

WEEK OF MARCH 24

Professional (March 27-April 3)

Angels' Ryan Johnson (2023 CNT) became just the 24th drafted player to reach the Major Leagues without seeing action in the Minors after making his debut on Mar. 27. Johnson continued achieving milestones later in the week. In a tightly-contested game with the Cardinals, Johnson was called on in relief in the bottom of the 10th inning. In only 20 pitches, he earned his first Major League save, marking the first time in history that a player, who has transitioned directly into the Majors, has recorded a save within two games.

A's No.1 prospect and No. 30 on MLB's Top 100 list Jacob Wilson (2022 CNT) registered his first career homer in his side's home opener against the Chicago Cubs. Wilson's homer traveled 341 feet over the left field wall leaving little left to the imagination of his potential. Along with his first Major League home run, Wilson has been as consistent as one can be at the plate, registering a hit in every contest to begin the year.

Brady Singer (2023 WBC) made his Reds debut on Monday and was nearly unhittable in seven strong innings against the Rangers. The right-hander allowed just one hit and two walks while striking out eight, picking up the win in his first start for Cincinnati.

With the Mets trailing by three and two outs in the top of the eighth, Pete Alonso (2023 WBC) capped a nine-pitch at-bat with a game-tying three-run blast to straightaway center field in an eventual 6-5 Mets win over the Marlins. The longball was Alonso's second of the season and his third hit of the game, as he also added two doubles and drove in four runs.

Kyle Tucker (2012 15U, 2023 WBC) put together a string of dominant performances at the plate, helping the Cubs outscore opponents 35-20 in a four-game span. The two-time USA Baseball alum went 10-for-18 with nine RBIs in the slate thanks in large part to four home run blasts, which currently ranks second in the MLB. Tucker also leads the league with 11 RBIs on the year as a whole.

Nolan Gorman (2017 18U) picked up three hits, including his first home run of the year in a 9-2 win over the Twins on Sunday. Gorman singled in his first two at-bats before crushing a 409-foot home run over the wall in right center field. The infielder's blast left his bat at 103.6 mph.

Carson Kelly (2010 16U, 2011 18U) hit for the cycle on Monday, becoming the first Chicago Cub to accomplish the feat since 1993. After drawing a walk in his first plate appearance, Kelly homered in the fourth and singled in the fifth to get halfway to the cycle. He socked a double in the sixth inning and then drew a walk later in the frame before hitting a triple off the wall in right field to check the final box. Kelly ended the day reaching in all six of his trips to the plate, driving in five runs and scoring three in an 18-3 win.

College/Prep (March 24-March 31)

Michael Brooks (2017 15U) and the Kansas Jayhawks secured a series sweep over St. Thomas and Oklahoma State to improve to 23-6 overall record on the season. Throughout the five-game span, Brooks was fantastic at the plate, punching home eleven runs with the help of three homers. With three homers added to his statline, Brooks is projected to crush his line from a year ago, which saw him leave the yard on eight occasions.

Three-time USA Baseball alum Louis Rodriguez (2016 12U, 2019 15U, 2021 18U) was detrimental in TCU's big 16-5 win over Houston on Sunday. After going down four runs in the first frame, Rodriguez came on in relief and got TCU back on track. The right-handed junior tossed 3.2 innings of scoreless baseball, yielding

only two hits and a single walk and allowing the Horned Frogs to work back into the game. In the victory, Rodriguez recorded five strikeouts, his second most in 2025. He now sits at 21 total punchouts through 20.2 innings.

Kolten Smith (2024 CNT) tossed five not-hit innings in Georgia's 4-1 series-opening win over Auburn. He issued just one walk and fanned a season-high eight batters to improve to 2-1 on the bump this season.

Dominic Voegele (2024 CNT) went a career-long eight innings in Kansas's series opener against Oklahoma State, earning the win to improve to 3-2 this season. He surrendered two earned runs on three hits and struck out a career-high 10 batters in the effort.

LSU's Anthony Eyanson (2024 CNT) tallied 12 strikeouts over five innings of work in the Tigers' 2-1 win over Mississippi State. He allowed one run to score in the effort to improve to 4-0 on the mound. His 12 K's were the most for Eyanson in a conference game and the second-most in an outing this season.

Northwestern's Tyler Ganus (2014 12U) played a pivotal role for the team's 2-1 series win against its conference foes the Maryland Terrapins. Ganus kicked off the three-game series with a 3-for-4 performance on Friday night, highlighted by a go-ahead solo shot in extra-innings. His second homer of the year came at an opportune time, as it gave the Wildcats a 6-5 lead it would not relinquish. Ganus picked up base knocks in each of the next two contests to finish the weekend batting .500 at the plate with two RBIs and three runs scored.

WEEK OF MARCH 17

Two-time USA Baseball alum Rawley Hector (2017 15U; 2019 18U) continued his dominant 2025 slate on the mound for UT Tyler in a 22-3 win over Cameron. The senior pitcher tossed the first four innings and racked up four strikeouts while only yielding two hits and a walk. Within his four frames of action, Hector kept Cameron scoreless, marking the second occasion he has prevented an opponent from scoring in his 2025 campaign.

Cam Kozeal (2022 18U) was in the middle of the offense for Arkansas during a perfect 4-0 week. Kozeal picked up two hits in three consecutive games, driving in three runs and hitting two doubles. The sophomore infielder also scored five runs in a three-game span; he has 15 runs scored so far this season to go along with a .365 average and .405 OBP.

Duke beat UConn in a midweek matchup before sweeping Virginia in a key ACC battle, and Team USA alum Macon Winslow (2022 18U) was a key reason why. The sophomore backstop collected two hits in all four games, including home runs in each of the last two games of the Virginia series. Winslow has now cranked five homers and is batting .296 through the first 21 games of his sophomore campaign.

Kade Anderson (2021 18U) continued his torrid start to 2025, tossing six innings and allowing seven hits and two earned runs to pick up his fifth win of the season against Texas. Anderson struck out eight batters in the victory and has now punched out 56 opponents in 34.0 innings pitched and owns a 2.65 ERA through six starts.

It was a weekend to celebrate for the University of Houston, as the baseball team complemented wins by the Cougar basketball team in The Big Dance with a series win at Central Florida. Key to the Big 12 conference play series was 2014 12U National Team alum and Houston pitcher Chris Scinta (2016 12U). Despite a sluggish start to the 2025 season, Scinta found his groove as of late and played a pivotal role for the Cougars in Orlando this past weekend. Scinta earned wins in back-to-back appearances after tossing 1.1 innings in

relief on Friday in addition to hurling 3.2 innings of no-hit ball with three punchouts in the rubber match on Sunday. Scinta has allowed only three runs over the past month as his level of play appears to be trending in the right direction.

Virginia Tech's Brett Renfrow (2024 CNT) surrendered just one unearned run in seven innings of work in the team's 5-4 series opening win over 16th-ranked Louisville. It was his second win of the season as he fanned three batters and walked one.

Max Belyeu (2024 CNT) had a pair of multi-hit performances in Texas' series win over LSU. He tallied three hits in his four at bats in the series opener on March 21, and then in the finale went 2-for-4 with a triple and home run and drove in four runs.

Eric Segura (2024 CNT) improved to 4-0 over the weekend when he tossed four shutout innings in relief in Oregon State's 4-1 victory at Cal Poly. The win extended the Beavers' win streak to 11, and Segura matched his career high in strikeouts with eight in the effort.

WEEK OF MARCH 10

San Diego State's true freshman, Daniel Arambula (2017 12U; 2022 18U), put up veteran numbers in the squad's series win over San Jose State. Arambula put up a surreal performance in the team's doubleheader-sweep this past weekend, pummeling a grand slam en route to going 2-for-3 with five RBIs and three runs scored to kick off the two-game slate on Saturday. The two-time alum stayed hot and launched another homer in Game 2, going 2-for-4 while notching three RBIs. Not only does Arambula lead the Aztecs in home runs (3) and RBIs (17), but he ranks among the top three hitters on the team in hits (22) and runs scored (15).

Jake Brown (2022 18U) and the LSU Tigers stayed hot throughout the week, beating Xavier and sweeping Missouri in a three-game series to move to 20-1 overall on the season. Brown went 7-for-13 with nine RBIs in the four game span to help keep LSU afloat. In the final game against Missouri on March 16, Brown mashed a homer which marked his first of the season.

Two-time USA Baseball alum Rawley Hector (2017 15U; 2019 18U) got the start on the mound for UT Tyler on March 15 and made the most of the opportunity. The senior out of Van Alstyne, TX., punched out nine batters through seven frames to propel his team to a win. Hector now sits at a 1.96 ERA, an improvement from a 2.95 mark last year.

Drew Burress (2019 15U; 2024 CNT) had another dominant week at the plate for Georgia Tech, going 9-for-16 over four games. He homered in the Yellow Jackets' midweek contest against Georgia State, then tallied a combined eight hits in its series against Pitt. Seven of those hits were for extra bases as he had a combined five doubles and two home runs. Additionally, he drove in six runs and scored seven of his own in the series.

Dominic Voegelé (2024 CNT) collected his second consecutive win on the bump after not giving up an earned run in seven innings to help Kansas earn a 9-1 win over Baylor in the series opener. He fanned six batters, marking the fifth consecutive outing where he has struck out six or more batters.

Nelson Keljo (2024 CNT) tossed six strong innings in Oregon State's 6-4 win over Grand Canyon on March 14. He scattered five hits, fanned four batters, and did not allow a run to score to extend his streak to 11 innings without surrendering a run.

Nate Snead (2024 CNT) collected a pair of saves in top-ranked Tennessee's sweep over Florida. He tossed 3.2 scoreless innings and fanned four batters on March 14, and then yielded just one hit in two scoreless

frames on Sunday. He currently leads the Vols' pitching staff with three saves on the year and ranks third on the team with 18 strikeouts.

WEEK OF MARCH 3

Taking the mound for the first time in nearly 365 days, 18U National Team alum Jack O'Connor (2021 18U) returned after surgery to toss a perfect inning on just nine pitches in a win for Virginia over William & Mary. O'Connor, who was a Freshman All-American in 2023 before an injury in 2024, struck out one in the 15-4 win.

LSU junior Anthony Eyanson (2024 CNT) started on the mound for the Tigers against North Alabama and did not disappoint. The right-hander punched out 15 batters across seven frames to lead LSU to a 6-2 victory. Eyanson's 15 Ks marked the most by an LSU pitcher since June 24, 2023.

Wake Forest junior Marek Houston (2024 CNT) continued his hot start to the 2025 season with a 3-for-4 outing consisting of two doubles, a homer and 10 RBIs. The 10 RBIs tied a Wake Forest program record for most RBIs in a single game. The Nokomis, Florida native also leads the team with 32 total RBIs on the season and is tied for the team lead with six home run blasts.

Two-time USA Baseball alum Drew Burress (2019 15U, 2024 CNT) became the fastest Georgia Tech player in program history to reach 30 career home runs in an 8-5 loss to Virginia Tech during a three-game series. The young star needed only 73 games to accomplish the feat, beating the previous record by 20 games. The record-setting homer was Burress' fifth of the year after he crushed a 1-1 pitch over the left field wall.

Nolan Schubart (2019 15U, 2024 CNT) and the Oklahoma State Cowboys enjoyed an offense-packed slate against Illinois State, scoring 40 total runs in the three-game series. The two-time USA Baseball alum was a pitcher's nightmare throughout the series as he raked in seven runs via two doubles and a grand slam. Schubart also crossed the plate himself on seven occasions and is currently batting .386 in his junior season.

Steven Milam (2016 12U, 2019 15U) kept on mashing for No. 1 ranked LSU (D1Baseball) this past week, helping power the Tigers in back-to-back midweek wins over North Dakota State and a weekend sweep of North Alabama. Milam initially got his bat geauxing with a 2-for-4, three-RBI outing last Tuesday in the series opener against North Dakota State. He only got hotter from there, as the two-time USA Baseball alum ended his week with a blazing statline, batting .500 with eight hits, seven RBIs, six runs scored and two home runs. Milam's efforts not only extended LSU's 10-game win streak, but ballooned his hit streak to 10 games as well.

Not only does he lead Oregon in home runs, but Mason Neville (2016 12U) sits among the top 10 of all NCAA Division I baseball players in the longball category with nine bombs on the season. A third of those jacks came this past week, as Neville went yard three times during the Ducks' midweek victory over Utah Tech and its three-game sweep of Southern California. Neville's midweek performance was an indication of the junior's impending production at the plate, as he went 3-for-5 with a double, homer, and three runs knocked in last Tuesday. Neville's final line after a weekend at the plate saw him tally seven hits with four being extra-base hits, six RBIs, seven runs scored and three homers.

Mason Brassfield (2022 18U) entered in relief on Sunday for TCU against Fresno State and was dominant, tossing 6.1 innings and allowing just three hits and no runs to earn his second collegiate win. Brassfield struck out seven in the outing and walked just one batter to move to 2-0 in his freshman campaign with the Horned Frogs.

18U National Team alum Casey Borba (2022 18U) helped lead Texas to a perfect 4-0 week, swinging a hot

bat all week long. In the Longhorns' midweek matchup against Texas A&M-Corpus Christi, Borba launched his first home run of the season before cranking another longball in the series opener against Santa Clara. A bases-clearing double on Saturday capped off his strong week, in which he picked up four hits and drove in five runs, also walking once..
