DASHED HOPES: After a strong start to the season, the Giants did not end the year with a winning record, finishing at .500 (81-81) for the second time in franchise history (and second time in the last three seasons, also 2022)...when it was all said and done, SF finished in third place in the National League West, 12.0 games behind the division champion Dodgers...in terms of the NL Wild Card, the Giants finished just 2.0 games back of the final WC spot that was claimed by Cincinnati.

JUST A BIT OUTSIDE...: 2025 marks the eighth time in the last nine years (since 2017) in which the Giants have missed the Postseason with the 107-win 2021 season being the outlier.

MANAGERIAL CHANGE: The day after the conclusion of the 2025 season, the Giants dismissed MGR Bob Melvin with one year remaining on his contract...he finished his two-year tenure as Giants manager with a record of 161-163.

THE FANS SHOWED OUT: The Giants welcomed 2,925,823 fans through the turnstiles at Oracle Park for an average of 36,121 fans per game...that number represented a 3,024 fans/per game increase over last season.

- The 36,121 average home attendance was seventh-best in the Majors and sixthbest in the National League.
- ▶ The last time the Giants drew more than 2,925,823 fans in a season was 2018 when SF drew 3,156,185 fans.
- ▶ SF finished the season with 28 sellouts at Oracle Park, its highest total in a season since selling out 50 games in 2017...the 28 sellouts were three more than the Dodgers (who led MLB in attendance at 4,012,470 fans) announced in 2025.

SHORT PEAKS, DEEP VALLEYS: The Giants' season was defined by a streakiness that lasted the entire season.

- ▶ SF shot out of the gate to an 8-1 record (their best start since 2003) and were 19-12 at the conclusion of April but would not record another winning month until September when they went 13-12 to finish the season.
- ▶ At the 70-game mark, the Giants were 41-29 following a 6-2 win at the Dodgers in LA on June 13 and were in a first-place tie with LA in the NL West...it was, unfortunately the second and final time that the Giants would be a season-best 12 games over .500.
- ▶ Over the club's next 59 games from June 14-August 22, the Giants were 20-39 (.339) and owned the worst record in the Majors in that span (the next closest were the White Sox at 22-36)...the .339 winning percentage was the worst 59-game stretch by an SF team since 2017 when it happened four different times.
- ▶ A frenetic surge over the season's final 33 games saw SF go 20-13 to get back to .500 but their playoff chances evaporated when they went 5-12 in the midst of that stretch from September 6-23.

ATWO-HEADED MONSTER: The Giants went a combined 7-19 against the Dodgers and Padres in 2025 and were 74-62 against everyone else they played.

▶ Overall the Giants were 40-45 (.471) against teams that were .500 or better in 2025 and 41-36 (.532) against teams there were under .500.

ON THE SHORES...: SF finished the year 42-39 at home thanks to a three-game sweep of the Rockies at the end of the season that capped off a 13-6 mark over the team's final 19 home games dating to mid-August.

- ▶ The Giants' needed the 13-6 stretch because they went 1-15 over a 16-game home stretch from July 12-August 16...that stretch was the worst 16-game stretch at home in Giants history since 1901.
- ▶ Furthermore, SF was 7-22 over a two-month span at home from June 17-August 16...as a team they slashed .215/.289.328 for a .617 OPS in that time while averaging 2.83 runs per game.

ROSTER CONTINUITY: The Giants used a total of 53 players, a few under the league average mark of 56.4...the 53 players used were tied for the ninth-fewest of any club and five fewer than last year's club used (58).

The average age of SF's batters was 28.1 years, just slightly over league average of 27.9 year...as for the pitchers, SF's average age of 29.8 years was tied for ninth-oldest in the Majors (league average was 29.2 years).

SHOWTIME: Six different players made their Major League debut for the Giants, a drastic decrease from a season ago (13).

- ▶ The six MLB debuts were tied for seventh-fewest in the Majors...Miami and the Athletics led the Majors with 15 players apiece who made their MLB debuts.
- ▶ The six players who debuted were: IF Christian Koss (April 1), RHP Carson Seymour (June 29), LHP Carson Whisenhunt (July 28), OF Drew Gilbert (August 8), RHP Joel Peguero (August 21) and IF Bryce Eldridge (September 15).

2025 REGULAR SEASON NOTES

TEAM BATTING NOTES

THE OFFENSE: The Giants had a .697 OPS that ranked 22nd of 30 MLB clubs and 11th of 15 teams in the National League.

- ▶ SF was closer to the middle of the pack in terms of runs per game, averaging 4.35 runs/game...that mark was 17th of 30 clubs and 10th of 15 National League clubs.
- ▶ Heading into the final six weeks of the season, however, SF was averaging 4.02 runs/game, 25th out of 30 clubs and third-lowest in the NL.
- An offensive surge that began on August 23 helped improve SF's overall numbers for the season...from August 23 through the end of the year, the Giants' 5.64 runs/game was best in the Majors, their .750 OPS was seventh-best in MLB (fifth-best in the NL) and their 47 homers were also seventh-best.
- ▶ The home run barrage started before August 23 in the form of an 18-game streak with at least one homer from August 17-September 5, the longest streak in the San Francisco-era (1958-pres.) and second-longest in franchise history behind a 19-game streak from the 1947 New York Giants

RIGHTY TIGHTY, LEFTY LOOSEY: The Giants were 11 games over .500 (64-53) when facing a right-handed starter...when facing a lefty starter, SF was 11 games under .500 (17-28, .378).

- ▶ The club's .378 win % in games started by a lefthander was fourth-worst in MLB and third worst in the NL ahead of only the Rockies (8-34, .190) and Nationals (18-30, .375).
- ▶ The Giants had a .645 OPS versus left-handed starters, third-lowest in the Majors ahead of only the Nationals (.616) and Marlins (.637)...against left-handed pitching overall (including relievers), the Giants had a .631 OPS, worst in the Majors.

WE ♥ WALK-OFFS: The Giants once again logged 11 walkoff wins, tied for most in the National League with Milwaukee and tied for second-most in the Majors behind the Red Sox (12).

► Since 2022, the Giants have 39 walkoff victories, most in MLB.

OPS BY POSITION, A BREAKDOWN: Below is a chart of the Giants OPS by position and in parentheses is where that OPS ranked in the Majors...the Giants ranked above league average in just four of the nine spots.

- ▶ The Giants' left side of the infield combined for a .769 OPS, fifth-best in the Majors and second in the NL to only the MLB-leading Diamondbacks left side (.822 combined OPS).
- ▶ That left side also clubbed a combined 57 homers, third in the Majors behind the D-Backs (61) and Mets (58)...the 168 RBI from SF's left side were sixth-most in the Majors (third-best in NL).
- ▶ Conversely, the right side of the infield combined for a .619 OPS, 29th in the Majors ahead of only the Rockies (.614)... the 29 homers were 24th of 30 clubs while the 137 RBI were 22nd-most.

RED LIGHT: The Giants finished with the fewest stolen bases in the NL and second-fewest in MLB...SF stole 68 bases, 14 fewer than the next closest NL team (Atlanta, 82)...only Detroit had fewer steals than SF (61).

- ▶ Over the last two seasons, the Giants combined to steal 136 bases, fewest in the Majors.
- ▶ The Giants only attempted 92 steals, fewest in the NL and second-fewest in the Majors ahead of only Detroit (77)...the Giants 182 stolen base attempts since 2024 are lowest in the NL and second-lowest in MLB ahead of Detroit (177).

ON THE BASEPATHS...: The Giants made 50 outs on the bases (does not include pickoffs, force plays or caught stealings), eighth-most in the Majors and sixth-most in the NL

▶ In terms of taking the extra base, the Giants were successful 42% of the time, right about league average.

TEAM PITCHING NOTES

SALES PITCH: The Giants pitching staff finished the season with the 10th-best ERA in the Majors at 3.82 (sixth-best in the NL)... four of the five teams in the NL with a lower team ERA than the Giants made the playoffs (all except Pittsburgh).

▶ Giants hurlers had a 0.90 HR/9ip mark that was lowest in the Majors) and allowed 143 homers overall, fewest in MLB...SF pitchers had a 3.77 FIP, second-lowest of any group in MLB behind only the Phillies' 3.74 FIP.

START HERE: In terms of the starting pitchers, SF's 4.10 starter's ERA was 17th of 30 MLB clubs but slightly better than league average (4.21).

- ▶ The quartet of RHP Logan Webb, LHP Robbie Ray, RHP Justin Verlander and RHP Landen Roupp posted a solid 3.58 ERA (258er, 648.0ip) in 117 starts (58 quality starts) with a 1.30 WHIP...those four had a 9.01 K/9ip mark, a 3.00 K/BB ratio and they averaged 5.2 innings pitched per game.
- ► The other 11 pitchers to make starts for SF combined for a 5.86 ERA (123er, 189.0ip) with a 1.48 WHIP, 8.71 K/9ip, 2.18 K/BB ratio and averaged 4.2 innings pitched per game.
- ▶ Giants starters threw 837.0 innings, up from the 778.2 innings the unit threw a season ago...still, SF's 837.0 innings from starters was 17th of 30 clubs.

PENMANSHIP: Despite trading away key bullpen pieces at the deadline, the Giants still finished the season with the fourth-best bullpen ERA in the Majors (3.48)...they trailed only San Diego (3.06), Boston (3.41) and Cleveland (3.44).

- ▶ Through July 31 (the Trade Deadline), the Giants had the second-lowest bullpen ERA in MLB (3.22) behind only the Padres (2.97)...after the trades, SF's bullpen unit posted a 3.97 ERA, 13th of 30 MLB teams.
- ▶ The Giants bullpen wasn't a heavy-strikeout group, registering a 7.93 K/9ip ratio that was fourth-lowest of any bullpen group in MLB and second-lowest in the National League ahead of only Colorado (7.86)...the 526 strikeouts by the bullpen were the fewest by a Giants club in a full season since the 2017 bullpen struck out 458 batters.
- ► The unit's BB/9ip ratio was third-best among MLB bullpens at 3.11...only the Cubs (2.95) and Rays (3.08) were better.
- ▶ Over the final two months, however, SF's bullpen K/9ip ratio of 7.16 was lowest in MLB while their 3.06 BB/9ip ratio was seventh-best.
- ► For all the different closers used in 2025, SF's pen had a 65.1% save percentage that was tied for ninth-best in the Majors, converting on 41-of-63 save opportunities.

TEAM DEFENSE NOTES

BYTRADITIONAL METRICS: A defense that seemed crisp early on finished the season with 95 errors, sixth-most in the Majors but second-most in the NL behind only the Rockies (110).

SF's .984 fielding percentage was 24th of 30 MLB clubs and third-lowest in the National League ahead of only Washington (.984) and Colorado (.981).

BY OUTS ABOVE AVERAGE: The drop off defensively from a season ago also was reflected in Baseball Savant's Outs Above Average metric, which had the Giants at -23 in 2025, tied for 23rd of 30 clubs and third-worst in the NL.

► SF infielders combined for a -5 OAA, 17th of 30 teams, while their outfielders were last at -18 OAA.

BY DEFENSIVE RUNS SAVED: According to Fangraphs, SF finished the year +18 defensive runs saved, a dramatic increase from a season ago when they finished the year at -3...still, the Giants at +18 were 16th of 30 MLB teams.

▶ Most of this gain came from catcher (+17), pitcher (+9) and second base (+13)...it was brought down by a -21 DRS from SF's outfielders.

FROM THE SIS COMPUTERS: The Giants ranked 11th with 168 Good Fielding Plays in 2025 and had 301 defensive misplays & errors, the 10th most in MLB... last year, the Giants ranked 22nd in Good Fielding Plays with 144 and their 333 defensive misplays and errors were tied with the Mets for seventh-most.

BEHIND THE DISH: The Giants allowed 92 stolen bases, sixth fewest in the Majors and a vast improvement over a season ago (146, third-most)

▶ SF had nine passed balls, tied for ninth-most in the Majors but down from 15 passed balls in 2024.

2025 REGULAR SEASON NOTES

INDIVIDUAL HITTER NOTES

WILLY THE KID: IF Willy Adames shook off a tough first two months and surged to became the first Giant to hit 30 homers in a season since **Barry Bonds** slugged 45 homers all the way back in 2004.

- ▶ The 2025 Willie Mac Award winner led the team in home runs (30), RBI (87), extra-base hits (54), walks (80), runs scored (94) and games played (160)
- ▶ By leading the team in homers, Adames became the first Giants shortstop to lead the team in homers since **Brandon Crawford** led the 2015 Giants with 21 homers.
- ▶ This was the third straight season he led his team in homers (he led Milwaukee in 2023 and 2024)...he's just the third shortstop since the end of World War II to lead his team in homers in three consecutive seasons...the other two are Ernie Banks (seven straight from 1955-61) and Alex Rodríguez (four straight from 2000-03; counts only his seasons primarily paying SS).
- Adames' 30 homers were tied for most among Major League shortstops with NYM's Francisco Lindor while his 87 RBI were third-most among MLB shortstops...since 2021, Adames' 142 homers and 447 RBI are most among Major League shortstops.

CALL RAFI!: IF/DH Rafael Devers settled into the orange and black nicely following the June 15 trade that brought him to the Bay Area from Boston.

- ▶ He slashed .236/.347/.460 with 15 doubles, 20 homers and 51 RBI in 90 games for SF...his 20 homers and 51 RBI were second-most on the team after June 17 (his first game with the club) behind **Willy Adames**' 22 homers and 55 RBI in that time...Devers' .807 OPS was also-second-best on the team from June 17 onward behind Adames' .835 OPS.
- ▶ The 28-year-old slugger picked up his fourth career Player of the Week award when he was named co-NL Player of the Week for the period from August 25-31...he slashed .478/.556/.957 (1.512 OPS) with nine runs, two doubles, three homers and 10 RBI in the six-game span.
- ► The 28-year-old was one of five players in the Majors with 100+ RBI and 100+ walks...the other four were NYY's Aaron Judge, LAD's Shohei Ohtani, PHI's Kyle Schwarber and NYM's Juan Soto...Devers was the first of the five to eclipse both marks.
- ▶ Because of the mid-season trade, Devers was also able to play in 163 games between Boston and SF, the first MLB player to do so since Justin Morneau in 2008 with the Twins.

OL' CHAP: IF Matt Chapman finished his second season in the orange and black with a .770 OPS, 21 homers and 61 RBI in 128 games...his 3.7 fWAR was second-best on the team behind **Willy Adames** (4.0 fWAR).

- ▶ He reached the 20-homer mark for the sixth time in his career with his 21-homer season...Chapman's 48 homers in his first two years as a Giant are tied with **Johnny Mize** for fourth-most by a player in his first two seasons with the club (*Stats, LLC*).
- ▶ Defensively he was worth +5 Defensive Runs Saved and +4 Outs Above Average at third base.

MORE HARDWARE COMING?: C Patrick Bailey followed up last year's Gold Glove season with another year that should put him in consideration for another come awards season.

- ▶ The 26-year-old remained the most elite pitch framer in the Majors, being worth +25 framing runs, nine more than the TOR's Alejandro Kirk who finished the year at +16...14 of those 25 framing runs came on balls outside of the zone, five more than the next closest catcher...Bailey's 47.7 shadow strike % was also best in the Majors among full time catchers.
- ▶ Bailey's pop-time to second base remained quick at 1.86s, tied for quickest among ML catchers...his +8 catchers caught stealing above average mark was third-best in MLB behind NYM's Luis Torrens (+12) and BOS' Carlos Narváez (+9).
- ► His 30.7 caught stealing percentage was third-best in the NL for any catcher who appeared in at least 85 games.
- ▶ He improved on his blocking, netting the year at +5 blocks above average after finishing last year at -1.

JHL DELIVERED: OF Jung Hoo Lee finished his first full MLB season by appearing in a career-best (KBO or MLB) 150 games.

- ▶ Lee became the fifth Giant in the SF-era with 30+ doubles and 10+ triples in a season.
- ► From July 1 through the end of the season, Lee batted .298 with 14 doubles, six triples, two homers, 21 RBI, 27 runs scored and a .773 OPS...Lee's 12 triples were third-most in MLB.

INDIVIDUAL PITCHER NOTES

WEBBMASTER: RHP Logan Webb racked up a second consecutive All-Star nod in 2025 and then became the first Giants' starter with a 200-inning, 200-strikeout season since **LHP Madison Bumgarner** in 2019...he was the first Giants righty to do it since **Jeff Samardzija** in 2017.

Webb again paced the National League in innings pitched for a third consecutive season while leading the Majors overall in innings for the second time in the last three seasons (also 2023)...he also set a career-best with his 224 strikeouts, reaching the 200-strikeout mark for the first time in his career...see Webb's full NL rankings in various categories below.

- Webb became the first Giant since Bill Voiselle for the 1944 New York Giants to lead the National League in both innings pitched and strikeouts.
- ▶ He is also the first pitcher to lead the NL in innings in three consecutive seasons since Liván Hernández did so for three straight years in 2003-2005.
- ▶ The 28-year-old now has three consecutive 200-inning seasons, the first Giant to do so since Bumgarner had six straight seasons from 2011-16.
- ➤ Since the start of the 2022 season, Webb has thrown the most innings in the Majors (820.0)....the next closest player is Houston's Framber Valdez (767.2).

RAYGUN: LHP Robbie Ray had a resurgent return to form in 2025 that garnered him his second career All-Star nod...the 33-year-old made 32 starts, tied for the second-highest total of his career and most since his 2022 season in Seattle.

- ▶ Ray finished among the National League leaders in ERA (3.65, 10th), innings (182.1, 6th), quality starts (16, T-10th), and strikeouts (186, 11th).
- ▶ SF went 22-10 (.688) in Ray's 32 starts in 2025, tied for the third-best winning percentage in a pitcher's starts by any team with NYY's Max Fried...only the Phillies in Cristopher Sánchez's starts (23-9, .719) and the Red Sox in Garrett Crochet's outings (23-9, .719) fared better.

JUST IN TIME: RHP Justin Verlander finished off the season as one of the Giants most reliable starters down the stretch...the 42-year-old logged a 2.60 ERA (21er, 72.2ip) with 70 strikeouts and a .228 opponent's average against over his final 13 starts of the season...SF went 6-7 in those 13 games, however, and Verlander himself was credited with a win only four times.

- ▶ Verlander allowed two earned runs or fewer in 10 of those final 13 starts...his 2.60 ERA from July 23 to the end of the season was fourth-best in the National Leauge (min. 60.0ip) behind only PIT's Paul Skenes (2.08), LAD's Yoshinobu Yamamoto (2.10) and MIL's Freddy Peralta (2.40).
- ▶ The future Hall of Famer ended up with only four total wins in 2025, increasing his career total to 266, which is now tied with Bob Feller and Eppa Rixey for 34th-most all-time.
- ▶ He struck out 137 batters to give him 3,553 strikeouts in his illustrious career...he's now eighth on the all-time strikeout list just behind Don Sutton (3,574).

A STAR IS BORN?: RHP Randy Rodríguez received his first All-Star nod after a stellar first half campaign that saw him go 3-1-1 with a minuscule 0.86 ERA in 41 appearances...he struck out 55 batters in 41.2 innings in the unofficial first half and was one of three Giants to represent the club in Atlanta.

- ▶ The 26-year-old was the first Giants reliever that was a non-closer to make an All-Star team.
- ▶ Unfortunately for Rodríguez after being moved into the closer's role with the trading of Camilo Doval it was revealed in late August that he'd need Tommy John surgery to reconstruct the UCL in his right elbow.
- ▶ He underwent successful UCL reconstructive surgery on September 24 in Dallas, TX...Dr. Keith Meister performed the surgery...Rodríguez is expected to miss all of next season with his recovery time being listed as 12-14 months.

2025 REGULAR SEASON INJURED, BEREAVEMENT & PATERNITY LISTS

According to Stats, LLC, the Giants finished the year with just 749 days missed on the Injured List third fewest among any MLB team. The league average for days missed on the list per team in 2025 was 1,481.3 days.

2025 GIANTS MINOR LEAGUE HIGHLIGHTS

SEASON IN REVIEW: The 2025 Giants farm system finished with a combined record of 295-254 (.537) between their affiliates in Triple-A Sacramento (77-73), Double-A Richmond (56-79), High-A Eugene (81-51) and Single-A San Jose (81-51)...SF led the entire 2025 Minor League system with 27 combined Player and Pitcher of the Week awards...SF also had six players make their MLB debut in 2025 (IF Christian Koss, RHP Carson Seymour, LHP Carson Whisenhunt, OF Drew Gilbert, RHP Joel Pequero and IF Bryce Eldridge).

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL STAR: The Giants organization finished the season with 15 total All-Star and Player Awards and three Minor League Manager of the Year awards...at the Triple-A level, RHP Carson Seymour and LHP Carson Whisenhunt were named PCL All-Stars, while Whisenhunt was named PCL Pitcher of the Year...at the High-A level, IF Charlie Szykowny and OF Bo Davidson were named NWL All-Stars, while Jeremiah Knackstedt was NWL Manager of the Year...at the Single-A level, IF Jakob Christian, OF Dakota Jordan, OF Carlos Gutierrez, UT Jean Carlos Sio and LHP Jacob Bresnahan were all named CAL All-Stars, while Bresnahan also earned CAL Starting Pitcher of the Year and Ydwin Villegas earned Manager of the Year... in the ACL, IF Dario Reynoso, RHP Argenis Cayama and RHP Keyner Martinez were all named ACL All-Stars with IF Johnny Level being named the league's top MLB prospect in addition to Martinez earning Pitcher of the Year and Jacob Heyward Manager of the Year.

SOUTH BAY SUPERSTARS: The **San Jose Giants** had the strongest season among the Giants affiliates, as they won the California League Championship after finishing first in the CAL North...it was the franchise's eighth title in team history...SJ finished among the top of all Single-A teams in batting average (.261, 1st), runs (811, 1st), home runs (101, T-2nd), RBI (731, 1st), OPS (.755, 2nd), ERA (3.50, 1st) and WHIP (1.32, T-4th)... SJ's playoff appearance was its 18th in its last 21 seasons.

OCTOBERFEST: San Jose continued its six-season playoff streak after finishing first in the California League with a league-best 81-51 record, its highest win total since 2013...the Giants won the CAL for the first time since 2021 and seventh time overall since their founding in 1988...the club's six-season playoff berth is the longest active streak in the California League...the **Eugene Emeralds** also clinched a playoff berth after finishing the season with an NWL-best 81-51 record...the Emeralds lost to Everett (1-3) in a best-of-five NWL Championship Series.

ROCKIN' ROOKIES: The Giants' three rookie ball teams finished the season with a combined 110-60 record (.647), led by the **ACL Giants**, who clinched the ACL Division Title after finishing the season 42-18 (.700) with five ACL All-Star selections...the **DSL Giants Black** finished their season 33-23 (.589), while the **DSL Giants Orange** went 35-19 (.648)...2025 marked the third-straight year that every rookie ball affiliate finished above .500.

WELCOME TO THE FARM: SF saw six of its 2025 draft picks make their pro-ball debuts: IF Gavin Kilen (1st round, 13th overall), OF Trevor Cohen (3rd round, 85th overall), IF Lorenzo Meola (4th round, 116th overall), LHP Jordan Gottesman (6th round, 176th overall), OF Cam Maldonado (7th round, 206th overall) and OF Damian Bravo (15th round, 446th overall).

THE BRYCE IS RIGHT: The Giants' top prospect, **IF Bryce Eldridge**, made his MLB debut on September 15...at 20 years and 330 days old, he became the youngest Giant to make his Major League debut since **Madison Bumgarner** (20 years, 38 days) did so on September 8, 2009 vs. San Diego....Eldridge was drafted 16th overall in 2023 and spent a majority of the 2025 season with Double-A Richmond and Triple-A Sacramento...in 102 MiLB games, Eldridge hit .260 with 46 runs, 21 doubles, 25 homers and 84 RBI...he ranked among Giants top-5 organizational players in homers (25, 1st), slugging percentage (.510, 1st), RBI (84, 2nd), extra-base hits (46, T-2nd) and total bases (196, 5th)... in 10 games with San Francisco, Eldridge had two doubles, four RBI and seven walks.

THE WHIZ: LHP Carson Whisenhunt made his Major League debut on July 28 after going 9-5 with a 4.43 ERA (53er, 107.2ip) with a 1.37 WHIP, .273 opponent average and a 20.9% stikeout rate in 21 starts with Sacramento, earning him PCL Pitcher of the Year...in the hitter friendly PCL, Whisenhunt had an especially successful May, going 4-1 with a 2.56 ERA (11er, 38.2ip), 34 strikeouts and a 0.93 WHIP in six starts.

THE FUTURE IS NOW: OF Trevor Cohen, SF's 3rd round pick, made his pro-ball debut with San Jose...in 28 regular season games with the San Jose Giants, Cohen went 35-for-107 (.327) with 23 runs, three doubles, a triple, a homer, 15 RBI and 20 walks (.840 OPS)...Cohen then went 7-for-16 (.438) with four runs and two RBI in four playoff games for San Jose.

THE FUN DOESN'T HAVE TO STOP: Eight Giants players will be participating in this year's Arizona Fall League (AFL), which kicks off on Monday, October 6th... LHP Ricardo Estrada, RHP Spencer Miles, RHP Ryan Murphy, RHP Jose T. Perez, LHP Juan Sanchez, IF Maui Ahuna, IF Parks Harber and IF Walker Martin will be suiting up for the Scottsdale Scorpions.

BRESNA-HAND IT TO YOU: LHP Jacob Bresnahan was named the 2025 California League Starting Pitcher of the Year after going 9-3 with a 2.61 ERA (27er, 93.0ip) with 1.18 WHIP and a .201 opponent average across 22 starts for San Jose.

LEVEL UP: SS Jhonny Level was named the ACL's Top MLB Prospect after hitting .288 with 10 doubles, four triples, nine homers and 38 RBI across 58 games for the ACL Giants...he spent the second half of the season with San Jose, where he slashed .236/.333/.339 in 31 games...he finished the season ranked as the Giants No. 4 top prospect on *MLB.com* and No. 5 according to *Baseball America*.

OTHER NOTABLE PERFORMANCES: IF Charlie Szykowny led Giants minor leaguers with 53 extra-base hits, 85 RBI and 234 total bases...RHP Josh Bostick struck out a career-high 14 batters in his start on August 12 at Tri-City, tied for the most strikeouts by any MiLB pitcher in a single game and most by a NWL pitcher since 2022...IF Walker Martin hit three grand slams, most by any Single-A player in 2025.

RAY GUN: The 2021 Cy Young Award winner wrapped up his 12th season in the Majors and second with San Francisco...the 2025 season marked the fourth year of a five-year, \$115 million contract he signed with Seattle in late 2021...he opted into the final two years of the contract prior to the season's start.

IT'S A WRAP: After making a combined eight starts in his previous two seasons (2023-24) while recovering from Tommy John, Ray started 32 games for SF in 2025, finishing the year with a 11-8 record and 3.65 ERA...the 3.65 ERA was his lowest since his Cy Young season in 2021 (2.84) and fourth-lowest in his 12-year career.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: Made his first start on March 30 at Cincinnati and was perfect through 5.0 innings before allowing a single to Gavin Lux to start the 6th...took the win and worked 5.1 innings with three runs on three hits, one walk and four strikeouts.

LUCKY CHARM: The Giants won all of Ray's first nine starts in 2025, making him the first Giants starter to have the team win each of his first nine starts of a season since **Bill Swift** in 1992 (11 wins to start the season).

SEVEN UP: Carried a perfect 7-0 record into his final start of May before taking a loss in his 12th start of the year on May 31st at Miami...became the first Giants starter since Hall of Famer **Juan Marichal** (1966) to tally at least seven wins and remain undefeated through his first 11 starts of a season...he also joined **Kevin Gausman** (2021) as the only Giants starters in the Wild Card Era to start a season 7-0.

ROBBIE RAY MAY: Was named the National League Pitcher of the Month after going 4-1 with a 1.38 ERA (6er, 39.0ip), 45 strikeouts, a 0.87 WHIP and a .169 opposing batting average in six May starts... the southpaw became the first Giant with an ERA of 1.38 or lower in a month and at least 39.0 innings pitched since Madison Bumgarner in May 2016 (1.05 ERA, 42.2ip)...he also became the seventh Giants southpaw (17th occurrence) with at least 45 strikeouts in a single month, joining Madison Bumgarner (6x); Rube Marquard (4x); Carlos Rodón (2x); Ray Sadecki...the honor was the second Pitcher of the Month award of Ray's career (also: AL Pitcher of the Month in August 2021 with Toronto).

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: Was selected to the NL All-Star team for the second time in his career...the lefty, who was also an All-Star in 2017 with the Diamondbacks, enjoyed the best first half of his 12-year MLB career, posting his lowest career ERA (2.65) before the break (min. nine starts).

MISSION COMPLETE: Tossed his second career complete game on July 3 at Arizona and retired the first 12 batters he faced to start the night...Ray entered the 9th inning at just 78 pitches with just one run (solo HR) on two hits and no walks before working a 24-pitch 9th to close out the evening...overall, he finished the outing giving up two runs (both homers) on three hits with a walk and seven strikeouts in the 9.0 innings thrown...he became the first Giants pitcher to throw a 9.0 inning complete game with 102 pitches or fewer since RHP Anthony DeSclafani did so on April 26, 2021 vs. Colorado (100 pitches)...he was the first Giants lefty to do so since LHP Madison Bumgarner on August 3, 2014 (94 pitches).

CHANGING THINGS UP: Told reporters in the spring that he added a changeup to his pitch mix after connecting with 2024 AL Cy Young Tarik Skubal in the offseason to learn about his grip....Skubal sent Ray pictures, video and was available to chat with him about the pitch...after incorporating the pitch during Spring Training, Ray threw it 399 times (13.0% of the time) through 32 starts (all to righties), with batters going 17-for-73 (.233) with 16 strikeouts off the pitch.

LEFT ON READ: Left-handers slashed .188/.282/.318 off him on the season...the .188 average was third-best in the National League, trailing LAD's Yoshinobu Yamamoto (.174) and SD's Nick Pivetta (.185).

THE LONG BALL: Went a career-best 51.0 innings (seven starts) without giving up a home run between April 21-June 5...his 1.09 HR/9.0ip (22HR/182.1ip) rate was his lowest since posting a career-best 0.63 HR/9ip (9HR, 127.2ip) in 2015.

FAST AND FURIOUS: Batters hit .208 (75x361) off his four-seamer, his most used pitch (52.0%)...the pitch had a +9 run value, his highest of any pitch since 2022 (slider)...additionally, Ray's 108 strikeouts with a four-seamer were most in the NL and ranked second in the Majors behind only MIN's Joe Ryan (109).

TRAFFIC JAM: Ray issued 73 walks on the season, most in the NL and tied for fourth-most in MLB...it marked his second-most walks allowed in a season, behind only 2019, when he walked a career-high 84 batters across 33 starts.

ROAD SHOW: Held opponents to a .207 (68x329) average in 16 starts on the road as opposed to a .234 average in 16 starts at Oracle Park...Ray's .207 opposing average on the road was eighth-best in MLB and ranked fifth in the NL behind LAD's Yoshinobu Yamamoto (.168), MIL's Freddy Peralta (.194), PIT's Paul Skenes (.203) and CIN's Nick Lodolo (.204).

GOOD LUCK CHUCK: The Giants were 22-10 in his starts...the .688 winning percentage ranked as the second-best record of any NL team behind the same starter, trailing only the Phillies 23-9 (.719) record with Cristopher Sánchez on the mound... it also tied NYY's Max Fried for the third-best team record among starters in MLB, (other: Boston's Garret Crochet at 23-9).

HOME STRETCH: Had a rocky stretch to finish the season... was 1-2 with a 8.13 ERA (25er, 27.2ip), .303 (33x109) BAA and 1.77 WHIP (16 walks) in his final six starts of the year (August 24-September 19).

2025 SEASON: The Giants' fourth starter for most of the season, Roupp had his year cut short after suffering a left knee bone bruise in his start on August 20 at San Diego...the injury shut his season down and he went 7-7 with a 3.80 ERA (45er, 106.2ip), 102 strikeouts and 45 walks allowed in 22 starts (eight quality outings)...the Giants went 12-10 in his outings.

OFF THE INJURED LIST: Missed a total of 54 games (approximately nine starts) with right elbow inflammation (missed 19 games) and a left knee inflammation/bone bruise (35 games missed).

HOME VS. ROAD: Had a 2.63 ERA (14er, 48.0ip) in nine starts at Oracle Park compared to a 4.76 ERA (31er, 58.2ip) in 13 starts on the road...his 2.63 home ERA ranked as the 14th-lowest among NL pitchers with at least 40.0 innings pitched.

THROWING A CURVE: Roupp's curveball was very effective as opponents were just 29x147 (.197) with 49 strikeouts and a 35.8% whiff rate...he relied on his curveball 35.7% of the time in 2025... opponents hit .305 (84x275) vs. everything else he throws.

AIN'T NOBODY GOT TIME FOR THAT: With the bases empty, Roupp averaged 11.9 seconds between pitches, which was tied for the second-quickest in the Majors...Cincinnati's Brent Suter was quickest with only 11.5 seconds between pitches with the bases empty... league average in 2025 was 15.8 seconds...when Roupp had runners on, he averaged 16.0 seconds between pitches, still below the league average of 18.7 seconds.

FOR THE FIRST TIME: Roupp made the Giants' Opening Day roster for the first time in his career.

CAREER-HIGH IN K'S: Registered a career-best nine strikeouts in his fourth start of the season on April 19 at Los-Angeles-AL...had seven-or-more punchouts in six of his 22 starts overall.

NOT THE BEST: Had his shortest start of his career as a starting pitcher on June 14 at Los Angeles-NL, recording just five outs (1.2ip) while allowing six runs on four hits and five walks in the Giants' 11-5 defeat to the Dodgers.

FIRST IL STINT: Placed on the 15-day Injured List on July 25 (retroactive to July 23) with right elbow inflammation...Roupp told Giants reporters that he initially felt some discomfort after his start against the Dodgers on July 12...an MRI showed no structural damage...pitched in one rehab game with Triple-A Sacramento before being reinstated from the IL on August 15.

SECOND IL STINT: After coming off the IL on August 15, he made just one more start the rest of the season...had to be carted off the field in the 3rd inning of his start on August 20 at San Diego...he twisted his left knee on the mound while trying to avoid a line drive off the bat of Ramon Laureano...was diagnosed with a left knee sprain and flew back to San Francisco the next day to receive an MRI...placed on the 15-day Injured List on August 22 with left knee inflammation...had a second opinion on his left knee with Dr. Timothy McAdams at Stanford Medicine and Dr. McAdams confirmed the diagnosis of a bone bruise and no structural damage to the rest of his left knee...his recovery time was approximately four weeks.

WITH THE GIANTS: The nine-time All-Star (2007, 2009-2013, 2018-19, 2022), three-time Cy Young Award winner (2011, 2019, 2022) and two-time World Series Champion (2017, 2022) completed his 20th season in the Majors in 2025 and his first with San Francisco...the 42-year-old signed a one-year, \$15 million contract with SF on January 11.

THAT'S A WRAP: Pitched better than his numbers would indicate over the course of the season and it was especially true in the second half of the year...Verlander's four wins were the fewest of his career in a single season in which he made at least 10 starts (previous low was five wins in a 20-start season for Detroit in 2015)...his 11 losses were the fourth-most of his career and most since losing 12 games for the Tigers in 2014...on the flip side, his 29 starts were his most since his 2019 Cy Young campaign with Houston when he made 34 starts.

HARDLY ANY LUCK AT ALL: Verlander had four wins in 2025 but was in line for seven others upon leaving the mound in 2025 only to see them fall by the wayside...he now has 266 wins in his career, tied for 34th-most all-time with Eppa Rixey and Bob Feller according to *Elias...*the Giants were 10-19 in the 29 games Verlander started... to put it in perspective, Verlander is the third Giant since at least 1901 to register four or fewer wins while making at least 17 starts and having an ERA of 3.85 or below...the other two were Madison Bumgarner in 2017 (4-9, 3.32 ERA in 17 starts) and Al Worthington in 1953 (4-8, 3.44 ERA in 20 games, 17 starts).

VINTAGE JV: Verlander turned on another gear in the second half of the season and was one of SF's most reliable starters... he posted a 2.60 ERA (21er, 72.2ip) over his last 13 starts dating to July 23, eighth-best in the Majors (fourth-best in the NL) in that time (min. 60.0ip)...he allowed one earned run or fewer in eight of those 13 outings...Verlander had a 3.39 FIP in this stretch, eighth-best in the NL...he was even better over his last six starts of the season, owning a 1.78 ERA (7er, 35.1ip) with 33 strikeouts and an opponent's average against of .206.

START ME UP: Made 29 starts in 2025 at 42 years of age...the last Major Leaguer 42 years of age (or older) to make at least 29 starts in a season was R.A. Dickey in 2017 for the Braves...overall, he's made 555 career starts which are 27th-most all-time according to *Elias*.

SUPPORT GROUP?: Verlander received 62 total runs of support in his 29 starts (3.67 run support average)...he received three or fewer runs of support in 23 of his 29 starts...the Giants went 6-17 in those contests...overall, Verlander's 3.67 run support average was seventh-lowest in the Majors (sixth lowest in the NL) among pitchers who made at least 29 starts.

HANG 10: Verlander struck out 10 Orioles hitters over 5.0 innings on August 31 in a 13-2 Giants win...it was Verlander's first double-digit strikeout game since October 4, 2022 with Houston versus Philadelphia (also 10 strikeouts)...the last pitcher older than Verlander to spin 5.0 scoreless innings and record a do3uble-digit strikeout game was Roger Clemens, who did so on July 22, 2005 with Houston (6.0ip, 10k).

DOUBLE-DOUBLE: The 42-year-old Verlander became the oldest Giant in team history to record a double-digit strikeout game...**Vida Blue** held the previous mark at 37 years, 34 days. the double-digit strikeout game was the 73rd of Verlander's 20-year career, which are 12th-most all-time...Bob Gibson and Sam McDowell are tied for 10th-most with 74 apiece.

FOUR!: Had a four-start stretch from August 31-September 17 where he allowed one or zero runs...the only other pitcher age 42 or older to do that in a four-start span in the last 125 seasons was Roger Clemens in 2005.

WHAT'S MY AGE AGAIN?: He began and ended the season as the oldest active player in not only the Major Leagues but also in any of the four major American sports...chart below courtesy of *SportRadar*...ages are current to the day of Verlander's last start on September 27.

WEBBY: Webb finished his seventh season with San Francisco, leading the team in wins (15), starts (34), innings (207.0), strikeouts (224) and ERA (3.22)...finished the season as the longest tenured Giant (after the trade of **Mike Yastrzemski**)...among the rest of the National League, Webb ranked inside the top-10 in a majority of key pitching categories, including leading the league in innings pitched, strikeouts and starts...he also ended the year tied for the NL lead in quality starts.

HEY NOW...: Elected an All-Star for a second straight season and the second overall time in his career...worked 1.0 scoreless inning in the game on July 15 at Truist Park in Atlanta, GA.

MR. 200: Webb became the first Giants pitcher to record 200.0 innings and 200 strikeouts in the same season since **Madison Bumgarner** (207.2ip, 203 strikeouts) did so in 2019...he is the first Giants right-hander to accomplish the feat since **Jeff Samardzija** (207.2ip, 205 strikeouts) in 2017...he is also the first Giants pitcher to reach 200.0 innings in three straight seasons since Bumgarner did so in six straight seasons from 2011-2016.

FIRST TIME SINCE WHEN?!: With Webb leading the NL in both innings (207.0) and strikeouts (224) in 2025, he became the first Giant since **Bill Voiselle** in 1944 to lead the NL in both of those categories in a single season.

GOOD COMPANY: Webb has now led the National League in innings pitched in each of the last three seasons...a single Giant has never done that...the last time any Giant led the NL in innings pitched in three straight seasons was **Juan Marichal** in 1968 (325.2ip) and **Gaylord Perry** in 1969 (325.1ip) and 1970 (328.2ip)...Webb is also the first player to lead the NL in innings in three straight seasons since Liván Hernández did so from 2003-2005 with Montreál and Washington.

WHEN YOU'RE 15: On the last day of the season Webb tied his career-high for wins (15) set in 2022...the only other Giants since 2000 with multiple 15-win seasons are Madison Bumgarner (four), Tim Lincecum (three) and Jason Schmidt (two).

HOME/ROAD SPLITS: The righty went 8-4 with a 3.10 ERA (40er, 116.0ip) and 126 strikeouts at Oracle Park (19 starts)...his 126 strikeouts at Oracle Park are the fifth most in a season since the ballpark opened in 2000, and the most since **Madison Bumgarner** had 141 in 2015...in 15 road starts, Webb was 7-7 with a 3.36 ERA (34er, 91.0ip) and 98 strikeouts.

HELPING THE CATCHER: Webb drastically improved his ability to keep runners in check in 2025 and limit stolen bases...he had +5 Net Bases Prevented (a sum of advances prevented and outs added assigned to the pitcher), which was tied for 13th-best in the Majors on *Baseball Savant*...he had scores of -5 in 2024, -9 in 2023 and -4 in 2022, -1 in 2021 and -3 in 2020...from 2020-2024, Webb allowed an average of 14 stolen bases off him per season (72 in five seasons)... in 2025, Webb allowed a total of nine stolen bases.

1,000 MILES: Passed 1,000 career innings during his start on August 5 at Pittsburgh, becoming one of 18 different Giants pitchers to reach the 1,000-inning milestone in the SF-era (1958-present).

GOING THROUGH CHANGES: After his sinker was his most valuable pitch in 2024 (+17 run value) and the majority of 2025 (+8) per *Baseball Savant*, Webb's changeup ultimately led the way in 2025, finishing with a +10 run value...in his last start of 2025, opponents were 0-for-7 with three strikeouts vs. the changeup...overall, they hit .207 (47x227) with 81 strikeouts, which is his third-most strikeouts with one pitch in a single season, behind only his 92 strikeouts with his changeup in 2023 and his 88 strikeouts with his sweeper in 2021.

SINK OR SWIM: His sinker had a +8 run value on *Baseball Savant*, making it his most valuable of the three types of fastballs he threw...over his last eight starts, batters were 25-for-59 (.424) with eight extra-base hits (two homers) vs. his sinker.

NO WALK ZONE: His four games with 10+ strikeouts and no walks were the most by a Giant in a single season in the last 125 seasons, surpassing the three game mark set by **Carlos Rodón** (2022), **Kevin Gausman** (2021) and **Madison Bumgarner** (2012, 2016) (*Sarah Langs*)...overall, Webb has six career games of 10+ strikeouts and no walks...the only other Giants with five or more such games in the last 125 seasons are Bumgarner (12) and **Tim Lincecum** (five).
