OCTOBER BASEBALL: The Yankees will play Game 4 of the ALCS tonight at Cleveland.

- ▶ **Marks their 19th appearance in the ALCS, marking the most LCS appearances by any Major League team...marks their fourth trip to the ALCS in the last eight seasons** (since 2017; went to ALCS in '17, '19 and '22)...their 19 trips to the ALCS are seven more than the next AL team (Boston-12).
- ▶ **Have advanced to the World Series in four of five ALCS when winning their first two games of the series...are 15-3 in a best-of-seven series in which they won Game 1 and Game 2.**
- ▶ **Marks their 59th playoff appearance in franchise history** (122 seasons, 48.4%)...their 59 postseason appearances are the most by any franchise in Major League history, 21 more than the Dodgers who have the second-most postseason appearances (38) and 30 more than the second-highest American League team (Athletics - 29).
- ▶ Marks the Yankees' seventh postseason appearance in the last eight seasons (since 2017) and their 25th trip to the postseason in the last 30 years (since 1995).

YESTERDAY'S NEWS: The Yankees fell to the Guardians in a 7-5 "walk-off" loss in extra innings on Thursday in ALCS Game 3 at Progressive Field...**RHP Clarke Schmidt** (4.2IP, 5H, 2R/ER, 2BB, 2K, 1HR) started and did not record a decision...**C Jose Trevino** (1-for-2, 1RBI) made his first start this postseason and drove in the Yankees' first run with a go-ahead RBI single in the second inning...**CF Aaron Judge** (1-for-5, 1R, 1HR, 2RBI) hit a game-tying two-run HR in the eighth inning...**DH Giancarlo Stanton** (1-for-3, 1R, 1HR, 1RBI, 2BB) reached base three times and hit a go-ahead solo HR in the eighth inning...**SS Anthony Volpe** (1-for-3, 2R, 1 double, 2BB) reached base three times...**2B Gleyber Torres** (0-for-3, 1RBI, 1BB, 1SF) hit a sac fly in the ninth inning...**RHP Luke Weaver** (1.1IP, 2H, 2R/ER, 2K, 1HR) allowed a game-tying two-run HR to Jhonkensy Noel in the ninth inning...**RHP Clay Holmes** (0.2IP, 2H, 2R/ER, 1HR) recorded the loss after allowing a "walk-off" two-run HR to David Fry in the 10th inning.

HIGH VOLTAGE: INF **Anthony Volpe** reached base three times on Thursday in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland...has reached base in 14-of-29PA this postseason, batting .286/.483/.333 (6-for-21) with 5R, 1 double, 1RBI, 8BB and 1SB.
▶ Is just the second Yankee in the last 21 years (since 2004) to reach base in each of his first seven career postseason games, joining Luke Voit (first nine from 2018-2020).

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager **Aaron Boone** is the second manager in Major League history to reach the postseason in six of his first seven seasons as manager (credit: *Elias* - min. 2G), joining Dave Roberts (first nine seasons with the Dodgers)...is the third manager to make the playoffs in six of his first seven seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (also first six of first seven) and Joe Torre (each of first 12).
▶ His next win will mark his 20th postseason win as Yankees Manager...would become just the fifth manager in Yankees history to record at least 20 postseason wins...would join Joe Torre (76), Casey Stengel (37), Joe McCarthy (29) and Joe Girardi (28).

EN GARD!: The Yankees are facing Cleveland in the postseason for the seventh time in franchise history and for the second time in the ALCS (also 1998)...the Yankees have won four of their six completed postseason series against the Guardians, including each of the last three and four of their last five: 2022 ALDS (3-2), 2020 ALWCS (2-0), 2017 ALDS (3-2), 2007 ALDS (1-3), 1998 ALCS (4-2) and 1997 ALDS (2-3)...the Yankees are 17-13 in 30 postseason games vs. Cleveland.
▶ Including the postseason, the Yankees are 6-3 vs. Cleveland this season and 24-11 vs. the Guardians since 2020.

▶ **Including the postseason, have won each of their last seven completed series vs. the Guardians (since 2022) and nine of their last 10 completed series (since 2020).**
▶ **Including the postseason, are 29-9 vs. the AL Central this season and 97-43 since 2021.**

THE GREAT JUAN: OF **Juan Soto** has reached base in each of his seven games this postseason, batting .292/.419/.458 (7-for-24) with 3R, 1 double, 1HR, 3RBI, 6BB and 1SF.
▶ Including the postseason, has hit 4HR in nine games vs. the Guardians this year and has hit 5HR in his last 11 games vs. Cleveland (since 6/14/23).

GLEYSER DAY: INF **Gleyber Torres** has reached base in 14-of-35PA this postseason (7H, 7BB), posting a .400 OBP in seven games.

NEW YORK GIANTS: OF **Aaron Judge** and DH/OF **Giancarlo Stanton** hit back-to-back home runs in the eighth inning on Thursday in ALCS Game 3...marked the 15th time this season (regular and postseason) the duo has homered in the same game and the first time this year the Yankees lost one of those games (are now 14-1)...including the postseason, their 15 games of homering in the same game are tied for the second-most games by any pair of teammates in Major League history, trailing only Texas' Alex Rodriguez and Rafael Palmeiro's 16 such games in 2002 (also St. Louis' Jim Edmonds and Albert Pujols homered in the same game 15 times in 2004 and San Francisco's Rich Aurilia and Barry Bonds homered in the same game 15 times in 2001).

- ▶ Including the postseason, Giancarlo Stanton and Aaron Judge have homered in the same game 50 times, the third-most games by a pair of Yankees teammates in franchise history, trailing only Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth (75), and Yogi Berra and Mickey Mantle (56) - credit *Elias*...the Yankees are 45-5 in those games.
- ▶ Were the first set of Yankees teammates to hit back-to-back home runs in a postseason game since Nick Swisher and Robinson Canó in the third inning of 2010 ALCS Game 5 vs. Texas.

ALL RISE: OF **Aaron Judge** hit a game-tying two-run HR in the eighth inning on Thursday in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland...**marked his 15th career postseason home run, tying Babe Ruth for the fourth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR) and Mickey Mantle (18HR)...**eight of his 15 career postseason home runs have either tied the game (two) or given the Yankees the lead (six).**

- ▶ Has driven in five of the Yankees' last 11R over the last two games.
- ▶ **Including the postseason, has hit 7HR in his last seven games vs. Cleveland** (since 4/14).

STANTON ISLAND: DH/OF **Giancarlo Stanton** hit his 14th career postseason HR with a go-ahead solo HR in the eighth inning on Thursday in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland...**has 3HR in his last five games (since ALDS Game 3)...four of his last five postseason home runs (since 2022) have given the Yankees the lead.**

- ▶ **Has recorded four go-ahead RBI this postseason, becoming just the fifth player in Yankees history to record at least four go-ahead RBI in a single postseason** (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), joining Bernie Williams (seven in 1996), Chris Chambliss (five in 1976), Hideki Matsui (four in 2003) and Lou Gehrig (four in 1928).
- ▶ **Has hit .308/.419/.731 (8-for-26) with 4R, 2 doubles, 3HR, 6RBI, 5BB and 1SB in seven games this postseason.**
- ▶ **His 14 career postseason home runs are tied with Carlos Beltrán (14HR) and Nelson Cruz (14HR) for the most by a Major League player in his first 34 career postseason games.**
- ▶ **His 14 career postseason home runs are the sixth-most in franchise history**, trailing only Bernie Williams (22HR), Derek Jeter (20HR), Mickey Mantle (18HR), Babe Ruth (15HR) and Aaron Judge (15HR).
- ▶ **His career 8.71 AB/HR (14HR/122AB) ratio in the postseason is the second-best in Major League history** (min. 100PA), trailing only Babe Ruth (8.60)...including the postseason, the Yankees are 25-5 this year when Stanton homers.
- ▶ **Has recorded 30RBI in 34 career postseason games, including 29RBI in his last 28 playoff games** (since 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota).
- ▶ Including the postseason, has hit 3HR in his last four games (since 8/22) and 13HR in his last 31 games vs. Cleveland (since 7/13/18).

WALK IT OUT: Yankees batters have walked 45 times this postseason, the most walks by any Major League team through their first seven games of a postseason...also marks the most walks by a Major League team in a seven-game span in the postseason.

PEN PAL: RHP **Tommy Kahnle** tossed 1.2 scoreless innings on Thursday in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland...has gone 1-0 over 6.0 scoreless innings this postseason, allowing just 2H to 25BF...including the postseason, has not allowed an ER in 13 of his last 14 appearances (since 9/3), going 1-1 with one save, a 1.32 ERA (13.2IP, 2ER) and 14K...has not allowed a run in 19 of 23 career postseason appearances, going 2-0 with one save, a 2.63 ERA (27.1IP, 8ER) and 27K.

ROAD WARRIORS: Including the postseason, the Yankees are a Major League-best 52-32 (.619) on the road this year...are 19-10 in their last 29 road games (since 7/27).

TODAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 18, 1999: Derek Jeter hits a two-run homer in the top of the first inning and Jorge Posada follows suit in the ninth, as the Yankees defeat the Red Sox, 6-1, in Fenway Park to wrap up a 4-games-to-1 ALCS victory.

Oct. 18, 1977: The Yankees snap a 14-season World Series championship drought and claim their 21st title by defeating the Dodgers, 4 games-to-2. After homering in Games 4 and 5, Reggie Jackson secures his World Series MVP honor by belting three more home runs in Game 6, as New York earns an 8-4 victory at Yankee Stadium.

TOMORROW IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 19, 2003: Hideki Matsui sets the pace by hitting a three-run homer in the bottom of the first inning, helping the Yankees earn a 6-1 win over the Marlins in Game 2 of the World Series.

SUNDAY IN YANKEES HISTORY

Oct. 20, 2009: Melky Cabrera drives in four runs and CC Sabathia tosses 8.0 innings, as the Yankees earn a 10-1 win over the Angels in Game 4 of the ALCS.

Oct. 20, 1998: Scott Brosius hits a solo homer in the seventh inning and a three-run shot in the eighth, as the Yankees overcome a 3-0 deficit to defeat the Padres, 5-4, in Game 3 of the World Series at Qualcomm Stadium.

YANKEE DOODLES

#17 AARON BOONE—MANAGER

- Has reached the postseason in six of his seven managerial seasons with the Yankees (2018-22, '24).
- Guided the Yankees to their 59th postseason in franchise history and their 21st division title (since the Divisional Era began in 1969) with an AL-best 94-68 (.580) record in 2024...marked the Yankees 32nd consecutive winning season and seventh such season under Boone.
- Earned his 557th career managerial win on 6/11 at Kansas City, surpassing Billy Martin (556-385) for seventh place on the Yankees' all-time list.
- Managed his 1,000th game with the Yankees on 8/24 vs. Colorado.
- Earned his 600th career managerial win on 9/21 at Oakland, becoming the seventh Manager in Yankees history to accomplish the feat, joining Joe McCarthy (1,460-867-21), Joe Torre (1,173-767-2), Casey Stengel (1,149-696-6), Miller Huggins (1,067-719-10), Ralph Houk (944-806-7) and Joe Girardi (910-710).
- His 603 career managerial wins rank seventh on the Yankees' all-time list, trailing only Joe McCarthy (1,460-867-21), Joe Torre (1,173-767-2), Casey Stengel (1,149-696-6), Miller Huggins (1,067-719-10), Ralph Houk (944-806-7) and Joe Girardi (910-710).
- His 19 career managerial wins in the postseason are the fifth-most in franchise history, trailing only Joe Torre (76), Casey Stengel (37), Joe McCarthy (29) and Joe Girardi (28).

#19 JON BERTI—INF **Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G**

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (2020, '23-24).
- Was 0-for-4 in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland...was removed for a defensive repalcement at 1B (Rizzo) in the eighth inning.
- Was 2-for-7 with 1BB in two games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Made his first career Major League appearance at first base in ALDS Game 2... according to MLB Network/*Elias*, became the third player in Major League history to start at a position for the first time during the postseason (min. 300 regular season games played)...joined Cleveland's Carlos Santana (LF in Game 3 of 2016 World Series) and St. Louis' Jake Flowers (3B in Game 2 of 1931 World Series).
- In 25 games with the Yankees in the regular season, batted .273 (18-for-66) with 10R, 1HR, 6RBI, 6BB, 1HP and 5SB...appeared defensively at 3B (18G/17GS), 2B (2G/1GS) and LF (1G/0GS)...missed 111 team games this season on the injured list over two separate stints (4/11-5/4, 5/25-9/9).

#95 OSWALDO CABRERA—INF/OF **Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G**

- Has made the postseason for the second time in his career (2022, '24).
- All three of his postseason hits in his career have gone for extra bases (2 doubles/1HR).
- Did not play in ALCS Games 2 & 3 vs. Cleveland.
- Was 1-for-5 with 3BB in two games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- In 109 games with the Yankees, batted .247 (74-for-299) with 47R, 11 doubles, 8HR, 36RBI, 21BB, 1HP, 4SB and 3SF...appeared defensively at 3B (74G/62GS), 2B (13G/7GS), 1B (13G/5GS), SS (6G/4GS), RF (3G/1GS) and LF (3G/0GS)...posted career highs in runs scored, hits, home runs and RBI.
- Hit safely in 19 of his final 22 starts of the season from 7/6-9/28, batting .321 (26-for-81) with 17R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 9RBI, 8BB, 15F and 2SB in those games.

#13 JAZZ CHISHOLM JR.—INF/OF **Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 2G**

- Has made the postseason for the third time in his career (2020, '23-24).
- Was 1-for-4 with 1BB and 1SB in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland...was 1-for-4 with 1 double in ALCS Game 2 vs. Cleveland.
- Appeared in all four games of the ALDS vs. Kansas City (2-for-15, 2R, 1HR, 1RBI, 1BB, 1SB).
- Combined with the Marlins and Yankees to hit .256/324/436 (144-for-562) with 74R, 21 doubles, 4 triples, 24HR, 73RBI, 53BB and 40SB in 147 games...appeared defensively in centerfield (97G/95GS), at third base (45G/GS) and second base (3G/2GS)...marked his first career appearances at 3B...set career highs in hits, home runs, runs scored, RBI, doubles, walks, stolen bases, extra-base hits (49), total bases (245) and games played.
- Was one of four players in the Majors to record 20HR and 40SB, joining Cincinnati's Ely De La Cruz (25HR/67SB), Los Angeles-NL's Shohei Ohtani (54HR/59SB) and Cleveland's José Ramírez (39HR/41SB).
- In 46 games with the Yankees, batted .273/.325/.500 (48-for-176) with 28R, 7 doubles, 11HR, 23RBI, 14BB and 18SB...hit safely in 33 of his 46 games with the Yankees and reached base safely in 35 of those games.
- Despite playing in only 46 games with the Yankees, ranked second on the team with 18SB, trailing only Anthony Volpe's 28SB...according to *Elias*, his 18SB match the fifth-most by a Yankee in his first 46 games with the club, trailing only Fritz Maisel (24SB in 1913), Rickey Henderson (22SB in 1985), Bert Daniels (19SB in 1910) and Dave Fultz (19SB in 1903)...Mickey Rivers (18SB in 1976), Willie Randolph (18SB in 1976) and Tommy L. McMillan (18SB in 1912) also recorded 18SB in their first 46 games with the club.

#89 JASSON DOMÍNGUEZ—OF **Current Postseason Hitting Streak: N/A**

- Has made the postseason for the first time in his career.
- Made his postseason debut in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland, entering the game as a PR (Stanton) in the 10th inning (did not bat).
- Did not appear in the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Batted .179 (10-for-56) with 8R, 1 double, 2HR, 4RBI, 11BB and 5SB in 18 games over two stints (8/18, 9/9-end of season) with the Yankees...appeared defensively in LF (13G/12GS) and CF (4G/4GS).
- Began the season on the 60-day I.L. due to "Tommy John" reconstruction surgery recovery.
- Hit 6HR in his first 20 career games, tied with Shelley Duncan (6HR in 2007) and Steve Whitaker (6HR in 1966) for the third-most HR by a Yankee through their first 20 career games, trailing only Gary Sánchez (8HR from 2015-16) and Kevin Maas (7HR in 1990).

#12 TRENT GRISHAM—OF **Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 0G**

- Has made the postseason four times (2019, '20, '22, '24).
- Has not appeared in each of the first three games of the ALCS vs. Cleveland.
- Did not appear in the ALDS vs. Kansas City.
- Has hit .169 (11-for-65) with 10R, 1 double, 3HR, 7RBI, 9BB and 3HP in 19 postseason games...drove in a run in six straight postseason games from 2020 NLDS Game 2 - 2022 NLDS Game 1, becoming the first player in Padres history to collect an RBI in six consecutive postseason games (previous: Jim Leyritz - five straight games in 1998)...his seven-game postseason hitting streak from 2020 NLDS Game 1 - 2022 NLDS Game 1 matched the second-longest postseason hitting streak in Padres history, trailing only Tony Gwynn's eight-game streak in 1984 (Alan Wiggins also had a seven-game streak in 1984).
- Appeared in 76 games for the Yankees, batting .190 (34-for-179) with 21R, 8 doubles, 9HR, 31RBI, 22BB, 4HP, 2SF and 1SB...played in 69 games (52 starts) in centerfield.

#99 AARON JUDGE—OF **Current Postseason Hitting Streak: 2G**

- Has made the postseason for the seventh time in his career (2017-22, '24).
- Has driven in five of the Yankees' last 11R over the last two games.
- Hit a game-tying two-run HR in the eighth inning in ALCS Game 3 at Cleveland (1-for-5, 1R, 1HR, 2RBI).
