HISTORY AGAINST BRAZIL

Team USA and Brazil have met seven times at the professional level dating back to 1999, with the U.S. winning all seven matchups. The U.S. won the first meeting, 3-2, at the 1999 Pan American Games with a team highlighted by Los Angeles Dodgers manager Dave Roberts and 14-year MLB veteran Brad Penny. Most recently, the United States beat Brazil 8-7 in the 2006 Olympic Qualifier, with current MLB managers Skip Schumaker (Texas Rangers) and Kurt Suzuki (Los Angeles Angels) suiting up for the U.S. in that contest.

IN HIS WEBB

U.S. starting pitcher Logan Webb has been a model of consistency over the last few years, leading all of baseball in innings pitched (627.2) since 2023. The righthander tossed a career-high 216.0 innings in 2023, led the National League in innings pitched in 2024 (204.2), and led the Major Leagues with 207.0 frames in 2025. He's one of two pitchers in MLB with 32+ starts in each of the last four seasons (also: Dylan Cease).

BACK IN THE RED, WHITE, AND BLUE

Thirteen players on the 2026 WBC roster are returning to USA Baseball after previously playing for the organization. Alex Bregman will appear on a Team USA roster for the sixth time after playing for the 16U National Team, 18U National Team twice, Collegiate National Team twice, and 2017 World Baseball Classic team. 2026 will mark Pete Crow-Armstrong's fifth USA Baseball appearance.

GOLDY X3

Paul Goldschmidt is on Team USA's World Baseball Classic roster for the third time in his career, becoming the first player in USA Baseball history to play in three different WBCs. Goldschmidt won a gold medal with the U.S. in 2017, playing in five games for the stars and stripes before batting .280 in a silver-medal run in 2023.

FROM 12U TO WBC

The 2026 World Baseball Classic won't be the first time Pete Crow-Armstrong and Paul Skenes suit up together for Team USA. The duo first donned the stars and stripes in 2014 for the 12U National Team, claiming a silver medal at the COPABE Pan Am "A" Championship. Crow-Armstrong combined with St. Louis Cardinals shortstop Masyn Winn to throw a no-hitter against Panama, with Skenes catching behind the dish.

FOR COUNTRY

Team USA relief pitcher Griffin Jax represents Team USA in more ways than one. In addition to his role in the bullpen, Jax is a Captain in the U.S. Air Force Reserve. Jax became the first Air Force Academy graduate to ever play in MLB when he made his big-league debut for the Minnesota Twins in 2021.

MR. UTILITY

Team USA infielder Ernie Clement was the only player in baseball last season to make 15+ appearances at first base, second base, shortstop, and third base. He became the ninth player in MLB history to accomplish the feat and the first since Marwin González in 2017.

BILLION DOLLAR TEAM

Bryce Harper returns to USA Baseball for the first time since 2009, when he played for that year's iconic 18U National Team that has gone on to have major success in the big leagues. Harper was one of eight players from that roster to make it to the Show, including Nick Castellanos, Kevin Gausman, Manny Machado, Robbie Ray, and Jameson Taillon. Team USA ran the table in the COPABE Pan Am "AAA" Championships, going 8-0 and winning gold.

PETE CROW'S ARM'S STRONG

Team USA outfielder Pete Crow-Armstrong is one of the best defensive players in the game, and his Baseball Savant page shows it. According to Savant, Crow-Armstrong ranks in the 100th percentile in Outs Above Average, 99th percentile in Fielding Run Value, and 94th percentile in arm strength.

THE BEST OF THE BEST

Only four players in baseball have accumulated 20+ bWAR over the last three seasons, and three of them play for Team USA: Gunnar Henderson, Aaron Judge, and Bobby Witt Jr. The only other player to post 20+ bWAR in that time frame is Shohei Ohtani of Team Japan.

HOF TRAJECTORY

U.S. stars Bryce Harper and Aaron Judge are two of just nine players in MLB history to win Rookie of the Year and multiple MVP awards, joining a list that includes Johnny Bench, Willie Mays, Shohei Ohtani, Albert Pujols, Cal Ripken Jr., Frank Robinson, and Mike Trout. Bench, Mays, Ripken Jr., and Robinson are all in the Baseball Hall of Fame.

SNELLVILLE'S FINEST

A pair of U.S. relievers share a birthplace, as both Brad Keller and Garrett Whitlock were born in Snellville, Georgia. Keller played high school baseball at nearby Flowery Branch High School, while Whitlock played for Providence Christian Academy.

COACHING STAFF

MARK DEROSA MANAGER

Mark DeRosa was named manager of Team USA for the 2026 World Baseball Classic on April 10, 2025. DeRosa returns for his second consecutive stint with the stars and stripes after he led the U.S. to a silver medal at the 2023 iteration.

DeRosa, a seventh-round pick by the Atlanta Braves in the 1996 MLB Draft out of the University of Pennsylvania, spent 16 seasons in the big leagues. He made his MLB debut with Atlanta in 1998, playing for seven seasons with the Braves before spending the following two seasons with the Texas Rangers. DeRosa then played for two seasons with the Chicago Cubs before clubbing a career-high 23 home runs in a 2009 campaign split between the Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Cardinals. He wrapped up his playing career with two seasons with the San Francisco Giants before playing a year each for the Washington Nationals and Toronto Blue Jays. DeRosa started at eight different positions throughout his career and finished with 100 home runs and 494 RBIs, posting a .268 batting average.

DeRosa also suited up for the stars and stripes in the 2009 WBC, playing a key role in Team USA's first ever trip to the tournament's semifinal round. He played in six games and batted .316 while driving in a team-high nine runs. After retiring from his playing career, DeRosa began a career as a host and analyst at MLB Network. He joined MLB Network in a full-time capacity in 2013 and currently serves as a co-host on MLB Central alongside Robert Flores and Lauren Shehadi.

MICHAEL YOUNG BENCH COACH

Michael Young, a perennial All-Star throughout his career, brings 14 seasons of big-league experience to his post as bench coach at the 2026 World Baseball Classic. The former infielder was selected in the fifth round of the 1997 MLB Draft by the Toronto Blue Jays and was traded to the Texas Rangers in 2000, where he spent the first 13 seasons of his career and made seven All-Star Game appearances. He was named to the Midsummer Classic every year from 2004 to 2009, playing 135 or more games in each of those seasons. Young collected over 200 hits in six different campaigns, including an MLB-leading 221 in 2005—winning the AL batting title—and 213 in 2011. He played his final big-league season split between the Philadelphia Phillies and the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2013 before retiring at the conclusion of that season. Young, who was inducted into the Texas Rangers Baseball Hall of Fame in 2016 and had his No. 10 retired by the Club in 2019, also played for Team USA in the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006 and assisted DeRosa in 2023. He is currently a special assistant to the general manager for the Rangers.

ANDY PETTITTE PITCHING COACH

Andy Pettitte returns to his role as pitching coach for Team USA at the 2026 World Baseball Classic. Throughout his 18-year career in the Bigs, Pettitte won five World Series titles with the New York Yankees—who drafted the southpaw in the 22nd round of the 1990 MLB Draft—and was a three-time All-Star. He made his debut for the Yankees in 1995 and won four world championships in five years from 1996 to 2000 and earned ALCS MVP honors in 2001. Pettitte also won a World Series with the Yanks in 2009 and finished his postseason career with 19 wins, including five in World Series games. He concluded his career with 256 victories and a 3.85 ERA, and his No. 46 jersey was retired by the New York Yankees in 2015. In 2019, Pettitte earned the USA Baseball Volunteer Coach of the Year award after serving as a pitching coach in the inaugural Prospect Development Pipeline (PDP) League.

SEAN CASEY HITTING COACH

A 12-year MLB veteran, Sean Casey will be a hitting coach for the United States at the 2026 World Baseball Classic. Casey was drafted in the second round of the 1995 MLB Draft by the Cleveland Indians and debuted with the big-league Club in 1997. Casey was acquired by the Cincinnati Reds—whose Hall of Fame he was inducted into in 2012—for his second season and put together his first All-Star campaign in 1999, batting .332 with 25 home runs and 99 RBIs to earn MVP votes. Casey socked another 20 homers in 2000 and made another appearance in the Midsummer Classic in 2001, when he hit .310 with 40 doubles and 89 RBIs. Casey had his third All-Star campaign in 2004, tying a career high in RBIs with 99 while also hitting 44 doubles and 24 home runs. He wrapped up his career with the Pittsburgh Pirates, Detroit Tigers, and Boston Red Sox, finishing his 12-year career with 130 home runs and a .302 batting average. Casey, who spent time as the New York Yankees hitting coach in 2023, is currently an analyst on MLB Network.

MATT HOLLIDAY HITTING COACH

A three-time USA Baseball alum and seven-time MLB All-Star, Matt Holliday will serve as the hitting coach for the United States at the 2026 World Baseball Classic. Holliday was selected in the seventh round of the 1998 MLB Draft by the Colorado Rockies and spent his first five big-league seasons with the Club, making three-consecutive All-Star game appearances from 2006-2008. He put together three more All-Star campaigns with the St. Louis Cardinals from 2010-2012, receiving MVP votes in two of those seasons. Holliday ended up spending eight seasons with St. Louis before wrapping up his playing career with the New York Yankees and one more season in Colorado. Holliday hit 316 home runs in his 15-year MLB career, batting .299 with an .889 OPS. He also played for Team USA on three separate occasions, competing for the 18U National Team in 1997, the Professional National Team in 2003, and the World Baseball Classic squad in 2006.

GEORGE LOMBARD FIRST BASE COACH

George Lombard, the bench coach for the Detroit Tigers, will be the first base coach for the United States at the 2026 World Baseball Classic. Drafted in the second round by the Atlanta Braves in 1994, Lombard spent time in the big leagues with the Braves, Detroit Tigers, Tampa Bay Devil Rays, and Washington Nationals. Lombard's playing career concluded in 2006, and he began his professional coaching career in 2010 as the hitting coach for the Single-A Lowell Spinners before earning a managerial gig for the Rookie-level Gulf Coast Red Sox in 2011 and 2012. Lombard continued his ascent through the Minor League system, becoming a roving outfield and baserunning coordinator for Boston's farm system in 2012. He got his first big-league coaching gig as first base coach for the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2015, spending six seasons in that role and capping it with a World Series title in 2020. Following the championship season, Lombard was named bench coach for the Tigers, a role he still currently holds.

DINO EBEL THIRD BASE COACH

Current Los Angeles Dodgers Third Base Coach Dino Ebel will return to Team USA in the same position after serving on staff at the 2023 World Baseball Classic, and more recently, the 2024 Premier12 tournament. Ebel returned to the Dodgers organization as third base coach in 2019 and has helped lead them to five NL West titles and the 2020 and 2024 World Series titles. In his playing days, Ebel signed with the Dodgers as a free agent in 1988 after winning the Division II baseball championship with Florida Southern College; he then spent eight years in their farm system. Ebel served eight years as a manager across multiple Minor League levels for the Dodgers before joining the Los Angeles Angels organization in 2005 as the Triple-A Salt Lake Bees manager. The Angels elevated him to the big leagues as the third base coach in 2006, a position he would hold until being named bench coach in 2014. He returned to Angels third base coach duties again in 2018 before re-joining the Dodgers in 2019.

DAVID ROSS BULLPEN COACH

David Ross takes over bullpen coach duties for the World Baseball Classic in 2026, bringing with him 15 years of playing experience and four seasons as a big-league manager. The former catcher most recently spent four seasons as manager for the Chicago Cubs from 2020-2023, guiding the Club to a playoff appearance in his first season in 2020. Prior to his managerial gig, Ross played for seven teams across 15 years in MLB. He debuted with the Los Angeles Dodgers in 2002 and played there for three seasons. In 2006, Ross posted a career-best season with 21 home runs and 52 RBIs for the Cincinnati Reds and later spent four seasons with the Atlanta Braves from 2009-2012. After winning a World Series with the Boston Red Sox in 2013, Ross concluded his playing career with two seasons with the Cubs, becoming the oldest player in MLB history to hit a World Series home run (39 years old) in Game 7 of the 2016 World Series to help Chicago win its first title since 1908. He was named a special assistant for the Cubs following his retirement and appeared as a baseball analyst on ESPN prior to being Chicago's manager from 2020-2023.

FREDI GONZÁLEZ ASSISTANT MANAGER

Fredi González will be an assistant manager on Mark DeRosa's staff at the 2026 World Baseball Classic, bringing with him a decade of managerial experience. After six seasons as a catcher in the New York Yankees' system, González began his professional coaching career as manager for the Miami Miracle (A+) in 1990. He joined the Florida Marlins' organization in 1992 and climbed his way to the big-league staff in 1999, spending two seasons as the third base coach for the Fish. After a stint with the Richmond Braves (AAA) in 2002, González became a coach on Atlanta's Major League staff in 2003. He earned his first big-league managerial gig ahead of the 2007 season with the Florida Marlins, where he spent four seasons and posted two winning campaigns. In 2010, González was named manager of the Atlanta Braves, a position he held until 2016. He led the Braves to two 90-plus-win seasons and two playoff appearances in his six seasons at the helm. González then returned to Miami as a big-league coach for three years before spending 2020-2024 on Baltimore's coaching staff and 2025 with the Braves.

BRIAN MCCANN ASSISTANT MANAGER

Brian McCann, a seven-time All-Star, six-time Silver Slugger Award winner, and Team USA alumnus, will be an assistant manager under Mark DeRosa at the 2026 World Baseball Classic. After being selected in the second round of the 2002 MLB Draft by the Atlanta Braves, McCann went on to have a 15-year career in the Bigs, spending 10 of those seasons in Atlanta. He appeared in the MLB All-Star game in six consecutive seasons from 2006-2011, hitting 20-or-more home runs in five of those campaigns. McCann, who also had stints for the New York Yankees and the Houston Astros, finished his standout career with 282 home runs and a .262 batting average. The Athens, Georgia, native is the only catcher in MLB history to win a Silver Slugger Award in both the American League and National League. He was a teammate of Team USA Manager Mark DeRosa on the United States roster at the 2009 WBC, batting .333 with six RBIs and a 1.194 OPS. McCann was also a member of DeRosa's staff in 2023, serving as an assistant.
