HISTORY AGAINST CHINESE TAIPEI

The U.S. and Chinese Taipei have faced off 26 times in international competition at the U-18 level, with the stars and stripes holding an 18-8 advantage in the series. Team USA won the first seven meetings between the two sides, but Chinese Taipei has taken three of the last four. The United States has beaten Chinese Taipei in three world championship games (1995, 1999, and 2022).

LAST TIME OUT

Gio Rojas tossed four shutout innings and Aiden Ruiz picked up three hits in a 9-0 tournament-opening win over Panama on Friday. Rojas got out of jams in the first and fourth innings to keep Panama off the board, striking out three and walking just one. Ruiz opened the scoring with an RBI single in the third before the U.S. put up seven runs over the fourth and fifth innings, using patience in the fourth and rallying for three RBI singles in the fifth to pull away from Panama. Nine of the 10 U.S. players with an at-bat picked up at least one hit; CJ Sampson reached base twice and Anthony Murphy scored three runs for the stars and stripes. After Rojas' four innings of work, Kaden Waechter and Cole Koeninger put the finishing touches on the win by combining to get the final nine outs. Jorvorskie Lane Jr. and Ruiz each had two RBIs in the win. Will Brick, Andrew Costello, Grady Emerson, and Jacob Lombard each drove in a run of their own. U.S. hitters only struck out four times in the contest and drew seven walks, also getting hit by four pitches.

THIS LOOKS FAMILIAR

Team USA's starting pitcher in Saturday's game, Carson Bolemon, has experience pitching against Chinese Taipei in a World Cup. The southpaw tossed five shutout innings against Chinese Taipei at the WBSC U-15 Baseball World Cup in 2022, earning the win while striking out four and allowing just one hit.

STARTING OFF STRONG

The United States has now won its World Cup opener in 10 consecutive tournaments after beating Panama on Friday. The last time Team USA lost its first game of a World Cup was all the way back in 2006 against Chinese Taipei before going on to claim silver.

DEATH BY A THOUSAND CUTS

All 11 of Team USA's hits in its tournament-opening win were singles. The stars and stripes hit two singles in the first inning but did most of their damage in the fourth, stringing together four singles in a seven-batter span to pull away from Panama.

BUILT BY MLB DEVELOPS

James Clark, Jacob Lombard, Anthony Murphy, and Aiden Ruiz are all products of MLB Develops, which is Major League Baseball's youth and amateur baseball and softball development programs and initiatives. The athletes have competed in a number of MLB Develops programs and events, including the Breakthrough Series, DREAM Series, Hank Aaron Invitational, High School All-American Game, High School Home Run Derby, and The Program.

"BILLION-DOLLAR TEAM"

The 2009 18U National Team has earned the moniker of the "billion-dollar team." Loaded with future stars, the 2009 squad ran the table at the WBSC U-18 Baseball World Cup Americas Qualifier in Barquisimeto, Venezuela, outscoring opponents 99-14. Half of the roster made it to the big leagues, including Nick Castellanos, Kevin Gausman, Bryce Harper, Manny Machado, and Robbie Ray. The team has combined to earn \$841 million through 2025 and will earn over a billion combined dollars when their current contracts expire.

CLASSMATES AND TEAMMATES

Two players on the Team USA roster attend the same high school. James Clark and Jaden Jackson are teammates at St. John Bosco in Bellflower, California, which won the Trinity League, California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Southern Section D1 title, and the CIF D1 State title in 2025.

FAMILY AFFAIR

Both Jacob Lombard and Brody Schumaker have fathers who are on Team USA's coaching staff for the 2026 World Baseball Classic. George Lombard, who currently serves the bench coach for the Detroit Tigers, will be the first base coach with the stars and stripes next spring. Brody's father, Skip, was the NL Manager of the Year for the Miami Marlins in 2023 and currently holds a senior advisor position with the Texas Rangers. Skip will be the bench coach for Team USA.

EMERSON MAKES HISTORY

Grady Emerson is making USA Baseball history with this year's 18U National Team, becoming the first player in the organization's history to play for two 15U and two 18U National Teams. Emerson won a gold medal with the 15U squad in 2022, returned in 2023, and then won a gold medal with the 18U National Team in 2024.

BEEN HERE BEFORE

A trio of players on this year's 18U National Team already have a world championship under their belt: Carson Bolemon, Andrew Costello, and Grady Emerson. The three of them played for the 15U National Team in 2022 and won a title at the WBSC U-15 Baseball World Cup in Hermosillo, Mexico. Bolemon pitched seven innings of one-run ball, Costello was a member of the All-World Team, and Emerson reached base at a .429 clip in the tournament.

NO. 1!

2024 18U National Team alum Eli Willits became the ninth overall player to be selected with the first pick of the MLB Draft after playing for the 18U National Team. Joe Mauer was the first 18U alum to go first overall, followed by a three-year stretch from 2003-2005 where the first pick was an 18U alum: Delmon Young, Matt Bush, and Justin Upton. 2010 No. 1 pick Bryce Harper continued the trend, and Mickey Moniak (2016), Royce Lewis (2017), and Jackson Holliday (2023) round out the group of first overall picks.

DRAFT DAY

Eleven of the 18 draft-eligible players from last year's 18U National Team were selected in the 2025 MLB Draft, including six first rounders: Eli Willits (1-1), Ethan Holliday (1-4), Gavin Fien (1-12), Kayson Cunningham (1-18) Josh Hammond (PPI-28), and Slater de Brun (CB-A-37). Additionally, Ethin Bingaman, Xavier Mitchell, Josh Owens, Dylan Wood, and Quentin Young heard their names called in the 2025 Draft.

RICK ECKSTEIN

Manager

Rick Eckstein was named manager of the 2025 18U National Team in February 2025, marking his second consecutive managerial gig and eighth overall appearance on a USA Baseball national team staff.

Eckstein led Team USA to a perfect 8-0 record at the WBSC U-18 Baseball World Cup Americas Qualifier in Panama City, Panama in 2024. The U.S. won its seventh consecutive gold medal at the tournament, outscoring opponents 58-9 in the eight-game span. Under the watch of Eckstein—a former Major League hitting coach—U.S. hitters batted a tournament-best .280 and reached base at a .398 clip. Eckstein coached three players to spots on the all-tournament team, including Tournament MVP and 2024 Richard W. “Dick” Case Player of the Year Award winner Kayson Cunningham. Team USA’s defense also shined with Eckstein at the helm as the squad committed just four errors—tying for the fewest in a tournament in program history—and posting a .982 fielding percentage, the best of the 13 competing nations.

Following his successful stint with the 18U National Team in 2024, Eckstein joined the Professional National Team coaching staff as the hitting coach for the 2024 Premier12 tournament. In his sixth appearance on the Pro Team staff, Eckstein helped lead the stars and stripes to their first bronze medal in Premier12 history. Team USA’s offense ranked second in the tournament in hits (83), runs scored (51), and home runs (12) as Eckstein captured his fifth overall medal. Prior to his stint as hitting coach at the Premier12, Eckstein had previously been a member of the Professional National Team coaching staff on five different occasions. Eckstein mainly worked under longtime big-league manager Davey Johnson and helped Team USA collect a trio of medals, including a bronze at the Beijing 2008 Olympic Games. He was also the bullpen coach for the United States at the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006.

Along with his national team coaching experience, Eckstein has also been deeply involved with USA Baseball’s development programs and educational initiatives. In 2023, he was a coach at the Prospect Development Pipeline (PDP) League, 16U/17U National Team Development Program (NTDP), and 18U National Team Training Camp, earning USA Baseball Coach Educator of the Year honors. Eckstein also took home the 2008 “Doc” Counsilman

Science Award for his coaching efforts through scientific data and technology.

Eckstein started his coaching career in 1997 when he served as a volunteer assistant coach for the University of Florida following the end of his playing career at the school. In 1999, he joined the Tampa Bay Devil Rays as a bullpen coach and batting practice pitcher before taking the same role with the Minnesota Twins a year later. Eckstein got his first hitting coach position shortly after this, joining the University of Georgia’s coaching staff during the 2002 and 2003 seasons. In the subsequent years, he worked for multiple minor league teams in that role, including the Harrisburg Senators, Vermont Expos, New Orleans Zephyrs, Memphis Redbirds, and Columbus Clippers. He got his first major league coaching role at the end of 2008 with the Washington Nationals, where he served as the hitting coach until the end of the 2013 season. Eckstein joined the Los Angeles Angels as a player information coach in 2014 before returning to the college ranks as an assistant coach for the University of Kentucky, a position he held for two years. After that, he was brought on by the Minnesota Twins as a minor league hitting coordinator and worked in that role from 2016-2018. His most recent big-league coaching position was as the hitting coach for the Pittsburgh Pirates, which he held until the end of the 2021 season.

BRAD PENNY

Pitching Coach

Brad Penny will be Team USA’s pitching coach for the fourth time in five years. He debuted in 2021 when he led the pitching staff to a 1.53 ERA and 89 strikeouts in 59 innings in a seven-game friendship series against Canada. In 2022, Penny guided the pitching staff to a gold medal at the WBSC U-18 Baseball World Cup Americas Qualifier, where the U.S. posted an 8-0 record and a 2.56 ERA with 65 strikeouts in 52 innings. Team USA was even more dominant at the same tournament in 2024, posting a 1.08 team ERA and allowing just two extra-base hits in 52.0 innings pitched en route to a gold medal. Overall, U.S. arms have a 1.52 ERA in 170 innings pitched with Penny as pitching coach.

The three-time Team USA pitching coach has been on staff at USA Baseball’s National Team Development Program (NTDP) and Prospect Development Pipeline (PDP) League as both a pitching coordinator and roving instructor on multiple occasions while also serving on staff at the MLB Draft Combine each year since its inception in

2021. In addition to his USA Baseball coaching experience, Penny donned the stars and stripes as a player when he suited up for the organization’s first Professional National Team in 1999. The squad earned a silver medal at the 1999 Pan American Games, qualifying Team USA for the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games, where the U.S. won gold with a 4-0 defeat of Cuba.

Penny was selected in the fifth round of the 1996 MLB Draft by the Arizona Diamondbacks and had a 14-year MLB playing career that included two All-Star selections and a World Series championship. After making his major league debut with the Florida Marlins in 2000, Penny helped lead the team to the organization’s second World Series championship in 2003 with a 4.13 ERA in 32 starts during the season. He made his first All-Star Game appearance in 2006 and finished that season with a 4.33 ERA, a career-high 148 strikeouts, and a league-leading 16 wins for the Los Angeles Dodgers. The right-hander made his second All-Star Game appearance amidst a 2007 season in which he had an MLB-best .800 (16-4) win percentage and finished third in National League Cy Young Award voting. He finished his career with stints playing for the Boston Red Sox, San Francisco Giants, St. Louis Cardinals, and the Detroit Tigers before returning to the Marlins in 2014 for his final season. The Blackwell, Oklahoma, native concluded his career with 121 wins, 1,273 strikeouts, and a 4.29 ERA in 1,925.0 innings pitched in the big leagues.

DAVID ECKSTEIN

Assistant Coach

Eckstein will be seeking his third gold medal in as many appearances on an 18U National Team staff in 2025. His first gig with the team was in 2015, when he helped lead the U.S. to an 8-1 record and a world title at the WBSC U-18 Baseball World Cup in Osaka, Japan. Returning to the staff last summer, Eckstein assisted in helping the Team USA win its seventh consecutive gold medal at the WBSC U-18 Baseball World Cup Americas Qualifier. Eckstein used years of infield knowledge to guide the U.S. defense to a tournament-high .982 fielding percentage as the team committed just four errors, tying for the fewest in a tournament in program history.

After walking on at the University of Florida and becoming a First-Team All-SEC selection in 1995 and 1996, Eckstein was drafted in the 19th round of the 1997 MLB Draft by the Boston Red Sox. He made his big-league debut four years later with

the Anaheim Angels in 2001, batting .285 with four homers and 41 RBIs en route to finishing fourth in American League Rookie of the Year voting. He spent four seasons in Anaheim as the team’s everyday shortstop and won his first World Series in 2002, batting .294 in 16 postseason games. Eckstein then signed with the St. Louis Cardinals in 2005 and had an All-Star season that year, hitting .294 with eight home runs and 61 RBIs. The following season was his most notable as he earned his second consecutive All-Star selection and was named World Series Most Valuable Player after batting .364 in the Fall Classic, including a 4-for-5 performance in a pivotal Game 4. Eckstein played one more season in St. Louis before spending the 2008 season split between the Toronto Blue Jays and the Arizona Diamondbacks. He wrapped up his career with two seasons with the San Diego Padres, batting .263 over the two campaigns while playing second base. Eckstein finished his decade-long career with 1,311 games played and a .280 batting average.

STEVE STONE

Assistant Coach

Stone will serve as an assistant coach in 2025 for the second straight summer after assisting in the 2024 gold-medal run. Taking on a handful of duties, including third base coach, Stone helped Team USA lead the tournament in runs scored (58) in addition to the team’s .280 batting average. The longtime head coach at Hebron High School in Carrollton, Texas, Stone also boasts USA Baseball coaching experience as an assistant coach at the NTDP in 2023. Stone spent 24 seasons at the helm at Hebron, founding the program upon the school’s inception in 1999. He won over 500 games as the school’s head coach and led the Hawks to a district title in his final season in 2023. Prior to taking the reins at Hebron, Stone coached at Wichita Falls Rider (Wichita, Texas) and Euless Trinity (Euless, Texas) High Schools. In addition to his experience at the NTDP, Stone also coached at USA Baseball’s Tournament of Stars from 2016-2018 and has been on staff at the MLB Draft Combine each year since 2021. He also assisted at the Women’s National Team Training in 2019, hosting the team at Hebron and helping the coaching staff during practices as the U.S. prepared for the WBSC Women’s Baseball World Cup Americas Qualifier. Stone is a former standout catcher at Texas Christian University, where he was named team MVP in 1988.
