FALL CLASSIC: The Yankees clinched their 41st American League pennant and are playing in their first World Series since 2009...the Yankees' 41 World Series appearances and 27 World Series championships are the most all-time (nextmost: Dodgers, 22 appearances; Cardinals, 11 championships).

- Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995).

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees fell to the Dodgers in a 6-3 YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees fell to the Dodgers in a 6-3 "walk-off" loss in 10 innings on Friday in World Series Game 1 at Dodger Stadium...RHP Gerrit Cole (6.0IP, 4H, 1R/ER, 0BB, 4K, 0HR) started and allowed only 1R/ER in 6.0IP in a no-decision... DH Giancarlo Stanton (1-for-5, 1R, 1HR, 2RBI) homered in his fourth straight game, hitting a go-ahead two-run home run in the sixth inning...RF Juan Soto (1-for-3, 1R, 2BB) reached base three times...2B Gleyber Torres (2-for-5, 1 double) and 3B Jazz Chisholm Jr. (2-for-5, 1R, 3SB) both recorded multiple hits... Yankees baserunners stole four bases, marking the second time in franchise history the Yankees recorded at least 4SB in a postseason game (also 4SB in 1998 ALCS Game 4 at Cleveland)... LHP Nestor Cortes (0.1IP, 1H, 2R/ER, 1BB, 1HR) surrendered a **LHP Nestor Cortes** (0.1IP, 1H, 2R/ER, 1BB, 1HR) surrendered a "walk-off" grand slam to Freddie Freeman in the 10th inning.

ROAD WARRIORS: Including the postseason, the Yankees are a Major League-best 54-33 (.621) on the road this year...are 21-11 in their last 32 road games (since 7/27).

▶ The Yankees are 4-2 on the road this postseason...matches their most wins on the road in a single postseason in the last 21 years since 2004 (recorded four road wins in 2009)...with a win tonight, would match their third-most road wins in a postseason (went 8-0 on the road in 1996, 6-3 in 2000, 5-1 in 1998 and '99, and 5-3 in 2003).

ALL ABOUT THAT JAZZ: INF/OF Jazz Chisholm Jr. stole three bases in Game 1 of the World Series on Friday, **becoming the first player in Yankees history to record 3SB in a postseason game**...was the first Major League player to accomplish the feat since Cleveland's Rajai Davis stole three bases in 2016 World Series Game 5.

HIGH VOLPAGE: INF Anthony Volpe is the seventh Yankee in franchise history to reach base in each of his first 10 career postseason games, joining Bernie Williams (15G from 1995-96), George Selkirk (14G from 1936-38), Derek Jeter (13G in 1996), Chris Chambliss (11G from 1976-77), Thurman Munson (11G from 1976-77) and Charlie Keller (11G from 1939-42).

• Has reached base in 18-of-42PA this postseason, batting

.273/.429/.303 (9-for-33) with 6R, 1 double, 2RBI, 9BB and 3SB.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).

Boone's 21 postseason wins are the fifth-most by a Yankees Manager in franchise history, trailing only Joe Torre (76), Casey Stengel (37), Joe McCarthy (29) and Joe Girardi (28).

RIVALRY RENEWED: The Yankees are facing the Dodgers in the World Series for the 12th time, with the Yankees winning eight championships (1941, '47, '49, '52, '53, '56, '77 and '78) and losing three times (1955, '63 and '81)...according to OptaSTATS, the Yankees and Dodgers' 12 matchups in the World Series are tied with the Boston Celtics and Los Angeles Lakers for the most common championship round matchup in the four Major sports (MLB/NBA/NFL/NHL).

PEN PAL: RHP Luke Weaver tossed 1.2 scoreless innings of relief on Friday in World Series Game 1...has not allowed a run in seven of his nine postseason appearances, going 1-0 with four saves and a 2.25 ERA (12.0IP, 3ER) and 12K...has held opponents to a .171 BA (7-for-41) this postseason.

STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton hit a go-ahead two-run HR in the sixth inning in Game 1 of the World Series on Friday...has homered in four straight games, the secondlongest streak of his postseason career, trailing only a five-game streak from 2020 ALWCS Game 1 - 2020 ALDS Game 3... is the only player in Major League history to homer in four straight postseason games multiple times...his four-game home run streak is tied for the sixth-longest streak in Major League history, trailing only Daniel Murphy's six-game streak in Major League history, trailing only Daniel Murphy's six-game streak in 2015, Adolis García's five-game streak in 2023, his own five-game streak in 2020, George Springer's five-game streak from 2017-18 and Carlos Beltrán's five-game streak in 2004.

Has 5HR in his last six games and 6HR in his last eight games (since ALDS Game 3).

- Yankee in a single postseason in franchise history...
 Stanton also hit 6HR in 2020, Alex Rodriguez hit 6HR in 2009 and Bernie Williams hit 6HR in 1996...is the only Yankee and one of just three Major League players to hit at least 6HR in a single postseason multiple times, joining Corey Seager (8HR in 2020 and 6HR in 2023) and Nelson Cruz (8HR in 2011 and 6HR in 2010).
- Six of his last eight postseason home runs (since 2022)

- Six of his last eight postseason home runs (since 2022) have either tied the game (one) or given the Yankees the lead (five). Has hit .282/.364/.795 (11-for-39) with 7R, 2 doubles, 6HR, 13RBI, 5BB and 1SB in 10 games this postseason.

 His 17 career postseason home runs are the most by a Major League player in his first 37 career postseason games (previous: Carlos Beltrán & Nelson Cruz-16HR). His 17 career postseason home runs are the fourth-most in franchise history, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR) and Mickey Mantle (18HR). His career 7.94 AB/HR (17HR/135AB) ratio in the postseason is the best in Major League history (min. 100PA). Including the postseason, the Yankees are 27-6 this year when Stanton homers.

- Has recorded 37RBI in 37 career postseason games, including 36RBI in his last 31 postseason games (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).

 His 13RBI this postseason are tied for the sixth-most by a Yankee in a single postseason (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), trailing only Alex Rodriguez's 18RBI in 2009, Scott Brosius' 15RBI in 1998, Bernie Williams' 15RBI in 1996, Cecil Fielder's 14RBI in 1996 and Reggie Jackson's 14RBI in 1978.

 Has recorded five go-ahead RBI this postseason...is one of just three players in Yankees history to record at least five go-ahead RBI in a single postseason (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), joining Bernie Williams (seven in 1996) and Chris Chambliss (five in 1976).

GLEYBER DAY: INF Gleyber Torres has reached base in each of his 10 postseason games, batting .310/.400/.452 (13-for-42) with 9R, 3 doubles, 1HR, 5RBI, 7BB and 1SF.

THE GREAT JUAN: OF Juan Soto reached base three times on Friday in World Series Game 1...has reached base in each of his 10 games this postseason, reaching base multiple times in seven of those games...is batting .333/.457/.639 (12-for-36) with 7R, 2 doubles, 3HR, 8RBI, 9BB and 1SF this postseason.
▶ In his postseason career, has hit .355/.500/.548 (11-for-31)

with 3 doubles, 1HR, 17RBI, 9BB, 1HP and 1SF with RISP.

NOBODY BEATS THE RIZZ: INF Anthony Rizzo has reached base in each of his six games this postseason, batting .389/.476/.444 (7-for-18) with 1R, 1 double and 3BB.

FOR STARTERS: Yankees starters have allowed 2ER-or-fewer in eight of their 10 postseason starts, posting a 3.60 ERA (50.0IP, 20ER).

TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 26, 2000: In Game 5 of the Fall Classic at Shea Stadium, the Yankees break a 2-2 tie with two runs in the top of the ninth inning and hold the Mets scoreless in the bottom half of the frame, giving them their third consecutive World Series title and 26th

Oct. 26, 1999: The Yankees overcome a 5-1 deficit to defeat the Braves, 6-5, in Game 3 of the World Series. Chad Curtis hits two of New York's four home runs, including a "walk-off" solo shot to lead off the bottom of the 10th inning.

Oct. 26, 1996: With a 3-2 win over the Braves in the Bronx, the Yankees secure a 4-games-to-2 World Series victory to mark their first title since 1978.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 27, 1999: The Yankees complete a four-game World Series sweep of the Braves, earning a 4-1 win at Yankee Stadium to Stadium to capture their second consecutive title and 25th overall.

MONDAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 28: This is the only date in October on which the Yankees have yet to record a postseason victory (0-3). On this date, the Yankees lost Game 6 of the 1981 World Series, Game 2 of the 2001 World Series, and Game 1 of the 2009 World Series.

LHP Carlos Rodón will make his sixth career postseason appearance (fifth start) and his fourth with the Yankees in Game 2 of the World Series tonight at Los Angeles-NL...last pitched in Game 5 of the ALCS at Cleveland, allowing 2ER over 4.2IP without recording a decision (5H, 1BB, 6K, 0HR)...allowed 2ER-orfewer in each of his two starts in the ALCS vs. Cleveland (1W, 10.2IP, 8H, 3ER, 1BB, 15K, 1HR)...has recorded 22K over his first three postseason starts with the Yankees, tied with David Cone and Red Ruffing for the second-most strikeouts by a pitcher in their first three postseason starts with the club, trailing only Gerrit Cole (30K)...over his final 13 starts of the regular season from 7/14-9/27, went 7-2 with a 3.00 ERA (72.0IP, 57H, 26R/24ER, 27BB, 90K, 12HR)...made 32 starts with the Yankees, going 16-9 with a 3.96 ERA (175.0IP, 157H, 81R/77ER, 57BB, 195K, 31HR)...his 16 wins and 32 starts were both career highs...his 195K and 175.0IP marked his second-most in a single season in his career, trailing only his 237K and 178.0IP in 2022 with San Francisco... was tied for second in the AL and tied for third in the Majors in wins...also ranked fourth in the AL in K/9.0IP (10.03), tied for fifth in starts, and ranked seventh in strikeouts...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 24 of his 32 starts, including 2R-or-fewer in 20 starts and one-or-zero rune orded at least 6K in 18 were the 10th-most by a Yankees left-handed pitcher in franchise history and the most since CC Sabathia recorded 197K in 2012...recorded at least 6K in 18 of his starts and at least 8K in nine of those starts...allowed 5H-or-fewer in 22 of his starts this season, including 3H-or-fewer in 10 of those starts...since 2021, ranks fourth in the Majors with an 11.14 K/9.0IP ratio, trailing only Blake Snell (11.99), Shohei Ohtani (11.39) and Dylan Cease (11.20)...ranks seventh in double-digit strikeout games (19) over that span, trailing only Gerrit Cole (24), Snell (22), Corbin Burnes (21), Cease (21), Kevin Gausman (21) and Ohtani (20)...has recorded at least 10K and 0BB in seven games, tied for the fifth-most such games in the Majors during that stretch...trails only Jacob deGrom (10), Cole (nine), Burnes (nine) and Gausman (nine)...is a two-time All-Star (2021 and 2022)...was selected by the Chicago White Sox in the first round (third overall) of the 2014 First-Year Player Draft...signed a six-year Major League contract with the Yankees extending through the 2028 season on 12/21/22.

LAST START: Made his third start of the 2024 postseason in Game 5 of the ALCS at Cleveland, allowing 2ER over 4.2IP without recording a decision (5H, 1BB, 6K, 0HR).

ALL THAT'S LEFT: In his career, left-handed batters have hit just .219/.293/.335 (182-for-830) in the regular season...has also surrendered just 19HR (932BF). His 9.99 K/9.0IP ratio since his Major League debut in 2015 ranks fifth among left-handed pitchers in that span, trailing only Chris Sale (11.76), Blake Snell

- (11.23), Robbie Ray (11.19) and Clayton Kershaw (10.05).
- Since 2015, his 1,206K are the seventh-most among active left-handed pitchers...his 26 double-digit strikeout games over that stretch among lefties are the fifth-most in the Majors, trailing only Sale (69), Ray (40), Kershaw (39) and Snell (35).
