Bourne Braves - Doran Park, Upper Cape Tech, Sandwich Road, Bourne Over Bourne Bridge. At rotary, take third right on to Sandwich Road, proceed $1 / 4$ mile to school entrance on right. The field is located behind the school buildings. (Bourne GPS Field Directions : 41.744200, -70.577800)
Cotuit Kettleers - Lowell Park, Lowell Street, Cotuit Rt. 6 to Exit 2 (Rt. 130). Take right and follow Rt. 130 to end. Take left onto Rt. 28, then immediate right to Cotuit Center (Main St.). Follow Main St. for 1.2 miles. Take left onto Lowell Ave., immediate left into Lowell Field parking lot. (Cotuit GPS Field Directions : 41.625218, -70.434877)
Falmouth Commodores - Guv Fuller Field, Main Street, Falmouth Follow Rt. 28 South until it becomes one lane. Then
 take left at 1st stop light (Jones Rd.). Follow Jones Rd. through 1st light. Take right at 2nd light (Rt. 28). Follow Rt 28.6 mile to Fuller Field sign on right. Field located behind parking lot. (Falmouth GPS Field Directions : 41.555210, -70.604085 )
Hyannis Harbor Hawks - McKeon Field, High School Road, Hyannis Rt. 6 to Exit 6 (Rt. 132). Bear right and follow Rt. 132 through 1st stop light. Take right just beyond Plaza Hotel (Hyannis West End). Cross Rt. 28. Bear left at "To Hyannis" sign. Continue through 2 stop lights and stop sign. Field located behind school building. (Hyannis GPS Field Directions : 41.648275, -70.283475)
Wareham Gatemen - Clem Spillane Field, Rt. 6, Wareham Field located directly behind Town Hall parking lot. (Wareham GPS Field Directions : 41.758022, -70.722160)

## EAST DIVISION

Brewster Whitecaps - Stony Brook, Underpass Road, Brewster Rt. 6 to Exit 11 (Rt.137). Right at top of the ramp, proceed 2.8 miles on Rt. 137, turn right on Underpass Road. Stony Brook School is on the left, the field is located behind the school buildings. (Brewster GPS Field Directions : 41.758270, -70.070055)
Chatham Anglers - Veteran's Field, Depot Station, Chatham Rt. 6 to Exit 10 (Rt. 124). Right at top of ramp, then 1st left at flashing light (Queen Ann Rd.). Follow across Rt. 39 and Rt. 137, then bear right at "Business District" sign onto old Queen Ann Rd. Take left onto Rt. 28, follow through stop light to the field on left. (Chatham GPS Field Directions : 41.684724,-69.962681)

Harwich Mariners - Whitehouse Field, Oak Street, Harwich Rt. 6 to Exit 10 (Rt. 124). Right at top ramp, then 1st left at flashing light (Queen Ann Rd.). After . 3 mile, take right onto Oak St. Follow Oak St. for . 8 mile, take left turn just before Harwich High School. Field is on left at back of parking lot. (Harwich GPS Field Directions : 41.692690, -70.066160)
Orleans Firebirds - Eldredge Park, Rt. 28, Orleans Rt. 6 to Exit 12 (Rt. 6A). Right at top ramp, then right at stop light (Eldredge Parkway). Follow for .7 mile, take left just before tennis courts into parking lot. (Orleans GPS Field Directions : 41.782775, -69.988120)
Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox - D-Y Regional High School, Station Avenue, S. Yarmouth Rt. 6 to Exit 8. Right onto Station Avenue. Follow for 1.4 miles. Take left turn at D-Y High School into parking lot, field at rear of parking lot. (YarmouthDennis GPS Field Directions : $41.677375,-70.191855$ )

The above printed directions are given from an "Off-Cape" starting point. Wareham field is "Off-Cape." Bourne Bridge connects to Rte. 28, Sagamore Bridge connects to Rte. 6.

The Town of Bourne is a mediumsized community at the gateway to Cape Cod - You must pass through the Town to get over the Cape Cod Canal and anywhere else on Cape Cod. Long used by the Pilgrims during the 1620's as a center for trading activities, Aptucxet Trading Post was built in 1627, and the area was settled as a part of the Town of Sandwich by 1640, before finally being incorporated as the Town of Bourne in 1884.

The Cape Cod Canal, operated by the Army Corps of Engineers, bisects the community, with both the Bourne and the Sagamore Bridges, as well as the Buzzards Bay Railroad Bridge, being the only means to cross the Canal, unless you're travelling by boat. The Canal is world renowned for its superb sport fishing, scenic vistas,
relaxing bike rides \& walking routes, and for carrying vessels of all sizes flying the flags of all nations.

Bourne Scenic Park, founded in 1951 and run by the independent Bourne Recreation Authority, is located beneath the Bourne Bridge along the Canal, and is a perfect location for those seeking to enjoy the Canal and its' many activities. Bourne has numerous quiet harbors and inlets for boating and swimming, and the fishing \& shellfishing in the area is particularly enticing and considered some of the most diverse in Massachusetts.

Bourne is also home of the National Marine Life Center, an independent, non-profit, rehabilitation \& release hospital for the treatment of stranded sea turtles and seals, with future plans to expand to treat dolphins, porpoises,
and small whales. The Center has been steadily growing since treating its' first patient in the Summer of 2004, and is destined to become the primary care center and information hub on Cape Cod regarding marine animals and their environment.

It is a quiet community without the continual Summer tourist crush experienced by some of the other Cape communities. During the Summer, there are weekly Concerts In The Park, the July 4th Parade has proven quite popular, the annual Bourne Scallop Festival is held in September each year, bringing visitors from all across North America, and in December there's A Canal Christmas to help celebrate the Holiday Season.

## IN OUR PARTNERSHIP WIITH THE UPPER CAPE TECHNICAL HIGH SCHOOL AND CAPE COD BASEBALL LEAGUE...

The following rules must be adhered to at Doran Park. Thank you!
No alcohol or tobacco products allowed at the park.

No dogs allowed at the park.
Bleachers and picnic tables are available but fans are encouraged to bring their own lawn chairs as there are plenty of great spots available to see the game!
For the safety of all fans, do not interfere with the progress of the game or go onto the playing field at any time.
Any fan interfering with a ball in play or going onto the field will be removed from the park and could be subject to arrest.

All fans, especially those sitting along foul lines are cautioned to stay alert for hard-hit foul balls or bats that might leave the field of play.

Fans with young children or who may not want to continuously be alert should sit behind the fenced/screened areas.

All fans assume all risks and dangers incidental to the game of baseball, whether occurring prior to, during, or subsequent to the actual playing of the game.
The participating teams, organizations, and players are not liable for injuries resulting from such causes.

In 2006 the Bourne Braves began playing at a brand new field located within the Barry J Motta Athletic Complex behind Upper Cape Technical High School. The new location allows for larger crowds and the Braves an opportunity to host CCBL All Star games but most importantly gives our fans a world class field to watch their beloved Braves.
On July 8th, 2007 the baseball field was officially dedicated in the name of George Doran, Sr., a longtime Sagamore Beach resident and avid baseball fan. Doran Park was officially commemorated with a sign unveiling and on field dedication ceremony. Highlights of the day's festivities included George's grandson, Patrick, throwing out the first pitch along with his Dad, John, and Katherine Doherty, George's eldest great-grandchild, singing both the National Anthem and

God Bless America. John Doran, son of George Sr., was the family member most instrumental in finding this way to celebrate his Dad's legacy.
In 2008 the Bourne Braves played their home games under the lights for the first time in Braves history. On June 11th, 2008 the Bourne Braves, the Cape Cod Baseball League, Upper Cape Technical High School, The Doran Family and many members of the community came out to celebrate the newly light Doran Park with a Lighting Ceremony. Former Bourne Brave and Boston Red Sox, Lou Merloni, was on hand to address the players are the privilege of playing in the Cape League and relay some stories of his time in Bourne. It was a truly memorable evening at the lights shone brightly at Doran Park for the first time.

## BRAVES BASEBALL: A DYNASTY ON THE CANAL

Most towns on Cape Cod can trace their baseball history back several generations, but only Bourne can say that baseball was played in town before there was a town of Bourne. Considering the first recorded baseball game was held on Casino Field in 1865, nineteen years before Bourne was incorporated, it's clear that America's Pastime is part of the fabric and history of the town to this day.
Prior to 1884, Bourne was part of the larger town of Sandwich and like all its other villages, Bourne had its own ball field. The first game played within its borders was a July 4th match between Sandwich and Barnstable, played less than three months after President Abraham Lincoln was assassinated. Though the Cape League as we know it today was still in its nascent stages, the die was cast for a league and a Bourne team that has become an institution on Cape Cod.
The "Cape League" grew in the roaring twenties as an outgrowth of the Barnstable County Fair and was anchored by four original teams in Chatham, Hyannis, Falmouth, and Osterville. A team from Bourne was invited to participate, but chose not to due to financial problems. When the 1930's brought the Great Depression, the financial constraints of baseball on Cape Cod wreaked havoc on several teams. After a team from Provincetown dropped out half way through the 1933 season, Bourne fielded a squad to fill in and complete the season, finishing with a 1-25 record.
Although the thirties proved to be a tough time for those across the
country, Bourne baseball began to show its first on-field successes. When the league moved in 1934 to limit its members to Barnstable County residents only, the path was cleared for Bourne to gain momentum on the diamond. The opening of the Bourne Bridge in June, 1935 would provide their fans an easier way to see them play.
The 1937 season is one that is still remembered as one of the greatest Cape League seasons to this day. That summer, four teams, Bourne, Falmouth, Orleans, and Harwich, staged a four-team duel for the league title that came down to the final weekend. The Bourne "Canalmen" seemed poised to win the league title before inclement weather forced several games to be played in a short period of time, stretching Bourne's pitching staff to the breaking point.
Alas, the Canalmen took the field against Barnstable on the season's final weekend with a chance to take
the crown. Unfortunately for Bourne, Barnstable hurler Norm Merrill threw a 5-0 no hitter in front of 500 fans to clinch the title and cap the best finish in league history up to that point.

When the 1940s rolled around and with it the distant drums of war in Europe, the Cape League again struggled with financial problems, which ultimately was forced to shut its doors. The promised $\$ 3,000$ funding from the county for the league fell through and soon after, the league chose to shut down and remained closed throughout World War II.

When the war came to a close in the late forties, the league started again under a new set of rules mandating that its players had to be residents or have summer homes on Cape Cod, a rule that would later set the foundation for one of the league's first powerhouses in Bourne.

By 1949, Bourne had 4 teams in the league: Bourne, Sagamore, Mass Maritime Academy, and a team from

the Otis Air Force Base. Of those teams, it would be the Sagamore "Clouters" that would set itself apart from its neighbors and rivals in the league.

The Clouters were led by Manny Pena who would later become the league's umpire-in-chief. Pena and his Clouters became the class of the league in the 50 s by manipulating the rule that players needed to be Cape Cod residents and recruited players from across the country. Though not all of its players were Cape residents, Sagamore found itself deeding pieces of non-descript land to imported players on the Cape, resulting in instant eligibility. One local player, Walter Stahura, Jr, a standout baseball and football player at Harvard was instrumental in luring many Ivy League players to the Cape League to play for Sagamore.

This creative recruiting recruiting strategy drew ire from across the Cape League, but nevertheless resulted in nine Upper-Cape Titles in 11 years and 4 "All-Cape" crowns. Led by such legends as future CCBL Hall of Famers Tello Tontini and Jack Sanford, the Clouters dominated the league for a decade. Also donning a Sagamore uniform was Harvard's Bill Cleary, a Crimson letterman in baseball and hockey who would later become the head coach of Harvard's 1989 NCAA Champion hockey team.

Unfortunately for Sagamore, all sports dynasties must come to an end and it was no different for the Clouters. The league caught on to Robello's recruiting strategy and in 1962, it abolished the rule that only Cape residents could play in the league. Without a restriction on the players, it didn't take long for the other teams to catch up to Sagamore. The team struggled through much of
the sixties and once again, financial issues caused hardship on the Bourne franchises.
The Massachusetts Maritime team folded in 1962 and the Otis Air Force team was expelled from the league in 1964 after forfeiting the season due to a lack of players. The result was a merged Bourne-Sagamore team in 1965 that would be known once again as the Clouters, later changed to the Bourne Canalmen in 1967. The Canalmen were left as the only team in Bourne, playing their games at Keith Field and struggling to find wins despite featuring future NBC Sports analyst John Dockery on the roster.
By 1971, the Cape Cod Baseball League was certified by the NCAA as one of just nine sanctioned summer leagues and the modern era of the Cape League was born. League rules specified that players would be required to work on the Cape during the summer. Also, no more than four players from each college could be on the same Cape League team, a rule that still stands today.
In Bourne, the Canalmen struggled on and off the field. In 1971 and 1972, Bourne won a total of just 30 games while losing 50 and finished 7th both years. Off the field, the cost of fielding a team in the competitive Cape League became insurmountable and the decision was made to fold after the 1972 season. After playing the game off and on for the better part of a century, Cape League baseball in Bourne was dormant for the next sixteen years.
After a decade of discussion, by 1988 it was clear that the Cape Cod Baseball League had grown to a point where expansion from 8 teams to 10 seemed feasible. After considering proposals from towns such as

Mashpee, Plymouth, and Sandwich, the league chose to award expansion franchises to Bourne and Brewster. By a 31-2 vote, the league approved Bourne to return to a league that it helped grow for most of the twentieth century.
With ten teams, the league split into its current two division league and the current playoff system was set up. The Bourne franchise, now the "Braves", started playing at Hendy Field at the Mass Maritime Academy in 1988 and finished fifth with a 12-29 record. The following year, the Braves finished first in the western division with a 24-17-3 record before falling to Hyannis in the playoffs.
In 1994, the Braves broke ground on a new ballpark at an abandoned baseball field on Trowbridge Road. After two years of renovations, paid for by raising money by selling parcels of the field for $\$ 5$, the Braves began play in 1996 at Coady Field, a ballpark named after 1920's star player Kempton Coady. Over the next ten years, Coady Field would be the summer home for Braves' players such as Mark Mulder, Kevin Youkilis, Brandon Inge, and Mark Kotsay who would all go on to have successful careers in Major League Baseball.



Although Coady Field provided the Braves gave their fans one more many cherished memories for fans of Bourne, it was clear that the Braves would ultimately need a new ballpark to call their own. While the Braves worked hard between the lines, the Bourne Athletic Association worked equally hard off the field to solidify the town's baseball future in a new home for the Braves. In 2006, the Braves' dream of a new home became reality as the team inaugurated a brand-new park at Upper Cape Tech School about a mile from Coady Field which was formally named Doran Park in 2007.

Since then, the Braves have been perennial contenders and have emerged as the latest Cape League "dynasty" by winning back-to-back championships for the first time in team history as Bourne captured their third title with a thrilling championship vs. Orleans.

As we enter 2024 (again) as defending Cape League champs, the Braves will continue to be led by energetic field manager Scott Landers and his team of outstanding assistants, including former Boston Red Sox World Series champion Jarrod Saltalamacchia.

A lot of baseball has been played on Cape Cod since that first game at Casino Field in 1865 and Bourne has had its share of great moments and outstanding players.

As fans sit at beautiful Doran Park and watch the Braves play this season, they will do just as Bourne fans have done for over 100 years: sit back, watch America's Pastime, and appreciate having the opportunity to spend a summer day on Cape Cod.

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## BRAVES ‘RUN IT BACK’ WITH 5-2 THRILLER OVER ORLEANS

## They ran it back.

Two summers, two championships for Scott Landers. It's hard to ask for a better start to your Cape Cod Baseball League managing career than that, and now Landers can carry that $100 \%$ success rate into his third year with the club.
The Bravos got it done in a tense winner-take-all Game 3 at Eldredge Park on Sunday, completing a marathon season with a 5-2 defeat of Orleans on its home grass. Just like the series, this game had it all. An early deficit. A comeback. Trash talk, dominant pitching, timely hitting and the celebration of a lifetime.
"It never gets old," Landers said. "I'm so proud of these guys, and it was a little different than last year, but we fought 'till the end. We persevered. It's a special group."
More than 7,000 fans packed Eldredge Park, bringing a playoff atmosphere to the Cape. Just like the tight first two games of the series, it got off to another nail-biting start. The Braves were burned by Orleans' pesky leadoff hitter Jo Oyama for the second straight game. He led off the bottom of the first with a solo home run, after homering in Bourne's 4-3 loss the previous night. Two innings later, the 5 -foot- 7 Japan native went deep again, this time to the opposite field. It was his third homer and fifth extra-base hit in his last seven at-bats.

## It was 2-0 Orleans.

"No panic. Just keep having fun," Braves catcher Derek Bender said. "That was the motto of the whole year.

How much fun can we have?"
Left-hander Trystan Levesque gave the Braves an otherwise solid $42 / 3$ innings of work. He struck out five and didn't walk anyone, his line only tainted by the Oyama solo shots. He retired seven straight after Oyama's second homer.
"We always say, 'If you're gonna give up home runs, let them be the solo ones. They don't kill you,"' Landers said. "But he pitched outstanding."
The Braves drew a walk in each of the first three innings against Evan Truitt, but they couldn't get any of them across to score. The second and third innings both ended on a 6-4-3 double play.
"I don't think we ever felt like we were out of it," assistant coach Jarrod Saltalamacchia said. "Scott had a meeting with all our guys.... Lock it in. Every at-bat. Every pitch."
Then the bats showed some life in the fourth. Kendall Diggs got things started with a hard-hit single, and Bryce Eblin did what he does best with a single of his own to extend his hitting streak to 23 . It was an infield hit for Eblin, and the runners each advanced a base as the ball got away from Orleans' second baseman.
With the tying runs in scoring position, Bender poked one through the right side. Diggs scored, but Eblin was thrown out at the plate on a perfect throw by right fielder Fenwick Trimble. After a Garrett Michel single and four straight hits for the Braves, Truitt's evening came to an end.
Bourne's fourth-inning rally was short-lived, as Bender was gunned down in a strike-'em-out, throw-'emout double play. But Bourne kept itself

in striking distance, down by only a run

Levesque came out of the game after retiring the first two batters in the fifth. With Oyama due up, Landers wasn't going to take any chances. Anthony DeFabbia struck Oyama out on three pitches, prompting the team to huddle around Landers in celebration.

## It was go time.

The momentum continued to shift in Bourne's favor. Josh Kuroda-Grauer lined a leadoff single in the sixth, knocking Watson out of the game. Orleans curiously chose to bring in Everett Catlett, who threw 55 pitches two nights ago.

The grind kept churning towards the Bravos. Diggs fouled off a few pitches before collecting his second single of the game. Eblin then grounded one to second, and the Firebirds tried to turn two, but the relay got away and KurodaGrauer came in with the tying run. 2023 CCBL Champs!

Eldredge Park was rocking. If somebody was sitting on the third base side, they might have thought it was a Bourne home game. An army of kids led a "LET'S GO BRAVES!" chant, with the sea of Firebirds faithful sitting in stunned silence as their championship hopes withered into dust.
"The atmosphere tonight was unbelievable," assistant coach John Topoleski said. "It felt like a national championship game."
Bender came up huge, smacking an RBI double to put the Braves in front. After Michel struck out, Catlett was pulled with a short leash after getting just two outs. In a move of desperation, the Firebirds turned to their closer, Sean Matson. Sam Petersen greeted him with a massive RBI single, giving Bourne a two-run cushion with a three-
run inning.
"You can go back to last night when we were down," Petersen said. "We always thought we were the better hitting team, and you run into some bad luck here and there, but we just kept chipping away. We need somebody to start it. We need somebody to keep it going. We need somebody to deliver a big blow, and we finally did that."
They led 4-2, and the prospect of victory was lurking on the horizon.
"Time and time again, Coach Landers said superstars show up when the lights turn on," Bender said. "And the lights turned on. They were a little brighter than I thought to start this playoff run. I had some big moments, but a lot of guys picked me up. Tonight, like I said to start the year, it was my night tonight. It's all our
nights tonight."
DeFabbia stayed dialed in on the mound. He made back-to-back sparkling defensive plays in the bottom of the sixth to shut Orleans down in rapid fashion.
With the Bourne fans getting increasingly antsy as their championship dreams came closer to reality, Bender annihilated a solo homer to left field. He stood and admired it, then flipped his bat while getting into a shouting match with Orleans catcher Henry Hunter. The umpire had to break it up, and discussions between the whole umpiring crew and Firebirds manager Kelly Nicholson commenced. The umpires eventually issued warnings to each side, and play continued on.

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"I have a lot of respect for a lot of guys in that team, and I don't really mean any disrespect to the game or anything. I know some people don't like it," Bender said. "I think it's one of those things that if you haven't done something like that in a big moment, you wouldn't understand the feeling. It isn't so much showing anybody up. It's more of just taking the whole moment in, like 'Wow, I just did that.'.. Let me take it all in. Because if you look at any video, I wasn't saying nothing until he got in my face."

DeFabbia didn't let the Firebirds even dream about making a comeback. He shoved all the way until the end, retiring the final 13 batters of the game to send Bourne to victory. Defensive replacement Gage Harrelson caught the final out in center field, and the team sprinted to the mound for its second dogpile in as many years. There were hugs. There were tears of joy. There were shouts of pure elation. There were group photos with the trophy, which will be added to the collection in the Doran Park press box

that's starting to get a little crowded.
Landers and general manager Darin Weeks were greeted with the trophy. Weeks sprinted, with the trophy in the air, into a mob of players at the mound. Kuroda-Grauer was crowned with the postseason MVP for his torrid hot stretch in the last week.
"It means everything to me," KurodaGrauer said. "I give all the credit to my teammates and coaches for putting me in position to be great."

The Braves are champions. It's a statement that was said last year, and it'll be said plenty more times this year. Champions. A franchise that had only won once, in 2009, now has three titles in its history.

## That's what happens when you run it back.

"I'm really, really proud of each and every one of them," Landers said. "Through the playoffs, we didn't have one unsung hero. There were multiple people that stepped up that not necessarily did throughout the year - they weren't here, or they were struggling going into the playoffs. And we put it all together when we had to.

## MAX PENTECOST ENSHRINED IN CAPE LEAGUE HALL OF FAME

There was a two-game stretch during Max Pentecost's time on the Cape in the summer of 2013 that always stood out to his former manager Harvey Shapiro.

In the middle of a three-game road trip, the Braves visited Falmouth at Guv Fuller Field on July 9. And though the Braves lost, 5-3, Pentecost had a standout performance at the plate. He went 3-for-4 with two doubles, a home run, two RBI, and a run scored. Less than 24 hours later, the Braves were down Cape visiting Orleans and found themselves in a 12-inning slugfest. Pentecost went 5-for-5 and reached base in all seven plate appearances, recording three runs scored, four RBI, a hit-by-pitch, and a walk. He crushed two more home runs that game, one of which was a two-run blast in the 12th to help Bourne leave with an 8-6 victory.

In that two-game stretch, Pentecost produced eight hits in nine at-bats with two doubles, three homers, six RBI, and four runs scored.
"That's a pretty good stretch," Shapiro, jokingly underselling the performance, recalled.
President Nicole Norkevicius also remembered Pentecost's late-game heroics against the Firebirds.
"I'll never forget those two home runs in Orleans over the left-field wall," Norkevicius said.

That stretch served as a microcosm for his summer. He finished that 2013 season with a . 346 average, six home runs, 29 RBI, 47 hits, 21 runs scored, and five stolen bases while managing the Braves pitching staff behind the plate-earning him the Pat Sorenti Most Valuable Player award.
Ten years later, Pentecost was invited back to the Cape to be part of the 22nd class of the Cape Cod Baseball League's Hall of Fame-
joining Lance Berkman (Wareham ‘06), Mitchell Jordan (Orleans '15), Glenn Davis (Chatham '80), Jim Higgins (League Executive), and Mary Henderson (Harwich \& League Executive).

With his induction, Pentecost became just the third catcher in Cape League history to win the MVP and be enshrined into the Hall of Fame, joining Jason Varitek (Hyannis '93) and Josh Paul (Cotuit '95).

And while his time spent on the Cape is remembered by spectators for his performance on the field, it's the connections he made that Pentecost remembers most.
"My host family and the Braves welcomed me with open arms. It always felt more like a family than a team or organization," Pentecost said.

He credited that welcoming atmosphere to helping his calm demeanor that summer.

"My main goal was to stay relaxed, get used to everything, make adjustments as quickly as possible, and just try to enjoy everything," he said. "It was a lot of fun, and it didn't take as long as I was expecting."

Coming from Kennesaw State, a mid-major NCAA Division 1 school, Pentecost wanted to test himself against the best talent in the country. He returned back to the Kennesaw state-Cape League MVP trophy in hand-knowing he belonged. Pentecost hit .422 with nine home runs, 61 RBI, 24 doubles, 59 runs scored, and had an OPS of 1.109 his next season at Kennesaw, helping his team reach the NCAA Division 1 college baseball super regional.
"Forcing myself to make those adjustments early on was big because that transitioned over to my next season in college," he said. "What I learned [in Bourne] carried over to that season and set the tone for my professional career."

Pentecost took home the Johnny Bench Award, given to college baseball's top catcher, in 2014 before being drafted 11th overall later that year by the Toronto Blue Jays.

With his playing days behind him, Pentecost lives in his home state of

Georgia with his wife, Chandler, and their two children. He holds private lessons for up-and-coming catchers but also serves as an assistant coach for the Bethlehem Christian Academy varsity softball program-where his wife is the head coach.
"I didn't want to spend too much time away from the family like I used to with baseball. So she convinced me to help out [with the softball program] and I've really, really enjoyed that and getting to do it together," he said.

# BAT BOY COOPER KARAS MAKES LIFELONG MEMORIES, FRIENDSHIP WITH GARRETT MICHEL

Come to a Bourne Braves game, and you might notice a small bat boy running from the dugout, his helmet wobbling from shoulder to shoulder as he sprints behind home plate.
That's eight-year-old Cooper Karas. Not only was he one of Bourne's most committed bat boys, but he was a vital cog in the machine of this championship-winning ball club in 2023. Behind an impromptu friendship with Braves first baseman Garrett Michel, while simultaneously carrying the spark of a good luck charm, Karas ran it back with Bourne this summer - all the way from the dugout to the glories of victory.
"It's special," Karas's dad Matt said. "Something like that is never probably gonna happen again."

Karas, in addition to his bat boy duties, attended the weekly kids camp that went on at Doran Park earlier in the day before games. Numerous Braves players, including Michel, helped out by coaching and running drills.
"It's as much fun for me as it is for them," Michel said. "You get to hang out with the kids, and then they get to come to the games and watch you play and watch you do your thing. And you get to hang out with them before and after the game, which makes it more special."
It was at kids camp that a bond started to form between Karas and the Virginia Tech slugger. Michel became Karas's favorite player, and warming up together turned into one of their rituals.
"Every time I went to camp, and

every time I saw him at the ball field, he always had the biggest smile on his face," Michel said. "And it kind of made everybody else in the room smile. He's a great kid, and it just made coming to the ball field fun after seeing him."
Michel was one of the key cogs on this Bourne team throughout the entire summer. He was there from the first day, and stuck around all the way through the championship run. His season, like the Braves', saw plenty of ups and downs. But he ultimately led the team in homers and was a mainstay in the middle of the lineup down the stretch.
Whether he was slumping or on a hot streak, Michel always brought a positive attitude to the field - much like the attributes he sees in young Cooper. Whether it was warming up with kids, chatting with interns or doing his daily pregame fist bumps, Michel exemplified what Cape League baseball is supposed to be about.
"Garrett's an exceptionally nice kid," Matt said. "He really just has a kind heart."

Those traits fortified a comfortable environment for Karas. While he and Michel may be in different stages in life, they're both kids who love baseball, and Karas's rookie season as a bat boy gave him a chance to gain inspiration and knowledge from someone who's playing the game at a high level.
"He is absolutely in love with baseball," Matt said of his son. "All he talks about is baseball. All he watches is baseball. If he's not playing baseball, he's collecting baseball cards. So to get him immersed into a team like this is really neat."

Karas made himself at home with the Braves, attending nearly every game. He became known among the players, coaches, fans and everybody who else who regularly supported Bourne Braves baseball. This organization stayed united as a tight-knit group through all the peaks and valleys, all the roster transactions, all the heartbreaking losses and all the triumphs. It's not just the players who develop a family-type atmosphere - it's everyone who's
involved in making baseball on Cape Cod happen, whether on the field, off the field or behind the scenes.
"It was really, really special. He was on a first name basis with pretty much the whole team and all the coaching staff. He knew them all," Matt said. "It's funny, when walking out of the park, you see Salty [assistant coach Jarrod Saltalamacchia] say 'Hey, we'll see you tomorrow, Coop!"'

Michel believes the atmosphere played a part in allowing this team to flourish. The competition is tougher than at school, and the wood bats are an adjustment for any hitter who's used to metal, but the culture on the Cape is more relaxed and homey than it might be under the rigors of Division 1 baseball.
"It chills you out a little bit, realizing that you're playing a game," Michel said. "It kind of takes the stress away and puts it in perspective where you're at and what you're doing. It makes the game a lot more fun."

The Karas family began going to games last year, and they got to witness the Braves' first championship since 2009 from the sidelines. At the beginning of this summer, Matt simply asked team president Nicole Norkevicius if Cooper could be a bat boy, and it was then that the Karas's' "summer family" was born.
"I can't say enough about the organization. It really is like a family," Matt said. "We moved here three years ago. We've been coming to Braves games for two years. And I think they've taken our family into more of it than what's even expected of anywhere else. Between the board members and the players and the coaching staff, it really is a family atmosphere. We've been calling it our summer family. Go to Doran, and
you can catch everybody talking to everybody. It's really cool."

A bat boy's main duties during the games involve being alert behind the screen near the dugout, ready to sprint out and retrieve stray bats. It's often a race with the other team's bat boy, especially when the bat is somewhere in the middle and could realistically be retrieved by either side.
The crowd will often get into it and cheer on the opposing bat boys. Karas is smaller than the other bat kids - with many onlookers thinking he's even younger than eight - but it doesn't stop him from doing his job in just as composed and efficient a manner as all the others.

Karas brought an extra spark the team perhaps didn't even know they needed. When the Braves opened the West finals against Hyannis, the Karas's weren't able to make it to the game, and Cooper had to be subbed in for. After sweeping Cotuit in the opening round, Bourne lost that first game. The Braves were dangling on the brink of elimination.
Phone calls and texts bombarded Matt's phone, demanding that Cooper be there for the remainder of the season. Sometimes baseball superstition wins out.
Cooper returned, and the Braves fought off elimination twice to win the championship.

Victory.
"We made a very strong point to [manager Scott] Landers that he needs to be our bat boy during the playoffs," Michel said. "I think if he wasn't our bat boy, people were gonna be very upset."
So now Karas can go back to school, and back to his own baseball teams, as the bat boy for a group of champions. He has a summer worth

of memories that he'll be able to hold onto for the rest of his long life ahead.
"The championship game, he's still talking about it," Matt said. "If someone had hit a home run: 'Oh, did you see how far Bender's home run was? It was so deep,' and everything like that. Pretty much every time he'd get home from a game, he'd throw on YouTube to rewatch the game, just to see his performance and everybody else's."

Karas has fall ball coming up, followed by spring ball, along with the Bourne camps and a couple other baseball camps. The Karas family's life revolves around baseball, and they wouldn't have it any other way. They're also hoping to travel and catch some college baseball, particularly to see some of Cooper's favorite players - first on the list: Garrett Michel of Virginia Tech.
"He's a light to everybody's day," Michel said of Karas. "Just keep being who he is. Keep loving and keep practicing the game."

Bourne will be back in action in early June of next year.

Until then, everybody in the Braves community can enjoy the taste of running it back.

## 2024 Season Preview

## TALENTED BRAVES ROSTER VYING FOR THREE-PEAT IN 2024

Winning a championship in any sport is an extremely tall task.

To reach the pinnacle of a league, the winning team must display an unwavering work ethic, commitment to a strong culture and willingness to play for one another, among various other qualities. Because of this, emerging as the last group standing even once has very long odds, never mind bringing home two or three consecutive championships.

But the latter is what Scott Landers, third-year head coach of the Bourne Braves, will attempt to accomplish in 2024. After only two seasons on the Cape, he already boasts a crowded list of accolades, winning the league's 2022 and 2023 titles. Landers brings a wealth of experience to Bourne, as he's been the head coach at SUNY Oswego since 2011 and has also served as a pitching coach for the Cape Cod League's Brewster Whitecaps in 2020.
If the Braves take the 2024 trophy - their fourth in franchise history - they will become only the fourth team since 1963 to win three or more championships consecutively and the first since the Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox did so in 2016.

The quest for yet another title starts with assembling championshipcaliber coaching staff, and Landers has retained most of his assistants from 2023. 17-year MLB veteran and 2013 World Series Champion Jarrod Saltalamacchia will returnforyearthree as an assistant, while Massachusetts Institute of Technology pitching coach Kevin Curtain is overseeing the Braves'

pitchers for the third season.
Rounding out Bourne's coaches are second-year assistant Lukas Olsson and Tanner Sinicki, who will coach his first campaign on the Cape this summer.
While rosters are subject to change before and during the season, this year's Braves' squad will possess a wealth of experience on the field with eight prospective returners, six of which are position players: catcher Adonys Guzman of Arizona, infielder Garret Michel of Virginia Tech, outfielder Gage Harrelson of Texas Tech, outfielder Chris Stanfield of Auburn, utility player Caden Bodine of Coastal Carolina and infielder Kodey Shojinaga of Kansas.
Headlining the crop of hitters running it back in Bourne is Bodine, who has produced a 0.906 OPS along with a .321 average and 65 RBI this spring. Bodine was also a major contributor for the Braves during the 2023 regular season, posting a .384
batting average while logging a . 944 OPS in 26 games. Shojinaga, a key member of the Jayhawks' lineup this year, is another exciting returner, as he aims to build off last summer when he slashed .326/.396/.349 across 11 contests.


Caden Bodine In 2024 Season Preview

Two pitchers - Rochester righty Nolan Sparks and St. Joseph's righthander Matt McShane - are returning to the Braves for the 2024 campaign. McShane proved a valuable arm in Bourne's bullpen in 2023, pitching to a 1.39 ERA and fanning 25 in 19 1/3 innings. Across $41 \frac{1}{3}$ frames of work for the Hawks this season, he has posted a 4.14 ERA and 56 strikeouts.

Sparks has been one of Rochester's most impactful starters in 2024 and owns a 2.25 ERA and 1.07 WHIP along with 80 punchouts in 60 innings. He has also tossed two complete games this year and now holds the Yellow Jackets' program record for career strikeouts with 248.
There are several other incoming arms for Braves fans to be excited about, including Clemson righty Aidan Knaak. Knaak has enjoyed a promising freshman campaign for the Tigers and owns a 2.96 ERA, 97 strikeouts and two s Gage Harrelson hutouts in 13 starts. Southpaw Zane Adams of Alabama, who has pitched $582 / 3$ innings with a 5.37 ERA and 47 strikeouts, also looks

to be another important member of Other arms out of the 'pen include Bourne's rotation.
Among the pitchers who look to bolster the Braves' bullpen is Arkansas right-hander Gabe Gaeckle. He has a 1.91 ERA, the lowest of Bourne's prospective arms, along with 7 saves this season, making him a strong candidate for the closing role. With a 3.13 ERA and 1.13 WHIP in 23, lefty Connor Hults of Florida State shapes up to be another trusted reliever.

St. Joseph's righty Will McCausland, Rutgers left-handed pitcher Donovan Zsak and Arkansas righty Cooper Dossett.
In terms of hitting, all 19 of the Braves' potential position players come from Division I schools. Coastal Carolina infielder Blake Barthol will likely be an explosive player at the plate who is a strong all-around hitter, boasting 15 home runs, a .319 average and 1.065 OPS. Outfielder Caden Sorrell of Texas A\&M possesses impressive power in his own right, as he's hit seven long balls and 19 extrabase hits while knocking in 33 runs.
Wake Forest outfielder Marek Houston is yet another complete batter slated to play in Bourne this summer with a .327 average and .429 on-base percentage this year.
Infielders Nick Roselli of Binghamton and Drew Smith of Oregon are two more of the 10 incoming Braves hitting above .300 for their respective schools in 2024.
Bourne's road to a three-peat begins on Saturday, June 15 at 6 p.m. at Doran Park, when it hosts the Orleans Firebirds in a rematch of the 2023 Championship.

## SCOTT LANDERS - FIELD MANAGER

Scott Landers returns as the Braves Field Manager for his third season in 2024 after leading the Braves to their second-straight Cape League championship-and third in team history-in 2023. Landers has been the Baseball Head Coach/ Strength and Conditioning Coordinator at SUNY Oswego since 2011. He joined the Laker staff after serving as the assistant coach at NCAA Division I Le Moyne College for the prior nine seasons. During his tenure at Le Moyne, five Dolphin pitchers signed professional baseball contracts. Two of Landers' players were named conference pitchers of the year. Overall, Landers coached 21 players at Le Moyne who went on to play professional baseball.
At Cortland, Landers helped guide the Red Dragons to two league titles with unblemished 12-0 conference marks, one regional title, and one Division III
 World Series berth. In 2001 at Broome Community College, Landers guided the Hornets to a 22-19 mark and a New York State Regional berth.
Landers was the pitching coach for the Brewster Whitecaps. In 2020, the Whitecaps allowed the second-fewest earned runs (119) in $3041 / 3$ innings during the regular season, good for an ERA of 3.52 . The Caps also gave up the second fewest hits (258), ranked second-best in walks allowed (114), and had the fifth-highest strikeout total on the Cape (349).
Landers was a four-year pitcher at Cortland. As a player, Landers helped the Red Dragons to three SUNYAC titles, four regional appearances, and three NCAA Division III World Series appearances. Cortland finished third on two occasions and seventh once at the NCAA Division III World Series. As a junior, Landers was named to the 1997 ABCA All-America Third Team.

Landers is father to Cal and Maura.


## KEVIN CURTIN - PITCHING COACH

Kevin Curtin is in his third year with the Bourne Braves serving as the Bullpen Coach and assistant pitching coach. He was part of the 2022 and 2023 CCBL championship coaching staff, working with the pitchers who led the league in team ERA (3.04) and second in WHIP (1.24). Coach Curtin is the pitching coach for Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) whose 2023 Engineers staff averaged 10 strikeouts per game-good for the top 10 in the country. He served as an assistant coach at Burlington (MA) High School for more than 20 years. After retiring from a successful career in financial services he became the Head Coach at Nauset Regional High School, leading the Warriors to consecutive Cape and Islands League titles in 2021 and 2022.
As a player, Kevin starred at Burlington High School for his father, legendary coach Jim Curtin, who coached for 52 seasons winning over 600 games. Kevin went on to pitch for Harvard University where he amassed a .750 winning percentage over his career. He had the fourth-best ERA (0.88) in NCAA Division 1 in 1987. His single season 0.88 ERA still ranks in the top five in the Harvard Crimson record books.
Coach Curtin holds an A.B. in Economics from Harvard University and also earned his M.B.A. from the Boston College Carroll School of Management with a concentration in Computer Science and Finance.
Kevin is married to his wife Eileen and they have five adult children-Michael, Kerry, Dan, Shaun, and Meghan.
