TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 2, 1978: After falling as many as 14 games behind Boston in the AL East standings, the Yankees defeat the Red Sox, 5-4 in Fenway Park, in only the second one-game playoff game in AL history. Trailing 2-0 in the seventh, the Yankees' offense is sparked when Bucky Dent hits a two-out homer to give New York a 3-2 lead.



OCTOBER BASEBALL: The Yankees will play Game 3 of the AL Wild Card Series against the Boston Red Sox tonight.

- Marks the Yankees' sixth appearance in the Wild Card round, also playing in four Wild Card Games (2015 loss vs. Houston; 2017 win vs. Minnesota; 2018 win vs. Oakland; 2021 loss at Boston) and a best-of-three Wild Card Series in 2020 (defeated Cleveland in two games on the road).
- Marks their 60th playoff appearance in franchise history (123 seasons, 48.8%)...their 60 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (39) and 31 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- Marks the Yankees' eighth postseason appearance in the last nine seasons (since 2017) and 26th trip to the postseason in the last 31 years (since 1995)...their 26 trips to the postseason since 1995 are the most in the Majors in that span, five more than the next highest team (Atlanta-21) and 11 more than the next highest AL team (Boston & Cleveland: 15).
- Are one of only three teams to make the playoffs in at least eight of the last nine years (since 2017), joining the Dodgers (nine: 2017-25) and Astros (eight: 2017-24).

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees defeated the Red Sox, 4-3, in AL Wild Card Series Game 2 on Wednesday at Yankee Stadium...**LHP Carlos Rodón** (6.0IP, 4H, 3R/ER, 3BB, 6K, 1HR, 1HP, 1WP) started and did not record a decision...**C Austin Wells** (2-for-3, 1RBI, 1BB) reached base three times and hit a game-winning RBI single in the eighth inning...**1B Ben Rice** (2-for-4, 1R, 1HR, 2RBI) hit a go-ahead two-run home run in the first inning in his first career postseason plate appearance in the first inning...**RF Aaron Judge** (2-for-4, 1RBI) hit a go-ahead RBI single in the fifth inning...**RHP Fernando Cruz** (1.0IP, 1H) tossed a scoreless seventh inning and stranded two inherited runners...**RHP Devin Williams** (1.0IP, 1H, 1K) tossed a scoreless eighth inning to earn his first career postseason win...**RHP David Bednar** (1.0IP, 2K) tossed a perfect ninth inning to earn his first career postseason save.

ALL ON THE LINE: The Yankees will play their 32nd "winner-take-all" game in club history tonight...are 16-15 in those games...have won four of their last seven "winner-take-all" games since 2017 and have won five of their last nine since 2012...**are 9-6 in "winner-take-all" games at home, including 8-3 in their last 11 such games at home (since 1976).**

- Tonight marks the Yankees' second potential elimination game of the 2025 postseason...the Yankees have won four of their last six potential elimination games (since 2022) and are 11-7 in those games since 2017.
- **Are 9-3 in their last 12 potential elimination games at home since 2017 and 13-6 in their last 19 such games at home since 2005.**
- *With a win tonight*, would advance to their 25th ALDS.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: **Manager Aaron Boone is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in seven of his first eight seasons as manager** (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G manager per season), joining Dave Roberts (first 10 seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in seven of his first eight seasons with the Yankees, joining Joe Torre (each of his first 12) and Casey Stengel (nine of his first 10).

RICE RICE BABY: **C/INF Ben Rice hit a go-ahead two-run home run in the first inning in his first career postseason plate appearance in the first inning of ALWCS Game 2...became the seventh Yankee in franchise history to homer in his first career postseason plate appearance**, joining Shane Spencer (1998 ALDS Game 2), Rick Cerone (1980 ALCS Game 1), Jim Mason (1976 World Series Game 3), Roger Maris (1960 World Series Game 1), Elston Howard (1955 World Series Game 1) and George Selkirk (1936 World Series Game 1).

- Was only the sixth Major League player since 2000 to homer on their first postseason pitch seen, joining Lane Thomas (2024 ALDS Game 1), Juan Ypez (2022 NLWCS Game 1), Evan Longoria (2008 ALDS Game 1), Raul Chavez (2004 NLDS Game 2) and Jason Lane (2004 NLDS Game 1).
- Over his last 16G since 9/11 (including the postseason), has hit .400/.441/.782 (22-for-55) with 11R, 7 doubles, 1 triple, 4HR, 13RBI and 4BB...has recorded multiple hits in seven of those games.

FIRST THINGS FIRST: Including the postseason, **Yankees batters** have scored in the first inning in 66 games this year, going 47-19 (.712) in those games...their 65 such games during the regular season were the most in the Majors.

- The Yankees homered in the first inning on Wednesday...hit a Major League-record 50HR in the first inning during the regular season (previous: Atlanta Braves' 47HR in 2023).

ALL IS WELLS: **C Austin Wells** reached base three times and hit a game-winning RBI single in the eighth inning in ALWCS Game 2...including the postseason, has batted .364/.417/.455 (12-for-33) with 3R, 3 doubles, 6RBI and 3BB over his last 12 games (since 9/16).

HIGH VOLTAGE: **INF Anthony Volpe** has reached base safely in 15 of his 16 career postseason games, batting .304/.409/.464 (17-for-56) with 11R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 7RBI, 10BB and 5SB.

CRUZ CONTROL: **RHP Fernando Cruz** tossed a scoreless seventh inning and stranded two inherited runners in ALWCS Game 2...**including the postseason, has allowed only two of his 30 inherited runners to score this year**...his 7.4 inherited runners scored pct. during the regular season was the second-best in the Majors (min. 25IR), trailing only Los Angeles-NL's Ben Casparius (3.4%).

WINNING WAYS: The Yankees posted a 94-68 (.580) record, tied with Toronto for the best record in the American League and third-best record in the Majors, trailing only Milwaukee (97-65, .599) and Philadelphia (96-66, .593)...their 94 wins matched their 2024 total.

- **The Yankees recorded their 33rd consecutive winning season (since 1993), marking the second-longest streak in the four major sports (MLB/NFL/NBA/NHL),** behind only their 39 straight winning seasons from 1926-64.
- **Recorded at least 90 wins for the seventh time in their last eight 162-game seasons (2017-19, '21-22, '24-25)...are one of only two teams to record at least seven 90-win seasons over that span**, joining the Los Angeles Dodgers (eight: 2017-19, '21-25)...**have recorded at least 90 wins in 22 of their last 29 full seasons since 1996** (1996-99, 2001-07, '09-12, '17-19, '21-22, '24-25)...**their 22 seasons are the most in the Majors over that span** (next: Atlanta-16).

FAN-TASTIC: The Yankees drew an AL-best 3,392,659 fans this year despite recording just 80 home games...the Yankees' 2025 home attendance was the club's second-highest over their last nine full attendance seasons (since 2015), trailing only their total attendance in 2018 (3,482,855)...averaged 42,408 fans per home gate this season, the highest home average attendance in the American League and the third-highest in the Majors, trailing only the Los Angeles Dodgers (49,537) and San Diego Padres (42,435).

- **The Yankees drew at least 3 million fans for their Major League-record 25th straight season when there was full attendance** (1999-2019, '22-25).
- Their 20 sellouts this season matched their second-most at the current Yankee Stadium, trailing only their 23 sellouts in 2018 (also 20 in 2011).

BRONX BOMBERS: **Yankees batters** hit a Major League-leading 274HR this season, 30 more than the next highest team (Los Angeles-NL: 244HR)...their 274HR this season are their second-most in a single season in franchise history and the sixth-most by any team in Major League history.

- **Owned a .405 winning percentage in games they were homerless this season, the third-highest winning percentage in the Majors...their .405 winning pct. in those games was 87 points higher than the Major League average (.318)...** have won each of their last three games they did not homer, four of their last five such games and five of their last seven.

SCHLITT'S CREEK: **RHP Cam Schlittler** will start tonight's ALWCS Game 3 after making only 14 career regular season starts...according to *Elias*, his 14 regular season starts are the fifth-fewest by a Yankees pitcher prior to their first postseason start, trailing only Deivi Garcia (6GS prior to start in 2020 ALDS Game 2), Mel Stottlemire Sr. (12GS prior to start in 1964 World Series Game 2), Whitey Ford (12GS prior to start in 1950 World Series Game 4) and Wilcy Moore (12GS prior to start in 1927 World Series Game 4 - also pitched in relief in 1927 World Series Game 1).

- Will become just the fourth rookie pitcher in franchise history to start a "winner-take-all" playoff game, joining Iván Nova (2011 ALDS Game 5), Mel Stottlemire Sr. (1964 World Series Game 7) and Spec Shea (1947 World Series Game 7) - credit (*Elias*).

ALL RISE: **OF Aaron Judge** recorded two hits in ALWCS Game 2, including a go-ahead RBI single in the fifth inning...including the postseason, has hit .343/.513/.639 (37-for-108) with 8 doubles, 8HR, 58RBI, 43BB/28IBB, 2HP and 7SF with RISP this year.

- Including the postseason, has hit .383/.531/.776 (41-for-107) with 35R, 3 doubles, 13HR, 22RBI, 33BB/7IBB, 3HP, 2SF and 4SB over his last 32 games (since 8/27).
- Has gone 4-for-8 with 1RBI this postseason.
- Has reached base in 15 of his last 16 postseason games since 2024.

SEEING RED: The Yankees are facing the Red Sox in a postseason series for only the sixth time: 1999 ALCS (won 4-1), 2003 ALCS (won 4-3), 2004 ALCS (lost 4-3), 2018 ALDS (lost 3-1) and 2021 AL Wild Card Game (loss)...the Yankees are 13-13 in 26 postseason games vs. the Red Sox (7-7 at home, 6-6 in Boston).

TONIGHT'S AL WILD CARD SERIES GAME 3 STARTING PITCHER: RHP CAM SCHLITTLER (4-3, 2.96 ERA IN 2025)

RHP Cam Schlittler will make his postseason debut in Game 3 of the AL Wild Card Series tonight vs. Boston...the 24-year-old will pitch on regular four days' rest...**will become just the fourth rookie pitcher in franchise history to start a "winner-take-all" playoff game**, joining Iván Nova (2011 ALDS Game 5), Mel Stottlemyre Sr. (1964 World Series Game 7) and Spec Shea (1947 World Series Game 7) - credit (*Elias*)...last started on Saturday vs. Baltimore, earning the win after tossing 7.0 scoreless innings (2H, 1BB, 9K, 2HP)...**went 4-3 with a 2.96 ERA (73.0IP, 58H, 24R/ER, 31BB, 84K, 8HR) in 14 starts**...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 12 of his 14 starts, 2R-or-fewer in 10 of his starts and 1R-or-fewer in seven starts...from when he made his Major League debut on 7/9 to the end of the season, ranked among AL pitchers (min. 60.0IP) in opponents' SLG (.337, fourth), strikeout rate (27.6%, sixth) and K/9.0IP (10.36, seventh)...**his 24R allowed were tied with Bill Stafford (24R in first 14GS from 1960-61) for the second-fewest by a Yankees pitcher through their first 14 career starts**, trailing only Dave Righetti (22R in first 14GS from 1979-81)...**his 84K through his first 14 career games are tied with Dave Righetti (84K in first 14G) for the fourth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Masahiro Tanaka (113K in first 14G), Orlando Hernández (97K in first 14G) and Luis Gil (88K in first 14G)...began the 2025 season in the minors, combining to go 6-6 with a 2.82 ERA (76.2IP, 67H, 30R/24ER, 26BB, 99K, 4HR) in 15 combined games (14 starts) with Double-A Somerset and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre...at the time of his Major League debut, was tied for ninth among minor league pitchers in strikeouts...among qualified Yankees farmhands, was tied for second in strikeouts and starts, ranked fourth in innings pitched, tied for fourth in wins and seventh in ERA...was selected by the Yankees in the seventh round of the 2022 First-Year Player Draft out of Northeastern University (Mass.)...is a native of Weymouth, Mass.

ALL ON THE LINE: Will become just the fourth rookie pitcher in franchise history to start a "winner-take-all" playoff game, joining Iván Nova (2011 ALDS Game 5), Mel Stottlemyre Sr. (1964 World Series Game 7) and Spec Shea (1947 World Series Game 7) - credit (*Elias*).

YOUTH MOVEMENT: At 24 years, 239 days, will be the fifth pitcher (12th time) in the last 29 years (since 1997) to start a postseason game for the Yankees at age 24-or-younger, joining Deivi García (1GS at 21-years-old in 2020 ALDS Game 2), Luis Severino (6GS: four at 23-years-old in 2017 and two at 24-years-old in 2018), Iván Nova (1GS at 24-years-old in 2011 ALDS Game 5) and Phil Hughes (3GS at 24-years-old in 2010).

HOW MANY???: Will start tonight's game having made just 14 regular season starts in his career...**according to *Elias*, his 14 regular season starts are the fifth-fewest by a Yankees pitcher prior to their first postseason start**, trailing only Deivi García (6GS prior to start in 2020 ALDS Game 2), Mel Stottlemyre Sr. (12GS prior to start in 1964 World Series Game 2), Whitey Ford (12GS prior to start in 1950 World Series Game 4) and Wilcy Moore (12GS prior to start in 1927 World Series Game 4 - also pitched in relief in 1927 World Series Game 1).

2025: Went 4-3 with a 2.96 ERA (73.0IP, 58H, 24R/ER, 31BB, 84K, 8HR) in 14 starts...allowed 3R-or-fewer in 12 of his 14 starts, 2R-or-fewer in 10 of his starts and 1R-or-fewer in seven starts...from when he made his Major League debut on 7/9 to the end of the season, ranked among AL pitchers (min. 60.0IP) in opponents' SLG (.337, fourth), strikeout rate (27.6%, sixth) and K/9.0IP (10.36, seventh).

- ✦ **His 24R allowed were tied with Bill Stafford (24R in first 14GS from 1960-61) for the second-fewest by a Yankees pitcher through their first 14 career starts**, trailing only Dave Righetti (22R in first 14GS from 1979-81).
- ✦ **His 84K through his first 14 career games are tied with Dave Righetti (84K in first 14G) for the fourth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Masahiro Tanaka (113K in first 14G), Orlando Hernández (97K in first 14G) and Luis Gil (88K in first 14G).
- ✦ Allowed 3R-or-fewer in each of his first nine career starts from 7/9-8/30, tying Dave Righetti (9GS from 9/16/79-8/16/81) and Herb Thormahlen (9GS from 9/29/1917(G2)-6/8/1918) for the second-longest streak to begin their career in franchise history, trailing only Joba Chamberlain (11GS from 6/3-7/30/08).
- ✦ The Yankees went 9-5 in his 14 starts, including 7-1 over his final eight starts from 8/20-9/27.
- ✦ **Went 3-2 with a 2.47 ERA (58.1IP, 16ER) and 69K over his final 11 starts (8/2-9/27)**...allowed 2R-or-fewer in nine of those 11 starts...allowed 4H-or-fewer in eight of those 11 starts, holding opponents to a .192/.284/.298 (40-for-208) slash line over that stretch.
- ✦ Made his Major League debut on 7/9 vs. Seattle, earning his first career win after allowing 3R/ER over 5.1IP (4H, 2BB, 7K, 2HR)...**became the 10th pitcher in franchise history to record at least 7K in his Major League debut**, joining Jordan Montgomery (7K on 4/12/17 vs. Tampa Bay), Luis Severino (7K on 8/5/15 vs. Boston), Masahiro Tanaka (8K on 4/4/14 at Toronto), Orlando Hernández (7K on 6/3/98 vs. Tampa Bay), Hideki Irabu (9K on 7/10/97 vs. Detroit), Al Leiter (8K on 9/15/87 vs. Milwaukee), Rich Beck (8K on 9/14/65 at Washington-AL), Vic Raschi (8K on 9/23/46 vs. Philadelphia-AL) and Bill Hogg (7K on 4/25/1905 vs. Washington-AL).
- ✦ **Went 1-1 with a 1.60 ERA (33.2IP, 6ER) and 39K in six starts in August**...allowed 2R-or-fewer in all six starts...recorded at least 6K in five of his six starts...**his 1.60 ERA was the third-lowest by a Yankees rookie (min. 25.0IP) in a single calendar month over the last 52 years (since 1974)**, trailing only Luis Gil (0.70 ERA in May 2024) and José Contreras (1.51 ERA in September 2003)...during the month of August, ranked sixth among Major League pitchers in ERA (third in AL), tied for seventh in strikeouts (tied for third in AL), eighth in opponents' BA (.186, fourth in AL), ninth in opponents' SLG (.288, fourth in AL), and 10th in strikeout rate (29.8%, seventh in AL) and opponents' OPS (.555, fourth in AL).
- ✦ **Posted a career-high 17.2 scoreless inning streak from 8/13-8/30...was the third-longest scoreless streak by a Yankees rookie in the last 57 years (since 1969)**, trailing only Ron Marinaccio's 19.0 inning streak from 5/22-7/28/22 and Luis Gil's 18.2 inning streak from 8/3-9/8/21.
- ✦ Recorded his first career scoreless start on 8/20 at Tampa Bay (6.2IP, 1H, 0R, 2BB, 8K)...retired his first 18BF before allowing a single to Chandler Simpson in the seventh inning...became the first Yankees rookie to retire his first 18BF in a game since Fritz Peterson retired his first 21BF on 7/4/66 vs. Chicago-AL.
- ✦ Made his final regular season start and earned his fourth win of the year on 9/27 vs. Baltimore after tossing 7.0 scoreless innings (2H, 1BB, 9K, 2HP)...**his 7.0IP and 9K were career highs**...marked his third scoreless start of the year...was the first Yankees rookie to toss at least 7.0 scoreless innings in a game since Shane Greene on 8/7/14 vs. Detroit (0R in 8.0IP).
- ✦ Began the 2025 season in the minors, combining to go 6-6 with a 2.82 ERA (76.2IP, 67H, 30R/24ER, 26BB, 99K, 4HR) in 15 combined games (14 starts) with Double-A Somerset and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre...at the time of his Major League debut, was tied for ninth among minor league pitchers in strikeouts...among qualified Yankees farmhands, was tied for second in strikeouts and starts, ranked fourth in innings pitched, tied for fourth in wins and seventh in ERA
