19 IN '19: The Braves clinched the 19th division title in franchise history this season, beating San Francisco, 6-0 on September 20 at SunTrust Park to win the National League East...The 19 division titles are tied for the most in major league history with New York (AL)...This season also marks the franchise's 25th postseason berth in the modern era and its second straight.

A The Braves won a major league-record 14 consecutive division titles from 1991-2005, with the first three coming as NL West champs before moving into the NL East in the strike-shortened 1994 season...They also won the West in 1969 and 1982, and the East in 2013 and last season.

A The Braves became the second National League team to clinch a playoff berth this season and the third division winner in baseball...Los Angeles won the NL West, while New York took the AL East prior to the Braves.

A The Braves clinched the title in game No. 155 with starter Mike Foltynewicz earning the win...The Braves won the 2018 NL East title in game No. 155 with starter Mike Foltynewicz collecting the win.

A The Braves have now clinched their last three division titles in game No. 155...They also took the East in 2013 155 games into the season.

97 WINS: The Braves finished with a record of 97-65, the franchise's 12th 95-win season since Major League Baseball went to a 162-game schedule for both leagues in 1962...The 97 victories are the club's most since 2003 (101 wins) and the fifth most in baseball this season.

A The 12 total 95-win seasons since 1962 are tied for the most in the National League with Los Angeles, who also had one this season...The only team in baseball with more such seasons than the Braves is the Yankees, who have won 95 games 23 times since the advent of the 162-game schedule for both leagues in 1962.

A The Braves are the first National League team to reach 90 wins in consecutive seasons following three or more straight 90-loss seasons since the 1991 & 1992 Braves...The Braves won 90 games last season.

A That 1991 club went 94-68 and reached the World Series after four consecutive 90-loss seasons...The 1992 team finished 98-64 and lost in the World Series to Toronto.

A The Braves went 67-95 in 2015, 68-93 in 2016 and 72-90 last season.

A The last time the Braves had consecutive winning seasons was 2012-13, which was part of a string of five-consecutive winning seasons from 2009-13.

A This marks the club's 56th winning season in the modern era (since 1900), and their 30th since the club moved to Atlanta in 1966.

A The 30 winning seasons since 1966 are the fourth most in the National League, and 12 off the lead of the Los Angeles Dodgers...St. Louis has 39, while San Francisco has 31.

50 WINS AT HOME: The Braves went 50-31 at SunTrust Park this season, winning 50 home games in a season for the first time since 2013, when that club went 56-25 at Turner Field to tie the single-season record for most home wins.

A The club also won 56 home games in 1996, 1998 and 1999.

13 STRAIGHT AT HOME: The Braves set a franchise modern-era record this season with 13 consecutive home wins from August 17-September 7...The 2000 Braves set the previous record, winning 12 straight from April 8-May 5.

A The Braves' run started on August 17 vs. Los Angeles and continued with wins over Miami, Chicago (AL), Toronto and Washington.

A The last major league team with a longer winning run at home was Arizona in 2011; the Diamondbacks won 15 straight, August 9-September 10.

A The longest home single-season winning streak by any Braves team in franchise history is 18, set in 1897 by the Boston Beaneaters...Led by 31-game winner Kid Nichols and four other future Hall of Famers (manager Frank Selee, 3B Jimmy Collins, OF Billy Hamilton, OF Hugh Duffy), the Beaneaters won 18 straight at South End Grounds from May 31-June 25.

ROSTER: The Braves used 50 different players this season, eight fewer than the club employed last year.

A The Braves used 20 position players and 30 pitchers, with 2B Ozzie Albies leading the way with 160 games played...RHP Luke Jackson led all relievers with 70 appearances, while RHP Julio Teheran made a team-high 33 starts.

A The average age of the 36 players on the Braves' active roster for the final day of the season was 29, while the team's average age on the Opening Day roster was 28.

A The Braves finished the season as the third-oldest team in baseball by average age.

A The Braves used 11 rookies this season, including RHP Bryse Wilson and RHP Kyle Wright, who started the second and third games of the season... This season marked the first time since 1905 that the Braves had two (or more) rookie starting pitchers in the first three games of the season.

A RHP Dick Harley started game two in 1905, while LHP Irv Young made the first of his 42 starts that season in game three...Young's 378.0 innings that year stand as the franchise's modern record for most by a lefthander.

SNIT: Brian Snitker completed his 43rd season in the Braves organization in 2019, and his third full campaign as the Braves manager...Snitker took over on an interim basis on May 17, 2016, before being named Atlanta's manager on October 11, 2016...Snitker joined the organization as a non-drafted free agent in 1977.

A Snitker is 318-292 (.521) at the major league level and was named National League Manager of the Year last season.

A Snitker managed for 20 seasons in the minor leagues, compiling a 1,301-1,309 (.498) record, while five of his clubs advanced to postseason play...He was named Manager of the Year twice while in the minor leagues, winning the award in 1999 and 2000 with Single-A Myrtle Beach.

A Snitker is the third manager in franchise history to take the team to the postseason twice in his first three full seasons...The first was Fred Haney, who won the 1957 World Series in his managerial debut, before leading the club to a Game 7 loss in the Series the next season...The Braves played in the National League Wild Card game during Fredi Gonzalez's second season in 2012, before winning the NL East the next year.

ATLANTA BRAVES TEAM NOTES (continued)

ALL-STARS: The Braves had three players named to the All-Star team this season, with 1B Freddie Freeman and OF Ronald Acuña Jr. voted to start... RHP Mike Soroka was selected as a reserve.

A The selection was the fourth of Freeman's career, and he made his second straight start after earning 38.5% of the vote... He joined fellow first baseman Fred McGriff (1995-96) and Hall of Fame third baseman Chipper Jones (2000-01) as the only Braves infielders to win consecutive fan-elected starts.

A Acuña Jr. was selected to his first career All-Star Game after earning 15.0% of the outfield votes...He was 21 years, 203 days old at the time of the game, making him the youngest Braves player to start an All-Star Game and the third youngest player in franchise history to earn a selection (Hank Aaron in 1955, Ozzie Albies in 2018).

A Soroka, 21, and Acuña Jr., 21, both making the National League team marked the first time in major league history a single club had two players under the age of 22 go to the All-Star Game in the same season.

COMEBACKS: The Braves rallied for 32 wins in 2019, including four when they trailed heading to the ninth inning...They also had two wins when trailing by at least four runs in the ninth inning, the first time in the franchise's 144 years of existence that a Braves club had multiple such wins in a season...Both of those wins came on the road, and the last team with multiple such road wins in a season was the 1937 Boston Red Sox.

A The Braves rallied from a seven-run deficit in Game 2 of a doubleheader on Saturday, April 20 at Cleveland to win, 8-7...The victory was the club's biggest comeback since 2012, when they overcame a 9-0 hole following five innings in a 11-10, 11-inning win at Washington on July 20.

A The Braves trailed 7-3 heading to the ninth inning against the Indians, and the club's five-run rally marked their biggest ninth-inning comeback since scoring six on May 20 of last season to beat Miami, 10-9.

A Atlanta entered the ninth inning down 3-0 on May 26 at St. Louis, before scoring three runs in the ninth inning and one in the 10th to beat the Cardinals, 4-3.

A That win was the first for Atlanta over St. Louis when trailing by at least three runs in the ninth since July 12, 1962...In that inning, Tommie Aaron homered and his brother Hank hit a walk-off grand slam...It was the only time they ever homered in the same inning.

A On June 9 at Miami, the Braves rallied from a 5-1, ninth-inning deficit to win, 7-6, in 12 innings...It marked the Braves' third win of the season when trailing by at least three runs in the ninth inning, tied for the most such wins in a single season in franchise history...The 1985 club was the last Braves team to have three such wins in a season.

SERIES PLAY: The Braves went 32-12-9 in series play this season, and the club's 12 series losses were tied for the second fewest in baseball...Only Houston lost less (10)...The Yankees and Dodgers also lost 12 series.

A The Braves lost a make-up game in Colorado that counted as a series... Using a formula where ties count as half a series win, the Braves multi-game series play winning percentage of .702 is tied for the sixth best in the franchise's modern era.

A The 1993 club had the best mark at .740, while the 1999 team (.731), the 1998 team (.718) and the 1995 (.717) were also better...The 2002 club also had a .702 percentage.

VS. THE MARLINS: Atlanta went 15-4 against the Marlins this season, marking the first time the Braves have won 15 games against a single opponent in a season since 2004, when Atlanta also went 15-4 against Montreal.

A Since the Braves franchise moved to Atlanta in 1966, there have only been two other times the Braves have won at least that many games against a team in a season...The 1974 club went 17-1 against San Diego and the 1969 team went 15-3 against Houston.

JUNE: The Braves went 20-8 in June, marking the first time Atlanta collected 20 victories in a calendar month since August 2013, when they went 20-7.

A Atlanta lost consecutive games in June one time, dropping two games at Pittsburgh, June 5 and June 6.

A The Braves scored double-digits six times in the month, scoring a MLB-high 187 runs for June.

ON THE ROAD: The Braves finished 47-34 (.580) away from SunTrust Park this season, tied for the best road record in the National League for the second straight year...The club tied Los Angeles again, after both clubs went 47-34 last season as well.

A The 1993 club had the best road record in franchise history, going 53-28 (.654)...Only three other Braves clubs have won 50 road games in a season (1997, 51; 1957 & 1998, 50).

LINEUP CHANGE: The Braves were 18-20 after play on May 9 when manager Brian Snitker moved Ronald Acuña Jr. to the leadoff spot for the following day's game...From May 10 through the end of the season, the Braves went 79-45 (.637).

A Snitker also moved 3B Josh Donaldson into the 4th spot in the lineup and SS Dansby Swanson to the two hole.

STRONG STRETCH: From August 17 through September 7, the Braves won 17 of 19 games, outscoring the opposition, 98-55.

A Atlanta last had as good a stretch over 19 games in 2013, when that club also went 17-2 from July 27 to August 16.

A Going into August 17, the Braves had a 4.5-game lead over second place Washington...At the end of the stretch, the Braves were up by 10.0 games over the Nationals.

INTERLEAGUE PLAY: The Braves went 13-7 against the American League this season and finished the year with their second-best interleague record of all time.

A They went 15-3 in 2002 against the AL.

A This year marks the Braves' first winning season against the American League since going 11-9 in 2013...From 2014 to 2018, the Braves went 38-62 (.380) in interleague play, the third-worst record in the National League...They were the fifth best interleague team in baseball this season.

WEEKEND PLAY: The Braves went 54-26 (.675) on weekends this season, the best record in the National League...Only Houston was better in all of baseball, going 60-20 (.750).

A The Braves went 18-7 on Friday, 18-10 on Saturday, and 18-9 on Sunday.

ATTENDANCE: In 81 home dates, Atlanta drew a SunTrust Park single-season record 2,655,100 fans, a per-game average of 32,779... Atlanta drew 2,505,297 fans to SunTrust Park in its inaugural season of 2017 and 2,555,782 last season... This is Atlanta's fourth highest attendance total since the turn of the century, topped only by the 2000, 2001 and 2007 seasons.

A The Braves had a SunTrust Park-record 17 sellouts this season.

SCORE FIRST: The Braves went 75-26 (.743) in games they scored first, the second-best record in the National League...Only Los Angeles (72-21, .774) was better.

A Atlanta also finished second in the NL in this category in 2018.

A The Braves were 35-14 (.714) when they took a lead into the second inning this season.

A Atlanta pitchers held a lead after the fourth inning 77 times this season and the Braves went 71-6 (.922) in those games, easily the best record in baseball.

A No other team in baseball won even 90% of their games when holding a lead entering the fifth inning...Houston ranked second, going 76-11 (.874) when leading after the fourth.

NO LONG LOSING STREAKS: The Braves were one of three teams in baseball, and the only National League team, to not have a losing streak longer than four games this season.

A The Yankees and Twins were the other two teams...The Yankees had two four-game skids this season, while Minnesota had one.

A The Braves had two four-game skids this season, with their last coming from May 6-May 9...The Braves lost consecutive games after the All-Star break nine total times.

TRADE ACQUISITIONS: The Braves had seven players on the active roster for the final game that the club acquired via trade during the season: LHP Jerry Blevins, RHP Shane Greene, RHP Chris Martin, RHP Mark Melancon, RHP Anthony Swarzak, C John Ryan Murphy, and OF Matt Joyce.

A The seven players combined to compile 2.6 fWAR for the Braves, with Joyce providing 1.3 wins above replacement according to Fangraphs.

DEFENSE: The Braves finished the year with 33 defensive runs saved, the 12th most in the majors and eighth best in the National League... They finished below league average in Baseball-Reference.com's defensive efficiency, which measures the percentage of balls in play converted into outs, with a .685 mark...League average was .688.

A Last season, the Braves had a .709 defensive efficiency ratio, second best in the major leagues and trailing only Oakland's .717 mark

DAY GAME: The Braves played a major league-low 39 day games this season, going 23-16 in daylight...The next lowest total was by Los Angeles (NL), who played 42 such games.

OVERALL PITCHING: The Braves allowed 743 runs this season, tied for 12th fewest in baseball and tied for seventh fewest in the National League... They had a 4.19 team ERA, which ranked 10th in the majors and fifth in the NL.... Opponents batted .256 (1,421-for-5,557) against Braves pitching, which ranked 19th in the majors and 12th in the NL... Atlanta pitchers struck out 1,393, the 11th most in the NL, while walking 548, fifth fewest... The club allowed 203 home runs in 2019, eighth fewest in all of baseball.

Across Major League Baseball, there were 1,837 more runs scored in 2019 (23,467) compared to last season (21,630), and just six teams allowed fewer runs this season than they did in 2018... On average, teams surrendered 70.5 more runs in 2019 than in 2018... The Braves staff allowed 86 more runs this season in comparison to last.

Atlanta pitchers walked 548 batters this season, 87 fewer than last season and fewest by an Atlanta club since the 2016 team walked 547... Atlanta's 548 walks this season are 16th most in a single season since the Braves moved to Atlanta in 1966.

The Braves staff induced 1,903 ground balls on the year, fourth most in the majors and second most in the NL (Colorado, 2,076), while Atlanta's 479 extra-base hits allowed were fifth fewest in baseball... There were more home runs hit in 2019 (6,776) than in any season in major league history.

Just three Braves pitchers - Jeremy Walker, Jacob Webb and Huascar Ynoa - made their major league debuts, and combined to appear in just 44 games on the season (36 by Webb)... Ten Atlanta pitchers debuted last season.

STARTERS: The Braves used 11 starting pitchers this year, two fewer than they used last season... Overall, the starters went 60-46 (.566), the exact same record as last season and the seventh-best record in the majors in 2019 (third best in the National League)... They tossed 873.0 innings, the 12th most in baseball, while their 4.20 ERA (407 ER) was the 12th-lowest mark in the majors and seventh best in the NL.

The Atlanta staff totaled 873.0 innings this season, the fewest in a non-strike season for the franchise since at least 1913... Since the Braves moved to Atlanta in 1966, three of the four fewest innings totals by starters have come in the last four years... The 2016 starters pitched just 880.1 innings, while last year's club tallied 889.2... The 2008 team logged 886.1 innings from its starting staff.

Atlanta signed starter LH Dallas Keuchel to a one-year contract on June 8, and he made his Atlanta debut on June 21 at Washington... In 75 games prior to Keuchel's debut, Atlanta starters pitched to a 4.39 ERA, 16th best in the majors... In 87 games following his debut, Atlanta's 4.04 ERA by its starters was ninth best in baseball and sixth lowest in the NL.

From August 3 through September 24, Atlanta used the same five starters - Mike Foltynewicz, Max Fried, Dallas Keuchel, Mike Soroka and Julio Teheran - over a 47-game span... In those 47 games, Atlanta's 23 wins by its starting staff were most in the NL, while its 3.54 ERA was sixth lowest in the majors.

The Braves got just one complete game on the season, a rain-shortened 6.0-inning effort by Max Fried on August 1 vs. Cincinnati.

RELIEVERS: The Braves bullpen used 26 different pitchers in a relief role this season, four fewer than last season... Atlanta relievers went 37-19 with a 4.18 ERA (268 ER/577.2 IP) and converted 44-of-66 save opportunities.

Atlanta relievers fanned 598 batters this season, the most by a Braves relief corps in franchise history and just the sixth time Braves relievers struck out 500 in a single season... All six seasons have occurred since 2010.

The Braves' .661 winning percentage in relief (37-19) was the third-best mark in baseball and second best in the NL (San Francisco, .667)... It was the highest percentage by a Braves relief corps since the 2002 club went 30-14 (.682).

Atlanta's 19 losses in relief were tied with San Francisco for fewest in the NL and the third fewest in baseball... Only Cleveland and Houston, who both dropped 18 games in relief, lost fewer.

SAVES: Atlanta relievers went 44-for-66 in save opportunities, and 11 different pitchers recorded a save for Atlanta this season... The 11 relievers with saves tied for most in the majors with Tampa Bay.

Jerry Blevins, Shane Greene, Luke Jackson, Mark Melancon, A.J. Minter, Sean Newcomb, Anthony Swarzak, Josh Tomlin, Jonny Venters, Arodys Vizcaino and Jacob Webb all logged saves for Atlanta this season.

The Braves' 11 relievers with saves this season matched the franchise record since the save became an official statistic in 1969... The 1973 club also had 11.

Atlanta blew just 22 save chances on the season, tied for third fewest in the NL... Only Philadelphia (19) and St. Louis (21) blew fewer saves than Atlanta.

WIN STREAKS: The Braves won 12 straight starts by Mike Foltynewicz from June 11 to September 20, nine consecutive starts by Max Fried from July 15 to August 5, and eight straight starts by Mike Soroka from June 1 to July 14.

Atlanta was the only team in the National League to have three different win streaks of at least eight games in a pitcher's starts this season, and one of just two teams in the majors to do so.

The Yankees won 11 straight started by James Paxton, nine straight by Chad Green and eight consecutive by Domingo German.

Foltynewicz's run was the longest string of team wins in the NL this season, and the longest by any Braves starter since Atlanta won an MLB-record 23 straight starts by Kris Medlen from 2010 to 2012.

ONE-RUN STARTS: Atlanta had 62 starts this season in which its starter allowed one earned run or fewer, tied for the seventh most such starts in the majors and fifth most in the National League.

Julio Teheran had 17 such starts, tied for third most among traditional starters in baseball, while Mike Soroka had 15 which tied for 10th.

IMMACULATE: RH Chris Martin tossed the sixth immaculate inning in franchise history, September 11 at Philadelphia, fanning César Hernández, Jay Bruce, and Logan Morrison on nine total pitches.

Martin joined John Clarkson (1889), Joe Oeschger (1921), Tony Cloninger (1963), Joey McLaughlin (1979) and Buddy Carlyle (2007) in accomplishing the feat.

Martin was one of eight pitchers with an immaculate inning this season.

TEHERAN VS. MIAMI: RH Julio Teheran made five starts on the season against Miami and allowed just one earned run in 32.0 innings (0.28 ERA).

The 32.0 innings marked the most such innings in a season by a Braves pitcher against a single opponent allowing one earned run or less... Pat Jarvis held the previous record, holding Houston to one run over 31.1 innings in 1971.

Teheran became the 11th pitcher in the live-ball era to allow one or fewer runs in at least that many innings against a single opponent in a season... The last to do so was Chicago-AL's Britt Burns, who did not allow a run in 32.0 innings against the Indians in 1985.

Teheran pitched exactly 6.0 scoreless innings in each of his first three starts against the Marlins to open the season... His run was just the fourth time since 1908 that a Braves starter had three straight such starts against one opponent in a single season.

YOUNG START: The Braves pitched RH Julio Teheran on Opening Day, followed by rookies RH Bryse Wilson and RH Kyle Wright in games two and three.

This season marked the first time since 1905 that the Braves had two (or more) rookie starting pitchers in the first three games of the season.

RH Dick Harley started game two in 1905, while LH Irv Young made the first of his 42 starts that season in game three.

Wilson became the first Atlanta-era pitcher to start one of the first two games of a season prior to his 22nd birthday, and the first in franchise history since 21-year-old Wade Blasingame started game two in 1965.

Wright, who appeared in four games out of the bullpen in 2018, became the first Braves pitcher to make his first career start in the first three games of a season since LHP Horacio Ramirez in 2003.

Following those starts on Opening Weekend, Wilson and Wright made just 11 more appearances for the Braves on the season, including six starts.

ATLANTA BRAVES PITCHING NOTES (continued)

ACQUISITIONS: The Braves completed four trades in the two days prior to Major League Baseball's trade deadline, acquiring RHP Chris Martin from the Texas Rangers in exchange for LHP Kolby Allard on July 30, before trading for RHP Shane Greene, RHP Mark Melancon and C John Ryan Murphy on July 31.

A Greene, Martin and Melancon were each added to Atlanta's bullpen, and joined the Braves after combining to go 4-6 with a 2.65 ERA (36 ER/122.1 IP) over 119 games on the season with their original clubs, with 27 saves, 130 strikeouts and just 32 walks.

A The trio combined to pitch in 20 games for Atlanta from August 1 to August 14 and went 1-2 with an 11.15 ERA (19 ER/15.1 IP), three blown saves and 31 hits allowed.

A In their final 50 combined games for Atlanta, from August 15 through the end of the season, the three combined to go 1-0 with a 1.69 ERA (9 ER/48.0 IP), convert all 11 save chances and collect 14 holds...They did not blow a lead in that span.

MIKE SOROKA: Made 29 starts during his rookie season, going 13-4 with a 2.68 ERA (52 ER/174.2 IP), 142 strikeouts and a .236 opponents' average.

A **N.L. Ranks:** ERA (3rd, 2.68), wins (T10th, 13)

A His 2.68 ERA was the lowest by a rookie in the majors, and the lowest by any rookie pitcher since Miami's Jose Fernandez pitched to a 2.19 ERA over 28 starts in 2013.

A Soroka's mark was third lowest by any Braves rookie in the live-ball era (since 1920), trailing just a 2.38 ERA by Jim Turner in 1937 and a 2.57 mark by Nate Andrews in 1943, both of which came when the franchise was still in Boston.

A Turned 22 years old on August 4 and went 12-3 with a 2.58 ERA (40 ER/139.2 IP) in 24 starts aged 21 or younger...His 24 starts before turning 22 are fourth-most in franchise history since 1908, and the most since Steve Avery made 56 such starts.

A He is one of 145 pitchers in the live-ball era (since 1920) to make at least 24 starts aged 21 or younger...Of those 145 pitchers, Soroka's 2.58 ERA was fifth lowest, trailing just José Fernandez (2.25 in 36 starts), Dwight Gooden (2.28 in 99 starts), Mark Fidrych (2.34 in 29 starts) and Vida Blue (2.36 in 49 starts).

A Went 7-1 with a 1.55 ERA (17 ER/98.2 IP) over 16 starts on the road.

A Soroka's 1.55 ERA on the road was best in the majors among qualified starters, and nearly a full point lower than the closest pitcher (Jacob deGrom, 2.34).

A Since 1913, only three qualified Braves pitchers had a better ERA on the road than Soroka's mark this season...Greg Maddux pitched to a 1.12 ERA in 1995 and a 1.37 ERA in 1994, while Bill James compiled a 1.53 ERA on the road for the 1914 Boston Braves.

A Won a career-best 10 consecutive decisions, April 24 to July 14...Went 10-0 with a 2.27 ERA (23 ER/91.1 IP) during the stretch, which spanned 15 total starts.

A Became just the sixth Braves pitcher in the live-ball era (since 1920) with a double-digit win streak and the first since Greg Maddux also won 10 straight in 2001.

A Went 9-1 with a 2.42 ERA (24 ER/89.1 IP) over 15 starts to open the season and became the youngest pitcher in franchise history to be named an All-Star.

A Made his All-Star Game debut with a scoreless sixth inning, July 9 at Progressive Field...Retired Whit Merrifield, Carlos Santana and Dan Vogelbach.

A Allowed no more than one earned run in each of his first eight starts this season...Soroka joined Cincinnati's Edinson Vólquez (2008) and Oakland's Mike Norris (1980) as the only pitchers in the live-ball era (since 1920) to begin the season with eight consecutive starters of one earned run or less...No pitcher has gone nine straight.

A For his career, the righty allowed one earned run or fewer in 11 of his first 13 starts...Since earned runs became an official statistic in both leagues in 1913, no other pitcher in history had as many such starts among his first 13 career games...In fact, Soroka was the only one to have eight such starts through his first 10 career games.

A Soroka's 1.07 ERA was the third lowest in history (since 1913) by a pitcher aged 21 or younger in his first eight starts of the season, according to research by the Elias Sports Bureau...Only Los Angeles' Fernando Valenzuela (0.50, 1981) and Oakland's Vida Blue (1.02, 1971) had lower marks through eight starts.

GOING DEEP: Atlanta went 21-5 (.808) when its starting pitcher went at least 7.0 innings, and 60-23 (.723) when going at least 6.0.

A Atlanta starters pitched to a 2.17 ERA (128 ER/530.0 IP) when going at least 6.0 innings.

MIKE FOLTYNEWICZ: Made 21 starts on the season and went 8-6 with a 4.54 ERA (59 ER/117.0 IP).

A Went just 2-5 and pitched to a 6.37 ERA (42 ER/59.1 IP) in 11 starts to open the season...Allowed a career high-tying eight runs on June 22 at Washington and was optioned to Triple-A Gwinnett following the game.

A Returned to Atlanta on August 5 and started the next night at Minnesota and proceeded to go 6-1 with a 2.65 ERA (17 ER/57.2 IP) over his final 11 starts of the season.

A Since his return from Gwinnett on August 5, his 2.65 ERA was seventh lowest in the National League.

A Atlanta won each of his 12 starts from June 11 vs. Pittsburgh through September 20 vs. San Francisco, including each of his first nine turns since returning from his option to Gwinnett...Foltynewicz went 7-0 with a 3.54 ERA (27 ER/68.2 IP) during the stretch.

A The run of team wins in his starts was the longest such streak of his career, and the longest by any Atlanta pitcher since the Braves won an MLB-record 23 straight starts by Kris Medlen from 2010 to 2012.

A Foltynewicz's 12-game run was the longest by a starter in the National League this season...Houston won each of Gerrit Cole's final 13 starts of the season.

A Foltynewicz went 7-0 during the stretch, which was the longest winning streak of his career...He had previously won six straight from June 7 to July 25, 2017.

A Made his 100th career start, all of which had come for Atlanta, May 14 vs. St. Louis.

A Became the 20th pitcher to make 100 starts for the Braves since the team moved to Atlanta in 1966...Of the 20 pitchers to make 100 such starts, Foltynewicz's 8.61 SO/9.0 IP at the time were most, and he stood as one of just two starters to strike out at least eight batters per 9.0 innings for Atlanta.

A Missed Atlanta's first 25 games of the season on injured list after developing a right elbow bone spur during spring training...Was on the IL from March 28 to April 27.

DALLAS KEUCHEL: Made 19 starts with Atlanta and went 8-8 with a 3.75 ERA (47 ER/112.2 IP)...The 19 starts were his fewest since making just 16 during his debut season in 2012.

A Was signed by the Braves to a one-year contract worth \$13 million on June 8...Became the first CyYoung Award winner to pitch for the Braves since R.A. Dickey and Bartolo Colón made a combined 44 starts for the club in 2017, and the first winner to join Atlanta in the middle of the season since Mark Davis in 1992.

A In 75 games before Keuchel debuted, Atlanta starters ranked 16th in the majors with a 4.39 ERA...In 87 games following his debut, Atlanta's 4.04 ERA by its starters was ninth best in baseball and sixth lowest in the NL.

A Induced 208 ground balls since his season debut on June 21, easily most in the majors, while his 16 double plays rank second...Oakland's Brett Anderson had 174 ground balls in that span to rank second.

A Earned the win in Atlanta's final start before the All-Star break, July 7 vs. Miami, and in Atlanta's first game after the break, July 12 at San Diego...Became the third Braves pitcher to start and win consecutive regular season games for the Braves in the modern era (since 1900) and the first since Johnny Sain on September 6 and September 11, 1948.

A Won five consecutive starts for the first time in his career, August 20 to September 11...Had previously won four straight on five occasions, last in 2018.

A Struck out opposing pitcher Elieser Hernandez leading off the third inning, August 20 vs. Miami, for the 1,000th strikeout of his major league career.

REGULAR REST: Atlanta starters pitched 70 games on four days' rest this season and went 25-15 with a 3.58 ERA (155 ER/390.0 IP) in such starts.

A In 63 starts on five days' rest, Braves starters were 25-20 with a 4.32 ERA (163 ER/339.1 IP)...In 27 starts getting six or more days, Atlanta starters were 6-10 with a 5.81 ERA (86 ER/133.1 IP).

A Mike Soroka made 14 of his 29 starts on regular rest and went 7-1 with a 1.99 ERA (20 ER/90.1 IP) in those games...In his other 15 starts on the season, all with at least five days between outings, he was 6-3 with a 3.41 ERA (32 ER/84.1 IP).

NO HOME RUNS: The Braves had 49 games on the season in which they did not allow a home run and went 42-7 (.857) in those games.

A Atlanta's .857 winning percentage was best in the majors when not allowing a homer...Houston ranked second, going 36-7 (.837).

MAX FRIED: Played his first full major league season and went 17-6 with a 4.02 ERA (74 ER/165.2 IP) in 33 games, including 30 starts.

- A* **N.L. Ranks:** Wins (2nd, 17)
- A* His 17 wins were most in the National League by a left-hander, and second most in the majors among lefties...Boston's Eduardo Rodríguez won 19 games.
- A* Fried's 17 wins were most by an Atlanta left-hander since 2002, when Hall-of-Famer Tom Glavine won 18 games.
- A* Opened the season with 16.2 innings without allowing an earned run, before Arizona scored twice in the fourth inning of his start on April 16...It was the longest streak without an earned run to open the season by a Braves pitcher since 2013 (Paul Maholm, 25.1 IP).
- A* Appeared in 20 games before the All-Star break and set full-season career highs in wins (9), games (20), starts (18), innings (98.2) and strikeouts (97).
- A* Went 9-4 with a 4.29 ERA (47 ER/98.2 IP) before the break... His nine wins were the most by a Braves lefty before the All-Star break since 2013, when both Paul Maholm and Mike Minor had nine...No Braves left-hander has won more since Tom Glavine had 11 wins at the break in 2002.
- A* Missed nine games with a blister on his left index finger, July 16-July 27.
- A* Won five consecutive starts from July 15-August 13, becoming the first Atlanta pitcher to win five consecutive starts since Mike Minor won five in a row between the 2012 and 2013 seasons.
- A* Won a career-most seven straight decisions, July 15 to September 5.
- A* Went 7-0 with a 3.02 ERA (17 ER/50.2 IP) during the run, with wins over Milwaukee, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Minnesota, the Mets, the White Sox and Washington.
- A* The stretch spanned nine total starts, and Atlanta won all nine... Atlanta had not won more consecutive starts by a left-hander since 1993, when the Braves won 13 straight games started by Steve Avery.

TEHERAN: Went 10-11 with a 3.81 ERA (74 ER/174.2 IP) and 162 strikeouts over 33 starts.

- A* Made a career high-tying 33 starts...Has made at least 30 starts in each of the last seven seasons dating to 2013 and is the only pitcher in the majors to do so...Mike Leake (29 starts this season), Jon Lester (28), Max Scherzer (24) and José Quintana (28) are the only other pitchers to make at least 30 starts in every season from 2013-2018.
- A* Made his 200th career start, April 30 vs. San Diego...Became the ninth Braves pitcher to make 200 starts for the club since the team moved to Atlanta in 1966...Joined Phil Niekro (594), Tom Glavine (518), John Smoltz (466), Greg Maddux (363), Tim Hudson (243), Rick Mahler (218), Ron Reed (203) and Steve Avery (201).
- A* Ended his season with 226 career starts, sixth most in Atlanta-era history...His 77 wins are ninth most for the club since the team moved to Atlanta in 1966.
- A* Made 17 starts this season in which he allowed no more than one earned run, tied for the most such starts in the National League and second most in the majors among traditional starters.
- A* Houston's Gerrit Cole made 19 such starts, while Ryne Stanek had 25 while serving as the Rays opener...The Dodgers' Hyun-Jin Ryu had 18 such starts, while the Mets' Jacob deGrom and Cardinals' Jack Flaherty also had 17.
- A* Teheran made eight consecutive such starts from May 5 to June 13, tied for the longest in the majors by a traditional starter this season and matching a run by his rotation-mate Mike Soroka...TB's Ryne Stanek had a 14-game run while opening for the Rays.
- A* Pitched to a 3.31 ERA over his first 30 starts of the season, before allowing 14 earned runs over his final 11.1 innings to spike his ERA for the season to 3.81.
- A* Served as Atlanta's Opening Day starter for the sixth consecutive season, matching Hall-of-Famer Warren Spahn for the longest such streak by a pitcher in Braves franchise history...Only two other Atlanta pitchers (Greg Maddux from 1993-96 and Rick Mahler 1985-88) went even four straight.
- A* Teheran's streak is the longest active run by a pitcher in baseball after both Seattle's Felix Hernandez (10 seasons) and Los Angeles' Clayton Kershaw (eight seasons) saw their streaks end this year.

JERRY BLEVINS: 2019 marked his 13th major league season, and he went 1-0 with a 3.90 ERA (14 ER/32.1 IP) in 45 games with Atlanta.

- A* Celebrated 10 years of major league service time on July 27.
- A* Had a 27.00 ERA (6 ER/2.0 IP) against the Dodgers this season...Had a 2.37 ERA (8 ER/30.1 IP) against all other teams.
- A* Atlanta acquired him from the Oakland A's on April 28 in exchange for cash considerations...Was designated for assignment by Atlanta on May 14 and re-signed to a major league contract on May 18.

SHANE GREENE: Combined to go 0-3 with a 2.30 ERA (16 ER/62. IP) and 23 saves in 65 games between Detroit and Atlanta.

- A* Atlanta acquired him on July 31 in exchange for LH Joey Wentz and OF Travis Demeritte...At the time of the trade, Greene ranked fourth in the AL with 22 saves, while his 1.18 ERA was the second lowest in baseball among qualifying relievers (SD's Kirby Yates).
- A* Pitched to a 14.54 ERA (7 ER/4.1 IP) over his first six games with Atlanta...Pitched to a 1.77 ERA (4 ER/20.1 IP) in his final 21 appearances and converted his only save chance and all nine holds.

LUKE JACKSON: Went 9-2 with a 3.84 ERA (31 ER/72.2 IP) in a career-high and team-most 70 games...Converted 18 of his 25 save chances after logging just one career save prior to 2019.

- A* Had nine wins out of the bullpen, the most by a Braves reliever since Mike Remlinger had 10 in 1999...His nine wins tied for fifth most by a Braves reliever since 1913.
- A* Per Statcast, had an average exit velocity of 87.9 mph and an expected batting average of just .207...Opponents officially batted .266 against him.
- A* Fanned 106 batters in 72.2 innings for a career-best 13.13 SO/9.0 IP ratio...Struck out the fifth-most batters out of the bullpen in baseball, and his 106 strikeouts tied for the fourth most by a Braves reliever in Atlanta franchise history (since 1966).
- A* Recorded his second consecutive two-inning save, May 15 vs. St. Louis... Became the first Braves closer with back-to-back two-inning saves since Hall of Famer John Smoltz in 2002.

CHRIS MARTIN: Appeared in 58 games on the season between Atlanta and Texas, combining to go 1-3 with a 3.40 ERA (21 ER/55.2 IP) and four saves.

- A* Atlanta acquired him on July 30 and he went 1-1 with a 4.08 ERA in 20 games for the Braves...Pitched to a 1.59 FIP...Had an 11.57 ERA (6 ER/4.2 IP) in his first six games with the Braves, before pitching to a 1.38 ERA (2 ER/13.0 IP) in his final 14 appearances.
- A* Walked just five batters in 55.2 innings on the season, the fewest in baseball among pitchers with at least 50.0 innings...His 0.81 walks per 9.0 innings were second fewest, behind only teammate Josh Tomlin (0.79).
- A* Tossed the sixth immaculate inning in franchise history, September 11 at Philadelphia, fanning César Hernández, Jay Bruce, and Logan Morrison on nine total pitches.
- A* Joined John Clarkson (1889), Joe Oeschger (1921), Tony Cloninger (1963), Joey McLaughlin (1979) and Buddy Carlyle (2007) in accomplishing the feat.

MARK MELANCON: Combined to go 5-2 with a 3.61 ERA (27 ER/67.1 IP) and 12 saves in 66 games between San Francisco and Atlanta.

- A* Atlanta acquired him on the July 31 trade deadline, in exchange for RH Dan Winkler and RH Tristan Beck...In 23 games with the Braves, he went a perfect 11-for-11 in save chances and pitched to a 3.86 ERA (9 ER/21.0 IP)...Logged a 1.79 FIP.
- A* Allowed six runs in 5.1 innings (10.13 ERA) over his first seven games with Atlanta...In his final 16 games, went 1-0 with a 1.72 ERA (3 ER/15.2 IP) and 10 saves.
- A* His 11 saves with Atlanta give him 194 for his career, seventh most among active pitchers in the majors.

SEAN NEWCOMB: Pitched primarily in a relief role for the first time in his career and went 6-3 with a 3.16 ERA (24 ER/68.1 IP) in 55 games, including four starts.

- A* Opened the year in the starting rotation, before moving to the bullpen on May 4...Had a 3.04 ERA (18 ER/53.1 IP) in 51 games in relief... Issued just 19 walks and struck out 57 hitters after joining the bullpen.
- A* Recorded his first career save, May 20 at San Francisco...Became the first Braves pitcher to start multiple games and earn a save in the same season since Matt Wisler in 2016.
- A* Went a career-high 11 consecutive appearances without allowing an earned run, May 29 to June 29.

DARREN O'DAY: Made his Braves debut and pitched in eight games with Atlanta, logging a 1.69 ERA (1 ER/5.1 IP) and six strikeouts.

- A* Atlanta acquired him, July 31, 2018, and he missed the remainder of last season with a left hamstring strain...Missed the first 140 games of 2019 with a right forearm strain suffered in spring training.
- A* Allowed his only run of the season in his debut, walking the only batter he faced which came around to score...In his final seven games, allowed just three hits and one walk in 5.1 scoreless innings, fanning six.

- A* Atlanta acquired him, May 20, from Seattle in exchange for LH Jesse Biddle and RH Arodys Vizcaíno...In 44 games with the Braves, went 1-2 with a 4.31 ERA (19 ER/39.2 IP).
- A* Appeared in 17 games with the Braves and pitched to a 0.52 ERA (1 ER/17.1 IP), before missing six games with right shoulder inflammation from June 30 to July 12...In 27 games since returning from the injured list, went 1-2 with a 7.25 ERA (18 ER/22.1IP).

JOSH TOMLIN: Compiled a 3.74 ERA (33 ER/79.1 IP) in 51 appearances for Atlanta, including one start.

- A* Atlanta signed him to a minor league contract, March 21, and he made the Braves' Opening Day roster...2019 marked his 10th major league season.
- A* Walked just seven batters on the season, and his 0.79 walks per 9.0 innings were fewest in the majors (min. 50.0 IP).
- A* His 76.1 innings in relief were fifth most in the National League...He also made a 3.0-inning start, September 25 at Kansas City.

LEAD AFTER FOUR: Atlanta pitchers held a lead after the fourth inning 77 times this season and the Braves went 71-6 (.922) in those games, easily the best record in baseball.

- A* No other team in baseball won even 90% of their games when holding a lead entering the fifth inning.
- A* Houston ranked second, going 76-11 (.874) when leading after the fourth.

RUNS: The Braves scored 855 runs this season, the second most in modern-era franchise history (since 1900)...They were topped only by the 2003 club, who scored 907 runs...Only two other National League clubs scored more than the Braves this season: the Dodgers (886) and the Nationals (873).

A Ronald Acuña Jr. scored a National League-most 127 runs...Freddie Freeman (113) and Ozzie Albies (102) also scored triple-digit runs this season...This Braves club became the fifth in modern-era franchise history to have a trio of players each score 100 runs...The 2003 club was the last to do so, when a record five players scored triple-digit runs (Rafael Furcal, Marcus Giles, Andruw Jones, Chipper Jones and Gary Sheffield)...The Milwaukee trio of Hank Aaron, Bill Bruton and Eddie Mathews did this twice, first in 1955 and again in 1960...The 1999 club was the other to accomplish this (Bret Boone, Chipper Jones and Brian Jordan).

A Atlanta had 19 games in which it scored 10 or more runs, the club's most such games in a season since 2006, when they had 21 double-digit run games.

A The Braves scored a National League-most 491 runs prior to the All-Star break, the most a NL club scored before the break since 2008, when Chicago scored 507...The only Braves team to ever score more prior to the All-Star break was the 2003 club, which scored 506.

HOME RUN RECORD: The Braves hit a franchise single-season record 249 home runs, including a club record 131 at home...Atlanta hit 143 home runs before the All-Star break, also a franchise record.

A The Braves hit 118 home runs on the road...They hit a home run in a franchise modern-era record 30 consecutive road games, from June 9-August 11...Atlanta hit 54 total home runs over that stretch.

A Ronald Acuña Jr. hit a team-most 41 home runs, while Freddie Freeman had 38 and Josh Donaldson had 37...This Braves club became the 17th ever to have three players hit 35 home runs in a season...Two other Braves teams are on this list...The 1973 trio of Hank Aaron, Darrell Evans and Davey Johnson did it first, and it was matched in 2003 by Andruw Jones, Javy Lopez and Gary Sheffield...The Dodgers were the only other team to accomplish this this season (Cody Bellinger, Max Muncy and Joc Pederson).

A Atlanta had a franchise record 16 sets of back-to-back home runs, the second most in the majors behind Los Angeles-NL (17).

A The Braves hit 56 home runs in 28 June games, the most homers the club has ever hit in a calendar month...The previous record was 55 in May of 2003...Atlanta homered in 26 of their 28 games in June.

A Atlanta hit 10 leadoff home runs, one off the franchise record set last season...Ronald Acuña Jr. hit seven of these home runs, second most in the National League (Joc Pederson had 9)...Ozzie Albies hit two and Ender Inciarte hit one.

A The Braves hit nine pinch-hit home runs, one away from the matching the franchise single-season record...The 2010 and 2017 clubs both hit 10...Johan Camargo hit a team-most four pinch-hit home runs this season...Evan Gattis (4 in 2013), Tommy Gregg (4 in 1990) and Butch Nieman (5 in 1945) are the only Braves to hit that many pinch-hit home runs in a season.

LATE INNINGS: Atlanta scored 308 runs after the sixth inning, the most such runs in the majors...They hit 94 home runs in these later innings.

A The Braves were the first team since the 2009 World Series champion Yankees to score 300 runs in the seventh inning or later of games...That New York club scored a record 336 runs in those situations.

A Atlanta's 94 home runs from the seventh inning on were the most by any major league team since at least 1974.

AGAINST BULLPENS: The Braves batted .262/.348/.461 with 105 home runs and 277 walks off relief pitchers...Opposing bullpens compiled a 5.54 ERA (352 ER/572.0 IP) against Atlanta, by far the worst mark against any one team in the majors.

PRODUCTION FROM THE TOP: The Braves top four hitters in their lineup this season hit 149 home runs and scored 477 runs, totals that were both second most in the National League...Overall, these four lineup spots batted .277/.362/.513...The .362 on-base was also second in the NL.

A Atlanta's primary top four hitters -- Ronald Acuña Jr., Ozzie Albies, Freddie Freeman and Josh Donaldson -- combined for 133 of these home runs (89.3 percent) and 401 of these runs scored (84.1 percent).

RONALD ACUÑA JR.: 21-year-old OF Ronald Acuña Jr. finished his first full major league season hitting .280 (175-for-626) with a team-most 41 home runs in 156 games...Acuña Jr. ranked among NL leaders in: runs (127, 1st), stolen bases (37, 1st), hits (175, 7th) and home runs (41, T-5th).

A Hit a team-most 41 home runs and stole a National League-most 37 stolen bases...Is one of five players in baseball history to reach those numbers in a season...The four others are José Canseco (42 HR, 40 SB in 1988), Barry Bonds (42 HR, 40 SB in 1996), Alex Rodríguez (42 HR, 46 SB in 1998) and Alfonso Soriano (46 HR, 41 SB in 2006)...Acuña Jr. is the youngest of that group.

A Became the second player in baseball history to have at least 30 home runs and 30 stolen bases in a season prior to his 22nd birthday...The only player to do so was Mike Trout, who had 30 home runs and 49 stolen bases as a 20-year-old in 2012...Only three Braves have gone 30/30 at any age (Ron Gant, 1990 and 1991; Dale Murphy, 1983; Hank Aaron, 1963)...Acuña Jr. reached the 30/30 mark in Atlanta's 130th game, the quickest a Braves player has ever accomplished the feat.

A Is the 11th player in Braves history with at least 20 home runs and 20 stolen bases in a season, and the first since 2012, when OF Jason Heyward had 27 and 21.

A Acuña Jr. also had 26 home runs and 16 stolen bases last season...He is the sixth player in baseball history, and the first since Mike Trout in 2012 and 2013, with two 20-homer/15-steal seasons prior to his 22nd birthday.

A Acuña Jr. stole a base in a modern-era franchise record-tying five consecutive games from July 16-20 (seven total in that time)...He was the fifth Braves player with as long a streak and the first since Otis Nixon from July 20-24, 1991...Acuña Jr. had a major league-most 24 stolen bases after the All-Star break.

A Scored 127 runs, tied for the third most in franchise modern-era history...Hank Aaron also scored 127 in 1962 with Milwaukee...Dale Murphy scored a franchise record 131 in 1983, while Rafael Furcal scored 130 in 2003...Acuña Jr. was the first Brave to lead the National League in runs scored since 1985, when Dale Murphy scored 118.

A Ronald Acuña Jr. scored his 100th run of the season on August 13, Atlanta's 121st game of the season...He is just the third Braves player in the modern era to reach 100 runs that fast...Dale Murphy reached the mark in 114 games in 1983, while Tommy Holmes needed 115 games in 1945.

A The only other players 21 or younger to score 100 runs by their team's 121st game in the last 112 seasons were Hall-of-Famers Lloyd Waner (1927), Mel Ott (1929), Jimmie Foxx (1929), Joe DiMaggio (1936), Ted Williams (1940), and Al Kaline (1955), plus Vada Pinson (1959) and Alex Rodríguez (1996).

A Became just the third player in baseball history to hit 40 home runs in a single season prior to his 22nd birthday...Acuña Jr. joined two Hall of Famers in Eddie Mathews, who hit 47 in 1953 as a 21-year-old, and Mel Ott, who had 42 as a 20-year-old in 1929...Only Ott was younger at the time of his 40th...Acuña Jr. was 21 years, 275 days when he hit his 40th on September 19 against Philadelphia, while Mathews hit his when he 21 years, 316 days.

A Acuña Jr. became the 12th Braves player (23rd time overall) to hit 40 home runs in a season and the first since Andruw Jones (41 in 2006).

A Hit a home run in four consecutive games, from August 6-9 (two against Minnesota, two against Miami)...He also had a franchise record-tying five-game home run streak last season from August 11-14...He is the first player in major league history to have two home runs streaks of four-plus games prior to turning 22.

A Along with his 26 home runs last season, has 67 in his career...Hit his 50th career home run on July 21 against Washington...At 21 years, 215 days old at the time of the homer was the fourth youngest player in baseball history to reach that milestone...The three younger were Mel Ott, Tony Conigliaro and fellow Braves outfielder Andruw Jones.

A Hit his 60th career home run on August 13, becoming the sixth player in baseball history to hit that many home runs prior to turning 22...He joins Mel Ott (86), Tony Conigliaro (84), Eddie Mathews (72), Frank Robinson (60) and Ken Griffey Jr. (60).

A Is one of 17 players in the modern era with two 20-homer seasons before his 22nd birthday...Of the 16 prior, seven hit 500 home runs (Mel Ott, Ted Williams, Mickey Mantle, Eddie Mathews, Frank Robinson, Ken Griffey Jr. and Alex Rodríguez), while eight are in the Hall of Fame (Ott, Williams, Mantle, Mathews, Robinson, Griffey Jr., Al Kaline and Orlando Cepeda).

- A* Finished the campaign with 101 RBI...He reached the 100-RBI mark at 21 years, 276 days, the 14th youngest in baseball history to reach 100 RBI in a season...Hall-of-Famers Al Kaline and Mel Ott each had two of these seasons...The only other active players ahead of Acuña Jr. on his list are Miguel Cabrera (2004), Albert Pujols (2001) and Juan Soto (2019).
- A* Moved to the leadoff spot on May 10...Hit .280/.364/.528 with 34 home runs and 78 RBI in 118 games out of the No. 1 spot of the lineup...Atlanta went 78-41 (.655) in those games.
- A* He set franchise single-season records for most home runs and RBI batting first in the lineup...Acuña Jr. had 10 more home runs than Felipe Alou, who held the then-franchise record with 24 in 1966...Ray Powell previously held the RBI record with 74 in 1921.
- A* Hit seven leadoff home runs, the second most in the NL, behind Los Angeles' Joc Pederson (9)...Acuña Jr. also had eight of those home runs last season, a single-season franchise record...His 15 leadoff home runs are the second most in franchise history, behind Felipe Alou's 17.
- A* No other player in major league history hit more than five leadoff home runs before turning 22 (Mike Trout had five).
- A* Reached base in a career-high 32 consecutive games, from June 19-July 28...That was tied for the fifth longest streak in baseball this year, trailing Jorge Polanco (37 games), Pete Alonso and Max Muncy (34 games) and Trea Turner (33 games)...Alex Bregman also reached in 32 straight.
- A* Over the stretch, Acuña Jr. hit .290/.388/.496 with eight home runs, 15 RBI and 33 runs scored.
- A* It was the longest streak by a Braves player since 1B Freddie Freeman put together a 46-game streak in 2016, from August 6-September 28.
- A* Was selected to his first career All-Star Game and started in center field for the National League...He was 21 years, 203 days old on the day of the game, making him the youngest Braves player to start an All-Star Game and the third youngest player in franchise history to earn a selection (Hank Aaron in 1955, Ozzie Albies in 2018).
- A* Won the National League Player of the Week for the period ending April 14...The weekly honor was the second of Acuña Jr.'s career after also winning on August 19th of last season.
- A* Batted .545/.630/1.091 over six games, going 12-for-22 with one double, one triple, three home runs and nine RBI while guiding Atlanta to a 4-2 record.
- A* He had five straight multi-hit games from April 8-13, the longest such run of his career and tied for the longest for any Braves player since 2014...Acuña Jr. also drove in at least one run in each of the six games...Five of his RBI gave Atlanta the lead.
- A* Agreed to terms on April 2 on an eight-year contract extension through 2026 worth \$100 million, with club options for the 2027 and 2028 seasons...The deal began this season and was the largest in history for a player under club control with as little major league service time as Acuña Jr., who had accrued just 165 days at the time of the extension.
- A* The contract is also the second largest in franchise history, trailing the eight-year, \$135 million deal signed by Freddie Freeman in 2014.
- A* Acuña Jr. is also the youngest player in MLB history to sign a \$100 million contract.

OZZIE ALBIES: 22-year-old 2B Ozzie Albies finished his second full major league season hitting .295 (189-for-640) with 24 home runs and career-highs in doubles (43), triples (8), RBI (86) and stolen bases (15).

- A* Led the National League in hits, becoming the fifth Atlanta-era player to lead the league in hits, joining Freddie Freeman (2018), Terry Pendleton (1991 and 1992), Ralph Garr (1974) and Felipe Alou (1966 and 1968).
- A* His 189 hits were a single-season Atlanta-era record for a second baseman...Felix Millan held the previous mark of 183 in 1970.
- A* The Braves became the first National League team to have consecutive hit leaders since Chicago in 2005-2006...Derrek Lee had 199 in 2005 before Juan Pierre had 204 in 2006.
- A* Albies had consecutive four-hit games on August 6 and August 7 at Minnesota... He was just the eighth Braves player in the live-ball era (since 1920) with consecutive four-hit games, and the first since Matt Diaz in 2006.
- A* Albies collected another four-hit game on August 9 at Miami, his third in a four-game span...He is one of just three Braves players over the last 112 seasons to record three four-hit games in a span of four games...The other two are Marcus Giles in 2003 and Kenny Lofton in 1997.

OZZIE ALBIES CONTINUED: Had 55 multi-hit games, tied for the second most in the National League with Anthony Rendon...Arizona's Ketel Marte had a league-high 59.

- A* In 18 of those games, Albies had at least three hits...Only Colorado's Charlie Blackmon had more such games in the NL this year (21)...The last Brave with more three-hit games in a season was Martín Prado in 2010 (19).
- A* Albies has 36 three-hit games in his career, tying him with Hall-of-Famer Hank Aaron for the most such games by a Brave prior to his 23rd birthday.
- A* Had 24 home runs and 43 doubles...Along with his 24 home runs and 40 doubles last year, became the 11th player in baseball history to have 20 homers and 40 doubles in each of his first two full major league seasons...Others are on the list include Ted Williams, Chuck Klein, Alex Rodríguez, and Albert Pujols...Washington's Ryan Zimmerman was the last to do so (2006-07).
- A* Hit a career high-tying 24 home runs, two of which were grand slams (May 4 at Miami and July 27 at Philadelphia)...Albies had two of Atlanta's five grand slams in 2019 (Acuña Jr., Ortega and Riley all had one).
- A* Albies also had two grand slams last season...He is the fifth player in major league history to hit four grand slams prior to turning 23.
- A* At the time of his last grand slam, Albies was 22 years, 201 days old and joined three Hall-of-Famers (Ken Griffey Jr., Eddie Mathews, and Ted Williams) and four-time All-Star Giancarlo Stanton in accomplishing the feat...Only Stanton at 22 years, 195 days old was younger at the time of his fourth slam.
- A* Signed a seven-year, \$35 million contract extension on April 11...The deal will keep him in Atlanta through 2025 and contains club options for 2026 and 2027.

JOSH DONALDSON: The former American League MVP, whom the Braves signed to a one-year deal last November, hit .259 (142-for-549) with 37 home runs, 94 RBI, 100 walks and 96 runs scored.

- A* The 37 home runs he had were tied for the second most in a single-season of his career (also: 2016)...Donaldson hit 41 home runs during his MVP season in 2015.
- A* According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Donaldson's 37 home runs were the fifth most homers hit by a player in his first season for the Braves in franchise history...The four higher: Andres Galarraga (44 in 1998), Davey Johnson (43 in 1973), Jeff Burroughs (41 in 1977) and Wally Berger (38 in 1930).
- A* His home run total ranked fourth in the Atlanta-era of single-season franchise history for third basemen...Since 1966, when the Braves franchise relocated to Atlanta, only Chipper Jones (45 in 1999 and 38 in 2001) and Darrell Evans (41 in 1973) hit more home runs in a season among third basemen.
- A* Twenty-nine of his home runs came after June 10, when he was ejected after being hit by a pitch from Pittsburgh's Joe Musgrove... That total ranked third in the National League for that time and fifth in all of baseball, trailing Eugenio Suárez (35), Pete Alonso (32), Jorge Soler (31) and Nelson Cruz (30).
- A* Hit his 200th career home run on July 7 off Miami's Trevor Richards...Only 37 other active players have reached the 200-homer milestone.
- A* Drew 100 walks, producing the first triple-digit walk season for a Brave since Chipper Jones in 2009 (101).
- A* Is one of seven players in the Atlanta-era of team history to walk 100 or more times in a season...Along with Chipper Jones (1999, 2002, 2009), joins Jeff Burroughs (1978), J.D. Drew (2004), Darrell Evans (1973-75), Dale Murphy (1987) and Jimmy Wynn (1976).
- A* Is the fifth player in franchise history to hit 35 home runs and draw 100 walks in a season, joining Chipper Jones (1999), Dale Murphy (1987), Darrell Evans (1973) and Eddie Mathews (1954-55, 1960).

FREDDIE FREEMAN: Batted .295 (176-for-597) with career-bests in home runs (38), RBI (121) and runs scored (113) in his 10th major league season.

- A* Ranked third in the majors with 121 RBI, the most for a Brave since Andruw Jones drove in 129 in 2006.
- A* Became the 13th player in Braves franchise history to drive in at least 120 runs in a season.
- A* Drove home a run in an Atlanta-era record 10 consecutive games, from June 12-22...That streak tied the Braves all-time mark, done by Sid Gordon in 1951 with Boston (8/15-25)...Freeman had 18 total RBI in that stretch.

- A* Had 33 RBI in 28 June games, setting an Atlanta-era record for most RBI in a calendar month...The old record was 32, first set by Bob Horner in July of 1980 and later matched by Mark Teixeira in August of 2007.
- A* Finished second on the team with 38 home runs, easily the most of his career...His previous career high was 34 in 2016, over 158 games and 693 plate appearances...Hit his 34th home run this year in his 128th game and his 570th plate appearance.
- A* Only three left-handed hitters in Braves history have hit more home runs in a season...Eddie Mathews did so five times, while Darrell Evans and David Justice each did so once.
- A* Only two other Braves' first basemen have hit 38 home runs in a season...Andres Galarraga hit 44 in 1998, while Joe Adcock also hit 38 in 1956 with Milwaukee.
- A* Had 176 hits, 87 walks and was hit by six pitches, reaching base a National League-most 269 times.
- A* Reached 56 times prior to the end of April, breaking his own franchise record in that category...Freeman reached 55 times last March/April.
- A* Recorded his 300th career double and 200th career home run this year... Is one of six players in Braves franchise history in the 300-double/200-homer club...The other five to reach those marks are Hank Aaron, Andruw Jones, Chipper Jones, Eddie Mathews and Dale Murphy.
- A* The Braves are just the third franchise in the majors with at least six players at 300 doubles and 200 home runs...The Yankees have 11, while Boston has six.
- A* Freeman currently ranks fifth on the franchise's all-time doubles list (319) and seventh on the home run list (227).
- A* Began the season with a 27-game on-base streak, tying J.D. Drew (2004) for the longest season-opening on-base streak in Atlanta franchise history.
- A* Freeman's previous longest season-opening streak was a nine-game run last season...His longest for any time period is 46 games, from August 6-September 28, 2016.
- A* Was the starting first baseman for the National League in the All-Star Game...The selection was the fourth of Freeman's career and his second consecutive...He joined fellow first baseman Fred McGriff (1995-96) and Hall-of-Fame third baseman Chipper Jones (2000-01) as the only Braves infielders to win consecutive fan-elected starts.
- A* His 23 homers at the All-Star break were the most by a Braves first baseman since 1998, when Andres Galarraga had 28 before the break.
- A* Had 25 doubles and 23 home runs at the All-Star break, becoming one of seven players in franchise history to reach 20 home runs and 20 doubles prior to the All-Star Game.
- A* Along with his 25 doubles and 23 home runs, had 68 RBI and 69 runs scored at the All-Star break...Freeman was only the second player in Braves history with at least 20 doubles, 20 homers, 60 RBI and 60 runs prior to the break...Gary Sheffield was the other in 2003 (21 doubles, 22 home runs, 70 RBI and 70 runs).
- NICK MARKAKIS:** 14-year veteran OF Nick Markakis finished his fifth year in a Braves uniform, hitting .285 (118-for-414) with nine home runs, 62 RBI, 61 runs scored and nearly as many walks (47) as strikeouts (59).
- A* Hit 25 doubles, fifth most on the team...Ozzie Albies hit a team-high 43.
- A* Has 499 doubles in his career, a total only 64 other major leaguers have reached...Only three active players have hit more: Albert Pujols (661), Miguel Cabrera (577) and Robinson Canó (562)...Since Markakis joined Atlanta in 2015, his 183 doubles rank second most in the National League...Nolan Arenado has 190, while teammate Freddie Freeman and Anthony Rendon also have 183.
- A* Got hit by a pitch from Philadelphia's Cole Irvin on July 26, fracturing his left wrist...Was activated on September 13, missing 44 games.
- A* Prior to his injury, had played in 270 consecutive games, a stretch that dated to September 28, 2017...At the time, it was the longest active games-played streak in the majors.
- A* On June 10 against Pittsburgh, went 4-for-5 with four RBI...His run-scoring single in the sixth inning was the 1,000th RBI of his major league career.
- A* Became the 251st major leaguer to reach the 1,000-RBI milestone since the statistic became official in 1920.
- A* It was only the second game of his career with at least four hits and four RBI...His other such game came this year on April 4 against the Cubs, when he had five hits and five RBI, becoming the second player in franchise history to have five hits, three doubles and five RBI in a game (Gene Moore, 8/25/1936, with the Boston Bees).
- BRIAN MCCANN:** C Brian McCann, who signed a one-year deal in November to return to his hometown team, hit .249 (69-for-277) with 12 home runs, 45 RBI and 28 runs scored.
- A* Hit a game-ending, two-run single on June 14 against Philadelphia, driving in the 999th and 1,000th runs of his career.
- A* Became the 13th catcher and 252nd player in major league history to reach the 1,000-RBI milestone since the statistic became official in 1920...His teammate, Nick Markakis, reached the mark four days earlier on June 10 against Pittsburgh.
- A* McCann was the first Braves player to record both his first and 1,000th RBI with the team since Andruw Jones collected No. 1,000 in 2006, 11 seasons after his initial RBI.
- A* Since the Braves franchise moved to Atlanta in 1966, the following are McCann's ranks with the franchise in that time: doubles (5th, 236), RBI (6th, 706), hits (7th, 1,139), home runs (8th, 188) and games (8th, 1,190).
- AUSTIN RILEY:** 22-year-old Austin Riley, who entered the season ranked by Baseball America as Atlanta's No. 1 prospect, received his first major league promotion on May 15...Riley played in 80 games with the Braves and hit .226 (62-for-274) with 18 home runs, 49 RBI and 41 runs scored.
- A* Named the National League Rookie of the Month in May, his first month in the majors...Hit .356/.397/.746 with seven home runs and 20 RBI in 15 games.
- A* Hit a home run in his second career at-bat, May 15 vs. St. Louis, becoming the eighth player in the Atlanta-era of franchise history to homer in his major league debut and the first since Evan Gattis on April 3, 2013.
- A* Hit his 10th career home run on June 12, the 26th game of his career... Was the fastest Braves player, by games played, in the modern era to reach double-digit career home runs...Wally Berger held the old record, hitting his 10th home run in his 29th game in 1930.
- A* Recorded his 25th career RBI in the 18th game of his career...Since RBI became an official statistic in 1920, Riley was the second fastest player to 25 RBI, by games played, in major league history...Only the Cubs' Mandy Brooks in 1925 reached the mark quicker, recording his 25th RBI in his 17th career game.
