**OCTOBER BASEBALL:** The Yankees will face the Boston Red Sox in the AL Wild Card Series starting tonight.

- ▶ Will be the Yankees' sixth appearance in the Wild Card round, playing in four Wild Card Games (2015 loss vs. Houston; 2017 win vs. Minnesota; 2018 win vs. Oakland; 2021 loss at Boston) and a best-of-three Wild Card Series in 2020 (defeated Cleveland in two games on the road).
- ▶ Marks their 60th playoff appearance in franchise history (123 seasons, 48.8%)...their 60 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (39) and 31 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- ▶ Marks the Yankees' eighth postseason appearance in the last nine seasons (since 2017) and 26th trip to the postseason in the last 31 years (since 1995)...their 26 trips to the postseason since 1995 are the most in the Majors in that span, five more than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the next highest AL team (Boston & Cleveland: 15).
- ▶ Are one of only three teams to make the playoffs in at least eight of the last nine years (since 2017), joining the Dodgers (nine: 2017-25) and Astros (eight: 2017-24).
- ▶ The Yankees are 12-3 in their last 15 postseason openers (since 2005), losing only the 2021 AL Wild Card Game at Boston, 2015 AL Wild Card Game vs. Houston and 2007 ALDS Game 1 at Cleveland.
- ▶ Are 8-4 in their first game of a playoff series since 2018 (lost 2018 ALDS Game 1 at Boston, 2021 AL Wild Card Game at Boston, 2022 ALCS Game 1 at Houston and 2025 World Series Game 1 at Los Angeles-NL)...are 18-10 in their last 28 such games (since 2004 ALCS Game 1).

**THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in seven of his first eight seasons as manager** (credit: Elias - min. 2G manager per season), joining Dave Roberts (first 10 seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in seven of his first eight seasons with the Yankees, joining Joe Torre (each of his first 12) and Casey Stengel (nine of his first 10).

**SEEING RED:** The Yankees will face the Red Sox in a postseason series for only the sixth time: 1999 ALCS (won 4-1), 2003 ALCS (won 4-3), 2004 ALCS (lost 4-3), 2018 ALDS (lost 3-1) and 2021 AL Wild Card Game (loss)...the Yankees are 12-12 in 24 postseason games vs. the Red Sox (6-6 at home, 6-6 in Boston).

**WINNING WAYS:** The Yankees posted a 94-68 (.580) record, tied with Toronto for the best record in the American League and third-best record in the Majors, trailing only Milwaukee (97-65, .599) and Philadelphia (96-66, .593)...their 94 wins matched their 2024 total.

- ▶ **The Yankees recorded their 33rd consecutive winning season (since 1993), marking the second-longest streak in the four major sports (MLB/NFL/NBA/NHL),** behind only their 39 straight winning seasons from 1926-64.
- ▶ **Recorded at least 90 wins for the seventh time in their last eight 162-game seasons (2017-19, '21-22, '24-25)... are one of only two teams to record at least seven 90-win seasons over that span,** joining the Los Angeles Dodgers (eight: 2017-19, '21-25)...**have recorded at least 90 wins in 22 of their last 29 full seasons since 1996** (1996-99, 2001-07, '09-12, '17-19, '21-22, '24-25)...**their 22 seasons are the most in the Majors over that span** (next: Atlanta-16).

**BRONX BOMBERS: Yankees batters hit a Major League-leading 274HR this season, 30 more than the next highest team (Los Angeles-NL: 244HR)...their 274HR this season are their second-most in a single season in franchise history and the sixth-most by any team in Major League history.**

- ▶ **Yankees batters** owned a .405 winning percentage in games they were homerless this season, the third-highest winning percentage in the Majors...their .405 winning pct. in those games was 87 points higher than the Major League average (.318)...have won each of their last three games they did not homer, four of their last five such games and five of their last seven.

**FINISHING STRONG:** The Yankees finished the regular season with a season-high eight-game winning streak and their longest since an eight-game streak from 5/29-6/6/24...matched their second-longest winning streak to finish a regular season in franchise history, trailing only their 15-game winning streak to end the 1960 regular season (also won their final eight games in 1979).

- ▶ Went 11-1 in their final 12G (9/16-28), 14-3 in their final 17G (9/11-28), 25-8 in their final 33G (8/24-9/28), 30-11 in their final 41G (8/15-9/28) and a Major League-best 34-14 in their final 48G (8/6-9/28).

**ALL RISE: OF Aaron Judge** reached base safely in 136 of his 152 games this year, batting .331/.457/.688 (179-for-541) with 137R, 30 doubles, 2 triples, 53HR, 114RBI, 124BB/36IBB, 7HP, 7SF and 12SB...**won his first career batting title, becoming only the third player in Major League history to hit at least 50HR and win a batting title in the same season, joining Mickey Mantle (1956) and Jimmie Foxx (1938)... his 53HR were the most by any player who has won a batting title.**

- ▶ Was only the fifth player in the Expansion Era (since 1961) to lead the Majors in BA, OBP and SLG in a single season, joining Miguel Cabrera in 2013, Barry Bonds in 2002, Larry Walker in 1999 and George Brett in 1980.
- ▶ Became the fifth player in franchise history to lead the Majors in batting average, joining DJ LeMahieu (.364 BA in 2020), Mickey Mantle (.353 BA in 1956), Joe DiMaggio (.381 BA in 1939) and Lou Gehrig (.363 BA in 1934)...became the 10th player (11th time) in franchise history to win the AL batting title...joined DJ LeMahieu (2020), Bernie Williams (1998), Paul O'Neill (1994), Don Mattingly (1984), Mickey Mantle (1956), Snuffy Stirnweiss (1945), Joe DiMaggio (1939-40), Lou Gehrig (1934) and Babe Ruth (1924).
- ▶ Hit at least 50HR in a single season for the fourth time in his career (also 52HR in 2017, 62HR in 2022 and 58HR in 2024), tying the Major League record for the most 50HR seasons... is the fourth player — and second Yankee — to record four such seasons, joining Sammy Sosa (4x: 1998-2001), Mark McGwire (4x: 1996-99) and Babe Ruth (4x: 1920-21, '27-28).
- ▶ Hit .374/.533/.798 (37-for-99) with 35R, 3 doubles, 13HR, 21RBI, 33BB/7IBB, 3HP, 2SF and 4SB over his final 30G (8/27-9/28).

**FAN-TASTIC:** The Yankees drew an AL-best 3,392,659 fans this year despite recording just 80 home games...the Yankees' 2025 home attendance was the club's second-highest over their last nine full attendance seasons (since 2015), trailing only their total attendance in 2018 (3,482,855)...averaged 42,408 fans per home game this season, the highest home average attendance in the American League and the third-highest in the Majors, trailing only the San Angeles Dodgers (49,537) and San Diego Padres (42,435).

- ▶ **The Yankees drew at least 3 million fans for their Major League-record 25th straight season when there was full attendance** (1999-2019, '22-25).
- ▶ Their 20 sellouts this season matched their second-most at the current Yankee Stadium, trailing only their 23 sellouts in 2018 (also 20 in 2011).

**STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton** has batted .265/.331/.662 (40-for-151) with 25R, 6 doubles, 18HR, 40RBI and 17BB in 41 career postseason games...has reached base safely in 35-of-41 postseason games...24 of his 40 hits in the postseason are extra-base hits (6 doubles, 18HR).

- ▶ His 18HR in the postseason are tied with Mickey Mantle (18HR) for the third-most in Yankees history, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR) and Derek Jeter (20HR)...his 18 postseason home runs are the most by a Major League player in his first 41 career postseason games...has 5HR in his last eight games, 6HR in his last 10 games, 7HR in his last 12 games and 17HR in his last 33 postseason games (since 2019 ALCS Game 1)...six of his last nine postseason home runs (since 2022) have either tied the game (one) or given the Yankees the lead (five).

**LAND OF THE FRIED: LHP Max Fried** will make his 21st career postseason appearance and 13th career postseason start tonight...will start Game 1 of a postseason series for the sixth time in his career...has posted a 3.76 ERA (26.1IP, 11ER) in those starts...has tossed at least 6.0IP and allowed 2R-or-fewer in three of those starts...his team is 4-1 in those starts.

- ▶ Went 6-0 with a 1.55 ERA (46.1IP, 8ER) and 48K over his final seven starts of the season (8/22-9/24).
- ▶ Has gone 3-1 with a 2.37 ERA (30.1IP, 8ER) and 40K in five career starts against Boston.

**OCTOBER TESTED:** Only eight of the 26 players on the Yankees' AL Wild Card Series roster have yet to appear in a postseason game: **RHP David Bednar, RHP Paul Blackburn, INF/OF José Caballero, RHP Fernando Cruz, C J.C. Escarra, C/INF Ben Rice, RHP Cam Schiltler and RHP Will Warren**...Rice was on the Yankees' 2024 ALDS roster but did not play.

#### TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

**Sept. 30, 2020:** Gio Urshela hits a go-ahead grand slam in the fourth inning of ALWC2 G2 at Cleveland. Along with Giancarlo Stanton's grand slam in ALWC5 G1 the day prior, the Yankees become the first team in AL history to hit a grand slam in back-to-back postseason games and just the third team to do so (also 1977 Dodgers and 2011 Diamondbacks).

## TONIGHT'S ALWCS GAME 1 STARTING PITCHER: LHP MAX FRIED(19-5, 2.86 IN 2025)

**LHP Max Fried** will make his 21st career postseason appearance and 13th career postseason start tonight in AL Wild Card Series Game 1... **will start Game 1 of a postseason series for the sixth time in his career...has posted a 3.76 ERA (26.1IP, 11ER) in those starts with his team going 4-1 in those starts...**the 31-year-old will pitch on extended five days' rest...last pitched on 9/24 vs. Chicago-AL and earned the win (7.0IP, 4H, 1R/ER, 2BB, 7K, 0HR)... **in his first year in pinstripes, went 19-5 with a 2.86 ERA (195.1IP, 62ER) in 32 starts in his first season with the Yankees...set career highs in wins, starts, innings pitched and strikeouts...allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 22 of his 32 starts and 1ER-or-fewer in 15 of those starts...**the Yankees went 22-10 in Fried's starts...led the Majors in wins, ranked second in winning pct. (.792, first in AL) and pickoffs (eight, first in AL), sixth in HR/9.0IP ratio (0.65, second in AL), eighth in ERA (2.86, fourth in AL), ninth in groundball/flyball ratio (1.97, third in AL), groundball percentage (52.7%, third in AL) and opponents' SLG (.334, fourth in AL), and tied for ninth in starts (32, tied for fourth in AL)...over nine Major League seasons with the Atlanta Braves (2017-24) and Yankees (2025), has gone 92-41 with six complete games (four shutouts) and a 3.03 ERA (1,079.2IP, 947H, 405R/364ER, 297BB, 1,052K, 90HR) in 200 regular season games (183 starts)...among Major League pitchers since 2020 (min. 600.0IP), ranks first in ERA (2.82), winning pct. (.709) and pickoffs (26), is tied for first in wins (73) and shutouts (four), second in HR/9.0IP (0.66), third in opponents' SLG (.331), opponents' OPS (.613), and groundball percentage (54.1%), fourth in groundball/flyball ratio (2.20), tied for sixth in complete games (five) and ninth in WHIP (1.09)...his 90 wins since 2019 are the most in the Majors...the three-time All-Star (2022, '24 and '25) and three-time Gold Glove Award winner (2020-22) has finished in the top-five of Cy Young Award voting twice in his career (second in 2022 and fifth in 2020)...the Santa Monica, Calif., native was originally selected by San Diego in the first round (seventh overall) of the 2012 First-Year Player Draft...was acquired by Atlanta along with INF Jace Peterson, INF Dustin Peterson and OF Mallex Smith in exchange for OF Justin Upton and RHP Aaron Northcraft on 12/19/14...was signed by the Yankees to an eight-year contract extending through the 2032 season on 12/17/24.

**2025:** In his first year in pinstripes, went 19-5 with a 2.86 ERA (195.1IP, 62ER) in 32 starts in his first season with the Yankees...**set career highs in wins, starts, innings pitched and strikeouts...**was named to his third career All-Star team...opponents batted .223/.281/.334 (164-for-737, 14HR); LH .209/.282/.393 (34-for-163, 8HR); RH .226/.281/.317 (130-for-574, 6HR).

- ✦ Led the Majors in wins, ranked second in winning pct. (.792, first in AL) and pickoffs (eight, first in AL), sixth in HR/9.0IP ratio (0.65, second in AL), eighth in ERA (2.86, fourth in AL), ninth in groundball/flyball ratio (1.97, third in AL), groundball percentage (52.7%, third in AL) and opponents' SLG (.334, fourth in AL), and tied for ninth in starts (32, tied for fourth in AL)...also ranked sixth in the AL in opponents' OPS (.615), and ninth in opponents' OBP (.281) and WHIP (1.10).
- ✦ **His career-high 19 wins matched the most by a Yankee in a single season in the last 15 years since 2011 (also CC Sabathia in 2011 and Luis Severino in 2018)...his 19 wins were tied with CC Sabathia (19-8 in 2009) and Ed Figueroa (19-10 in 1976) for the third-most by a Yankees pitcher in his first season with the club in the Expansion Era (since 1961),** trailing only Catfish Hunter (23-14 in 1975) and Tommy John (21-9 in 1979).
- ✦ **Allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 22 of his 32 starts and 1ER-or-fewer in 15 of those starts...**his 22 starts of 2ER-or-fewer were tied for the fourth-most in the AL and tied for the seventh-most in the Majors...his 15 starts of 1ER-or-fewer were tied for the sixth-most in the AL...was the first pitcher in franchise history (excluding openers) to allow 2ER-or-fewer in each of his first 11 starts of a season (since ER became an official stat in 1913)...Chad Green did so in his first 11 starts as an opener in 2019.
- ✦ **The Yankees went 22-10 in Fried's starts...his 22 team wins were the second-most in the AL and tied with San Francisco's Robbie Ray (22-10) for the third-most in the Majors,** trailing only Boston's Garrett Crochet (23-9) and Philadelphia's Christopher Sánchez (23-9).
- ✦ **His 2.86 ERA was the fourth-lowest by a Yankee in the last 44 years (since 1982),** trailing only Gerrit Cole's 2.63 ERA in 2023 and 2.84 ERA in 2020, and David Cone's 2.82 ERA in 1997.
- ✦ Tossed at least 6.0 innings in 21 of his 32 starts, tied for the sixth-most in the AL and tied for the eighth-most in the Majors.
- ✦ Tossed at least 7.0 innings in 13 of his starts, tied with Detroit's Tarik Subal (13) and Philadelphia's Christopher Sánchez (13) for the second-most in the Majors, trailing only Boston's Garrett Crochet (14)...were the most by a Yankee since 2017 when Luis Severino recorded 14GS and Masahiro Tanaka recorded 13GS.
- ✦ Allowed 2BB-or-fewer in 27 of his 32 starts and 3BB-or-fewer in each of his 32 starts.
- ✦ Made 16 starts after a Yankees loss and went 11-1 with a 1.82 ERA (103.2IP, 21ER) in those starts...tossed at least 6.0IP in 14 of those starts and did not allow an ER in seven of them...the Yankees went 12-4 when Fried started after a loss.
- ✦ Left only five of his 32 starts trailing this year.
- ✦ His eight pickoffs this year were the most by a Yankee in a single season in the last 17 years (since 2009) and the most since Andy Pettitte recorded 10 in 2008.
- ✦ Allowed only 14HR to 801BF, posting a 0.65 HR/9.0IP ratio.

**ON A ROLL: Went 6-0 with a 1.55 ERA (46.1IP, 8ER) over his final seven starts (8/22-9/24)...allowed 2R-or-fewer in six of his final seven starts and 1R-or-fewer in five of those starts...**won each of his final six starts of the year, marking the second time this season he won a career-high-tying six straight starts (also 4/4-5/2).

- ✦ Was named the AL "Pitcher of the Month" for September after going 5-0 with a 1.89 ERA (33.1IP, 26H, 7R/ER, 9BB, 35K, 1HR) in five starts...among Major League pitchers in September, ranked first in wins, was tied for first in innings pitched (first in AL), and sixth in ERA (1.89, third in AL) and opponents' SLG (.279, sixth in AL)...marked his third career "Pitcher of the Month Award" and second this season (also September/October in 2021 with Atlanta and March/April in 2025 with the Yankees)...**became the first Yankee to win the award multiple times in a single season...**with Aaron Judge also being named the "AL Player of the Month" in both March/April and September, it marked the first time a set of teammates each won the award in the same month twice in a single season since the award was established in the NL in 1958 and in the AL in 1974.

**HOME SWEET HOME:** Went 8-2 with a 2.37 ERA (91.0IP, 24ER) in 15 home starts...allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 11 of those 15 starts and tossed at least 6.0IP in 12 of those starts...the Yankees went 11-4 in his 15 home starts this season.

**VS.
