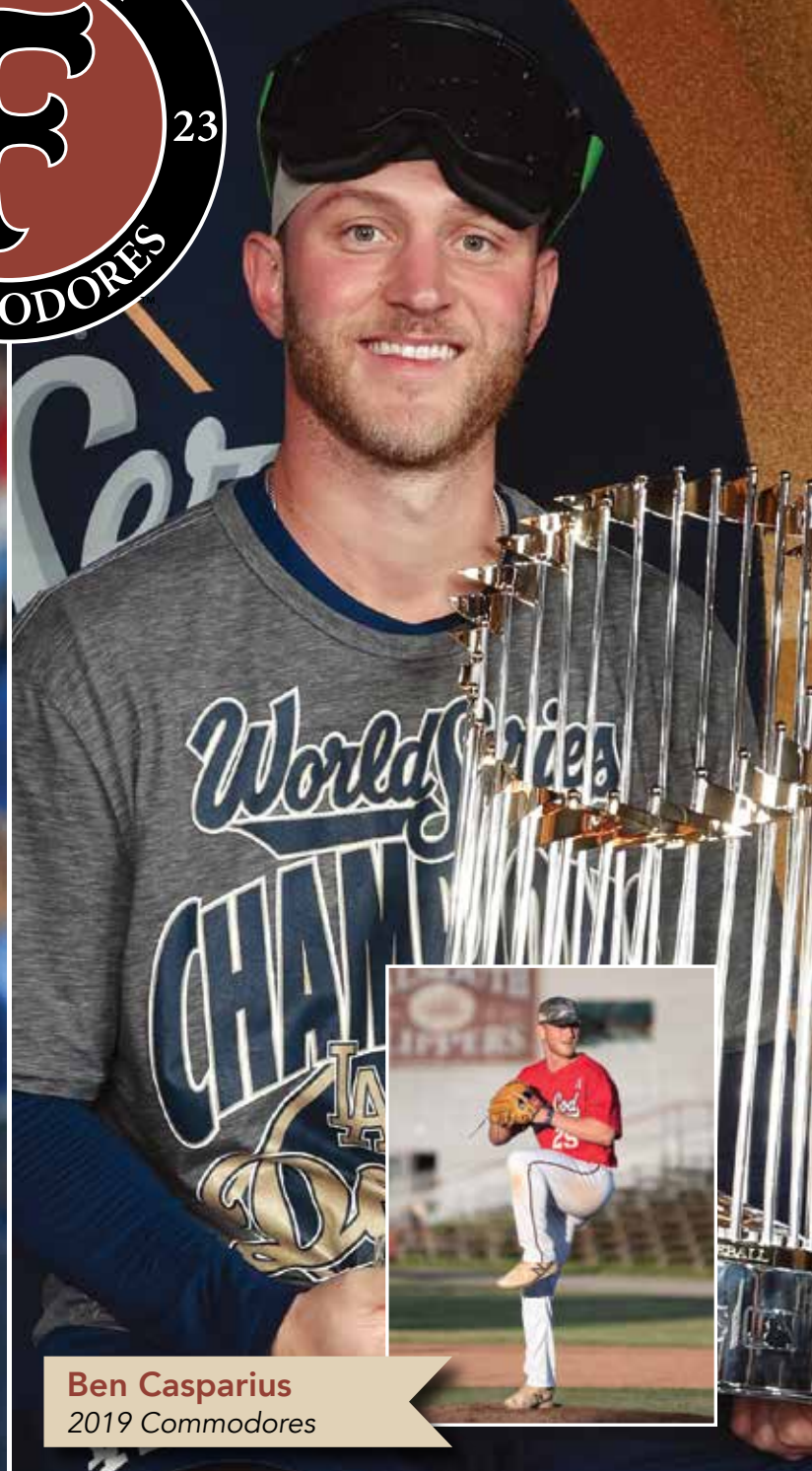

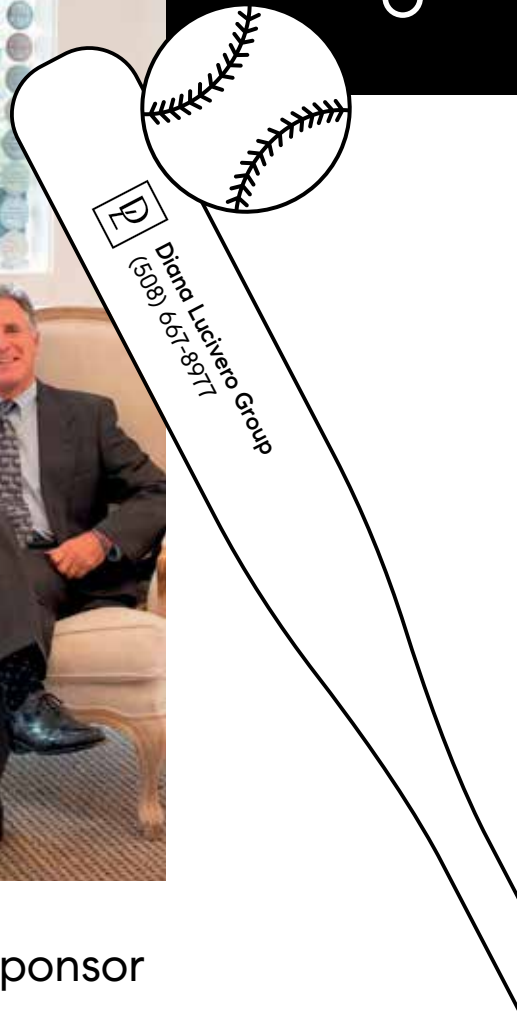

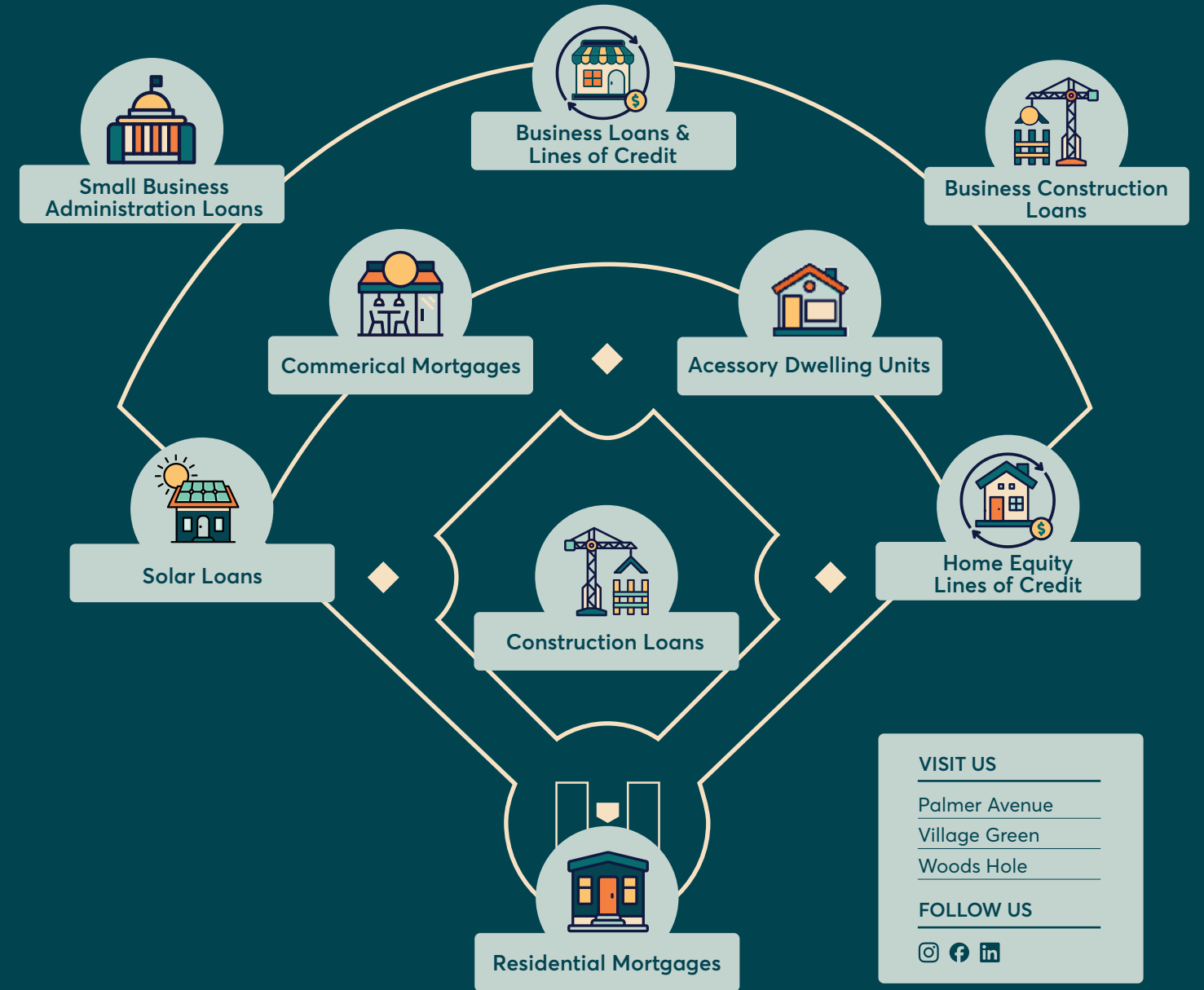

# FROM THE PRESIDENT



Summer is just around the corner, and soon we'll be back at Guv Fuller Field enjoying warm Cape Cod nights, the crack of wooden bats, and cheering on our hometown team. Few things capture the spirit of summer in Falmouth quite like a Commodores baseball game. I am excited to return to the Commodores as President after serving the past two years as Deputy Commissioner of the Cape Cod Baseball League and previously spending six seasons as General Manager here in Falmouth.

This season you'll see both new and familiar faces at Guv Fuller Field this year. Field Manager Jack Dahm will lead the team in his first year as Falmouth's new head coach. Coach Dahm brings 31 years of head coaching experience in collegiate baseball, including 20 years at the NCAA Division I level and five years managing in a collegiate summer league. The success of our program continues to speak for itself. Twenty-one Commodores were selected in the 2025 Major League Baseball Draft, including three first-round picks. Seven Commodore alumni, representing five countries, competed in this year's World Baseball Classic.

On the field last summer, the Commodores led the league with nine players selected to the 2025 Cape Cod Baseball League All-Star Game, highlighted by 2025 CCBL Most Valuable Player Maika Niu. In addition, two players were named First Team All-CCBL, two earned Second Team honors, and three were selected to the Third Team.

These accomplishments reflect the elite level of baseball played each summer here in Falmouth.

We are proud to represent the Cape Cod Baseball League – the premier collegiate summer league in the country – while delivering an exceptional experience for our local community of Falmouth and the surrounding area.

I look forward to seeing you at Guv Fuller Field this summer, where the stars of tomorrow shine tonight!

To the fans who travel from near and far, thank you for your support! Your presence allows the Cape Cod Baseball League to remain the undisputed best summer collegiate league in the United States.

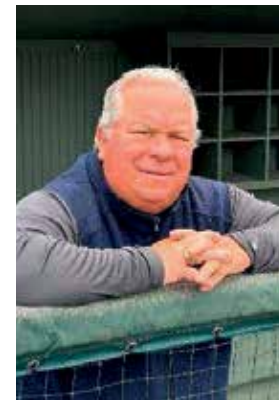

Thank you for welcoming my family and our staff to the Commodores organization. We're looking forward to a tremendous season and can't wait to see everyone at the ballpark.

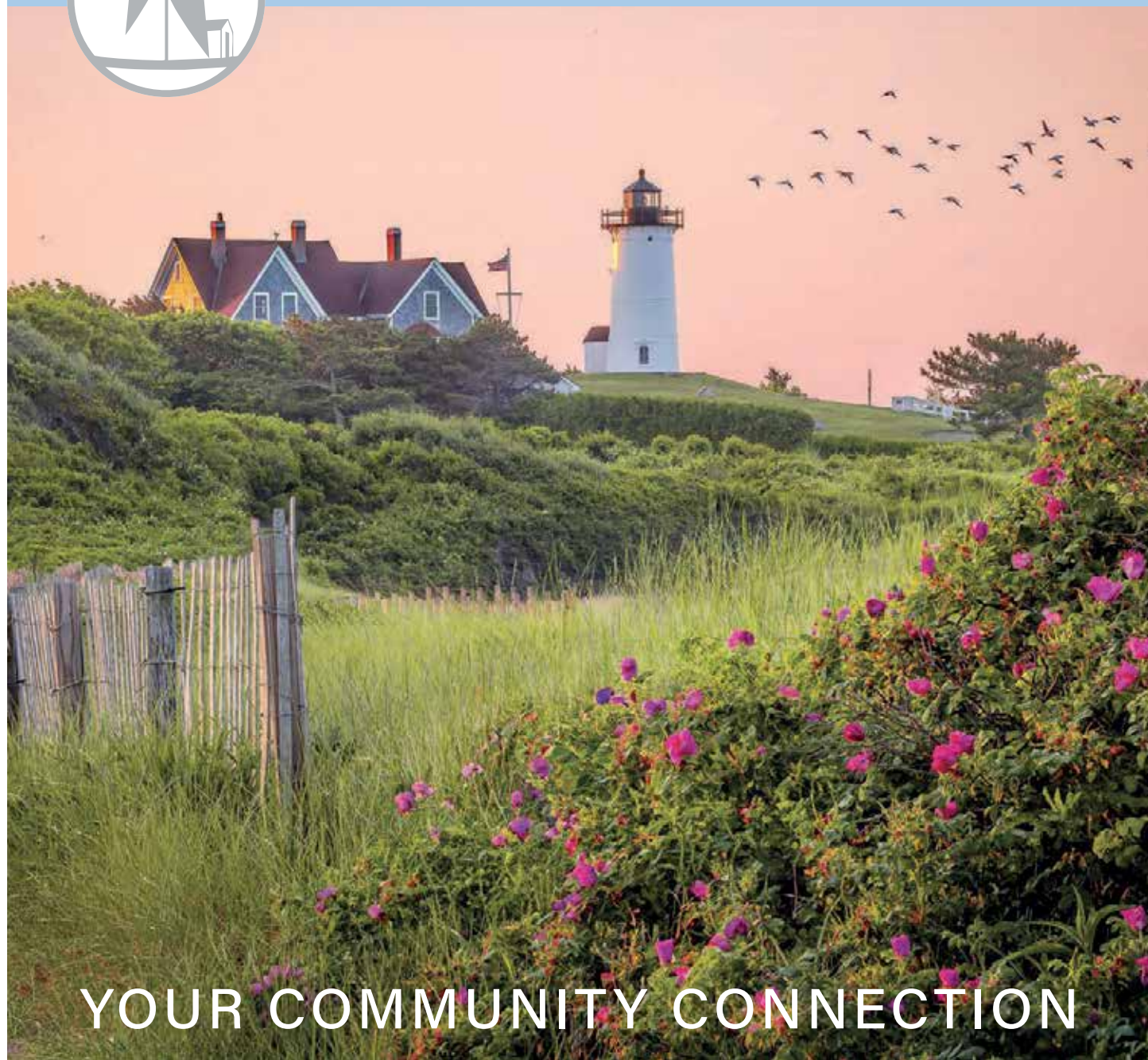

## BOB CURTIS Retires After 18 Years with the Falmouth Commodores

After nearly two decades of unwavering service, Bob Curtis retired as President of the Falmouth Commodores. Curtis, who was succeeded by former General Manager Chris Fitzgerald on January 1, 2026, leaves behind a legacy that transcends the win-loss column at Guv Fuller Field. His tenure was defined by infrastructure improvements, community integration, and a commitment to the "Commodores Way."

### Guv Fuller Field Enhancements

Curtis successfully navigated the complexities of fundraising and municipal partnerships to raise over \$1.5M for capital improvements and team operating expenses. Major projects included installing professional-grade dugouts and a modern backstop/safety netting system at Arnie Allen Diamond. In addition, the deteriorating wooden bleachers were rebuilt with aluminum bleachers and the visiting team bleachers were expanded. These initiatives greatly enhanced the safety and accessibility to the field for the players, fans, and others who use this public recreation facility.

### Stewardship through Historic Milestones

Under Curtis' leadership, the Commodores organization presided over some of the most significant moments in the team's recent history:

**The Centennial Season:** Curtis led the organization through its landmark 100th-anniversary celebration in 2023, kicking off the festivities with a donor appreciation event at the Pocasset Golf Club. The evening featured legendary sports journalist Peter Gammons as the guest speaker and was attended by alumni like Ace Adams and 2018 Cape Cod Baseball League Hall of Fame inductee Cliff Pennington. Guests enjoyed a curated display of artifacts from the Cape Cod Baseball League Museum, participated in a silent auction, and received a commemorative centennial coin.

Before the July 15, 2023 game, the Falmouth community gathered for a festival at Guv Fuller Field. The celebration was officially opened by Falmouth's newly appointed Police Chief, Jeff Lourie. The day featured live music by the Puffy Elvis band, a dunk tank, a pie-eating contest, player autograph sessions, and 25-cent hot dogs as a throwback to earlier days.

Before the evening game against the Chatham Anglers, Curtis accepted official citations on behalf of the organization from both the Massachusetts State Senate and the House of Representatives.

**All-Star Saturday:** In 2024, Curtis brought the Cape Cod Baseball League All-Star Game back to Falmouth for the first time in over two decades. The monumental all-day event drew over 5,000 guests who experienced the electric atmosphere firsthand.



The day featured several highlights for fans of all ages. Kids lined up in droves for a chance to get player autographs. Six different food trucks and the Commodores concession stand kept the crowds fed throughout the day. The Cape League's best hitters faced off in a high-stakes Home Run Derby. The main event was the All-Star Game, where the best players of the East and West divisions battled it out on the field.

### The Heart of a Host Family

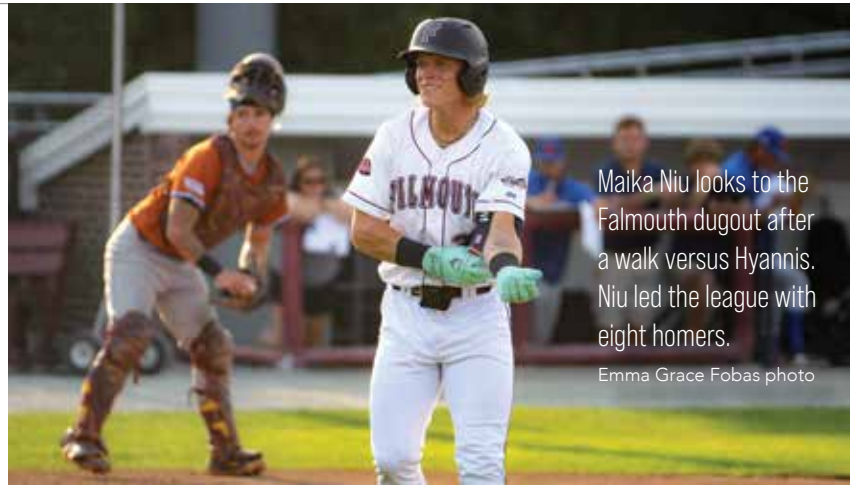
The impact that Bob Curtis left was not limited to administrative duties. Along with his wife, Donna, he has served as a host family for players since 2007. Over the past 18 years, they have hosted 45 players at their

home. Some of these players included future MLB stars like Chad Bettis, Nick Martini, and Seth Elledge.

As a host family, Bob and Donna did far more than provide meals and a place to sleep – they welcomed players into their family. From homemade Sunday-morning cinnamon rolls to boat outings and trips to Boston, they created lasting memories. Those connections have endured. They keep in touch with many former players and are often included in their major life events.

Curtis thanks the volunteers he has worked with for their contributions over the years that have made the Commodores one of the preeminent teams in the Cape League. By building robust relationships with local sponsors and prioritizing community, he ensured that the team remained a pillar of Falmouth's summer identity.

# Reviewing Falmouth's 2025 Season

Falmouth hired former MLB catcher Jarrod Saltalamacchia as its manager, hoping to improve from a fifth-place finish. But its 2025 campaign was a rollercoaster.

The 'Dores started slow. Though they opened with a 1-0 shutout of Chatham, the Commodores dropped six of their next eight, including a three-game losing streak to Wareham, Yarmouth-Dennis, and Hyannis. Then, Falmouth won eight of the next 12. It snapped its skid by defeating Bourne and Harwich, and its offense finally turned the corner. In eight of the Commodores' next 11 games, they scored five-plus runs. They downed Chatham 9-7, beat Bourne 8-6, and claimed a 10th-inning victory over Harwich.

During that span, Falmouth was propelled by numerous

offensive standouts. Maika Niu hit a league-high eight homers. He won the Cape Cod Baseball League MVP. Georgia Tech's Kent Schmidt and California's Carl Schmidt also impressed. Kent led Falmouth with 24 RBIs. Carl batted .284 with a .358 on-base percentage. The three were half of Falmouth's six All-Star position players (nine total), which also included outfielder Antonio Morales, catcher Bear Harrison, and infielder Adrian Lopez.

Once star arms like Kaden Echeman, Grayson Saunier, and Trever Baumler left, issues caught up to the 'Dores. After beating Cotuit on July 11, Falmouth went on a four-game losing streak. Later, it embarked on a six-game skid, plummeting it to fifth place in the West with five games left.

Falmouth perked up briefly, demolishing Hyannis and producing a comeback victory over Chatham. The 'Dores also downed Wareham in their penultimate game, setting up one final matchup with Cotuit. It was a win-and-in scenario to make the postseason in their final regular-season game. Unfortunately, Falmouth never pulled ahead by more than one run versus Cotuit, which claimed a 6-5 10th-inning victory. The Commodores finished the season with a 16-23-1 record, missing the playoffs in Saltalamacchia's lone year with Falmouth.

# Falmouth – a launchpad for two LA Dodgers World Series winners

Justin Wroblewski and Ben Casparius first crossed paths during college conference play, and again in 2019 as teammates with the Falmouth Commodores. Both are World Series champions with intriguing stories that mirror each other in several fascinating ways.

Ben was the superstar of Staples High School, setting the all-time hits record for the state of Connecticut while being the “go-to

guy”, per coach Jack McFarland, on the mound for the Wreckers. He led the program to a 2017 state championship and won the Connecticut Gatorade Player of the Year award for his efforts. His two-way ability as a “lights out” right-handed arm and a power bat with a strong frame attracted scouts from 25 of 30 Major League teams by his senior year, but much like Justin, Ben decided to trek to the Atlantic Coast Conference and begin his college career at the University of North Carolina.

Justin was the proverbial “prodigy” for Sequoyah High School – a small school located in his hometown of Canton, Georgia, not known to be a “traditional powerhouse” in his own terms. Nonetheless, he spearheaded a Cinderella run to the state playoffs in his senior year, picking up Honorable Mention All-State and First Team All-Region Team MVP honors on the way. He was selected by the Seattle Mariners in the 36th round of the 2018 MLB Draft, but opted to honor his commitment to Clemson University and pitch for the Tigers, beginning his college career a year after Ben.

For the first time, Wroblewski and Casparius found themselves on a collision course, eventually meeting in the second week of conference play for a three-game set. Wroblewski’s Tigers got the better of Casparius’ Tar Heels, sweeping the eventual ACC Tournament champions. Although Wroblewski didn’t appear on the bump, Casparius contributed an RBI in his six at-bats over the weekend.

That wasn’t the only parallel between the two, however. After showing young promise, both began to falter in 2019, with Wroblewski getting rocked for a 10.38 ERA and Casparius tossing to a 4.41 ERA of his own – a far cry from the sub-2 average he posted in his freshman season the year previous.

After their rocky 2019 seasons for the Tigers and Tar Heels, Wroblewski and Casparius took their talents to Falmouth during the summer of 2019. Unfortunately, Ben would have a short stint, only pitching one inning-long appearance that season, but Justin shined, striking out 22 batters in 23.1 innings and helped the Commodores to the top spot in the West Division and a 27-15 regular season record.

After having a summer to iron themselves out, both hurlers opted for a change of scenery for their next years of college. Justin went to the State College of Florida, Manatee-Sarasota and overcame

a jaw injury that required his mouth to be wired shut to emerge as one of the best junior college products in the nation, fanning 27 batters in 18 and two-thirds innings to accumulate a 2.89 ERA before the COVID-19 pandemic shut down the rest of his season. Ben, now focused on developing as a pitcher, transferred to the University of Connecticut and sat out the 2020 season due to transfer rules at the time.

2021 was the breakthrough for both. Justin earned himself a scholarship to Oklahoma State and made eight starts for the Cowboys, pitching to a 4.20 ERA in 40 and two-thirds innings. His signature performance was seven innings of one-hit ball against Grand Canyon, striking out 13 in his 103 pitch outing. OSU finished with 36 wins that season and an at-large bid to the NCAA Tournament. Ben was the no. 1 starter for UConn, racking up 127 punchouts that season – the 12th highest mark in the nation. He was an integral part of the Huskies’ Big East Tournament title run, tossing seven shutout innings against Creighton to advance them to the championship series.

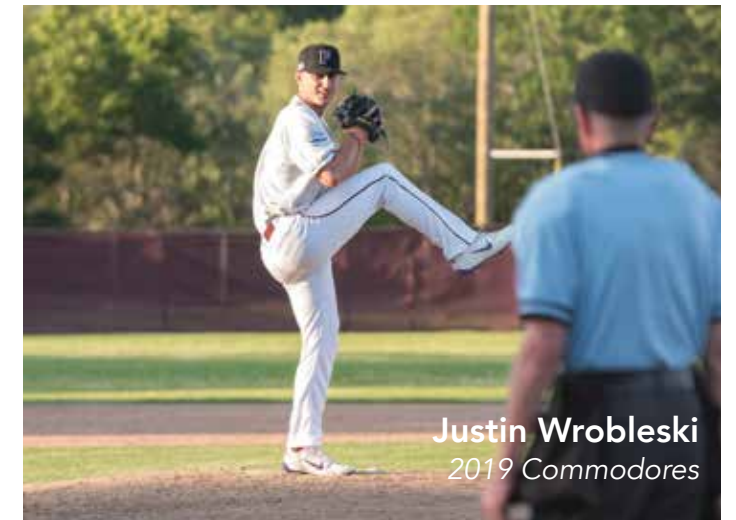
Both would hear their names called by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 2021 Draft, Ben going in the fifth round and Justin following suit in the 11th. Soon enough, former ACC foes would be wearing the same uniform, as they were sent to the Arizona Complex League.

Ben and Justin climbed up the Minor League ladder at nearly parallel speed. Ben spent 2022 in A-ball with the Rancho Cucamonga Quakes and the Great Lakes Loons, pitching nearly 90 innings in 27 appearances across both levels. Justin spent the whole year with the single-A Quakes, posting a sub-3 ERA before moving up to high-A with the Loons the year after.

The two would spend part of 2023 on the same roster before Casparius ascended to double-A Tulsa. In that year, he boasted a 6-7 record in 26 appearances. Wroblewski was an even .500 with the Loons, pitching to a nearly identical ERA he had at the previous level.

The duo made rapid jumps in 2024, going from Tulsa to triple-A Oklahoma City, and eventually got the call from Dave Roberts and the Dodgers to make their debuts in The Show. Justin trekked to Milwaukee on July 7 to make a spot start for Los Angeles, pitching five innings in a Dodger loss to the Brewers, but struck out Willy Adames during the best season of his career for his first Major League strikeout. Casparius was promoted a little over a month after and debuted against the Arizona Diamondbacks on August 31, tossing a scoreless inning of relief to earn the win. Just 30 days later, his bullpen counterpart in Justin hurled his first career save against the Colorado Rockies, recording the final 12 outs of the contest.

Injuries to the Dodgers pitching staff gave way for Ben to join the

postseason roster during the Divisional Series against the San Diego Padres. He tossed six and a third innings in the playoffs, surrendering his only run to the New York Yankees in the World Series, who Los Angeles defeated in five games to become world champions.

Both Ben and Justin made the 2025 Opening Day roster for the Dodgers and re-established themselves in the bullpen for the best team in the National League West. Casparius had a 7-5 record for the Dodgers and struck out 71 batters, while Wroblewski was 5-5 in 24 games with 76 punchouts. The latter was a crucial part of LA’s World Series victory over the Toronto Blue Jays, pitching five scoreless innings to earn his first ring. Wroblewski is off to a great start for LA in 2026 with a perfect 4-0 record and a 1.50 ERA in 30 innings so far, while Casparius continues to settle back into the bullpen.

# The Mount Rushmore of Boston Globe Sportswriters at Guv Fuller Field

Between them, they've been inducted into 11 halls of fame, won two JG Taylor Spink awards, written numerous New York Times bestselling books and been awarded more sportswriter of the year awards than you can count. These are just some

of the accolades piled up by whom many deem the "Mount Rushmore of Boston sports writing." On Tuesday, Bob Ryan, Peter Gammons, Leigh Montville and Dan Shaughnessy stopped by Guv Fuller Field here in Falmouth to watch the Commodores take on the Cotuit Kettleers.

Ryan, a longtime writer for the Boston Globe, shamefully admitted that this was only his second Cape League game, and claims that the "hole in my athletic soul living in Boston all these years has been the Cape League." Although he says he isn't very familiar with the league, according to Ryan, "the league's reputation obviously precedes itself." What struck Ryan's eye, however, wasn't a difference in the play on the field, high level baseball is high level baseball no matter where you look. What stuck out to him was the lack of change. "The only thing was the people with the lawn chairs on the hill, people enjoying the game outside the bleachers, I guess as part of the Cape League charm," Ryan said. If nothing else, he perfectly described "Cape League charm" with that statement. Not unlike the Cape League, the northeastern icon has a prestigious reputation of his own. Throughout his time covering the 18-time NBA champion Boston Celtics, Ryan quickly found his niche in a way few writers ever accomplished, developing relationships with players well enough to be included in team dinners, becoming a big enough voice to have referees take time during a dead ball to explain a call to him and even being referred to as "the commissioner" by his colleagues. Even as a basketball-oriented guy, Ryan's range of

coverage includes 20 NBA Finals, nine World Series, five Super Bowls and seven Olympics. I dare you to find a resume that compares.

However, if you're looking for the Cape Cod Baseball League expert, look no further than Peter Gammons. Anyone who respects the history of both baseball and the written word likely holds Gammons in higher regard than almost any man in history. He is a winner of the JG Taylor Spink award, given by the Baseball Writers' Association of America, an award which many believe to be the most prestigious achievement possible for a sports journalist.

For Gammons, the Cape League presents a version of baseball other avenues of the sport simply cannot offer. "I always look for, which is one thing every scout should look for as well, is how much a player loves playing baseball." He says his preference for the Cape League over NCAA ball is the freedom of the

players. "I think they're freer. One of my major complaints about college baseball coaching is that the coaches are too controlling of players," Gammons said. He believes that these are grown men, and they should be allowed the freedom to play the game the way they deem necessary.

Throughout my discussion with this living legend, I quickly came to realize how he not only climbed the mountain but has stayed atop it for so long: He's got the memory of an elephant, the vocabulary in his writing is comparable to that of historic poets, and he has a love for the game of baseball that few have ever known.

As far as pure writing skill is concerned, you'd be hard-pressed to find a better author than Leigh Montville, who has as many NYT bestselling books as a half-inning has outs, as well as six other successful authoring jobs. He has written biographies on some of the biggest names the wonderful world of sports has ever offered, including the likes of Babe Ruth, Ted Williams, Muhammed Ali and even Dale Earnhardt Sr. For Montville, he takes the approach of 'never worked a day in my life' to his job, saying that "you never think you're working, even when you are." While a lot of people say that, it's evident to me that the same opinion will always ring true in the sports world. Montville pointed out the fact that no matter what sport, and no matter what venue, everyone always seems to want to be there. It's something that not many office buildings in America can say, when everyone from top to bottom is exactly where they'd like to be. Montville says his biggest influence in terms of athletes is undoubtedly Ted Williams, the man who not only fought two wars, but managed to find time to bat .406 in between them. Some of these men have made their money through the newspaper, others through television, others have even written books themselves. But when it comes to sports literature, Leigh Montville is more than likely your favorite author's favorite author.

Dan Shaughnessy represents the fourth leg of this historic sporting media stool. The 14-time Massachusetts Sportswriter of the Year built his legacy by becoming a perfect representation

of Boston media: unforgivingly critical, and an unprecedented drive to deliver the truth for not only Bostonians, but all New Englanders and Americans. Another JG Taylor Spink award winner, Shaughnessy holds a level of prestige among baseball

writers that most aspiring journalists could only dream of. As far as his take on the Cape, he feels it gives advantage to everyone involved with big-time baseball. For scouts, it's a chance to see which players can and cannot hide behind the aluminum lumber, and who actually has power when swinging a wooden bat. For coaches, they enjoy their respective players getting the opportunity to continue sharpening their iron and working on their craft for the summer. For players, it's a chance to take in the fair weather, astounding coastline views and enjoy the greatest of what a young, American summer has to offer.

These four men have seen more baseball than most of us would be lucky enough to watch in five lifetimes, and for decades they have been both the literary and television voices of one of the hardest media markets in the world. Boston expects winners, Boston expects the truth, no matter how harsh, but most importantly, Boston expects the best of the best, be it on the field or off. If I had to offer you one takeaway from my time with these legends, it's that Boston can hang its hat on knowing these four have delivered on all three of those, and then some.

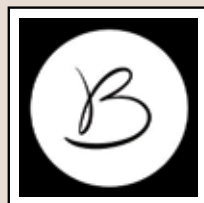

His extensive baseball resume includes his current position as the head baseball coach for Mount Mercy University in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. He joined Mount Mercy after serving as head coach of the Iowa Hawkeyes from 2003-13. At Iowa, he led the Hawkeyes to the Big Ten Tournament three times. They finished second in 2010, their highest finish in the tournament since 1982. Prior to his tenure at Iowa, Dahm was the head coach of the Creighton Bluejays from 1993-2003. The Bluejays made back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 1999 and 2000, and Dahm was a two-time Missouri Valley Conference Coach of the Year in 1999 and 2002. He compiled 800 career wins while coaching at these schools, as well as numerous tournament appearances.

As manager of the Clinton Lumberkings, a collegiate summer team playing in the Prospect League, since 2021, Dahm led the team to the playoffs four out of five years and won the Northwest Division Championship twice. He has also served as a baseball analyst for the Big Ten Network and is general manager for Dahm Baseball 10, LLC, which operates youth baseball leagues, camps and private lessons.

Advising for Elite Sports Advising.

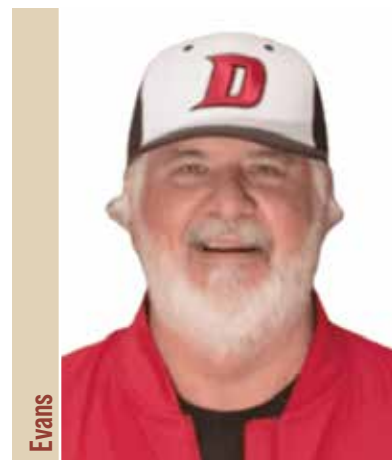
McMillan recently spent 10 years as associate head coach at Palm Beach Atlantic University. He spent a total of six seasons on the coaching staff at his alma mater, Lynn University, in Boca Raton, Fla., where he was a part of the staff for the Fighting Knights' NCAA Division II National Championship team in 2009. In his first year coaching LU, he oversaw eight team offensive records shattered as LU won its first national title.

McMillan began his professional career with the Gulf Coast League Marlins before being twice promoted to the Jamestown Jammers of the New York Penn League and the Greensboro Grasshoppers of the South Atlantic League. He later advanced to the Marlins' Triple-A affiliate, the Albuquerque Isotopes.

Following his playing career, he worked with Perfect Competition, a company that promotes performance enhancement, skill and professional development, and sports nutrition.

A 2004 graduate with a degree in business administration, McMillan resides in Delray Beach.

## Paul Evans ASST. HITTING COACH



Paul Evans is the new pitching coach for the Commodores. In 2023, Evans transitioned to the role of special assistant to the head coach at Missouri State University after spending 34 seasons as the Bears' pitching coach. A Central Illinois Collegiate League and Cape Cod League hurler in his own

playing days, he returned to Cape Cod as pitching coach at Yarmouth-Dennis and now the Falmouth Commodores. A total of 67 hurlers signed pro contracts under Evans' tutelage, with 14 advancing to the Major Leagues.

Additionally, Evans has seen three Bears selected to pitch for Team USA. Furthermore, MSU pitchers have been tabbed for first-team all-conference honors 26 times during Evans's tenure in Springfield, with 15 different hurlers claiming All-America recognition.

Evans, who is a Missouri Sports Hall of Fame Class of January 2021 inductee, led a star-studded Bears staff that featured three All-Americans who helped power MSU to a school record 49 victories and the program's second NCAA Division I Regional crown in 2015. This earned him D1Baseball.com's National Assistant Coach of the Year award following that season. Over the past 14 years, Evans has helped develop four of the highest MLB Draft picks in MSU history.

In 2012, Evans guided a dominant Bears' pitching staff that posted the best team ERA (2.57) in the country, while ranking fifth in Division I with 537 strikeouts. Both marks shattered previous MSU team records, as did the Bears' 11 shutouts, which also led the nation. The Bears' 2013 staff was nearly as impressive, posting a 3.12 ERA for the season, good for the third-best in program history.

A native of Granite City, Ill., Evans played football and baseball at South High School. He pitched his American Legion teams to back-to-back state runner-up finishes and had a 50-8 combined career record in high school and the American Legion. He gained Illinois all-state honors in baseball while in high school and, in 2000, was inducted in the Granite City Sports Hall of Fame.

Evans was 18-7 at Southern Illinois before graduating from SIU in 1981. His 0.84 ERA as a sophomore was third in NCAA Division I. Additionally, his nine career saves still rank ninth all-time at SIU.

## Tyler Young GENERAL MANAGER



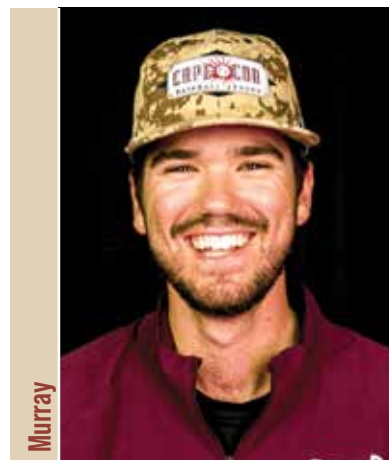

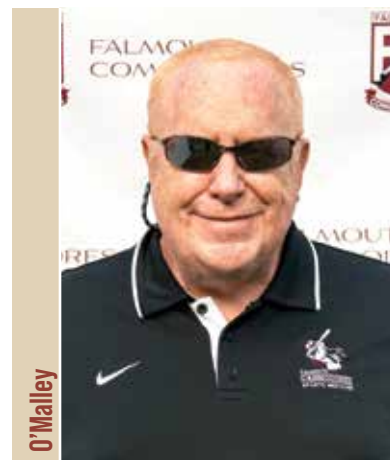
**Brendan Driscoll**

# Falmouth players shine in CCBL All-Star Game

The Cape Cod Baseball League took a much-needed All-Star break on Saturday, July 19, in Yarmouth-Dennis.

But Falmouth was busy at the festivities. Along with the Cape League home run leader Maika Niu swatting six long balls in the Home Run Derby, the Commodores had a league-leading nine players suit up for the All-Star Game.

The 'Dores had four starters selected — pitcher Trevor Baumler, outfielders Niu and Antonio Morales, and first baseman Kent

Schmidt. They also added five reserves in infielders Adrian Lopez and Carl Schmidt, catcher Bear Harrison, and relievers Jakob Schulz and Joe Sabbath.

These Falmouth players earned an invitation to be a part of the 2025 CCBL All-Star team:

**Trevor Baumler, RHP, TCU:** Baumler was selected as the West's starting pitcher because of his stellar start to the season. During the Commodores' first 28 games, he posted a 0.92 ERA, allowing just two earned runs through five appearances (three starts).

**Maika Niu, OF, Arkansas:** Niu's spot as the West's starting center fielder was a no-brainer. He entered the All-Star break leading the Cape League in OPS (1.032), slugging percentage (.630) and homers (seven), while also tying for the top spot with 20 RBIs.

**Antonio Morales, OF, Maryland:** Morales entered the break slashing .255/.366/.287, operating mostly out of the number two spot in the lineup. He also impressed defensively. He was the best of the bunch at the All-Star Game, snagging the West All-Star Game MVP.

**Kent Schmidt, 1B, Georgia Tech:** Schmidt was selected to start at first base for the All-Star Game. Though he started the season off slow, he upped his numbers to a respectable .282/.367/.373 slashline. He also added two homers and came in clutch often with 16 RBIs. As a pure bat-to-ball hitter, Schmidt also totaled more walks (11) than strikeouts (nine).

**Adrian Lopez, SS, USC:** Lopez has played just 20 games with Falmouth due to an early head injury and missing time for the MLB Draft. However, he started hot after returning from injury. His early heroics earned him an All-Star Game bid as a pinch hitter.

**Carl Schmidt, INF, California:** Schmidt became a reliable leadoff option for Falmouth midway through the season. At the break, he had a slashline of .280/.360/.370 with one long ball and 10 RBIs.

**Bear Harrison, C, Texas A&M:** Harrison was added as a replacement to the All-Star roster. In 17 games, while rotating with former

Commodores David McCann and Mark Quatrani, he slashed .233/.304/.367. He was phenomenal defensively as well, catching eight runners stealing.

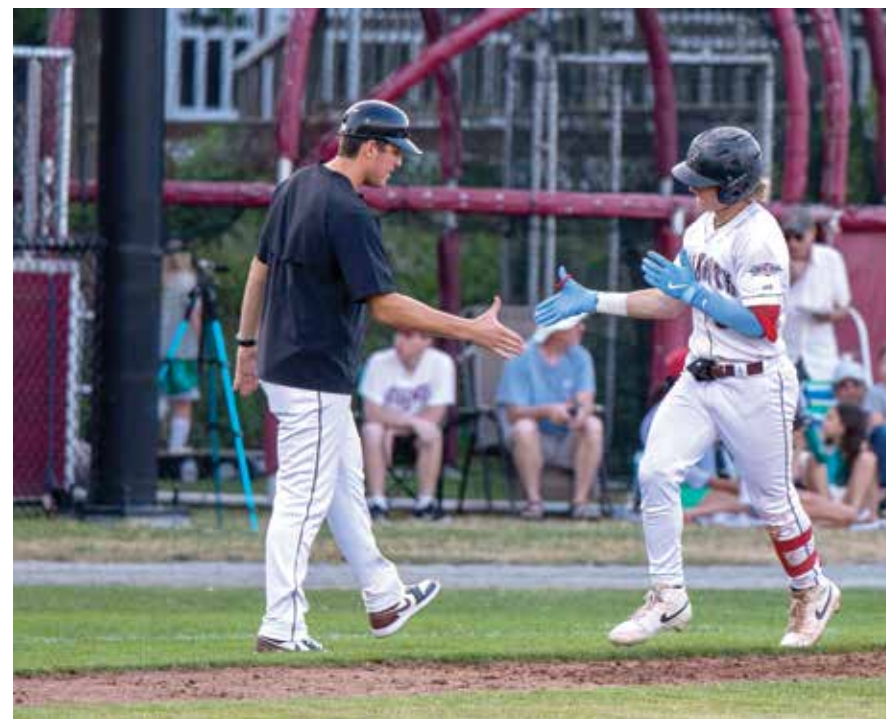
**Jakob Schulz, LHP, Vanderbilt:** Schulz has been one of Falmouth's most reliable relievers in 2025, acting as its setup man. In nine appearances before the break, he allowed just three earned runs, amounting to a 2.53 ERA.

**Joe Sabbath, RHP, Rhode Island:** Sabbath gave Falmouth consistency as its closer. In nine outings (12 innings), he posted a scintillating 0.75 ERA, only surrendering one run all year. He induced copious swings and misses, leading to his 18:6 strikeout to walk ratio at the break.

Despite the talent on the West team, the East team took home the 2025 All-Star trophy with a 13-8 win.

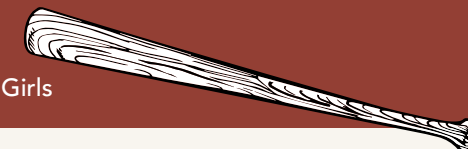

Where are they now? The Falmouth Commodores and the Cape Cod Baseball League have launched hundreds of players into professional baseball and other sports. What is frequently overlooked is the experience team interns have gained and how it has impacted their careers.

## TREY REDFIELD

**Sports Broadcaster, Local 5 News We Are Iowa (WOI-DT)  
2023 Falmouth Commodores Broadcasting Intern**

### What are you doing now?

For the past three years, I have been a sports reporter and weekend sports anchor for WOI Local 5 News We are Iowa (WOI-DT). WOI Local 5 is the ABC affiliate in Des Moines. I love sports and reporting on all aspects of sports. The local high schools and four Division 1 colleges in Iowa (Drake, Iowa State, Iowa, and UNI) provide some competitive sports coverage opportunities.

### How did you end up where you are now?

Interning with the Falmouth Commodores was great, and I thought about staying for another season, but opportunity called. Right after graduating from Syracuse University at the age of 21, I moved to the Midwest to work as a reporter for KHGI-NTV News in Kearney, Nebraska. It was my opportunity to get into the game, and I didn't want to miss out. Being from North Carolina, I found moving to the Midwest a bit of an adjustment. I now, however, have no problem driving six hours to get somewhere. Midwesterners will understand this.

Getting into the sports broadcasting business is competitive. You have to be very promotional about your work on social media and other platforms. That's what opened the door for me with the Commodores, with KHGI, and with WOI. I really believed in myself before anyone else did.

### What are your job responsibilities?

My day is similar to what it was when I interned with the Commodores. My mornings are focused on prepping for the day, whether I will be researching, interviewing, or broadcasting.



that, I get in a lift, have lunch, and am in the office by 2:00 p.m.

The first hour at work is getting organized for the day's shoot, and then whatever else comes. On the weekend, I am covering a game(s), and then back to the studio in time to broadcast the 6:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. shows.

### How did you get involved with the Commodores?

Everyone studying sports broadcasting wants to be a part of the Cape League, covering baseball. It's a coveted internship.

### What did you do while interning with the Commodores?

The Commodores' broadcasting three-person rotation differed from that of the other Cape League teams I spoke with. This setup allowed you to transition from play-by-play broadcasting to color commentary to sideline reporting. There was a game every night, so you got up to speed fast. Preparation was key. We had to do the Opening the 'Dore and Closing the 'Dore pre- and post-game segments on one take.

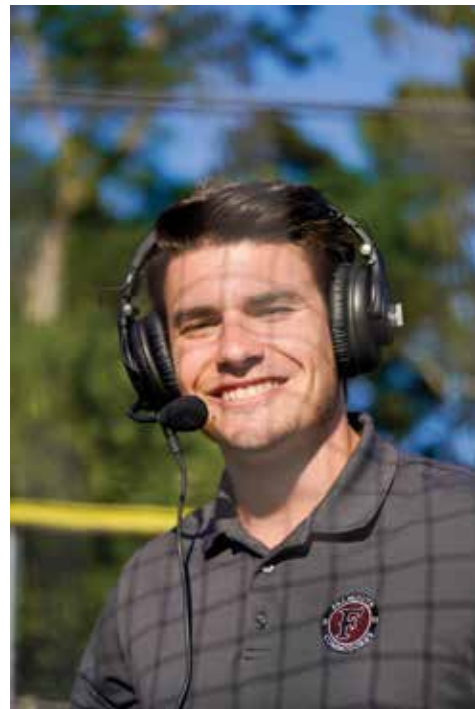
Doing some form of broadcasting every day during my internship helped me improve quickly. I consider myself a versatile guy; I can go from anchoring the news to covering a game. I learned that skill from interning with the Commodores.

Carter Bainbridge (Syracuse University), Logan Soforenko (California Lutheran College), and I were selected by the Commodores as the 2022 broadcasters. Working with Carter and Logan made for a great season. We really helped each other improve our skills. Carter is currently the play-by-play broadcaster at the University of Tennessee. Logan is working as the Communications Manager for the Mudd-Scripps Athletics in Claremont, California.

It was great to spend time with Carter and Logan in the broadcasting booth and off the field, along with my closest friend Brian Coleman. Brian and I grew up together in North Carolina. Brian interned with the Commodores for three seasons as a game-day intern and general manager intern. He is currently a graduate assistant baseball coach at Lenoir-Rhyne University. These three will remain lifelong friends.

### What advice do you have for future interns?

Know when to work and know when to play. You are in Falmouth first and foremost for the experience and opportunity of the



Commodores internship. Also, remember that people take their sports teams seriously. The Commodores mean so much to the fans. You have the privilege of delivering something meaningful to them every night, plus you get to do it in the surrounding beauty of the Cape. Pull it together 'Dores.

## MEGHAN MURPHY

**Freelance Photographer  
2020 Falmouth Commodores Broadcasting Intern**

### What are you doing now?

I'm currently based in Nashville, Tennessee, where I live with my younger brother. He's a full-time freelance musician, so we both share a pretty creative, nontraditional lifestyle. I work as a full-time freelance photographer and short-form videographer, primarily capturing content for athletes, artists, and live events. My work takes me all over, with frequent travel back to New England, which I'll always consider home. Since graduating from college, my path has been a mix of experiences that I'm incredibly grateful for, from touring across the U.S. with independent artists, to covering major sporting events and brands with featured clients in Red Bull, Adidas, Hoka, Tampa Bay Buccaneers/NFL, Connecticut Sun/WNBA, Boston

Fleet/PWHL, Boston Legacy/NWSL, and Athletes Unlimited. It's been surreal at times, and I'm still wrapping my head around having a seat at the table in those spaces. At the core of it all, what I love most is being part of someone else's story; capturing moments that might otherwise pass by and helping preserve them in a meaningful way.

### How did you end up where you are now?

It's felt, at times, like I've been moving at full speed, while at other times like I've had to pull over and regroup...maybe that's just life. My path hasn't been traditional, and it's continuously shaped by a lot of curiosity, risk, and trust in the unknown. I studied journalism at the University of New Hampshire '20, where I initially focused on storytelling through writing and conversation. Over time, that evolved into visual storytelling through photography and video. I was also a college rower, and after an injury, I picked up a camera as a way to stay connected to my team. I became the person documenting our memories, then it quickly turned into something more.

One of my best friends encouraged me to apply for a student photographer internship, and from there, I spent the next few years saying yes to every opportunity I could; covering every team on campus, learning the craft from mentors and online resources, and building confidence. That momentum in undergrad carried into other spaces, including music and live events, which felt natural given my background growing up as a theater kid around the musicians in my brother and dad.

I was drawn to the art of cultivating and capturing memories for loved ones, and being part of high-energy environments where stories unfolded. Embracing this realization and my love for travel, eventually brought me to Nashville, where I've found a strong creative and entrepreneurial community of artists who are similarly juggling many things at any given time.

### What are your job responsibilities?

My job is a mix of creative work and running a business. Before I even pick up a camera, a lot of my responsibilities start on my laptop; researching projects, reaching out to potential clients, pitching ideas, and maintaining relationships. Networking and communication are a huge part of what I do. On the creative side,



my task list includes planning shoots, coordinating travel, packing and managing gear, and collaborating with clients on concepts and shot lists. Some projects are very fast-paced and require me to show up, adapt quickly, and capture moments as they unfold. Others involve more in-depth pre-production, where we're building out a vision ahead of time.

No matter the project, the goal is to deliver high-quality work efficiently while staying present and responsive to what's happening in real time.

#### How did you get involved with the Commodores?

I have deep family ties to Cape Cod and have spent many summers working in Woods Hole and living in Falmouth with my grandparents who often talked about the Commodores. When it came time as a sophomore in college to apply for internships, I came across the opportunity to apply. I knew there was nowhere else I'd rather be than learning from, and working with the best in baseball (and hitting the beach as many days as I could). I fell in love immediately – with the game of baseball, our team, and this corner of the Cape itself. What stood out most, though, were the people. Over the years I spent with the organization, the relationships I built became incredibly meaningful and are ones I still carry with me today.



I'll never forget the small moments, like arriving at the field and hearing "Hey Megs" and a fist bump from Coach Trundy. He, and so many members of the team over the years continue reminding me that, beyond loving and dedicating to the work, it's our human connections that really matter.

#### What did you do while interning with the Commodores?

During my time with the Commodores, my responsibilities ranged from photographing all home and away games and documenting experiences on and off the field. I directed team media days to capture player and staff portraits, each year experimenting with new ideas, lighting setups, and creative approaches to make the space run smoothly and full of music and laughs. All the while, inspiring new creative concepts like an end-of-season photo book and building up my love for

storytelling. As I grew into more of a leadership role, I continued shooting while also taking on administrative projects like revamping the team's photo archive system; organizing and tagging over a decade's worth of images to make them more accessible and usable for the entire organization. Beyond the technical work, what made

the experience so special were the people and the day-to-day moments. Some of my favorite memories are the simplest ones building these forever friendships; streaming Sox games at Shoreway Acres, whale watches, rain out shenanigans in the dugout, post-game Añejo dinners and Ben & Bills ice creams, Chick-fil-A runs in Hyannis... I guess food was a big focus :) Those moments, alongside the work, shaped how I view my career today. They reinforced the idea that while the art matters, the relationships and shared experiences are what stay with you the longest.

#### What advice do you have for future interns?

I think the most important thing is to show up for yourself and for others. Self-awareness is one of the most valuable tools you can develop. Small things go a long way: making eye contact, actively listening and participating in conversations, putting your phone away, and treating everyone with respect. Kindness, reliability, and a willingness to help are just as important as technical skills. The job-specific tasks can be taught, but how you carry yourself and treat people will define your experience and reputation. Also, take care of yourself. Get rest, stay hydrated, pause to absorb the moment for yourself, and be honest when you make mistakes because you will, and that's part of the process. You don't have to say yes to every opportunity, but when something aligns with your passions and challenges you, it's worth leaning into. Growth isn't linear, and things will feel messy at times. That's okay.

And on a practical note: charge your batteries, format your SD cards, keep your portfolio updated, and make it easy for people to contact you.

At the end of the day, the work matters, but the relationships you build along the way are what you'll remember most.

# Baseball Clinics

## Can you imagine learning baseball skills from a future Major League Baseball (MLB) player?

The Falmouth Commodores are proud to continue their tradition of hosting Youth Baseball Clinics for kids ages 5 to 18, offering fun, skill-building experiences led by some of the best collegiate baseball players in the NCAA. Our Assistant Head Coach, Beau McMillian, leads the youth clinics focused on building offensive and defensive skills and leveraging top-of-the-line technology.

The Commodores are offering four specialized groups this summer, including a Varsity level for players who aspire to continue their playing careers in college.

> **The Rookie Clinic**, for ages 5-7, introduces young players to baseball fundamentals, including hitting, throwing, fielding, and baserunning, through fun drills and games.

> **The Advanced Clinic**, for ages 8-10, refines skills with advanced drills and hands-on instruction from Commodores players and coaches. Players rotate through different positions and learn about offensive and defensive situations.

> **The Elite Clinic**, for ages 11-13, is designed for players with significant experience in AAU, Babe Ruth or Little League. This program includes daily infield/outfield workouts, batting practice, and 'Baseball IQ' discussions on situational play and mental approach. Individualized coaching ensures players sharpen their skills.

> **The Varsity Clinic**, for ages 14-18, is a high-intensity program for high school players preparing for the next level. Players go through a college-level workout, including live at-bats and bullpens. Using state-of-the-art Rapsodo PRO 2.0, players receive individualized video analysis of their hitting mechanics with recommended adjustments to hit for power. Additionally, participants learn how to create a player resume with key metrics to promote themselves to college coaches.

Each weekly session wraps up with Fun Friday, which features a variety of age-appropriate special experiences, including sliding practice on the Slip-n-Slide, a scrimmage with the college players, and autographs.

2026 clinics are offered Tuesday through Friday from 9-11:30am. Weekly sessions begin on June 23 and end on July 31.

The number of kids per group is limited to ensure a small player-to-coach ratio for high-quality instruction, so don't delay in registering. All sessions sold out last year.
