RAYS REPORT—The Rays fell short of a postseason berth for the second straight year for the first time since a three-year drought from 2014-16...this comes on the heels of a franchise-record five consecutive postseason appearances from 2019-23...they remained in contention until being eliminated with an 11-7 loss on Sept. 19 vs. BOS...wo na season-high seven consecutive games from Aug. 29-Sept. 4, their longest streak since June 3 (G2)-10, 2023 (7G), to draw within two games of an AL Wild Card spot, but went 6-16 over their final 22 games from Sept. 5 on, tying the Angels for the worst record in the AL over that span...their 77 wins tied 2014 for their second fewest in a 162-game season since becoming the Rays in 2008, more than only 2016 (68-94)...fell to fourth place with a 5-4, walk-off loss on July 12 at BOS, where they remained for the next 80 days through the end of the season...including off days and the All-Star break, they spent two days in first, 37 in second, 32 in third, 110 in fourth and four in fifth...dropped to eight games under .500 with a 13-4, season-ending loss on Sept. 28 at TOR, their most since entering play April 20, 2018 (5-13)... they did not fall more than five games below .500 at any point from 2019-24.

* The club's plus-31 run differential ranked seventh in the AL/14th in the majors...it was their best run differential in a losing season in franchise history, surpassing 2015 (+2)...it marked the second-best run differential over a 162-game season in which a club finished eight games under .500 or more, trailing the 1984 Pirates (+48).

* They were 47-36 on June 26 after an 11-3 win at Oriole Park capped an MLB-best 25-9 stretch (May 20-June 26)...it was Tampa Bay's best 34-game stretch since April 5-May 11, 2023 (25-9)... the Rays went 31-50 (.383) for the remainder of the season, tied with the Twins for the second-worst record in the majors in that span, ahead of only the Rockies (25-56/.309).

* Tampa Bay went 50-47 before the All-Star break, seventh in the AL/tied for 15th in the

SERIES-LY SPEAKING—The Rays went 23-26-3 in series play, their first time finishing with more losses than wins since going 17-28-7 in 2016...they went 16-8-2 across their first 26 series before going 7-18-1 over their final 26 sets...this includes an 0-6-1 skid to conclude the year, their most consecutive winless sets at any point in a season since an 0-6-2 run to end the 2006 campaign (Sept. 4-Oct. 1)...they posted a 13-11-2 mark in home series, including 3-6-1 in their last nine from June 30 on on the heels of a 10-5-1 start...the Rays went 10-14-1 as visitors thanks to road losing streaks of six (June 27–July 31) and four series (Sept. 9-end of season).

** Tampa Bay's 26-26 record in series openers tied for 13th best in the majors, making it one of eight clubs to finish with an even record in openers (14-12 home, 12-14 road).

** The Rays were 23-21-0 in three-game seres, 0-4-3 in four-game sets and were swept in their lone two-game series Aug. 19-20 vs. NYY.

** They went 12-21-3 vs. AL opponents and 11-5-0 in Interleague series.

 CROSS-BAY RAYS—Following extensive damage to Tropicana Field in the wake of Hurricane Milton last October, the Rays played all 81 home games at Tampa's George M. Steinbrenner Field, spring training home of the New York Yankees...the Rays hit 96 HR (0.68 HR/G) at home and allowed 111 HR (1.37 HR/G), most in franchise history...the combined 207 HR surpassed 2023 (201HR) for the highest home total in Rays history and marked the 10th-most long balls at any major league venue this season...of those 207 HR, 126 were hit to right or right-center field, second most in MLB behind Yankee Stadium (165HR) and a 59-HR increase from the 2024 total at Tropicana Field (67HR).
 ★ The Rays went 41-40 at Steinbrenner Field, their ninth consecutive winning season at home, the longest streak in team history and the fourth-longest active run in the majors behind the Yankees (34), Dodgers (20) and Brewers (10).
 ★ The Rays had 12 weather-related delays in 81 home games, the longest of which was four hours, 25 minutes (Aug. 24 vs. STL).
 ★ Tampa Bay did not play a doubleheader for the sixth time in franchise history, joining 2024, 2010, 2006, 2005 and 2001...the Rays and Astros are the only teams to not participate in a twin bill over the last two seasons.
 ★ In order to avoid Florida's rainy season, the Rays swapped home dates with the Angels and Twins, resulting in a 13-game homestand from April 8-20 (5-8) and a 12-game road trip from Aug. 4-17 (6-6)...they played 19 of their first 22 games at home, becoming the first team to do so since the 1970 Washington Senators (Stats Perform).
 ★ The Rays went 36-45 (.444) away from Steinbrenner Field, their third time in the last four seasons finishing below .500 on the road...they were 17-33 over their final 50 games away from home after starting 19-12.
 TALKIN OFFENSE—The Rays averaged 4.41 runs per game, seventh most in th

TALKIN' OFFENSE—The Rays averaged 4.41 runs per game, seventh most in the AL/15th in the majors and a 0.68-run improvement from their franchise-low 3.73 runs per game in 2024...it marked the fifth-largest year-to-year improvement in the majors, trailing the White Sox (+1.77), Athletics (+1.27), Marlins (+1.16) and Blue Jays (+0.79)...the Rays scored seven runs or more 41 times, fourth most in the AL behind the Yankees (52G), Tigers (44G) and Blue Jays (42G) and seventh most in team history...however, they were also held to one or zero runs 35 times, tied for second most in club history behind 1998 (40G)...this includes 13 shutout losses, their most since 2014 (18G)...Tampa Bay averaged 6.52 runs in wins (9th in MLB) and 2.49 runs in losses (22nd in MLB)—the 4.03-run discrepancy was the fifth largest in the majors and the Rays second largest since 2012, trailing 2021 (4.08).

* The Rays went 66-24 (.733) when scoring four runs or more, 15th in the majors and their worst mark since 2017 (63-24/.724)...they were 11-61 with three runs or fewer. Tampa Bay's .251 batting average ranked ninth in the majors, its fourth time finishing with a top-10 average in MLB along with 2023 (3), 2018 (3) and 2005 (3)...this, after posting a 27th-ranked .230 average in 2024, the lowest mark in franchise history.

* The Rays hit .267 with RISP, second highest in the AL to the Blue Jays (.292) and sixth in the majors...over the last 15 seasons (2011-25), only the 2023 (.285) and 2013 (.268) teams posted higher RISP average.

* The Rays 934 singles were their most since 2018 (948), but their 440 extra-base hits were their fifth fewest in a 162-game campaign...they led the majors with five wins without tallying an extra-base hit, tied for third most in the majors behind the Dodgers (9) and Yankees (7) and tied for third most in team history behind 2021 (9) and 2010 (7).

MEN OF STEAL—The Rays led the majors with 194 SB, tying their team record from 2009, after stealing three bases in their final game of the season...they matched the 2009 team for the most stolen bases by an AL club since the Rays inaugural season in 1998...in that timeframe, the Rays own four of the six highest single-season stolen base marks in the AL (2025 and 2009 - T1st, 1945B; 2024 - 4th, 1785B; 2010 - 6th, 1725B)...it marked their fourth time pacing MLB in steals, joining a three-year run from 2008-10...they have led the AL in steals in each of the last two seasons and seven times in franchise history (2024-25, 2008-11, 2003)...Tampa Bay has finished among the AL's top five stolen base leaders in eight consecutive seasons, the second-longest streak in team history behind 2002-12 (11).

The Rays recorded an MLB-leading and club-record 55 multi-steal efforts, fourth most by any major league team in the Wild Card era (1995-pres.).

Chandler Simpson swiped a Rays rookie-record 44 SB, second in MLB to former teammate NYY José Caballero (49SB) and tied for eighth most in team history, trailing the seven seasons in which Carl Crawford registered 46 SB or more.

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

March 28 vs. COL
Rays 3, Rockies 2 (walk-off)
The Rays first outdoor home game in club history and the first at George
M. Steinbrenner Field...Kameron
Misner became the first player in major league history to hit his first career home run in walk-off fashion on Opening Day. he became the second career nome run in walk-off fashion on Opening Day...he became the second player in club history to accomplish the feat in any game, joining Bobby Smith on April 13, 1998 vs. MIN, and the first major leaguer to do so since AZ Adrian Del Castillo on Aug. 9, 2024 vs. PHI.

Jake Mangum reached base in each of
his first two at-bats as part of a stretch
of 7 PA consecutively reaching base...
his seven hits were tied for second in his seven hits were tied for second in team history through a player's first three career games (Akinori Iwamura, 7 - April 2-6, 2007 & Delmon Young, 8 - Aug. 29-31, 2006)...he became the second player in MLB history with seven hits or more and three stolen bases or more in their first three games (DET Frank Dillon, April 25-27, 1901 - 8H, 4SB)...joined Young (2006) as the only Rays to record two multi-RBI games within their first three career games.

April 14 vs. BOS

The Rays plate nine runs in the 3rd inning as part of a 16-run night against the Red Sox, the most runs scored by the club in a game since plating 18 on Aug. 19, 2023 at LAA (G2)...marked the first time the Rays have scored nine runs or more in an have scored nine runs or more in an inning since Aug. 22, 2023 vs. COL (9R, 8th).

April 19 at SD Rays 4, Padres 2 Chandler Simpson extended his hitting streak to eight games, becoming the first rookie Ray to hit safely in each of his first eight career in club history.

May 10 vs. MIL

An overcast day resulted in the first two
home rain delays in club history with
a 27-minute delay that moved back
the start of the game and a 38-minute
delay in the 5th inning...Travis
Jankowski produced the third walk-off
of the season for the Rays with a single
to left field.

Chandler Simpson stole three bases in the game, the 22nd three-steal game in club history and first since José
Caballero on Aug. 18, 2024 vs. AZ.

May 31 at HOU Rays 16, Astros 3 Junior Caminero went 4-for-5 with 2 2B, 2 HR, 5 RBI, 4 R and 12 TB in the 2B, 2 HR, 5 RBI, 4 R and 12 TB in the contest and became the youngest player in major league history (21.330) with 2 2B, 2 HR, 5 RBI and 4 R in the same game...it was the seventh fourextra-base hit game in club history and the first since **Ben Zobrist** (June 11, 2011 – 3 2B, 1HR)...marked the first time in Rays history the club scored 16 runs or more in multiple games in a single season...the Rays 12 extra-base hits as a team tied the franchise record (also: June 16, 2009 at COL).

Zach Littell pitched the first complete game by a Ray since June 3, 2021 at NYY (Ryan Yarbrough)...he threw 9.0 innings and allowed 10 H, 3 R, 1 BB, 6 SO and 2 HR in the winning decision... marked the first complete game of his career and the fourth by a pitcher managed by Kevin Cash.

June 5 vs. TEX
Rays 4, Rangers 3 (walk-off)
Tampa Bay came from behind to win
with three runs in the 9th inning...the
game-tying and game-winning runs
were plated on an infield single by
Taylor Walls...marked the first walk-off
two-run infield single in the majors
since COL Seth Smith recorded one on
September 9, 2009 vs. CIN.

June 8 vs. MIA Rays 3, Marlins 2 Rays 3, Marlins 2
The Rays won a season-best sixth straight home series after beating Milwaukee (May 9-11), Houston (May 19-21), Toronto (May 23-25), Minnesota (May 26-28), Texas (June 3-5) and Miami (June 6-8)...marked their longest home series winning streak since June 11–July 28, 2024.

Min. 400 PA, Simpson (44SB/43SO) became the first major league rookie with more stolen bases than strikeouts since SEA Ichiro Suzuki (56SB/53SO) in 2001...he is the sixth AL rookie to accomplish the feat and the first Ray, regardless of rookie status. Simpson and Jake Mangum (27SB) became the first set of rookie teammates in franchise history to both eclipse 25 SB and the first in the majors since PHI Juan Samuel (72SB) and PHI Jeff Stone (27SB) in 1984.

Between Simpson, Mangum and Caballero (34SB w/ TB), the Rays had three players reach 25 SB for the second time, joining 2009 (Jason Barlett/Carl Crawford/B.J. Upton) With 182 HR and 194 SB, the Rays were the sixth team in MLB history to record 180 HR and 180 SB, joining the 2023 Reds (198/190), 2016 Brewers (194/181), 2009 Rays (199/194) 1998 Blue Jays (221/184) and 1996 Rockies (221/201).

PLAYING THE HITS—Jake Mangum (.296) and Chandler Simpson (.295) became the second and third Rays rookies to hit .295 or better (min. 400AB), joining Joey Wendle (.300) in 2018...since 1930, only three other pairs of rookie teammates have accomplished the feat: PIT Kevin Newman/PIT Bryan Reynolds in 2019, PIT Jose Tabata/PIT Neil Walker in 2010 and BOS Fred Lynn/BOS Jim Rice in 1975...Mangum and Simpson are the 10th pair of rookie teammates in the modern era (1900–pres.) to turn the trick.

** Between Mangum, Simpson and Yandy Díaz (.300), the Rays had three players hit .295 or better (min. 400AB) for the second time, joining 2009, when Jason Barlett (.320), Carl Crawford (.305) and Ben Zobrist (.297) all met the mark.

ON THE MOUND—The Rays pitched to a 3.94 ERA, 15th in the majors and their highest since 2017 (3.97)...it was their first time finishing outside MLB's top 10 leaders in ERA since 2016 (16th, 4.20)...Tampa Bay has still recorded a sub-4.00 ERA in nine consecutive seasons (2017-25), the longest active streak in the majors, ahead of three clubs tied at five seasons (HOU, MIL, NYY)...the club's ERA dipped to 3.42 entering play June 17, fifth lowest in the majors, but its 4.37 ERA from that point on ranked 11th in the AL and 21st in MLB...the Rays pitched to a 1.22 WHIP, third in the AL behind the Rangers (1.18) and Mariners (1.22)... it marked their eighth consecutive year ranking among the AL's top three clubs in the category (2018-25) and the 12th time in the last 15 seasons (2011-25).

The Rays staff ranked fifth in the AL with 1,416 SO, sixth most in franchise history... they led the AL with a 25.8 pct. strikeout rate after the All-Star break, second in the majors to the Dodgers (27.4%).

Tampa Bay starters ranked ninth in the AL/15th in MLB with a 4.03 ERA, their highest since 2021 (4.08), and recorded the third-best opp. average in the AL (.238)... their 850.2 IP marked their most since 2017 (899.1IP).

Three members of the Rays rotation recorded exactly 31 starts: Shane Baz, Ryan Pepiot and Drew Rasmussen...it marked the club's most pitchers with 30 starts or more since 2016 (Chris Archer/Jake Odorizzi/Drew Smyly).

The Rays bullpen turned in a 3.81 ERA, seventh in the AL/12th in the majors and their highest since 2016 (4.09)...they held opponents to a .306 on-base pct., third lowest in the AL, but yielded 83 HR, second most in the AL behind the Angels. the Rays 28 blown saves were third most in the AL and tied for third most in team history, trailing 2022 (33) and 2023 (29).

The Rays used 30 pitchers, fourth fewest in the AL, more than only the Guardians (26), Royals (27) and Rangers (29) and matching their total from 2024...only nine pi

FLASHING LEATHER—The Rays 44 defensive runs saved were fifth most in the majors with only the Rangers (97), Cubs (85), Dodgers (66) and Blue Jays (52) earning more...this includes an MLB-leading 18 DRS from the shortstop position, due in part to Taylor Walls whose 18 DRS on the year ranked third among major league infielders behind TOR Ernie Clement (23) and PIT/CIN KeBryan Hayes (19) despite Walls appearing in his final game on Aug. 8...the Rays 44 DRS was 49 runs higher than their 2024 total (-5)—only the Rangers (+64) and White Sox (+53) had larger year-to-year increases across all of MLB.

The Rays committed 81 errors, 15th fewest in the majors...this includes 14 miscues in their final 14 games, most in MLB in that span (Sept. 14–end of season).

Among AL clubs, only the Rangers (7) had fewer outfield errors than the Rays (8). Tampa Bay's 14 outfield assists were sixth most in the Junior Circuit.

STARSTRUCK—Four Rays were selected to represent the club as All-Stars: 1B Jonathan Aranda, 3B Junior Caminero, 2B Brandon Lowe and RHP Drew Rasmussen...Aranda Caminero and Rasmussen were first-time All-Stars, while Lowe was selected for the second time in his career, joining 2019...it marked the fourth time in franchise history the Rays had four All-Stars or more, joining 2023 (Arozarena/Diaz/Franco/McClanahan) 2010 (Crawford/Longoria/Price/Soriano) and 2009 (Bartlett/Crawford/Longoria/Peña/Zobrist)...at 22 years, 10 days old on the day of the Midsummer Classic, Caminero became the youngest player in Rays history to start an All-Star Game and the third-youngest third baseman since the contest's inception in 1933, older than only the Milwaukee Braves Eddie Mathews in 1953 (21.274) and CLE Buddy Lewis in 1938 (21.330)

**Caminero also became the fourth Ray to participate in the T-Mobile Home Run Derby, joining Randy Arozarena (2023), Carlos Peña (2009) and Evan Longoria (2008)...he qualified for the finals before falling to champion SEA Cal Raleigh joining Arozarena as the only Rays to advance past the opening round.

THE CAMINER-SHOW—In his first full major league campaign, 22-year-old Junior Caminero ranked third in the AL with 45 HR, second most in Rays history behind Carlos Peña (46HR) in 2007...according to Stats Perform, he became the sixth player to rank among the AL's top-three home run leaders in an age-21-or-younger season (age as of June 30), joining BOS Tony Conigliaro in 1965, BOS Ted Williams in 1939, CLE Hal Trosky in 1934, BOS Tris Speaker in 1909 and DET Ty Cobb in 1907...it marked the second-most long balls in an age-21-or-younger season in MLB history, trailing the Milwaukee Braves Eddie Mathews (47HR) in 1953...his 110 RBI were the most by a Ray since Evan Longoria (113) in 2009 and were fourth most in franchise history, also trailing Peña's 2007 season (121) and Jorge Cantú (117) in 2005...he is one of five players since 2000 to tally 110 RBI in an age 21-or-younger campaign, joining WSH Juan Soto (110) in 2019, WSH Ryan Zimmerman (110) in 2006, FLA Miguel Cabrera (112) in 2004 and STL Albert Pujols (130) in 2001...Caminero became the third AL third baseman (4x) with 45 HR and 110 RBI in a season, regardless of age, joining NYY Alex Rodriguez in 2007 and 2005 and MIN Harmon Killebrew in 1969...he also became the first Dominican-born player to reach those marks at any position since TOR José Bautista in 2010 (54HR, 124RBI)...Caminero collected 73 XBH, tied for fourth most in the AL and the most by a Ray since Longoria in 2016 (81).

He recorded 6 HR or more in each month of the season (March/April, May, June, July, Aug., Sept.) becoming the first Ray to accomplish the feat and the youngest player in major league history to do so.

On May 31 at HOU, he went 4-for-5 with 2 2B, 2 HR, 5 RBI, 4 R and 12 TB...he became the fourth-youngest player in MLB history to record multiple doubles and multiple homers in the same game, older than NYY Joe DiMaggio (21.212) o

THE GREAT YANDINO—Yandy Díaz set career highs in hits (175), home runs (25), RBI (83) and games played (150)...it marked the most hits by a Ray since Carl Crawford had 184 in 2010...he joined Aubrey Huff (2x, last: 2004, 29HR/178H) as the only players in team history to record 175 hits or more, including 25 HR or more...he and NYY Aaron Judge (179H/53HR) were the only players in the majors to turn the trick this season...Díaz hit exactly .300, one of six AL players to bat .300 or better...paired with his club-record .330 average from 2023, Díaz and Crawford (5x, last: 2010) are the only Rays with multiple qualified seasons batting .300 or better...Díaz (2), José Abreu (4) and HOU Yordan Alvarez (2) are the only active Cuban-born players with multiple such campaigns...Díaz recorded 53 multi-hit games, tying SEA Julio Rodríguez for the MLB lead and becoming the first player in franchise history to pace the majors in multi-hit efforts...he ranked fourth in the AL in both on-base pct. (.366) and hits (175), was sixth in average and eighth in OPS (.848).

From May 31 on, he led the majors in both hits and batting average (.340/125-for-368)...among AL hitters, only NYY Aaron Judge (1.086), ATH Nick Kurtz (1.072) and TOR George Springer (1.037) had a better OPS than Díaz (.956) in that span...this includes a .404/.491/.596 (40-for-99) clip with 7 2B, 4 HR and 10 RBI over his final 28 games from Aug. 25 on, the majors' best average and second-base on-base pct. to Judge (.521) in that timeframe.

six strikeouts...became the second six strikeouts... Decame the second pitcher in major league history to allow one or zero hits in three straight starts while going 5.0 innings or more in each outing (also: Dylan Cease, 3G - July 13-25, 2024).

Junior Caminero hits his 43rd home run of the campaign and the 50th of his career, becoming the second player in major league history with 43 home runs or more in an age-21-or-younger season...became the second-youngest (22.070) Dominican-born player in MLB history to reach 50 career home runs behind Juan Soto (20.297). Díaz finished the year with the fifth-most hits in franchise history (882) after surpassing **Kevin Kiermaier** (756) and **Aubrey Huff** (870) during the season...the only Cuban-born player with more career hits than Díaz (957) to appear in an MLB game this season is SD **Jose Iglesias** (1,212). He recorded an MLB-leading 260 hard-hit balls (95 mph EV or faster), the highest total by a Ray under Statcast (2015–pres.), surpassing his own 2023 campaign (234), and tied for the seventh-highest mark by any player in the majors in that span. Díaz appeared in a career-high 114 games at designated hitter, second most in franchise history behind **Johnny Damon** in 2011 (135).

ARANDA'S WORLD—Despite missing 49 games with a left wrist fracture, Jonathan Aranda earned his first career All-Star selection, setting career highs in every major category...at the time of his injury on July 31, he ranked third in the AL in average (.316), and on-base pct. (.394) and was sixth in OPS (.872)...min. 350 AB, his .316 batting average on the season was fourth best in Rays history behind Yandy Díaz (.330) in 2023, Jeff Keppinger (.325) in 2012 and Jason Bartlett (.320) in 2009.

* Aranda's 3.4 bWAR marked the highest total by a Mexican-born first baseman in MLB history, surpassing AZ Erubiel Durazo in 1999 (1.4) and was the 11th-highest single-season total by any Mexican-born position player.

* Min. 90 AB, his .367 (33-for-90) average with RISP ranked third in the AL behind TOR Bo Bichette (.381) and ATH Jacob Wilson (.371) and was second best in franchise history, trailing Bartlett (.386) in 2009.

* He batted .343/.421/.521 (81-for-236) when hitting in the clean-up spot...min. 200 PA, it was the highest average and on-base pct. by a clean-up hitter in franchise history, and his .942 OPS led the majors was second in team history to Fred McGriff (.960) in 1999.

DAWG POUND—Brandon Lowe was named an AL All-Star for the second time in his career, joining 2019, after hitting 31 HR in 134 games, both of which were the second-highest marks in his career behind 2021 (39HR/149G)...the 31 HR tied NYY Jazz Chisholm Jr. for the most among MLB second basemen...Lowe became the fourth active second baseman with multiple 30-HR campaigns along with ATL Ozzie Albies (2), HOU Jose Altuve (2) and AZ Ketel Marte (2)...he also joined Evan Longoria (4) and Carlos Peña (3) as the only Rays with multiple such seasons...he finished the year with 157 homers in his career, third in Rays history behind Longoria (261) and Peña (163)...it marks the ninth-most long balls by any second baseman in MLB history through his first eight career seasons—Lowe has appeared in over 200 games fewer than any of the eight players ahead of him in those rankings.

* Lowe recorded a franchise-record-tying 20-game hitting streak from June 11—July 5, matching Yandy Diaz (June 7-28, 2024)...during the streak, he hit .367/.412/.633 (29-for-79) with 3 2B, 6 HR and 14 RBI...he also produced a career-best 23-game onbase streak from June 9—July 5.

He hit his fifth career grand slam on Aug. 31 at WSH, tying Peña and Ben Zobrist for the most in franchise history.

Paired with Junior Caminero (45HR), the Rays had multiple players tally 30 HR for the sixth time (last: B. Lowe - 39HR & Mike Zunino - 33HR, 2021).

Lowe is the sixth player to spend the first eight years of his career with Tampa Bay... he joins Carl Crawford, Kevin Kiermaier, Longoria, B.J. Upton and Ben Zobrist.

UNCLE DREW—In his first full season as a starter since undergoing an internal brace procedure in July 2023, Drew Rasmussen went 10-5 with a 2.76 ERA (150.0IP, 46ER) over a career-high 31 starts en route to his first career All-Star selection...min. 150.0 IP, it marked the AL's fourth-best ERA behind DET Tarik Skubal (2.21), HOU Hunter Brown (2.43) and BOS Garrett Crochet (2.59) and was fifth best in franchise history, trailing Blake Snell (1.89) in 2018, Shane McClanahan (2.54) in 2022 and David Price in both 2012 (2.56) and 2010 (2.72)...Rasmussen recorded a Rays-record 10 scoreless starts of 5.0 IP or more, tied for third most in MLB behind PIT Paul Skenes (12) and Skubal (12)...he also made a franchise-record 13 starts of 5.0 IP or more with no extra-base hits allowed, most in the AL since CAL Nolan Ryan (13GS) in 1977 and tied for fifth most by an AL pitcher in the live ball era (1920-pres.).

FOR PETE'S SAKE—Pete Fairbanks compiled a career-high 27 saves, seventh in the AL and the most by a Ray since Alex Colomé (47) in 2017...he became the second pitcher in franchise history to record three 20-save seasons, joining Roberto Hernandez from 1998–2000...Fairbanks, CLE Emmanuel Clase, KC Carlos Estévez and LAA Kenley Jansen are the only AL pitchers to reach the mark in each of the last three years...Fairbanks' 90 career saves rank third in Rays history, trailing Hernandez (101) and Colomé (95)...he has recorded 313 SO as a reliever with Tampa Bay, second in franchise history to Jake McGee (319SO)...his 265 relief appearances are fourth behind McGee (297), Joel Peralta (296) and Grant Balfour (274).

AT THE HELM—The longest-tenured manager in the majors with his current team, Kevin Cash completed his 11th season as Rays skipper, moving to 896-784 (.533) in his career...at the conclusion of the season, Cash ranks sixth among active skippers in wins and 12th in winning pct....the Rays 896 wins since his 2015 managerial debut are eighth most in MLB... Cash, who joined the Rays on Dec. 5, 2014, is the seventh-longest-tenured manager/head coach in the big four North American professional sports leagues (MLB, NBA, NFL, NHL) by hiring date...he trails Mike Tomlin (Jan. 2007), John Harbaugh (Jan. 2008), Erik Spoelstra (April 2008), Andy Reid (Jan. 2013), Jon Cooper (March 2013) and Steve Kerr (May 2014).

Nine of 26 players on the Rays Opening Day roster remained active throughout the entire season: Shane Baz, Junior Caminero, Garrett Cleavinger, Yandy Díaz, Pete Fairbanks, Christopher Morel, Ryan Pepiot, Drew Rasmussen and Edwin Uceta.

The Rays used a total of 56 players, fifth most in franchise history...19 of the 56 players were rookies, tied for second most in the AL behind the Athletics (25)...this includes 10 rookies who made their major league debuts, tied with 2023, 2003 and 2002 for the Rays second most behind 2018 (12)...among AL teams, only the Athletics (15), Astros (11) and White Sox (11) had more debuts than the Rays in 2025.

Cash deployed 153 different lineups, tied for the third most during his tenure as manager (2015-25) behind 2022 and 2021 (both 158 lineups)...eight of the 153 were used more than once and only one was used three times.

DRAFT DAY(S)—The Rays selected 22 players in MLB's 2025 First-Year Player Draft, including 15 pitchers and seven position players...14 were college players, three junior college and five high school...21 of the 22 players were signed, with 20th round selection RHP Ike Young opting to attend the University of Illinois...the Rays took 18-year-old SS Daniel Pierce out of Mill Creek (Ga.) High School in the first round (No. 14 overall)...he was rated the No. 13 player in the draft according to MLB.com and he hit .451/.605/.939 (37-for-82) with 10 2B, 3 3B, 8 HR, 18 SB and 33 BB against 9 SO in his senior year...he was the fourth shortstop selected with Tampa Bay's first-round selection in the last seven drafts, joining Greg Jones (2019, No. 22 overall), Carson Williams (2021, No. 28 overall) and Brayden Taylor (2023, No. 19 overall).

** Six Rays draftees are among the organization's top 30 prospects (MLB.com): SS Daniel Pierce (No. 4), OF Brendan Summerhill (No. 8), OF Dean Moss (No. 14), SS Cooper Flemming (No. 16), C/OF Taitn Gray (No. 26) and OF James Quinn-Irons (No. 30).

THE RAY WAY—Since 2008, the Rays .541 (1,523-1,292) winning pct. ranks third in the majors behind the Dodgers (.586) and Yankees (.571)...this success comes after the Devil Rays amassed the majors' worst record at 645-972 (.404) over the club's first decade of existence....they have recorded a winning record in 12 of 18 seasons since 2008—only the Yankees (18), Dodgers (17) and Cardinals (16) have more in that timeframe.

MINOR MATTERS—The Rays minor league affiliates combined to go 395-321 (.552), ranking fourth in both wins and winning pct. among all organizations...Rays farm teams have combined for a top-six winning pct. in each season since 2017, posting the best winning pct. in baseball over that timeframe (.563/3,490-2,705)...all seven affiliates produced a .500 or better record this season, marking the second time in club history all members of the farm system have done so (2019 – 9) and the sixth time by any organization since the minor leagues were restructured in 2021.

Three of seven Rays affiliates made the postseason with DSL Tampa Bay earning a Wild Card spot, Class-A Bowling Green winning both first- and second-half division titles, and Double-A Montgomery winning a second-half division title en route to its second straight Southern League Championship Series appearance.

No. 1 prospect Carson Williams made his major league debut on Aug. 22 vs. STL after playing 111 games with Triple-A Durham to begin the season...he homered five times in his first 25 career games, tying Mike Brosseau and Nathaniel Lowe, both in 2019, for the most through 25 career games in franchise history.

Per MLB.com, five of the Rays top 30 prospects entering the season appeared for the big-league club this season: Williams, OF Chandler Simpson (No. 7), LHP Mason Montgomery (No. 16), LHP Ian Seymour (No. 20) and LHP Joe Rock (No. 22).
