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NEW YORK METS (83-79)
SECOND PLACE, NL EAST, 13.0 GB

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METSCELLANEOUS: The Mets finished the season going 83-79 and in second place in the National League East...The team opened the 2025 season in Houston and concluded their campaign in Miami.

WE REMEMBER: Throughout the 2025 season, the Mets wore a tribute uniform patch to honor Mets Hall of Famer Ed Kranepool...Kranepool passed away on September 8, 2024, at age 79...Kranepool played for the Mets from 1962-1979, spending his entire 18-year career with the Mets...He was a member of the 1969 Miracle Mets, a 1965 All-Star and the club's all-time leader in games played...Kranepool remains in the Mets all-time top 10 in many statistical categories including plate appearances, hits, at-bats, total bases, doubles, RBI, walks and runs scored...He was inducted into the Mets Hall of Fame in 1990.

MENDOZA LINES: Carlos Mendoza returned for his second season at the helm of the Mets...He owns a 172-152 (.531) record as manager...He was named the 25th manager in franchise history...The 45-year-old spent the previous 15 seasons with the Yankees organization, including his last four as the club's bench coach...From 2018-19, Mendoza served as the Yankees' quality control coach...Prior to joining the big league coaching staff, Mendoza served as a manager and coach in the Yankees farm system...A native of Barquisimeto, Venezuela, Mendoza is the second full-time Venezuelan-born manager in big league history, joining Ozzie Guillén...He became the second manager in Mets history to earn a Postseason berth in his first season, joining Buck Showalter in 2022.

AMF LEGACY AWARD: The Amazin' Mets Foundation, led by Foundation President and Mets Owner Alex Cohen, awarded the third annual Amazin' Mets Foundation Legacy Award to Sarah Langs in a pregame ceremony on August 6...The Amazin' Mets Foundation Legacy Award celebrates the people and organizations in the baseball community that are making a difference and driving impactful change, on and off the field...In her fight with ALS, Sarah has raised awareness and inspired countless others throughout the baseball community.

THE WRIGHT WAY: David Wright became the eighth Mets player in franchise history to have his number retired by the organization, joining Tom Seaver (#41), Mike Piazza (#31), Jerry Koosman (#36), Keith Hernandez (#17), Willie Mays (#24), Dwight Gooden (#16) and Darryl Strawberry (#18)...In addition, the Mets have retired three other numbers, including Manager Gil Hodges (#14), Manager Casey Stengel (#37) and Jackie Robinson (#42)...Wright joined Seaver as the only players to have their number retired and enter the Mets Hall of Fame on the same day.

THE EAST WAS A BEAST: The Mets went 25-27 against the NL East division this season...They posted a 4.35 ERA, while slashing .266/.338/.452...This compared to a 30-22 record against the division in 2024.

HOME, SWEET HOME: The Mets went 49-32 at home this season...This included one victory in Williamsport, PA...Their .605 home winning percentage was the ninth-best in the majors and the sixth-best in the NL...The team's .605 winning percentage at home was tied for the 11th-best in franchise history...The last time the Mets have a better winning percentage at home was in 2022 when they went 54-28 (.667).

ON THE ROAD: The Mets went 34-47 on the road this year...Their .420 winning percentage was tied for 22nd in the majors and tied for 11th in the National League...The Mets posted a 4.38 ERA on the road, which was 19th in the majors...Their .732 OPS on the road was the eighth-best in The Show and fourth-best in the Senior Circuit.

THEY'RE OUT OF OUR LEAGUE: For the first time in franchise history, the Mets opened their regular season schedule and their home schedule against Interleague Opponents...New York went 24-24 against the American League in 2025...The Mets are 302-300 against Interleague opponents all-time...Pete Alonso owns the franchise record with 68 homers in Interleague play.

OUCH: The Mets were plunked 87 times this year, which was second in the NL and tied for fourth in the majors...Pete Alonso owns the franchise record, having been hit by 100 pitches in his career...Brandon Nimmo is second with 87, followed by Jeff McNeil with 85 HBP.

STREAKS: The Mets won a season-high seven straight games twice during the 2025 season from April 17-23 and again from July 20-27...The team dropped eight straight games from September 6-13...It was their longest losing streak since May 31-June 9, 2018...The last time the Mets had a longer streak was an 11-game streak from August 28-September 8, 2004...The 2025 season marked the first time since 1980 that the Mets have had three separate seven-game losing streaks.

DEBUTS: The Mets featured several players who made their Major League debut in 2025 - Catcher Hayden Senger, RHP Alex Carrillo, RHP Dom Hamel, RHP Justin Hagenman, RHP Nolan McLean, RHP Jonathan Pintaro, RHP Brandon Sproat, RHP Blade Tidwell and RHP Jonah Tong.

WE ARE THE CHAMPIONS! Congrats to the Brooklyn Cyclones, who for the first time in franchise history, are South Atlantic League Champions...The 'Clones topped the Spartanburgers to secure their third championship in franchise history, and first since becoming a full-season affiliate...The win completed a perfect 4-0 postseason for Brooklyn...Gilbert Gomez's squad swept both Greensboro and Hub City en route to the championship. After winning a franchise best 72 games during the course of the regular season, including a 2025 First Half North Division crown, the 'Clones ran the table throughout the postseason.

RUMBLE: Congrats to the Binghamton Rumble Ponies who defeated the Erie SeaWolves in three games to earn the Eastern League Championship...With the victory, Binghamton won its fourth Eastern League championship in franchise history and its first since 2014...Binghamton also won the Eastern League title in 1992, 1994, and 2014.

KEEP THE CAR RUNNING: The Mets scored 19 runs on April 28 at Washington and again on August 29 vs. Miami...Their 19 runs on August 29 were their most ever in a home game, breaking the previous high of 17 set on July 8, 2006 vs. Florida and September 25, 2016 vs. Philadelphia...It marked the seventh game in franchise history with 19 or more runs and the first time the Mets have accomplished the feat twice in the same season...The Mets' 19 runs were tied for the second-most scored in a pitcher's Major League debut (Jonah Tong) since 1900 (last: 8/12/08 Charlie Zink, BOS)...Courtesy of Sarah Langs.

WHAT A NIGHT: The Mets had 20 plate appearances through the first two innings in the August 29 game against Miami, a franchise record...The previous high was 19 plate appearances on June 16, 1989 vs. Montreal...Only one other team has had 20+ plate appearances through the first two innings of a game this season (also: WAS, 22 on 5/31 at ARI)...Courtesy of Elias...The team's 12 runs through the first two innings of the game were the most in franchise history breaking the previous high of 10 set on four separate occasions, August 7, 1971 at Atlanta, September 29, 2000 vs. Montreal, July 31, 2002 vs. Houston and April 12, 2013 at Minnesota...Courtesy of Elias.

DINGERS: In August, the Mets set a franchise record for the most home runs in a single month with 53...It topped their previous high of 50 homers in September of 2019 and June of 2017...Their 53 homers were the most in the NL in August and the second-most in the majors...Overall, the Mets hit 224 home runs in 2025, which were the fifth-most in the majors and the second-most in the NL.

SEVENTH HEAVEN: The Mets hit seven solo home runs on June 21 at Philadelphia, which tied an MLB record...The Angels were the last team to do so on August 22, 2022 vs. Oakland...The Mets recorded seven or more homers in a game for the fifth time in franchise history...All five occurrences have come on the road and four of the instances have occurred at Citizens Bank Park...In addition, the game marked the first game in MLB history to feature seven or more total home runs with all of them being solo homers by the same team...Courtesy of Stats Perform.

TWINBILLS: The Mets played three doubleheaders in 2025...The Mets were swept in a doubleheader on May 4 in St. Louis, split a two games on July 2 vs. Milwaukee and were swept on July 10 at Baltimore...The Mets have played 36 double dips since 2021, more than any other team in the majors...The Mets have earned at least a split in 31 of those 36 twinbills over the last four years...New York has swept nine of their last 23 doubleheaders...Of the 36 doubleheaders, the Mets have swept 12, split 19 and have been swept five times.

STEAL THIS BASE: The Mets stole 147 bases in 2025, which ranked fifth in the majors and third in the National League...The team's 89.1 stolen base percentage was the best in The Show and the highest in franchise history...The team's 147 steals were the most since 2007 when the team swiped 200 bases...Juan Soto recorded 38 steals, which were tied for the most in the NL...It was the most by a Met in a single season since Eric Young Jr.'s 38 in 2013.

BLADES OF STEAL: From June 19-August 16, the Mets safely stole 39 consecutive bases...It was the second-longest such streak since caught stealing was first tracked (AL in 1920 and NL in 1951), trailing only the Red Sox (40, 2013-14)...It was tied with the 2013 Red Sox (39) for the longest single-season streak in Major League history...From June 18-August 16 the Mets went 50 games without getting caught stealing...That was the fifth-longest such streak Major League history.

APRIL COME SHE WILL: The Mets went 19-8 in April...The team's 19 April wins were most wins in the month in team history, surpassing the 2006 and 2002 teams who each had 16...The National League record for wins in the month of April is 19 (done by: Philadelphia-2024, Pittsburgh-2023, Arizona-2008, Atlanta-1997 & Milwaukee-2014).

STARTING OFF: New York's starting pitching staff went 33 consecutive games allowing four runs or fewer to start the season...It was the longest streak in the National League in the last 125 years...Only the 2022 Yankees (41 straight starts allowing four runs or less) and the 1972 Indians (also 41 starts) had longer such streaks...Hat tip to Sarah Langs for the info.

NO HOMERS CLUB: The Mets starting pitching staff did not allowed a home run over a 14-game span from April 12-26...The team record is 23 games from August 30-September 19, 1969...Overall, the Mets starting staff allowed 83 home runs this season, which was the fewest in the majors...Aside from 2020 (47 homers), the team's 83 home runs allowed by starters was the fewest since 1994 (113 games), when they also allowed 83...The last time Mets starters allowed fewer home runs in a full-season was 67 in 1992.

SUBWAY SERIES: The Mets went 3-3 in the Subway Series this year...They went 4-0 in the Subway Series in 2024...The Amazin's are 69-83 vs. the Yankees all-time during the regular season...The Mets are 117-151-3 vs. the Yankees combined in the regular season, World Series, Spring Training, 2020 Summer Camp, Mayor's Trophy Games, Mayor's Challenge Games and the Big Apple Series.

DIRTY 30S: The Mets featured three players with 30 + homers - Pete Alonso, Francisco Lindor and Juan Soto...This is the first time in franchise history that the Mets have featured three players with 30+ homers in season...The Mets were one of four teams with three players with 30+ homers this season, joining the Athletics, Cubs and Yankees.

30/30: Lindor and Soto joined Howard Johnson (36 HR/32 SB) and Darryl Strawberry (39 HR/36 SB) in 1987 are the only pair of Mets teammates to have a 30/30 season...Along with the 1987 Mets, the 1996 Rockies are the only other team that featured two players with a 30/30 season - Dante Bichette (31 HR/31 SB) and Ellis Burks (40 HR/32 SB)...According to Sarah Langs, the Mets have had eight individual 30/30 seasons, the most of any franchise.

DID WE JUST BECOME BEST FRIENDS?: Francisco Lindor and Pete Alonso have homered in the same game 30 times...That is the most among any duo in franchise history (previous: Howard Johnson and Darryl Strawberry - 27)...Courtesy of Elias.

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: 1B Pete Alonso, SS Francisco Lindor, RHP Edwin Díaz and LHP David Peterson represented the Mets on the National League All-Star team in 2025...Alonso was named to the All-Star team for the fifth time in his career, the most by any first baseman in team history – two more than Keith Hernandez...Alonso became the sixth player in franchise history to be named to five or more All-Star teams, joining Tom Seaver (nine), David Wright (seven), Mike Piazza (seven), Darryl Strawberry (seven) and Carlos Beltrán (five)...Diaz was named to an All-Star team for the third time in his career and second as a member of the Mets (also in 2022)...He was an American League All-Star in 2018 with Seattle...Lindor was announced as the National League starting shortsto and made his first trip to the Midsummer Classic as a member of the Mets and his fifth overall after making four straight American League All-Star teams with Cleveland from 2016-19...Peterson was selected to his first career All-Star Game.

THE FUTURE IS NOW: RHP Jonah Tong tossed a 1-2-3 inning in the 2025 Futures Game in Atlanta...He had one strikeout...Tong, the Mets #4 prospect and #46 prospect in MLB Pipeline's Top 100 prospects was selected by the Mets in the seventh round of the 2022 MLB Draft out of Georgia Premier Academy...Carson Bengé went 0-1...The Mets #2 prospect and #21 prospect in MLB Pipeline's Top 100, was selected by the Mets with the 19th overall pick in the 2024 draft out of Oklahoma State.

CLOUD NINE: On April 28 at Washington, Brandon Nimmo tied a franchise record with nine RBI in a single game...According to Elias, Brandon Nimmo is the third player with nine or more RBI in a three-inning span within a game since RBI became an official stat (1920), joining Sammy Sosa (8/10/02, 3rd-5th) and Ivan Rodriguez (4/13/99, 1st-3rd)...He is the second player with nine or more RBI in a game in the sixth inning or later since RBI became an official stat (1920), joining Mike Moustakas (9/12/15).

FIRST-HALF DUBS: New York collected 55 wins prior to the All-Star break... That were the third-most wins in franchise history in the first-half behind 59 wins in 1986 and 58 victories in 2022.

LITTLE LEAGUE CLASSIC: The Mets and Mariners played in the 2025 Little League Classic at Bowman Field in Williamsport, PA...The Mets earned a 7-3 victory over the Mariners in the game...Prior to the event, the Mets participated in a variety of activities and interacted with LLBWS players at the Little League Complex...It marked the second time the Mets participated in the Little League Classic...In 2018, the Mets faced the Phillies in Williamsport and defeated the Phillies, 8-2, at Bowman Field...From 1964-1967, Williamsport was the Mets Double-A affiliate in the Eastern League... Jerry Koosman, Jon Matlack, Nolan Ryan and Ron Swoboda all played in Williamsport before the Miracle Mets of 1969.

METS-LLBWS CONNECTION: The following former Mets participated in the Little League Baseball World Series: Billy Connors (1954), Gary Sheffield (1980), Derek Bell (1980-81), Jason Bay (1990), Lastings Milledge (1997), Todd Frazier (1998), Ruben Tejada (2001), Michael Conforto (2004) and Gavin Cecchini (2006).

GRAND GROUP: Four players in franchise history have played in 1,000 or more games, hit 100 or more homers and walked 500 or more times...Darryl Strawberry, Howard Johnson, David Wright and Brandon Nimmo.

LUCKY LINDOR: From July 9, 2024 - June 21, 2025 the Mets won 28 straight games in which Francisco Lindor homered...That streak was the longest streak in team history...Prior to Lindor's streak, the longest was 21 straight wins when George Foster homered between July 3, 1985, and June 29, 1986...Carl Furillo (29, 1951-53) holds the record...Courtesy of Sarah Langs.

OUCH OUCH: On April 28 at Washington, Francisco Lindor was hit by a pitch twice in one inning...According to Elias, it was the second time that has happened in franchise history...Frank Thomas was hit twice in the fourth inning in game one of April 29, 1962 vs. Philadelphia.

SIDE TO SIDE: Francisco Lindor has homered from both sides of the plate seven times in his career and five times with the Mets...Courtesy of Elias... His five games with homers from both sides is tied with Todd Hundley and Carlos Beltrán for the most such instances in franchise history.

SHORT KINGS: According to Elias, Francisco Lindor has hit 271 home runs and stolen 214 bases as a shortstop...Only two players in major league history had 200/200 (HR/SB) as a shortstop - Derek Jeter (255 HR, 351 SB) and Jimmy Rollins (229 HR, 469 SB).

THE SIXTH SENSE: Lindor has recorded three straight seasons with 30+ homers...He has six seasons with 30+ homers, which is the second-most 30-HR seasons as a primary SS in MLB history (min 50% games at SS), behind only Alex Rodriguez (seven seasons)...He broke a tie with Ernie Banks... Courtesy of Sarah Langs.

A HIT'S A HIT: Francisco Lindor recorded his 1,500th career hit on April 7 vs. Miami...He is the 24th active player to reach the milestone...He is one of 13 active players with 1,500 hits since 2015 and one of 14 active/non-active players to accumulate 1,500 hits during that span.

DING DING: Francisco Lindor's walkoff home run on April 18 vs. St. Louis was his 250th career home run...He became the fifth shortstop in major league history to reach the 250-career home run mark (min. 60% of career games at SS)...He became the 254th player in major league history to reach 250 career home runs and is the first to hit a walk-off for No. 250...Courtesy of Sarah Langs...He became the 19th active player with 250+ career homers.

LEADING OFF: On April 20-21, Francisco Lindor joined Curtis Granderson (2017) and Kaz Matsui (2004) as the only players in franchise history to hit a lead-off homer in consecutive games...He has recorded 22 multi-homer games...He joins Alex Rodriguez (33) and Ernie Banks (24) as the only shortstops in major league history with 20 or more multi-homer games... Courtesy of Sarah Langs.

KEEPIN' IT 200: Francisco Lindor collected his 200th career stolen base on July 12 at Kansas City...He is one of nine active players with 200 or more stolen bases...He joined Roberto Alomar and Carlos Beltrán as the only Puerto Rican-born players with 200 homers and 200 stolen bases.

LIN-SANITY: Francisco Lindor was named the National League Player of the Week presented by Chevrolet for the week of August 17...Lindor earned his fifth career honor and third with the Mets following awards on August 26 of last season and on May 31, 2022...The 31-year-old hit .560 (14-25) with three homers, seven RBI, three doubles, three walks, seven runs, two stolen bases, a 1.040 SLG and a .607 OBP in six games...The Puerto Rico native led the majors in batting average, OBP, OPS (1.647), hits and total bases (26)...He was tied for first in extra-base hits (6) and ranked second in slugging.

DOUBLE TROUBLE: Alonso recorded 41 doubles this season, which was tied for the most in the National League and tied for third in the majors...His 41 doubles were tied for the fifth-most in a single-season by a Mets player... He is one of 11 players in franchise history to record at least 30 doubles in three or more seasons (also: 2019 and 2024), joining David Wright (8), Daniel Murphy (5), Carlos Beltrán (5), José Reyes (4), Carlos Delgado (3), John Olerud (3), Kevin McReynolds (3), Keith Hernandez (3), Howard Johnson (3) and Francisco Lindor (1).

POSTING UP: Pete Alonso appeared in all 162 Mets games this year... AND I WOULD WALK 100 MILES: Juan Soto set a franchise record with 127 walks this season...His 127 walks led the major leagues...He recorded his sixth season with 100+ walks and became the second Mets player to break the 100 walk barrier...John Olerud owned the previous franchise recorded when he recorded 125 walks during the 1999 season...Soto has five seasons of 120+ walks, the fifth-most such seasons in Major League history..Only Barry Bonds (11), Babe Ruth (10), Eddie Yost (8) and Ted Williams (8) have had more such seasons.

KEEP ROLLING NOLAN: On August 16 vs. Seattle, RHP Nolan McLean threw 5.1 scoreless innings, allowed two hits, struck out eight and earned the win in his Major League debut...McLean became the sixth pitcher in franchise history to record eight or more strikeouts in their debut and joined Collin McHugh and Matt Harvey as the only players in franchise history to throw 5.0 or more scoreless innings with eight strikeouts...The right-hander became the 26th pitcher to earn the win in his Major League debut and the first since Kodai Senga (4/2/23 at MIA).

FOUR SCORE: According to @OptaStats, Nolan McLean is the second MLB pitcher to go 4-0 with a sub-1.50 ERA and 25+ strikeouts over his first four career starts (since ERA became official in both leagues in 1913)...The other was Fernando Valenzuela in 1981...His 28 strikeouts through his first four career starts are the most in franchise history...Tylor Megill, Matt Harvey, Doc Goode and Dick Selma previously held the record with 26 strikeouts...He won each of his first four career starts...That marks the first time in franchise history a pitcher has accomplished that feat.

YOUNG MAN'S GAME: Jonah Tong, at 22 years old and 71 days became the youngest pitcher to start for the Mets since Jenrry Mejía (20 years old and 339 days) on September 15, 2010 and the youngest Mets starting pitcher to make their Major League debut since Jon Niese (21 years old and 311 days) made his debut on September 2, 2008...He became one of 12 pitchers in franchise history to make his Major League debut as a starter at age 22 and 71 days or younger...He was the third-youngest starter at the time of their debut in the Majors this season and was only older than Chase Petty and Didier Fuentes were.

PAIR OF ACES: Jonah Tong and Nolan McLean became the fourth pair of Mets teammates to earn the win in their Major League debut in the same season...They other pairs are Roger McDowell and Rick Aguilera (1985), Bobby Jones and Kenny Greer (1993) and Robert Gsellman and Gabriel Ynoa (2016)... #35 Clay Holmes| RHP | 12-8, 3.53 ERA

NEW ROLE WHO DIS: In his first season with the Mets, Holmes was a mainstay in the rotation, starting 31 of his 33 games...Prior to this season, Holmes had only started four Major League games, all of which came in his first season, 2018...The right-hander established career highs in innings (165.2), strikeouts (129) and wins (12)...Additionally, Holmes ranked ninth among qualifiers in the NL with a 3.53 ERA (65 ER/165.2 IP).

OPENING DAY CLAY: Holmes started for the Mets on Opening Day (3/27 at HOU) in just his fifth career Major League start...He is just one of 10 pitchers in the Expansion Era (since 1961) to start Opening Day having made four or fewer career starts prior, joining Marty Pattin (1969, 4), Tom Hall, (1969, 4), Fernando Valenzuela (1981, 0), Al Holland (1982, 3), Dave Nied (1993, 2), Tanner Scheppers, (2014, 0), Dustin May (2020, 4), Garrett Crochet (2024, 0) and Sean Burke (2025, 3)...Courtesy of Sarah Langs...Holmes became the seventh Mets pitcher to make their team debut as the club's Opening Day starter...The others are Roger Craig (4/11/62 at STL), Don Cardwell (4/11/67 vs. PIT), Mike Hampton (3/29/00 vs. CHC), Tom Glavine (3/31/03 vs. CHC), Pedro Martinez (4/4/05 at CIN) and Johan Santana (3/31/08 at FLA)...Courtesy of Elias.

THEY SAY IT'S YOUR BIRTHDAY: On Opening Day, Clay Holmes celebrated his 32nd birthday...He became the seventh pitcher in Major League history to start Opening Day on their birthday joining Vic Willis (4/12/1906 PIT at STL), Marty Pattin (4/6/1971 MIL at MIN), Bert Blyleven (4/6/73 MIN at OAK and 4/6/79 PIT vs. MTL), Catfish Hunter (4/8/76 NYY at MIL), Jon Lieber (4/2/01 CHC vs. MTL) and Ryan Drese (4/5/05 TEX at LAA)...Courtesy of Elias.

10 K CLAY: On April 8 vs. Miami, Holmes made his Mets Citi Field debut...The right-hander allowed four runs over 5.1 innings, issued three walks and struck out a career-high 10 batters...Holmes became the fifth Met all-time to record 10 or more strikeouts in their home pitching debut, joining Dennis Ribant (10 K on 8/17/64 vs. PIT), Dick Selma (13 K on 9/12/65 vs. HOU), Aaron Harang (10 K on 9/12/13 vs. WAS) and Max Scherzer (10 K on 4/19/22-G2 vs. SF)...Courtesy of Elias...Holmes struck out five straight batters starting at his final batter of the third inning until the first batter he faced in the fifth...At the time, 5.1 innings were the second-most he had ever thrown in an outing behind his 6.0 innings pitched in his second career Big League start on July 14, 2018 with Pittsburgh.

HOLMES RUNS: Holmes did not allow a home run in each of his first seven starts of the season...The righty joined Ed Lynch, Tim Leary, Dwight Gooden, Al Leiter and Orel Hershiser as the only pitchers in Mets history to not allow a home run through their first seven starts with the club...Over his next 10 starts, May 9-July 2, Holmes surrendered 11 home runs over 56.2 innings...In his final 14 outings of the season, Holmes only allowed three home runs over 72.1 innings...Overall, Holmes ranked sixth in the NL and ninth in the majors among qualifiers with a 0.76 HR/9 rate...Additionally, Holmes was one of nine pitchers in the majors to throw 150.0 innings and allow 14 or fewer home runs.

A TALE OF TWO SEASONS: In his first 17 starts of the season, Holmes went 8-4 with a 2.99 ERA (31 ER/93.1 IP)...Holmes allowed three or fewer runs in 15 of those starts and did not allow more than four runs in any of those starts...Holmes pitched 6.0 or more innings in seven of nine starts from April 2-June 7...Six of Holmes' eight quality starts came during that span...On June 1 vs. Colorado, Holmes allowed three runs over a career-high 7.0 innings...In his final 16 outings of the season, Holmes went 4-4 with a 4.23 ERA (34 ER/72.1 IP)...During that span, the right-hander allowed a season-high five runs on three separate occasions and failed to complete 5.0 innings five different times...Only twice during that span (8/23 at ATL and 9/27 at MIA) did Holmes complete 6.0 or more innings.

STAYING GROUNDED: This season, Holmes ranked fifth in the majors among qualifiers in groundball percentage with a 56.7% mark...In each of the four prior seasons, Holmes' groundball rate ranked in the top five in the majors, including a league-leading 77.0% mark in 2022 (min. 250 BF each season)...Since 2019, Holmes' 63.3% groundball rate is the fourth-highest mark in the majors during that span behind Aaron Bummer's 65.2% clip, Andre Pallante's 63.8% rate and Jhoan Duran's 63.5% rate (min. 1000 BF).

WAY AWAY FROM HERE: In 17 away games (16 starts), Holmes went 7-6 with a 3.38 ERA (31 ER/82.2 IP)...Among qualifiers, Holmes ranked seventh in the NL and 15th in the majors in road ERA...Additionally, Holmes was tied for fourth in the NL and tied for ninth in the majors in road wins...In his final start of the season, September 27 at Miami, Holmes tossed 6.0 scoreless innings and allowed only one hit...The right-hander became the 15th pitcher in franchise history and the first since Daivd Peterson (9/29/24 at MIL) to throw 6.0 or more scoreless innings and allow one or zero hits in a road start...Since 2022, Holmes ranks 13th in the majors with a 3.01 road ERA (min. 150.0 innings).

THE GAME OF RISP: In his first 17 starts of the season, Holmes held opposing batters to a .111 (7-63) average with runners in scoring position...During that span (March 27 - July 7), Holmes ranked tied for fourth in opponents' batting average with RISP and also ranked fourth in opponent's OPS with RISP, a .372 clip (min. 50 batters faced w/RISP)...Over his final 16 outings of the season, Holmes held opposing batters to a .250 (18-72) average and a .654 OPS...Overall, Holmes ranked second in the majors among qualifiers in OPS with RISP and fourth in average...Additionally, Holmes was one of four pitchers in the majors to allow one or zero homers with RISP and one of two pitchers to allow five or fewer extra-base hits (min. 125 batters faced w/RISP).

WHAT A RELIEF: Holmes made two relief appearances in consecutive outings, September 21 vs. Washington and September 24 at Chicago-NL...On September 21 vs. Washington, Holmes threw 3.2 scoreless innings in relief of Sean Manaea and struck out four without issuing a walk...The outing marked the longest scoreless relief appearance of his career...On September 24 vs. Chicago-NL, Holmes allowed one unearned run over 1.0 hitless inning.

#38 Tylor Megill | RHP | 5-5, 3.95 ERA

2025: He made 14 starts this season before going on the Injured List on June 17...He finished with a 5-5 record, a 3.95 ERA (30 ER/68.1 IP), 33 walks, and 89 strikeouts...He recorded at least five strikeouts in 11 of his 14 starts this season and posted a 11.72 K/9...He allowed three earned runs or fewer in 10 of his 14 starts, and one or zero earned runs in five...He held batters to a .230 average (60-261)...He tossed 5.0+ innings in nine of 14 starts this season.

TYLOR MADE: Dating back to September 9, 2024, Megill has recorded a 3.40 ERA (34 ER/90.1 IP) with 41 walks and 116 strikeouts in 18 starts...He has held opposing batters to a .220 average (75-341) and has posted a 11.60 K/9.0 IP ratio...Also has posted a 0.80 HR/9.0 IP ratio (8 HR/90.0 IP)...In that span, he ranks 10th in the majors in K/9.0 IP (11.60, fourth in NL) and ninth in the NL opponents' SLG (.331) (min. 80.0 IP).

SIX PACK: He posted a 1.74 ERA (6 ER/31.0 IP) through his first six starts this season, which is the 10th-best mark by a Mets pitcher through their first six starts of a season since 2000...Two other of Megill's teammates posted a sub 1.80 ERA through their first six starts this season (also: Nolan McLean 1.19 and Kodai Senga 1.38)...Prior to 2025, the last to accomplish the feat was Jacob deGrom in 2021 (0.68 ERA).

HOMECOMING: In six starts at home this season, he finished with a 3-3 record, a 2.83 ERA (9 ER/28.2 IP), a .241 opponents' batting average (27-112), and a 12.24 K/9.0 IP ratio (39 K/28.2 IP)...Did not allow an earned run in each of his first three starts at home this season (14.2 IP)...His three starts to open the season at home without an earned run were tied with Glendon Rusch (3 GS in 2001), Craig Swan (3 GS in 1978) and later in the season Nolan McLean (3 GS in 2025) for the longest such streak in franchise history...Also, his three consecutive starts without allowing an earned run at home was tied for the second-longest such streak by a Met in a single season, trailing only Jerry Koosman's four starts from 8/19-9/3(G1)/73...He was just the 13th Mets starter to accomplish the feat and the first to do so since Jacob deGrom's three starts from 6/11-21(G1)/21.

PITCH ARSENAL: Megill used his slider 24.1% of the time and posted a 45.5 whiff rate with the pitch, striking out 25 batters...Though he only used his changeup 7.2% of the time this season, Megill has recorded a 36.7 whiff rate with his off-speed pitch...He has batters to a .211 average (4-19) when throwing his changeup...In 2024, Megill used his slider just 11.0% of the time and recorded a 29.1 whiff rate.

CAREER NOTES: Made his third career Opening Day roster (also: 2022 and 2024)...Over parts of four Major League seasons with the Mets, Megill has combined to go 26-26 with a 4.46 ERA (203 ER/409.2 IP), 163 walks and 435 strikeouts over 88 games (81 starts)...Was originally drafted by the Mets in the eighth round of the 2018 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of Arizona.

#46 Griffin Canning | RHP | 7-3, 3.77 ERA

SEASON RECAP: In 16 starts for the Mets, he finished with a 7-3 record, a 3.77 ERA (32 ER/76.1 IP), 70 strikeouts and 35 walks...His season was cut short due to injury, but through his first 16 starts, his 3.77 ERA was his best mark (second best was 4.46 in 2023) and his seven wins were his most through his first 16 starts of a season.

THE NEW KID: In his first season in Queens, Canning posted a 2.36 ERA (11 ER/42.0 IP) through his first eight starts...It is the 13th-best mark for a starter through their first eight starts with the franchise...It was the 12th-best mark at the time, but it was topped later in the season by teammate Nolan McLean's 2.06 ERA...His ERA was the best mark through a pitcher's first eight starts with the Mets since Taijuan Walker posted a 2.05 ERA through his first eight starts with the franchise in 2021.

HIGH FIVE: Picked up a win in five consecutive starts from April 11-May 5...He became the first Met to earn a win in at least five consecutive starts since Zack Wheeler recorded a win in six consecutive starts from July 14-August 15, 2018.

WHAT A STRETCH: Over a six-game stretch from April 17-May 17, he completed at least 5.0 innings and surrendered two or fewer earned runs for the first time in his career...Over that same span he posted a 1.67 ERA (6 ER/32.1 IP), which was his lowest ERA over any six-game stretch of his career.

THIS IS MY LEAGUE: In 10 starts vs. NL opponents this season Canning owned a 6-0 record with a 2.59 ERA (14 ER/48.2 IP) and has held opponents to a .600 OPS...The Mets went 9-1 in games Canning starts against NL opponents...In comparison, in six starts against Interleague opponents he owns a 1-3 record, a 5.86 ERA (18 ER/27.2 IP) and opponents have an .820 OPS.

NO EXTRA BASES: In 16 starts this season Canning produced a plus five rating in Net Bases Prevented (a sum of advances prevented, and outs added assigned to the pitcher) according to Baseball Savant...At the time of his injury (6/15) it was tied for the most this season with teammate David Peterson and Atlanta's Grant Holmes...Since the start of 2020 he is tied for fourth with 21 Net Bases Prevented.

SLIDE TO THE LEFT: In 2025 Canning threw his slider more than he ever had before...He threw his slider 31.5% of the time compared to 24.1% of the time last season and 29.9% during the 2023 season...He picked up 27 of his strikeouts with his slider and he generated a 33.5% whiff rate on the pitch...He generated 74 swing and misses with his slider this season, which was the 10th-most in the majors upon the date of his last appearance (6/15).

SPRING FLING: During Spring Training, he struck out 22 batters over his 14.1 innings of work, highlighted by his nine strikeouts in 4.2 innings vs. Tampa Bay on March 17...His 22 strikeouts ranked ninth in the Grapefruit League and tied for the 17th-most across the majors...Canning finished the spring with an impressive 1.88 ERA (3 ER/14.1 IP) and a K/9. rate of 13.8%.

#23 David Peterson | LHP | 9-6, 4.22 ERA

SEASONS GREETINGS: Over a career-high 30 starts this season, he went 9-6 with a 4.22 ERA (79 ER/168.2 IP), 65 walks and a career-high 150 strikeouts...He allowed three earned runs or less in 22 of his 30 starts this season and one or zero earned runs in 10 starts...He picked up at least eight strikeouts in five of his 30 starts this season...Allowed four or more earned runs in eight of his last 16 starts after not allowing more than three earned runs through his first 14 starts of the season...Among qualified Major League pitchers this season, finished third in HR/9.0 IP ratio (0.59), tied for fourth in opponent GIDP (20) and sixth in groundball percentage (54.7).

GOING THE DISTANCE: Completed at least 7.0+ innings in six of his 30 starts this season...Mets starters completed 7.0 innings 10 times this season, six of those starts came from Peterson...Him and Nolan McLean were the only Mets pitchers to complete 8.0 innings this season...His two 8.0+ innings pitched starts were the most by a Mets southpaw in a single season since Jon Niese (2014)...He completed pitched 5.0 or more in 24 of his 30 starts this season, and 6.0+ innings in 16 of those starts...His 24 such starts were the most on the team and his 16 such starts of 6.0 or more innings were the most on the team...He became one of 13 left-handed starters this season to record at least 16 starts with 6.0+ innings pitched...He joined Sean Manaea (16 in 2024) as the only Mets lefties to record as many 6.0+ IP starts since Steven Matz (16 in 2016 and 2019)...Peterson's 24 starts of 5.0+ innings pitched, his 16 starts of 6.0+ innings pitched, six starts of 7.0+ innings pitched and two 8.0+ innings pitched are all his most in a single season.

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL STAR: On July 10, Peterson was named to his first career All-Star Game after posting a first-half career-best 3.06 ERA and 93 strikeouts (previous: 3.09 ERA in 2024 and 84 K in 2022)...He became the first Mets starting pitcher to be named an All-Star since Kodai Senga in 2023 and is the first left-handed Mets pitcher to be named an All-Star since Johan Santana (2009)...He threw 1.0 scoreless inning in the Midsummer Classic on July 15, becoming the first Met to do so since Jacob deGrom in 2019 and the first left-handed Mets pitcher to do so since Tom Glavine in 2004.

2024 YEAR IN REVIEW: Since making his season debut last year on May 29, 2024, Peterson has allowed three runs or fewer in 38 of his 51 starts, going 19-8 with a 3.67 ERA (118ER/289.2 IP), 106 walks and 249 strikeouts...Of those outings, 27 have been quality starts...The Mets are 29-20 over games in which Peterson has started in that span...Since 2024, has allowed just 10 runs in the first inning, which is the tied for the third fewest in the majors during that span (min. 40 G)...Since May 29, 2024 (min. 40 GS), he is second in HR/9.0 IP (0.59), sixth in winning percentage (.679, third in NL), seventh in ground-ball percentage (52.9, fourth in NL) and 13th in opponents' SLG (.361, fourth in NL).

LEFTY LEADERBOARD: His 614 strikeouts are the seventh-most by a left-hander in franchise history...Tug McGraw is next on the list with 618 K...His 115 career starts are the eighth-most in franchise history by a southpaw...Vs. left-handers this season, he posted a .228/.275/.289 slash line (34-149) and allowed just one home run to 161 lefty batters faced...Among qualified left-handed pitchers facing left-handed batters this season, he finished fifth in groundball percentage (63.7), tied for fifth in strikeouts (48), seventh in opponents' SLG (.289), 10th in OPS (.564) and 13th in opponents' OBP...He reached 500.0 career innings pitched on May 18, becoming one of 18 left-handed pitchers to reach the milestone with the franchise...He also became the 13th Mets southpaw to reach 500 strikeouts on May 6 and was the first to do so since Steven Matz (recorded his 500th strikeout on 9/11/19).

QUALITY CONTROL: Recorded 15 quality starts in 30 total outings this season, including 12 of his last 23 starts...Recorded five straight quality starts from July 3 - August 1, which was tied for the longest such streak in his career (also: 8/14-9/3/24)...Peterson recorded 27 quality starts since his start to last season (5/29/24), with 25 of them coming in his last 46 games (since July 1)...From July 1, 2024 to the end of this season, he was one of 12 pitchers (one of five in the NL) to record at least 25 quality starts and one of five left-handers to do so (also: Tarik Skubal, Framer Valdez, Max Fried and Cristopher Sánchez).

APPLE PICKING: This season, Peterson recorded a net bases prevented of eight (a sum of advances prevented and outs added assigned to the pitcher) according to Baseball Savant, which was tied for the second-best in the majors with six others, trailing Matthew Boyd and Max Fried...Since his Major League debut in 2020, his 33 net bases prevented is the most among qualified Major League pitchers...Max Fried is next on the list at 23...Peterson has recorded 18 career pickoffs (three this season), which is tied with Sid Fernandez for the seventh-most by a Mets pitcher...He trails only Ron Darling (41), Jerry Koosman (36), Dwight Gooden (32), Al Leiter (28), Jon Matlack (24), Mike Scott (20)...According to OPTA.

CAREER NOTES: Has set new career highs in strikeouts, innings pitched and starts this season...Had a career-high 15.0 scoreless inning streak from June 5-17...He threw at least 5.0 innings in 12 straight starts from April 12 - June 17, which was the longest such streak of his career...Over parts of six Major League seasons with the Mets, the southpaw has gone 37-30 with a 4.12 ERA (285 ER/622.2 IP), 262 walks and 614 strikeouts in 131 games (115 starts)...Was drafted by the Mets in the first round (20th overall) of the 2017 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of Oregon.

#34 Kodai Senga | RHP | 7-6, 3.02 ERA

SEASON RECAP: Senga finished the season going 7-6 with a 3.02 ERA (38 ER/60.2 IP), 55 walks and 109 strikeouts in 22 starts...Started the season going 7-3 through June 12, with a 1.47 ERA (12 ER/73.2 IP)...He had thrown at least 5.0 innings in all 13 starts and has allowed three runs or fewer in all of those starts...Following his return from the IL, posted a 5.90 ERA (26 ER/39.0 IP) in nine starts...Allowed three or more earned runs in three consecutive games before being sent to Triple-A.

KODAI THE FRIENDLY GHOST: Senga picked up 71 of his 109 strikeouts on the ghost fork this season...Held batters to a .130 average with his ghost fork this season, which was the second-lowest opponents' batting average among any qualified pitcher throwing a split-finger pitch and the seventh-lowest opponent batting average among any qualified pitcher throwing any pitch...His 41.8% whiff rate was the fourth highest...In his rookie year (2023), Senga's "ghost fork" accounted for 110 of his 202 strikeouts...The pitch had a 59.5% whiff rate and a 28.2% put away rate...Opponents managed just 18 hits in 163 at-bats ending with the forkball, a .110 batting average.

GOOD THINGS COME IN THREES: Has allowed three or fewer runs in 44 of his first 52 career starts...His 44 such starts are tied with Dwight Gooden for the second most in franchise history through a starter's first 52 career games...He had allowed three earned runs or less in 31 consecutive starts from June 23, 2023 to July 11, 2025, which tied with deGrom for the second-longest such streak in franchise history...At the time, it was the longest active such streak in the majors...He trailed only Jacob deGrom's 40 starts (from 9/9/19-9/18/22) and deGrom's 31 starts (from 4/16/18-4/3/19).

SENGA GENESIS: Through Senga's first 52 career starts he has posted 320 strikeouts...His 320 strikeouts through his first 52 Major League games are the fifth-most in Mets history behind Dwight Gooden (433), Matt Harvey (361), Noah Syndergaard (361) and Jacob deGrom (349)...His 320 strikeouts are also the fifth-most among Japanese-born pitchers through their first 52 starts, trailing only Yu Darvish (428), Hideo Nomo (409), Shohei Ohtani (367) and Masahiro Tanaka (326)...His career 3.00 ERA (95 ER/285.0 IP) is the 12th-best in franchise history through a player's first 52 starts with the club.

CRUISING AT CITI: In 29 career games at Citi Field, he has gone 12-5 with a 2.80 ERA (49 ER/157.1 IP), which is the 11th best in the history of the ballpark (min. 90.0 IP)...He has allowed just 15 home runs to 653 batters faced, recording a 0.86 HR/9.0IP ratio at home...His 11.27 K/9.0IP is the third-highest among pitchers at Citi Field behind Edwin Diaz's 15.10 K/9.0IP and Jacob deGrom's 11.52 K/9.0IP (min. 400 BF).

2024 REWIND: He missed nearly the first four months of the 2024 season with a right shoulder capsule strain...Returned and made one regular season start on July 26 vs. Atlanta, throwing 5.1 innings and allowing two runs on two hits with nine strikeouts and one walk before exiting with an injury...Missed the rest of the regular season with a strained left calf...He made it back for the Postseason and he made his first career Postseason start on October 5 in Game 1 of the NLDS against the Phillies...Threw 2.0 innings allowing one run, a home run in the first inning, and recorded one walk and three strikeouts...Finished the Postseason making three appearances and pitching 5.0 innings while striking out four.

REMARKABLE ROOKIE: During his rookie campaign in 2023, Kodai Senga recorded 202 strikeouts and became the 18th rookie pitcher in the Modern Era (Since 1900) to have 200 or more strikeouts in a season...Senga's 202 punch outs were the second-most by a Mets pitcher behind only Dwight Gooden's 276 strikeouts in 1984...He joined Hideo Nomo (236), Yu Darvish (221) and Daisuke Matsusaka (201) as the only Japanese-born rookie hurlers to reach 200 strikeouts...Senga's 12 wins were tied with Ron Darling (1984) for the seventh-most wins in a single season by a Mets rookie and was the first Mets rookie to reach double-digit wins since Dillon Gee (13, 2011)...His 2.98 ERA (55 ER/166.1 IP) was the fifth-lowest in a single season by a Mets rookie behind only Jerry Koosman (2.08, 1968), Jon Matlack (2.32, 1972), Dwight Gooden (2.60, 1984) and Tom Seaver (2.76, 1967)...He finished seventh in NL Cy Young voting.

HEY NOW YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR: In 2023 Senga joined Pete Alonso (2019), Dwight Gooden (1984), Jerry Koosman (1968) and Tom Seaver (1967) as the only Mets rookies selected to an All-Star Game...He was the eighth Japanese-Born rookie ever to be selected to an All-Star Game joining Masahiro Tanaka (2014), Yu Darvish (2012), Kosuke Fukudome (2008), Hideki Okajima (2007), Hideki Matsui (2003), Ichiro Suzuki (2001) and Hideo Nomo (1995).

METS-JAPAN CONNECTION: Senga is the 14th Japanese-born player to appear in at least one game for the Mets, the most by any major league team...Prior to Senga, the last Japanese-born player to appear in a game for the Mets was OF Norichika Aoki in 2017.

#47 Frankie Montas | RHP | 3-2, 6.28 ERA

SEASON RECAP: Began the season on the 15-Day Injured List with a right lat strain and was transferred to the 60-Day Injured List with the same injury on May 1...Was activated on June 24, he went 3-2 in nine appearances (seven starts) with a 6.28 ERA (27 ER/38.2 IP) and 32 strikeouts...His season came to an end when he was placed on the 15-Day Injured List with a right elbow UCL injury (retro. 8/22) and he was transferred to the 60-Day Injured List on August 25.

REHAB RECAP: Between Brooklyn and Syracuse, he made six rehab starts and he threw 356 pitches over 18.2 innings...He struck out 12 batters over those six starts, including three in a game twice...In his final rehab start for Syracuse on June 18 he tossed 5.0 innings allowed seven hits, five runs, and he struck out two...He threw 80 pitches (47 strikes) in his final rehab start.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS: Made his New York Mets debut on June 24 vs. Atlanta and he tossed 5.0 scoreless innings while recording five strikeouts (5.0 IP, 3 H, 3 BB, 5 K)...Over his Major League career, he has pitched for six different teams and over his six debuts with the teams he has posted a 3.57 ERA (9 ER/22.2 IP)...He has allowed one or zero earned runs in four of his six debut games with a franchise...In 2024, he made his Reds debut as their Opening Day starter, and he fired 6.0 scoreless innings with four strikeouts and zero walks.

STRONG AT HOME: Over his first three home starts, went 2-0 with a 3.31 ERA (6 ER/16.1 IP)...In two of those starts, he threw at least 5.0 innings and allowed two or fewer earned runs...Overall, over five appearances (four starts) at home he finished with a 5.64 ERA (14 ER/22.1 IP) opposed to a 7.16 ERA (13 ER/16.1 IP) over four appearances (three starts) on the road.

WHAT A RELIEF: Made two appearances and tossed 5.0 innings as a reliever while posting a 3.60 ERA (2 ER/5.0 IP)...When he entered in relief on August 9 at Milwaukee, it marked his first relief appearance since September 30, 2023 at Kansas City while with New York-AL...He has only made three relief appearances since 2019 after he made 30 relief appearances from 2015-2018...Over 33 career relief appearances, he owns a 2-1 record and a 5.29 ERA (28 ER/47.2 IP).

#59 Sean Manaea | LHP | 2-4, 5.64 ERA

SEASON RECAP: Manaea finished the season going 2-4 with a 5.64 ERA (38 ER/60.2 IP), 12 walks and 75 strikeouts in 15 appearances (12 starts)...Since his season debut on July 13, ranked sixth in the majors with a 6.25 SO/BB rate (min. 50.0 IP)...His 11.13 SO/9 rate is the sixth-best mark in the NL and the eighth-best in the majors since his debut this season (min 50.0 IP).

IN THE CITI: In 26 career appearances including the Postseason (23 starts) at Citi Field he has posted a 3.63 ERA (56 ER/139.0 IP) and has a 10-3 record...Dating back to July 30, 2024 he has made 14 appearances (13 starts) including the Postseason and recorded a 3.56 ERA (32 ER/81.0 IP)...He has allowed three or fewer runs in 11 of those 14 appearances and the Mets are 10-4 in those games.

RIGHTY DOMINATION: In 2025, righties were batting .257 (45-175) against him...Last season he held right-handed hitters to a .190 batting average, compared to his career average to right-handed hitters being at .251...It was the lowest batting average he's held right-handers to in his career (in a season where he appeared in more than five games).

HERE COMES THE HEAT: This season, Manaea threw his four-seam fastball 60.1% of the time, and picked up 43 of his 75 strikeouts with his fastball...His fastball generated a 23.3% whiff rate this season...He threw his fastball at the 18th-highest clip (60.1%) among all pitchers who have thrown their fastball at least 300 times this season.

HOW SWEEP IT IS: Manaea threw his sweeper 33.9% of the time and generated a 35.3% whiff rate on the pitch...He recorded 28 strikeouts with the sweeper and held opposing batters to a .211 batting average (16-87) on at-bats ending with the pitch...His 33.9% sweepers usage was the 18th-highest mark in the majors among pitchers who threw their sweeper at least 200 times.

REHAB STINT: Was originally placed on the 15-Day IL on March 27 (retro. March 24) with a right oblique strain and then was transferred to the 60-Day IL on April 29...This season, he made six rehab appearances (five starts) for Brooklyn, Binghamton, and Syracuse...Over those appearances, he allowed 13 earned runs over 18.2 innings and recorded 23 strikeouts...He made his final rehab start on July 8 with Syracuse, and allowed three runs over 3.2 innings pitched and struck out five...He threw 73 pitches, 48 for strikes.

CAREER: Over the course of 10 Major League Seasons with the Athletics, Padres, Giants, and Mets he has a 79-66 record, a 4.08 ERA (565 ER/1245.0 IP), and 1184 strikeouts in 243 games and 210 starts...His 1184 career strikeouts are the 13th-most among active left-handers...He resigned with the Mets this offseason on a three-year contract in December 2024.

#26 Nolan McLean | RHP | 5-1, 2.06 ERA

DAZZLING DEBUT: Made his Major League debut on August 16 vs. Seattle...Earned his first Major League win after tossing 5.1 scoreless innings and striking out eight...He joined Matt Harvey as the only pitchers in Mets history to earn a win, strike out eight or more batters, and allow zero runs in their Major League Debut...His eight strikeouts are tied for the third-most by a Met in their Major League debut (also: Tom Seaver, Bill Denehy, and Kodai Senga)...The only Mets who have recorded more strikeouts in their Major League debut are Harvey (11) and Collin McHugh (9)...Became the second pitcher in franchise history to throw at least 5.0 scoreless innings, allow two or fewer hits and strike out eight or more batters in their Major League debut (also: McHugh)...He became the fourth starter in the majors this season to record eight or more strikeouts in their Major League debut (also: Mick Abel 9, Logan Henderson 9, and Chase Burns).

ONE OF A KIND: He posted a 2.06 ERA (11 ER/48.0 IP) with a 5-1 record and 57 strikeouts through his first eight career starts...His ERA is the third-best in franchise history through a player's first eight career starts, only trailing Terry Leach's 1.68 ERA and Rick Aguilera's 1.92 ERA...His 57 strikeouts are the third-most in franchise history through a pitcher's first eight career games, only trailing Nolan Ryan's 64 and Dwight Gooden's 59...He became the first pitcher in Major League history to throw at least 5.0 innings, strikeout five or more, and allow two or fewer earned runs in each of his first seven career starts...He is one of four players in Major League history to record 57 or more strikeouts and allow 11 or fewer earned runs through their first eight career games...He joins Nolan Ryan, Stephen Strasburg and Paul Skenes as the only other pitchers to do so.

IN THE CITI: He only allowed one earned run through his first four starts at home and finished with a 0.37 ERA (ER/24.1 IP)...His first three home starts were scoreless and he became the first Met pitcher to not allow a run in their first three career starts at home and the seventh pitcher in Major League history not to allow a run in each of their first three home starts (min. 15.0 IP)...His 19.1 inning scoreless streak at home is the longest to start a career since Robert Suarez didn't allow a run through all 24.0 innings he threw at home during the 2022 season...Per Elias.

SPIN THAT THING: McLean threw his sweeper 25.7% of the time and his curveball 15.8% of the time...His curveball averaged a league-leading 3,248 RPM, which was the most anyone generated on a curveball and any pitch this season...He has generated a 20.3 whiff rate on his sweeper and a 50.0% whiff rate on his curveball...His 50.0% whiff rate on his curveball is the sixth-best among pitchers who have thrown their curveball at least 100 times...25 of his strikeouts this season have come via the curveball/sweeper...In at-bats ending with his curveball opposing batters are hitting .074 (2-27)...In the minors, he threw his sweeper 28.4% of the time and recorded 51 swings and misses with the pitch...Opposing hitters only hit .186 (17-91) in at-bats ending with his sweeper.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: He became the sixth player (fifth pitcher) to make his MLB debut with the Mets this season, joining Hayden Senger, Alex Carrillo, Justin Hagenman, Jonathan Pintaro and Blade Tidwell...He became the 43rd pitcher the Mets have used this season, which topped the previous franchise high of 42 in 2023...The Mets finished the season using a Major League record 46 different pitchers.

MINOR LEAGUE RECAP: The Mets No. 3 prospect and the No .37 prospect in baseball according to MLB Pipeline, appeared in 21 games between Double-A Binghamton and Triple-A Syracuse and posted a 2.45 ERA (31 ER/113.2 IP)...He recorded 127 strikeouts over those 113.2 innings, good for a K/9 of 10.06...His 127 strikeouts were the second-most among Mets Minor Leaguers and the 18th among all minor leaguer players at the time of his callup...He has only surrendered two or more earned runs in one of his last 14 appearances prior to being called up.

TWO-WAY COWBOY: The Willow Spring, North Carolina native, was a two-way player during his time at Oklahoma State and during the beginning of his professional career...During his final collegiate season he pitched in 14 games and posted a 3.30 ERA (11 ER/30.0 IP) while batting .250 (31-124) and having a .911 OPS...Overall he finished he career at Oklahoma State with a career .957 OPS and 36 home runs...Was originally drafted by Baltimore in the third round of the 2022 First-Year Player Draft but decided to return to school and was drafted by the Mets in the third round of the 2023 First-Year Player Draft...He hit in his first two professional seasons and overall he finished as a .185 (27-146) hitter with nine home runs and 24 RBI.

LET ME GET A WHIFF: In the minors he had a 12.5% whiff percentage this year...Of his 1,363 pitches, he has generated whiffs at least 20 times with four different pitches in his arsenal...Sweeper (51 pitches), Curveball (30 pitches), sinker (29 pitches), and 4-seam fastball (28 pitches).

CAREER: Overall, in three Minor League seasons he has posted a 3.10 ERA (78 ER/226.2 IP) and has recorded 245 strikeouts, good for a K/9 of 9.72...In three seasons at Oklahoma State he finished with a 4.55 ERA (29 ER/57.1 IP) and recorded 76 strikeouts good for a K/9 of 11.93.

#21 Jonah Tong | RHP | 2-3, 7.71 ERA

FIRST TIME SO GOOD: Allowed four runs, one earned over 5.0 innings and earned the win in his Major League debut on August 29 against Miami...Joined Jim McAndrew, Tyler Yates, Nino Espinosa and Jon Matlack as the only pitchers in franchise history to throw 5.0 or more innings and issue zero walks in their Major League debut...Tong's six strikeouts were the most among the group...Tong became the fifth-youngest Mets starter to earn the win in their Major League debut and the youngest since Julio Valera who earned the win in his Major League debut on September 1, 1990 at 21 years and 323 days...Joined Dwight Gooden as the only Mets pitchers age 22 or younger to throw at least 5.0 innings and allow one or zero earned runs in the Major League debut.

ROCKSTAR: His eight strikeouts on September 18 were the most by a Met who is 22 years old or younger since Noah Syndergaard struck out nine on August 25, 2015...On the same day, he became the second pitcher in franchise history to have a start of at least 5.0 innings, eight or more strikeouts, no walks, and no earned runs through their first four career starts (also: Dennis Ribant, 8/17/64).

STRIKE 'EM OUT TONIGHT: He became just one of six Mets to throw at least 5.0 innings and strikeout at least six in each of their first two Major League appearances...This season, teammate Nolan McLean has accomplished the feat along with Christian Scott (2024), Kodai Senga (2023), Steven Matz (2015) and Matt Harvey (2012).

GOT THE CALL: Tong was ranked the No. 44 prospect in baseball and the No. 4 prospect in the Mets system when he was called up, according to MLB Pipeline...He became become the seventh player (sixth pitcher) to make his MLB debut with the Mets this season, joining Hayden Senger, Alex Carrillo, Justin Hagenman, Jonathan Pintaro, Blade Tidwell, and Nolan McLean.

YOUNG MAN'S GAME: At 22 years old and 71 days he became the youngest pitcher to start for the Mets since Jenrry Mejia (20 years old and 339 days) on September 15, 2010 and the youngest Mets starting pitcher to make their Major League debut since Jon Niese (21 years old and 311 days) made his debut on September 2, 2008...He is one of 12 pitchers in franchise history to make his Major League debut as a starter at age 22 and 71 days or younger...Was the third-youngest starter at the time of their debut in the Majors this season and will only be older than Chase Petty and Didier Fuentes were.

THE GREAT TONG: In 22 starts between Double-A Binghamton and Triple-A Syracuse, he posted a 1.43 ERA (18 ER/113.2 IP) and recorded a Minor League-leading 179 strikeouts...His 1.43 ERA is the best among qualified full-season minor leaguers...He ranks first in batting average against (.148, 58-392) and third in WHIP (0.92) among qualified full-season minor leaguers...He has given up one or zero earned runs in 12 of his last 13 starts dating back to June 4 and he has a 0.90 ERA (7 ER/69.2 IP) with a 13.82 K/9 over that span.

TONG 'EH': He was born in Markham, ON and he is the 12th player born in Canada to play a game for the Mets...He is the eighth Canadian to pitch for the team in franchise history and the third this season (Jared Young 6/15 and Zach Pop 7/6)...He became the third Canadian to start a game for the Mets and the first since 1962 (also: Ray Daviault, 1962 and Ken MacKenzie, 1962)...He became the 22nd player born in Canada to play in the majors this season...He is the youngest Canadian-born player to make their Major League debut since Josh Naylor debuted at 21 years old and 336 days on May 24, 2019.

SWING AND A LOT OF MISS: Tong was the Minor League strikeout leader at time of his callup and through his two starts in Triple-A generated a 21.9% whiff rate...His whiff rate is tied for the eighth-most among Triple-A pitchers who have thrown at least 100 pitches...23 of his 39 swing and misses were generated by his fastball...He had a K/9 of 14.17 and for his career it sits at 13.70...His arsenal contains a four-seam fastball, a changeup, a slider, a curveball and a cutter.

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: Sproat became the eighth Met (seventh pitcher) to make their debut this season, joining Hayden Senger, Justin Hagenman, Blade Tidwell, Jonathan Pintaro, Alex Carrillo, Nolan McLean and Jonah Tong...The Mets had four different pitchers make their debut this season as a starter (also: Tidwell, McLean and Tong), which is the most in a single season in franchise history and the most by a team this season...The previous most was when the Mets had three players make their debut as a starter in 1967, 1982 and 2006...He became the 45th pitcher to make an appearance for the club, tying a Major League record (also: 2024 Miami Marlins)...With McLean and Tong, it was the first time in franchise history that the Mets had three pitchers debut as a starter in a 21-game span...The last team to do so were the 2023 Cleveland Guardians (Peyton Battenfield, Logan Allen and Tanner Bibee)...Courtesy of Elias.

SECOND START SUCCESS: In his second career Big League start and Citi Field debut, September 13 vs. Texas, Sproat fired 6.0 scoreless innings and did not issue a walk...He became the 12th pitcher in franchise history to record 6.0 or more scoreless innings in one of their first two Major League starts and the first since Steven Matz (7/5/15 at LAD)...He joined Jason Jacome and Tyler Yates as the only pitchers in franchise history to throw 6.0 scoreless innings and not allow a walk in one of their first two Big League starts...Additionally, Sproat became the 14th pitcher in franchise history to record a quality start in each of his first two Major League games.

FINAL TWO: After only allowing three runs in his first two Major League starts, Sproat allowed four runs in each of his final two starts of the season...On September 19 vs. Washington, Sproat allowed four runs over a career-low 4.0 innings, and in his final start of the season, September 26 at Miami, the right-hander allowed four runs across 4.2 innings.

HOME RUN FREE ZONE: Through his first 20.2 innings, Sproat has yet to allow a home run...He became the fourth pitcher in Mets history to not allow a home run and pitch 20.0 or more innings through his first for Major League games...The others are Mike Bruhart (22.2), Ron Darling (26.1) and Dwight Gooden (20.1).
