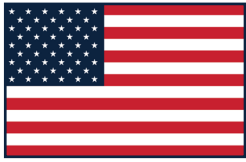

HISTORY AGAINST CHINESE TAIPEI

The U.S. and Chinese Taipei have a deep history at the collegiate level that dates back to 1987, as they two federations have played in 21 editions of the USA vs. Chinese Taipei International Friendship Series. The U.S. leads 17-0-4 in the overall series and leads the all-time game series 89-13-2. Of the four times the series has been played in Taiwan, the U.S. has won one of the series and the other three have been split. The U.S. has won each of the last five series, though, dating back to 2017.

The last time the teams met outside of the USA vs. Chinese Taipei International Friendship Series was in 2014 at the XXVIII Haarlem Baseball Week in The Netherlands. The teams met three times in the tournament, July 14, 18 and 19, and the U.S. won all three contests.

BACK IN THE RED, WHITE, AND BLUE

This year's roster is highlighted by three national team alumni. For Ryan McPherson (Mississippi State), this is his third national team appearance after playing on USA Baseball's 2021 15U National Team and last year's Collegiate National Team. 2024 18U National Team gold medalists Trent Grindlinger (Tennessee) and Nico Partida (Texas A&M) have been reunited and will play together for the second time in their careers.

ABOUT THE WORLD COLLEGIATE BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

USA Baseball, Chinese Taipei Baseball Association (CTBA), and Japan University Baseball Federation (JUBF) jointly created the World Collegiate Baseball Championship (WCBC), and 2026 marks the inaugural event. As the founding federations, USA Baseball, Chinese Taipei Baseball Association, and Japan University Baseball Federation will compete in the event each year, while the fourth team will be a wild card participant selected by the host country. The host country, as well as the wild card participant, will rotate annually. This year's host country, Chinese Taipei, has invited Korea, who will represent the Korea Baseball Softball Association (KBSA), as the wild card team.

2026 ROSTER BREAKDOWN

Twenty-one schools and five conferences in the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) are represented on the 2026 Collegiate National Team roster. Florida leads all schools with three players apiece, the most of all

schools, while Auburn, Mississippi State, Oregon, Texas, and UCLA have two representatives each on the list. The Southeastern Conference (SEC) boasts 15 athletes on the roster to lead all conferences, followed by the Big Ten with six, the Big 12 with four, the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) with two, and the Sun Belt Conference with one.

RUNS IN THE FAMILY

For Collegiate National Team members Tague Davis and Landon Hairston, baseball runs in the family. Davis's dad, Ben, played on USA Baseball's 18U National Team in 1994 and was the second overall pick of the 1995 MLB Draft by the San Diego Padres. He played seven years in the big leagues with the Padres, Mariners, and White Sox. Hairston comes from a long line of big-league players. His dad, Scott, is an 11-year MLB veteran, while his great uncle, Johnny, uncle, Jerry Jr. grandfather, Jerry, and great grandfather, Sam, all had stints in the big leagues.

COLLEGIATE NATIONAL TEAM SELECTION PROCESS

The primary pool of players under consideration for the Collegiate National Team is comprised of non-draft-eligible players currently playing baseball at the collegiate level. A selection of the year's USA Baseball Collegiate National Team field staff and USA Baseball staff members evaluate data from the current college season, as well as possibly data from the prior summer collegiate wood bat leagues, to select 56 players to travel to Cary, North Carolina, for a training camp. The players participate in workouts, practices, and intrasquad scrimmages, and at the conclusion of the training camp a final roster is determined based on that year's competition and roster size limit.

THE GREATEST SHOW ON DIRT

Five players on this year's Collegiate National Team participated with their respective schools in the NCAA Men's College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska: Kolby Branch (Georgia), Walker Hooks (Ole Miss), Luke Harrison (Texas), Anthony Pack Jr. (Texas), and Gavin Kelly (West Virginia).

GOING WAY BACK

For Landon Hairston and Ryker Waite, this summer isn't the first time they have played together on the same team. They go way back as they are both from Queen Creek, Arizona, and played together on travel ball from eight years old through their high school years. They played for rival high schools and matched up against each other annually, as Hairston played at Casteel and Waite played at Queen Creek.

2026 COACHING STAFF

This year's team is led by manager Dan Hartleb, and he is assisted by pitching coach Matt Hobbs and assistants Jonathan Hernandez, Tracy Smith, and Tom Walter. Together they have a combined 150 years of coaching experience across the high school and collegiate levels of the game. Hernandez, who was recently named the Southwestern Athletic Conference Coach of the Year for the second consecutive season, just completed his eighth season at the helm of Bethune-Cookman, and Hobbs just wrapped up his eighth season as pitching coach for Arkansas. Hartleb, who has been the head coach at Illinois for 21 seasons, is the winningest head coach in program history, while Smith and Walter each own more than three decades of coaching experience. Smith is currently the head coach at Michigan while Walter has been at the helm of Wake Forest's program since

2026 USA BASEBALL COLLEGIATE NATIONAL TEAM COACHING STAFF



DAN HARTLEB

MANAGER

University of Illinois Head Coach Dan Hartleb will manage the 2026 Collegiate National Team. This year will mark Hartleb's managerial debut, but he is no stranger to USA Baseball as he has coached in a multitude of roles with national team programming for more than a decade. His USA Baseball resumé includes serving as an assistant coach at last year's Collegiate National Team Training Camp and as an assistant coach for the 2021 Collegiate National Team.

Hartleb will head to Cary after wrapping up his 21st season as head coach at Illinois and 36th on the coaching staff. He is the winningest head coach in program history, as he owns 625 wins across his tenure with the school. Prior to taking the head coaching role in 2006, he was the pitching coach and associate head coach from 1991-2005. He has led the Illini to three Big Ten titles, five appearances in the NCAA Tournament, and the program's first Super Regional appearance in 2015. Thanks to the team's historic 2015 season, Hartleb was named Big Ten Coach of the Year, ABCA Midwest Region Coach of the Year, a National Coach of the Year finalist, and eventually the Big Ten Coach of the Decade for the 2010s.

In his 36 seasons in Champaign, Hartleb has established consistent success and has been instrumental in player development. Every Illini that has played four years for Hartleb has left with a winning percentage of .500 or better, and his teams have finished with a record of .500 or better in 18 of 20 seasons under his leadership. Since joining the staff in 1991, Hartleb has produced a combined 34 All-Americans, seven Big Ten Players of the Year, five Big Ten Pitchers of the Year, and 47 All-Big Ten First Team selections. Additionally, 76 players have been selected in the MLB Draft, including 24 in the first 10 rounds, and 13 have reached the major leagues.

Hartleb has previously worked with USA Baseball on numerous occasions, including as a member of the staff at the 14U and 17U National Team Development Programs (NTDP) in 2014 and 2016, respectively, as an assistant coach for the 2021 Collegiate National Team, as the manager of Team Light Blue at the 2023 16U/17U NTDP, and most recently as the bench/hitting coach at the 2025 Collegiate National Team Training Camp.

Hartleb began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach at Southern Illinois University in 1989-90. A two-year letterwinner at SIU, Hartleb finished his playing career with a .305 batting average. As a senior, Hartleb appeared in 56 contests as a catcher. Hartleb transferred to Southern Illinois from John A. Logan Community College, where he was a junior college all-star catcher. At Hamilton High School in Hamilton, Ohio, Hartleb was a standout athlete in both baseball and football. He was inducted into Hamilton High School's Hall of Fame in February 2002.



MATT HOBBS

PITCHING COACH

Matt Hobbs, the 2024 D1Baseball Assistant Coach of the Year, will join this year's Collegiate National Team staff as pitching coach. He brings more than 20 years of coaching experience with him to the stars and stripes, highlighted by eight seasons with college baseball powerhouse Arkansas where he currently serves as the program's pitching coach.

Hobbs has put together an illustrious coaching career with the Razorbacks, as he has helped develop 10 All-Americans, 12 All-SEC honorees, including two conference pitchers of the year, and 30 MLB draft selections since joining Arkansas ahead of the 2019 campaign. Under Hobbs' tutelage, Kevin Kopps won both the Golden Spikes Award and Dick Howser Trophy in 2021, and Hagen Smith developed into the unanimous national pitcher of the year and became the highest-drafted pitcher in program history in 2024. Since Hobbs joined the Razorback coaching staff, Arkansas has made three trips to the College World Series (2019, 2022 & 2025), clinched a pair of overall SEC championships (2021, 2023) and captured four SEC Western Division titles (2019, 2021, 2023, 2024).

Before Arkansas, Hobbs spent four years at Wake Forest, joining in 2014 and staying on staff through the 2018 season. In each of his first three years in Winston-Salem, the Demon Deacons improved in ERA (5.73 to 5.24 to 4.11), strikeouts (364 to 435 to a program-record 559), walks per nine (5.03 to 4.35 to 3.83) and opponent batting average (.281 to .280 to .247). While at Wake Forest, Hobbs was a coach at USA Baseball's 2015 Tournament of Stars.

Before arriving at Wake Forest, Hobbs spent four years (2011-2014) as the pitching coach at Missouri, his alma mater. During his four years in Columbia, Hobbs had seven of his pitchers drafted and guided four players to all-conference honors. Hobbs has also made stops in his coaching career at San Francisco (2010), UC San Diego (2007-2009), and Santa Barbara City College (2005-2006).

Over the course of Hobbs' coaching career, more than 50 of his pitchers have either been drafted or signed pro contracts. Hobbs has also helped develop numerous big leaguers over his college coaching career, including Dylan Axelrod (Santa Barbara City College), Isaiah Campbell (Arkansas), Guido Knudson (UC San Diego), Matt Stites (Missouri), Rob Zastryzny (Missouri), and Kyle Zimmer (San Francisco).

Hobbs pitched at Missouri from 1999-2002, where he won 13 games and struck out 125 batters. Hobbs was drafted twice, first by the San Diego Padres in 2001 and then by the Kansas City Royals in 2002.

TOM WALTER

ASSISTANT COACH

Wake Forest Head Coach Tom Walter will make his national team coaching debut by joining the 2026 Collegiate National Team staff as an assistant coach. Walter has had previous touch points with USA Baseball's national team programming, as he was a coach at the 2016 17U National Team Development Program and the 2018 18U National Team Training Camp.

Walter is in his 17th season at the helm of the Demon Deacons and has led the program to five straight postseason appearances (seven total), highlighted by a trip to the Men's College World Series in 2023. The 2023 season was historic for Walter and the Deacs, as they captured the ACC regular season title, set program records in regular season wins (45), ACC wins (22), ACC series wins (10), postseason wins (9), and overall wins (54), and made an appearance in Omaha for the first time since 1955. Additionally, Walter was named the ACC Coach of the Year and the National Coach of the Year thanks to the team's success.

Earlier this season he earned his 500th win at Wake Forest and owns the second-most wins in program history as the Deacs have finished with a winning record in 13 of the last 14 seasons. During his tenure in Winston-Salem, Walter has helped 64 players get drafted or sign pro contracts over the last 10 years, including 14 Deacs drafted among the top 50 picks and nine first rounders since 2020. Additionally, he has guided 23 players to All-America honors, 47 to All-ACC honors, and four players to conference, regional, and national superlatives. Will Craig was named the ACC Player of the Year (2015) and National Player of the Year (2016), Bobby Seymour was named the 2019 ACC Player of the Year, Rhett Lowder was the two-time ACC Pitcher of the Year (2022-2023) and the NCBWA District 4 Player of the Year in 2023, and Chase Burns earned ACC Pitcher of the Year honors in 2024.

Walter also spent time as the head coach at the University of New Orleans (2005-2009), and George Washington University (1997-2004), and is one of just three active head coaches in the country to lead three different programs to the NCAA Division I Tournament. During his time at New Orleans, he helped the Privateers to consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances in 2007 and 2008. At George Washington, Walter averaged 39 wins at season and is the school's all-time wins leader with 273 wins, led the Colonials to an NCAA Tournament appearance in 2002, and saw 26 players go on to play professionally. While he was there, Walter also was the head coach for the Cotuit Kettlers of the Cape Cod Baseball League in the 1997 and 1998 seasons, leading the Kettlers to the playoffs in 1997. At Cotuit, Walter coached eight players who went on to the majors and 25 players who signed professional contracts.

Walter also was a head coach of the New Market (Va.) Rebels during the summer of 1994 while he was an assistant coach for the Colonials, where he led the team to the Shenandoah Valley League title. Before going to GW, Walter spent two years as an assistant general manager with the Greensboro Bats, performing various duties for the then-New York Yankees Class A affiliate.

Walter played at Georgetown University and started all four seasons either behind the plate or in the outfield. He served as team captain in 1990 and 1991 and was named to the 1991 Big East Conference All-Academic Team.



JONATHAN HERNANDEZ

ASSISTANT COACH

Bethune-Cookman Head Coach Jonathan Hernandez will return to USA Baseball this summer as an assistant coach for the 2026 Collegiate National Team. This summer will be his second time on a national team coaching staff after serving as the manager for the Stripes Team and Collegiate National Team Prospects squad at last year's Training Camp. Hernandez has been involved with the organization in a coaching capacity since 2012, as he has been a part of various Task Force teams for identification events and was a pitching coach at the 2015 14U National Team Development Program.

Hernandez, the 2025 and 2026 Southwestern Athletic Conference Coach of the Year, has held the head coaching position at Bethune-Cookman since 2019. He owns 190 wins and counting, including four consecutive 30-win seasons. The 2025 season was historic for the program, as the Wildcats won their first-ever Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) championship title to give the Wildcats its first NCAA Regional berth since 2017.

During his time at Bethune-Cookman, he has produced three SWAC Relief Pitchers of the Year, two Newcomers of the Year, one Player of the Year, one Pitcher of the Year, and one Co-Hitter of the Year.

Hernandez joined Bethune-Cookman after four years at ASA College in Miami. He served as the school's first head coach after being named to the post in May 2014. He was responsible for all of ASA's program aspects and helped ASA to a Division 2 Region 8 Conference runner-up finish in 2016 and a conference championship title in 2017. During those two seasons he guided a combined 11 players to All-Region 8 District Team distinction. Prior to the appointment at ASA, Hernandez was the head coach for six years at Hialeah High School in his hometown of Miami from 2008-2014. During his stint with the Thoroughbreds, his 2011 team reached the State Final Four, and in 2013 he was named the Miami Dade High School Class 8-A District 13 Coach of the Year. He had a number of his former players go on to play college and professional baseball, including Rangel Ravelo and Nestor Cortes. Both were drafted out of Hialeah High by the Chicago White Sox and New York Yankees

TRACY SMITH

ASSISTANT COACH

Michigan Head Coach Tracy Smith will make his national team coaching debut this summer when he joins the 2026 Collegiate National Team staff as an assistant coach. Smith recently wrapped up his fourth season at the helm of the Wolverines program and has nearly three decades of head coaching experience, including 932 career wins, that he will bring with him to the stars and stripes. He is just one of three active coaches all-time to bring three different Division I schools to the NCAA Tournament.

Smith has made a name for himself with developing talent, as he has produced a combined 90 MLB Draft selections in his head coaching career, with Wolverine alums Mitch Voit (2025) and Connor O'Halloran (2023) being his latest draftees. Since taking over at Michigan, he has led 18 Wolverines to All-Big Ten teams, highlighted by O'Halloran being named the 2023 Pitcher of the Year. Voit was the first player in his tenure to collect multiple All-America honors before being selected as a first-round pick by the New York Mets.

Prior to Michigan, Smith spent seven seasons at Arizona State (2015-2021) where he led the Sun Devils to an NCAA Tournament appearance four times in six seasons. While at ASU he saw 30 players selected in the MLB Draft, including the No. 1 overall pick of Spencer Torkelson in 2020 and fellow first rounders Alike Williams (2020) and Hunter Bishop (2019).

While at Indiana from 2006-2014, Smith earned National Coach of the Year and Big Ten Coach of the Year honors in 2013 after leading Indiana to the school's only Men's College World Series appearance in a 49-win campaign. Smith mentored two Big Ten Players of the Year, three Big Ten Pitchers of the Year, and a pair of Big Ten Freshman of the Year in his time with the Hoosiers. He also mentored Kyle Schwarber, who was Indiana's highest draft pick in program history when he was selected fourth overall to the Chicago Cubs in 2014. While in Bloomington, he coached at USA Baseball's 2013 14U National Team Development Program.

Before his time at Indiana, Smith led his alma mater, Miami University (Ohio), for nine seasons (1997-2005). He compiled eight consecutive 30-win seasons, two NCAA Regional appearances, and advanced to the Mid-American Conference Tournament finals six times.

He began his coaching career as head coach at Miami University-Middletown in 1990, served as an assistant coach at Miami (Ohio) from 1993-1994, and was the pitching coach at Indiana from 1995-1996.
