Evan Longoria (6HR)...only one other Yankee has hit as many HR in the postseason prior to turning 24 (Mickey Mantle, also 5HR).
- Batted .257 (151-for-587) with 80R, 26 doubles, 15HR, 63RBI, 65BB, 3HP, 8SF and 45B in 154G.
- Ranked seventh in the Majors in pitches per plate appearance (4.24, third in AL) and was tied for eighth in sac flies (eight, tied for fourth in AL).
- Batted leadoff in the starting lineup over his final 39 games of the season from 8/16-9/29, hitting .313/.386/.454 (51-for-163) with 31R, 8 doubles, 5HR, 18RBI, 20BB and 1SF over that span.
- His 138 career home runs are the seventh-most by a Yankee prior to his 28th birthday, trailing only Mickey Mantle (280HR), Joe DiMaggio (219HR), Lou Gehrig (198HR), Babe Ruth (148HR), Don Mattingly (141HR) and Joe Pepitone (139HR).

**Playoff Bests:** 4H (1x); 1HR (6x); 5RBI (1x); 3R (2x); 10G hitting streak (1x)

### #39 JOSE TREVINO—C Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 1G

- Has made the postseason for the second time in his career (2022, '24).
- Appeared in two games of the ALCS vs. Cleveland (1-for-2, 1RBI)...made his 2024 postseason debut in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland, hitting a go-ahead RBI single in the second inning (1-for-2, 1RBI).
- Did not appear in the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Hit .215 (45-for-209) with 26R, 5 doubles, 8HR, 28RBI, 20BB, 2HP, 2SF and 15B in 73 games with the Yankees.
- As a Yankee (since 2022), has hit .299 (52-for-174) with 8 doubles, 1 triple, 3HR, 60RBI, 13BB, 3HP and 3SF with runners in scoring position.
- Has posted a 3.34 catcher's ERA as a Yankee (since 2022), the best in the Majors over that span (min. 1,500.0 innings).
- Over parts of seven Major League seasons (2018-24), has posted a .992 fielding percentage (23E/2,999TC) in 389 career games (331 starts) as a catcher.
- According to Baseball Savant, his 10 catcher framing runs were tied the fourth-most in the Majors (Catcher Framing Runs converts strikes to runs saved on a .125 run/strike basis, and includes park and pitcher adjustments).
- Ranked fifth among Major League catchers with a 50.8% strike rate (Baseball Savant).
