NEW YORK METS (89-73)
TIED FOR SECOND PLACE, NL EAST, 6.0 GB



METSCELLANEOUS: The Mets finished the season going 89-73, tied for second in the National League East and clinching a Wild Card spot in the Postseason...Their 89-73 record was a 14-win improvement from 2023 (75-87)...The team fell to the Los Angeles Dodgers 4-games-to-2 in the NLCS.

MENDOZA LINES: Carlos Mendoza was named the 25th manager in franchise history...The 44-year-old spent the previous 15 seasons with the Yankees organization, including the last four as the club's bench coach...From 2018-2019, Mendoza served as the Yankees' quality control coach...Prior to joining the big league coaching staff, Mendoza served as a manager and coach in the Yankees farm system...A native of Barquisimeto, Venezuela, Mendoza is the second full-time Venezuelan-born manager in big league history, joining Ozzie Guillén.

DINGERS: The Mets finished sixth in the majors and fourth in the NL with 207 home runs this season...New York hit 215 home runs in 2023 and 171 in 2022...The Mets recorded 200+ home runs in a single-season for the sixth time in franchise history.

HOME, SWEET HOME: The Mets won 12 of their last 14 games at home and 15 of their last 19...New York finished the year going 46-35 at home in 2024, including a 46-34 record at Citi Field (one home game in London)...The Mets went 33-12 at Citi Field from June 12 until the end of the season...The team lost consecutive games at home only three times in that period...New York posted a 3.57 ERA at home, which was sixth in the majors and fourth in the NL...The Mets went 43-38 at Citi Field in 2023, posting a 3.89 ERA.

ON THE ROAD: The Mets finished the season going 43-38 away from Citi Field in 2024...The Mets surpassed their road win total of 2023 (32-49)...The Mets hit .254/.316/.416 on the road this year...They ranked seventh in the majors in AVG and SLG and were 10th in OBP.

THE EAST IS A BEAST: The Mets went 30-22 against the NL East this season...After starting the season 3-6 against the NL East, the Mets went 27-16 in their final 43 games...The Mets did not drop three straight games against the division in that span.

ALL YOUR BASE ARE BELONG TO US: The Mets stole 106 bases out of 128 attempts this year, giving them a 82.8% success rate...It is the second-highest in franchise history...Last year, the team was successful in 88.7% (118-133) of stolen base attempts, the highest in team history...Brandon Nimmo was not caught in 15 stolen base attempts this year...His 15 steals were a career best...Francisco Lindor stole 29 bases this year...That was two shy from his career-best 31, accomplished in 2023.

20/20 VISION: The Mets featured four players who recorded 20+ doubles and 20+ home runs this season...That ties a franchise record for most players with a 20/20 season on the same team, done twice before...The 2019 Mets (Pete Alonso, Michael Conforto, J.D. Davis & Jeff McNeil) and the 2000 Mets (Edgardo Alfonzo, Mike Piazza, Robin Ventura & Todd Zeile) each had four players with 20/20 seasons.

STRIKE THAT: The Mets bullpen recorded 648 strikeouts in 2024, which was fifth in the majors and third in the NL...Their 648 punchouts were second in team history behind only the 2021 (658)...The Mets 10.61 strikeout per 9 IP ratio from the pen is the best in franchise history as well as the best in the majors in 2024.

THREE'S COMPANY: From September 17-19, the Mets scored 10 or more runs in three straight games for the first time in franchise history...The team slashed .350/.433/.680 in that span with 30 runs, 36 hits, five doubles, one triple, nine home runs, 15 walks and a 1.113 OPS.

TWIN BILLS: The Mets played a doubleheader on the final day of the regular season for the first time since 1983 at home vs. Montreal...Overall, the team played three doubleheaders in 2024...The team split a twinbill with Detroit on April 4 at Citi Field and was swept in two games by the Dodgers on May 28 at Citi Field and split two games on the final day of the season, September 30 in Atlanta...The Mets played six doubleheaders in 2023...The Mets have played 33 double dips since 2021, more than any other team in the majors...The Mets have earned at least a split in 30 of those 33 twin bills over the last four years...New York has swept nine of their last 20 doubleheaders, including two last year and six DH sweeps in 2022...Of the 33 doubleheaders, the Mets have swept 12, split 18 and have gotten swept just thrice.

TWICE IS NICE: Adam Ottavino and Huascar Brazobán appeared in both games of the doubleheader on September 30 in Atlanta...He became the first Mets pitcher to appear in both games of a twin bill since Brooks Raley did so on May 21, 2023 vs. Cleveland...The last time a Mets pitcher recorded a save in both games of a doubleheader was Manny Acosta on September 24, 2011 vs. Philadelphia.

QUALITY EATS: From September 11-19, the Mets recorded a quality start in eight straight games...They went 6-2 in that span with a 1.50 ERA (9 ER/53.1 IP) with 13 walks and 44 strikeouts...It was the longest streak since an eight-game stretch from August 10-18, 2015...The last time the team had a stretch of nine straight quality starts was from April 16-25, 2014...The longest streak in franchise history is 14 straight quality starts, done twice before - September 2-13, 1969 and April 21-May 5, 1992...Courtesy of *Elias*.

FALL Y'ALL: The Mets featured several players who participated in the Arizona Fall League in 2024...INF/OF Jett Williams, OF Drew Gilbert, INF Jacob Reimer as well as RHP Saul Garcia, RHP Noah Hall, RHP Jonathan Pintaro, RHP Jawilme Ramirez and RHP Dylan Ross all appeared for the Scottsdale Scorpions.

BLANK STREET COFFEE: The Mets recorded nine shutouts in 2024...The Mets did not record a shutout until their 92nd game of the season...The Mets went a total of 94 games without a shutout from September 30, 2023 (game one) until July 10, 2024...That was the second-longest streak in franchise history...Their 91 games without a shutout to start a season was the longest in franchise history...The overall franchise record is 118 games without a shutout from May 24-September 30, 1982...The 2007 Tampa Bay Rays were the last team to have a longer streak to start a season without a shutout...They did not record a clean sheet in their first 115 games of the season.

WALK IT OFF: The Mets earned 11 walk-off wins in 2024...That was tied with San Francisco and Seattle for the most in the majors...Their 11 walk-off wins are tied for the third-most such wins in a single season in franchise history (also: 1963, 2006 and 2021)...The Mets recorded six walk-off home runs in 2024...That is tied with 1963 & 1962 teams for the most in a season in franchise history...Courtesy of Sarah Langs.

DEBUT NOTES: The Mets featured five players who made their major league debut in 2024 - Luisangel Acuña, Tyler Jay, Dedniel, Núñez, Eric Orze and Christian Scott.

NO NO-NO: Thanks to a solo home run by Francisco Lindor, the Mets broke up a no-hitter in the ninth inning on their way to a 6-2 victory over the Blue Jays on September 11...According to *Elias*, the team's six runs are the most ninth-inning runs scored by a team who did not have any hits through eight innings in the expansion era (since 1961)...The previous record was five runs by the Athletics on July 15, 1974 at Baltimore...Lindor became the fourth player to break up a no-hit bid with a homer in the ninth inning (or later) this season...It was the second time by a Mets player as J.D. Martinez did so on May 11 vs. Atlanta...The Mets now have five wins after being no-hit through eight innings in franchise history...According to *Elias*, that's the most such wins for any team in the expansion era (since 1961).

THEY'RE OUT OF OUR LEAGUE: The Mets went 24-22 in Interleague play this year...Last year introduced the new schedule format which had New York playing a total of 46 Interleague games in 2023, more than double their previous high for a single season (20)...The Mets went 19-27 against the American League...Overall, New York owns a 278-276 record in Interleague play.

INTERLEAGUE PETE: Pete Alonso has hit 56 home runs in Interleague play...His 56 home runs against the American League is a franchise record, and the most among any player since he entered the league 2019...Mike Piazza was the previous record holder with 28 Interleague home runs.

OUCH: The Mets were plunked 92 times this season, which is the most in the National League and third-most in the majors...The team's 92 HBP was fifth in franchise history...The Mets were plunked 107 times in 2023, the second-most in team history...The 2022 set the franchise record with 112 HBP...Since 2021, the Mets have been plunked 405 times, which is the most in the majors in that span...Pete Alonso has been hit by 85 pitches in his career, the most in team history...Brandon Nimmo is second with 80 HBP.

LET'S GO STREAKING: The Mets won a season-high nine games from August 29-September 7...It was the team's longest winning streak since a nine-game streak from April 3-13, 2018...New York posted a 1.65 ERA (15 ER/82.0 IP) with 23 walks and 90 strikeouts over the winning streak...This includes a 0.66 ERA (2 ER/27.1 IP) and 35 strikeouts from the bullpen...The team batted .256/.324/.433 over that span...The Mets outscored their opponents 44-16 in the streak.

SAVE ME: The Mets featured 10 different pitchers who recorded a save for the team in the regular season in 2024...That tied a franchise record that was done twice before, in 1982 (Neil Allen, Pete Falcone, Terry Leach, Ed Lynch, Jesse Orosco, Charlie Puleo, Mike Scott, Doug Sisk, Craig Swan and Pat Zachry) and in 1965 (Larry Bearnarth, Dave Eilers, Jack Fisher, Al Jackson, Gary Kroll, Frank Lary, Tug McGraw, Tom Parsons, Dennis Ribant and Gordie Richardson).

SUBWAY SERIES: The Mets went 4-0 in the Subway Series this year...The Mets earned their second series sweep against the Yankees in franchise history, also accomplished in 2013 (4-0)...Last year, the Mets went 2-2 against the Yankees, splitting the series in The Bronx and in Queens...The Amazin's are 66-80 vs. the Yankees all-time during the regular season...The Mets are 114-150-2 vs. the Yankees combined in the regular season, World Series, Spring Training, 2020 Summer Camp, Mayor's Trophy Games, Mayor's Challenge Games and the Big Apple Series.

ON THE MARK: On June 25 at Citi Field, Mark Vientos became the 12th player in franchise history to record a multi-homer game in the Subway Series, joining Pete Alonso, Francisco Lindor, José Reyes, Jason Bay, Carlos Delgado, David Wright, Carlos Beltrán, Cliff Floyd, Ty Wigginton, Kaz Matsui and Richard Hildago...He hit safely in each of his first seven career games vs. the Yankees, which is a franchise record.

YOU LOOK FAMILIAR: There have been 163 players who have played for both the Mets and Yankees...Carlos Mendoza managed his first game against the Yankees on June 25...The Mets skipper spent 15 years in the Yankees system, serving most recently as the team's bench coach...There have been five managers who have guided both teams - Buck Showalter, Casey Stengel, Yogi Berra, Dallas Green and Joe Torre.

THE PICK IS IN: The Mets pitching staff recorded 20 pickoffs this season, the most for any team in the majors...It's the most in a season by the Mets since 1987, when they recorded 20...Courtesy of *Elias*.

THE FUTURE IS BRIGHT: RHP Brandon Sproat represented the New York Mets at the 2024 All-Star Futures Game...He tossed 1.0 scoreless inning...The right-handed pitcher was selected in the second round of the 2023 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of Florida...He was named the Mets Minor League Pitcher of the Year after going 7-4 with a 3.40 ERA (44 ER/116.1 IP) with 42 walks and 131 strikeouts across three levels.

WE REMEMBER: Throughout the season, the Mets remembered Team Photographer Marc Levine who sadly passed away mid-year...For more than three and half decades, Marc documented every move our team made from minor leaguers to Hall of Fame and number retirement ceremonies...He photographed over 2,000 Mets.

THIS BUD'S FOR YOU: In January, Mets Hall of Famer Buddy Harrelson passed away at age 79 at after a lengthy battle with Alzheimer's...Harrelson played for the Mets from 1965-1977 and was a member of the 1969 Miracle Mets, a two-time All-Star (1970 and 1971) and earned the 1971 Gold Glove at shortstop...He later would serve as a coach with the Mets in 1982 and again from 1985-1990. Harrelson took over the managerial duties early in the 1990 season and led the Mets through the 1991 campaign...In honor of his life and legacy, the Mets wore a patch commemorating him all season long.

GOODBYE, JERRY: On April 7, Mets Hall of Fame catcher Jerry Grote passed away at the Texas Cardiac Arrhythmia Institute in Austin, TX...He was 81...The backstop played 12 seasons in Flushing, batting .256/.321/.329 with 35 home runs and 357 RBI...Considered the best defensive catcher in team history, Grote was twice named an All-Star in 1968 and again in 1974...In honor of his life and legacy, the Mets wore a patch commemorating him all season long.

THE KRANE: In September, Ed Kranepool passed away at the age of 79...He was an original 1962 Met, joining the team as a 17-year-old and spent his entire 18-year Major League career with New York...He hit a critical home run in the 1969 World Series for the victorious Miracle Mets...To honor his memory, the Mets will wear a patch commemorating him in 2025.

HOMER HAPPY: From June 15-July 3, the Mets homered in 16 straight games, bashing 36 home runs in that span...It was their longest streak of the season and the second-longest in franchise history...The Mets record is a 21-game streak from July 16-August 5, 1996.

DOUBLE VISION: From May 29-July 3, the Mets recorded a double in 30 consecutive games...That was tied for the second-longest streak in franchise history...New York recorded 72 doubles in that span...The Mets also had a 30-game streak from April 20-May 22, 2001...The franchise-record is a 36-game streak from May 7-June 14, 2012 (81 doubles)...The Mets finished sixth in the majors with 279 doubles.

HIGH-FIVE: The Mets have scored five or more runs in nine straight games from June 23-July 3...That was tied for the second-longest streak in franchise history...The last time the Mets accomplished that feat was also a nine-game stretch from August 3-10, 2022...The longest streak scoring five or more runs in consecutive games was from August 11-24, 2007...The Mets scored 65 runs during the nine-game stretch.

ACROSS THE POND: The Mets have played 323 games outside the USA...This includes Canada (vs. Montreal/Toronto), Japan vs. Chicago-NL (March 29-30, 2000), Mexico vs. San Diego (August 16-18, 1996), Puerto Rico against Montreal (April 11-14, 2003, April 9-11, 2004) and against Florida (June 28-30, 2010) and England (June 8-9, 2024) ...The Mets played the first regular season games in both Mexico and Japan...New York owns a 148-173 record in those games.

THE GOOD DOC: On April 13, the New York Mets retired Doc Gooden's No. 16...Gooden spent 11 years with the Mets, winning the 1984 NL Rookie of the Year Award while setting a major league rookie record with 276 strikeouts and was the youngest player ever named to an All-Star team at age 19...The following year, Doc became the youngest pitcher ever to win Cy Young honors when he captured the "Triple Crown" of pitching, leading the majors in wins (24), strikeouts (268) and ERA (1.53)...Gooden was inducted into the Mets Hall of Fame in 2010.

STRAWBERRY FIELDS FOREVER: On June 1, the New York Mets retired Darryl Strawberry's No. 18 in a special pregame ceremony... Strawberry was a seven-time All-Star with the Mets after he was selected first overall in the 1980 June Draft...Strawberry earned National League Rookie of the Year honors in 1983 when he slugged a then-club rookie record 26 homers.

HEY NOW YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: Pete Alonso was named to the 2024 NL All-Star team...He was named to the All-Star team for the fourth time in his career, the most by any first baseman in team history – one more than Keith Hernandez...Alonso, who was also an All-Star in 2019, 2022 and 2023, becomes the 11th Met to be named to four or more All-Star teams...Additionally, he once again participated in the Home Run Derby...He became the sixth player to compete in the HR Derby at least five times, joining Ken Griffey Jr. (eight), Mark McGwire (seven), Barry Bonds (six), Sammy Sosa (six) and Albert Pujols (five).

POSTING UP: Pete Alonso appeared in all 162 Mets games this year... Outside of 2020, he became the second Mets player to appear in every single game, joining Félix Millán (1975)...John Olerud appeared in 162 of 163 games during the 1999...This year marked the third time in his career he has appeared in 160 or more games (also, 2019 & 2022).

FOR PETE'S SAKE: Pete Alonso recorded 31 doubles and 34 homers this season...His 31 doubles were a career high...Alonso recorded his second season with 30 doubles and 30 home runs...In 2019 he hit 30 doubles and 53 home runs...The Mets have featured two players with 30/30 seasons on the same team five times in franchise history - 2024 (Alonso/Lindor), 2008 (Delgado/Wright), 2007 (Beltrán/Wright), 2006 (Beltrán/Delgado) and 1996 (Bernard Gilkey/Todd Hundley).

EXTRA-EXTRA: Alonso is the all-time leader in extra-base hits at Citi Field with 169...He surpassed Daniel Murphy who collected 159 XBH and David Wright who had 154...Alonso has hit 103 home runs at Citi Field, the most in franchise history.

THIS IS 200!: Pete Alonso launched his 200th home run of his career on April 27 vs. St. Louis...He joined Darryl Strawberry (252), David Wright (242) and Mike Piazza (220) as the only Mets to reach 200 career home runs...He reached 200 career home runs in 710 games...Only Ryan Howard (658), Aaron Judge (671) and Ralph Kiner (706) reached 200 career homers in fewer games...Courtesy of *Elias*.

THIS IS 500: Pete Alonso hit a solo home run in the bottom of the ninth in game two of a doubleheader on April 4 vs. Detroit...The home run marked Alonso's 500th career RBI...He is the 10th player in franchise history to record 500 RBI...In recording his 500th career RBI in his 690th career game, Alonso became the fastest player in franchise history to reach 500 career RBI.

THIS IS 100: Brandon Nimmo recorded his 100th career home run on June 30 vs. Houston...He became the 16th player in franchise history to hit at least 100 home runs...He has recorded at least 10 or more home runs in each of his last three seasons...Overall, Nimmo hit 23 home runs this year, one short of his career-best 24 he accomplished in 2023.

WE FOUND NIMMO: Nimmo hit .241/.344/.419 with 44 runs, 14 doubles, one triple, 12 home runs, 39 RBI and 39 walks in 74 road games...This compared to a .207/.310/.379 slashline with 11 doubles, two triples, 11 home runs and 38 walks in 75 games at home in 2024...He recorded 77 walks this year...That's three short of his career-best 80 he recorded in 2018...His 90 RBI were a career-best.

A LEADING MAN: Francisco Lindor hit 26 home runs when batting first this season...That tied a record for the most in franchise history... He joined Curtis Granderson (26 HR/140 Games, 2015) as the franchise leader...In 109 games batting in the leadoff spot this year, Lindor batted .303/.374/.552 with 82 runs, 31 doubles, one triple, 26 home runs, 71 RBI, 42 walks, 23 steals with a .926 OPS...The Mets went 64-43 when Lindor bated first this season.

30-FOR-30: Lindor recorded his second 30 home run/30 double season as a Met and the fifth of his career...Only six players in Mets history have recorded multiple seasons with 30 home runs and 30 doubles - Lindor (2023-24), Pete Alonso (2024 & 2019), David Wright (2007-08), Carlos Beltrán (2006-07), Carlos Delgado (2006 & 2008) and Howard Johnson (1989 and 1991).

FWAR, WHAT IS IT GOOD FOR?: Francisco Lindor finished the season with a 7.6 fWAR...That was the sixth-best mark in the majors and the second-best mark in the National League...Only Shohei Ohtani (9.1 fWAR) had a higher mark...Lindor's 17.5 defensive fWAR was fifth in the majors.

THIS IS 100 HUNDRED: On September 7 vs. Cincinnati, Francisco Lindor recorded his 100th run of the season...He became the seventh player in franchise history with multiple seasons of 100 or more runs...Lindor recorded 108 runs last season...He has recorded four seasons with 100+ runs.

A HIT'S A HIT: Francisco Lindor owned 16-game hitting streak from August 20-September 6...It is the longest of game of his career...It was the longest hitting streak by a Mets player since Jeff McNeil's 16-game streak (July 7 (GI) - 30, 2019)...He batted .353 (24-68) in that span with 16 runs, eight doubles, six home runs, 12 RBI, three walks with a .389 OBP, a .735 SLG and a 1.124 OPS.

SIDE-TO-SIDE: On August 24 vs. San Diego, Lindor hit a home run from both sides of the plate...It was the sixth time in his career he accomplished that feat...Among active players, his six games of hitting a home run from both sides of the plate is third most among active players behind Jose Ramirez (7) and Anthony Santander (7)...His four as a Met ties Bobby Bonilla for third most by a Met behind Carlos Beltrán (5) and Todd Hundley (5).

AIN'T IT GRAND?: Lindor connected on his fifth grand slam as a member of the Mets on August 24 at San Diego...That is tied for the second-most in team history with John Milner, Howard Johnson, Robin Ventura, Yoenis Céspedes, Carlos Beltrán and Kevin McReynolds...Mike Piazza owns the franchise record with six.

ONE FLU OVER THE CUCKOO'S NEST: After leaving the game on May 1 vs. Chicago-NL with Flu-like symptoms, Francisco Lindor did not start the following game...He entered the game as a pinch-hitter and went 2-3 with one run, two doubles and four RBI...He notched his sixth career walk-off RBI...It was his third career walk-off hit as a member of the Mets...He became the second shortstop in team history to have two or more hits and four or more RBI off the bench, joining Felix Mantilla (May 25, 1962)...The last major league shortstop to collect two or more hits (including a walkoff) and two or more RBI in a game he didn't start was Elliot Maddox on July 7, 1970 for the Tigers...Courtesy of Mathew Brownstein.

OMG: Jose Iglesias recorded a hit in both games of the team's final day of the season...He ended the year with a 22-game hitting streak...It was the longest hitting streak of his career and the longest streak by a Mets player this year...His previous high was an 18-game streak from May 27-June 18, 2013 with the Red Sox...The last time a Mets player had a longer streak was Wilson Ramos, when he recorded a 26-game hitting streak from August 3-September 3, 2019...Iglesias batted .395 (34-86) over that span with 14 runs, four doubles, one home run, four RBI, one walk, two steals, a .429 OBP and a .477 SLG.

THE LEFTORIUM: Sean Manaea recorded 184 strikeouts this season...It was his second-highest total of his career...He struck out 194 in 32 starts in 2021...His 184 punchouts were the highest total by a left-handed pitcher for the Mets since Johan Santana struck out 206 in 2008...Including Manaea, there have been eight left-handed pitchers to recorded at least 175 strikeouts in a single-season with the club...The most recent player was Óliver Pérez, who recorded 180 in 2008.

KING LUIS: On August 17 vs. Miami, Luis Severino hurled a complete game shutout, allowing four hits and striking out eight...He recorded his second career complete game shutout (Also: May 2, 2018 vs. Houston with Yankees)...He was the first Met to throw a 9.0-inning complete game shutout since Jacob deGrom blanked the Nationals at Citi Field on April 23, 2021...The last six complete game shutouts for the Mets have come at Citi Field...He was the first Met to throw a complete game shutout against Miami since Noah Syndergaard (September 30, 2018)...In the complete game, he threw 113 pitches, the most by a Mets pitcher in a game this season and the most since David Peterson threw 113 pitches on September 28, 2023 vs. Miami...It was his most pitches in a start since he threw 115 on August 3, 2018.

WILD OUT: The Mets clinched a spot in the Postseason on the final day of the regular season...They previously made the Postseason as the Wild Card team in 1999, 2000, 2016 and in 2022...In 1999, New York defeated the Diamondbacks, 3-1, in National League Division Series and fell to the Atlanta Braves, 4-2, in the National League Championship Series...The 2000 Mets defeated the Giants, 3-1, in the NLDS and the Cardinals, 4-1, in the NLCS...The team fell to the Yankees, 4-1, in the World Series...The 2016 Mets fell to the Giants, 1-0, in the one-game Wild Card Series...The Mets lost a best-of-three-game series to the San Diego Padres, dropping two games to one in 2022 at Citi Field.

POSTSEASON BOUND: The Mets clinched a playoff berth for the 11th time in franchise history this season...This marks the fifth Wild Card berth in team history...Also in 1999, 2000, 2016 and 2022.

FIRST IS THE BEST: The Mets are the first team in MLB history to clinch a postseason spot in a win and win a playoff series BOTH via games in which they faced a deficit in the ninth inning or later...Courtesy of Sarah Langs and *Elias*.

TO THE POST: The Mets are 59-46 all-time in Postseason play...The club's .562 winning percentage is the third-best in major league history...Only the Marlins (24-16, .600) and the Yankees (252-184, .578) have a better winning percentage.

DIVISION BELL: The Mets appeared in the Division Series for the first time since 2015...They defeated the Phillies, three-games-to-one...Overall, it was their fifth appearance in the series (also, 1999, 2000, 2006 and 2015)...The Mets are 15-5 all-time in the series...Their .750 winning percentage in the series is the best in the National League...That is tied with the Blue Jays (.750) for the best mark in the majors...This includes a 9-1 record at home in the Division Series.

THIRD TIME'S THE CHARM: Game 2 of the NLCS marked the third time in Postseason history that a club hit a leadoff home run and a grand slam in the same game...Courtesy of *Sarah Langs*...New York is the first club to accomplish the feat since the Orioles in Game 1 of the 1996 ALDS...The first club to ever accomplish the feat was the Yankees, who did so in Game 5 of the 1953 World Series, also against the Dodgers.

EVERYBODY HITS: In Game 2 of the NLCS, each player in the Mets starting lineup safely reached base, marking the second time this Postseason that every batter in New York's starting lineup reached base...They also did so in Game 2 of the Wild Card Series against Milwaukee...Overall it is the sixth time in Mets Postseason history that each batter in the starting lineup reached base safely after they also accomplished the feat on October 30, 2015 (G3 WS); October 15 2006 (G4 NLCS); October 11, 2000 (G1 NLCS); and October 17, 1973 (G4 WS).

KEEP THE CAR RUNNING: New York's 12 runs in Game 5 of the NLCS were tied for the second-most in a Postseason game by the Mets along with their 12 runs in Game 4 of the 2006 NLCS at St. Louis...The team set a franchise record with 13 runs in Game 3 of the 2015 NLDS, also against the Dodgers.

STRIKE THAT: In Game 5 of the NLCS, the Mets became the first team to not strike out in a Postseason game since the Angels in Game 2 of the 2002 World Series...Overall, it was the 11th such postseason instance overall and the third in the expansion era (1961)...Courtesy of *Sarah Langs*.

FIVE FOR FIGHTING: Game 5 of the NLCS marked the fourth time this Postseason that the Mets scored at least five runs in an inning, following a five-run fifth inning in Game 1 of the Wild Card Series against Milwaukee; a five-run eighth inning in Game 1 of the NLDS at Philadelphia; and a five-run second inning in Game 2 of the NLCS against Los Angeles...Per *Elias*, the Mets are the fifth team (sixth occurrence) with at least four five-run innings in a single Postseason and the first since the Rangers had five five-run innings en route to their World Series Championship last October.

a Postseason game, joining Daniel Murphy (G4 NLCS, 2015); Carlos Delgado (G1 NLDS, 2006); Kevin McReynolds (G6 NLCS, 1988); Lenny Dykstra (G3 WS, 1986); and Rusty Staub (G4 WS, 1973)...He is the first Mets player with three doubles in a Postseason game.

SWAGGY V: In his first 13 career Postseason games, Mark Vientos batted .327 (18-55) with five homers, 14 RBI, two doubles, three walks, eight runs, a .362 OBP and a .998 OPS...His 14 RBI are the most by a Met in a single Postseason, he passed Daniel Murphy (2015) and John Olerud (1999) who both previously had the record with 12 RBI.

SEVENTH HEAVEN: Mark Vientos recorded seven multi-hit games in the Postseason this season...His seven multi-hit games is tied with Edgardo Alfonzo and Cleon Jones, for the most ever in a single Postseason in Mets' history...Francisco Lindor (2024), John Olerud (1999) and Todd Zeile (2000) each had six multi-hit games in the Postseason...Marty Barrett (1986), Troy Glaus (2002) and Marquis Grissom (1996) hold the single-Postseason record with nine multi-hit games each.

AIN'T IT GRAND: Mark Vientos connected for his first career grand slam in Game 2 of the NLCS at Dodgers Stadium...He is the first player since Bryson Stott (2023 WC, G2) to hit a Postseason grand slam for his first career grand slam...Per *Elias*, he is one of 13 players to accomplish the feat including Jordan Luplow (10/8/2021); Ronald Acuña Jr. (10/7/2018); Paul Goldschmidt (10/4/2011); Shane Victorino (10/2/2008); Kazuo Matsui (10/4/2007); Mark Lewis (10/6/1995); Ron Gant (10/7/1992); José Canseco (10/15/1988); Mike Cuellar (10/3/1970); Chuck Hiller (10/8/1962); and Bobby Richardson (10/8/1960)...Francisco Lindor connected for his second career Postseason grand slam in Game 4 of the NLDS...He also cleared the bases on October 6, 2017 with Cleveland vs. New York-AL...His two Postseason grand slams are tied with Shane Victorino and Jim Thome for the most in MLB history.

SEASON RECAP: Blackburn joined the Mets on July 30 after spending the first half of the season with the Athletics...He made nine starts in Oakland, going 4-2 with a 4.41 ERA (25 ER/51.0 IP) with 14 walks and 38 strikeouts...He made five starts in New York, going 1-2 with a 5.18 ERA (14 ER/24.1 IP) with seven walks and 21 strikeouts before being placed on the IL with a right hand contusion.

DAZZLING DEBUT: On August 2 at Los Angeles-AL, Blackburn earned the win his Mets debut after he allowed one run over 6.0 scoreless innings...The right-hander became the 10th pitcher in franchise history to allow one or zero runs over 6.0 or more innings and earn the win in his team debut.

WELCOME TO NEW YORK: On July 30, the Mets acquired Blackburn from Oakland in exchange for minor league RHP Kade Morris...The 30-year-old has made nine starts in Oakland, going 4-2 with a 4.41 ERA (25 ER/51.0 IP) with 14 walks and 38 strikeouts... Blackburn was on the Injured List from May 11-July 26 with a stress fracture of the fifth metatarsal of his right foot...He appeared in three rehab games between Single-A Stockton and Triple-A Las Vegas.

SIZZLING START: This season, Blackburn began the season with a scoreless streak of 22.1 innings...It was the longest scoreless streak to open the season by an A's starting pitcher in franchise history breaking the previous high of 16.0 scoreless innings by Matt Keough (1980)...It was the third-longest scoreless streak by an A's pitcher to start the season behind only Ryan Cook (3/28-5/27/2012) and Harry Krause (4/22-5/10/1910)...

Blackburn began the season with three straight starts of 6.0 or more scoreless innings...He is the ninth starting pitcher in major league history since 1914 to begin the season with three straight scoreless starts of 6.0 or more innings and was the first starter since James Paxton (4/5-4/15/2017) to accomplish the feat.

HOME IS WHERE THE HEART IS: In six home starts this season, Blackburn is 2-1 with a 2.75 ERA (11 ER/36.0 IP)...Four of those starts at home have been quality starts and Blackburn has pitched into the sixth inning in four of those five starts...In seven road starts this season, Blackburn is 3-2 with a 5.59 ERA (23 ER/37.0 IP)... The right-hander has allowed four or more runs in four of those starts and has allowed eight of his 10 home runs this season on the road...For his career, Blackburn owns a 4.49 ERA (115 ER/230.2 IP) in 46 career road outings compared to a 5.11 ERA (111 ER/195.1 IP) in 39 career home outings.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS: Blackburn was originally drafted by the Cubs in the first round (56th overall) of the 2012 First-Year Player Draft out of Heritage High School in Brentwood, California...On July 20, 2016 Blackburn and INF Daniel Vogelbach were traded to the Mariners in exchange for RHP Jordan Pries and LHP Mike Montgomery...On November 12, 2016 Blackburn was traded to Oakland in exchange for INF Danny Valencia...At the age of 23, Blackburn made his major league debut with Oakland on July 1, 2017 vs. Atlanta and allowed one unearned run over 6.0 innings...Blackburn finished his rookie season with a record of 3-1 and a 3.22 ERA (21 ER/58.2 IP) over 10 career starts...From 2018-2021, Blackburn appeared in 20 games (17 Starts) and pitched to a 7.60 ERA (67 ER/79.1 IP)...In 2018, Blackburn was limited to six starts due to a right elbow injury...In 2022, Blackburn was named an American League All-Star and established career highs in starts (21) and innings (111.1) before suffering a season-ending right middle finger injury...Last season, the right-hander appeared in a career-high-tying 21 games (20 starts) and recorded a career-high 104 strikeouts...Blackburn began the 2023 season with a right middle finger injury.

SLINGIN' IN SYRACUSE: Spent most of his season in Triple-A Syracuse and he appeared in 27 games and made 17 starts...He finished with a 5-7 record and a 4.70 ERA (60 ER/115.0 IP) and 86 strikeouts.

FINAL ACT: Made one of his only two starts in the final game of the Mets season at Atlanta...He went 6.0 innings, allowed one run, walked four, and struck out five.

INNINGS EATER: In his last two major league seasons he has made 11 starts and has completed 57.0 innings...Lucchesi has completed at least 5.0 innings in six of his last 11 major league starts.

SPRING FLING: Lucchesi made only appearance in Spring Training in 2024...Allowed four runs on four hits with one walk in 1.1 innings of work.

2023, RETURN OF LUCCHESI: Lucchesi pitched to a 4-0 record with a 2.89 ERA (15 ER/46.2 IP) in 2023 in his return to the majors after missing the entirety of the 2022 season due to undergoing "Tommy John" surgery...Finished the season with a 1.31 WHIP and .251 opponent average while tallying 32 strikeouts...Lucchesi collected three quality starts this season, more than both 2020 and 2021 combined (both of which were shortened seasons).

CHURVE TO THE LEFT: Gained fame for a pitch he calls a "churve"...He holds it deep in his palm like a classic circle changeup, and for most of his college career, that's all it was - a basic changeup...Early in his pro career, he began tinkering with his wrist action as he threw it, snapping off the pitch like a breaking ball...It soon became his go-to putaway weapon...Per Statcast, his churve had an average 8.9 inch vertical drop in 2019, which was the most movement of any pitcher's changeup by more than a full inch.

ALL I DO IS WIN: Established a career high winning streak with four wins in 2023 after picking up wins in each of his four decisions...His wins came on April 21 at San Francisco, August 18 at St. Louis, September 13 against Arizona and September 27 in the first game of a doubleheader against Miami.

CAN'T WAIT TO GET ON THE ROAD AGAIN: In five away starts in the majors last season, Lucchesi pitched to a 2-0 record with a 2.59 ERA (7 ER/24.1 IP), tallying 20 strikeouts, and earned his first two wins of the season on the road (April 21 at San Francisco, August 18 at St. Louis)...In four home starts this season, Lucchesi pitched to a 2-0 record with a 3.22 ERA (8 ER/22.1 IP).

HEY NOW, IT'S AFTER ALL-STAR: In 2023, pitched to a 3-0 record with a 1.48 ERA (4 ER/24.1 IP) after the All-Star Break in four starts compared to a 1-0 record with a 4.43 ERA (11 ER/22.1 IP) in the first half of the season...All four home runs allowed by Lucchesi this season came before the break...Pitched to a 1.93 ERA (4 ER/18.2 IP) in the month of September, picking up two wins in three starts.

PUTTING UP GOOSE EGGS: Dating back to June 13, 2021, Lucchesi tossed 18.1 straight scoreless innings, a career-best scoreless streak, which came to an end on April 27, 2023 against the Nationals...Among starting pitchers, Lucchesi's scoreless streak was the third-longest active scoreless streak in the majors at the time, behind Zac Gallen (28.0 innings) and Gerrit Cole (20.0 innings).

MANAEA NEWS & NOTES

POSTSEASON: Pitched in the Postseason for the fourth time in his career...Made four starts and picked up his first two Postseason wins...Finished with a 4.74 ERA and 19 strikeouts.

SEVENTH HEAVEN: Manaea completed at least 7.0 innings in nine of his 32 starts this season and that was tied for the sixth-most in the National League...Manaea recorded back-to-back starts of 7.0 scoreless innings and 10 or more strikeouts on July 30 against Minnesota and August 5 at St. Louis...Manaea joins Tyler Glasnow and Spence Schwellenbach as the only pitchers in the majors this season with consecutive starts of 7.0 or more innings and double-digit strikeouts...Manaea is the only one of three to not allow a run in both of those starts...He is the first Mets pitcher to throw 7.0 or more innings and record 10 or more strikeouts in consecutive starts since Max Scherzer (4/19/22 (2) - 4/25/22)...The southpaw joins Dwight Gooden (two separate occasions) and Tom Seaver (three separate occasions) as the only pitchers in franchise history to post back-to-back starts of 7.0 or more scoreless innings and double-digit strikeouts... He is just the 10th left-handed pitcher in major league history with back-to-back starts of 7.0 or more scoreless innings and 10 or more strikeouts (Last: Chris Sale, 6/24/18-6/30/18).

WRITING A CHECK FOR 10K: The Mets have had six games in which the starter has struck out 10 or more batters this year...Four of those performances were by Sean Manaea...Manaea is the just the seventh left-handed pitcher in franchise history with four or more double-digit strikeout games in a season joining Sid Fernandez (1985-1986), 1988, 1990 1992), Jerry Koosman (1968, 1976), Johan Santana (2008-2009) and Jon Matlack (1974)...His 11 strikeouts on July 30 vs. Minnesota were the most in a game by a Mets left-handed pitcher since Steven Matz's 11-strikeout performance on September 1, 2018 at San Francisco and were the most by a Mets southpaw at Citi Field since April 24, 2012 when Johan Santana struck out 11 Marlins hitters...In his last start, August 27 at Arizona, Manaea became the first Met since Jacob deGrom (9/30/22 at Atlanta) to record 11 strikeouts and not issue a walk.

SPECTACULAR DOWN THE STRETCH: Since the start of July, Manaea was second in the majors in quality starts (12), first in innings (105.1), sixth in strikeouts (108) and sixth in WHIP (0.93)...Manaea allowed three or fewer runs 17 times since June 14, which is tied for most in the majors during that span with Chris Sale (17).

CAREER YEAR: Manaea recorded a career high in innings pitched (181.2), tied a career high in wins (12), tied a career high in starts (32)...He also finished with the second-lowest ERA of his career (3.47), and his best came in 2019 when he only appeared in five games.

RIGHTY DOMINATION: Held right handed hitters to a .190 batting average, compared to his career average to right handed hitters being at .250. It was the lowest batting average he's held right handers to in his career (in a season where he appeared in more than five games).

WHAT A MIGHTY GOOD MANAEA: In his first career start with the Mets, April 1 vs. Detroit, Manaea did not allow a hit through his first 5.2 innings...It was the longest no-hit bid by a Mets pitcher in their team debut and the second-longest no-hit bid by a Mets pitcher in their first career start with team...Tracy Stallard threw 6.0 no-hit in his first career start with the Mets on June 2, 1963 vs. Pittsburgh after making 13 relief appearances to begin his career with New York...He joined Kenny Rogers (7/28/99) as the only Mets pitcher to allow one hit and throw 6.0 or more innings in their team debut... He recorded eight strikeouts, which tied Johan Santana (3/31/08) for the most punch outs by a Mets left-handed pitcher in their team debut and were tied for the seventh-most by any Mets pitcher in their team debut...Credit Elias.

SWEEPIN SAMOAN: At the end of May 2023, Manaea introduced a sweeper to his arsenal...Last season, the pitch generated a 35.1 percent whiff rate and kept batters to a .140 average and .163 slugging percentage...The southpaw allowed just 26 hits in 135 plate appearances ending with the offering for a .193 batting average with 61 strikeouts... His 44.9 K% with the pitch is the 20th best in the majors, while his 41.9 whiff% is the 12th-best mark in the majors this season (Min. 25 Plate Appearances).

SINK OR SWIM: Manaea has thrown his sinker 44.7% of the time, the highest usage rate of any of his six pitches in his arsenal...The southpaw has a run value of 15 with his sinker, which is the fifth-best mark in the majors. He also has 71 strikeouts via the sinker which is the highest mark in the majors.

SEASON'S GREETINGS: Peterson finished the season going 7-3 with a 2.68 ERA (28 ER/94.0 IP) with 33 walks and 81 strikeouts in 16 starts...Since July 1, Peterson had the ninth-best ERA in the NL, tied for the second-most wins in the NL (7), and threw the third most innings in the NL (94.0 IP).

POSTSEASON: Has appeared in eight career Postseason games, including seven starts...Is 0-2 with a 3.55 ERA (13 ER/33.0 IP) with 13 walks and 28 strikeouts...Has appeared in three games in 2024, starting Game 3 of the NL Wild Card Series in Milwaukee, Game 4 of the NL Division Series against Philadelphia and Game 4 of the NL Championship Series against Los Angeles-NL.

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS: Quintana finished his second season as a Met with a 10-10 record and a 3.75 ERA (71 ER/170.1IP), adding 135 strikeouts against 63 walks... Quintana took the mound for Opening Day on March 29 vs. Milwaukee at Citi Field, becoming the 30th Opening Day starter in franchise history, throwing 4.2 innings, allowing two runs with four strikeouts and two walks...Earned his first win of the season on April 11 in Atlanta, throwing 5.1 innings recording three runs, four strikeouts and two walks... PROUD TO BE AN AMERICAN: In March of 2024, the Colombian-born Quintana passed his naturalization test in Miami to become an American citizen.

METS DEBUT SEASON: After starting his first season with the Mets in 2023 on the IL due to a stress fracture in his rib cage, Quintana made his first start for the club on July 20, 2023, against his former team, the Chicago White Sox...The southpaw finished the last season 3-6 with a 3.57 ERA (30 ER/75.2 IP) in 13 starts.

300 CLUB: In his start on September 17, 2023, Quintana became the 11th active pitcher to reach 300 career starts and joined Clayton Kershaw, Madison Bumgarner and Wade Miley as the only active left-handed pitchers with 300 or more career starts.

SENGA NEWS & NOTES

POSTSEASON: Senga made his first Postseason start after making just one start in the regular season on October 5 in Game 1 of the NLDS against the Phillies...He threw 2.0 innings allowing one run, a home run in the first inning, and recorded one walk and three strikeouts...In total, he appeared in three games in 2024 Postseason starting Game 1 of the NL Division Series against Philadelphia, Game 1 of the NL Championship Series and appeared out of the bullpen of Game 6 of the NL Championship Series against Los Angeles-NL.

2024 SEASON RECAP: Senga missed nearly the first four months of the season with a right shoulder capsule strain...After his one start on July 26, against Atlanta, Senga missed the rest of the regular season with a strained left calf...The right-hander made five rehab starts, one with High-A Brooklyn and four with Triple-A Syracuse...In his five rehab starts, Senga allowed six runs over 14.0 innings and recorded 15 strikeouts.

REMARKABLE ROOKIE: In his rookie campaign, Senga recorded 202 strikeouts and became the 18th rookie pitcher in the Modern Era (Since 1900) to have 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Senga's 202 punch outs were the second-most by a Mets pitcher behind only Dwight Gooden's 276 strikeouts in 1984...He joined Hideo Nomo (236), Yu Darvish (221) and Daisuke Matsusaka (201) as the only Japanese-born rookie hurlers to reach 200 strikeouts...Senga's 12 wins were tied with Ron Darling (1984) for the seventh-most wins in a single season by a Mets rookie and was the first Mets rookie to reach double-digit wins since Dillon Gee (13, 2011)...His 2.98 ERA (55 ER/166.1 IP) was the fifth-lowest in a single season by a Mets rookie behind only Jerry Koosman (2.08, 1968), Jon Matlack (2.32, 1972), Dwight Gooden (2.60, 1984) and Tom Seaver (2.76, 1967).

KODAI THE FRIENDLY GHOST: In 2023, Senga finished second in the NL and fifth in the majors among qualifiers in ERA...His 202 strikeouts were the tied for the eighth-most in the NL and tied for the 14th-most in the majors...Senga held opposing batters to a .208 average, the third-lowest mark among qualifiers in the NL and the fourth-lowest mark in the majors...His 10.93 SO/9 rate was the fifth-best mark among qualified major league pitchers last season.

SENGA GENESIS: In his last 18 starts of the 2023 season dating back to June 10, Senga pitched to a 2.57 ERA (31 ER/108.2 IP), struck out 129 batters and recorded 12 quality starts...During that span, his ERA was the fifth-best in the majors and his 10.68 SO/9 rate was the 12th-best (Min. 75.0 IP).

METS-JAPAN CONNECTION: Senga is the 14th Japanese-born player to appear in at least one game for the Mets, the most by any major league team...Prior to Senga, the last Japanese-born player to appear in a game for the Mets was OF Norichika Aoki in 2017.

POSTSEASON: Has appeared in 14 career Postseason games, including 13 starts...He is 2-5 with a 4.62 ERA (31 ER/60.1 IP) with 27 walks and 57 strikeouts...Has appeared in three games during the Mets 2024 Postseason run, starting Game 1 of the NL Wild Card Series in Milwaukee, starting Game 2 of the NL Division Series in Philadelphia, and starting Game 3 of the NL Championship Series against Los Angeles-NL.
