In 2006 the Bourne Braves began playing at a brand new field located within the Barry J Motta Athletic Complex behind Upper Cape Technical High School. The new location allows for larger crowds and the Braves an opportunity to host CCBL All Star games but most importantly gives our fans a world class field to watch their beloved Braves.

On July 8th, 2007 the baseball field was officially dedicated in the name of George Doran, Sr., a longtime Sagamore Beach resident and avid baseball fan. Doran Park was officially commemorated with a sign unveiling and on field dedication ceremony. Highlights of the day's festivities included George's grandson, Patrick, throwing out the first pitch along with his Dad, John, and Katherine Doherty, George's eldest great-grandchild, singing both the National Anthem and God Bless America. John Doran, son of George Sr., was the family member most instrumental in finding this way to celebrate his Dad's legacy.

In 2008 the Bourne Braves played their home games under the lights for the first time in Braves history. On June 11th, 2008 the Bourne Braves, the Cape Cod Baseball League, Upper Cape Technical High School, The Doran Family and many members of the community came out to celebrate the newly light Doran Park with a Lighting Ceremony. Former Bourne Brave and Boston Red Sox, Lou Merloni, was on hand

to address the players are the privilege of playing in the Cape League and relay some stories of his time in Bourne. It was a truly memorable evening at the lights shone brightly at Doran Park for the first time.

HISTORY & STATS

The Town of Bourne is a medium-sized community at the gateway to Cape Cod - You must pass through the Town to get over the Cape Cod Canal and anywhere else on Cape Cod. Long used by the Pilgrims during the 1620's as a center for trading activities, Aptucxet Trading Post was built in 1627, and the area was settled as a part of the Town of Sandwich by 1640, before finally being incorporated as the Town of Bourne in 1884.

CAPE COD!

The Cape Cod Canal, operated by the Army Corps of Engineers, bisects the community, with both the Bourne and the Sagamore Bridges, as well as the Buzzards Bay Railroad Bridge, being the only means to cross the Canal, unless you're travelling by boat. The Canal is world renowned for its superb sport fishing, scenic vistas, relaxing bike rides & walking routes, and for carrying vessels of all sizes flying the flags of all nations.

Bourne Scenic Park, founded in 1951 and run by the independent Bourne Recreation Authority, is located beneath the Bourne Bridge along the Canal, and is a perfect location for those seeking to enjoy the Canal and its' many activities. Bourne has numerous quiet harbors and inlets for boating and swimming, and the fishing & shellfishing in the area is particularly enticing and considered some of the most diverse in Massachusetts.



Bourne is also home of the National Marine Life Center, an independent, non-profit, rehabilitation & release hospital for the treatment of stranded sea turtles and seals, with future plans to expand to treat dolphins, porpoises, and small whales. The Center has been steadily growing since treating its' first patient in the Summer of 2004, and is destined to become the primary care center and information hub on Cape Cod regarding marine animals and their environment. It is a guiet community without the continual Summer tourist crush experienced by some of the other Cape communities. During the Summer, there are weekly Concerts In The Park, the July 4th Parade has proven quite popular, the annual Bourne Scallop Festival is held in September each year, bringing visitors from all across North America, and in December there's A Canal Christmas to help celebrate the Holiday Season.

- Fans with young children or who may not want to continuously be alert should sit behind the fenced/screened areas.
- All fans assume all risks and dangers incidental to the game of baseball, whether occurring prior to, during, or subsequent to the actual playing of the game.
- The participating teams, organizations, and players are not liable for injuries resulting from such causes.

Bourne Braves - Doran Park, Upper Cape Tech, Sandwich Road, Bourne Over Bourne Bridge. At rotary, take third right on to Sandwich Road, proceed 1/4 mile to school entrance on right. The field is located behind the school buildings. (Bourne GPS Field Directions : 41.744200, -70.577800)

Cotuit Kettleers - Lowell Park, Lowell Street, Cotuit Rt. 6 to Exit 2 (Rt. 130). Take right and follow Rt. 130 to end.

Take left onto Rt. 28, then immediate right to Cotuit Center (Main St.). Follow Main St. for 1.2 miles. Take left onto Lowell Ave., immediate left into Lowell Field parking lot. (Cotuit GPS Field Directions : 41.625218, -70.434877)

Falmouth Commodores - Guv Fuller Field, Main Street, Falmouth Follow Rt. 28 South until it becomes one lane. Then take left at 1st stop light (Jones Rd.). Follow Jones Rd. through 1st light. Take right at 2nd light (Rt. 28). Follow Rt 28.6 mile to Fuller Field sign on right. Field located behind parking lot. (Falmouth GPS Field Directions : 41.555210, -70.604085)

Hyannis Harbor Hawks - McKeon Field, High School Road, Hyannis Rt. 6 to Exit 6 (Rt. 132). Bear right and follow Rt. 132 through 1st stop light. Take right just beyond Plaza Hotel (Hyannis West End). Cross Rt. 28. Bear left at "To Hyannis" sign. Continue through 2 stop lights and stop sign. Field located behind school building. (Hyannis GPS Field Directions : 41.648275, -70.283475)

Wareham Gatemen - Clem Spillane Field, Rt. 6, Wareham Field located directly behind Town Hall parking lot. (Wareham GPS Field Directions : 41.758022, -70.722160)

EAST DIVISION

Brewster Whitecaps - Stony Brook, Underpass Road, Brewster Rt. 6 to Exit 11 (Rt.137). Right at top of the ramp, proceed 2.8 miles on Rt.137, turn right on Underpass Road. Stony Brook School is on the left, the field is located behind the school buildings. (Brewster GPS Field Directions : 41.758270, -70.070055)

Chatham Anglers - Veteran's Field, Depot Station, Chatham Rt. 6 to Exit 10 (Rt. 124). Right at top of ramp, then 1st left at flashing light (Queen Ann Rd.). Follow across Rt. 39 and Rt. 137, then bear right at "Business District" sign onto old Queen Ann Rd. Take left onto Rt. 28, follow through stop light to the field on left. (Chatham GPS Field Directions : 41.684724, -69.962681)

Harwich Mariners - Whitehouse Field, Oak Street, Harwich Rt. 6 to Exit 10 (Rt. 124). Right at top ramp, then 1st left at flashing light (Queen Ann Rd.). After .3 mile, take right onto Oak St. Follow Oak St. for .8 mile, take left turn just before Harwich High School. Field is on left at back of parking lot. (Harwich GPS Field Directions : 41.692690, -70.066160)

Orleans Firebirds - Eldredge Park, Rt. 28, Orleans Rt. 6 to Exit 12 (Rt. 6A). Right at top ramp, then right at stop light (Eldredge Parkway). Follow for .7 mile, take left just before tennis courts into parking lot. (Orleans GPS Field Directions : 41.782775, -69.988120)

Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox - D-Y Regional High School, Station Avenue, S. Yarmouth Rt. 6 to Exit 8. Right onto Station Avenue. Follow for 1.4 miles. Take left turn at D-Y High School into parking lot, field at rear of parking lot. (Yarmouth-Dennis GPS Field Directions : 41.677375, -70.191855)

The above printed directions are given from an "Off-Cape" starting point. Wareham field is "Off-Cape." Bourne Bridge connects to Rte. 28, Sagamore Bridge connects to Rte. 6.





IN MEMORIAM

THOMAS S. CAHIR SEPTEMBER 19, 1952 - MARCH 12, 2025

Tom's career in Massachusetts politics and transportation is quite illustrious. Elected to the Mass. House of Representatives in 1985, he represented the 3rd Barnstable District for 14 years. During his tenure, he held several leadership positions, with a significant focus on transportation issues. Notably, he served on the Joint Committee on Transportation throughout his legislative career and chaired it as well.



Not only was Tom a champion of Cape Cod through his many years of public service, he was also a champion of the Cape Cod Baseball League. He was involved in the League for decades and most recently sat on the Advisory Committee of the Cape Cod Baseball League Hall of Fame. Tom was often seen at Braves games as a life long resident of Bourne.





ROBERT "BOB" WILLIAM PARADY

JULY 21, 1947 - MARCH 9, 2025

Bob lived and devoted his entire life to his hometown of Bourne. His first job was as a lifeguard as a teenager, eventually working his way up to Beach Supervisor. His lifetime love of politics resulted in his first elected position to the town's Planning Board. In 1977, Bob was elected as Selectman-Assessor – at the time, Bourne was one of just ten communities in New England that had a full-time board of selectmen. He served six terms as Selectman-Assessor until 1995 when he resumed his full-time law practice.

Bob also served on the Cape Cod Joint Transportation Committee and the Cape Cod Regional Transit Authority Advisory Board. He concluded his political career by serving as the elected Town Moderator for 18 years. Bob helped the Braves many times over the years.

JEFFREY EVAN TRUNDY

MAY 6, 1950 - DECEMBER 20, 2024

Coach Trundy was the head coach and heartbeat of the Falmouth Commodores for over 26 years. He left a 30-year legacy of greatness in the Cape Cod Baseball League and with the Falmouth Commodores.


Baseball and coaching were in coach Trundy's blood. He was captain of the University of New Hampshire baseball team before moving on to earn his master's degree from the University of Colorado. It was in Colorado that Jeff spent some time as an assistant coach. He received the Mike Curran Award naming him Coach of the Year for the Cape League in 2004, 2016 and 2019.

In the off-season, Jeff was the head baseball coach at Frederick Gunn School, a prep school in Washington, Conn. In addition to coaching, he had also served as a part-time scout for the Toronto Blue Jays.

Coach Trundy was inducted into the Maine Baseball Hall of Fame in July 2013 and the Cape Cod Baseball League in 2024.



Known throughout the league and beyond as "Gentlemen Jeff', coach Trundy left an indelible mark on everyone he interacted with. He not only coached the young men who had the privilege of playing under his leadership but also took a personal interest in their lives, mentoring them to play with integrity.

In Memory of Dudley Jensen 1925 - 2018

Dudley was a long-time resident of Bourne and a graduate of Bourne High School. During his many years in Bourne, Dudley was an avid fan of the Bourne Braves. He served as an assistant General Manager for the Braves and later, for many years, as it's historian. He was also incredibly



active in the Bourne community being able to tell the history of Bourne from Colonial Days to the present. He was President of the Bourne Historical Society, on the Board of the Bourne Society for Historical Preservation and a member of Bourne's Planning Board. Fondly remembered by Bill Weihs who Dudley coached during his long tenure as the swimming coach at the College of William and Mary in Virginia.

THE BACKBONE OF THE CAPE COD BASEBALL LEAGUE

BOURNE BRAVES OUT FOR REVENGE AFTER FALLING SHORT IN 2024 CCBL CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES

The Bourne Braves were Cape Cod Baseball League champions in 2022. The squad brought home the hardware again in 2023.

2024 had the Bravos pushing for the three-peat, but for the first time since 2021, a new team came out victorious, as the Braves fell to the Harwich Mariners 4-3 in Game 3 of the Championship Series.

"I would think most people don't want us here, but expect us to be here," field manager Scott Landers said following the defeat to the Mariners. "We did what we were supposed to do. We just fell a game short."

Landers said people might not want the Braves to be in the Championship Series game, but it's becoming a hard task to eliminate them from postseason contention. It's been four straight summers that the Braves have made it to the last dance, having also won the Championship Series a total of nine times all-time.

In 2021 the Braves lost to the Brewster Whitecaps – the following two seasons resulted in championships. After falling to the bunch from Harwich to end last summer, it leaves the question as to if Landers can bring his crew back to the promised land.

The field manager returns for his fourth campaign as the bench boss, with his first three resulting in championship game appearances. The head coach brings a wealth of experience to the ballpark, having been the head coach/ strength and conditioning coordinator at SUNY Oswego since 2011.

Landers is accompanied by five assistants in veteran Kevin Curtin, and newcomers Jeff Limoncelli, Ed Blankmeyer, Anthony Barone and Alex Conrad.

Curtin, the pitching coach at Tufts University, will manage the arms in the bullpen for his fourth season. He joined the staff the same season as Landers, and was part of the 2022 and 2023 championship-winning teams, including managing the 2023 batch of pitchers who led the league in team ERA with 3.04.

Limoncelli will join the Braves' staff for his first season, having been a key figure in upstate New York high school baseball. He's notched over 400 wins in his career that's lasted over four decades, including guiding Horseheads High School to nine NYSPHSAA Section 4 championships.

Blankemeyer will also be spending his first season with





Bourne as a hitting coach, with his last summer gig being for the Brooklyn Cyclones of the New York-Penn League in 2022. He's the all-time winningest coach at St. John's, and has led the Red Storm to five Big East tournament championships.

Barone's first season with the Braves will have him as an assistant as well as the camp coordinator. He's a graduate student-athlete at SUNY Oswego, playing under Landers as a catcher, where he's posted a .264 batting average with 51 hits and 33 RBIs in his five-year career.

Conrad will round out the first-year staffers, and will join his SUNY Oswego teammate Barone as an assistant coach, working with the pitchers. The second graduate student-athlete for the Braves is a southpaw that has a 4.64 ERA and 91 strikeouts in his four seasons.

The Braves boast a roster of 48 players, including six returners in second baseman Cam Kozeal (Arkansas), outfielder Caden Sorrell (Texas A&M), pitchers Chase Meyer (West Virginia), Cameron Flukey (Coastal Carolina), Zach Konstantiovsky (Rutgers) and utility man Brayden Holcomb (Vanderbilt). The roster is made up of 27 pitchers, 11 infielders, seven outfielders and three catchers.

Seven conferences create the makeup of the roster, including the ACC, SEC, Big 12, Big Ten, Big East, Sun Belt and America East. The roster has several colleges with multiple players from each who will be suiting up for the Braves, headlined with four from Arkansas, followed by three from Rutgers, West Virginia, Wake Forest and Cincinnati, then two from Vanderbilt, Texas Tech, North Carolina,TCU, Louisville, St. John's, Texas A&M, Florida State and Clemson.

Notable bats to watch for the Braves are infielder Kade Lewis (Wake Forest), first baseman Ty Doucette (Rutgers) and shortstop Ryan Cooney (Oregon).

Lewis transferred to the Demon Deacons in 2025 after earning the Big East Freshman of the Year in 2024 for Butler. Through 47 games for Wake Forest, he boasts a .420 batting average, 71 hits, 52 RBIs, 41 runs and 11 home runs.

Doucette finished 2024 with a .321 batting average for the Scarlet Knights, and through 49 games in 2025, which he's started in all of them, he's once again hitting over .300 with a .335 batting average. So far in his sophomore campaign, he's totaled 68 hits, 48 runs, 46 RBIs and 10 home runs.

Cooney has stepped up in the Ducks' lineup in 2025, making massive strides from his freshman campaign the year prior. Through Oregon's 47 games, Cooney has started in every single one and has notched a .344 batting average, 52 hits, 41 RBIs, 37 runs, 26 walks and 13 stolen bases.

Arms to keep tabs on are Masson Brassfield (TCU), Nathan Taylor (Cincinnati) and John Abraham (Florida State).

Brassfield, the No. 54 overall prospect and No. 9 lefthanded pitcher by Perfect Game in the 2024 recruiting class, has been an immediate impact player for TCU in his freshman year. He's garnered a 2.89 ERA with a 5-1 record through 14 appearances, totaling 51 strikeouts for the Horned Frogs.

In 2024 Taylor made the Big 12 All-Freshman Team as well as being an honorable mention for All-Big 12. He picked up right where he left off for his sophomore year with the Bearcats, boasting a 2.54 ERA with a 5-1 record and 70 strikeouts in 11 outings.

Abraham tallied a 5-2 record for the Seminoles in 2024, and he's kept that some consistency in 2025, currently



holding a 3-0 record. Through two years at Florida State, he's appeared in 40 games and has dialed up 73 strikeouts.

It's never an easy task to make a championship appearance, but the Braves have made the Championship Series the last three years. Yet, last season it didn't end the way the squad wanted to with a loss to Harwich, but the Braves will be out for revenge this upcoming year as they fight for their third championship in four years — starting with its 2025 opener at 5:30 p.m., June 14, against none other than Harwich.





SCOTT LANDERS

FIELD MANAGER

Manager Stats: 2022-Present | 4 Years | 168 Games | 88-63-14 W-L Record 20-10, 2 Cape League Championships, 1 Runners-Up, 1 Division Title

Scott Landers returns as the Braves' Field Manager for his fourth season in 2025 after leading the Braves to back-to-back Cape Cod Baseball League titles in 2022 and 2023.

Landers has been the Baseball Head Coach / Strength and Conditioning Coordinator at SUNY Oswego since 2011. He joined the Laker staff after serving as the assistant coach at NCAA Division I Le Moyne College for the prior nine seasons. During his tenure at Le Moyne, five Dolphin pitchers signed professional baseball contracts. Two of Landers' players were named conference pitchers

of the year. Overall, Landers coached 21 players at Le Moyne who went on to play professional baseball. At Cortland, Landers helped guide the Red Dragons to two league titles with unblemished 12-0 conference marks, one regional title, and one Division III World Series berth. In 2001 at Broome Community College,

Landers guided the Hornets to a 22-19 mark and a New York State Regional berth. Landers was the pitching coach for the Brewster Whitecaps. In 2020, the Whitecaps allowed the second-fewest earned runs (119) in 304 1/3 innings during the regular season, good for an ERA of 3.52. The Whitecaps also gave up the second-fewest hits (258), ranked second-best in walks allowed (114), and had the fifth-highest strikeout total on the Cape (349).

Landers was a four-year pitcher at Cortland. As a player, Landers helped the Red Dragons to three SUNYAC titles, four regional appearances, and three NCAA Division III World Series appearances. Cortland finished third on two occasions and seventh once at the NCAA Division III World Series. As a junior, Landers was named to the 1997 ABCA All-America Third Team. Landers is the father of Cal and Maura.



KEVIN CURTAIN



PITCHING COACH/BULLPEN COACH

Kevin Curtin is in his fourth year with the Bourne Braves, serving as the Bullpen Coach and assistant pitching coach. He was part of the 2022 and 2023 CCBL championship coaching staff, working with the pitchers who led the league in team ERA (3.04) and were second in WHIP (1.24). Coach Curtin is the assistance coach at Tufts University. Prior to that he was the pitching coach for the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). He served as an assistant coach at Burlington (MA) High School for more than 20 years. After retiring from a successful career in financial services, he became the Head Coach at Nauset Regional High School, leading the Warriors to consecutive Cape and Islands League titles in 2021 and 2022.

As a player, Kevin starred at Burlington High School under his father, legendary coach Jim Curtin, who coached for 52 seasons, winning over 600 games. Kevin went on to pitch for Harvard University, where he amassed a .750 winning percentage over his career. He had the fourth-best ERA (0.88) in NCAA Division 1 in 1987. His single-season 0.88 ERA still ranks in the top five in the Harvard Crimson record books.



JEFF LIMONCELLI

HITTING/ASSISTANT COACH


Jeff Limoncelli enters his first season in Bourne. He's been a staple in high school baseball in upstate New York, with his career spanning four decades. In March 2024, he earned his 400th career victory as head coach of Horseheads High School and guided them to nine NYSPHSAA Section 4 championships and the Class A state title in 1999. He also coaches the Horseheads boys' varsity basketball team, winning three Section 4 titles in the process. He was a threesport star at Elmira Free Academy, played college baseball at the University of South Carolina Aiken and the University of West Florida, then had a pro career of three and a half seasons as an infielder in the Boston Red Sox farm system, starting with the Elmira Pioneers of the New York-Penn League in 1989.



ED BLANKMEYER

Ed Blankmeyer joins the Braves after last coaching for the Brooklyn Cyclones of the New York-Penn League in 2022. Previously, Blankmeyer was synonymous with St. John's baseball, serving as the university's head baseball coach from 1996 through 2019. He's the Red Storm's all-time winningest coach (829-499-4), earning six Big East regular season championships, five Big East tournament championships, 11 NCAA Regional appearances, and an NCAA Super Regional appearance in 2012. He's been named Big East Coach of the Year eight times and the ABCA Northeast Region Coach of the Year four times. He was inducted into the American Baseball Coaches Association's Hall of Fame in 2018. Blankmeyer served as an assistant coach at Seton Hall from 1973 to 1976 before taking over at St. John's.



ANTHONY BARONE

LANDERS LIFTS BRAVES TO CHAMPIONSHIP HEIGHTS DURING HIS TENURE

When the final out was recorded for the 2021 Cape Cod Baseball League season and the Brewster Whitecaps secured a championship, the Bourne Braves' history was staring them in the face. The organization had lost in the finals three times since the turn of the century, though breaking through with its first title in 2009.

But while history repeated itself by watching their opponents celebrate a title, the Braves were, unbeknownst to them then, also watching their future field manager in then-Brewster pitching coach Scott Landers.

"We watched him against us in the final [in 2021]. He seemed like someone who really had his finger on the pulse with the pitching. And they shut us down big time," former Braves general manager Darin Weeks said. "It was like chess versus checkers with the coaching staff. [Brewster] just had all the answers to the test. They were prepared."

Following the 2021 season, long-time field manager Harvey Shapiro surprisingly resigned, creating a coveted Cape League coaching position. Former pitching coach Josh McDonald recommended Landers to the Braves Board of Directors, and he was one of six candidates to interview.

During the interview process, Landers was struck by the team's dedication to the community and family-first approach. The Braves were struck by his recruiting prowess, Power 5 conference connections, and relentlessly dogged style of play.

"One of the key things he brought up from day one was his family and wanting to have the ability to have his kids and family part of the franchise, which we certainly welcomed. That's what the Cape [League] is all about," Braves president Nicole Norkevicius said. "But his networking connections across the SEC and the ACC really stood out."

"You never want to leave your family at home for eight to 10 weeks. And so when [my kids] can have that experience at such a young age and being around those players, and I think it helps them grow as little kids and as individuals, but it gives them an experience that'll last forever," Landers added.

The family-friendly confines of Doran Park proved to be the perfect incubator of prosperity for Landers and the Braves. Much like he did a SUNY-Oswego, Landers





found immediate success in Bourne, winning back-toback Cape League championships in 2022 and 2023 while coming a game short of a three-peat in 2024.

This is the story of how Landers turned the Braves into a perennial title contender in short order.

From Oswego to the Cape

A native of upstate New York, Landers took over the head coaching duties at SUNY-Oswego after assistant coaching stints at Le Moyne College and SUNY-Cortland, and quickly found success. He led the Lancers to six straight NCAA Championship appearances (2015-2021) and made back-to-back NCAA Division III College World Series appearances in 2017 and 2018. With a career winning percentage of .659 (328-170), Landers' approach to the game provided immediate dividends.

"You have to have the ability to execute and score runs

in different ways. You have to be able to execute and create runs [on offense]. And on the pitching side, we just don't want to walk guys. We want to attack them and put guys away," Landers said. "We want to recruit athletes."

That style of play was on display during the 2024 Cape League postseason. In a one-game playoff on the road against top-seeded Hyannis, centerfielder Chris Stanfield (LSU) launched a 349-foot go-ahead homer in the top of the fourth. In his next at-bat, with a runner on third, Stanfield laid down an RBI bunt single to put the game out of reach for Bourne.

While everyone loves the long ball, at the cavernous Doran Park, home runs are harder to come by. And Landers looks to build his teams that can manufacture runs instead of relying on the big flies. But success breeds interest even in the absence of power at the plate.

"I think, ultimately, these guys are showcasing themselves, and the more you win and the more success you have, the better off they are, the better they're showcasing for a college or a draft position," Landers said. "My message to them is this generation is all stats — not every single one of them, I'm generalizing right now — but a lot of it is stat-driven. A bunt base hit is the same as a single to left. A single to left and a stolen base, or a bunt single and a stolen base, is as good as a double. You fail a lot in this game. So any way that you can showcase your skills in different ways is a positive."

Unlike a lot of today's coaches, his baseball philosophy isn't dominated by advanced analytics and statistics, though Landers does 'play the percentages.' Instead, he subscribes more to baseball's unwritten rules and isn't afraid to buck those trends to put his team in a position to win. Like deploying a double-steal with runners on first and second with two outs.

"I really feel like some of baseball's rules, like making the third out at third base, go to the wayside for us a little bit. There are a lot more ways in college baseball than pro ball to score from third base. We may give up an out at third to end an inning, but I feel like the number of times we score doing that far outweighs that. Just the amount of passed balls and wild pitches compared to pro ball, and guys throwing it away or slow rollers in the five or six-hole [leads to more scoring opportunities," he said.

Like a master poker player, when Landers knows his opponents know how the game should be played, he can break those traditional rules and make himself a wildcard.

"You just kind of play the odds and negate some of those rules that people might think, 'What are you

doing?" he said. "But when other teams know you're a threat to steal at any time, it puts a lot of pressure on the pitchers at this level to control the run game and get them out of focus with the hitter."

Under Landers, the Braves have shown their need for speed, swiping a league-high 271 bags over the last three seasons. Aside from stolen bases, he also wants players who get on base, have plate discipline, can throw strikes and limit walks. And the stats back up that approach. His teams have finished first or second 11 times in on-base percentage, stolen bases, walks, team ERA, strikeouts, and walks issued in that time.

Leading Through Communication

When Bourne defeated the Firebirds in Orleans in Game 3 of the Cape League Finals in 2023, the organization knew the outcome before the Braves even took the field.

"It was like the game was already played," Weeks said. "There was no question we were going to win. Even though it was one on the road and [Orleans] had beaten us the night before at home pretty good, but Scott was prepared."

In front of 7,000 fans at Eldredge Park, despite falling behind 2-0, Bourne scored five unanswered runs to capture its second-straight Cape League championship. While Weeks spoke glowingly of his situational preparedness, Landers can also effectively communicate with players on an individual basis, that's led to his success.

"He can deal with the younger kids, and he understands the nuances of the 21st-century college baseball player," Weeks said. "He understands the transfer portal. He understands how to motivate kids. And he doesn't manage a broad brush."

Landers is known for pushing the right buttons to

get the most out of players. One player may need a proverbial swift kick in the pants. Another may need a shoulder to lean on. And every player wants to be put in a position to succeed.

"I'm around college kids every day running my program at [SUNY-Oswego]," Landers said. "We don't run it any differently in Bourne. And at the end of the day, I don't think age has much to do with it. It's all about the ability to relate to people."

Braves vice president Jenabeth Ferguson put it another way. "He's also a person who makes you want to follow him. He's a natural leader."

"I think the coaching staff is a big part of [players staying with the team," Landers said. "I try to build a staff where we can have a good rapport with each other and the players. We're all away from our homes, so there's some camaraderie in that — kind of a foxhole mentality. Being in a foreign place and going through everything together."

He added, "But it also speaks to the host families. If these kids are in a bad situation on an everyday basis, when they're going back to these host families, then they're going to be more likely to leave. Our host families have been awesome." In a league where players change by the season and storylines shift with the tide, Scott Landers is building sustained success in Bourne that's grounded in connection, communication, and a deep understanding of the game's evolving nature. From the sting of coming up short in 2021 to becoming the standard others now chase, the Braves have redefined their identity under Landers' leadership. His mix of old-school instincts and modern-day savvy has not only produced championships, but cultivated a culture where players thrive, the community unites, and winning is simply the byproduct.



BRAVES BASEBALL: A DYNASTY ON THE CANAL

Most towns on Cape Cod can trace their baseball history back several generations, but only Bourne can say that baseball was played in town before there was a town of Bourne. Considering the first recorded baseball game was held on Casino Field in 1865, nineteen years before Bourne was incorporated, it's clear that America's Pastime is part of the fabric and history of the town to this day.

Prior to 1884, Bourne was part of the larger town of Sandwich and like all its other villages, Bourne had its own ball field. The first game played within its borders was a July 4th match between Sandwich and Barnstable, played less than three months after President Abraham Lincoln was assassinated. Though the Cape League as we know it today was still in its nascent stages, the die was cast for a league and a Bourne team that has become an institution on Cape Cod.

The "Cape League" grew in the roaring twenties as an outgrowth of the Barnstable County Fair and was anchored by four original teams in Chatham, Hyannis, Falmouth, and Osterville. A team from Bourne was invited to participate, but chose not to due to financial problems. When the 1930's brought the Great Depression, the financial constraints of baseball on Cape Cod wreaked havoc on several teams. After a team from Provincetown dropped out half way through the 1933 season, Bourne fielded a squad to fill in and complete the season, finishing with a 1-25 record.

Although the thirties proved to be a tough time for those across the country, Bourne baseball began to show its first on-field successes. When the league moved in 1934 to limit its members to Barnstable County residents only, the path was cleared for Bourne to gain momentum on the diamond. The opening of the Bourne Bridge in June, 1935 would provide their fans an easier way to see them play.

one of the greatest Cape League seasons to this day. That summer, four teams, Bourne, Falmouth, Orleans, and Harwich, staged a four-team duel for the league title that came down to the final weekend. The Bourne "Canalmen" seemed poised to win the league title before inclement weather forced several games to be played in a short period of time, stretching Bourne's pitching staff to the breaking point.

Alas, the Canalmen took the field against Barnstable on the season's final weekend with a chance to take the crown. Unfortunately for Bourne, Barnstable hurler Norm Merrill threw a 5-0 no hitter in front of 500 fans to clinch the title and cap the best finish in league history up to that point.

When the 1940s rolled around and with it the distant drums of war in Europe, the Cape League again struggled with financial problems, which ultimately was forced to shut its doors. The promised \$3,000 funding from the county for the league fell through and soon after, the league chose to shut down and remained closed throughout World War II.

When the war came to a close in the late forties, the league started again under a new set of rules mandating that its players had to be residents or have summer homes on Cape Cod, a rule that would later set the foundation for one of the league's first powerhouses in Bourne.

By 1949, Bourne had 4 teams in the league: Bourne, Sagamore, Mass Maritime Academy, and a team from the Otis Air Force Base. Of those teams, it would be the Sagamore "Clouters" that would set itself apart from its neighbors and rivals in the league.

The Clouters were led by Manny Pena who would later become the league's umpire-in-chief. Pena and his Clouters became the class of the league in the 50s by manipulating the rule that players needed to be The 1937 season is one that is still remembered as Cape Cod residents and recruited players from across

the country. Though not all of its players were Cape residents, Sagamore found itself deeding pieces of nondescript land to imported players on the Cape, resulting in instant eligibility. One local player, Walter Stahura, Jr, a standout baseball and football player at Harvard was instrumental in luring many lvy League players to the Cape League to play for Sagamore.

This creative recruiting recruiting strategy drew ire from across the Cape League, but nevertheless resulted in nine Upper-Cape Titles in 11 years and 4 "All-Cape" crowns. Led by such legends as future CCBL Hall of Famers Tello Tontini and Jack Sanford, the Clouters dominated the league for a decade. Also donning a Sagamore uniform was Harvard's Bill Cleary, a Crimson letterman in baseball and hockey who would later become the head coach of Harvard's 1989 NCAA Champion hockey team.

Unfortunately for Sagamore, all sports dynasties must come to an end and it was no different for the Clouters. The league caught on to Robello's recruiting strategy and in 1962, it abolished the rule that only Cape residents could play in the league. Without a restriction on the players, it didn't take long for the other teams to catch up to Sagamore. The team struggled through much of the sixties and once again, financial issues caused hardship on the Bourne franchises.

The Massachusetts Maritime team folded in 1962 and the Otis Air Force team was expelled from the league in 1964 after forfeiting the season due to a lack of players. The result was a merged Bourne-Sagamore team in 1965 that would be known once again as the Clouters, later changed to the Bourne Canalmen in 1967. The Canalmen were left as the only team in Bourne, playing their games at Keith Field and struggling to find wins despite featuring future NBC Sports analyst John Dockery on the roster.

By 1971, the Cape Cod Baseball League was certified by the NCAA as one of just nine sanctioned summer leagues and the modern era of the Cape League was born. League rules specified that players would be required to work on the Cape during the summer. Also, no more than four players from each college could be on the same Cape League team, a rule that still stands today.

In Bourne, the Canalmen struggled on and off the field. In 1971 and 1972, Bourne won a total of just 30 games

while losing 50 and finished 7th both years. Off the field, the cost of fielding a team in the competitive Cape League became insurmountable and the decision was made to fold after the 1972 season. After playing the game off and on for the better part of a century, Cape League baseball in Bourne was dormant for the next sixteen years.

After a decade of discussion, by 1988 it was clear that the Cape Cod Baseball League had grown to a point where expansion from 8 teams to 10 seemed feasible. After considering proposals from towns such as Mashpee, Plymouth, and Sandwich, the league chose to award expansion franchises to Bourne and Brewster. By a 31-2 vote, the league approved Bourne to return to a league that it helped grow for most of the twentieth century.

With ten teams, the league split into its current two division league and the current playoff system was set up. The Bourne franchise, now the "Braves", started playing at Hendy Field at the Mass Maritime Academy in 1988 and finished fifth with a 12-29 record. The following year, the Braves finished first in the western division with a 24-17-3 record before falling to Hyannis in the playoffs.

In 1994, the Braves broke ground on a new ballpark at an abandoned baseball field on Trowbridge Road. After two years of renovations, paid for by raising money by selling parcels of the field for \$5, the Braves began play in 1996 at Coady Field, a ballpark named after 1920's star player Kempton Coady. Over the next ten years, Coady Field would be the summer home for Braves' players such as Mark Mulder, Kevin Youkilis, Brandon Inge, and Mark Kotsay who would all go on to have successful careers in Major League Baseball.

Although Coady Field provided many cherished memories for fans of Bourne, it was clear that the Braves would ultimately need a new ballpark to call their own. While the Braves worked hard between the lines, the Bourne Athletic Association worked equally hard off the field to solidify the town's baseball future in a new home for the Braves. In 2006, the Braves' dream of a new home became reality as the team inaugurated a brand-new park at Upper Cape Tech School about a mile from Coady Field which was formally named Doran Park in 2007.

Before leaving Coady Field for good, the Braves gave their fans one more reason to celebrate in 2005 as Bourne played for the league championship. Despite coming up one game short of the title to Orleans, the Braves gave Coady Field a proper sendoff by winning a playoff game in front of more than 3,000 fans in the final Cape League game ever played at the park.

In the 19 years at Doran Park, the Braves have achieved an incredible level of success and fan support. After a division crown in 2007 and a trip to a one-game playoff vs. Falmouth in 2008, the Braves finally reached the top of the mountain in 2009.

Since then, the Braves have been perennial contenders and have emerged as the latest Cape League "dynasty" by winning back-to-back championships for the first time in team history as Bourne captured their third title with a thrilling championship vs. Orleans in 2023.

2024 saw the Braves reach the league championship series for the fourth straight year (the first time in CCBL modern history a franchise has accomplished that feat). For the first time in Doran Park history, the championship trophy was won at home, unfortunately, the visiting Harwich Mariners spoiled the dreams of a three-peat.

As we enter 2025 the Braves will continue to be led by energetic field manager Scott Landers and his team of outstanding assistants looking for another banner to be

MAX PENTECOST Pentecost played for the Braves in 2013 from Kennesaw State University and during his time in Bourne, Max hit .346 with 6 HRs and 20 RBI, stats that earned him the Pat Sorenti Cape Cod Baseball League Most Valuable Player Award. He was named the starting catcher for the west division in the All-Star game and went on to win the Buster Posey award, honoring the best catcher in all of college baseball. Pentecost was drafted in the first round, 11th overall, by the Toronto Blue Jays in the 2014 Major League draft where he played five seasons in professional baseball.

KYLE ROLLER Roller played for the Braves in 2008 and 2009 and was the Cape League Regular Season and Playoff MVP in 2009. He was instrumented in bringing Bourne its first Cape Cod Baseball League championship as in 2009 as the power hitter from East Carolina University slugged 10 home runs during the regular season and hit a staggering .786 in the 2009 playoffs. Roller was a 2010 draft pick by the New York Yankees.

RYAN SPEIER Roller played for the Braves in 2008 and 2009 and was the Cape League Regular Season and Playoff MVP in 2009. ERIC BEATTIE Beattie, a 2003 member of the Braves was inducted into the Cape League Hall of Fame in 2014 after a campaign that saw the U. of Tampa hurler notch the league's "Outstanding Pitcher of the Year" award in 2003. He went 4-0 with a 0.39 ERA (second lowest all-time to former Commodore and Maryland Terp Eric Milton) with 51 strikeouts and just 6 walks. He was drafted in the second round by the Detroit and played for the Tigers in 2005-2006 as well as Boston in 2007. Eric returned to the Cape in 2022 as manager of the Hyannis Harbor Hawks and during his two years in Hyannis, led the Harbor Hawks to back to back trips to the western divisional finals.

TONY PLANSKY Plansky played for Bourne in 1929 and from 1933 to 1939. He was a six-time All-Star and two-time batting champion. Plansky was named the 62nd best athlete of the century by the Boston Globe.

NOEL KINSKI Kinski pitched for Bourne in 1964 and Sagamore in 1965. He was 10-1 with a 1.91 ERA in 1965, second all-time for wins in one Cape League season.

GEORGE KARRAS Karras was a Player/Manager for the Sagamore team in 1948.

PAT SORENTI Sorenti was the President/Manager of Sagamore in the 40's. League's MVP Trophy is named in his honor.

JOHN CANEIRA Caneira pitched for the Bourne Canalmen in 1972. His 119 strikeouts in a season ranks second-all time in Cape League history.

TELLO TONTINI Tontini was a seven-time All-Star for Sagamore from 1946 to 1952. He was named MVP of the league in 1949 and 1951. A two-time batting champion, Tontini is the only player in Cape League history to play all nine positions during his career.

MANNY PENA Pena played for Sagamore from 1950 to 1955 and managed the team from 1956 to 1961. During his tenure, Pena led the Clouters to the 1956 and 1959 Cape League championships.

JACK SANFORD Sanford pitched for Bourne and Sagamore from 1946 to 1954. He holds the record for most wins in a season with 14. Sanford holds the record for best two-year record in league history, pitching to a record of 25-2 combined in 1951 and 1952.

WAYNE GRANGER A pitcher and centerfielder from Springfield, Mass, Granger for the first-place Sagamore Clouters in 1962 and finished among the league leaders with a .329 batting average, a league-leading six home runs and 25 RBI in 76 at-bats. Granger went on to enjoy a career in major league baseball with the Cincinnati Reds, Minnesota Twins, Chicago White Sox, New York Yankees, Houston Astros and Montreal Expos.

LOU MERLONI A native of Framingham, MA and Providence College, Merloni starred at shortstop for Bourne in 1991. During his Cape League career, Merloni earned the league's Daniel J. Silva Sportsmanship Award and later went on to play nine seasons in the major leagues, including six with the Boston Red Sox.

JOHN "JACK" AYLMER As President of Massachusetts Maritime Academy, Aylmer became one of the most instrumental individuals in the history of the Bourne Braves. Aylmer helped found the Bourne Braves, making its debut in 1988 and at that time, played at Massachusetts Maritime Academy's Hendy Field.

DAN DIMICHELE A native of Cranston, Rhode Island, DiMichele played for Sagamore in 1965 and 1966, achieving a career batting average of .330. A member of the 1965 championship team, he was the only player in League history to be elected a starter in the All-Star game at 3 different positions.

HARVEY SHAPIRO Field manager for 18 years, Shapiro guided the Braves to five trips to the Cape League finals, including the league championship in 2009. His 388 regular season wins and 28 playoff victories rank first in franchise history in both categories. Shapiro is tied for first place for most championship victories by a manager in franchise history.



In 2009, Kyle Roller (East Carolina) became the first Bourne Brave to win the Pat Sorrenti MVP award since Dick Licini (Notre Dame) in 1968. Roller finished second in the league in hitting with a .342 batting average and led the league in homers with 10 and RBI with 33. Roller also became just the second player in Cape League history to win the "Star of Stars Award" given to the Most Valuable Player of the league playoffs as well. Roller joins former Cotuit Kettleer and Cape League Hall of Famer Josh Paul (Vanderbilt) as the only other player to win both prestigious awards in the same season.









