FROM THE PRESIDENT



Welcome to Falmouth Commodores baseball 2024!

As we reflect on last season when the Commodores celebrated their 100th anniversary since becoming a founding team of the Cape Cod Baseball League (CCBL) in 1923, we have much to ponder as we move forward. This includes hosting the 2024 CCBL All-Star game on July 27th at Guv Fuller Field.

The quality of amateur baseball on Cape Cod has never been better. The game itself seems to be elevated to a new level with players arriving poised to exhibit their skills developed over their many years of practice and play. To that point, in the 2023 Major League Baseball (MLB) draft, 26 Falmouth Commodores were selected by the 30 professional teams. Currently more than 350 players who played in the CCBL are playing in the major leagues. Furthermore, it is expected at the upcoming 2024 MLB draft that 2 of the top 5 overall picks in the first round will be Commodores who played here in 2023. It deserves reiteration that the CCBL is a major launching point for many of these players seeking to play professional baseball.

But let's take a moment to look at a broader, more general impact that the team and league have on the many volunteer interns and people in the community who make major contributions to fielding and supporting the operations of the team.

After a month or so pause following the CCBL season, Commodores volunteers begin meeting in the fall to plan for the next season. This includes identifying and recruiting upwards of 30 college interns who fill positions in media and broadcasting, game day operations, scout liaisons, communications, and administration. These students work for the team as volunteers without any financial compensation. The challenge is not only recruiting the best talent nationally for the team, but on a practical level, finding affordable housing on Cape Cod for these unpaid interns. This is a real challenge in today's real estate market, and the team is seeking ways to help support intern housing. Yet every year the Commodores have been successful in getting the best and the brightest. These interns use their experience with the Commodores to seek and obtain professional careers in sports management, broadcasting, and media or affiliated professions.

At about the same time, our fulltime volunteer pool of approximately 80 people begins to commit to hosting players, organizing field improvements, serving on the fundraising committee, and planning next year's game day operations. Identifying host families for players is absolutely key, as without these generous folks who are willing to open their homes to one or more players for 10 weeks are critical in the ability to recruit and field the best players from around the country.

The Falmouth Commodores are 1 of the 10 teams in the CCBL. Together the CCBL represents a large, coordinated effort to showcase some of the best amateur baseball talent in the county. While doing so, it also provides experience and opportunity for numerous interns and a high level of satisfaction to the droves of volunteers that make it all happen. We hope it brings enjoyment and fun for you, our loyal fans, as well.

We look forward to seeing you at Guv Fuller Field!

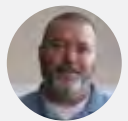

FALMOUTH ALL-STAR GAME HISTORY

This season the Cape Cod Baseball All-Star game returns to historic Guv Fuller Field in Falmouth for the first time since 2003.

It will mark the eighth time the showcase game will be played in Falmouth, which included some memorable games of the past. In addition, a number of former Commodore players distinguished themselves in past games as noted in this brief history of Falmouth in the annual Cape Cod All-Star Game.

Here is a look back at all of the past All-Star games which were played in Falmouth over the years:

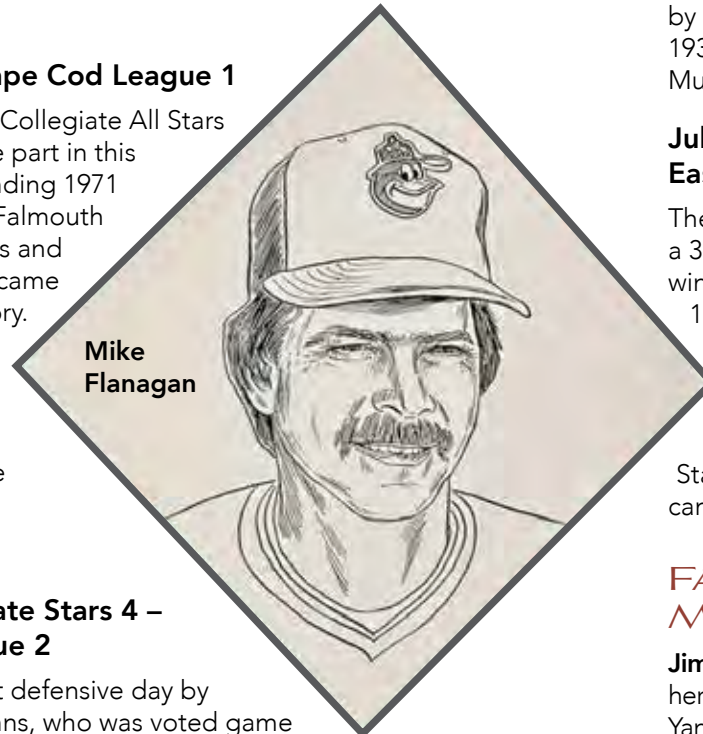
PAST ALL-STAR GAMES PLAYED IN FALMOUTH

Aug. 8, 1966
Lower Cape 5 – Upper Cape 1

Playing under the new lights at Guv Fuller Field, the All-Star Game made its first appearance in Falmouth. Harwich first baseman Ed Drucker led the winners with three RBIs, while Wareham's Ed Waters went 2-4. Chatham hurler Joe Jabar picked up the victory, while future major leaguer Tom Grieve of Chatham scored two runs and set an all-star game record with four walks. The game was called in the top of the ninth when a fly ball to right field hit by Harwich's Cal Fisk became lost in the fog and dropped in behind right fielder Mike Finnell for a double.

July 15, 1972
Falmouth 8 – Cape Cod League 1

When the Atlantic Collegiate All Stars elected not to take part in this year's game, defending 1971 playoff champion Falmouth played the All-Stars and the Commodores came away with the victory. Jim Riggleman belted a pair of home runs and the victory went to Falmouth ace Mike Flanagan.



Aug. 3, 1974
Atlantic Collegiate Stars 4 – Cape Cod League 2

Sparked by a great defensive day by shortstop Tom Sohns, who was voted game MVP, the Atlantic Collegiate All Stars picked up their first win in four tries against the Cape League. Future major leaguer Rich Gale of Falmouth struck out the side in his one inning of work. Among the Collegiate All Stars was catcher Joe Maddon of Lafayette who started behind the plate. Maddon, the future Major League manager with Angels, Rays and Cubs, went hitless.

July 20, 1991
East 7 – West 4

For the first time in nearly two decades, the All-Star game returned to Guv Fuller Field. The East scored three runs in both the third and sixth innings to post the victory as Brewster's Bill Scalzitti went 2-for-3 with a home run and was named MVP of the game. Hyannis' Doug Hecker homered for the West and Wareham's Wes Wegler added a two-run double. Chatham's Steve Duda was the winning pitcher.

July 22, 1995
West 4 – East 0

A large crowd of 5,000 fans packed Guv Fuller Field as Hyannis' designated hitter Dan Olson had three singles and an RBI to be named game MVP. Falmouth's Kris Watson picked up the victory working strong two innings, striking out a pair.

July 21, 2001
East 10 – West 1

The All-Star game returned to Falmouth and 3,000 fans saw the East pound out 16 hits for a 10-1 win. Russ Adams of Orleans was East MVP with two hits, including a three-run home run. Wareham's Matt Murton homered for the West's lone run. The first pitch of the game was thrown out by 95-year-old Connie Hurley who played for Wareham in 1930-31 and later played for Casey Stengel with the Toledo Mud Hens.

July 26, 2003
East 3 – West 1

The East rallied for three runs in the top of the ninth for a 3-1 win. Sean Gamble of Yarmouth-Dennis drove in the winning runs with a two-run single. The West had taken a 1-0 lead in the first when Hyannis' Sam Fuld scored on a double by Falmouth's Joey Metropoulos. In a classy gesture, Falmouth's legendary special assistant Arnie Allen – who started as a Falmouth batboy 46 years prior – was chosen to coach first base for the West All-Stars. Allen, who had been diagnosed with esophageal cancer, died later that October.

FALMOUTH ALL-STAR GAME MVPs

Jim Riggleman (1973). The Falmouth right fielder was the hero of the 13-7 win over the Atlantic Collegiate Stars at Yankee Stadium. Riggleman became the first player to hit an all-star game grand slam as his timely blast broke open a close game and led to a 7-1 lead. Riggleman hit several deep foul balls to left before lining one off the left field screen attached to the foul pole.

Jason Edgar (1997). While the Falmouth second baseman was not a starter, he was named game MVP with two hits, two runs and an RBI on a solo home run as the West won 5-4. His home run in the last of the eighth pulled the West stars even, and the team went on to win the game on a one-out walk-off homer in the bottom of the ninth by Cotuit's Robb Quinlan.

Dallas Buck (2004). Not much to cheer about for the West All-Stars as they had only two hits and the East won in a rout, 13-0. The two hits tied the record for the fewest hits in an All-Star game. Oregon State's Dallas Buck, representing Falmouth, pitched well in his inning of work to be named the West All-Star MVP.

Brad Chalk (2006). Falmouth's Chalk had two hits for the West in their 7-2 loss to the East and was named MVP. Future Red Sox star Mitch Moreland had three RBIs to capture East MVP honors.

Aaron Crow (2007). Crow struck out all three East batters in the top of the first inning including future major leaguers Cole Figueroa and Yonder Alonso. It was one of the few bright spots for the West which fell to the East, 3-2.

Kevin Cron (2013). Cron, the starting first baseman from TCU, had two hits, including a double and a pair of RBIs but the West lost to the East, 9-3.

FALMOUTH WINNING PITCHERS IN ALL-STAR GAME

Bud Knittle (1964). In 2 2/3 innings of shutout pitching, Knittle allowed one hit and struck out two. He also helped his cause with a pair of hits, including a double in posting the 4-2 win by the Upper Cape All-Stars.

Steve Kadison (1965). While Kadison made the team as an infielder, he was called upon in late innings to pitch and collected the win, 10-9 win by the Upper Cape All-Stars. With the bullpen spent, Kadison came on in the eighth inning and allowed four runs on three hits. However, the Upper Cape Stars rallied for three runs in the last of the eighth before darkness set in giving Kadison the unexpected victory.

Dave Stone (1968). Stone got the win and helped his cause with a run-scoring double in the top of the ninth leading the Upper Cape to a 3-0 win over the Lower Cape. Stone pitched two-hit ball over the last two scoreless innings.

Paul Mitchell (1970). Mitchell pitched two scoreless innings in the Cape League's 6-3 victory over the Atlantic Collegiate Stars at Yankee Stadium.

Paul Mitchell (1971). The future Baltimore Oriole won for the second straight year as the Cape League All-Stars topped the Atlantic Collegiate Stars 6-3 at Veteran's Field in Chatham. Mitchell went three innings allowing no runs, scattering two hits and striking out three to earn the victory.

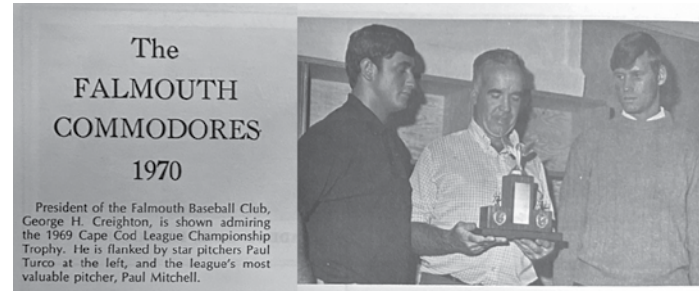
Mike Flanagan (1972). Flanagan, another future Baltimore Oriole, picked up the victory when his Falmouth teammate Jim Riggleman hit two home runs leading to the win. With the Atlantic Collegiate All Stars opting not to take part in this year's game, defending playoff champ Falmouth played the All-Stars and posted an 8-1 victory.

George Tsamis (1988). This year the league returned to an intra league game which featured the best of the West against the best of the East. Orleans hosted the game and Tsamis pitched the second and third innings for the win leading the West to a 4-3 victory. Future major league stars Jeff Bagwell (Chatham) and Mo Vaughn (Wareham) each hit home runs.

Kris Wilson (1995). The right hander out of Georgia Tech struck out two over two innings pitched for the 4-0 victory for the West over the East.

Jeffrey Passatino (2016). Passatino retired all three batters in the top of the first to become the pitcher of record as the West blanked the East, 8-0

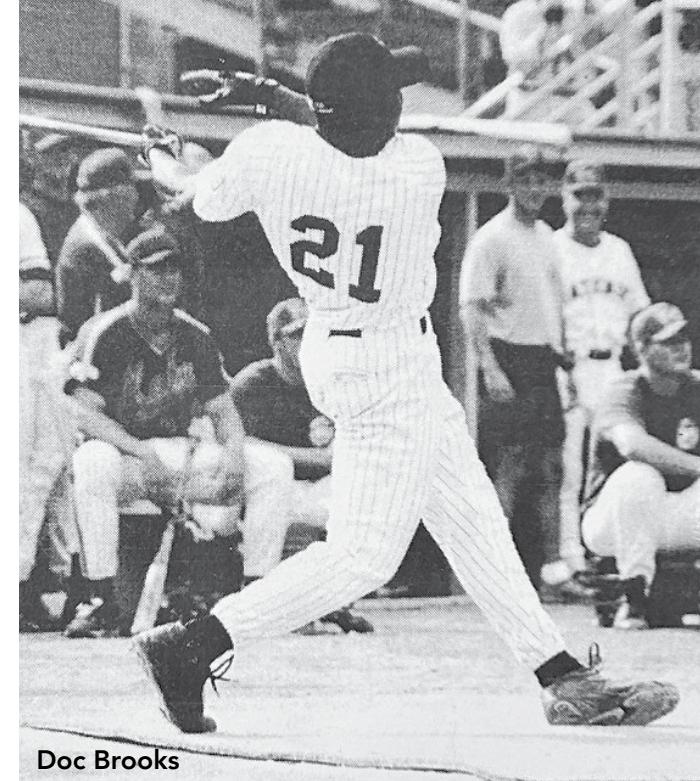
Matthew Canterino (2018). As the West starter, Canterino was staked to an early 2-0 lead and was awarded the 4-3 victory. Falmouth's Kyle Stavers had an RBI single in the first to give the West team a lead they would not lose.

COMMODORES CELEBRATE 100 YEARS!

2023 represented a special year for the Falmouth Commodores. It was in 1923 that the Cape Cod Baseball League was originally founded. When it was formed, the League consisted of only four teams – Falmouth, Chatham, Hyannis, and Osterville. One hundred (100) years later, the Cape League is consistently recognized as one of the nation's premiere collegiate summer leagues – only now with 10 teams.

The Commodores celebrated this milestone season with a centennial celebration that was open to the public before the July 15th home game against Chatham. The event included player autographs, Homer (the 'Dores loveable mascot), a dunk tank, a pie eating contest, giant games, and more. Puffy Elvis, the local band comprised of teachers and guest performers, kept things lively all afternoon. The local food trucks and 25 cent hotdogs – 1923 prices – proved to be a hit as well as evidenced by the long lines. Among the crowd were special guests Barnstable County Sheriff Donna Buckley, Troy Clarkson,

and newly appointed Police Chief of Falmouth Jeff Lourie, as well as MLB players and Commodores' alumni Ace Adams (Pittsburgh Pirates) and Cliff Pennington (Oakland A's, Arizona Diamondbacks, Toronto Blue Jays, LA Angels, and Cincinnati Reds). A great time was had by all who joined to celebrate the Commodores' anniversary!

A Special Edition Commodores Program Guide was also created to commemorate the centennial year. This 74-page guide included articles, Commodores' photos from the past century, and interviews with MLB alumni players and people who contributed to the organization over the years.

To culminate the centennial season, the Commodores received several awards before their home playoff game on August 5th. Bob Curtis, President of the Commodores, accepted citations from the Massachusetts State Senate, the Massachusetts House of Representatives, and the Barnstable County Sheriff's office. They were presented by Massachusetts State Senator Susan Moran, Falmouth Town Manager Mike Renshaw, and Barnstable County Sheriff Donna Buckley, respectively, with their signatures. Each official acknowledged the achievement and extended their best wishes for continued success before throwing out a threefold first pitch and declaring "play ball".

"It's absolutely iconic," Senator Moran said of the centennial year. "As Chair of

the Board of Selectman in Falmouth, I was very invested in helping out the volunteers to uplift the space and the field, because we wanted the home field to really measure up to the incredible athletes that play here." Moran, whose official title is Senator for the Barnstable and Plymouth District of Massachusetts, went on to explain that she was a big baseball fan both rooting for the Boston Red Sox and attending many Commodores games during her lifetime.

Awards were also presented from the Cape Cod Baseball League to two of the Commodores' players before the game. Tyler MacGregor (Northeastern) received the Outstanding New England Player Award. Travis Bazzana (Oregon State) received both the Thurman Munson Batting Title and the Pat Sorenti Most Valuable Player Award.

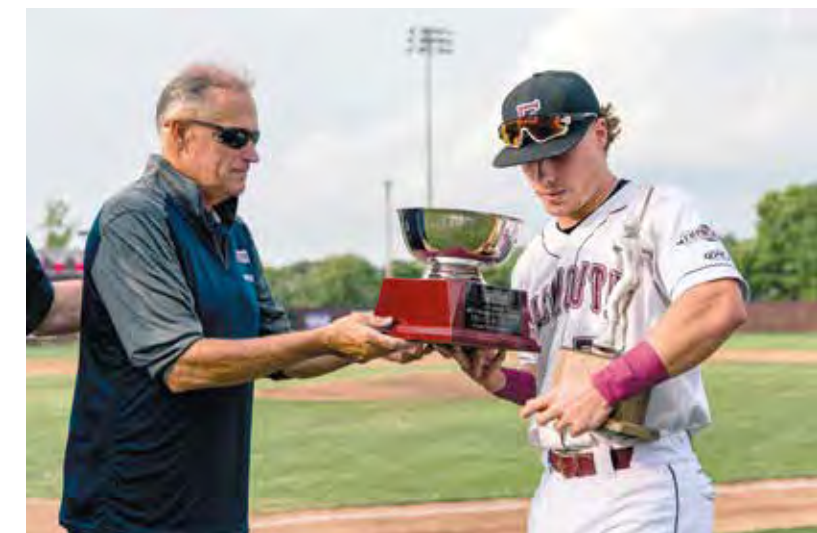

24 Falmouth Commodores Inducted into the Cape Cod Baseball League Hall of Fame Since its 2000 Inception



The Cape Cod Baseball League (CCBL) Hall of Fame recognizes the most deserving players, coaches, and others who have made outstanding contributions to the league. Since its inception in 2000, the honorees are traditionally announced at the CCBL's First Pitch Brunch and officially inducted into the Hall of Fame during the fall ceremony.

In addition to the inductees, the CCBL Hall of Fame recognizes a select few stellar contributors through the recognition of special awards. **Chuck Sturtevant, Falmouth Commodores (1989-2006) and President (1987-1989), and CCBL President (2015-2022)**, was honored with the first Dick Sullivan Executive of the Year Award in 2006. The award recognizes distinguished service, including franchise and/or league management, outstanding leadership qualities, professional behavior, timeliness of required reporting mechanisms, proactive guidance for student-athletes, and overall performance that exceeds expectations by going above-and-beyond the call of duty. This award is named after Dick Sullivan, who was CCBL Deputy Commissioner in the 1970s and President in the 80s.

Falmouth's longtime volunteer and league historian Al Irish, who saw his first game in 1925, was honored in 2007 with the highly coveted Fred Ebbett Lifetime Achievement Award. This award recognizing a significant franchise volunteer, was named in 2003 in recognition of contributions made to the CCBL by the late Fred Ebbett, an inductee in the CCBL Hall of Fame.

Twenty-four (24) Falmouth Commodores have been inducted into the CCBL Hall of Fame since 2000 and recognized for their outstanding contributions to the league. They include:

2020 Kevin Newman – The University of Arizona slugger and two-time Cape League batting champion led the Falmouth Commodores to the playoffs in 2013 and 2014. Newman was selected by the Pittsburgh Pirates in the first round of the 2015 MLB draft and is enjoying a successful professional career.

2020 Cliff Pennington – The Texas A&M talent led the 2004 Falmouth Commodores to the CCBL championship series. Pennington was a switch-hitting, strong-armed shortstop. He was drafted in the first round of the 2005 MLB draft by the Oakland Athletics and enjoyed a successful 11-year big-league career playing for the Athletics, Diamondbacks, Blue Jays, Angels, and Reds.

2019 Conor Gillaspie – Conor Gillaspie arrived on Cape Cod in 2007 as an unknown from Wichita State. He left in August with the Cape League's Most Valuable Player and Thurman Munson Batting Champion awards. Gillaspie was drafted in the sandwich round by the Giants (37th overall) in 2008, where he began a big-league career for the Giants and White Sox.

2018 Arthur "Ace" Adams – The Michigan hurler, selected as a Big Ten Pitcher of the Year, played three years in the Cape League from 1972-74. Adams began a 42-year coaching career before switching to pro ball, playing for the Pittsburgh organization. He managed Falmouth in 1992-93.

2017 Chuck Sturtevant – Chuck started in 1987 with the Commodores as President and from 1989-2006 as GM and Treasurer. He served four years as a Vice President with the league, and was league President from 2015 through 2022. Chuck was the first recipient of the Dick Sullivan Executive of the Year award in 2006 and was named John Wylde General Manager of the Year in 2014-15. In 2023, he came out of retirement to once again support the Commodores as GM.

2016 Jim McCollom – The right-handed hitting first baseman-outfielder from Clemson played for the Commodores in 1984. After being drafted by the California Angels in 1985, McCollom played five seasons in the minor leagues. He was named ACC Player of the Year for the Tigers and advanced to Class AAA Edmonton in 1990.

2014 Bob St. Pierre – This Richmond hurler, is an Outstanding Pitcher Award recipient. Receiving the best record in the league, he played for the Commodores in 1994. He was selected in the 1995 amateur draft by the New York Yankees and played in the minors for three years.

2013 Daniel Carte – The slugging right-fielder from Winthrop College became the league's Most Valuable Player in 2004. Powering the Commodores to the championship series, Carte was named Summer League Player of the Year by Baseball America. He played for the

Colorado Rockies, and coached for the Commodores and on the collegiate level.

2012 Billy Best – Best's 32-game hitting streak for Falmouth in 1979 is still a league record. After playing five years in the Kansas City Chiefs minor leagues, Best went into college coaching, including his alma mater East Carolina University, and served as a scout for the Atlanta Braves.

2012 Danny "Deacon" MacFayden – MacFayden went 9-2 for Osterville in 1924, and threw a one-hitter for Falmouth against Hyannis in 1925 before signing with the Red Sox. He led the AL with four shutouts in 1929, and in the 1935 tied the then-NL record with 15 strikeouts.

2011 Doug Fisher – The Central Michigan University alumnus was a power-hitting first baseman for Falmouth in 1984 and 1985. He earned a spot on the 1980's All-Decade Team.

2010 David Aardsma – Pitched for Falmouth in 2002 and was nearly perfect in 18 appearances. He played in the MLB for the San Francisco Giants, Chicago Cubs, Chicago White Sox, Boston Red Sox, Seattle Mariners, NY Yankees, NY Mets, and Atlanta Braves.

2009 Harold "Pie" Traynor – Traynor played for both Falmouth and Oak Bluffs in 1919 and went on to become a seven-time all-star third baseman for the Pittsburgh Pirates. He was inducted into Cooperstown in 1948.

2008 Roche Pires – One of the finest athletes Falmouth ever produced. He began playing with the Waquoit Braves as a pitcher/first baseman/catcher in the early 1930s, and from there starred for Falmouth and Mashpee. He helped lead the Commodores to the Cape title in 1946 and 1950.

2007 Jack Walsh – Playing for and then managing Falmouth in the 1930s, his teams won three titles. He was nominated by Al Irish, lifetime member of the Commodores Board of Directors and an unofficial team historian.

2006 Steve Balboni – The Eckerd College slugger owned one of the best nicknames in baseball history, "Bye-Bye" Balboni. He played for the Commodores in 1976 and enjoyed a successful major league career with the NY Yankees and Kansas City Royals.

2005 Sam Nattile – The Central Florida native enjoyed one of the best seasons in Cape League history in 1981. He slugged the game-tying home run in the All-Star Game and was named to the All-League Team. Nattile signed with the Boston Red Sox.

2005 Manny Pena – Pena played for the Falmouth All-Stars as a catcher from 1946-49 and as a Field Manager for Sagamore. He served as umpire-in-chief from 1976-83, a time when the CCBL was gaining national attention for

being the best summer college league in the country.

2004 Eric Milton – This left-hander compiled several league records during 1996. He was the first-round selection of the NY Yankees during that year's amateur draft. He also pitched for the Minnesota Twins and Philadelphia Phillies. Milton is the only known pitcher to hurl a no-hitter in both the Cape Cod League and the majors.

2003 Noel Kinski – The former Providence Friar pitcher was one of the top hurlers in the Cape League in the mid-1960's, playing for Falmouth in '66. Kinski, a three-time All-Star, started the '65 and '66 games for the Upper Division,

2002 William "Bill" Livesey – Livesey played and then managed 10 years in the CCBL, including eight seasons for Falmouth (1965-72). His teams won 239 games and produced six championships, the most ever by a Cape League manager at the time. He was director of player development with the NY Yankees and then joined the Tampa Bay Devil Rays and Toronto Blue Jays as special assistant to the GM.

2002 Paul Mitchell – Mitchell was the pitching ace of the Falmouth Commodores from 1969-71, leading them to three championships. He was a three-time All-Star and named the league's Outstanding Pitcher in both 1969 and 1970. Mitchell enjoyed a career with the Baltimore Orioles, Oakland Athletics, Seattle Mariners, and Milwaukee Brewers.

2001 Darin Erstad – The first pick overall in the 1995 draft by the Anaheim Angels, Erstad played two years ('93 and '94) for the Falmouth Commodores. A fan favorite, he was presented with the Pat Sorenti Award as the league's Most Valuable Player in his second season.

2000 Mike Flanagan – Flanagan pitched in the majors for 18 years and won the Cy Young Award with Baltimore in 1979. He also said of his 1972 summer in Falmouth, "I've forgotten some of my major league years. They all run together. But I'll never forget my year in the Cape Cod League."

2020 Ed Lyons – After a stint with the U.S. Army, Lyons signed a minor league contract with the Cincinnati Reds in 1947, toiling for 18 years across the United States and Canada. Eventually, Lyons was given the nod to manage in the Cape League, quickly garnering a reputation as a "players' manager" with stints as the skipper of Hyannis, Falmouth, Wareham and ultimately, Chatham.

The 2024 Hall of Fame induction ceremony is scheduled for November 17th at the Wequassett Inn in Harwich, MA. Tickets go on sale in the fall.

Mike Murray has baseball and the Falmouth Commodores in his blood. Since his early childhood, he attended BoSox Fan Club meetings with his uncle who was president of the club. He subsequently started attending Falmouth Commodores baseball clinics every summer at the earliest age allowable. This led him to become a bat boy during Commodores games, which he enjoyed for 4 years. Mike then went on to become the Clubhouse Intern for 2 years with him providing field maintenance and helping with game day operations. That experience led him to become the General Manager's Lead Intern for 2 years. This internship was key, as Mike was responsible for working closely with and being mentored by the General Manager. His role was to ensure that when players arrived they got settled in, and that game day operations on the field were fired up and ready to go. This encompassed everything from ordering uniforms and equipment to keeping track of players who were invited and had arrived to play for Falmouth.

Mike's own baseball experience included playing little league, Babe Ruth, and AAU baseball in his hometown of West Roxbury while attending the Xaverian School in Westwood MA, graduating in 2020. He will graduate from Suffolk University with the class of 2024 with a



major in Criminal Justice and a minor in Sports Management.

Mike has assumed the role of Assistant General Manager of the team as of the 2024 season. In this very important position, he is doing a lot of heavy lifting to prepare for the summer season.

This includes working with the General Manager and Field Manager to identify and recruit the best players from colleges across the country. His traits of being exceptionally organized, knowledgeable, and reliably following up on ongoing activities have him well prepared for this role. He is also responsible for the development of the budget and for purchasing equipment and supplies. He is the liaison with the housing committee, which places players with host families. Mike recently attended the American College Baseball Coaches Association meeting in Dallas, TX on behalf of the Commodores where he met and interacted with the top college baseball coaches in the country and has begun establishing relationships for future interactions.

The team is very fortunate to have Mike with not only his talents,

but his extensive experience with the Commodores. His plan is to go to graduate school for a degree in advanced sports administration. Did we mention he also was a Francis Ouimet Scholar!

2023 SEASON RECAP

ONE LAST LOOK BACK AT FALMOUTH'S 2023 CAMPAIGN

The Falmouth Commodores are just over two months away from a new chapter. Before the page is officially moved to the 2024 season, though, it's time to take one last check-up on how things turned out in the 'Dores 2023 campaign.

Falmouth was slow to kick things in gear throughout the early stages of the Cape season. Following an 11-10 opener loss to Wareham, the Commodores went on to finish the first quarter of their campaign with a 3-6-2 record. Manager Jeff Trundy's squad notched a pair of early one-score victories against Harwich and Brewster, but additional defeats to Yarmouth-Dennis, Hyannis (twice), Orleans, and Bourne put the 'Dores at the backend of the West Division standings.

Things wouldn't get much easier from there. In its first duel with rival Cotuit, Falmouth was handed its biggest loss of the season in a 12-1 defeat. A day later, the Commodores were held to just one run against Chatham – a trend that also continued in their next two duels against Harwich and Hyannis.

After an off day, however, Trundy's team finally started to find its stride. The Commodores rattled off four straight wins against Orleans, Chatham, Brewster, and Wareham, averaging over eight runs per game through that span.

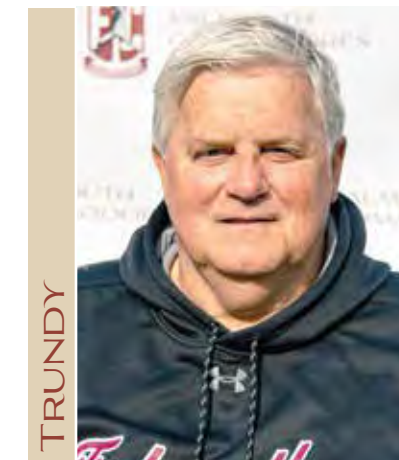

MIKE LANDRY ASSISTANT COACH

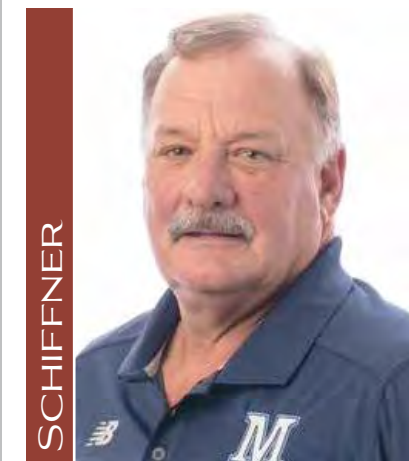

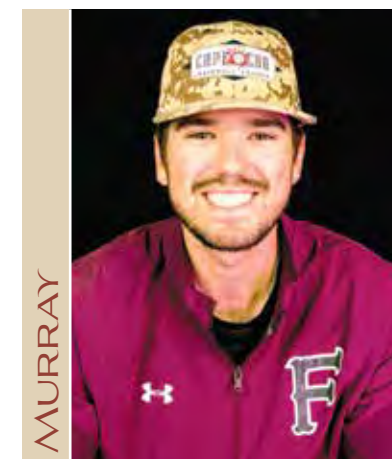
involved in the All-Star games at Fenway Park. Chuck then moved over to Bourne where he was the Treasurer for 2 years and General Manager for 4 years.

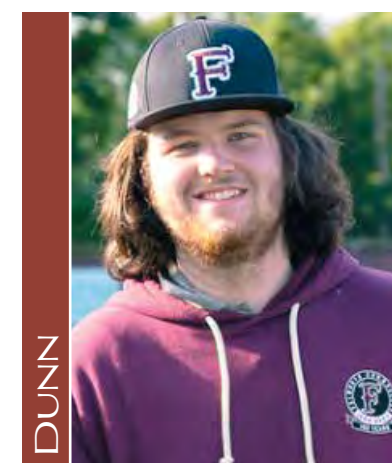

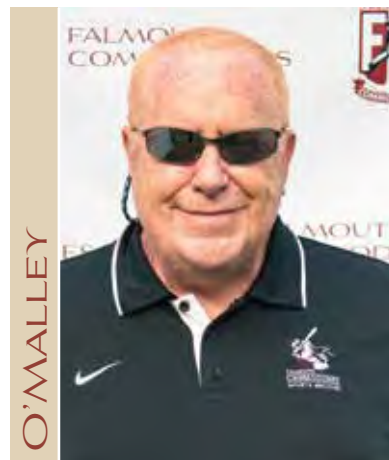

for the World Championships in Ireland. She is a Physician Assistant working for Falmouth Orthopedic Center, Cape Cod Healthcare, in Falmouth.

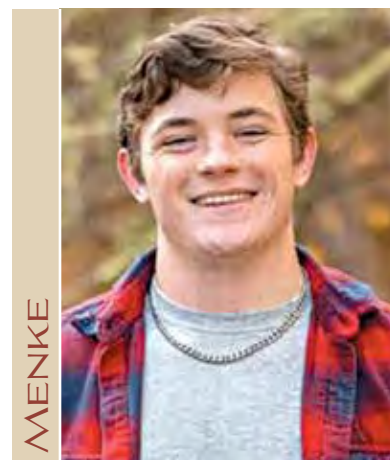
LAURA MURPHY, EDM, ATC, LAT, CSCS ATHLETIC TRAINER

Erich is returning this summer working with the Commodores AT staff. He is a rising junior at Endicott College majoring in Exercise Science/Pre-Athletic Training.



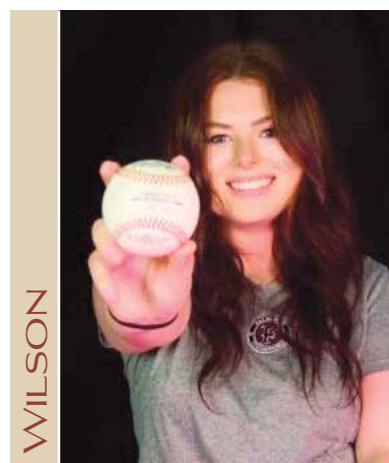

Enhanced audio technology and microphones will help bring the telecasts and audio broadcast to life. Did you hear the swat of the bat as it hit the baseball? Well, you will now!

A new Tricaster broadcast system, which many NCAA Division 1 colleges use, will enable more camera angles this season. Viewers will be able to see more of the game through a professional quality live stream.

CONNECTING WITH SEAN OLDREAD AND JOHN NOLAN



SEAN OLDREAD
ESPN PRODUCTION ASSISTANT
FALMOUTH COMMODORES INTERN 2021, 2022

A somewhat unplanned internship with the Falmouth Commodores lead Sean Oldread to change his career direction and college major. Sean interned with the Commodores in 2021 and 2022; first as a camera operator and then as Director of Broadcasting under Ernie Hyde. Sean is now a Production Assistant at ESPN, providing college basketball and football video highlights for half-time and pre- and post-game coverage.

As a rookie broadcaster in 2011, John Nolan was able to gain valuable experience during his internship with the Falmouth Commodores. His career has led him to become the Broadcasting and Media Relations Manager for the Fort Wayne TinCaps, a Minor League Baseball team of the Midwest League and the High-A affiliate of the San Diego Padres.

Recently, Sean and John both told us about their time as interns with the Commodores and how it prepared them for their current roles in sports media.

SEAN...

What are your responsibilities as a Production Assistant at ESPN?

Basically, my job is all of the clips that you see on ESPN, whether it's highlights, just some of the voiceover stuff, any of the press conferences you see on ESPN is being cut up by a production assistant. I'm on our RAPS team, which focuses on college football and college basketball. With college basketball the job is to run the halftime shows and those pre- and postgame shows that you see in between games on ESPN. My job is cutting up those highlights that you'll see on any of those studio shows for college basketball. Once we get to the fall, it'll be focused on college football. I think hopefully I'll get some college baseball in there once the college Baseball World Series comes around.

When you're watching college football, for example, if Matt Berry wants to talk about the Alabama Crimson tide for 20 seconds, we're cutting up 20 seconds of Alabama highlights, getting good shots of them, scoring touchdowns, big tackles, big plays, that type of thing. It is crazy to know that you cut something up and it goes out there and you can watch it run on tv, but then it could go out to socials and you could get hundreds of thousands, if not a million or more, impressions on something you worked on.

How did you get involved with the Commodores?

The first summer that I interned with the Commodores, I didn't know that I wanted to be involved in sports media at all. I was majoring in political science. We were all coming out of Covid, and I had a group of friends that were living down on the Cape and I wanted to figure out how I could live with them. Being a huge baseball fan, I figured that this was something I could do in my free time. I took a job as a camera operator because that was the only job that was available at the time, and I immediately fell in love with it.

Tell us what you did while interning with the Commodores?

I think that's what is unique about Falmouth is just the community that's made with those interns. You spend so

much time together over those 40 games that you become really, really tight. I wanted to come back and do it the second summer. Ernie Hyde, Director of Broadcasting & Media, brought me back as director of broadcasting that second summer, which I absolutely loved. That's where I feel like I really found exactly what I wanted to do with my career and the rest is kind of history. I went back to UMass and got super involved with student radio, student media, just trying to stay involved and do as much as I could. That's how I ended up on this path that led me to my career.

The internship combined with all the things I did on campus definitely prepared me for a job. It was a lot to learn, but it was so worth it. The Commodores give you a great place where you can learn so much, but there's also room to make mistakes, and I think that's the only way you truly learn. I didn't realize coming into Falmouth about how many great people you end up working with. Everybody's really, really talented. I met a couple of my best friends while interning for the Commodores. I am forever grateful for those moments.

What advice do you have for future interns?

Take every opportunity that you can. When you're on the Cape, go to the All-star games, go and do all the extra things. Learn about everybody else's position. Not only is it important to be good at what you do, but since I was the director my second summer there, it was also really important to know what everybody else was doing, how we can really improve the broadcast in the best way possible. Meet new people, make great friends, and go 'Dores!

JOHN...

What are your responsibilities as the Broadcasting & Media Relations Manager for the Fort Wayne TinCaps?

I am the team's play-by-play broadcaster for all of our home games on local TV and streaming online through a variety of platforms from MiLB.TV to even the MLB app. I also travel with the team and cover road games on radio. Out of the 120 teams in minor league baseball, I have one of the more unique positions in that I get to have both the home games on tv, whereas most minor league teams are just exclusively on radio. When you work in minor league baseball, you do wear a variety of hats.

Among my responsibilities, I manage the team's website, social media, media relations (writing press releases for the team or coordinating interviews with our players, coaches, and staff members). Here and there you need to help clean up trash or pull the tarp when the rain comes. Parkview Field has been ranked as the top ballpark in all of minor league baseball for any level. We have an awesome staff of people that I work alongside here. It's a great community that's similar to Falmouth and really supports their local baseball team.

I know it's been 13 years now, but how did you get involved with the Commodores?

In 2011, I was a student at Syracuse University, in the middle of my sophomore year. While Syracuse is known for producing lots of sportscasters and we get a terrific experience there covering Syracuse's football, basketball, lacrosse, and other sports, Syracuse does not have a baseball team. At that point in time, I was seeking experience in baseball play-by-play broadcasting. A guy who was a couple of classes ahead of me at Syracuse named Mike Couzens had previously spent a couple of summers with the Commodore and was one of my mentors. He introduced me to Pat Loftus, a saint of a guy whom unfortunately we lost too soon, who oversaw the Commodore broadcast program back then. I thank Mike and Pat for giving me the opportunity to join the Commodores back then. Fast forward, Mike ended up working for the Tin Caps after he graduated. I followed him to be an intern with the Tin Caps. Mike is now big time at ESPN and I wound up taking Mike's full-time job with the Tin Caps. I've been here for a decade and am still enjoying it.

Tell us what you did while interning with the Commodores. How did your internship with the Commodores prepare you for your future jobs in broadcasting?

I know things have really evolved technology wise and what Cape League teams like the Commodore are putting out there in terms of content has grown rapidly. Back then we were just broadcasting the home games. I was working alongside a couple of Syracuse guys that summer named Chet Davis and David Proper. Chet is now a TV news anchor in Albany, NY and David is a writer/reporter for the New York Post. We would trade off on doing play-by-play back then for home games. One of us would step over to do the PA announcing and operate the scoreboard. It was kind of basic as far as the broadcast goes, not necessarily the growing team that exists these days.

What did you like most about your time with the Commodores?

Oh, wow. It's neat now working in minor league baseball. So many of the prospects coming through here, not only on our side but with the opposing teams too, have played in the Cape League. From time-to-time, I have a guy here who played for the Commodores. Lee Solomon comes to mind in the last five years. He was teammates with Adley Rutschman, an infielder with the Commodores, who was a great success story. Yeah, just like I'm raving about my

summer interning, it's usually the best summer that these players ever had too.

What advice do you have for future interns?

To just have the opportunity to work for a team like the Commodores is a privilege. I hope they appreciate all of the great people that make the Commodores and the Cape Cod Baseball League possible. Back in my day, there was not the sophistication from the technology, so I hope that there's an appreciation for what everyone has now. It's definitely a point of pride to be able to represent the Falmouth community and have fun. The learning will happen with the broadcast, but just embrace what you have. Just have gratitude for all the people that make it possible.

A final memory to share from 2011, I think our team, which made it to the finals, had a slow start to the season and rallied thanks to Andrew Heaney as the ace who just won a World Series with the Rangers. That year our guys started the hashtag "Win It for Trundy", and so they came close and hope everyone can win it for Trundy this year. Another person who really helped to make the broadcast possible back then and overall enhance the experience was Rob Zeida, who was an unsung hero with the Commodores there during those years, and someone who's great in keeping in touch. It's wonderful to still have those relationships. I wish everyone the best for a winning season. Hopefully, one of these days, I'll get to make a return to Arnie Allen Diamond at Gov Fuller Field.

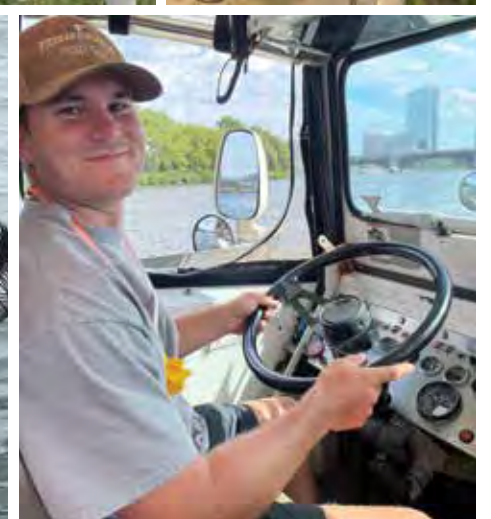

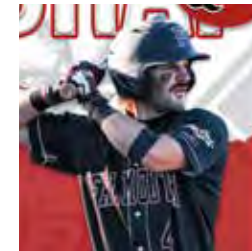

TRAVIS MILLER RUNS FOR A PURPOSE – THE CAPE COD BASEBALL LEAGUE HALL OF FAME

It all started back in 1973, when the first Falmouth Road Race from Woods Hole to Falmouth Heights Beach was run by only 100 registrants. Fifty (50) years later the Falmouth Road Race has grown to over 12,000 runners in 2023. The race founder, Tommy Leonard, had a vision that he brought to life – and it’s become bigger than I’m sure anyone ever imagined.

Tommy also wanted to use the opportunity to raise money for various charitable causes, with money from the first race donated to the Falmouth High School girls track team. The combination of running and community support remains a focus today.

Amongst the Hall of Famers, Olympic gold medalists, and world champions who have run the race is 12-year-old Travis Miller. On a hot muggy August morning in 2023, Travis (bib # 7648) successfully finished his first Falmouth Road Race – even with a smile during the last leg of the race.

Travis was sponsored by the Falmouth Commodores to raise money for the Cape Cod Baseball League Hall of Fame and brought in over \$1,400 for the cause, surpassing the \$1,000 entry goal. The Hall of Fame was established in 2000 to honor the many legends of the league. For several years it was housed adjacent to the Kennedy Museum in Hyannis, and a committee is currently looking for a new home for the museum.

Travis is a hockey and baseball fanatic, and longtime fan of the Falmouth Commodores. Growing up, he and his family have summered in Falmouth and attended many Commodores games. What drew Travis’ interest in running the road race? His mother Nina explains, “We went to see the race last year; it was his first time seeing it. We had some friends running it. I think we were at the six-mile mark when we saw some kids passing us and he was really jazzed up about it. He kept saying, “I think I can totally do this! What do you think? I think I’m going to start training today!” And that is what he did! Beginning in early March, Travis was running up to 12 miles weekly in preparation for the August race.

To help on the fundraising side, the Commodores honored Travis at the June 11th game against Bourne. Following a short introduction from the PA announcer, Miller took the mound for the ceremonial first pitch of the game and threw a neat strike down the heart of the plate for infielder Michael Eze (Georgetown). He then stepped up to the mic to utter the time-honored words that precede every game at Guv Fuller Field: “play ball”.

With Travis being so driven at such a young age, Nina was asked what she expected him to gain from this experience. She shared, “I wanted him to learn that if he wants to do something, that he should go after it. Things sometimes aren’t easy, so you really have to work hard if you want to get to the finish line.”

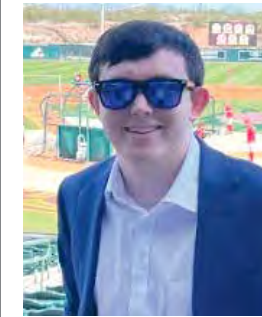

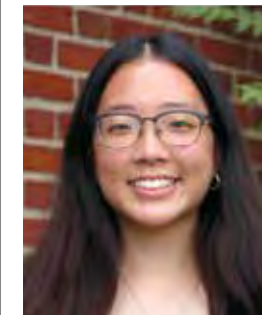

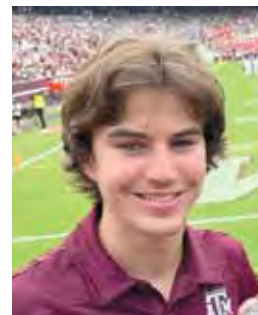

Can you imagine learning baseball skills from a future Major League Baseball (MLB) player? The Falmouth Commodores Youth Baseball Clinics offer boys and girls, 5 to 14 years of age, the opportunity to be coached and mentored by some of the top collegiate baseball players in the country – those who have the best chances of being drafted into the MLB!

Children attending the clinics have the experience of a lifetime. Players from great college programs like Oregon, Florida State, Texas A&M, Alabama, and others work in a small player-to coach ratio on building skills such as hitting, base running, infield/outfield play, as well as pitching and catching. Coaches and players also discuss topics like sportsmanship, academics, teamwork, and other issues important to being an all-around player.

THERE ARE THREE CLINIC LEVELS AVAILABLE BASED ON A PLAYER'S AGE AND EXPERIENCE:

- **The Rookie Clinic** (ages 5 to 7 years) focuses on drills, games, pitching, and fun.
- **The Advanced Clinic** (ages 8 to 10 years) focuses primarily on drills, games, and pitching.
- **The Elite Clinic** (ages 11-14) is for kids who have significant baseball experience through AAU Leagues, Little League, or similar.

The Youth Baseball Clinics have been a hallmark tradition of the Commodores, a team that celebrated its 100-year anniversary just last year, and the entire Cape Cod Baseball League for decades. It is just one of the many ways that the team has continued to connect with the local community.

HIGH POINT UNIVERSITY SPORT MANAGEMENT STUDENTS SCORE HOME RUN COLLABORATION WITH FALMOUTH COMMODORES

High Point University's sport management students stepped up to the plate this spring on an ambitious project aimed at enhancing the fan experience for the Falmouth Commodores, by improving the return on investment (ROI) of community gifts provided to fans. Spearheaded by Professor Amy Rundio, participants in the undergraduate-level Sports Executive Boardroom class worked hard to propose innovative solutions to address the challenge and help bolster the overall game-day experience.

As a non-profit organization, the Commodores are run entirely by volunteers and funded through the generous support of sponsors and donations. Each season sports management interns from colleges across the country come to gain valuable experience by helping to run the game operations, preparing for their careers in sports management. The Game Day interns work to improve the fan experience by representing Homer (the team mascot), running the 50/50 ticket raffle program, coordinating games for kids, and much more. Local businesses give donations to the Commodores in the form of prizes for the

50/50 raffle program. It is important that these donations be used for the most effective outcome.

The project's relevance stems from the Commodores' commitment to providing an unmatched experience for players, interns, and fans alike. As students worked hard to develop their solutions, they remained focused on delivering real outcomes that enhanced the game-day experience and strengthened the bond between the Commodores and their loyal fanbase.

The project was structured to emulate real-world scenarios, and saw students collaborating in groups to dissect challenges, conduct thorough research, analyze data, devise solutions, and ultimately crafted a comprehensive final project outlining their findings and recommendations.

Throughout the semester, students interacted with Joanne Hyde and Mark Ordway, Chairs of the Falmouth Commodores' Game Day Committee, through virtual meetings and email exchanges, fostering a continuous exchange of ideas and feedback. The students'

final proposals were then shared with the Falmouth Commodores' Game Day Committee.

Professor Rundio emphasized the significance of this collaboration. "One of the exciting things about this collaboration is that there are benefits for both the students and the Commodores," she stated. "It's great for the sports management students because they're getting practical experience and getting to present to people in the industry, all while providing and proposing solutions for the Commodores."

Ja'Niyah Williams, one of the project participants, expressed her excitement for the initiative, acknowledging its impact on her academic journey. "Partnering with the Falmouth Commodores has brought a whole new level of excitement to our coursework," said Williams. "It's an opportunity of a lifetime that is expanding my perspective and teaching me valuable skills I can't learn from textbooks alone."
